



We'd need you to look after the area for three years to ensure it establishes and we can discuss with you how we might help with this. 



Design and Construction of Kuranda Reservoir

Council agreed to accept the offer from FGF developments for the design and construction of a reservoir in Kuranda.

"Tenders were invited for the design and construction of additional reservoirs in Kuranda to provide an adequate water supply to the residents of Kuranda area which to date has been at risk given the very limited water storage capacity in Kuranda," Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

"Council previously engaged Aurecon Consulting Engineering to undertake an assessment of the water storage requirements throughout Mareeba Shire. This assessment identified the need for additional water storage reservoirs at Kuranda, with two new one mega litre reservoirs at Myola Road to meet current and future water requirements in order to achieve required storage and fire reserves," Cr Gilmore said.

"The assessment recommended that the Kuranda reservoirs be constructed in a staged approach with the first of the new reservoirs to be constructed during the 2014/2015 financial year," Mayor Gilmore said.

Council has agreed with the appointment of FGF Developments as the contractor for the project, for the amount of \$954,347.00 which will be funded from the Water Reserves.







Kuranda Community Precinct Advisory Committee

The Story So Far - A Brief History of the Kuranda Community Precinct Project...

Many newer residents of Kuranda may not be aware of relationships with the new Council – councillors Jenny the history of this project to redevelop the old Kuranda Primary School site.

Amongst those who are aware of it I often encounter the response that nothing has been done with the site and while this is certainly not true, I can understand the community's sense of frustration at the rate of progress in redeveloping the site.

I will outline below how this progress has been achieved through many twists and turns and how we have arrived at our present state of play. I will finish by outlining what I believe is now a clearly emerging vision of what the present Council Advisory Committee working with the Mareeba Shire Council would like to achieve at the site.

After the movement of the Primary School to join the High School at the Kuranda Community College site on Myola Road, the old school site was purchased by the former Mareeba Shire Council in 2008.

The original Council Advisory Committee was formed that same year and the work of this committee with the new Tableland Regional Council resulted in the following actions:

- Employment of caretakers on the site (still present)
- A series of consultations with the Kuranda community which culminated in the preparation by professional consultants of the Engagement Plus Report in 2011
- · Building reports undertaken by the Council looked at the costs of refurbishing the range of buildings on site and resulted in the demolition of A and B blocks and the refurbishment of C block, the toilet block and the tuckshop at a cost of several hundred thousand

Over recent years the buildings and the old school oval have been used by a range of sporting and other community organisations.

In 2012 the idea of moving the Council library to the downstairs area of C-block where it would have more than twice the floor space gained impetus.

In early 2013 a new Kuranda Community Precinct Advisory Committee was formed. Given the TRC decision to move the library and the outcomes of the earlier community consultations, the committee decided that its initial work should focus on advising the council on the library transition as the new library would form the heart of the Precinct.

Some progress was made towards the library move in 2013, but inevitably this was slowed by the transition to the new Mareeba Shire Council at the beginning of this year. In 2014 the committee has built strong Jensen and Nipper Brown attend committee meetings and Mayor Tom Gilmore has attended on a number of occasions. Key council staff officers have also attended regularly and provide clear advice on technical issues.

A concept plan for the library was drawn up and has now been approved. An architect has been engaged to produce construction plans and the hope is that these will go out to tender later this year or early next year.

With the recent sale of the 2 blocks associated with the old Pre-school and previously committed council funds, the completion of the library should still leave several hundred thousand dollars for new Precinct developments.

The concept of the Precinct has now been broadened to cover the whole of the area from the school site through to the amphitheatre. Based on consultation, we believe the emphasis for the next stage of development should be on the Arts and broader cultural projects which would sit well in relation to a community library. Some possible examples:

- · A sculpture courtyard
- Artist workspaces
- A site for local history/historians
- Landscaped public areas
- Signposted cultural/historical walkways linked to those already existing.

We are open for ideas. At our next meeting the Committee has resolved to re-visit the community consultation to look at where we go next. You may be assured that in doing this we will reach out to individuals and groups within the community to form new partnerships.





ovember and the ground bakes awaiting the embrace of the coming Wet with a few promissory kisses of storm rains presaging the season's turn. It certainly pays long-term dividends in opening or recreating gardens to carefully plan your plantings, not only to plant habit and growth but according to water needs, with those requiring regular water maintenance all together.

As usual, the seasonal moans about turkey depredations. Warning for the newcomer as well as the long-stayers, most bulbous and many cormous plants are under threat, particularly Alocasias, Caladiums, some Heliconias and even, in some years, the occasional Philodendron. The keen Vegetable grower needs to fence and net over their beds since all ripening fruit and underground storage organs are vulnerable. Kitchen scraps should be carefully disposed of so as not to encourage foraging and nest building discouraged to at least 50m from any plantings.

Date Claimer: Plant sale at the Flecker Botanical Gardens on Sunday 7th December and remember to check out the Friends of the Botanical Gardens stall for their remarkable range and excellently priced range of plants. The Friends also operate a small plant stall every Wednesday at the Flecker commencing 9.30am – it's a matter of the first in, best planted.





