Extra Costs on Electricity Bill

On checking my electricity account, I enquired why the carbon tax was not listed separately as is the GST.

The customer service officer advised that we do not pay tax on our electricity accounts!!

She explained that the electricity company pays the carbon tax. On my questioning further, she added that the cost of carbon tax to us has been incorporated into the cost per kilowatt usage since 1st July, 2012.

I checked further and discovered that the carbon tax cost is 9.46% for Residential Tariff 11 and 20.64% for Tariff 31 Super Economy Water charges.

An extra 2.4 and 2.5 cents/kWh may not appear much. However, that adds up over a year for every consumer.

GST is paid on the carbon tax as well which is not widely known (another 10%).

In future people will pay without realising that these extra costs have been foisted upon us for dubious reasons.

It is sad and unfortunate for Kuranda and Districts residents to see your inaction, apparent incapacity, incapability or perhaps, 'don't give a rats', attitude towards our de-amalgamation predicament, by your not being able to, or prepared to, give the go-ahead to the setting into motion a boundaries change for the Kuranda District/Watsonville Districts before these two Districts are expected to get lumped into the new MSC, against our collective wills. Nearly 80% for Kuranda and 85% odd for Watsonville of 'NO' votes, which in 'referendum' terms, I would have imagined, rates a very substantial figure, and I would have thought deserved to be listened to, or at least acknowledged, instead of the apparent, 'head in the sand' mentality, hoping the whole thing will, just, go away.

- 4. We are working on a number of exciting fundraising initiatives.
- 5. We continue to write and email politicians, asking questions and seeking action to overturn de-amalgamation.
- 6. We are now a bonafide Association so you can now officially join the KDRG as members.

AND there will be a public meeting on Monday June 3rd at 7.00pm at the Kuranda Community Precinct (old school). PLEASE JOIN US.

Political Activities: Letters continue to be written to those in power and now, rather than asking for a review of the boundaries, are focusing on getting any explanation for why only 4 councils out of 19 who applied were selected to go to the de- amalgamation vote.

Paraphrased responses received in response to this question so far:

- 1. From Ombudsman that they will forward our complaint to the Department of Local Government and Resilience. This will take 4-6 weeks.
- 2. From the Minister a standard reply that we should refer the question to the Boundaries Commission.
- 3. From the Change Commissioner –that when a decision is made it will be made public.

HELP: A simple letter example can be found on the <u>www.kurandanewdeal.com</u> website so that you may also to write to Minister Crisafulli asking for an explanation for why he selected ONLY four old council areas to go to the poll for de-amalgamation. You can also ask how the 15 unsuccessful council submissions compared with Mareeba's successful submission. And why he ignored his own EXPERT advice and allowed a poll.

Legal Activities: Very simply – we are investigating challenging the legality of the poll itself. The challenge is on the basis of the unreasonable impacts of the de amalgamation on ratepayers. This includes not only on ratepayers within the old Mareeba Shire but also on the remainder of the Tablelands Regional Council area. For we are ALL going to be severely impacted. Some impacts are:

- 1. Kuranda Ratepayers will pay, on average \$3750 over 5 years and then ongoing costs forever, even though the Kuranda community voted 8 out of 10 against it.
- 2. That rates will go up by \$872 per property to pay the \$8.2 million required to de-amalgamate the two Councils.
- 3. That the cost the new MSC Mareeba Shire Council is projected to be unsustainable and will require State funding to continue past 2014.
- 4. This process and the ongoing costs will create severe hardship for the entire region.

Adding to the weight of our argument is evidence the figures the proponents published at the time of the poll were misleading. We also believe that on the basis of the information available to the Minister at the time he acted irresponsibly to allow a poll to go ahead.

Fund Raising: We have raised over \$3000 with your support. This has brought us within arm's reach of taking the legal challenge. But to make this a reality we need to reach at least \$10,000. Two ways we can come up with this amount at the moment are:

- 1. We have a possible offer to match any donation dollar for dollar up to \$5,000 (to raise a total of \$10,000). So every dollar counts.
- 2. We are investigating running a "crowd funding" campaign where incentives are offered for people to pledge money for the campaign. It relies on all of us using our networks to build the donation momentum which has the potential to go global if we market our cause well.

There will be a presentation on how Crowd Funding works at the Public meeting on June 3rd. In the meantime please donate if you can (any amount) and encourage people to continue to donate what they can to challenge the de-amalgamation.

In the meantime, the Transition Process: Please send us your concerns, your questions – we need to be vigilant that services and regional development projects are not eroded as the de-amalgamation process rolls out. It is unlikely that anyone but us will be monitoring the Council to ensure that Kuranda and shire services are not impacted by the de-amalgamation (as required by legislation but it is hard to see they will not be). The KDRG will act as the rallying point for any Council services or quality of service you notice diminishing or are alarmed may be cut or reduced.

Kuranda Community Precinct Advisory Committee

A new advisory committee to the Tablelands Regional Council has been recently established to continue the process of advising the Council on the future of the Kuranda Precinct (the old Primary School site). Members of the committee met for the first time on 1 May and were given a detailed history of the project by Dean Davidson the Council's Manager of Plant and Facilities and local Councillor Jenny Jensen. The committee sees its main areas of responsibility as:

- To continue consultation with the Kuranda community on the appropriate use and development of the Precinct facilities.
- Based on these consultations and the data provided from the survey conducted and published in 2010/11 to produce recommendations for further development and use of the facilities.
- To assist the council in sourcing funding to achieve further development.

