# **Visitors or Permanent Residents?**

IT'S A WELL KNOWN FACT AROUND KURANDA that the majestic Southern Cassowary (Casuarius casuarius johnsonii) is under considerable threat of extinction. In Australia approximately 20 to 25 per cent of their

natural habitat remains, with the houses and roads that have replaced it putting the flightless birds under pressure to survive. A constant flow of traffic is the cause of 55 per cent of all cassowary fatalities with domestic dogs contributing to an additional half of that amount. The future looks grim for cassowary populations in the area, unless we act now.

Recent sightings in and around Kuranda have been welcome news, although probably caused by a poor fruiting season, prompting the reiteration of information regarding their safety, the public's safety and who to contact if cassowary related assistance is required.

Cassowaries feed mainly on rainforest fruits and can become sick when fed foods foreign from their natural diet. Food such as pizza and chips, and in fact anything that is not a rainforest fruit, can lead to the demise of our beloved birds. Cassowaries play an important role in the dispersal and germination of a number of rainforest plants, making it vital for their own future that they are not fed foreign foods. As well as the threat of poisoning the animals, cassowaries can become very aggressive if fed even once, putting their own and the public's safety at risk. If a cassowary is sighted do not approach it; they are best left alone.

It is important for visitors and locals alike to note that cassowaries are not born with road sense and, although most people are sensible drivers, there are some who put the birds' lives at risk by driving too fast. By slowing down and staying aware on the road we can reduce the threat of one of the cassowary's biggest killers. There are a number of signs and speed bumps around Kuranda that are in place to protect cassowaries and the rest of our local wildlife. These warnings are there for a reason.

With the increased number of houses popping up around Kuranda so increases the number of domestic dogs. Dogs pose a huge threat to the dwindling cassowary population, however this threat can easily be eliminated. By housing pets in a secure, fully fenced yard, or ensuring they are restrained if the yard is not secure, the number of dog-related cassowary attacks can be greatly reduced. In addition, when walking dogs in and around the Kuranda area they must be placed on a leash at all times. This will ensure the increased safety of not only the cassowaries, but also any other wildlife in the area.

After a few recent sightings it's becoming increasingly likely that someone will need to contact authorities in regards to a cassowary's safety. There are two organisations in Kuranda that can be contacted, Kuranda Envirocare and Kuranda Conservation. If a cassowary, or its scat, is spotted, then Kuranda Conservation needs to be contacted at <a href="https://www.kurandaconservation.org">www.kurandaconservation.org</a> or call Jax Bergersen on 4093 8834. Likewise, Kuranda Envirocare can be contacted on 4093 8989 and 4093 9926. Certain information including the time and date the animal was sighted, the location and direction the animal was heading, is all important, so be sure to remember as many details as possible. Once again, it is extremely important that the cassowary is not approached in any circumstances.

Although the plight of the Southern Cassowary population is at crisis point, it's not too late to make a difference. If the simple information listed above is followed, the outlook for Kuranda's cassowary population can be a positive one.

# Dear Kuranda Paper ...

### **Action Needed On Fallon Road**

Fallon Road has long been a winding, twisting and dangerous little back road, needing to be driven slowly, with care and awareness.

Not only that, Fallon Road is the ONLY access road out to the main Highway for Masons Road, Williamson Drive, Kuranda Springs and draws some traffic from Barron Falls Road. As such, it has been placed under increasing pressure in the past few years with the development of Kuranda Springs. Before the 2020 planning scheme was approved one more development snuck in. It was for 84 lots to be built adjacent to Fallon Road and stretching up to the Kennedy Highway.

The flabbergasting thing about this development (other than that it was approved at all) is that it is ONLY accessed by Fallon Road – so all traffic coming from this 84 lot development will be entering Fallon Road from roughly opposite the Sports and Recreation Centre.

These two major developments were allowed through Council in an ad hoc manner, without consideration of the overall traffic implications, let alone any service/emergency access.

Implications for the environmental cost aside (that's another whole story) this development poses a serious problem for the community – firstly the access of traffic from that development to Fallon Road. Secondly, it will exacerbate the traffic flow onto the Kennedy Highway from the Fallon Road exit, which is already very dangerous.

Whilst Council have been approached in the past and are actually quite sympathetic to the situation, it is the Department of Main Roads that has blocked past proposals for another access road out onto the Highway because they don't want to 'slow down' the traffic even further coming in towards Kuranda. Please, give us a break. The entrance of Fallon Road onto the main Highway is so dangerous at the moment that it is only a matter of time before someone is seriously injured if not killed. It is difficult to enter, with signage blinding the driver, and the sheer amount of traffic and speed at which the traffic is travelling makes it a daily risk for motorists.

With extra housing going into the whole area accessed by Fallon Rd it is only a matter of time before Main Roads are forced to put in lights. Now that WILL slow down the traffic.

At this time, before all land is sold in both Kuranda Springs and the Fallon Road development, there is a window of opportunity to plan effectively for the future, by purchasing and opening up an access to the Highway thus taking the pressure off both Fallon Road and the entrance to the Highway. This is one solution – a reaction to a problem created by a short sighted council. But if this is to pan out, there needs to be an assessment by State Government of the road from Speewah into Kuranda that takes into account the large number of people who live there and the development planned in the next 5–10 years. There cannot simply be a road going through a community that does not look at the demographics and geography of that community and create a 'rule' for the sake of it.

I would like to call on Advance Kuranda, a local progress association, to take this issue up with Steve Wettenhall, our local MP. We need this looked at closely by the State Government, as it is they who are blocking main road access, leaving the locals to struggle with a dangerous, insufficient and stressed road system and to put our lives at risk every time we come onto that Highway.

The Council has set aside money for the Fallon Road Bridge – after a fatality occurred on it. The people of Masons Road & Williamson Drive petitioned Council years ago about, amongst other things, the problems and pressures on that particular bridge. How convenient it was to ignore it at the time. We are all wiser in hindsight. Well, let's have a bit of foresight and PREVENT another tragedy in our community. Let's get behind Advance Kuranda and take advantage of this window of opportunity to create an access onto the Highway and demand that it is taken into account the growing number of households and consequent traffic problems that are sure to arise.

Kuranda celebrates 120 years of Kuranda Scenic Rail on June 25 with a full day of activities themed around the 1880s. Characters from the bygone era will be busking around the village, there will be a period costume fashion parade, activities for the kids, a jumping castle, horse and carriage rides and games of old such as horse shoe throwing.

The star of the day, the Kuranda train, will be running as scheduled with anniversary celebrations including anniversary pins, balloons and morning and afternoon tea for passengers, plus a welcoming band.

### **World Champion Joins Train Race**

Current Ultraman World Champion Mike Le Roux will be competing in the inaugural 18km Cairns Kuranda Great Train Race on June 25 where competitors will try to outrun the iconic Kuranda Scenic Rail train as it ascends the Barron Gorge on its historic route through the Wet Tropics rainforest from Freshwater Station to Kuranda.

The race will start with a 5km road run from Freshwater Station to the Barron Gorge National Park before runners hit an 8km trail on the undulating four-wheel-drive McDonalds Track to Wright's Lookout, then revert to a 5km road run on the Barron Falls Rd to Kuranda Station.

Runners will be faced with a challenging ascent as they leave from a few metres above sea level on a steady climb to 50m before an extreme ascent to more than 300m, at times topping 400m. Meanwhile, the Kuranda train will be winding its way through tunnels and bridges along the spectacular 31km winding track through the Barron Gorge National Park on its 120th anniversary.

