Kuranda Community Unites Against ICE

FRIDAY 6TH APRIL 2018 was the day people across the Kuranda community and elected representatives from Local, State and Federal governments came together to say "enough is enough", and vowed to work together to address the tragedy of drug addiction, most especially "ICE" (crystal meth/methamphetamine). On a beautiful Friday morning Kuranda residents gathered to march together through the streets of Kuranda to Centenary Park to enjoy the company and fellowship of each other, to discuss the problems of drug addiction and to remember those lost to its menace and offer support for those who are struggling to overcome it.

While this happened in Kuranda it could happen any day in any town in this nation. ICE knows no boundaries.

Organiser Manny Ross, CEO Ngoonbi Community Services Indigenous Corporation, Glenis Grogan, Co-ordinator of the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre Marg Yandell, Mareeba Shire Mayor Tom Gilmore, Federal Member for Leichhardt Warren Entsch and State Member for Barron River Craig Crawford all had a common message – everyone needs to come together and work together to defeat ICE.

Manny Ross said there were few resources available to the community to assist addicts to get off the drug or prevent dealers recruiting new users. "I'm an Aboriginal man but the ice problem effects everyone in this community and the region; it's just as addictive whether you're black or white; the Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities have to stand together to fight this terrible drug. We need proper facilities to deal with this drug, including a local detox and rehabilitation centre, we need a proper education and awareness campaign and we need to provide more hope for our young people."

"We know we can't beat this thing without help," said Manny (via firstnations-telegraph.com).

On Facebook, Mayor Tom Gilmore said "Today I attended the March against the drug ICE in Kuranda along with my State and Federal counterparts... While the March was a show of unity against the scourge of ice, the community needs to tackle this problem from the ground up. If you know someone who is involved in the supply of the drug, report them to CRIME STOPPERS on 1800 333 000. If you or anybody else needs support call Alcohol and Drug Information Services Support on 1800 177 833."

In a media release Federal MP Warren Entsch said all levels of government must take a bipartisan approach and work together to rid Far North Queensland communities from the scourge of ICE. "The scourge of ICE is tearing apart families, relationships and communities. It is happening every day." "ICE use across Queensland, particularly in regional and remote communities, has skyrocketed in recent years – it has fast become the number one illicit drug in the State... Together, we must all work towards reducing the supply of ICE, reducing the demand of ICE and reducing the harms from ICE."

Glenis Grogan said a next step in Kuranda's anti-ice campaign would be a community forum where all our elected representatives and representatives from appropriate agencies can come to Kuranda to listen to this community's experiences and what is needed to address the problem and come up with local solutions (via firstnationstelegraph.com).

While that forum is still in the planning stages, local residents have now organised a community come-together to discuss strategies and ideas to lift positivity in the community, most especially among the young.

In Response to Airstrip Criticism

Koah resident Marc Jaschok has published articles in this newspaper concerning my application for a Material Change of Use-Air Services (Private Airstrip) in regards to the existing lawful airstrip on my property at Fantin Road, Koah.

Mr Jaschok's articles contain a number of incorrect statements that were clearly designed to induce people to question the integrity of my application.

In his articles Mr Jaschok stated that my property which "shares a fence line with the highest populated area of Koah (the township)". The township of Koah is separated from the boundary of my property by some hundreds of metres of trees and the Clohesy River.

Mr Jaschok's articles refer to the impact of "700+ movements" and "700 flights" per year. My application is for 365 recreational flights per year

Mr Jaschok's articles refer to my intention to develop a "mini airport" and my "expansion towards commercial activities/a commercial enterprise". I have not applied for approval of commercial activities nor do I intend to apply for such approval.

I am merely seeking the approval necessary to allow me more recreational use of my airstrip, allow me to fly to my places of work and places of interest and also to allow occasional visits by my flying enthusiast friends.

Mr Jaschok's articles also refer to my "disregard for sticking to the current conditions of use" but I have at all times strictly complied with my existing conditions.

Mr Jaschok also drew a comparison between my application and an application that was rejected by a court in Rockhampton and then stated that based on that case, concerned residents "stand a bloody good chance at getting the airstrip shutdown completely."

The case Mr Jaschok was referring to concerned an application to facilitate a second airstrip and six aircraft hangars for and an aviation fuel storage and dispensing facility which is quite obviously distinguishable from my application.

Further, the lawfulness of the existing airstrip was not in issue in the Rockhampton case and the existing airstrip remains in use.

Mr Jaschok's articles otherwise refer to concerns about "increase in noise", "privacy invasion", "wildlife and stock considerations" and "land valuations" but there is no proper foundation for such concerns.

I consider Mr Jaschok's articles to have been improper, unjustifiable, unreasonable and lacking in bona fides and I am grateful for the opportunity to restore some sensibility to the debate in regards to the integrity of my application.

Koah Airstrip Update

Is the take-off flight path for the Koah airstrip illegal? Aviation experts have advised Koah residents this is so and a letter of official complaint has been sent to council. They have been asked to review — and possibly annul — both the initial and recent approvals. No reply has been received at the time of writing.

The whole process has been perplexing. What appears to have been an administrative error has changed the original motion from a maximum of six flights a day and up to 12 visitor flights a year to one flight a day for an unlimited number of pilots. In the council meeting, it appeared that Cr Toppin's amendment (to reduce the number of flights a day) had the intention to restrict, not expand, the approval. No mention was made in the meeting of the number of other pilots allowed to use the airstrip. And councillors were not told in the meeting that the restriction of 12 visitor pilots had been removed.

Whether these strange procedures are due to loopholes in the Queensland planning laws or council oversights is not entirely clear. Mayor Tom Gilmore has been quoted in the local papers as saying 'Councillors always act in the best interest of the community within the commitments of the rules.' Now is the time to explain to the community what is going on — and attempt to restore faith in council's planning procedures.

JMac Constructions Awarded Kuranda Village Revitalisation

Located north of Cairns, Kuranda is becoming an increasingly popular tourist destination with visitor numbers increasing daily.

With the town's transient population growing, JMac Constructions has been awarded the \$1.3 million project to redevelop Therwine Street, to enhance the atmosphere of Kuranda Village.

The project involves demolition of the existing streetscape, and the design and installation of new urban infrastructure and soft landscaping that will tie in with the township's heritage values. Upgraded retaining and stormwater management systems will also be installed, and new pavements constructed to use for alfresco dining.

JMac Constructions worked collaboratively with Mareeba Shire Council to develop a construction solution which best suited the client's needs and budget. The BMD Group's vertical integration strategy saw BMD's design division, Empower Engineers & Project Managers, work with the project team to deliver a design that would upgrade the village's infrastructure to suitably service visitor demand.

The project is expected to be completed mid-2018, weather and construction conditions permitting.



Council Supports Men's Shed in Kuranda

Council recently endorsed the Kuranda Men's Shed group to occupy a portion of reserved land in Kuranda to develop a safe facility for men to meet and socialise, promoting physical, mental and spiritual well-being.

For some time, the group has been in negotiations with Council to access a suitable parcel of land for their meeting place. Council had previously offered the portion of a reserve which holds what was the old Civil Works Kuranda Depot which is no longer used. Consequently, the section of land has not been used for a number of years and the group accepted the offer.

The portion of land includes an old shed which the group can use as an initial base of their operations and the site has sufficient area to allow for the erection of a new shed which has been donated to them by the Australian Defence Force.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said he was pleased the group accepted Council's offer. "Council certainly encourages the building of strong partnerships with the community and we are delighted to be able to assist this group who provide a wonderful service

The Unfolding KUR-World Train Wreck

KUR-World (*Kur meaning dragon in Chinese*), is a proposed \$650m integrated resort proposed for the Myola Valley, close to Kuranda. The development is the invention of former Macau casino executive Ken Lee, now a born-again real estate developer who also happens to dabble in the cattle industry.