Committee members are well aware of the long and at times troubled history of the consultation process on this project. Whilst we are aware of the disquiet experienced by many community members by this history, we are resolved to focus on the future, and the development of a process by which a community resource of value can be developed. We are also well aware that financial, political and administrative restraints will inevitably impinge on our deliberations. In view of the de-amalgamation process for Council which will be occurring this year, our aim will be to have recommendations which reflect the community's consensus views written into a report to present to a new Council in 2014.

All members of the committee (listed below) invite feedback from members of the Kuranda community to assist us in our deliberations. We will continue to provide regular updates to the community through The Kuranda Paper.

Local Pubs Getting Serious About Unacceptable Behaviour

In an attempt to curb unacceptable behaviour in licensed premises, the local hotels and clubs have formed the Kuranda Liquor Accord (KLA) providing local venue operators the ability to ban offenders from their premises.

Participating venues include: Barron Falls Hotel, Kuranda Hotel, Speewah Country Tavern, Kuranda Recreation Centre, The Billabong and The Amphitheatre.

Rob Matthews, Chairman of the Kuranda Accord said, "If and when an offence occurs and the offender is banned from the premises, an Incident Sheet and Banning Sheet is completed and brought to the attention of the other licensed premise operators at their next regular meeting. The ban is then extended and implemented in all local venues. If banned, a patron can no longer just move on to another licensed premise. We, the licensees, are all in this together and the unanimous support for this information sharing is welcomed. Patrons need to know that we are serious about this clean up of troublesome drunks.

"Recently an unprecedented alliance was formed with 50 pubs and nightclubs including Cairns, Mareeba and Innisfail. The Far Northern Liquor Accord Alliance 'Designated Driver' campaign will be launched in a concerted effort to tackle the ongoing problem of drink driving. The move to formally unite Accords is understood to be Queensland's first. This is the first of a number of suggested reforms and strategies to improve the safety of patrons and reduce drink driving.

"Participating local licensed premises owners and managers are certainly raising the bar and want their patrons to be aware of and understand the new reforms."



Gardening in Kuranda with Alectura

UNE and slowly, silently the garden changes as the air and soil cool, growth slows and the Winter solstice approaches. Leaves yellow and Ifade away as more tender plants retire while those plants more used to cooler climes rejuvenate.

At this time of the year, the observant gardener spends considerable time just looking and pondering – the perfect place for that new plant and, where possible, reads up on the plant's origin, its native habitat or how it may be growing well in another's garden, then, where these conditions may be best replicated in one's own garden.

One's garden is a sacred space for contemplative action, an ark for animal, bird and butterfly as well as a battlefield where gardener pitches war against the elements, invasive weeds and skirmishes with marauding hordes of leaf munchers, flights of white fly, aphid and scale armies.

Where does this gardening passion come from? Go past the showy glitz of glamour gardens, the talking heads of garden gurus and at the heart, most gardeners acknowledge that a parent or, so often, a grandparent passed on their love of plants. Gardens not only link people but link the generations.



Plant of the Month: The next several plants featured here will be the moppets, the small slowly (and sometimes more rampant) spreading, filling plants to clothe bare spots and serve as carpet to taller plant furnishing.

My first choice is the Fittonia family, commonly known as the Nerve Plants or Painted Net-Leaf. Coming from Peru, all require good open well drained soils in sheltered positions with fairly high humidity. While requiring good drainage, water should be kept up in summer but resenting cold, held back in winter although not allowing to totally dry out.

With their remarkable ornamental foliage carried on fleshy, trailing stems, they grow to 10 cms and slowly spread. F. verschaffeltii has olive green leaves veined with scarlet or ruby red with F. argyroneura having dark, emerald green leaves netted with white. A seemingly tougher smaller leafed form is also available.

Fittonias are easily propagated in warmer weather from young shoots or by division and nipping out the insignificant flower spikes will result in more compact Dear Graham Bell, Thank you for your eagle eye and actioned concern in drawing attention to Ardisia elliptica, another introduced and highly invasive shrub, seeding in our public park. Unfortunately, too many plant introductions, especially those with berrying attractive to birds, are all potential risks to our native rain forests and the concerned gardener should carefully consider these risks before the introduction of any new plant, no matter how beautiful.



Dear Aleesha, Fashions come and fashions go and so with plants and garden styles. Study carefully your site, particularly in regards to drainage in the Wet and aspect as regards sun/shade as the seasons change. Make a list of what you and your family needs – a lawn for the children to play, a vegetable garden which will need maximum sunlight year round, a clothes drying area, a hen coop, dog run, a particular plant passion and its requirements and how much time you are prepared to spend in lawn and garden maintenance and a proposed budget?

Festina lente – make haste slowly is the best motto to adopt in planning your new garden. Resist rushing out and buying plants. Before turning the first sod, spend a year in turning over in the mind's eye and on paper, the basic structures and planting bones of your Eden-to-be. This will not only save time and energy but considerable satisfaction and monies saved longer term.

Join the Kuranda Garden Group to learn what grows well here, see others' gardens to be inspired and where to save on plant purchases. As well as making a new circle of friends, these forays will serve as a vicarious fix to tide you over till your work commences.

Dear Owen, Probably the largest palm seed listing is Rare Palm Seeds with a regular newsletter at: http://www.rarepalmseeds.com/index2.shtml and on eBay, Glubbia, a Cairns seller, offers a very wide seedling stock and more well established plants may be purchased from TNQ Palms, Julatten, 4094 1590 with Jan bringing stock to Mareeba Markets (second Saturday of each month) or Babinda Palm Supply, 4057 1665.