# Gardening **Kuranda**



JUNE and it's looking like a hard cold winter – not exactly what some of the more tender tropicals need. So expect some possible dieback and losses with slower growth until the return of warmer weather. With continued high winds, drying out of soils, container and hanging baskets need particular attention to watering needs.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: Calathea (Family – Maranta). A large genus of 300 plus species renowned for their subtle yet striking foliage often with metallic sheen. Hailing from South America, these clumping understory plants are excellent for shady to part shady plantings. Of easy cultivation, preferring open humus rich soil, all need consistent moisture while maintaining good drainage as they are subject to rot if waterlogged. All are cold sensitive. Given the wide variety of leaf patterning, height and growth form, there is an abundance of choice. Possibly the easiest and most adaptable and a good one to start off with is Calathea zebrina from Brazil. Growing to approximately one metre with long leaves elegantly striped, it quickly forms an imposing clump. All calatheas are easy of propagation either from root or rhizome division and transplanting of suckers. Some of the smaller and more tender species may do better as potted subjects. Dome of

**Q & A:** *Dear Ann*, Welcome to gardening in the Kuranda area and no – you are not alone in losing all your caladiums to brush turkeys. Each year, the keen gardening incomer (and even the more established) are appalled by the losses sustained to these marauders of seemingly insatiable appetite. The problem is often compounded by initial feeding of the birds and/or having nesting sites adjacent to garden areas.

Essentially, Alocasias, Caladiums, Colacasias and some Heliconias, particularly the dwarf Jamaican Red, are most vulnerable and even large plants may be destroyed in a day. Careful fencing from inception of planting or other method of plant protection such as planting through large stones, is the only way to avoid

Depending on the harshness of the season, turkeys will often take other soft stemmed plants such as Philodendron gloriosum. If nest building starts near or in garden beds, this should be discouraged as early as possible giving time for alternate sites to be settled on.

Remember that the brush turkey is a protected species and was here before we started to garden so it is up to the keen gardener to develop a modus vivendi with

I would certainly encourage you and all gardeners new to the area to consider joining the Kuranda Garden Club where there is opportunity to meet other keen gardeners, learn what does well in the area, tips to minimize losses to turkey, orange footed scrub fowl, feral pig and other munchers as well as visiting other gardens and nurseries.

**NOTE**: With a Cassowary sighting in the Village proper and an increasing number of juveniles along Barron Falls and Mason Roads, it is particularly important that care is exercised in driving to avoid injury to this threatened species. Every keen gardener should consider planting one or more cassowary fruit trees to ensure that these unique birds have adequate future food sources.

A visit to the Envirocare or Conservation Community Nursery will soon help out in sourcing the right tree for your property and the visiting cassowary.

### **Kuranda Club Soccer News**

As President of the steering committee, I am extremely pleased to be able to watch my youngest son play soccer for Kuranda in a club team. The Soccer Club formed in 2011, has two great little teams in the Tablelands Regional Junior Soccer Association's Competition. This competition is played by Mareeba, Atherton, Malanda, Dimbulah and once again Kuranda. We have teams in the Under 7 and Under 10/11 age groups. It is massive

The Club has taken up residence at the Recreation Centre, using the facility's two fields at Hunter Park, an under lights 30m by 15m mini field and the venue for meetings, functions, presentations and training.

Twice a week about 35 kids come between 3.45pm and 5.45pm Monday and Wednesday to train. About half of these play on Saturday in the district competition. The kids that play weekends are decked out in a beautiful strip, including QSA approved socks and shorts. During the training the bigger numbers allow for strategy and teamwork development.

Each trainee pays a base fee that entitles them to attend organised training and the other benefits of the Recreation Centre. BatReach recently welcomed a young British woman by the name of Christine Hipperson, a stay-in volunteer with an Environmental Science degree and a passion for helping injured wildlife. During her stay Christine formed a special bond with one of the shelter's other stay-ins, the vulnerable-listed Squirrel Glider (Petaurus norfolcensis) named Romy.

Romy was found around the time of Cyclone Yasi at only two months old and missing her mother. She was rescued and taken to Atherton Animal Welfare and eventually found her way to the sanctity of BatReach. Now about six months old Romy is nearing her release age, at which time she will hopefully be paired with a mate and released into the wild.

Squirrel Gliders live in tight family groups in the wet eucalypt forests on the western side of Queensland's ranges and can be found as far south as the Victoria/South Australia border. The gliders make dens in hollow trees, coming out at night to feed on a variety of local goodies including insects, fruits, tree sap and pollen. In Queensland, the Squirrel Glider is threatened by loss of habitat, barbed wire fences and household pets namely cats and dogs.

It's June now and Christine has made the return trip to her homeland. But at BatReach unfortunately it's business as usual, with May seeing the rescue of eight injured animals. Hopefully June will see a decrease in the number of injured wildlife in the area.

# Mere Males

IN MANY VERTEBRATE SPECIES such as birds, for example, males are often those we take more notice of. They are larger, sometimes more colourful and quite often control the flock, herd, pack or pride. Enter the invertebrates. The minibeast world is dominated by females and the males are quite often subordinate, insignificant, and on occasions not required at all!

Social insects such as bees and ants are dominated by females. The colonies are controlled by a queen or, in the case of some ants, multiple queens. The rest of the functioning colony are female – the workers, guards, and soldiers. Males only exist in low numbers, and have the single role to mate with new queens. That's it. It is a far cry from the way the sexual dynamics are portrayed in the Hollywood films "Antz", and "A Bugs Life". Apparently our society can't deal with the truth!

In the spider world it is a case of size doesn't matter, or in some cases, the smaller the better. Most female spiders are much larger, more powerful and longer-lived than their male counterparts. But there is no more extreme example than in the orb-weaving spiders. Some males are 10 times smaller than the females they are attempting to court, and one wrong move results in them becoming nothing more than an extra mouthful of food. Some male spiders deliberately sacrifice themselves to the females after mating to provide nutrients for their developing young within

her body. And why not? – they have nothing more to live for; their mission in life is accomplished.

Most human males would be aware that reincarnation as a male praying mantis would not be a wise move. Apart from the dangers in attempting courtship (just approaching a female is a matter of life and death), the actual mating process often results in the male being partly consumed before it is even over. The male continues on pure instinct and nervous function, until the process is over and she can finish him off

The pinnacle of this demoralisation of males would have to be within the stick insects, grasshoppers and crickets – the orthopteran insects. Some of these insects can do without males altogether. In simple terms, if Mr Right doesn't come along, they just go ahead and lay eggs anyway. They produce clones of themselves, which are of course all female. In some populations males are extremely rare – in some cases, even non-existent.

Considering that invertebrates make up around 99 percent of all animal life on earth, maybe we human males should feel lucky that we've landed the role that we have. It's a good thing we don't need to continually look over our shoulders just in case a huge female is lining us up for dinner (well most of us anyway).

The aim of this meeting will be to identify individuals and groups who can or already are contributing to the work required to make Kuranda sustainable and to develop a resilient community together.

A crowd of more than 35 people, ranging from toddlers to more seasoned campaigners, participated in this first forum organised by the RealFood network together with Friends of the Earth Kuranda.

Topics debated included the National 100% Renewable Energy campaign, outlined by Anna McGuire, CAFNEC sustainability officer; how we as a community can act to protect Australian wildife and bees from the hazards of pesticides especially the insecticide Strike Out; sourcing clean drinking water, uncontaminated by pesticides and other positive actions inspired by the global Transition Towns movement.

Janet Millington of Transition Towns Cairns, a permaculture author, teacher, co-

founder of the first Transition Initiative in Australia and a wealth of information and experience commented, "This is a good time to get the message to council while they are doing their community plan and to drive the change we want through a responsive council asking for direction."

