

Street Art Refurbishment Under Way


As reported in last month's *Kuranda Paper*, blacksmith and artist Hans Pehl is currently giving his beautiful street art iron works some much needed TLC. As demonstrated in this cute pic *(below)* by @kobutatwist on Instagram (courtesy of Kuranda Village Tourism), they have really been loved to death by visitors from around the world.

To enable the works to be carried out, some of the masterpieces will need to be temporarily removed while other work will occur on site. The work will include restoring and repairing the iron benches, rubbish bins, street signs, bollards and railings in the village. "It is a much needed revitalisation and we can't wait to see the iron work restored to its original state," Mareeba Shire Mayor Gilmore said.

"The unique street furniture and signage add so much character to the village and it's important that we maintain these assets for the residents and the many tourists who visit the village each year."

So while we may have to endure some mundane rubbish bin, bollards and street signs for a short while, residents and visitors can be assured the amazing original ones will be back. To be loved all over again.

In addition, the proposed upgrade of Therwine Street is progressing, with Council having awarded a \$1.3 million contract to JMac Constructions. This is being funded through the Kuranda Infrastructure Program (KIP) from a levy on ticket sales on train and Skyrail journeys.

Developer Tramples MSC

Should we mere ratepayers want to build a dam, make extensive renovations to our home, or start a business, there are, quite rightly, procedures to follow.

It seems that the rules and regulations are very different for one out of town developer.

In my opinion, Reever and Ocean, headed up by a Macau based developer, rode into Kuranda and is now riding roughshod over the Mareeba Shire Council.

Initially, Reever and Ocean applied for a co-ordinated project in Myola, to be called KUR-World. This was supposedly an eco resort involving some \$650 million in investment. With a huge residential component, the population of Kuranda would quadruple. Range Road Chaos anyone?

Part of that process is to produce an Environmental Impact Study which is still in progress.

Not content with that, Reever and Ocean applied to submit plans for a **high density subdivision** (under the superseded 2004 planning scheme) – Plan B, should KUR-World fall in a heap.

Again, not content, Reever and Ocean applied to MSC to obtain temporary permission for a nature based tourism operation whilst waiting for the EIS.

Having already given retrospective approvals for an illegally built dam and very extensive house renovations, MSC again bent over backwards for this developer and complied.

Operations began on 22nd December, if not before, with very little infrastructure in place. In rolled the portaloos and eskies.

If anyone can tell me what non native animals (courtesy of FuneFarm) and a mechanical bull have to do with nature based tourism, I will eat my hat.

What next – a jumping castle?

To see Nature Based Tourism at its best, Google 'Kuranda Rainforest Journeys' – a wonderful, professionally run, local operation.

What is Our Council Doing?

This community has loudly and continuously voiced their concerns regarding the development plans for the old Barnwell property at Myola. There are three current applications for approval on the same block of land by the same developer under three different business names; KUR-World, KUR-Cow and Reever & Ocean P/L. There is a \$650m resort with up to 4,400 people PLUS approval for a 222 lot subdivision PLUS approval for a 30 quad bike nature based tourism activity. All these have been applied for by the same developer on land that is currently rural, which the developer is supposedly running as a rural cattle grazing property.

It appears that the MSC CEO and our Mayor have instructed our Councillors to NOT speak with the community about these developments. Our Mayor has publicly stated in *The Cairns Post*, his support for the developer.

Yet decisions are being made and have been made that affect the Kuranda community and the viability of Kuranda businesses. In a democratic local government, our Councillors must represent the community in the decision making process. That is why we vote them in; Councillors should not be representing their own opinion, or allowing the Mayor or the CEO to dictate their vote as was the case when the CEO used his delegated authority to approve the nature based tourism approval.

There are people in this community who have been working on this issue to ensure that democracy prevails. Many in this community increasingly believe that 'something' is not right here.

The nature based tourism activity does not yet have MSC approval to begin operations YET tourists can be seen on site and developer has reported in The Cairns Post to have tourists already visiting. This unapproved start of tourism activity has been reported many times to MSC with no satisfactory answers provided.

The unelected MSC CEO made the decision to $approve the \, nature \, based \, tour is m \, without \, Councillors$ or community involvement. 298 petitions and 36 letters did not change the decision.

RSL Profile

My name is **Mick Forde** and I am currently the President of the Kuranda RSL sub Branch. We will be placing articles about our members and their careers in the Military just so that you can get to know some of your neighbours and the unusual lives that they have led.

My life in the Royal Australian Navy started in 1975 at HMAS Cerberus located at Western Port Bay Victoria about a two hour drive south of Melbourne. I joined as an Adult recruit and was trained as a Weapons Mechanic. These weapons ranged from 9mm Pistols up to 4.5 inch guns. After about a year of training I was posted to HMAS Vendetta, a Daring class Destroyer, which was my home for three and a half years as I travelled to the Middle East on three sixmonth voyages in that time and numerous trips around Australia and New Zealand. After I left Vendetta I was posted back to HMAS Cerberus as part of the Gunnery School Instructional staff for a year and then posted to a patrol boat, HMAS Bayonet which was home ported in Cairns.