The enormous scale of the development, including an 18-hole golf course, shopping village and 373 residential blocks, has resulted in the project being declared a Coordinated Project by the Queensland State Government. The draft EIS is now being reviewed by the Coordinator-General who has announced this week that the lapse date will be extended from 18th April 2018 for the project to 30th January 2019. This gives the community of Kuranda more time to gather the resources to fight the assault on our precious environment and the insult of this project on our social environment. To date there has not been any public consultation by the developer, although he has been required to do so.

The Myola Valley, in ecological terms, is a uniquely special place. It has the only known specimens of the endangered Myola Palm and Myola Tree-frog. To place such an intensive development in the heart of the Myola Valley will be fought tooth and nail by the majority of Kuranda residents, including Kuranda business owners who see this development as a threat to the existing tourist retail village.

The Kuranda community is a tough, resilient, resolute and determined bunch. But we are few. We need the support of bigger populations to secure our precious natural environment for all to share. The KUR-World development is just another play thing fantasy from an out of town developer. They come, they wreck forever change, then they leave. This battle can be won.

In what could be the first time in Queensland history, the developer has lodged four separate development applications over the same parcel of land. Firstly KUR-World has been lodged with the State Government, and secondly a 239 block subdivision application with Mareeba Shire Council under a 14 year old superseded planning scheme, thirdly, a Nature Based Tourism Material Change of Use to run

quad bike tours (how this is nature based is anyone's guess?) and more recently a Farm Tourism Material Change of Use.


The small community of Kuranda is now fighting against four separate development applications over the same piece of land simultaneously! Many community members could accept a well thought out eco-tourism proposal that provides benefit to the community but this developer has shown by his own actions that eco "is just a meaningless word".

The proponent has clearly indicated that he seeks maximum return from the property and subdividing it into tiny pieces will do just that. The 239 block subdivision application was lodged and the application is Code Assessable and the CEO of Mareeba Shire has delegated authority, effectively locking out any community consultation. Meanwhile helicopters and tour buses are already shipping in Chinese tourists to the site without final approval from Council for the Material Change of Use who are ignoring community complaints.

The Kuranda community needs the representation of their state and federal parliamentarians more than ever. But 'jobs and growth' seem to exclude rather than include the reason that visitors come to our village in the rainforest. This community needs their voice, loud and clear, NOW.

The ongoing current state of play is this:

- The KUR-World EIS has been extended to 30th January 2019.
- A new 239 block subdivision has been lodged with Mareeba Shire Council with Council now awaiting further information requested from the developer.
- Nature Based Tourism to run quad bike tours through sensitive Myola Treefrog creeks has been approved with unsatisfactory conditions by Mareeba Shire Council.
- Farm Based Tourism Material Change of use is awaiting Mareeba Shire approval.



A Brief History of Mareeba Airfield

THE MAREEBA AIRPORT is located 4.3 nautical miles (8.0 km) south of Mareeba Queensland, located on the Atherton Plateau near the Barron River. The Mareeba airfield was built in 1942 as a US Army Air Force base during World War II. The airfield had two runways, with a complement of taxiways, hardstands and



a containment area, and anti-aircraft gun pits and air raid shelters which were constructed but never used. The Mareeba Airfield housed both heavy bomber and fighter squadrons of the US Army Air Force Base in 1942 and 1943. The Americans referred to it as Hoevet Field in honour of Major Dean Carol "Pinky" Hoevet. Major Hoevet was based at the Mareeba airfield and was tragically killed with his crew when their B17 crashed into the sea about a mile off Yorkeys Knob in Cairns on the 16th August 1942.

Queensland was a frontline of Allied efforts in the Pacific War of 1941-45, and especially in the crisis year of 1942. On 9th March 1942, a partial blackout was enforced in Qld from Mackay north and districts 100 miles inland. In total, 12 Japanese air raids were conducted across Queensland, all but one between March and August 1942. Queensland became a military state. Traffic was



restricted, schools closed, radios banned, goods rationed and information tightly controlled. Queenslanders felt the threat of invasion keenly, and the state's military bases, airfields and ports were major launching points for the Americanled counter attack on the Japanese in the southwest Pacific.

Airfields, supply depots and camps were built and coastal forts upgraded. The Atherton

Tableland was used for tropical training and convalescence facilities to treat sick and injured soldiers. During World War II the Atherton Tablelands was home to one of the largest staging bases in the Pacific. Beginning in 1942 with the Mareeba Airstrip being sealed and home to both Australian and American Airforce Squadrons, Mareeba airfield became the main operational airfield in Far North Queensland. In November 1942 the Chief of Australian Military Forces, Lt General Thomas Blamey, ordered a survey of the Atherton Tablelands for combined recuperation and jungle warfare training for Australian troops, of the 6th and 7th Divisions AIF, heading for New Guinea. It was to become the centre for cool climate recuperation of troops and to treat malaria and tropical diseases. It also allowed for the location of personnel and maintenance facilities close to the New Guinea frontline with access to railway and port facilities. This was known as the Atherton Project. From that point on, there was a steady increase of more troops from both Australia as well as the US. There were both Australian and US serviceman based in Kuranda, Mareeba, Atherton, Herberton, Ravenshoe and Tinaroo.

On 12th May 1942, the Main Roads Commission commenced construction of Mareeba airfield and just eight days later, through the efforts of 700 men, on 20th May, the Mareeba airfield gravel strip was first used by RAAF aircraft, and two days later RAAF No 100 Squadron (Beaufort Bombers) moved to the airfield.

On 1st June 1942, it was decided to make Mareeba the main operational airfield in Far North Queensland and on 15th October the Mareeba airfield was completed and sealed with bitumen.

Concurrent with the military buildup of the Tablelands, on 15th June 1942, the Cairns—Kuranda Road was completed and opened to military traffic. From Kuranda the roadworks continued to Mareeba by way of pre-war forestry tracks. Continuous use soon necessitated widening and sealing of the road. The Cairns—Kuranda road and railway became vital links in the military build-up on the Tablelands. Queensland rail traffic during the war jumped by 66% and had the highest density of rail traffic in Australia. Extensions to the main railway lines on the Tableland enabled troops and supplies to access their training camps. The Cairns—Kuranda section was so busy at one stage that in "one 24-hour period, a record 43 trains chugged up the range" (Timothy Bottoms, *Defending The North: Frontline Cairns*).

On 18th June 1943, the Australian government announced that Australia was no longer threatened with invasion; the Japanese no longer had the capacity. Not the

end of the war or the war effort but a change from less defensive to more offensive air operations. Then the end really did come. In Australia, Prime Minister Ben Chifley announced the news in a radio broadcast at 9.30am on Wednesday 15th August 1945, after six years of wartime privations and the loss of some 34,000 Australians.

With the departure of the American units, Mareeba was then used by Nos 5 and 100 Squadrons, No 5 Communication Unit and a variety of Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) support units, with No 24 Operational Base Unit disbanding in early 1946. After the war, much of the airfield reverted to agricultural use, while the southern runway remained as an active airfield. One of the two runways is still in use today as the Mareeba Airport. Around the former airfield are several air raid shelters and the outlines of gunpits. Today, the airfield also hosts a museum with several World War II vintage airplanes on display in a flyable condition and a major maintenance facility. Some years, the Mareeba Warbirds hold airshows at the field.

And now it appears the Mareeba Airport is about to enter into a new phase of development with that recent announcement of The Mareeba Airport Upgrade Project (see page 17).

Unable to apply the breaks or flaps, one of the wheels broke off causing the bomber to spin to the right into a ground loop hitting a tree. Although smoking, the B-17 did not catch fire but was heavily damaged and written off (ozatwar.com).

Force of Nature The 2018 Wet Season

The effects of the wild weather of March 2018 are still everywhere to be seen. In creeks and rivers, and thankfully tanks and dams! Less helpful is the extensive damage to bridges, roads, homes and gardens. It will be quite some time before some are able to come to grips with such dramatic changes. For others though it will just remain one of THOSE Wet Seasons...a real one.