At the end of an interesting and informative few hours, and a shared lunch of delicious market food and homemade snacks, Sjoerd Aadema summed up by saying "Recharging Kuranda is

going to be an all inspiring happening and a long-term project for positive change.

"Through the RealFood network we plan to bring real organic and biodynamic certified produce from the Tablelands to the Kuranda original markets and to use this stall as a community hub for forums, workshops and social gatherings. ### **Back in Health**

Back pain can be caused from many different conditions. A moderate level of degeneration from wear and tear should be expected within our life time. Improper lifting/carrying techniques, standing on hard surfaces for long periods of time, sleeping positions, posture, accidents or trauma to the back can all present with complications days, weeks or even years later. It can even cause pain in other parts of the body such as the hips or buttocks and can be increased by such activities as sitting, lifting, turning or bending over. When addressing the back many factors need to be taken into consideration.

Bone health: The vertebrae consist of bone and can become weak due to deficiencies. Both calcium and silica can help strengthen bone structure to help protect against osteoarthritis and other conditions relating to general wear and tear. Comfrey can also help broken

Muscle health: Magnesium is the main mineral to relax muscles. Each time our muscles contract, we require magnesium to 'release' the contraction. We also lose magnesium in our perspiration, thus needs are increased in warmer climates or when working

Signs of magnesium deficiency include muscle cramps or twitches, tight, sore and aching muscles, tension headaches and sleep disorders. Dietary sources include almonds, brazil nuts and sunflower seeds but our soils are fairly depleted from mass production. Sea vegetables such as dulse, kelp etc. are also high however a good powder supplement is often required.

**Sprains/Strains:** Ligaments and tendons stretch and tear, causing pain and unfortunately are slow recovery. Rux tox and ruta grav are two homoeopathic remedies which can guicken the healing process. Arnica can also be very helpful and a heating agent to increase blood flow to the area increasing nutrient supply.

Anti-inflammatory: Many herbs can help keep inflammation down whilst remaining gentle on the stomach and even having other health benefits.eg Boswelia, Ginger and Turmeric. Fish oil contains EPA which is an excellent anti-inflammatory also found in krill and green lipped mussels. At least 6 fish oil capsules are required to have this desired effect. **Repair:** Bovine cartilage and glucosamine all help by promoting rebuilding especially over the joint areas.

MSM also helps the production of connective tissue to increase mobility.

Pain relief: White willow bark and MSM are great analgesics. Liniments and heat packs can also relieve

**Exercises:** Core strength is very important and can be addressed with such exercises as Yoga or Pilates. Acupuncture has also been proven effective for many. Massage: Can help increase circulation and thus nutrient flow to quicken recovery time. Also relaxes muscles, releases tension spots by 'ironing out the

Bowen: Can help with realigning, relaxing and releasing many underlying conditions with only a few appointments by delivering gentle movements over muscles, fascia and tendons. The practitioner initiates signals to the nervous system and the body does the

### **Not a Sweet Story!**

A lot of people have a 'sweet tooth'- like myself! The funny thing is – I have a two year old granddaughter who loves everything green and actually dislikes sweet things altogether (don't know what planet she is from). Unfortunately most of us 'normal' people would probably prefer if spinach and green salad would taste a bit more like chocolate or peaches 'n cream!

Almost everybody likes the sweet taste at least to a certain degree. After all – we don't call people we adore 'sweetheart' or 'sweetie pie' for nothing.

Sometimes the taste for concentrated sweetness can also be acquired in childhood because it was given to us by Mum or Dad to cheer us up or to reward us and 'Sweets' might have become emotional comforters which we still use as adults.

In western countries the average person eats one kilogram of sugar per week, some in coffee and tea, others hidden in cakes and biscuits, cereal, alcohol or chocolates, candies and desserts.

Too much sugar produces a surge of insulin and stress hormones like cortisol and adrenalin, which in turn promotes inflammation. It causes an overdose of intestinal yeast and bacteria. It causes disease, obesity, and dental caries, hyper-activity in children, fatigue and overweight. It also causes loss of Vitamin B and loss of the body's calcium supply.

As if that wasn't enough, excess sugar also overworks the pancreas, causing it to lose some of its efficiency and then produces either too much or too little insulin. If we lack insulin in response to high levels of blood sugar, Diabetes can be the result. If we produce too much insulin, Hypoglycemia is the result, that's when blood sugar levels drop too low and the brain doesn't function well. We might feel low in energy, weak and a bit jittery and desperately looking for a 'quick fix' like a sweet, a cup of coffee, alcohol or a smoke.

If this roller coaster continues for any length of time, adrenal exhaustion may be the result and sugar needs to be avoided in all its forms including soft drinks, honey, dried fruit and even fruit juice.

 $But don't be \, dismayed-under normal \, circumstances$ we don't have to give up 'Sugar, Spice and all things *nice*', we have to have some fun in life and most things are alright in moderation!

Also, if necessary we can use sugar substitutes as sweeteners. I am not talking about artificial sweeteners like Saccharin or Aspartame – they have shown to have harmful effects on your health in the long run. I am talking about natural things like unrefined honey, or a natural sweetener called 'Stevia' which is a South American herb that is 100 to 400 times sweeter than sugar.

There is also a powder sweetener called 'Xylitole' which is found in the fibers of many fruit and vegetables These products can be purchased in health food stores.

If you happen to be a 'Chocoholic', you might like to try some carob chocolate instead. The carob bean is a legume with naturally sweet seeds. The taste is similar to chocolate and very nutritious with three times as much calcium than milk, Vitamins A, D and B and many minerals. You can buy carob in powder form, as a substitute for cocoa or as a solid chocolate bar without added sugar – try it, it's yummy!

Still the best sugar-hit we can give ourselves is from complex carbohydrates like whole grains, vegetables like the humble potato, beans or lentils. Our body will release their potential energy gradually over several hours. Also, we could try to get hooked on our beautiful delicious tropical fruit, it will give us a fairly quick but healthy 'fix'...

Let's stop the 'Blood-Sugar-Merry-Go-Round', because in the end it might not be so merry anymore! In Health and Harmony,

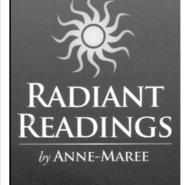

# Going in to Bat for FNQ Kids

The Queensland Rail Bulls Masters bowled up a week of excitement to budding cricketers across Far North Queensland earlier this month, but their tour also brought a serious safety message.

During a series of school visits, the QRBM touring side provided advice on bowling, batting and fielding, while Queensland Rail Community Education officers spoke about the importance of keeping a level head and being smart around tracks and trains.

As part of the Queensland Rail Bulls Masters Far North Queensland tour, former Australian champions Allan Border, Ian Healy, Matthew Hayden, Jimmy Maher and Michael Kasprowicz hosted coaching clinics across Cairns and Port Douglas.

Coinciding with these coaching clinics, Queensland Rail Community Education officers delivered their RailSmart programs to schools from Yarrabah to Port Douglas and west to Kuranda.

"It's great for us to go to the Far North and lift some spirits in the community," QRBM player Jimmy Maher said.

"It's fantastic to be able to go and visit some kids at hospital, to do some clinics for the kids at schools and to raise money for much needed charities."

Queensland Rail Chief Executive Officer Paul Scurrah said RailSmart teams would be delivering educational sessions to thousands of students, urging them to keep safety front of mind at level crossings and near tracks

"Through the hands on RailSmart program we can influence young minds to do the right thing around trains and tracks, as it is never too early to teach a child about rail safety," Scurrah said.