After promotion I was posted to HMAS Hobart out of Sydney which included a six-month trip to the Middle East and mixing with the Russian Navy and Air force in the Indian Ocean during the Cold War. This trip also got me to Mombasa in Africa which is a great memory, especially a trip to Treetops Safari Lodge to see African animals in the wild.

During my next Promotion course at HMAS Cerberus of about a year, I met and got married to Kim – the best decision of my life. At the end of my course,

I was promoted to Petty Officer. We then got posted back to Cairns to another Patrol Boat, HMAS Townsville. This posting gave me my first experience with navigation, particularly of the Great Barrier Reef. I served on Townsville for three years that included another three-month trip to South-east Asia. Our daughter, Nikeah was born during our time in Cairns.

After another promotion to Chief Petty Officer I was posted to HMAS Darwin (which just finished service in the RAN recently) working out of Sydney in charge of seamanship on board and small arms. Our son, Russell was born during that time.

After that I was posted to a couple of positions at HMAS Creswell in Jervis Bay, south of Sydney, where I trained Officers in Seamanship, boat handling and Parade and Ceremonial. Then I was posted as Officer in Charge of a Self-Propelled Water and Fuel Lighter called Warrigal working out of Jervis Bay.

My next posting was to the Torpedo Recovery Vessel working out of HMAS Waterhen in Sydney. This was one of the highlights of my career as I was OIC of this Vessel and eight crew. We would go out to sea most days up to 100 nautical miles off the coast working with Submarines, Ships and Aircraft. On promotion to Warrant Officer I was posted back to Cairns and was part of the training group that looked after Patrol Boat, Landing craft and Survey vessels all over Australia. This required going to sea on these vessels to train and test the crews.



It's about time ... a Kuranda Historical Society

With each year that passes Kuranda has more history. And yet it also has less.

Over the years there have been occasional attempts to found a community group dedicated to collecting, collating, recording and sharing stories and items with which to honour the lives and times of those who have lived here before us. In the 1990s we came very close to even having a dedicated centre but alas we were unable to secure it.

Mareeba has a museum as does Cairns but neither have much coverage of Kuranda history, although both have resources such as photographs which could find a home here. And as different as those two cities are, Kuranda is different again.

And has its own stories to tell.

From traditional owners, to settlers, to the timber cutters and railway workers, alternative lifers, artists, scientists and of course a century plus of travellers, there are so many stories to be heard. But currently this is not easy to do. Modern technology is creating opportunities which may assist to change that and open up a world of local stories.

Last year, following the opening of the newly refurbished and expanded Cairns Museum a group of interested Kuranda residents were encouraged to explore the idea

of establishing a Kuranda "historical" society with the aim of finding a home temporary, one day, permanent) for items of historical interest pertaining to the Kuranda district. Photos, letters, documents and other items are being lost each year and with them the details of daily life. Ultimately it is hoped that one day Kuranda will have a museum, or keeping place for residents old and new and of course visitors to explore and enjoy. An online virtual museum is another possible project.

An interim working group was established late last year to approach Council to see if a space could be found to store items the public might donate or loan, as well as a space where small displays, exhibitions or events might be held. Council has responded positively and now the working group is wanting to invite the general public to get involved. The process of incorporating the Kuranda Historical Society has just begun, vital to pursue funding options. It is hoped that a public meeting will be held in April so please WATCH THIS SPACE.

The interim working group currently consists of a dozen or so local residents, with Interim President Garth Owen and Interim Secretary Gayle Hannah. It is hoped many, many residents will become involved in what could be a very rewarding community enterprise.

A message to all those currently staring at boxes of old photos, letters, documents and other bits and pieces of Kuranda history. PLEASE do not throw them away. In April it is planned to hold the first of hopefully many receiving days. So hold on just a little longer. Fantastic Fungi Part Two – Mates and Messengers

Welcome back to the fascinating world of fungi.

We've talked briefly about fungi as recyclers, and we'll now look at some other important roles of fungi. Not only are they essential for decomposing dead plant material and returning nutrients to the ecosystem, they are also important for the health of living plants.

Plant roots have limited access to some essential minerals and nutrients. They are also in many cases limited in their ability to take up sufficient water for their needs for growth and reproduction. Fungal organisms, however, consist of microscopic threads, which can grow between fine soil particles and even penetrate rocks. Through their enzymes, they are able to take up minerals in forms accessible to plants. By partnering with plant roots, they can extend the virtual reach of the plant by many times that of plants alone. The fungi can then transfer minerals such as phosphorus, nitrogen, plus water to the plant roots. In exchange, fungi receive sugars, which they need for growth. This mutually beneficial arrangement is known as a mycorrhizal partnership.