The Kuranda Riverboat is up and running again, with only an amazing eight days out of action despite temporarily losing gangway and pontoon and needing to rebuild the jetty. The very shape of the river and banks has also changed to deposits of sand, but with that too comes soil and nutrients.

Davies Creek is now mostly re-opened although sections of the Bike Park were still closed as of 18 April, and according to OPWS Ranger Rob Miller Davies Creek itself has been massively changed after the floods of March. Boulders and vegetation have been moved by the sheer force of water. How high that water came can be gauged by the fact the Davies Creek Bridge was briefly closed due to massive amounts of debris over the highway. But all that is a distant memory now and already the water is clear and we are entering the months of spectacular postcard worthy weather and lush green vistas.

For the record, March 2018 was recorded at the Kuranda Railway Station BOM weather station as the fourth highest March rainfall total (1216.0 mm) since records started in 1896. And with the accumulated rainfall for the first three months of 2018 (2080.5 mm) at the end of March we had already exceeded the total rainfall for 2017 (1794.0 mm). The highest rainfall total, for ANY month, since 1896, recorded at the Kuranda station was a whopping 2940.0 mm in January 1979 - another month like this March which experienced a cyclonic event at either end of the month. Many residents of Kuranda may remember January 1979, but now many more will also remember March 2018.

Wet Season Story by Marc Jaschok, Koah

PART ONE: THE DRY

My eyes squint as they drift over the paddocks. The reflection of the sun from the brown blades of grass hurts behind my eyes. A familiar headache starts creeping in. I walk across the lawn that is now nothing but dust and the heat from the earth is close to unbearable on my shoe-less feet. I wonder how any microbes or fungi could possibly survive this oven-like dehydrator that surrounds me and my shoulders feel heavy. The thought of rain seems like a past life and I am sure that it will never happen again. This heat is so oppressive, there is no wind and the humidity has burnt off a long time ago ... it is just dry. I am sure the moisture is evaporating from my eyes, as the lids slowly scratch their way down and up like the cracked wipers of my car. There is a lingering smell of a faraway bushfire in the air that puts fear into my heart in a way cyclones don't. The thought of losing everything that is on my farm in one swoop makes me question the path I have chosen to take. I am amazed that the timber house hasn't already spontaneously combusted and disappeared with barely a puff of smoke. Mother Earth has been teasing me these past weeks by drifting nimbus clouds so close that I can feel their presence without having to open my dry eyes. My body acts like a barometer and I know the pressure is dropping, I want it to rain with all my heart and soul.

PART TWO: THE WET

I stand in the field watching yet another cloud drift by, teasing me; I close my eyes. I need it to rain or else I will implode. If the dry hadn't drawn all the moisture out of me I would probably

I DO feel a wetness on my face. Perhaps there was a drop left in me after all; that thought makes me smile. There it is again, another drop! I open my eyes to find my tears of joy falling from the sky. From the nearby tin roof a single note hits like a snare drum, then another, and another. Soon the sound is like a thousand enthusiastic kids playing out of rhythm on their first drum kit. I don't mind. The frogs try and sing along to its irregularity, but they are soon drowned out by the life that is now pouring from the crack in the heavens. My heart explodes open and I realise I haven't breathed in a long time? Weeks? Perhaps even months. The weight is off my shoulders and I feel light and giddy. I am wet to the bone and loving every moment of it. Is that a blade of green grass coming up already? A fungus showing its head? Soon the death that had seemed all around me has turned into life; the green is easy on the eyes, the pheasant mating calls are easy on the ears, the wet earth easy on the nose, and the moisture has returned to my body. I feel alive.

PART THREE: THE MOULD

The hot dry ground beneath my feet has turned to mud between my toes. The closet is now a fungal petri dish, my brown leather shoes are now green. Will this rain ever ever end?




Focus on Kuranda

Snippets from Mareeba Shire Council

A GROWING, CONFIDENT AND SUSTAINABLE SHIRE

On Wednesday 18th April Council adopted its Corporate Plan for the next five years. The Plan sets the strategic direction of the Council and highlights the performance indicators for measuring the local government's progress in achieving its vision for

The document includes a fresh vision, mission and set of values and principals which will help define Council's direction over the next five years.

Council's mission is to: "provide cost-effective services, foster collaborative partnerships and maintain accountable governance to promote the prosperity and livability of the Shire."

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the strategic priorities start with financial sustainability. "We will continue to manage our finances efficiently and effectively to ensure longterm financial sustainability, while bolstering capacity to provide a high level of service across all areas of the Shire, "Cr Gilmore.

Cr Gilmore said community engagement and promoting an active, safe and healthy lifestyle were also priorities over the next five years. "We will continue to assist the community to build its capacity to develop the area of arts, culture and heritage to enrich lifestyles and encourage economic development across the Shire."

Maintaining transport and Council infrastructure, focussing on and enhancing the Shire's resilient economy, being environmentally responsible and governing with ethical, accountable and transparent decision making are Council's other strategic principals included within the Plan.

CHANGES TO BUILDING CERTIFICATION

In keeping with current trends with other regional Councils, Mareeba Shire Council will no longer offer building certification services, with an exception for remote areas in the Shire.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the private certification industry has grown. "An investigation into the market has revealed that there are sufficient private certifiers in the region to provide adequate service to the region." Cr Gilmore explained.

"For many years, Council has been offering building certification services however under Local Government Regulations, this service is not mandatory."

Council will continue to assist those remote communities that are not frequently serviced by private certifiers. "We understand that people living in remote parts of our Shire may find it difficult to obtain a private building certifier, so we will still be offering the service in those remote areas," Cr Gilmore said.

More information, including a map of the building certification boundary, will be available on Council's website.

BUDGET SET TO BALANCE

In preparation for the upcoming budget, Council today adopted several scheduled fees and charges for the next financial year.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said next year's budget would again be a safe and sensible one. "There has been a slight increase in fees as you'd expect across the board to keep in line with the rising cost of living and cost recovery," Cr Gilmore said.

'Our staff have been working diligently to ensure our budget puts Council in a sound financial position for a sustainable future."

Council is set to adopt the budget at a special Council meeting in June.



As with many of Australia's native animals, the Sugar Glider is appropriately and imaginatively named: "Sugar" owing to its favourite diet consisting mainly of sugary foods, nectars and saps, and it "glides" by way of the patagium, a membrane that stretches from hindlegs to forelegs.

The Sugar Glider can be easily mistaken for its close relative, the Squirrel Glider, which is larger and lacks the white tip on the end of the tail.

The Sugar Glider is relatively widespread throughout northern and eastern Australia, New Guinea and parts of Indonesia. They are found in a wide range of

habitats, from rainforest to Sclerophyll forests – wherever there is an abundance of its main food sources - nectars, fruits and saps. The glider is omnivorous and particularly likes to snack upon various insects, the occasional lizard and bird eggs.

Very social animals, family and friends set up home in tree hollows, and this is generally how many Sugar Gliders and other species of Glider come to grief. Farmers and residents clearing trees, especially old growth trees, often find a family of Gliders crashing to the ground. Usually the adult members will run off in terror into other surrounding bush leaving the juveniles and babies to be gathered up and passed onto vets or animal welfare carers.

Other dangers to gliders are of course domestic animals and kookaburras, goannas, as well as nocturnal predators such as owls, and snakes. The feral cat is by far reputably the biggest killer of gliders.

Ollie, pictured, was brought into care at Batreach Kuranda from Top of the Range estate in February as a 14 gram baby (adult fully grown males range up to 140g). Under Pam's care he is now a robust 50g and once paired with an appropriate mate will be safely released back to the wild.