"Trespassing, taking shortcuts and other unsafe behaviour near railway tracks is not a joke. It's illegal and risky behaviour that endangers not only their lives but the lives of Queensland Rail train crew and customers."

"In 2010 there were 26 level crossing incidents reported in Far North Queensland. From January to December there were four level crossing collisions, three incidents of motor vehicles hitting level crossing infrastructure, such as boom gates, and 19 Near Misses, including two incidents involving pedestrians.

"The difference between 19 near misses and 19 fatalities is literally a matter of seconds."

The RailSmart rail safety education sessions were delivered at Kuranda, Yarrabah, Mossman, Wangetti, Port Douglas and Miallo schools.

Children around Far North Queensland not only benefitted from RailSmart sessions and coaching clinics with cricket legends, but also received free entry to the Twenty20 showdown when the QRBM took on Cricket Far North Invitational XI at Port Douglas Sporting Complex on May 21.

Team members also attended a free community breakfast at Cairns Station (adjacent to Cairns Central) at 7.30am on Wednesday 18 May.

The QRBM touring squad included Allan Border, John Buchanan, Lee Carseldine, Joe Dawes, Steven Farrell, Matthew Hayden, Ian Healy, Ken Healy, Michael Kasprowicz, Martin Kent, Jimmy Maher, Scott Prestwidge, Greg Ritchie, Greg Rowell, Chris Simpson and Wendell Sailor.

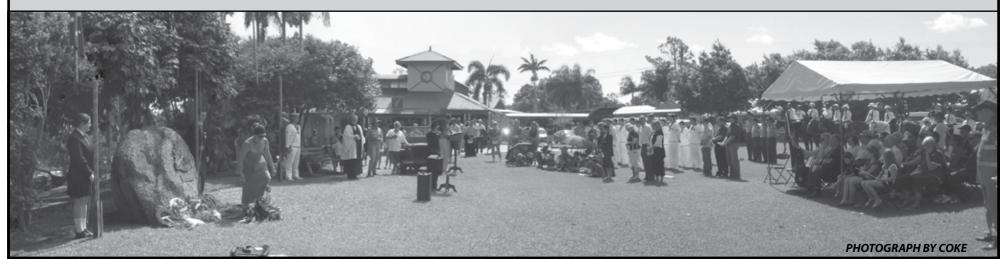

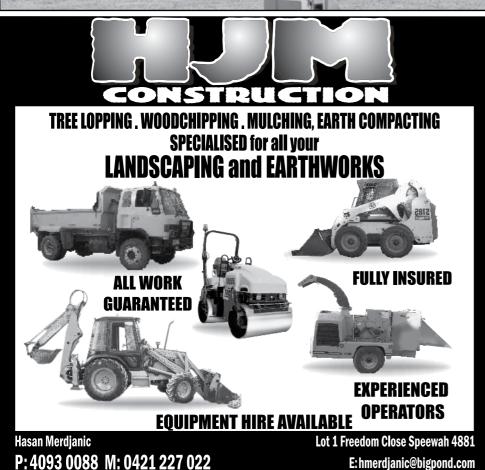

# **Book Review**

### "The Meaning of Things"

by A.C. Grayling (Phoenix, Reissue 2007) ISBN 9780 75381 3591 \$15.95

Grayling is the distinguished Professor of Philosophy at the University of London. He is a philosopher who has written many books. His writings challenge scepticism in philosophy. He has a strong interest in the practical application of philosophy in everyday life, which enables him to write in a way that the average person can readily comprehend. According to Wikipedia "He is .. interested in both practical and theoretical questions of human rights and related ethical problems, and has been a significant contributor to philosophical pedagogy and scholarship through writing and editing."

This book is a good example of this. In it, the author writes first of those virtues and attributes which the author sees as being of value to human flourishing and the human spirit, such as tolerance and courage. In the second part of the book he writes of the enemies of human flourishing, such as racism and hate. In the last part, he writes of those of those things which he sees as giving meaning to life, such as human reason, peace and art.

Now many readers may be wary of writers who pursue a discussion of ethical principles, for fear of a moralistic approach. Graying immediately disavows such an approach by condemning moralising – the practice of seeking to impose one's views on others as to how they should live or behave. He sees this practice as rarely working. Rather, he seeks to inculcate mature and tolerant debate and reflection on how society can best be ordered in terms of fairness and decency.

Of course the field of ethics has been the subject of legitimate philosophical consideration for thousands of years. Aristotle's Nicomachean Ethics is a classic example. In it Aristotle considered what was conducive to happiness within society, and developed his concept of the "golden mean" in human conduct. All of the great religions have themselves been much concerned with ethical and moral standards and have had a huge impact on human conduct. Often in the past, philosophical discussion was merged with spiritual beliefs. But in the 20th century, philosophers tended to take a narrow view of the subject, largely divorced from the religious context, examining such concepts as "what do we mean by good?" and "what do we mean by ought?".

Grayling is not in this category. Rather he belongs in the liberal, humanist tradition. He is most concerned to examine the values by which people can best achieve human flourishing in society, and to encourage discussion of them. But he does this from a contemporary secular position, contemptuously dismissing the trappings of religion as practiced in a manner that has become common through the writings of Dawkins and others. He is particularly dismissive of Christianity based on the worst of its history. God to him is a human invention. One has to accept this controversial standpoint to get anything of value from the book. The book is saved in many ways by his emphasis on many of the core values found in the original teachings of the great religions, such as love and mercy. He also accepts the value in some religious traditions, such as that of the Quakers and Theravada Buddhists, and he himself professes to be a believer in the human spirit and the importance of spirituality.

Given his perspective on life, the author has much of use to say on ethical principles that are worthy of consideration. For example, on the subject of blame, he says:

"Whereas blame is justified in this universal sense, it is by contrast inappropriate in an important aspect of the particular, namely, in the breakdown of personal relationships, where it likewise tends to be endemic. One way of recovering from these smaller tragedies is, in fact, to learn how to stop blaming."

In the contemporary debate on ethics as applied in many fields of human endeavour, this is a book for the ordinary person who wishes to consider some of life's most important issues. The discussion of virtues and attributes for life is now firmly on the table as a result of books like these and also books written from the religious perspective.

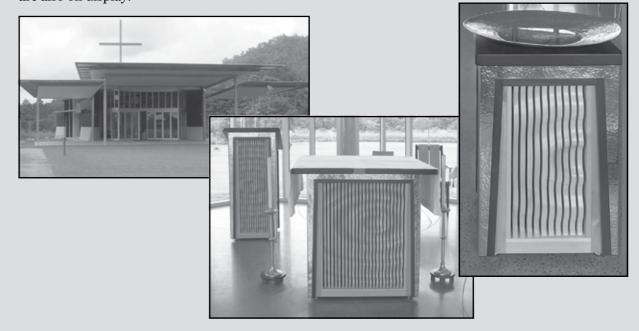

# The District of Cairns

By our own reporter (Continued)