Some mycorrhizal fungi have a totally microscopic lifecycle, and so without a microscope, we are generally unaware of them. This is the case for over 90% of our rainforest trees. Others, however, have reproductive fruitbodies that we can see. These are some of the large mushrooms that we find in eucalypt forests – Amanitas, brittlegills (Russulas), boletes (pored mushrooms) and dyeballs (Pisolithus). Some are even truffle-like, in that they grow and fruit, just under the leaf litter. These require specialised spore dispersal mechanisms,

involving some of our threatened iconic mammals.

Fungi are also partners with algae in the formation of lichens. Tropical rainforests are rich in lichens, every tree bearing a great diversity on their trunks and leaves. They are indicators of a healthy atmosphere, as many cannot survive in polluted conditions.

As well as mutual partnerships with trees, fungal threads (mycelia) form underground networks, connecting trees so that messages can be passed from tree to tree. (The 'Wood wide Web'.) This allows trees to respond to threats from disease and predators, avoiding serious damage. Fungi also mediate the sharing of sugars from canopy trees to seedlings on the forest floor, keeping them green and healthy while living in deep shade.

This article has only touched on the incredibly complex, interdependent nature of fungi in the ecosystem. It is a fascinating world!





ARCH and the sometimes rough and wild weather has not only played havoc with power supply and internet, but with very) hot days and often violent downpours has also tested the mettle of keen gardeners. Hopefully, mulching has paid dividends in

keeping soil cool and moist and preventing soil compaction and run-off.

Important this time of year to carefully check possible mosquito breeding sources, with ponds stocked with larvae eating fish (the native blue-eye and guppies will not take frog hatchlings). It should be noted that pond plants and fish stock should never be discarded where they may enter water courses.

Plants fall in and out of fashion with both palms and bromeliads declining in prices and sales. Presently there seems to be an increase in interest in climbing plants suitable for totem plantings with the once avoided, as too rampant, Philodendrons and Monstera. Recently on eBay a variegated Monstera fetched an eye-watering sum of \$1,150.



PLANT OF THE MONTH: With approximately 400 species of Medinilla, family Melastomataceae, occurring in a wide sweep through tropical Africa, Madagascar, India, Sri Lanka, Southern China, Southeast Asia, to New Guinea, Australia and Micronesia, the epicentre for diversity of the genus is the Philippines.

Mainly epithetic, they are found growing in relatively high altitude tropical moist forest environments, growing as small to medium sized shrubs. This simply means that they often use a host tree for support enabling them to occupy a niche environment up off the dark sodden rainforest floor or growing high in dense fern clumps.

Making excellent subjects for pot or hanging basket in dappled light with good ventilation, a 50:50 high quality potting mix with an orchid/bromeliad mix is

suitable. Drainage should be sharp but soil kept damp. It is probably better to underwater than overwater.

Probably the best known and possibly the most spectacular is Medinilla magnifica with its long leathery leaves, succulent stems and cascading flower panicles up to 59cm long. Panicles are made up of small pastel pink or coral red flowers that are framed by paperlike, large eye-catching ballerina pink

The native interesting but somewhat rare Medinilla balls-headleyi comes from the tropical rainforests of North Queensland where it grows as a vigorous scrambling plant with long to 5m woody shoots that weave up into trees. With reddish new growth and small pinkish flowers carried on the stems, it is an attractive plant that may be pruned to size and bears and carries almost year round pink to red plump berries turning black that are edible, but more watery than sweet.



Dear Sandra, Impatiens repens is an endemic creeping herb growing in wet-zone rainforests of Sri Lanka. Easy and quick growing, it is an excellent ground hugging cover for shaded and moist places and pool sides. Disliking any hint of cold, its large yellow balsam flowers are quite showy studding the plant in the warmer months. Parts of this plant are used in Sri Lankan traditional medicine for treating epilepsy.

Dear Graham, From your description the shrub in flower is Rothmannia

longiflora which grows to a height of approximately 2-3 metres. With its dense, evergreen glossy foliage green and ease of growing with average water requirements

when established. It prefers a bright, well-drained spot with good soil and annual mulching. Its repeat warmer weather flowering of elongated, trumpet shaped cream striped burgundy blooms with interiors decorated with burgundy spots makes for a spectacular display.

Dear Caitlin, Thank you for your appreciation. Chiltern Seeds: https:// www.chilternseeds.co.uk/ with their on-line catalogue offer a good range of gesneriad seed that are easily grown and suitable for our climate. I have found germination excellent with the major


losses due to damping off so watch ventilation and drainage. From time to time, Strange and Wonderful Things carry rarer and more difficult to obtain gesneriad seed and well as seed of other exotics: http://www.strangewonderfulthings.com/

Forks Not Knives

Most of us feel uncomfortable when we catch glimpses of the realities of the modern meat and dairy industry. It's hard to witness the callous brutality of factory farming, hear the terrified cries of beasts we treat as disposable commodities — and still feel good about the way we humans make use of our absolute power over other animals.