Piper magnificum

Plant of the Month: Piper magnificum, the Lacquered Peppertree, is a small, remarkably hardy understory shrub, noted for its large puckered dark shiny green leaves with purple underleaf. Fairly drought hardy and easily propagated from cutting, this makes an excellent potted and garden subject requiring bright indirect light. The Piperaceae family with its 1000-2000 species of pan-tropical distribution gives us a plethora of lianas, shrubs and ground covers including the commercial peppers.

Another highly ornamental pepper is *Piper ornatum*, the Celebese Pepper, a light vine grown for its pewter coloured, pink splashed leaves, again with similar requirements to *P. magnificum* but with possibly slightly higher water needs. Capable of sending out short adventitious roots, I find P. ornatum liking fern tree trunks as a host climbing support.

Q&A *Dear Dimity:* Although able to track down seeds of *Myristica fragrans*, source of nutmeg and mace, further research shows seed as having extremely short viability, possibly as short as three days if stored dry. Nutmeg farmers in Java start sowing nutmeg seeds within 24 hours after being extracted from the fruits. This small evergreen tree, usually 5-13m is <u>dioecious</u>, – "male" and "female" flowers are borne on different plants and usually take 5-8 years to reach flowering stage. While seed is allowed into Australia from O/S, their very short viability and often problems with seed packing materials makes importation a somewhat risky business.

Dear Roger: Thank for your kind words! I am always somewhat loath to give planting suggestions and yes we, in the tropics are certainly spoilt for choice in the matter of ornamental climbers. However many will be too vigorous for your light trellising. Possibly **Ipomea horsfalliae**, the Cardinal creeper, with its bright cherry red flowers and glossy green fingered foliage may suit. Coming from the West Indies, it may die back to its tuberous root in your area, coming back in warmer weather. However this will also prevent its main flowering flush. Like for so many climbers, the general rule is roots in the shade and head in full sunlight. This is one of the few climbing Ipomeas that that does not pose potential seed risk as its native pollinator is humming birds and thus very seldom sets seed here and is extremely hard to propagate from cutting.

Dear Narelle: Your pic of the red flowered hedge-plant is probably one of the **Metrosideros** hybrids. Known as the New Zealand Christmas Bush or Pohutukawa, Metrosideros is a large and diverse family ranging from huge vining types, to large tree and shrubs and occurring in New Zealand and through the Pacific Islands. Noted for their prolific flowering, much work has been done by hybridists in producing smaller shrubs suitable for the home garden, growing to various heights, different flower colourings and variegated and striking new leaf flushes. Available at most local nurseries such as Anza, Mareeba, it will pay to enquire re suitability for your area and soil/water requirements particularly before committing to bulk purchase for hedge planting. Caveat emptor!





ustin Wellington - In recent years his name and his music have taken the Pacific by storm. 

THE BOOGIE BROTHERS CD REVIEWS

Van Dieman's Land: Russell Morris Fanfare 2014



Russell Morris is a colossus of Aussie music with almost 50 years of writing and performing under his belt. So it is rather grand that at the age of 66 he is making the most successful albums of his career. His last one; Sharkmouth highcharted at No.6, went platinum, and won an Aria award. This new album ups the ante, debuting at No.4 and is still Top 40 three months later.

Van Diemen's Land, like its predecessor, tells stories of this country. With a great eye for detail both musical and lyrical

Morris puts the spotlight on history. The life and times of Australians such as Kings Cross witch Rosaleen Norton and executed soldier Breaker Morant become mini-movies, and the dark worlds of Sandakan and Van Dieman's Land are subtly but clearly conjured up.

The music is deeply rooted in the blues, with a bit of Cajun and roots flavouring the set. From the scary Irish stomp of 'Lucy McBride' to the New Orleans groove of 'The Sweetest Thing', the playing is uniformly top quality. Even though everything: the music, instrumentation, playing and arrangements are firmly in the service of the story, there's still room for tasty blues guitar playing and solos, some of it provided by guest artists Phil Manning of Chain & Daddy Cool's Ross Hannaford. Other guests, including Linda and Vika Bull & Joe Camilleri, add light and shade to individual songs.

Russell Morris sounds great, his voice strong and weathered, strident and clear, telling his stories most deftly. This is a vividly dark evocation of

times of infamy, hardship and war but Van Dieman's Land is never dull or gloomy. Russell's take on the blues here is exciting and filled with often inspired and surprising choices, each choice made to further the telling of a great story.

here's so much genuinely great music coming out this year, it's been kinda limiting to review just one or two each month.

This is stuff you probably won't hear on radio playlists but for the lovers of meaty, beaty music (thanks Pete) it's well worth a listen. Here's a random run of really rich and rewarding musical treats.



Robert Plant: "Lullaby... The Ceaseless Roar" Led-Zep sex god at 66 explores deep space in a celebratory record of powerful, gritty, African trance, in and out of the rainbow, Led-Zep style.