To continue my account of Mr. Koch's selection I must say a few words for the forest land which is so prevalent about here. Not so rich as the scrub soil and not so fertile or so adapted for close settlement, forest land has its advantages. It is generally considered unfit for cultivation purposes and written down as so. This is to a certain extent correct, but not wholly so. As it now lays it would not do to plant crops among the timber and cultivate them by the hoe, as is possible to do on scrub soil. It is now sour and unfit for even cultivated grasses, but if it were turned over and the air allowed to sweeten it, very fair results could without doubt be obtained. A selection with forest pockets is invariably a poor man's selection. To grub out the roots from forest land is of necessity pastime compared to the laborious backbreaking operation of rendering scrub land fit for the plough. If a £100 contract was let to get a piece of scrub land grubbed out, the piece done for that amount would be but the small area of three or four acres, while the same amount of money spent on forest land would result in a large paddock. If then the plough was more generally employed these large tracts of forest could be made to produce almost as much as the scrub soil will. The judicious employment of fertilizers and small water schemes, not necessarily expensive, would in many cases being in returns where none are at present drawn. To return to Mr. Koch's selection. Since writing the last paragraph which appeared in our last issue I discovered that the return of 30 bushels of corn to the acre had been obtained from the scrub land and not the forest as quoted by me. However, the difference there is not great, as the soil is the same, only the scrub is manured with the decayed vegetation of years and the forest is not. Mr. Koch is a great believer in grape vines. The situation and the soil cannot be beaten for the purpose of a vineyard. There are about 1300 vines now in, and this year (the third) a good crop may be expected. Mr. Koch has a thorough method in cutting and training the vines, and there is every probability of a fair return. About 70 excellent healthy fruit trees are flourishing and some 100 banana plants have been put in. the fruit trees are oranges, citrons and lemons. At the other side of the selection Mr. Koch has several acres more under cultivation, but time forbade me looking over. A sawn timber house, 22ft by 12 ft is being built with an 8 ft verandah all round. It is astonishing what a quantity of really nice looking houses are going up around, and the familiar split stuff humpie

seems to be going out of fashion.

Below Mr. Koch's selection is that of Mr. Dillon, who is but a recent arrival there. He has a considerable slice of the forest country, and is running a big herd of cattle.

At Myola is the selection of Mr. Emil Scholz. This is a very pretty selection, adjoining the township, and fronting the river and route of the third section. There are two beautiful creeks through this land, and the soil and situation make it a valuable piece of property. Mr. Scholz has 100 full sized banana plants, paw paw trees, pines, and sugar cane. About six acres is now ready to plough. The clearing is fenced with a good fence of wire with top rail.

Lower down on the other side of the river adjoining the late Mr. George Hobson's place is the selection of Mr. Wm. Knocks. While waiting for the railway to be completed before starting in earnest to cultivate his land, Mr. Knocks has cleared about 12 acres, and planted it with fruit trees, following the rest of the selectors by going in for oranges, citrons and lemons, besides other fruit. He believes in grafted trees, and being a gardener has selected them for himself.

Before touching on any more of the selections around I will give a brief description of the roads, railways and townships. The road from Middle Crossing to Welcome Pocket is perhaps one of the best and cheapest works done by the Divisional Board for some time. Some very ingenious cuttings have been made over some of the many gullies, and a very good

crossing or causeway of stones has been put in at Owen's Creek. Without this track the Welcome Pocketites would indeed be shut off from the outside world until the railway reached them, and therefore the road is regarded as a boon and a blessing.

# Inside My Studio

Interview and Photograph by Toni Rogers

**Terry Eager** focuses on the diverse and unique uses of glass in contemporary arts practice. Glass is such an alluring medium, it luminates and glows. Terry creates magnificent flowing shapes which come to life before your eyes. Terry's glass works include fine sculptural pieces as well as decorative bowls and plates. Every part of the process is critical. Her willingness to experiment and challenge the medium has resulted in a spectacular array of artwork.

### Where is your current studio?

Mainly on my verandah, but also under the house and at times has been known to take over the dining table, laundry and kitchen sink!

### Do you work alone or with others?

Generally alone, but I have worked in collaboration with other artists. The artist I have worked with most in the past was Hans Pehl.

### What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Good light and lots of horizontal space to spread out!

### Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

I don't think the word 'pattern' comes anywhere near my work habits! Sometimes if I have a deadline, it occupies all my available time, other times I might go weeks without doing

anything. My other jobs take up a lot of my time available, and there is a lot of other life to fit in too!

### Describe the works you do in your studio.

Mainly I do my production series of bowls and plates, which involves a lot of cutting and assembly, then linishing edges after the first firing to get a nice clean edge. They all go through two firings to get to the finished product.

I also do cast pieces, mainly for exhibitions as it is very labour intensive and involves a lot of mould making which are generally for once-off use. Lately I've been using computer and TV glass for this.

### Why is glass your chosen medium?

It was something that at the time was not being explored by many people and I have always found glass to be a seductive medium. It has a lot of variety of aspects to explore.



In cast glass you have the added dimension of inside space as well as the usual colour, texture, form. You also have the effect of light passing through! Though a lot of my pieces are opaque, I always include a transparent element so you can tell, yes it is glass!

### List three things you listen to while working.

I mainly listen to Radio National on demand – it can be a music show like Music Deli, but sometimes if I don't have to think too much it might be In Design or All in the Mind.

### Your favourite tool?

At the moment it is probably my diamond saw, because it has opened up new possibilities – but I should say my kiln in case it gets offended and decides to get revenge!

### How do you identify your work?

I engrave my name with a Dremel on the bottom.

### How do you sell your work?

As I am not producing a lot these days I just sell through the Arts Co-op and the Cairns Regional Gallery Shop.

### Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I am not home enough!

### What do you do with your seconds?

If it is only a minor blemish I will sell it on sale days or give them as a present. But often if something goes wrong, it is a crack or I've programmed the kiln wrongly late at night – then it is a bin job!

### Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

Yes I have two paid jobs at present – at the surgery, where most people know me from and also I do a few odd shifts at Lotus Glen. Otherwise I certainly would not survive!

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? I'd have an elf to tidy up after me!

If you were not working with art what would you be doing? Everything else I do!

Terry's glass art can be seen and enjoyed at the Kuranda Arts Co-op Gallery in Coondoo Street. Her public art glass installations throughout the village are identified on the Kuranda Art Trail brochure, available at the Arts Co-op and the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre.

### Malanda Sewerage Project

Mayor Tom Gilmore and Cr Rhonda Sorensen were given an inspection of the new Malanda Wastewater Treatment Plant recently to see how the project was progressing now that the region is experiencing clearer weather.

The main bioreactor structure is complete while the control building is expected to reach lock-up stage this week. At this stage, the plant should reach practical completion during August, when clean water commissioning can commence.

Tenders will be invited during June / July for the house connection works. It is anticipated that house connection work should be able to commence in Malanda during September.

The Malanda Sewerage Project is a \$14 million project which is being supported by the Queensland Government through a 65 per cent subsidy on the overall cost of the project.

# KURANDA VILLAGE TAX TIP

### Does my association need to be audited?

On 15 March 2007, the Queensland Parliament approved changes to the Associations Incorporation Act 1981(Act) to make life easier for associations.

These changes mean that associations will have different financial reporting requirements depending on whether they are a Level 1, Level 2 or Level 3 association

**Level 1**: Level 1 associations have either current assets of more than \$100,000 or total revenue of more than \$100,000. There was no change in financial reporting requirements for Level 1 associations. These associations must lodge financial statements audited by a person with the appropriate qualifications.

**Level 2**: Level 2 associations have either current assets between \$20,000 and \$100,000, or total revenue between \$20,000 and \$100,000. They are required to lodge financial statements that have been verified by a person who can audit Level 1 associations or by a person approved by the Chief Executive. An audit is not required. The verification statement must state: "I have sighted the association's financial records and the financial records show that the association has bookkeeping processes in place to adequately record the association's income and expenditure and dealings with its assets and liabilities" or words to the same effect.

**Level 3**: Level 3 associations have total revenue of less than \$20,000 and current assets of less than \$20,000. Level 3 associations will need to lodge financial statements that have been verified by the President or Treasurer of the association. An audit is not required. The verification statement must state: "The Association keeps financial records in a way which properly records the association's income and expenditure and dealings with its assets and liabilities" or words to the same effect.