Until recently I lived with the contradiction of sharing that negative opinion of the livestock industry, while continuing to consume its products. I got around the contradiction by entertaining the notion, which I never seriously queried, that meat and dairy were intrinsically high-quality nutritious food that I was better off consuming "in moderation", despite having moral qualms.

I no longer believe that — and to be free of what I now think was a false belief is liberating. Shopping is much faster. I simply skip the many aisles of meat, dairy and processed foods. I buy as much as possible 100% plantbased whole foods. Cooking and planning meals takes longer, especially while I learn this new style of cookery. But overall, I've found the transition from omnivore to a 100% plant-based whole food diet — without processed foodstuffs including oils — remarkably easy to accomplish. These days, I wonder only why it took me so long to make the change. For me at least, giving up coffee would be far more challenging.

My catalyst for change was the movie *Forks Over Knives*. Apparently its had a similar effect on many people. Of course, a 90-minute video can only introduce a topic, but for those interested there are copious references — books, papers, other videos etc — that can easily be chased up. I did enough of that (including checking out the best rebuttals I could find) to be persuaded that animal-free eating is not only possible, but highly desirable, and desirable not only from an animal welfare and ecological perspective but also for better human health and

Forks Over Knives focuses on the work of two remarkable Americans, both now in their 80s: Cornell research scientist Colin T Campbell, a life-long specialist in human nutrition, and cardiologist Caldwell Esselstyn whose grateful clients include Bill Clinton. Both men went through a revolution in their own beliefs, starting their careers believing the "Standard American Diet" was good — and that if anything more animal protein was optimal for optimal health. They both completely changed their minds on that as they encountered more and more evidence favouring plant-based whole food nutrition.







Kuranda's 60 70-Year-Old Hippy

THE FROG HOSPITAL will celebrate its 20th anniversary in August but will it still exist by then? We have always existed on public donations and have always struggled for volunteers. There is so much more that we need to do for frog conservation – but more activities need more manpower and more bills to be paid.

So this year will be our 'make or break' year. We cannot stay in Mission Beach and need to be much closer to Cairns. Chemical pollution is also a major factor for us and the only area in the greater Cairns region I know of that doesn't have any agriculture woven though it is Kuranda. For our group to continue, we need to be in Kuranda.

Relocating to Kuranda is more of a challenge then it seems when you run 'on the smell of an oily rag' as we have. Real estate prices are being inflated and the price of rentals is completely over the top! And almost every rental managed by a real estate agent is poisoned - whether it needs it or not. (That's why we ended up all the way down at Mission Beach.) We need to find a private arrangement with an owner who doesn't use chemicals.


What exactly do we need? It depends on whether we are able to expand and FINALLY offer a low-key visitation experience for locals and tourists (that's 'Plan A'). In that case, we need the right house with three or more bedrooms and a very large lounge area or some other 'family room extension". A house with a granny flat would do nicely.


A 'Plan B' is also being considered since we may not be able to continue to receive animals if public donations don't pick up. This past year, we've had both an expensive relocation and now the group's vehicle just had to be replaced. We have a lot of ground to make up financially. If we are forced to drop animal handling, we will retain an office, our huge website, and long-distance consults. For 'Plan B', we could function in a large 1 or 2 bedroom cottage. A share property could also work in that case such as a caretaker's cottage. However, in any case, neighbours' houses can't be too close because our live-in volunteer President also has three parrots (but no cats or dogs!).

What kind of money are we talking about? We have a potential investor interested in buying to rent to us permanently so we are looking at both sales properties and long term rentals. For a 'Plan A' arrangement, the sales price needs to be under \$360K or a rental under \$330/wk (at least for the first six months with small rises after that). For 'Plan B', a rental would have to be no more than \$220/wk and a sales property should be less than \$225K.





VENOM versus POISON

Quite often the terms venomous and poisonous are interchanged when people refer to animals that have toxic chemicals at their disposal. These terms however, actually refer to the way in which these toxins are delivered and are quite different in their meaning.

Poisonous animals are those which have chemicals in their bodies that can be distasteful, cause sickness or even death if they are absorbed into another animal's body. Eating them is an obvious way of absorbing these poisons, however some can be absorbed through the skin. There are many examples of poisonous animals, some mildly poisonous and others lethal. In the Wet Tropics region, we have quite a few mildly poisonous animals which are living in most backyards.

Millipedes have defensive poisons in their bodies which make them taste awful, and small predators may have bad reactions if they eat one. Although millipedes cannot bite or sting, having these internal poisons means that many animals avoid eating them.

Many poisonous animals have bright colours to warn others of the dangers of feeding on them. The brightly marked poison arrow frogs of South America are perfect examples. They have extremely toxic poisons protecting them, and predators avoid eating them for obvious reasons. Locally, bugs such as the brightly coloured Hibiscus Harlequin Bugs have mild toxins inside them which is enough to make most predators reject them.

Not all poisonous species advertise their dangers. Cane Toads have poison glands on the back of their heads which produce chemicals potent enough to kill most predators which take them on.