IN MEMORIUM



SPEEWAH RESIDENT MERILLI (SANDRA) EDWARDS (born 11/1/1943) passed away peacefully on Monday 19th March 2018. A memorial service was held at the Mareeba Garden Settlement chapel on Tuesday 27th March 2018. A reception was held afterwards at the The Australian Icecreamery, Emerald Creek, which was one of her favourite eating places. Her husband Saddhen thanks those who attended and all who have sent their condolences.

Merilli was one of three daughters born to doctors Robert and Natherli Johnson in Tarrytown NY. She was a very intelligent woman, being in the top few percent in the Mensa test. After high school she attended Vassar College

and later studied arts at Hawaii University before going to Japan to teach English for 12 months. This was to be her only paid work experience as her parents set up a trust fund to assist her in life. For many years she was a volunteer for the Peace Corp in Northern India

She also studied ballet and loved modern dance as well and classical music. Her chosen sports were ice skating in the winter and trekking the Himalayas almost to the base camp of Everest staying close to where the Dali Lama resided. She painted well but never kept her works, she wrote poems by the hundreds and even a few stories, one of which was serialised in *The Kuranda Paper*. She played piano and had a great singing voice bringing many guests to tears at our wedding at Binna Burra National Park where she came down a staircase singing The Hawaiian Wedding song.

She would visit her parents most years and returned to Hawaii many times. It was here in Kuranda in the early 1970s that she heard of Bhagwan, later to be known as Osho, and after a bit of study applied for a Sanyasin name and was given the name Suchata, which enticed her to go to Poona, India to experience the scene first hand.

She sat with Osho with only three other westerners there. This was way before a commune was formed. Osho renamed her Suneeta and she sat with him for his talks even when in Hindi. She had to leave every six months owing to visa rulings, returning to NY. Eventually a commune was formed in Poona and she spent time working (a part of worship) in the kitchens, alternating with three or four different meditations a day. This to-ing and fro-ing between visits to NY and more trekking continued for a few years until the commune opened up in Oregon USA.

In 1982, the first world annual festival at the Oregon commune attracted many thousands of visitors. I went in '83 and again in '84 and it was then that I met Suneeta, my soulmate, and we became partners. I travelled with her to NY to meet her family and persuaded her to come back to Australia with me where we lived in commune together. Eventually the commune had to close down and we lived in Bondi for a few months before I talked her into travelling around Australia. We set off in an old Land Rover towing a semi foldable caravan. After five months we arrived at Kuranda and she fell in love with the area and we decided to stay.

Most years she would go travelling while I built us a house at Speewah and it was on one of those trips to southern India, Mother Meera gave her the name Merilli.

We continued to live and travel, sometimes alone and sometimes together. She loved cruises and we did some of those together. For many years and until a few weeks before passing over she attended meditations with Kuranda's Pat Chong and a group of friends.

Amen. May she endure in our hearts and rest peacefully.





Kuranda Historical Society – UPDATE –

Toolbox for Sustainable Development

What is Sustainable Development?

Perhaps the most complete definition is development that meets the needs of the current generation without degrading the ecological inheritance of future generations.

Is This What We Are Seeing in Our Region?

Over the last few decades, there has been an onslaught on the recovering rainforest and bush in Kuranda and the wider region. Cassowaries and other endangered wildlife have been killed by loss of habitat, traffic, feral animals and domestic cats and dogs. Just recently, large numbers of paperbarks have been cut down in the centre of Mareeba to evict flying foxes.

As habitats shrink, the clashes between humans and wildlife will increase unless a more collaborative and sustainable planning approach is taken. With this vision in mind, the Kuranda Region Planning Group (KRPG) has been set up. See www.kurandaregion.org for further information. This is a network of local residents, environmental groups and wildlife experts that aim to work with government at all levels. FoE FNQ is a member of this network.

ACTION: Support KRPG's Wet Tropics World Heritage Vital Corridor Buy Back Scheme - email info@kurandaregion.org for further information.

Opposing Environmentally Destructive Development

We have various options:

Engaging with the official governmental planning system at Local, State or Federal level

We can put in submissions to Mareeba Shire Council about potentially environmentally destructive developments that conflict with the Mareeba Shire Planning Scheme 2016. For a list of current development applications, see https://msc.qld.gov.au/building-planning/development-applications/.

If the development is still approved, we can then appeal in the Planning and Environment Court against the approval – but only if we were submitters. The Environmental Defenders' Office (EDO) offers legal advice, fact sheets and community handbooks prepared by legal experts. However, court cases can be lengthy and expensive. Mediation is another option to achieve a better outcome.

Very large developments are assessed by all three layers of government – and this is the case for the mega-resort KUR-World.

Non violent direct action

In the 50th year after Martin Luther King was killed, this remains one of the most powerful tools we have.

The Daintree Blockade in the 1980s was a local example of people risking their lives to protect the rainforest. Though




it failed to stop the Bloomfield track being bulldozed through, it helped to save the Daintree and kick started the listing of the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area.

This inspiring local history has been chronicled in the new book The Daintree Blockade: the Battle for Australia's Tropical Rainforests by Bill Wilkie.

It is well worth the read with the added bonus of name spotting local eco-heroes who still live in the area.

As Bob Brown said "The sheer energy and commitment of those campaigners on the ground—that was the core to saving the Daintree itself."

As we battle mega-resorts and huge subdivisions and find out how weak and woolly the planning law is in Queensland, this may be what it takes to save the Kuranda region.





halls, in every shopfront and available window space, pottery artworks from 'everywhere' were being displayed. (Toni got her directions from the local butcher's shop which had artworks featured in the window). SUPPORTING ART AND CULTURE IN REGIONAL **QUEENSLAND**

Over the last three years, Mareeba Shire Council has funded 33 community arts, heritage and cultural initiatives, to the tune of \$110,000, through Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) program.

After a recommendation given by the RADF Advisory Committee, Council today agreed to fund seven projects under the community grant round of the RADF 2017/18 strategy.

The funding is an ongoing partnership between the State Government and the Mareeba Shire Council to support local arts and culture in regional Queensland.

Chair of the RADF Committee, Councillor Angela Toppin congratulated the seven successful applicants. "It is wonderful to see Queensland Government support art and cultural projects in regional areas, and I look forward to seeing these projects come to fruition," Cr Toppin said.

"Creative opportunities are essential to the cultural vitality and wellbeing of the community by decreasing social isolation and sense of belonging to the community."

From your Councillors

It has been a fantastic start to the year hosting the Queen's Baton Relay, the annual Kuranda Easter Festival and most recently Michael Portillo from the BBC's 'Great Continental Railway Journeys'.

Supporting Local Artists: Kuranda resident, Rebecca Koller was among seven successful applicants to receive funding from the Mareeba Shire Council and Queensland Government's Regional Arts Development Fund community grant round. The Wildlife artist will paint murals on six Ergon power boxes on Coondoo and Therwine Streets, Kuranda. This will increase the visual aesthetics of the town, promote the natural beauty of the region and encourage tourism. This project has the support of the Tourism Kuranda Advisory Committee. The Mayi Wunba Dance Troupe from Kuranda also received funding after they performed at multiple events at the 2018 Commonwealth Games at the Gold Coast. The performance showcased the group's cultural traditions and provided dancers with the experience of performing in front of large audiences. Congratulations!

Flood Damage: Council has worked hard to repair roads and bridges damaged in the flooding event we saw in March. Flaggy Creek Bridge, at Mona Mona, was damaged by flood water and debris, effectively closing Mona Mona Road at the Flaggy Creek Bridge. Accessibility to the bridge was restricted by flood waters and once it was able to, Council began removing debris and what was left of the bridge. While the bridge still remains closed, Council hopes to provide temporary access, however this depends on the findings of an engineering assessment. The bridge will be replaced when approval is received from Queensland Reconstruction Authority as it will be funded by the national disaster relief funding arrangements.