A cautionary note! Before purchase, check estimated mature growth height, think about seed fall and mowing, about falling fronds, their damage to understorey plantings and potential danger from fronds torn off in cyclonic winds. Many gardeners, caught up in the early frenzy of palm collecting have spent big bucks in removing established palm ill-planted.



Reef Walk 2013

Do you care about protecting the Great Barrier Reef? Are you a walker or can you spare some money to support a very special community event?

Reefwalk 2013 from Cairns to Gladstone is being launched on Cairns Esplanade on Saturday 1 June. It aims to highlight the impact that coal exports will have on the Great Barrier Reef. The walk is supported by Friends of the Earth and Lock the Gate.

June Norman, a 72-year-old great grandmother, who instigated the event, said "The rush to export coal and gas will continue to affect other industries such as tourism, agriculture and fisheries. This short term gain may see Australia lose its World Heritage listing with UNESCO. Now is the time to make a stand to save the reef. This is your invitation to join this walk for an hour, for a day, for a week or for the whole walk."

As many people as possible are needed to walk, either some of the way, or all of the way, to highlight the importance of this issue.

Support vehicles and accommodation will be provided for walkers. See www.reefwalk2013.com for further information and to register.

Why the Great Barrier Reef is at risk and worth saving:

The Great Barrier Reef is the largest coral reef in the world and is recognised as a global treasure, due to the amazing biodiversity which it sustains and its unparalleled beauty.

The Great Barrier Reef is one of the Seven Wonders of the Natural World.

The reef brings in billions of dollars of economic activity every year and supports tens of thousands of jobs in tourism and the fishing industry.

The largest dredging project ever undertaken in Australia was approved to occur within the Great Barrier Reef WHA, at Gladstone Harbor, and is slated to remove a total of around 50 million cubic meters of soil.

The ecosystem of the GBR is already very fragile and is facing total collapse with the added pressure of the dredging, which releases toxic chemicals into the sea.

In the past six months (the first stage of dredging) there has been a steep increase in deaths of endangered marine wildlife - six dolphins, 10 dugongs and 231 turtles have washed up dead near Gladstone on the Great Barrier Reef.

Fishermen and their families have been getting sick and have noticed that many of the fish have washed up with a strange flesh disease.

The Australian government failed to inform UNESCO of the approval of the gas facilities in the Great Barrier Reef WHA.





CD REVIEWS

Amok: Atoms For Peace 2013 XL Recordings

Like a lush electric dream from the future this first album from Atoms for Peace is a sweetly beguiling thing. While at times sounding not unlike early electronica of Eno/Byrne or 80's Detroit, there's modern sensibilities at work here. With this band it's no surprise. Radiohead's Thom Yorke, their producer Nigel Godrich, bassist Flea of Red Hot Chilli Peppers, Chilli's percussionist Mauro Refosco and star session/touring drummer Joey Waronker (REM, Beck, Doobie

Brothers, Leonard Cohen, Air, Johnny Cash & more) have manifested something ethereal, yet right of the now. A light calibrated mix of digital and live instruments layer slow burning emotion upon funky machine grooves. There's the unrushed feel of experiments "the songs go where they want to go". Melodies change slowly, hypnotically like Steve Reisch or Phillip Glass. Nothing is doofed up but it's a big sound. Waronker, Refosco, and Godrick's rhythms are syncopated chatter, urgent and vital. Flea's basslines bubble mightily, taking in dub, afro, jazz, reggae & punk. Gliding over the top is Thom Yorke's mad angel's voice, honeyed, soulful and haunted. He also plays some crystaline guitar. This intricate album is very much a sum of it's parts, easy to play right through, as each song flows on from the start. It's love and wonder being renewed against the grindstone of daily existence, aching beauty soaring over the ever forward rush of our hi-tech world.

With this high speed trip into calmness, Atoms of Peace have produced a meditation in the madness here and discovered a groovy new planet where hope is still intact.



What's So Super About Your Food?



The term 'superfood' is becoming far too over used. So what does this term mean and what really qualifies as a super-food?



Tjapukai Bids for Australian Indigenous Museum

Federal Member for Leichhardt Warren Entsch has received a proposal that – if successful – would see Tjapukai Aboriginal Cultural Park become the site of Australia's first national Indigenous museum.

At a recent media event, Tjapukai Board Chairman Bruce Glanville formally announced the concept, which was initially suggested by Mr Entsch during the Centre's 25th anniversary celebrations last year.

An application has now been made to the Federal Government to fund an independent feasibility study.



Mr Entsch said he had long believed Tropical North Queensland, with its diverse mix of Indigenous cultures, was the appropriate location for a national museum.

"Australia needs a national museum as a mark of respect to our country's first inhabitants and to educate the world about their rich culture. Cairns is now the third most popular holiday destination for international

visitors after Sydney and Melbourne and an Australian Indigenous museum will add to the depth of experiences our region offers. Housing the museum at Tjapukai makes sense as it will give visitors the opportunity to experience authentic Indigenous culture on many different levels that are engaging, entertaining and above all, educational."

Mr Glanville said the project would see Tjapukai build Australia's most comprehensive exhibition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and history using state-of -the-art interactive technologies, drawing on artefact collections across the globe and involving traditional owners from around Australia.

"We believe a national Indigenous museum could be central to the reconciliation process by becoming a centre of learning, engagement and interaction that would give all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people a place where they can proudly celebrate their culture and display it to a wide audience," Mr Glanville said.