Venoms in comparison are very different. Venoms are chemicals which are intended to be injected through fangs or stings, and are used to capture prey as well as defend the animal against its own predators.


Australia has a wealth of well-known venomous species including snakes, spiders, scorpions, centipedes and bullants. Like poisons, the strength of toxins in venoms vary widely; those most potent are capable of killing humans. Unlike poisons, venoms need to enter the tissues or blood stream to work effectively. Therefore, predators can actually eat venomous species as long as they are not bitten or stung in the process. Unless the predator has a stomach ulcer (which would allow venom into the bloodstream) their digestive enzymes simply break the venom down. This is why some of the most venomous species on our planet (such as the Sydney Funnelweb spider) can be safely eaten by many other animals.



Whether or not you agree with the proposal, or with that of guns being outlawed, you would surely see the wisdom, or prescience of the ensuing comment by a mother of a six year old boy killed in the Sandy Hook School shootings in Connecticut in 2012: "It's not personally something that I support. Rather than arming them with a firearm, I would rather arm them with the knowledge of how to prevent these acts from happening in the first place". Elsewhere she was quoted as adding, "Let's talk about prevention. There is so much we can do to help this person before we reach this point."

I'm not here today to debate the gun laws in the States (as far as I understand it, half the problem is the laws vary from State to State, so if you can't get a gun in one State, you just head for another to purchase your weapon of choice). Nor am I here to debate the efficacy of gun laws here. I'm inviting you to consider the statement by the bereaved mother of a junior school child, that prevention is better than cure.

Just this week, a resident of Trinity Park and his wife were bashed by a group of young thugs who have

been roaming the streets of that suburb stoning cars and generally running riot. He suffered a fractured eye socket and a broken jaw, I believe, and the suburb is in meltdown.

We all know that, but short of unheeded cries for tougher sentencing and more Police, and various diversionary programs that individually make a huge difference and should be more vocally lauded for same, the most successful 'program' to date has been the iconic Petford Training Camp, which has rehabilitated over 3000 troubled youths and adults. Many attempts have been made

to mirror Geoff and Norma Guest's success, but failed to take into account the holistic approach the couple took to turning kids' lives around. Geoff was awarded the Order of Australia Medal and life membership of Rotary, and despite these tremendous accolades and a lifetime of accomplishments in the face of hardship, he remains one of the most humble people I have ever had the fortune to meet and befriend.

I wrote about Geoff Guest in a previous article, and here I am again, because as you will have seen from recent news, more and more people are recognising that 'Old Man' as he is respectfully known, holds the key to change. Over ninety now, Geoff recognises it's time to pass on his wealth of knowledge to others. A legend in his own lifetime, a Stolen Generation child for whom inflicted trauma left him hardly able to speak in childhood, Geoff has only ever looked forward and is a true inspiration to everyone who meets him. His history of achievements is breathtaking, his knowledge awesome in the true sense of the word.

On Saturday 10th March, at 2.30pm, the Cairns community, are invited to a public meeting at the Woree Community Hall (see ad) to outline Petford Wellness Association's (PWA)'s Petford Rehabilitation Program and to seek government support for an extensive revitalisation of the proven Petford model. This is an opportunity for our communities to come together to show support for change, a change very relevant to Kuranda's fortunes.



The New Norm

George Monbiot's December article of 2017 "Our selective blindness is lethal to the living world" has had me thinking for weeks. It's about perception and what becomes the new norm with each generation. Biologist Daniel Pauly outlined one of the most important concepts relating to our relationship to the natural world - that of the 'shifting baseline syndrome'.

"The people of each generation perceive the state of the ecosystems they encountered in their childhood as normal and natural. When wildlife is depleted, we might notice the loss, but we are unaware that the baseline by which we judge the decline is in fact a state of extreme depletion."

I'm not sure about you but I find this alarming...as Monbiot points out "we forget that the default state of almost all ecosystems – on land and at sea – is domination by a megafauna". We forget the seas should be full of huge shoals of fish and pods of whales. 'Fish huge like halibut the size of doors.' The grasslands should be teeming with herds of bison and gazelle and elephants and horses. Trees should hang with

leopards and plains with lions. The skies once were black with birds and fields white with fungi; flowers covered land to the far horizons. Insects were numberless and kept exuberant flora in check. Trees were truly massive and carpeted the earth in immense forests. The air was clean and sweet and the seas pristine and teeming with life. The soil was deep and rich, and food did not need to be labelled organic – it just

This absence, that we take for granted now, is purely through human activity. Our entitled and elitist activities that make humans 'the only megafauna worth keeping' ensures that everything else is disappearing. But are we noticing? Are our limited powers of perception realising the full extent of our losses? Or is our perception only limited to where our next take out is coming from and what the latest fashion is?