Kuranda Men's Shed: For some time, the Kuranda Men's Shed have been looking for a suitable parcel of land for their shed for a number of years. The group has now decided to accept the parcel that Council had previously offered which used to house the old Civil Works Kuranda Depot. The portion of land includes an old shed which the group can use as an initial base of their operations and the site has sufficient area to allow for the erection of a new shed which has been donated to them by the Australian Defence Force. A wonderful outcome!

Dog Registration: Dog registration renewal notices will be sent out at the end of the month. You can receive your renewal notice by email - contact council to register for this digital service. Remember every dog in Queensland needs to be registered by law and not only will failing to do so result in a fine but will make it very difficult for Council to reunite you with your animal should it go missing.

Therwine Street Upgrade: Work will begin soon on the exciting Therwine Street Redevelopment. Council is spending \$1.3 million, raised through the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund which comes from contributions from Scenic Rail and SkyRail, to improve the streetscape and amenity in Therwine St. The project forms part of Council's ongoing commitment to systematically upgrade infrastructure to adequately service visitor demand and enhance Kuranda's appeal as a world-class tourist destination.

Black Mountain Road, Mona Mona: Bridge No. 7 on Black Mountain Rd has been replaced. The old timber bridge was coming to the end of its useful life and had a very low load limit imposed on it.

MAREEBA SHIRE COUNCIL is soaring closer to completing the region's most anticipated aviation facility, with the next two stages of the Mareeba Airport Upgrade Project set to take off.

Council recently awarded a contract for the construction of airside infrastructure to local company FGF Developments Pty Ltd.

Mareeba Mayor Tom Gilmore said the \$14 million contract consists of the extension of the aviation commercial precinct (Stage 1) and airside works (Stage 2).

"The award of this tender is without a doubt the most significant milestone to date in the reconstruction of this World War II airstrip. The project is anticipated to support the transformation of the Mareeba Airport into a major pilot training and aircraft maintenance facility - probably the most important facility of its kind in northern Australia," Cr Gilmore said.

The Mareeba Airport Upgrade Project is jointly funded by the Australian Government (\$5 million) and the Queensland Government (\$13 million) and is

being delivered by Mareeba Shire Council.

"This redevelopment is a result of generous contributions from the Australian Government and Queensland Government without which the redevelopment would not and could not have ever proceeded," Cr Gilmore said.

"On behalf of the community, I offer my sincere thanks to both governments for their input and their co-operation as we move towards the award of this tender."

Northern-based Federal Government Senator Ian Macdonald said the work is an important milestone.

"This initiative will give the Mareeba Airport a new lease of life and ensure future pilots in North and Far North Queensland have access to new and improved training facilities."

The key project deliverables include a 52-lot aviation commercial precinct, resurfacing the existing runway, upgrade to airfield lighting, construction of new taxiways and upgrades to surrounding roads, drainage, lighting and airport fencing.

Member for Cook, Cynthia Lui said the Queensland Government was proud to be working with Mareeba Shire Council on an important project set to deliver enduring regional benefits driving economic development, jobs growth and benefits for Far North Queenslanders.

"This project is building on the region's existing strengths in aviation and will help position Mareeba as an important provider of aviation services, pilot training and maintenance in Far North Queensland," she said.

"Awarding this tender marks an important milestone in the delivery of this project and I look forward to seeing the economic benefits for Mareeba realised once

Cr Gilmore said Council is looking forward to working with FGF Developments. "The successful tenderer, which is of course a local firm and is well understood to be capable of the scope of works required to be undertaken. We are proud to partner with FGF and congratulate the company on the successful outcome," he said.

Company Director, Blue Williams said FGF was excited to be part of such an important project. "We are looking forward to working with the Mareeba Shire Council on this multi-million-dollar upgrade which will see further job creation and investment opportunities in regional areas such as Mareeba," Mr Williams said.

Cr Gilmore said the project had been a long-term dream of Council to have this relic of the war turned into a nursery for job creation for the community. "It is fair to say that we are unlikely to see a development of this magnitude again in Far North Queensland," he said.

"The process leading to the awarding of this tender has been long and complex, and I thank the Mareeba Shire Council staff and those departmental staff, both in Brisbane and Canberra, who have been working diligently to ensure we progressed to this point with minimal disruption.

"I am thrilled to see these next stages of the project get underway," Cr Gilmore concluded.


















A Bug's Life

When it comes to living long lives, we humans are near the top of the list. Only a handful of other animal species on the planet have a longer life expectancy than we do. Often it is the larger animals that live for longer, but there are numerous exceptions. Many people assume that the insects and their relatives (the invertebrates) have very short life-spans due to their small size, but surprisingly this is not always the case.

There are certainly many invertebrates which do not live long at all and have their entire life cycle over and done with in a couple of weeks. Some invertebrate's lives appear to be over in the blink of an eye. Some butterflies, for example, have only a few days of life on the wing. What many people do not consider is the length of their immature lives as caterpillars and their time pupating prior to emerging into the form that we know so well. Still, a few months is not exactly a surprisingly long life.

Cicadas take this a step further. They may only appear above ground for a matter of weeks over the summer months, but in fact many of these animals are quite long-lived. In some cases the young cicadas (nymphs) spend many years developing underground before emerging as the noisy adults we hear.

For other species, some individuals may live longer than others due to the roles they play in their communities. Social insects such as bees and ants are such examples. Worker honeybees live fast, furious lives of around six weeks in duration, however, the queen honeybee can live three or four years.

Cockroaches are relatively long-lived insects, with many species expecting to live a year or two. One Australian species, however, the Giant Burrowing Cockroach (*Macropanethsia rhinoceros*) lives up to ten years on a very simple diet of dry gum leaves.

In the spider world, many species are seasonal (living for less than a year) which includes the regularly encountered orb-weaving spiders common to our region. Some of those we encounter around the house such as huntsman spiders may live two or three years. The longest living species are actually the most primitive species; the trapdoors, funnelwebs and tarantulas. The tarantulas hold the records here; Australian species may live to around ten years, while some of the largest overseas species can live for up to twenty years.

Sex also has a big influence on the lifespan of many invertebrates. The females of many invertebrate groups including stick insects, praying mantids and spiders outlive their male counterparts, often by a considerable length of time. The pinnacle of the male's life is to reproduce and once he has mated it is often game over. The sexual cannibalism of mantids and some spiders is well known, but if not being eaten by a ravenous female, the male often simply hits his 'use by date' and dies naturally. Females on the other hand must live on to lay eggs or give birth, often doing this multiple times and living months, or in some cases, years longer.


Top Photo: The Giant Burrowing Cockroach's ten year lifespan is longer than many reptiles, and mammals.

COMMANDER BOB HEFFEY, CSM, RAN

Bob Heffey was born in Hamilton, Victoria in 1956. Educated in various schools throughout Victoria and New South Wales, he joined the Royal Australian Navy as a Recruit Weapons Mechanic on 6 February 1974 at HMAS *Cerberus* in Victoria.

Between 1974 and 1987, he served in most classes of RAN surface combatants, including HMA Ships *Supply*, *Torrens*, *Buccaneer*, *Wewak*, *Moresby* and Diving Tender Vessel *Seal*.

Interspersed during this period, he also served in shore establishments HMAS *Cerberus, Coonawarra, Kuttabul, Waterhen, Moreton, Leeuwin* and the Defence Force Recruiting Centre in Brisbane.

He was the Commanding Officer of Diving Tender Vessel *Seal* between 1984-1987, operating out of HMAS *Waterhen*.

Bob was promoted to Leading Seaman in 1979, Petty Officer in 1981, and Chief Petty Officer in 1984, he was selected as a Commissioned Officer in September 1987 with the rank of Sub Lieutenant.

During 1988 and 1989, Lieutenant Heffey served as the Gunnery Officer and Senior Officer of the Watch in HMAS *Success*.

In February 1990, on completion of his Intermediate Navigation course, he was appointed Navigating Officer of the Fremantle Class Patrol Boat HMAS *Ipswich* in Cairns where he served for 18 months in Border Protection roles

A posting to Darwin as the Executive Officer of Fremantle Class Patrol Boat HMAS *Launceston* followed, until January 1993.