Level 2 and Level 3 associations need to be mindful of any governing body of your association that requires a full audit. They also need to be mindful of the rules of the association although the Act overrides any rule that is inconsistent with the Act.

If you have adopted the Model Rules after 15 March 2007 then the changes are included in these rules.

I hope this has been helpful to those generous people who volunteer as committee members of associations in the community.

Determinedly Dr Dave

MOST PEOPLE in Kuranda know **Dr Dave Cuming**. He is the driving force in the Kuranda Medical Centre and the subject of this month's profile.

A determined man, his character reflects his main interest in his youth - rugby, and to look at him in his fit middle age you can still believe it. Born in Kent in England nearly 50 years ago, he ascribes his career as a doctor to his ability at rugby (although he admits that he was also good academically). How's that, you say. Well, his answer is that the Dean of the Charing Cross Hospital Medical School was a great rugby fan, and was intent upon maintaining that school's good form in the inter medical school rugby cup. The School had a distinguished history dating back to the mid 1900s. And it had the advantage of having many students from Wales, a rugby centre. So Dave was accepted as a medical student and graduated from there as a doctor, qualifying in 1985.

He spent a little while working in paediatrics around London before putting his name forward for Operation Raleigh in West Africa, where he served for three months. This gave him a new perspective on the practice of medicine.

Coming back to London, he met his future wife Margaret, a senior nursing sister from Cairns. In 1990 they moved to Cairns to live, and they married at the end of that year.

Together they then went back to England to live for 10 years, where Dave practised as a GP in the west country (Devon). They had two girls. But Margaret was still homesick, and while the girls were still young it was possible to contemplate an Australian return. So they made the move back again to Cairns.

By a twist of the immigration laws Dave was not eligible to practice in Cairns. But with the assistance of the QRMSA, Dave was eligible to practice in Kuranda, and it just happened that the two Kuranda GPs, Ian Williams and Ashley Peake, wanted to sell at that time. So Dave took over the practice, operating from the old buildings that were then on the site of new Foodworks. Dave also bought a house in Cairns.

In 2003 Dave bought the land where the Kuranda Medical Centre is now located and made extensions to the building. It opened for patients in September 2003. Later he opened the practice in Redlynch. Dave now spends about three days a week in Kuranda and about two days in Redlynch. The practice is now thriving with 15 practitioners plus staff, with Dave as the senior practitioner and mainstay. Dave now lives in Redlynch, with room for his children's horses. You often see Dave cycling up and down the Range Road to and from work, so please, please be careful.

Dave loves Kuranda and its people and enjoys the mix of work and patients, from senior citizens to indigenous people to many other races. Work is his way of providing service to the community, and this he does with great assiduity. But he is not a doctor to be taken for granted. He strongly believes that people have to take responsibility for their own health in all aspects of their lives. He does not accept the common practice of defensive medicine and is opposed to over prescribing and over testing. Patients may not always be happy with his views. He puts his views into practice in his own life, through healthy living and plenty of exercise. He sees his role as setting an example, not only to his fellow practitioners but also to patients. One cannot help but to admire this approach, at a time when many people look for external sources and excuses to explain and resolve their problems rather than looking at themselves. He sees preventive medicine as beginning with the patient and his/her responsible choices in life.

But within these limits, service to others remains for him a key driver. This includes an extensive use of bulk billing in the practice and the maintenance of high standards. His recruitment policies reflect this. And he is keen to limit the waiting time for patients to see a doctor.

In his limited spare time, Dave is a tennis fan and also at futsal. He is active in the Freshwater Pony Club. He is a devoted family man. What an advantage it is for Kurandaites to have such a man and such a medical practice on their doorstep. Surely a great positive for the community.

As our temperature drops and 'Winter' conditions continue, prepare yourself and your vehicle for seasonal road conditions on the Kuranda Range and Kennedy Highway.

### Driving in mist & fog - what can I do to prepare my vehicle?

- Refill your windscreen washer bottle with water and check the squirt pump operates properly.
- Clean your windscreen wipers and do a 'test run'. If they are not working properly, buy new ones.
- Clean all windows and windscreen (interior and exterior) to remove any smoke haze, dirt, grime or chemical residue.
- Read your car manufacturer's instruction manual, to learn how to de-mist or anti-fog the interior of your car.
- New cars especially European and Asian vehicles are fitted with front and rear fog lights. Check and read the owner's manual.
- Check all headlights are working and aimed correctly.
- Check the condition of your tyres and ensure correct tyre pressure for better traction and control on slippery roads.
- Check your battery, as lights, heaters, air conditioners and windscreen wipers use a lot of battery power.
- Use Rain X Anti-fog liquid for the interior windscreen.
- For 'Wet Season' driving use Rain X Water Repellent on the exterior windscreen only. Heavy rain will glide easily off the outside glass. (Do not get these two products mixed up). Removing Rain-X from a Windshield http://tinyurl.com/3kamqab). If you can't afford or don't have Rain-X, try using shaving cream smeared on the interior glass and polished clean. It makes a good temporary anti-fog remedy. (Do NOT use on the exterior windscreen.).
- Before driving to work in the morning, quickly spray water all over your car and exterior windscreen.

### Remove condensation

- Do not wipe the screen with your hand, use absorbent cloth, towel, or chamois, won't smudge the windscreen.
- Set the de-misters to the fresh 'outside' air, not interior air.
- If your air conditioner and heater work correctly, switch both of them on. If not, then safely wind down driver and passenger windows to fully open.
- If the windscreen still fogs up inside the car, switch the fan on, and direct it onto the interior windscreen.
- For outside condensation turn on your windscreen wipers and use the squirt pump.

### Mist & fog = low visibility

- Most driving decisions are based solely on vision or speed, so please SLOW DOWN.
- Fog creates a visual illusion resulting in limited sight, incorrect distance judgement, and the illusion of slow motion. So please slow down because you may actually be speeding.

### Make sure you can be seen

- Be aware! Grey or white vehicles are almost invisible in heavy fog or mist.
- Re-check your rear view mirrors before you switch on lights and adjust de-misters. Beware of speeding tailgaters.
- Some vehicles are fitted with fog lights front and rear. Know how to use them and don't forget to switch them off or you will incur a penalty. New rules on fog lights: http://tinyurl.com/5ws452q
- No fog lights? Then switch on headlights (not high beam). Dipped headlights direct the light down onto the road and help other drivers to see you.
- Double the normal distance between you, and the car in front, to allow for safer braking and reaction time.
- Tailing someone's rear lights can give a false sense of security, and is dangerous.
- Never stop in the middle of the road you will be rear-ended.
- While driving, gentle manoeuvres are safer. Gently touch your brake and steer smoothly.
- Your full attention is required. Turn off the radio, music and mobile phone to reduce distractions.
- Beware of fallen rocks, trees and cassowaries.
- Driving DOWN the Kuranda range, do not drive too close to the left-hand side.
- Driving UP the Kuranda range, do not drive too close to the middle white line.
- Driving between Kuranda and Mareeba (Kennedy Highway) stay alert for kangaroos, cows, horses, stalled cars or slow moving trucks.
- Read all electronically operated warning signs and follow instructions from TMR Road Tek staff.
- Be patient! Don't put other traffic in danger, especially school and tourist buses, caravans and trucks.