We are very lucky in the wet tropics of FNQ where in some locations over 75% of the original habitat still remains - thereby the huge changes that have happened to the rest of the country are not so prevalent. Though I do remember almost empty beaches in Cairns and hundreds more kangaroos on quiet Myola Road while driving home at night. And I'm sure there were once a lot more bats filling the night skies. However, my partner who grew up in Brisbane, remembers seeing hundreds of fish in each wave that rolled into the Gold Coast beaches while the long garfish chased them. And millions of Magpie Geese filling the skies of Townsville. I remember the beaches I visited littered with seashells and large raptors soaring the skies looking for the smaller birds to make a quick graceful meal of. Now with much of the grasslands given over to cattle those vast flocks of birds and the attendant predators are fast disappearing.

Maybe it's not so much that we don't remember or notice but rather that we too easily accept the new norms. Whichever, it's dangerous because with each acceptance our world becomes that bit smaller, that bit less wild that bit less magic.

And this 'selective blindness or passive acceptance' is not limited to the natural world. I also remember dial phones and doctors that spent more than 10 minutes with you and encyclopaedias and food that mostly didn't have barcodes, handwritten letters in the post and no internet. I remember no traffic jams, ever! But we bridging peoples are a dying breed. My daughter said the other day that she didn't know how I completed my schooling without the internet. That she certainly couldn't do it without being online! I pointed out that books and knowledge straight from wise humans worked very well for centuries and still can. But I think the age of books is fast becoming like the age of dinosaurs to the younger generation.

It may well be a strangely empty world our children will inherit. But they will probably not notice. Unless they are curious enough to look up the past – on Google.

stir well. Heat a pan and pour in peanuts mix and roast over medium heat for 4-5 minutes, stirring to avoid burning. Remove from heat and allow to cool.

Cut papayas in half and remove seeds. Cut papayas into matchsticks or use a spiralizer to create noodles. Put in a large bowl, add finely chopped herbs and chilli. Add squeezed lime juice and combine everything well. Serve topped with peanut mixture.



Coconut Lime Black Beans

Serves 4

Ingredients: 2 cups dried black beans, rinsed, 1-2 limes, juiced, 2 cups coconut water, salt and freshly ground black pepper, 1 tablespoon coconut oil, 2 green onions, greens only, sliced.

Method: Soak the beans overnight in cold water to cover. Drain the beans and transfer them to a large saucepan. Cover with 3 cups cold


water and the coconut water set over medium heat and bring to a boil. Boil for 2 minutes, then turn the heat down to low, cover and cook until tender.

When tender, add the coconut oil and lime juice and season with salt and pepper. Pour into a serving dish and garnish with the green onions.

Raw Vegan Lime Cheesecake via caseyjade.com

Serves 4-8

Ingredients: ½ cup of almonds, 2 tablespoons desiccated coconut, ¾ cup dates, 1½ cup cashews, soaked, 2 tablespoons coconut oil, melted, ½ cup coconut milk, ½ cup fresh lime juice, zest of one lime, 2 tablespoons of maple syrup.



Method: Soak cashews in cold water for at least 8 hours. Soak dates in warm water for 15 minutes and then drain the water before putting in the food processor. Add almonds and desiccated coconut to the food processor along with the dates and pulse into a fine grain Press the mixture into an 20cm spring form pan or smaller individual tins. Push down firmly until it is well compacted and even. Put in the fridge to set. This can be made the day before. Add soaked cashews to the food processor along with lime juice, lime zest, coconut oil, coconut milk and maple syrup and blend well until the mixture is smooth and creamy, scraping down the sides as needed. Pour mixture onto the base, spread evenly and sprinkle with lime zest. Store in the freezer and take out 30 minutes before serving.

Lime and Lemongrass Cordial



Method: Bring sugar, lemongrass, lime zest and 1 cup water to a boil, stirring to dissolve sugar. Reduce heat and simmer for 2-3 mins. Let cool completely. Add lime juice then strain. To serve, fill a glass with ice. Add 1 part cordial to 3 parts soda water. Garnish with fresh lime slices.

NBN Community Exercise

In a world of ever changing technology and faster internet speeds, it's amazing that there was still doubt for some localism regards to moving on with the latest technology. But for many locals a black flag which questioned their ability to connect to the NBN had them at the point of giving up, stuck in the 20th century, no way to embrace the faster speeds many others have come to enjoy. However, the weekend of February 24th was to be the light at the end of the tunnel for these locals.

Cairns Computer Support, with NBNCo, ran a field test day covering areas of Myola, Speewah and Koah. We visited several properties in the immediate area of NBN fixed wireless coverage to test (from an engineering perspective) viability and connectivity – particularly for those previously told they were unable to connect due to bad signal strength. It was also a great opportunity to provide locals with a better understanding and the knowledge about migrating to an NBN service — be it Fixed Wireless (semi rural areas), Fibre to the Node (built up areas), and for some, high speed satellite in (rural & remote areas).



Site visits covered 13 local properties which were seeking NBN Fixed Wireless, 10 of which but had previously failed pre-qualification when an installation technician visited. Our visits resulted in 9 of these as passes, which means these clients can now connect to NBN Fixed Wireless and enjoy internet speeds up to 50mbps! Only 2 of 13 site visits were a complete fail, the clients have the option of satellite NBN, another 2 sites require further investigation for non-standard installations – however, preliminary tests indicate a serviceable result! A great outcome. And some very happy people.