Lieutenant Heffey then joined the Commander Australian Patrol Boat Forces (COMAUSPABFOR) Sea Training Group as Staff Officer Navigation, holding that position until November 1994, when he was posted as the Staff Officer Gunnery to COMAUSPABFOR. Both postings enabled him to utilise all his gunnery, seamanship and management skills to best effect.

Promoted to Lieutenant Commander in July 1995, he was posted to the United Kingdom for the Royal Navy International Amphibious Exchange billet on the Royal Navy Amphibious Assault ship HMS *Fearless* in December 1995 as the Bosun and Senior Dockmaster.

Returning to Australia in March 1998, he completed a short stint at Naval Training Command Headquarters in HMAS *Cerberus* conducting a review on Billet Pre-requisite Training, until he was appointed as the First Lieutenant of HMAS *Cerberus* in June 1998.

He was then selected for, and assumed command of, the Darwin based Fremantle Class Patrol Boat HMAS *Dubbo* in May 1999.

He departed HMAS *Dubbo* in September 2000 after an extremely successful command, which included 185 boardings of foreign fishing vessels of which 28 involved apprehensions, interception and tow of seven illegal entry vessels and the arrest and repatriation of 1394 illegal immigrants.

He still holds the record for the arrest of the largest number of illegal immigrants at one time, with the interception and arrest of the 'Harapan Satu' on 4 November 1999 with 357 illegal immigrants onboard.

Between October 2000 and November 2001, he was the Maritime Operations Officer at Headquarters Northern Command in Darwin, followed by an overseas posting to the Republic of Palau as the RAN Maritime Surveillance Adviser to the Marine Law Enforcement Division for the Ministry of Justice, managing and training the Palauan Nationals onboard the Pacific Class Patrol Boat 'PSS President H.I. Remeliik'.

Promoted to Commander on 1 January 2004, he returned to Australia in March 2004 where he was posted as the Minor War Vessel Operational Test Director at the Royal Australian Navy Test, Evaluation and Analysis Authority (RANTEAA) on Garden Island, Sydney.

His extensive portfolio of Projects included the introduction into service of the Armidale Class Patrol Boat, Mine Warfare Command Support System, Amphibious Watercraft and Hydrographic Ships.

In December 2006 he posted to the position of Chief of Staff and Deputy Commander Australian Navy Patrol Boat Group in Darwin.

He was awarded the Conspicuous Service Medal on Australia Day 2007 for his outstanding service whilst posted to RANTEAA for his contribution to, and successful introduction into service, of the Armidale Class Patrol Boat.

From December 2008 to January 2011 he was the Commanding Officer HMAS *Cairns*.

During this posting, HMAS *Cairns* was awarded the coveted Governor's Cup in 2008 and again in 2010 for the most efficient and outstanding Navy Establishment in Australia

He was also awarded a Fleet Commander's Commendation for outstanding leadership on completion of his Command tenure.

Commander Heffey was then posted as the Director Australian Navy Cadets in Canberra between March 2011 and July 2015, which involved the personnel and financial management of 90 Training Ship (Cadet Units) throughout Australia and approximately 3500 cadets and civilian cadet staff.

He then returned to Cairns as the Regional Manager Personnel Support Unit, Far North Queensland until his retirement on 10 December 2016.

In his final week in the Royal Australian Navy, Chief of Navy, Rear Admiral Tim Barrett, visited HMAS *Cairns* and awarded Bob a Chief Of Navy Gold Commendation for his outstanding performance and leadership as Director Australian Navy Cadets.

Twenty one years of his naval career were spent at sea, the majority of the time in and around Minor War Vessels, as well as Sea Training Group.

Bob is now happily retired after 43 years of service and lives with his lifelong partner Ange and their loyal dogs, Labrador 'Pirate' and Golden Retriever 'Boo'.



Kuranda Woman Hit Hard by March Floods

During the March floods, Kuranda local Meredith Clarke's property in Myola was decimated by the floodwaters. "An inland tsunami swept in and washed everything I owned away whilst I was stuck near Mareeba, unable to secure or save anything. I was absolutely devastated with the loss as I have been slowly building my own little cabin on a tiny piece of land on my own. Most of my utilities run off either generators or gas bottles. The only things that survived were my dog, my truck and the clothes I had with me."

One can hardly imagine the despair at not only losing everything and having to start over completely but to also have have to first re-establish a place in which to live, Meredith's caravan was not only filled with mud but also knocked off its foundations. Although she has been supported by friends following the disaster, including being given temporary shelter, she still desperately needs some help to get back on her feet.

The main items that she is in desperate need of replacing or repairing (apart from the most basic and personal items, household goods and even food) are:

- GAS/2way fridge
- Whipper Snipper
- Lawn Mower
- Twin Tub Washing Machine
- 3.5 kg Clothes Dryer
- 1500ltr Water Tank
- Cement Mixer
- 2 Solid Clothes Cupboards.

• Ukulele and tuner (for keeping of spirits up)

The fridge is a big stepping stone in Meredith getting back into her home. Living with solar and small generator has its own challenges, so having basic refrigeration is a huge step towards regaining her independence. A Grinter's Tale

Doggone it!

I seem to recall I started last month's article with a sentence that went something like "Yay, we finally have a wet season". I think that was something of an understatement and I'm fully aware that there are those who could have rammed those words down my neck in the aftermath of the sudden deluge I did not predict.

To those poor souls who lost everything, my heart goes out. It truly does. I wrote the column two days before frantically wielding a mattock, digging a trench to prevent putrid liquid mud flowing through the house. I was one of the lucky ones.

With Speewah Rural Fire Brigade I witnessed the utter devastation at The Billabong, absolutely soul destroying for Jake and the crew, but what a huge effort the guys had made before we even got there.

Earlier, the RFB guys had headed down to Cedar Park to help restore some semblance of normality. How soul destroying for the many householders around the Kuranda region whose lives have been turned around by that unheralded event.

So, my huge apologies to those who were inundated, to whom my comment must have been like salt in a wound. On the day in question, I arrived back in Speewah and crossed Grove Creek in the nick of time before it became a raging river. It was only one week after arguing with Youi Insurance about 4881 being a flood zone in toto. The customer service representatives must be sniggering into their lattes and replaying my recorded "Are you kidding me, I hope this message was

recorded. I am up a mountain! I am on a virtual plateau no less! I have a creek down the road, not a lake or a tidal river, but a wee creek that cuts the road once in a blue moon."

I cringe now at the thought that my rantings will probably be used in future Youi advertisements. You know, the one that starts "Hey, you've probably seen this ad, it's been on television since January. Since then, over 60,000 people from all over Australia have joined Youie..." Behind 'Joseph', pictures of widespread flood damage on the Atherton Tablelands appear, with voice over of Grinter assuring Youi she lives in a desert.

Social media played a role in opening our eyes to the widespread damage and accompanying heartbreak. To the lowlifes who stole a mower from a 'condemned' house in Speewah, where the owner lost everything, I feel sorry for you. Karma is like a magnet; believe me, it's on its way to your place right now, and it has horns, wings and the wrath of the entire Speewah neighbourhood behind it.

Talking of the wrath of neighbourhoods, our dog problem here in Speewah is getting pretty serious. Although Facebook is a great medium to advise people their dogs (or other animals) are out and causing a nuisance, threats of violence against the dog and pictures of instruments of torture aren't conducive to creating peace and harmony amongst residents.

I don't allow my dogs to use Facebook, and I'm pretty sure I'm not the only one, and although most loose dogs are blissfully unaware of threats floating around in the ether, the children of the family that own the dog/s may well see a picture of their dog and the accompanied threat. Their pet is lost, and besides that, there's adults around talking of cruel ways of disposing of it. There's surely enough violence in the world without us sowing the seeds of wrath in a small community and teaching our kids to do away with something that annovs them.