June comes in with a Solar Eclipse at 21:00 hours G.M.T. on 1st June (actually 7.00 am AEST 2nd June). There is a partial Solar Eclipse at 11° Gemini. The eclipse shadow tracks from East Asia to North America. All the symbolism speaks of duality; polarities; reflections and interfacing opposites. Insubstantial, but subtle, butterfly effects. # A Thought for June

**♦** his month we read a passage from St John's Gospel Chapter 20 verses 19 to 31. 'Jesus said to [Thomas] "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe. John 20:29.

Things went a little havwire for Thomas, at a time when the other disciples were daring to believe that the unbelievable had actually happened. Thomas could not take the news on board without proof. So Jesus allowed him to go a week beyond belief, in continued doom and gloom and uncertainty - and then, very daringly, challengingly and convincingly, made it impossible for Thomas not to believe. That was the 'God of the second chance' at work.

As we re-live the wonderful Easter story, doesn't it home in on us that God is in the risk business in a big way, as we see one after another of the disciples, nearest and dearest to Jesus, failing to understand, doing or saying the wrong thing, being slow on the uptake? It took Jesus most of Easter Day to get the message across to those in whom he was placing his trust to take the Church out from Jerusalem and into the world at large. He had to convince them that it had happened - that preaching the gospel was more important than trawling in a netful of Galilean fish. So what chance have we of convincing the millions of people out there that the gospel today is worth more than the National Debt?

At times we are like Peter, Thomas and the rest. We are slow to respond to God's hints and prods. Sometimes, when we think we're actually doing quite well, we let down our guard and do, or say, the wrong thing - not deliberately, please God, but often because we've taken off some of the attention our Lord requires. But God is still the 'God of the second chance'.

And nothing is too big or too trivial for him. We have his word that if we sin in ignorance, he understands. Yes, he does, and we are not to be too hard on ourselves. God not only forgives sins confessed and repented of, he also forgets them. If God is so magnanimous, we also need to forget them. The world will try to tell us that such is not the case; but the world does not, in general, know the meaning of magnanimity and love.

But then, the world is not God. If we let go the pull of the world, and hitch on to the gentle pull of God, we shall let go all those inner tensions that threaten to surface, and which tell us we are no good; we've failed in our calling; it would be best to chuck in our lot with the rest of the world.

If Satan can get us to believe all that junk, he is one happy Devil. Peter could have been so devastated by his threefold denial of Jesus that he high-tailed it out of the limelight, never to return. Who would then have become the missionary to the Gentiles, and the first Bishop of Rome? Thomas could have wallowed so whole-heartedly in his doubting that he broke off all relations with the other disciples, and never returned to the upper room. Who would then have been the first to take the gospel to India? – for that is where tradition tells us Thomas

Even today, in some parts of India Christians are known as 'Christians of St Thomas'. The disciple's grave is said to be in the church at Mylapore, near Madras. God knows what it needs to keep us in his will. He'll work with us, as he worked with Peter and Thomas. He will give us all that is necessary to keep us on the right lines. We can bank on it; God's assurance is gilt-edged. And, praise him, it's not beyond belief.

# **NEXT COMMUNITY MEETING**

# Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> June - 4pm - Kuranda CWA Hall

Kuranda's about to put on another spurt of growth in an area already feeling the strain, that is, in the Fallon Road / end of Mason Road (Kuranda Springs) area.

Some 80-90 house blocks are to go in along Fallon Road, backing on to some Mason Road properties and stretching to the Kennedy Highway. There is no plan for any access to Kennedy Highway apart from existing Mason and Fallon Road. This is looming as an issue of concern. We'll be discussing this at the next meeting.

There was a good turn out of people interested in discussing ways of raising morale in the face of reduced visitor numbers to Kuranda and poor takings. For some, the income has hardly been worth the effort. The town's viability depends on the businesses so we're looking at how we can inject some zing into the businesses. Here's a summary of a great deal of discussion:

We're looking for WHITE LIPPED GREEN TREE FROG habitat. The Cairns Frog Hospital has a frog that has been rehabilitated and is ready for release. It can't go back into the habitat from whence it came, but needs to go into a location where such frogs are known to reside. Can you help?

We're off to kindy this week to revisit our childhood and talk to the wee ones about worms and food trees for our native animals. It's heartening to know they and their teachers have such interest in maintenance of the natural environment.

\*\*

The Kuranda Conservation Community Nursery is very keen to encourage you to plant local native species to enhance the habitat of our local wildlife.

While Kuranda's native flora is not highly colourful with showy flowers, many plants have brilliantly coloured new leaf growth and an amazing display of colourful fruits – food for birds. Of course, some plants do have fabulous flowers, too.

You might be drawn to a garden full of bright flowers, but such a place is denying food and habitat for our local wildlife.

If you absolutely have to have pretty flowers that don't belong here, please also plant some native plants as well.

Another thing to check on if you must plant nonnative plant species is the likelihood of them spreading out of control and becoming a pest, such as "mother-in-law-tongue", syngonium (butterfly creeper in hanging baskets), African tulip trees and many creepers with their attractive flowers.

### Budget 2011-12

### **Barang Street Closure**

I have had many questions about Barang Street. Please have a look at the article on Barang Street on page 29 in this paper. Basically, the crossing is significantly damaged and the crossing is unsafe. The repair estimates are around \$300,000. Council has secured funding for the works through the NDRRA (Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Reconstruction Authority). The funding guidelines require tender processes. Unfortunately, all this has added delays to the commencement of works which has meant continued inconvenience for residents.

### Fallon Road/Jum Rum Crossing

Council has approved signage and lighting upgrade to the approaches to the crossing and also allocated \$150,000 to constructing a bridge access on the causeway. The signage and lighting works should be completed before next wet season.

### **Lights at Ros Common**

The lights are installed at Ros Common Tennis Courts and will soon be available for use. Residents will be able to purchase tokens for a small fee, which will enable them to use the lights. More details will be available at the Residents Association meeting on June 6th.

### Safety Upgrades on Kuranda Range Road Continue

Ongoing safety improvements for users of the Kuranda Range Road remains one of my top priorities so it is good to see the latest equipment being installed. Seven electronic Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) are being installed on the Kuranda Range including on the approach to the downhill 'hairpin' bend.

These intelligent wet weather and speed detection signs will alert motorists to drive to the conditions and remind motorists to slow down if they are driving too fast. These types of signs have proved to be effective in reducing crashes.

Departmental officers have also completed road friction safety tests for the bend, showing that if motorists are adhering to the conditions, using VAS warning signs and static 40kph advisory sign on the curve, there is adequate skid resistance on this section of the road.

Many people who live in Kuranda who also regularly drive the Kennedy Highway to Mareeba will also be pleased to know that planning is underway to determine the best way to manage traffic increases on this section in the years ahead.

### **Government Funding Supports Tourism**

Cyclones, floods and the high Aussie dollar have all played their part in making operating conditions for tourism businesses extremely difficult. That's why the additional \$12 million funding for tourism marketing and development has been so important over recent months with reports of strong Easter bookings. Congratulations to Marc Sleeman and the team at Tourism Kuranda and Kuranda businesses for putting on such a lively and effective Easter promotion for Kuranda.

### **Housing Upgrades Underway**

Work continues on the new housing at Top Korowra with families already moved in to completed stages. As part of this project, the State Government also funded the extension of the sewer line which will enable connections from the School, Mantaka and other properties in the area including the proposed Welcome Pocket aged care facility delivering both environmental and health benefits.

I also recently met with community members to discuss further improvements to housing in the district and I will continue to lobby government for more investment in housing in the Kuranda area.