We also ran an information session at the Koah Hall later in the day. Great to see many locals. My colleagues from NBNCo were able to provide all the necessary information for clients to make the switch. NBNCo also had their Sky Muster Truck on display, showcasing the new SkyMuster II Long Term Satellite NBN service. Despite a rolling storm and heavy cloud cover, the Sky Muster Satellite internet service still displayed impressive speeds! Available in remote or rural areas where no other NBN connectivity is available — Cairns Computer Support can assist you to get connected!


If still unsure about connecting the NBN, feel free to contact me. Remember KURANDA your switch off date for analogue services is September 2018 - BUT don't leave it till the last minute! Talk to me today to get prepared. MYOLA, SPEEWAH and KOAH, rest assured your copper services are not being terminated, and migrating will be optional, however, making the switch would be very beneficial.

Cairns now also has three local based NBNCo employed Field Engineers

available for initial site visits or to have your home re-tested for coverage following any previous failure. I'd like to thank the guys from NBNCo who travelled from South East Queensland to join us on this day, also The Kuranda Paper for their support in raising awareness of this community exercise for locals. Feel free to get in touch with me Computer Cairns Support, Speewah on 4222 1111, NBN 'Advantage' Accredited, with local knowledge. We never say anything is impossible!

The nature based tourism is clearly defined and this activity is NOT nature based; it is farm tourism including quad bike and horse riding. Thirty quad bikes traversing the creeks in Myola frog breeding habitat??? Really???

The nature based tourism is supposed to be a temporary approval to 30th June 2018. Yet, hundreds of thousands of dollars is being spent on infrastructure, such as roads, car parking, buildings, catering, toilets, house renovations. It does not make sense to most people and raises questions about the definition of temporary for this activity.

The Planning Act provides for large penalties for non-compliance of conditions of a development approval such as these.

MAREEBA SHIRE COUNCIL HAS BEEN ASKED BY MANY RESIDENTS 'WHAT IS GOING ON', AND RESIDENTS HAVE ASKED FOR PUBLIC CONSULTATION ON DECISIONS ABOUT THIS PROPERTY.

HOWEVER, THE PROPER LOCAL GOVERN-MENT PROCESS DOES NOT APPEAR TO BE FOLLOWED HERE. AS RATEPAYERS, WE HAVE TO ABIDE THE LOCAL LAWS, WHY IS this developer DIFFERENT??? PROPER PROCESS AND DEMOCRACY IS IMPORTANT. WITHOUT IT, WE LOSE EVERYTHING.

For over 40 years, the Mareeba Shire Council have thought they know what is good for Kuranda, and they still think they know, with very little to no consultation.

The Myola area is an important connection of the north and south wildlife corridor from Daintree to Mission Beach. These developments as currently planned, cut across the corridor, breaking it in two. For over 25 years many Kuranda residents have volunteered tirelessly to revegetate this corridor and ensure survival of many precious species. This also represents the survival of what is precious in our own lifestyles and is the foundation uniqueness of our rainforest village. We must be heard if we are to ensure future sustainability.

Our community wealth can easily be undermined and transferred to developers' pockets and marketed as progress and growth. Beware, that this may only be a transfer of community social wealth to financial wealth for developers.





Should We Feed the Wildlife?

Wildlife carers do a fantastic job nursing sick animals back to health where possible and may need to use non-native food sources. But what's the impact when wild animals are fed by us? First there's the problem of feeding them food that they might never encounter in the wild and creating a nutritional imbalance, ie too much of a good thing. Then there's the impact on the ecosystem. For example, for every mouthful of non-rainforest fruit and seeds that a cassowary consumes, it is not performing its role in the rainforest. As an umbrella species its role is distributing

seeds in the ecosytem. Every meal it gets from fruit like pawpaw, bananas and mango is a meal when it is not doing its usual dispersal job. We should not be aiding with this nonnative cassowary food source if we are serious about the rainforest survival. This goes for all birds and animals. They all have a role and there is an ecosystem balance. By feeding wild animals you may preference one population which surges and causes issues for other animals within the system.

Plant of the Month – *Melicope rubra* For Gardens

The spectacular flowering with lolly pink blossoms and white stamens gives way to the collection of light green bells which split around this time to reveal up to four black seeds. There's a great example at the old Information Centre next to the Kuranda public toilets.

Their three leaflets leaf grouping at the end of stems is distinctive and somewhat narrower than its cousin, the large "Euodia". Both elleryana and rubra are host plants for the Ullyses butterfly.

Peace at Koah or Just a Pause?

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the 180-ish* people who took the time to submit an objection to the proposed increase in air traffic from a private airstrip in Koah. The increase would go from a 52 flight-a-year hobby, to a serious 365 flight a year/no engine restriction/6 flight-a-day/12 additional pilots mini airport, on a property which shares a fence line with the highest populated area of Koah (the township).