"Tjapukai is in the first stage of a \$12 million transformation to become Australia's leading venue to experience Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture where people from around the world will come to see our country through the eyes of Australia's Indigenous people. "A national museum is a perfect fit as it would have an immediate global audience, complement the authentic cultural experiences at Tjapukai Aboriginal Cultural Park and provide more employment for Indigenous people.

You've grown an extra foot since I last saw you!


THE REGENERATION OF LOST LIMBS is something that we humans can only dream of, yet some of the animals around us can do exactly that. The rough and tumble of nature is often responsible for injuries which can mean the end of it all, but for some creatures it results in new beginnings.

Invertebrates (animals without backbones) are the masters of limb regeneration and there are many species which can do it. The reason for this is usually as a result of surviving an attack from a predator. The ability to shed limbs is often why they are still alive. It is akin to a skink releasing its tail to escape a predator, except in this case they have to manage the next phase of their lives a leg or two

Spiders can lose legs to escape the grip of predators. If their legs are damaged but still attached to their bodies, they will often drop them as it is the only way they can stop the bleeding. The regeneration of the limbs becomes apparent when spiders go through their next phase of growth in the form of a moult; shedding the hard outer skeleton called an exoskeleton. Miraculously they emerge from the old exoskeleton with the new limb (or limbs), albeit sometimes a little smaller than the rest. After their next moult these regenerated limbs will be indistinguishable.

Many insects can regenerate limbs too. Stick insects are particularly good at it, and use their ability to rapidly release their limbs to free themselves from predators just as spiders do. Again, the regeneration of insect legs becomes evident as they moult, but the regenerated limbs are usually quite small – often bud-like at first – and become more developed with each subsequent moult. It usually takes them three moults to fully develop the limb. If they mature before then (mature insects no longer moult), they have to make do with what they have.

Crustaceans are another group of invertebrates that can regenerate limbs. Crabs, crayfish and yabbies do so in a similar way to spiders and insects; the replacement limb appearing as the animal moults.

One of the most amazing regenerative abilities in the invertebrate world is that of the sea-stars. If limbs are bitten off, these animals can regenerate the entire missing portion of their bodies as long as their central core is undamaged. Some species can, even more remarkably, regenerate a whole new body from a single severed limb! As often is the case, nature is stranger than science fiction.

Inside My Studio

If you want something done, ask a busy person. This truism certainly applies to **KATE PRYNNE**. When she is not silver smithing and jewellery making Kate changes hats continually to meet the demands of her many interests and mixed involvements. A recently broken hand slowed her down but did not stop her.

A past RADF grant allowed Kate to attend an arts Summer School. This tuition really challenged her but she gained confidence and the skills in making a 'mark' on metal, moving the metal around and making it pliable and organic. This was turning point in jewellery making for Kate Prynne.

A trip with ceramicist Mollie Bosworth to the 'outback' influenced Kate's most recent artwork. In Winton they looked at ancient remains of dinosaurs, and they spent time on the Birdsville Track where Kate reminisced a 1950s story of 'the postman'. Kate holds dear her experiences in the stony desert, so desolate and abandoned, the textures and the colours of burnt copper. A burnt land, a desert red from the oxidised iron of an ancient land, and it was the colours of Lake Eyre, citrus, lime, turquoise and white which today influence her artwork, which is about to include etching silver and enamelling on copper, and offers the freedom of changing textures.

Where is your current studio?

In my home in Butler Drive, Kuranda, but anywhere within the house. It varies. I could be working on the dining room table or on the verandah.

Do you work alone or with others?

Totally alone, but for my 13-year-old Spicey, a rough-coated Jack Russell. She is always under my feet or at my side.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

If I am using gas, then ventilation and fresh air are essential. The right tools for the job are also essential, and I would have to add – a very clean space. As metal tools rust constantly in the tropics, I spend a lot of time cleaning and looking after my tools.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

As and when I have the time to attend to my jewellery making. I lay everything out on my dining room table in readiness for a quick start. I am fortunate that I don't have to pack everything away during the making process.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

Silver smithing and working with metals. Assorted metals including copper, silver, brass and gemstone beads. All in the name of jewellery making.

Why is jewellery making your chosen medium?

I have always had an interest in jewellery. Its design, fashion and wearability. 26 years ago I started silver smithing but then I lapsed. I later did a course at Byron Bay and returned seriously to my jewellery making. I joined a Mineral and Lapidary Club and I haven't looked back. The environment really influences me and I pick up rocks and stones from everywhere, as I did as a child in Africa. I now have stones that have been worn down over millions of years and which are the remains of incredibly high mountains in Australia. The colours of the environment amaze me and help with my choices for my pieces. My patinated metal earrings are influenced by the colours of the reef and the chemical process I use permanently alters the surface of the metal.

List the things you listen to while working.

Radio National (ABC). I thoroughly enjoy many of the interviews. I am extremely interested in people and what they do, and I also like to listen to the sounds of nature in the surrounding bush of my home.

Your favourite tool?

My jump ring maker. [Kate produces a small rectangular solid wooden slab with

varying sized holes attached to what appears to be bench vice. Along with it a box of assorted handles and wires. In no time at all, with slight of hand, Kate makes some rings for earrings. TR] I love all my tools, and perhaps my texturing hammers and my assorted pliers could be on my favourites list. I love pliers. My agitating polisher is certainly another favourite.

How do you identify your work?