### **Barron River Queensland Day Awards**

This year I will be again be holding the Barron River Queensland day awards to honour constituents who have served our community through volunteering. ### **Regional Parliament**

Following the success of the Cairns regional sitting of Parliament, the next regional sitting is to take place in Mackay 24-26 May. I will be travelling to Mackay on the Queensland Rail Tilt Train, One of the Tilt Trains has been transformed by 301 meters of Queensland Indigenous artwork, the first of two destined to become striking tourist attractions. Aboriginal artists Judy Watson and Torres Strait Islander Alick Tipot, both with well established international careers are featured.

### In Memorium

I would like to record my respectful acknowledgement for the life of the late Milton Brim. Milton Brim is a loved and respected Djabuguy elder who will be remembered and missed by so many from his country and beyond including the many thousands of people he met through his work as a ranger at Skyrail. My deepest condolences to his family and friends.





### **Barang Street roadworks**

Barang Street, Kuranda has been closed for some time now, due to the collapse of pipe work under the road that needs to be replaced.

The works will cost significant funding (approximately \$290,000) so Council applied for funding and has been successful.

Tenders are set to be advertised on Saturday 11 June, with Council expected to receive a report and select a tender at the Council meeting of 20 July. Tenders are being called for the removal of the existing embankment and broken pipe, placing new box culverts, replacing the embankment and then constructing batter protection gabions or similar, followed by the restoration of the road surface.

The project is expected to take an estimated eight weeks once works have begun (weather dependent). In the interim, motorists are asked to take alternate routes – via Thongon Street and Thooree Streets, Kuranda and Masons Road and Fallon Road, Kuranda.

### Trees to be removed

Three large pine trees near the bus parking area and entrance to Skyrail will be removed after a request from the management of the tourist facility due to safety concerns.

Skyrail has advised Council that it is concerned about the trees due to the number of falling pine cones. The cones are being dislodged by both natural means and the activity of cockatoos.

Due to the height of the upper branches, pine cones fall at great speed, damaging paving bricks and could cause injury to visitors to the Skyrail station.

There has been work done in the past to mitigate the risk, with trees being reduced by half the height, but this has left unsightly trunks as the variety does not re-shoot. Three trees and two unsightly trunks will be removed on 3 June.

### **Bridge to replace causeway**

A bridge will replace a causeway on Fallon Road, Kuranda where a woman died earlier this year after her vehicle was caught in floodwaters.

Tablelands Regional Council has approved the construction of the bridge, estimated to cost \$155,000, with the majority of funding to come from developers' contributions currently being held in trust for that area.

Following the fatal car accident, Council officers conducted a road safety assessment of the site to identify any future improvements that could reduce the likelihood of any future incidents occurring during times of flood.

Officers recommended enhancing warning signage of the Jum Rum Creek causeway as a short-term measure, and replacing the causeway with a two-lane bridge to reduce potential future accidents.

Fallon Road serves as the key access for people living in the growing Kuranda Springs area, with traffic volumes currently in excess of 800 vehicles per day.

### Bursary on offer for young sportspeople

The call has gone out to young people all over the region who are seeking to excel in their chosen sport.

Tablelands Regional Council will be nominating two aspiring young sportspeople from the region to the North Queensland Sports Foundation for the 2011 BHP Billiton Cannington Mine North Queensland Sport Development Bursary.

The \$500 bursaries, as well as a unique embroidered track suit jacket for each successful applicant, will be awarded to two recipients to enable them to pursue

their chosen sport.

Applications must be submitted through member Councils of the NQ Sports Foundation. So, now Council needs to hear from people in the community to be able to determine the two nominations to go forward

Applicants must be under the age of 18 during the year the Bursary is awarded (that is, they must be still 17 years of age on 31 December 2011). The applicants must also live in the Tablelands Regional Council area.

Applications need to be received by Council by 3 June, 2011. Application forms can be obtained from all Tablelands Regional Council service centres or by contacting Council's Coordinator Sport and Recreation Christine Leet on 4043 4769.

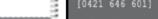

# **Kuranda Community Precinct**

The Kuranda community's interest and participation in the consultation process about the future use of the Kuranda Community Precinct has been both wonderful and exciting. A total of 217 survey responses have been received.

What quickly has become apparent is that people in Kuranda are passionate about their community and environment. It is a very diverse region with many different community and business interest groups.

The future development of the Kuranda Community Precinct is seen by many in the community as an opportunity to revitalise the village, address wider social needs and help create better community cohesion.

The community have suggested the following Key visions for the Kuranda Community

- The desire that the Precinct be developed to act as a community service hub providing Kuranda residents with a place to access community services and engage in activities that enhance social connection. Suggestions include consolidating existing community services and facilities in the one location (e.g. the relocation and expansion of the Library).
- That the Precinct be a multi-purpose space that provides and supports recreational, sporting, cultural, educational and ecological experiences for the entire Kuranda community while preserving the significant environmental and historical aspects of
- · Integration of the Precinct with other surrounding facilities and services (e.g. Kindergarten, Amphitheatre, basketball court, JumRum Creek walking track, Bartley
- Provision of an education/training facility that supports a wide range of learning opportunities and needs.
- Provision of a conference centre that caters for 150+ people that can also be used as a place to hold exhibitions and expos.
- Development of an aged care facility/residential units for seniors to provide for Kuranda's aging population.
- · Development of an indoor sports and recreation facility in addition to providing facilities that support existing sporting groups that use Bartley Park (e.g. club house for rugby league).
- The Precinct is an opportunity to address some of the wider social needs apparent in Kuranda. Suggestions include the establishment of a men's shed, day care facility, youth centre, women's shelter and community housing.

The community have shared their views about the important considerations that should shape the future directions of the Precinct including:

- The long term financial and social viability of the site and its structures.
- The cost of developing and maintaining the precinct to ratepayers.
- Community ownership and acceptance over any proposed development.
- Facilities developed should complement, and not compete with existing facilities such as the CWA Hall, Neighbourhood Centre, Recreation Centre and Amphitheatre.
- Any development of the site should plan for the future long term needs of the Kuranda community.
- Aesthetically, any development of the site should be consistent with the existing character of the town and its buildings. It should also preserve the significant historical and environmental aspects of the site.
- The precinct should not be developed in such a way that becomes a white elephant, under-utilised by the Kuranda community.
- The precinct and facilities it contains should be inclusive of, and accessible to all aspects
- The development of the precinct should be used as an opportunity to revitalise and reinvigorate the Kuranda community. It should be a vehicle for community involvement, communication and community building.
- The site should be retained as a public asset for the benefit of the Kuranda community now and into the future.
- The Precinct should be developed primarily for the community's benefit, with very little, if any, commercial development.

We are currently in the process of finalising the development of options for the site based on our consultations so far. These options will be the subject of a second survey which is likely to be distributed in the community by early June 2011. The survey will be mailed

out to residents, available in hard copy in key locations around Kuranda, and online via the Tablelands Regional Council website.

This second survey will close on Thursday 7 July 2011.

While the response to date has been fantastic, we hope to better that this time, thereby ensuring that any preferred direction developed is truly reflective of the wider Kuranda community.

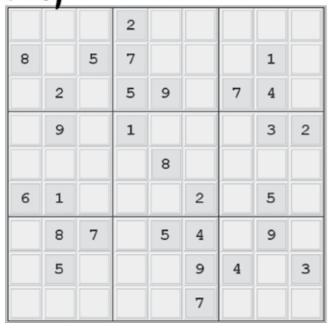

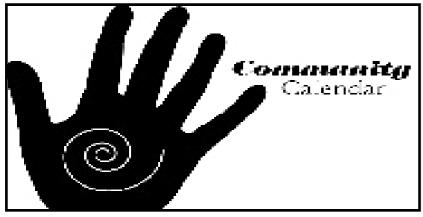