(*169 objections were received, but approximately 18 went missing in transit, we are working at getting those included in case it comes to an appeal.)

Bizarrely, the MSC town planners don't believe the 700+ movements per year will have any significant negative impacts on the area (although many studies disagree), and the noise will only effect the three houses directly adjoining the property. The town planners have recommended that the application gets approved, even though the subject site contains "State & Regional Conservation Corridors, Wetland Area of General Ecological Significance and Terrestrial Area of High Ecological Significance", and they seem to dismiss residents' concerns about privacy, safety, stressed stock, devaluation of property, as well as the existing applicant's disregard for sticking to the current conditions of use, the inability of council to enforce conditions, and further possible expansion towards commercial activities.

The sheer number of objections has attracted the interest of the media so on 21st February, at MSC monthly meeting, the room was packed with media in all its forms (and a large number of concerned residents) wanting to hear the councillors' decision on this matter. The airstrip was the first item on the agenda. After a brief silence to honour the people that we have lost the past month, the Mayor Tom Gilmore announced that the developer had asked for voting to be postponed from this months' meeting to a later date.

The media and residents were stunned into silence. Within minutes the packed meeting room was empty with only the council remaining. The media and most residents remained outside waiting for the meeting to finish to try and get some more information. The Mayor didn't have much to add besides saying that it was fine to take it from this meeting and put it on another one. The developer declined to comment on air to the media, but said he decided to postpone it due to media

attention it has received.

There are absolutely no benefits from this airstrip to the community, to economic growth, or even the council (and is in fact detrimental to the above three – who wants to buy and move to live next to an airfield?) So the residents find it strange to lift the restrictions originally put there by the Council themselves (it was the amalgamated Tablelands Regional Council at the time).

It remains to be seen if the developer has had a change of heart and has come to consider his neighbours, or if he and his team of lawyers, advisers, and planners are up to something. There are a group of residents that are willing to keep fighting this if it gets approved, and if the case of Ward & Anor -v- Rockhampton Regional council & Anor [2014] is anything to go by, they stand a bloody good chance at getting the airstrip shut down completely.

A Thought for March

THIS month Bible reading is from St John's Gospel Chapter 2 verses 13-22. Unlike the other three Gospel writers Matthew, Mark and Luke, St John hurls us into confrontation almost immediately. We are in a shouting, heaving mob. There are the sounds of stalls crashing, money tinkling on the ground, animals howling, and birds squawking. Amid it all is the angry figure of Jesus surrounded by the astonished and enraged trading community of the temple.

What is being said to us? Everything that John writes is meant to communicate on many levels. This episode, which took place some fifty years before John wrote, would have spoken in a particular way to a Christian reader of John's time. It would have pointed to the relationship between Judaism (still recovering from the temple's destruction in 70AD) and the emerging Christian community. That relationship was mostly bad and was rapidly worsening. By reporting the incident John is implying that this past confrontation still describes the relationship between Jew and Christian. What does it imply for us today?


Jesus stands for the spirit at the heart of Christian faith. The temple stands for all the wrong things which can develop in a religious system. We are seeing the clash between spirit and institution all down through Christian history. It is not necessarily a tragic clash. It is absolutely necessary if Our Lord is going to correct and cleanse and reform his church.

Times without number, in many voices and lives of great witness, Jesus has challenged his church to finer ways than it has chosen. Again and again Jesus has gone into the "temple" of many churches over the centuries. Our Lord has overturned the life of that church, making demands upon it to get its priorities more in line with his purpose.

Our task is continually to watch the patterns and priorities of the church's life, to see where it is necessary and

desirable for a judging Christ to do some overturning of us and our priorities! When Our Lord speaks of raising a temple in three days, He is saying that we can never be content with building only the institution.

We must also build the inner temple of the heart where He dwells. It is in the heart that some dying must be done, so that there we can experience resurrection. If we are ready to do the first, then the second will surely take place. As Christians we are called to the outer life of the institution and the inner journey of the heart. There are times when one must challenge the other.



Recent Volunteer Activities

With a couple of quiet wet seasons behind us in the local area, this season is turning into more of an average level of activity for our volunteers, but so far, fortunately, none of the frantic level of activity we experience during a cyclone. Three chainsaw jobs have been completed in the last month with trees landing on roofs or blocking driveways. This is the "bread and butter" work of the SES in Kuranda. After heavy rain and even a little wind, trees will come down because of the softened soil and the extra weight in limbs. Once the wet season is over it is worth getting a tree lopper in to attend to that overhanging weight above your head which may have caused you occasional worry when you look up around your house.

Shed Upgrade

The upgrade of our shed, completed in 2017, allowed us to move the garaging of our 4WD, boat and trailer into the extension, leaving the old shed to be converted into a training and operational area. Since then, the receipt of a Gambling Fund grant has enabled us to start constructing the new training area in the old shed. In recent weeks volunteers have been busy painting the new internal carpentry.