I don't have a special mark but my printed tickets attached to my jewellery items identify me as the maker. My jewellery is all handmade including hooks and clasps. The integrity of the handmade item shows through. My pieces can also be identified by my use of knotted silk thread. I use it as it allows the items such as a necklace to move with the body and it sits nicely. There is no stiffness in my jewellery.

How do you sell your work?

Through the Kuranda Arts Co-operative gallery in Kuranda.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I don't teach jewellery making at the moment. However, it is in my future plan after eventual retirement.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

[This is where the 'busy' comes into it. TR] I am a volunteer at the Kuranda Arts Co-op and I am on the Arts Co-op's executive committee. I am a full-time English Language teacher and I am on a Regional committee for a charitable organisation. When I have any extra spare time, I can be found developing my garden.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I would finish building a studio under my house. The flooring is down, the electricity is there but I need walls, a window, ceiling, plumbing and a door. Time got away from me. Finishing this project is at the top of my bucket list.

If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing?

I always fancied I would like to be an opera singer or have my own tea house. Dreamtime. All my work will soon be put on hold as I am venturing off overseas for three months mainly in search of supplies for my jewellery, and gallery and museum hopping for inspiration and research. Collections really interest me, especially influences from the past. I am taking time to attend the Al-Anon International Convention in Vancouver in July. The Rockies and New York will follow, theatres and galleries galore, then some time with relatives and friends in UK. I know I will come back so inspired that I will want to fall headlong and refreshed into my craft and other commitments.

"Religion: Key Concepts in Philosophy"

by Brendan Sweetman

(2007, Continuum) ISBN 9780 8264 86271, RRP \$18.95

This book is part of a series of books designed to introduce core ideas and subjects encountered in the study of philosophy. As such, it is not a "religious" book, in that it does not advocate any particular view. Rather, it is a journey into the main philosophical arguments that support or otherwise the basis of religion, and in particular the notion that there exists a transcendental deity of some kind. Now it was common until recent decades to state in Australia that you did not engage in ordinary conversation about matters of religion or politics. But notwithstanding this widely accepted taboo, Australia was colonised by persons, mostly from Europe, mainly from Great Britain or Ireland, who traditionally had had an allegiance to one or other Christian denominations. Then quite mysteriously over the course of the 19th and 20th centuries, this changed. There was a widespread loss, in the West, of belief in the existence of a deity over this period, or at least a significant loss of belief in established religion. This took place with little public discussion, and was no doubt the product of a number of factors - Darwin's theory of evolution and its general acceptance, the growth of science and scientific explanations for the phenomena that is the universe, the spread of materialism and consumerism, etc.

But in more recent times, there has without doubt been a revival of interest in religion and/or spirituality. There has been an explosion of books and other publically accessible considerations of these issues, some positive, some negative and critical, and some philosophical and neutral. The book being reviewed falls into this latter category. It is written by a Professor of Philosophy who also happens to be a believer. But the manner in which it is written is quite impartial and does not reflect the author's religious beliefs in any intrusive way. It is a work of philosophy only. And it is written in a manner that the average reader can comprehend, even without any philosophical background. As such, it is recommended reading for the average person, whether as a believer, agnostic, atheist or simply being uncertain, and who has a curiosity about the subject and who would like to understand more. This can be done through this book in the absence of any bias being displayed and with a total lack of pressure to adopt any particular view. As such, it is a healthy thing in itself. Rational and independent investigation of such important topics is clearly desirable. And in my view the interest to engage in such an exercise is now there in our society. As the author states "Religion is a quite fascinating subject, as even those who are not religious will agree."

The book examines in broad terms the main philosophical arguments that have been advanced over the centuries for and against a religious belief involving some kind of sacred and transcendent reality. The author's approach is based around the question whether the religious view of the world is reasonable or not, a test of rationality if you like. Definitely a good starting point.

The author examines firstly the traditional philosophical proofs, being the

"first cause" or cosmological argument, and the "design" or teleological argument. The latter argument would seem to have gathered greater traction from recent amazing discoveries in science that have shown up the immense complexity and inter-relatedness of all that exists in the universe, although some ardent non-believers would adopt an opposite conclusion. From these two arguments the author moves to a more contemporary argument or proof, which can be called the "fine tuning" or anthropic argument, based on the view that, left to itself, the chances of life appearing and flourishing on earth are extremely low such that it could not have been just a chance "accident".


Next examined is the "necessary existence" or ontological argument for some deity to exist, and the ancillary argument that this necessary existence flows from the existence of absolute moral values. These tend to be very contentious arguments among those debating them.

The next two Chapters are devoted to philosophical issues surrounding the nature of the deity and the existence of evil in the world. A further Chapter examines the proofs inherent in the common personal religious experiences found in many religious traditions, and which are usually of a compelling nature. Then the topic of religion and science is examined, including the

question whether evolution theories are really a threat to religious belief. Many, including religionists, now hold that they are not. Finally the author considers religious diversity and the problems that this poses for the enquirer, including that of claims to exclusive truth by some religions and the now commonly postulated views of a pluralistic nature. Increasingly, religionists and other spiritually minded persons are asserting that there are many paths to the one truth and that what is required is much more tolerance, understanding, mutuality, goodwill and peace. It makes for great consideration and debate.

Living in Furanda

Kids and Carrots = Edible Fun

Now that our weather is cooler and gardeners are eager to get growing, if you are searching for fun ways to get the kids active in the garden, and you have plenty of sunshine, grow carrots!!

Of course some 'encouragement' along the way to keep up their interest, must include cooking a few recipes together or it just wouldn't be memorable.