I dread going away, as I had a housesitter years ago, who, as it turned out, came home at 11.00pm, went to bed, and left at 6.00am, chucked charcoal briquettes (or that's what they looked like) into a bowl rather than feed the good meat left for them, and that was it as far as interaction with the dogs. My dogs went AWOL a couple of times, jumping over the fence and being seen up the road. They were used to a long walk every day, ball throwing, and being fed. It happens. I was powerless to do anything, being in the UK.

But this is the biggest problem in the Speewah neighbourhood, and one which I am constantly asked to write about, that is dogs near their own property but just left to venture out of the front gate and wander around. So many people are loathe to walk their dogs now due to the presence of other people's dogs outside the confines of their properties.

Most of these dogs are in fact cowards, but there are several local residents who are genuinely scared of dogs, and have stopped walking as a result. Other dog owners carry a stick, and those with unreliable dogs who fear aggression, as a result of being attacked by another dog, cannot take their dog out at all.

The situation is made worse if the dog is walking on a lead, as it is aware it has no control over the situation and will normally react more violently and possibly involve, even injure, the owner as a result of the owner trying to save their pet, or being bowled over. That's why dogs will often get on much better when meeting off lead or on a very loose lead. It is a common thing to restrain a dog when walking towards another dog. However imperceptible this tightening of the lead is, it immediately alerts the dog, sending a message that something could be wrong and setting the meeting up for failure.

That's a subject for another day — I could talk about that for hours.

> So many people say, "But my dog is friendly". Try telling that to someone who has been attacked by a dog, or whose dog has been aggressed by another dog.

> No less than three people here on my road have been aggressed by three different dogs in the past few years, dogs that I personally never had a problem with, but fear is palpable for the person who is feeling it, and evident to an animal.

> It's a sad state of affairs when you can't walk or drive around the block without passing three or four dogs wandering on the road. It is even more sad that responsible owners cannot exercise their dogs without fear. If more dogs on acreage were exercised there'd be half the amount of barking and escapism.





Do You Eat Fair?

Our current times are being described as the Great Transition or the Great Turning and involves humans living in a completely new way on this planet or as Thomas Berry says in The Great Work, "Our challenge is to create a new language, even a new sense of what it is to be human." Food and the way in which we produce, distribute and consume it is a major player in this transition. Food needs to be ethical, ecologically sustainable, organic and socially just. In other words, food needs to be healthy, affordable, properly honoured, shared and not wrecking the planet to make it.

Communities can and are changing food for the better. Movements like the **Incredible Edible Network** which started in Todmorden in the UK are now found all over the world. The IE Network is a group of people from a small town, who,

through food, strengthens its community and provides local opportunities and health. It promotes local growing and buying, has a green food walk through the town, plant sout the streets, even the police and railway stations and puts on markets and educational talks all around food.

Sounds good... then why not start an Incredible Edible movement in your town:

http://www.incredibleediblenetwork.org.uk/get-going

But there are plenty of other ways to get involved too. Below are some ideas to get you started (with big thanks to *PIP magazine – '10 ways to create a fairer food system'* March 2016).

Learn to cook: Or learn a new dish. Make what you want, when you want and avoid packaging, sprays and food miles.

Spend most of your money outside of the big supermarkets: Look at the true cost of food and don't just go for cheap. Cheap has a big cost on people and the planet through unseen environmental and social impacts that mass food production creates. And the food is often

tasteless and bad for your health. The cost will come back to you in doctor's bills. I've got my supermarket spending down to about \$50 with the rest spent at co-ops and markets.

Buy directly from a producer: Know where your food comes from. Have a relationship with the thing that keeps you alive! Farmers markets are a good place to start. Or purchase online through the Real Food Network: http://www.realfoodnetwork.com.au —and talk to Chris and Sjoerd, who do know where your food is coming from as they source it locally every week. The Atherton Community Co-Op does the same.

Grow your own – and share it: "This is the fairest food of all, and while this takes a little effort— growing your own food is a powerful thing."

Not keen on gardening alone? Then join your local Community Garden or Permaculture Group. Start your own thing with The Food is Free project: http://foodisfreeproject.org — which will 'teach you how to connect with your neighbours and line your street with front yard community gardens which provide free harvests to anyone.'

Host a dinner: "A person's consciousness of fair food is raised when food is restored as part of her or his culture. Having a dinner once a month, with friends, where everyone brings a dish made from local produce, allows people to brag about

what they made and where they sourced it from (or what they grew themselves). This creates connections and good food and generates traditions and memories (culture)."

Invest in fair food – and divest from corporate food: "Increasingly, fair food farmers and enterprises turn to online crowdfunding sites to start or grow their ventures.

There are many platforms, such as Start Some Good, who have developed an ebook for food projects.

If you're on a tight budget, you can lend money to farmers through Kiva, the funds are returned to you." Or join a bank that supports the good stuff like Bank Australia and put your cash to work with no effort at all.

Lean on a pollie: "Growing your own food is great, but to address systemic problems government policies need to change.

Ask your politicians – local, state and federal – what they are doing to address the consolidation of power in the supply chain; how will they promote healthy food environments; and how are they supporting fair food

farmers and enterprises? 'Corporate Food' has lobbyists – fair food needs people power! Become part of the fair food movement by joining the Australian Food Sovereignty Alliance."

And lastly – Be willing to forgo convenience: As Megan Ray Nichols says on her blog, "Supporting a sustainable food system isn't easy. When you commit to buying locally-produced foods and Fair-Trade foods and adhering to other tenants of sustainable living, these conscious choices may cost you time and money.

But ultimately, you're working toward a greater cause that will ensure you pass on a healthy earth to future generations."

Indian Cabbage and Potato Curry (Vegan)

Serves 2-3

Ingredients: 1 tbsp coconut oil, 1 tsp cumin seeds, 1 tsp mustard seeds, 1 onion, finely sliced, 2 fresh garlic cloves fresh minced, 1/4 tsp cayenne, ½ tsp ground turmeric, 1 tsp ground coriander, 500gm gold potatoes, diced (scrubbed but not peeled), 1/2 small head green cabbage, cored and sliced, ½ cup diced fresh tomatoes, 1/4 tsp salt, 1/4 cup fine chopped coriander, salt and pepper to taste.

Method: Heat coconut oil in a large pan over medium heat. Add the cumin and mustard seeds and cook for 1-2 minutes. Add Ingredients: SLAW - 2 cups finely shredded the onions and garlic stir well to combine, and cook for a further 2 minutes. Stir in cayenne, turmeric and coriander and cook for 1 minute. Add the potatoes, cabbage, tomatoes, 1/4 tsp salt, and 1/4 cup water. Stir well, reduce heat to low, cover, and cook until the potatoes are tender, about 30-35 minutes. Check it every now and then to make sure it is not sticking. If it is, add another tbsp water. Once cooked, remove from the heat, stir in the fresh coriander, and add salt and freshly ground



black pepper to taste.

Polish Cabbage and Potatoes (Vegan)

Serves 4

Ingredients: 1 large or 2 medium green cabbages, 3 onions, 1 garlic clove, 1 tblspn coconut oil, 1 bay leaf, 4-5 peppercorns,

Budget friendly cabbage and potatoes aren't cheap on flavour and are great to have some fresh dill to taste, young potatoes peeled and cut in small pieces, 3 tblspns of apple cider vinegar.

> Method: Wash the cabbage, discarding outer leaves, and cut onions into small pieces. Heat coconut oil in large cooking pan and add the onions into the cooking pan. Cook until the onions are soft and brown. In the meantime, cut the cabbage into small pieces. Once the onions are soft, add the cabbage into the pan. Add bay leaf and all spices and vinegar. Cook the cabbage for about 20 minutes on medium heat until it becomes soft. Once the cabbage is soft add one cup of water. Cover the pan now and let it simmer for another 20-30 minutes stirring regularly. Check water levels in between. When the cabbage becomes too dry, add one more cup of water. Cook cabbage until soft through and the flavours are well combined (taste to try). In the meantime, cook the potatoes until they are soft in a different pan with water. Cut fresh dill. Add 3/4 of fresh dill to the cabbage in the final minutes of cooking and stir. Serve the boiled potatoes and cabbage adding more dill over the potatoes. Add ground pepper and salt to taste.