Kid friendly carrot recipes like carrot juice, soup, smoothies, carrot hash browns, carrot fries or chips, carrot salad, carrot bread, pancake, muffins, cake, jelly and jam. What about carrot pancakes for breakfast, or after school treats like carrot dip, carrot jelly or carrot 'lemonade'. www.carrotmuseum.co.uk/recipes.html#bread

When buying carrots, food transport mileage is a problem with central food distribution systems. For fresher produce, buy local, choose fresh thin carrots, and use within two weeks to provide the best nutrients and taste. Avoid split, damaged, or hairy carrots. Store carrots in a cold crisper, not in plastic but inside a paper bag, because they go slimy and rot. There are ways to keep your produce 'fresher' in your fridge, but the best is simply to peel, chop and freeze them as soon as possible. They are a great timesaver that way; no other preparation is needed, especially for soups, stews, casseroles, cakes, muffins etc. Juice the fresh carrots, and keep the pulp for other recipes.

Don't store carrots and fruit together. e.g. don't store carrots near apples, bananas or melons; the ethylene gas from fruit increases the bitter compounds present in carrots.

Simple recipes for getting kids to eat carrots are:

Cooking them differently to see which way is best for them – raw carrots, roasted carrots, steamed carrots, boiled carrots; Carrot ribbons, carrot sticks, carrot coins, steamed carrots with peas, mashed potato and carrots together, carrot & apple, carrot & cheese, carrot, apple & cashews, carrot & lettuce cups.

Get your kids to try these ideas too:

Carrot dips and crackers; Carrot cake, pancakes or muffins; Carrot chips instead of potatoes; Nutella and shredded carrot sandwiches, instead of peanut butter and jam; Carrot burgers or even carrot soufflé; use carrots in the easiest gluten free meal; the classic, meat and three veg – carrots, potatoes and peas.

Can I overdose on carrots? Yes, carotenemia occurs mostly in infants when they are fed too much pureed carrot baby food, plus liquid supplements — ask you doctor or pediatrician. Adults with thyroid, diabetes, anorexia, kidney and liver disease must watch their food intake of carrot and other foods containing high levels of carotenoids. So everything in moderation!!

Symptoms include orange coloured skin around the nose, on palms, soles of the feet and knees. http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Carotenosis

Carrots contain more sugar than any other vegetable, with the exception of beets. Avoiding carrots because of their Glycemic Index ranking would be a big mistake for diabetics, particularly given all the vitamins and minerals they contain and the low Glycemic Load of each serving but diabetics should still be very aware.

The low GL tells you how much sugar is in the food, rather than just how high it raises blood sugar levels. Carrots and potatoes both have a high glycemic index, but using the new glycemic load (GL), carrots dropped from high GI of 131 to a GL of 10.

With many vegetables, cooking destroys some of their vitamins, but you can absorb more beta carotene from cooked carrots than from raw ones. Beta-carotene converts to vitamin A once it reaches the intestine. www.carrotmuseum.co.uk/nutrition.html

Vitamin A helps with night vision – that's why children are told to eat carrots because it helps them to see in the dark! Carrots greatly enhance blood flow to and function of the eyes. Take a closer look at a sliced carrot – it even looks like the human eye.

Carrots are related to the parsley plant and come in a variety of colours, white, golden, orange, red, black and purple.



Our Historic Past

Some Early History of Kuranda

This article is compiled from a story written in 1967 by Mrs Mann and presented as a bulletin by the Cairns Historical Society in December 1972. Some of the "historical facts" are inaccurate. For instance, there was no "Kuranda Range Road" – Kuranda did not exist until the late 1880's. Cairns was established in 1876 to give access to the Thornborough gold field, and the Colonial Government funded the establishment of very crude tracks over the range. No real road over the range existed until the 1930's. Despite the inaccuries the article is still interesting as it gives an insight into one woman's experiences in Kuranda in another era.

The picturesque little town of Kuranda 21 miles from Cairns, on the Barron River, and backed by Saddle Mountain, began its existence in the early 1880s. During the early part of 1877 the sum of £9979 was spent on the Kuranda Range Road, a part of the Cairns – Thornborough road, the through road to the hinterland and to Herberton. The Cairns road was steep and needed "double banking" to the top owing to sharp pinches. It was not used for long, as a shorter road from Port Douglas was discovered and this was the main coach road. However the land around Kuranda was cut up into blocks of mainly 100 and 150 acres (a few were much larger) and all was sold and the little town was established.

Its very early settlers suffered hardships from the aboriginals, some being very wild. In 1897 a man of Greek nationality travelling about 7 miles from Kuranda to Groves Creek, arrived with spear wounds in his legs, after losing his packhorse and all loading. Some years later a Mr Hobson was murdered on his property, just opposite Myola railway station.

However the little town progressed, never grew very large, but is renowned for its tourist attractions, being so close to the Barron Falls and having a very picturesque and unique railway station showing many varieties of ferns, orchids and colourful tropical plants of all sizes.

It is now, in 1967, to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the Kuranda State School. My father, the late Mr R.W. Warren built the original school and also the residence. The school was sold to become a home, but the residence still stands.

The country around Kuranda has valuable timber. Kauri Pine, Oaks, and Hickory were the best. This was railed to Cairns for milling, providing a lot of work, and landholders and profits from sales helped to clear the land. The heavy scrub cost a lot to clear. Nearly all settlers put in an area of coffee, supervised by an expert, Mr Newport of the Kamerunga State Nursery. As the trees grew to bearing the whole district looked lovely with the evergreen trees at times covered with white blossoms and later with the red coffee berries.