Asian Slaw with Tofu and Potato Wedges (Vegan)

Serves 2-3


green cabbage, 2 cups finely shredded red cabbage, 1 large finely shredded or julienned carrot, 1 cup fresh mint leaves roughly chopped, 1 cup coriander leaves roughly chopped, 2 cups bean sprouts, 6 spring onions finely sliced, 400g firm tofu, 2 tblspns sweet chilli sauce and 2 tblspns tamari sauce (for marinade), 2 tsp each garlic and ginger finely chopped. DRESSING -

4 tblspns sweet chilli sauce, 2 tblspns organic tamari, juice of 1 lime, 1/4 cup extra virgin cold pressed olive oil. Choice of potatoes for wedges (optional).

Method: Prepare ahead – Heat oven for potato wedges if making, these will need to be cut and baked around 20-30 minutes before you plan to serve. Chop the tofu into cubes and marinate for at least 1 hour in the 2 tbs sweet chilli sauce and 2 tbs tamari. When ready to serve, combine cabbages, carrots, mint, sprouts, spring onions and toss to combine. Heat a pan and cook the tofu for around 2 minutes each side or until cooked through, then add ginger and garlic, cook for another 2 minutes. Add freshly ground pepper, ½ tspn salt, 2 cups tofu to salad. Combine dressing ingredients, and pour over salad and serve with hot of water, a dash each of dried thyme and wedges. Optional – Add finely chopped chilli to tofu when cooking. Optional garnish marjoram (or a teaspoon each of fresh), - crushed roasted peanuts (add on top just before serving).



How Secure is your password?

In this day and age of digital technology we all require passwords to access personal information online, whether it be as simple as email, government services or our bank accounts, but how secure is your password, and what helps make your password more secure?

Before I explain the how-tos of creating a secure password, there is an important need to understand why you actually need a super-secure password. After all, you might be wondering who would want to hack your accounts and how your passwords can become compromised. Here are some possible scenarios:

• Someone is out to get you: There are many people who might want to take a peek into your personal life. If these people know you well, they might be able to guess your e-mail password and use password recovery options to access your other accounts.



Whether a hacker attempts to access a group of user accounts or just yours, bruteforce attacks are the go-to strategy for cracking passwords. These attacks work by systematically checking all possible passphrases until the correct one is found. If the hacker already has an idea of the guidelines used to create the password, this process becomes easier to execute.

• There's a data breach: Every few months it seems another huge company reports a hacking resulting in millions of people's account information being compromised.

Now that we have an understanding of some ways passwords could be breached, how are passwords deemed secure? Although data breaches are completely out of your control, it still is imperative to create passwords that can withstand brute-fore attacks and "frenemies". In an ideal world your passwords would be at least 12 or more characters and contain a combination of numbers, symbols, uppercase and lowercase letters. Passwords should be free of repetition, common words, names

and pronouns, as well as IDs and any other pre-defined number or letter sequences.

Ideal passwords however are a HUGE inconvenience, I mean, how can we be expected to remember long passwords for each of our online accounts? Many people turn to password managers like LASTPASS, DASHLANE and 1PASSWORD. Applications that you can use to store your passwords, that encrypt the information, and you only require one password to access it.

How to create a secure password: A guide once written suggested creating a system that both allows you to create complex passwords, and remember them. For example: "I hope the Cowboys win the NRL grand final in 2018!" Then take the initials of each word and all the numbers and symbols to create your password. This resulting in: "IhtCwtNRLgfi2018!". The next option is to perhaps use a password generator. Many password generators as those mentioned above also have built in password generator tools. Of course, at the end of the day, the more complicated, and longer the password the more secure it will be.

In addition to password security, many online 'anytime' services like Facebook, Gmail and Microsoft offer "two-step verification". If it does – use it! When enabled,

signing in will not only require a password, but will also require a follow up code that is sent as a text message to a mobile phone, meaning that someone attempting to access a service cannot complete the login without access to that phone. This is similar to how banks now process online transactions using security 'tokens'.

Recent development of facial recognition and biometric (fingerprint) logins are now also becoming popular trends as more and more devices enter the consumer marketplace, allowing users to interact more digitally and securely using unique features that are virtually impossible to replicate.



Some trivial facts about passwords

- A brute force attack can uncover a simple seven character password in 0.29 milliseconds whereas a simple nine character password can take five days. A simple 10 character password will take approximately four months, whereas 11 characters will take approximately one decade to crack. A 12 character password mixed with all the characteristics of a strong password (see above) would take over two centuries to crack.
- The password "123456789" can be cracked 431 times in the blink of an eye.
- "P@sswOrD" would take 14 years to crack.
- "123456" and "password" were the most commonly used passwords in 2017.





We were very sorry to hear the stories of part and complete destruction of some people's homes in the rain event of late March. The Kuranda community rallied around those families most badly affected; what a great community we live in.

This show of the power of concentrated water lends support to the flood overlay mapping showing a fantastical 100 year flood line which some of us felt to be an exaggeration. Maybe not.

Our river planting assessment revealed that new plantings had fared quite well. The flexible stems of less than two year old trees bent with the flow. Those 3 to 10 year trees were in the danger zone, with bushy ones pushed over in the direction of the flow. Larger trees stood tall with some limbs down; direct hits from loose logs caused most damage. Individual species are starting to bounce back, showing the value of planting the right trees in the right place, with new stoots sprouting from any trunk which is not vertical.

The Bama of this area shared a common ngirrma, language. The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like archaic English 'aye'

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have a people been able to reside continuously in the one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual word "bulmba" has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the world itself, time, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of year, the season, the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for this selection of words and to the Diabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation for its work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

A Thought for May

THIS month's Bible reading is from St Johns Gospel Chapter 10 verses 11-18. Of all the images which Jesus used for his person and his work, the image of the good shepherd has shone most over the centuries of the Christian tradition. The role of the shepherd became synonymous with such values as trust, faithfulness, dependability, gentleness. However, the role of the shepherd also requires tenacity, strength, courage, leadership. If these values are placed beside the others, we avoid childish images of a Jesus who is merely meek and mild. We have only to read the first sentence of this passage to hear Jesus define the reality of the shepherd's role with chilling foresight.

"The good shepherd," says Jesus "lays down his life for the sheep." To do anything less is to betray the flock,



"I am the good shepherd." What might that be asking of my life? If a shepherd cares, then the question is whether I am becoming an essentially caring or a self-centred human being. That may seem obvious. Yet patterns of behaviour change in our lives, and we need to examine them from time to time.

Again, if a shepherd leads, then in what sense am I leading other lives, perhaps those younger than myself. Leading can be an exercise in ego and power. It can be domineering.

Obviously, Jesus pattern of shepherding does not call for that. Rather, are there vocations in my life that I could give some time to? Is there some aspect of youth formation, a Sunday school class, a Scout or Guide group, children of alcoholic parents anything like this that I could be involved in to guide others? In terms of adults, could I give time to leading Bible study? Is there a self-help group to which from my experience I have something to give? All of these things are shepherding.

Such vocations may seem very tame and pedestrian compared with Our Lord's laying down His life as the good shepherd. But we are not all asked to do what Jesus did. To lay down one's life can mean many things at many different levels. One thing is certain. You and I are never going to lay down our lives for anything until we give even a small part of ourselves for something! Surely there is not one of us who cannot respond in some way to Our Lord's call to be a shepherd. There is not one of us who cannot in some way respond to Our Lord's call to shepherd other lives.