Mr A. Street was an asset to the district. On his property at Kuranda, he established a secondary industry, the manufacture of coffee from the beans and his coffee, in its green and gold-labelled tins, found ready sale. He won many prizes in the shows and also at the London and Paris Exhibitions. Mr Street purchased all the coffee beans from other growers adding to his manufacturing trade. Disaster came and they all suffered a severe blow, in the 1900 black frost. All the crops were ruined except those of Mr Street and a Mr Driscoll. Mr Street's were protected by scrub and were saved. Other growers became despondent and sold out. Others went in for dairying and cattle. Mr Street also owned a small store near the school, run by his daughter. For some time the Garbutt family ran a butcher's shop and a few others were able to supply the town with milk and butter.

Dancing classes were held for some years by a Miss Barson, the Sergeant's daughter, who prepared children for the annual Fancy Dress Ball. The young men had a cricket team and, on occasions, an excursion train would run from Cairns when a cricket match could be arranged. Boxing Day and St Patrick's Day always had a sports gathering, otherwise pastimes were few. A School of Arts provided a library and its hall was used for dancing and a general meeting place; dance practices etc and also Church Services. The little town had some memorable balls, when the bachelors would issue invitations. This effort was returned by the spinsters and followed by the Benedicts. An orchestra was engaged from Cairns. We all felt classy with our little programmes, complete with pencil. Sit down suppers catered for at Remilton's Kuranda Hotel and at Hunters Hotel, left nothing to be desired.

At the start there were Remiltons and the "Family Hotel" with its little shop and grocery alongside. "The Family Hotel" was built along from Mr Cash, the nursery man and over the slope past him when going from the railway station. Later on Hunters Hotel was built. Actually there were three hotels at one stage. "The Family Hotel" was where working men in the locality boarded. Hunters and Remiltons accommodated visitors and tourists. "The Family Hotel" was burned down in 1919 or 1920. In the early part of the century tourist trade boomed when hundreds travelled to Cairns by steamer. Special trains conveyed them to Kuranda and they visited the Maze, Fairyland and Barron Falls.

Fairyland was built by Mr & Mrs Dick and run mainly by Mrs Dick and her

daughter. Mr Dick was a photographer and travelled the country taking photos for the "North Queensland Register". This paper was renowned for lovely photos prior to World War I. Kuranda boomed in the third decade of the century when the Barron Falls Hydro Electric Scheme with underground powerhouse was commenced in 1932 and finally opened in 1935. Though extensive alterations have been done since and another underground powerhouse has been built, it was a major project to supply power to Cairns and hinterland.

Some very gay social activity was centred round Kuranda in the 1890s. Mr Boucher, an English gentleman, owned a residence now known as "Kuranda Heights". He engaged special trains to bring the guests from Cairns. Another place was the home of Mr and Mrs W.A. Hannam, at their 400 acre property at Myola. This was a large fourteen-roomed home and later, half of it was sold to Mr E. Hunter and moved to Kuranda for his residence. Mr Hannam was an engineer on the Cairns railway and also on the building of the Chillagoe railway. The home was outstanding – set in six acres of garden, set out by an expert gardener and cared for by a number of aboriginals. The Myola Post Office was run by Mrs Hannam and daughters. He also grew coffee. A great social event occurred at the home when Miss Norma Hannam's wedding to Mr A.J.P. MacDonnell of Cairns was celebrated. A special train ran from Cairns to take many guests.

Strange to say, in the early days Kuranda never grew. It was Myola where the town was with as many as six hotels, a butcher's shop, bakery, blacksmiths and others but today Myola has only a few residences on the properties and cattle are the main source of income.

A number of personalities lived in Kuranda in the early days. Mr & Mrs Collinson, the parents of J.W. Collinson, well-known historical writer, lived on land just out of the town. In close proximity was the 600-acre block, taken up by Mr R.A. Kingsford. Their daughter, May married a Mr Smith of Cairns. She wished to retain her maiden name so they changed their name to Kingsford-Smith and their son, born in Cairns, became the famous aviator, Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith.

Among early pioneers were Mr & Mrs W.H. Veivers Snr., Mr & Mrs Sam Crothers, Mr & Mrs J.W. Kelly, the Garbutt family who had a butchering business and delivered meat around the farms on horseback, per splitbag and arm basket, Mr Rob Veivers being the butcher boy. Mrs Fallon, Mr & Mrs A. Street, Mr & Mrs Hobler, Mr & Mrs Fitzpatrick, Mrs Remilton and daughters, Mr & Mrs E. Hunter, Mr & Mrs R.W. Warren, Mr & Mrs W.H. Warren and many others whose names cannot be remembered.

Praise cannot be too great for the efforts of the bullock teams and drivers, being Mr Rob Veivers who is the only remaining one of a family of eight. He placed all the poles in position for erecting over the Cairns Range for the Hydro Electric scheme, from Cairns to Mareeba and on the hinterland, quite a feat in rough terrain and no good road. He did lots of good work with them — a real practical bushman. Another time it was very hot and the team got thirsty — they panicked and bolted, yoked up and into the flooded river at the Fairyland Crossing. He had to swim in amongst them and uncouple to save them from drowning. This however was later than the actual pioneering days but worthy of mention.

FREE DUMPING & RECYCLING IN KURANDA

The Kuranda transfer station takes glass, plastics, paper and aluminium cans so you can take them there to be recycled instead of mixing them in with general waste. Car batteries can also be taken to the dump but smaller batteries can be recycled at the **Kuranda District College**. There is a large box at the front office for you to put your batteries in for recycling. Why recycle batteries?



Reuse valuable minerals

By recycling, valuable minerals can be recovered that can otherwise act

as pollutants. These include mercury (from button cell batteries), zinc, manganese dioxide and silver (from single-use batteries), lead, sulfuric acid, & plastic (from car batteries), and nickel-cadmium, cadmium, nickel-metal hydride and lithium-ion (from rechargeable batteries). Lead acid batteries are 96% recyclable, and cadmium can be returned to battery manufacturers to create a fully closed loop recycling system. Keep toxins out of the soil and

Most batteries contain toxic but valuable metals (such as those listed above), that can, when sent to landfill, harm the environment by contaminating soil and groundwater

FAUNA OF THE MONTH - BATS



Bats are a very important part of our local biodiversity. They are of great help with seed dispersal and pollination of flowers. Spectacled Flying Foxes are one of our local and very venerable species. Three quarters of the species we plant provide habitat and food for bats. Our plantings along the Barron River will continue to support these beautiful creatures

A Thought for June

This month we open our bible to St Luke's Gospel Chapter 24 and read verses 46 to 53.

This passage which brings Saint Luke's Gospel to an end is not actually an ending, it's really a beginning. Although it marks the end of Jesus being among the disciples in a visible, objective way, it also shows them being called to the beginning of a new responsibility. They had seen Jesus die, and had scattered, demoralised and defeated. Then the unbelievable had happened: he came among them again. Although he was changed, the disciples were quite sure it was the Lord whom they had known and followed for the last few years. From time to time he reappeared: to all of them in Jerusalem, to Mary in the garden, to a group fishing in Galilee, to a couple on the road to Emmaus.

It is just after this last encounter that this Gospel passage begins. The two disciples have just come running back from Emmaus. They have gasped out the story of their encounter with what they had thought was a stranger. In the simple action of his breaking a piece of bread they realized that the person with them was far from being a stranger. It was their Lord!

The news electrifies the rest of the disciples into all sorts of thoughts and hopes and plans. Suddenly, Jesus is among them. Once again, he explains the meaning of all that has happened and is happening. He reassures them that the world is not falling apart. The ghastly cross was part of a great plan, and his coming from the tomb was the climax and triumph of that plan. Now something new must begin in and through them. What has happened has to be communicated, and that task is in their hands.

This Gospel's point is that we are those whom Jesus calls disciples. Whatever was said in that long-ago encounter after the resurrection is being said again to-day and will be said in every age. Ours are the ears that hear him – or choose not to hear him – today.

Jesus was asking for his disciples' commitment, and he asks the same of us. If we commit ourselves to him he promises us what he promised those men and women. He promises his Spirit, the Spirit we call the Holy Spirit, in our deepest being. It's a real promise which millions of men and women have found to be true. If we

say Yes to him giving him our spirit, poor and limited though it may be, he gives us his. We get much the better side of the bargain!

Our Lord ended this last encounter by gathering the disciples, blessing them, and going from them. As people have discovered in every generation since, he went away only to return into every one of their lives. He has already returned to yours and mine; all we need to do is to realize it.

When Jesus left his disciples he did so only to return into every one of their lives. He can return to our lives as well.



This is our last article for the current season - hard to believe - the 10 months have flown by. The pool will close for its two-month annual down-time for July and August where maintenance and upkeep can be carried out.

On reopening a new Sanitization system will be installed to work with a different type of mineral salts called "Aquatherape".

All of these changeover procedure budgets and equipment involved are already in place to happen this financial year so some of the works will happen while we finish this year and no disruption to times is expected.

Linda and I would like to thank all our customers for their patronage over the last 10 months and for the last 5 years as the pool has become established. All of you have been at the forefront of evolution in Aquatic culture for this community.

It appears normal to see little ones swimming confidently in the deep end and the swim programs all show tangible gains in skills and abilities. We have a tradition in school swimming carnivals and fundays. All these things never happened before in Kuranda and are great to see developing and evolving.

Our learn to swim clients, swim program patrons and Aquafitness clients in particular keep us afloat especially in the off peak times after Easter and we look forward to catching up soon.

For now the sun continues to shine and plenty of people are enjoying the heated water and warm sun of the Winter days.

On the theme of warm water and sunny Winter days we have married up a beautiful arrangement with Rosa and the guys involved in Sport and Recreation

Transport is provided for all the local indigenous kids from town and surrounding communities to come in and frolic in the magnificent clean water, and back again the next afternoon with little ones who need support with learn to swim. The programs are proving popular with over thirty participants.

Also it is very encouraging to see volunteer mums and dads assisting with the supervision and activities, with 8 to 10 learners being helped.

We also see this as a great role modelling exercise in healthy active participation

This is the most tangible example of mentoring I have been involved in for a long time. All of this sees some of the dreams for bridging the gap in life span and health standards and it is a great example of a working process that can make significant inroads.

We are still seeing bookings in Learn to Swim and Stroke development groups and these will run until end of term 2 in 3 weeks.

We have also had quite a few past learners coming in to get assessed before they sign up to Surf Lifesaving Nippers at the local surf clubs.

It is very satisfying to see beginners through to learners then take on this very important and exciting aquatic pathway. Their parents are to be commended for those early starts on a Sunday mornings.

TRC have prepared submissions for solar heating the water to replace the outdated electrical heaters the old Mareeba Shire Council bought. It will be up to the new Mareeba Shire Council to see this potential project carried out.