Justin Townes Earle: "Single Mothers" Son of Steve, who's not like, or not liking, his dad that much. His bluesiest record yet. Still edgy and bitterly reflective but now focussed and pushing his musicality

Johnny Winter: "Step Back" The albino genius of aggressive sharp-edged blues guitar; passed away with the release

of this final album, guesting Eric Clapton, Ben Harper and other icons, a fantastic thanks and goodbye... John Murry: "California Yes!" What a word. The haunted one; the

grittiest snarling howling vocals, rhythmic and melodically elegant. Corb Lund: "Counterfeit Blues" One of our favourite bands, the hurtin' Albertans from Canada. Recorded in Sun Studio, Memphis a rollicking set of rockabilly and country honk blues. Love this guy!





What is causing the deformities of flying-foxes at the Cairns Library?

The Cairns Library Spectacled Flying-fox colony has suffered over 100 premature and/or deformed babies over this last month, including a high number of cleft palates. Dismissing this occurrence as 'normal', without support of evidence, has seen media down play the significant ecological damage that has and is taking place within this colony.

This Library roost has been well monitored for many years and the current number of deformed cannot even come close to being deemed 'normal', nor could these numbers have been previously unnoticed. There have been only a few occurrences of high birth deformities previously in other colonies and all close to where farmers and Councils intensely spray organophosphate, which makes this occurrence at the library even more unusual.

There is believed to be a correlation between spraying tobacco weed and cleft

palate and the Council admits to spraying the tobacco weed with glyphosate at the library. One witness asked a Council worker what he was doing and was told, 'we are trying to get rid of the bats'. One witness took photos. Another witness reported that they were concerned by the intense strong smell of chemicals that was similar to cattle dip.

Cairns Regional Council has seemingly acted maliciously towards the Cairns Library roost colony since its Mayor Bob Manning and Deputy Mayor Terry James declared the colony must go. The Council seems intent on the destruction of heritage trees and promotes the removal of historic trees that were to be protected at the old Cairns State School site (now Novotel Oasis).



The Council is currently under EHP investigation for numerous alleged breaches of the NCA and Heritage Act.

If the council did spray this colony with chemicals that result in embryonic deformities, it would be a callous, uncontrolled and careless airborne act that any first tri-mester pregnant woman passing by the library could have, yet unknown, fallen victim to. The alleged events were between May and July 2014. Anyone who witnessed anything at the Cairns library roost site should contact Department of Environment EPBC Act Compliance on **02 6274 2384**.

A Halloween Pumpkin Meditation

(Before doing this meditation it may be fun to first carve a halloween pumpkin with your children)

This is a guided relaxation/savasana we use in class around halloween time. Not everyone celebrates halloween but children are often interested in this celebration as it plays on fancy dress and of course candy. Halloween has not much to do with yoga but it is fun to integrate things that are happening around us into our classes any way we can. This relaxation is said slowly and with frequent pauses to allow for imagination time.

Sit or lay down comfortably. Gently close your eyes and begin to find your breath. Take two deep breaths. Inhale for a count of five and exhale for a count of five.

Imagine, for this moment, that you are sitting inside a huge halloween pumpkin. It is a bright orange colour and is very safe and cosy inside. You are sitting or laying on a soft mat that has been left for you. The pumpkin has been carved on one side. What carving do you see on your pumpkin? A candle has been placed inside your pumpkin with you. As it fills the pumpkin with a warm glow you too can feel the warmth of the candle flame. It helps you feel relaxed and safe and it makes the whole pumpkin light up.

Feel your body relaxing and allow it to become heavy. Feel the warmth of the candle flame on your toes. The warm light is melting away any tension or fear you may have. Feel your skin, muscles and bones melt and relax on the pumpkin floor. Just like candle wax. Allow yourself to relax in the glow of the light. Next you can feel your legs getting heavy and feeling warm. Let them melt like wax onto the floor. Skin, muscles and bones are soft and heavy. The warmth of the candle now reaches your arms, your shoulders and hands. Feel the heat on the inside of your palms. Imagine, just like wax, everything melting towards the floor. Finally, the warm glow reaches your neck and head. You notice your face relax, your teeth, tongue and jaw soften. For a moment feel the relaxing warmth melting your whole body. Your skin is warm, your muscles are warm, your bones are warm...and now, even the very inside of your bones can feel the gentle candle light. Imagine that the huge pumpkin you are in is shining a brilliant golden light over all of your body. When you can see this light clearly start to wiggle your toes and your fingers. Take a deep breath all the way to the bottom of your belly. Place your hands slowly over your eyes and when you are ready to leave your pumpkin open your eyes and allow your hands to drop away.

Stroke: RECOGNIZING A STROKE: REMEMBER THE 1ST THREE LETTERS: S. T. R.

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- **S**: Ask the individual to SMILE
- T: Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (coherently eg Chicken Soup)
- **R**: Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call **OOO** immediately and describe the symptoms to the operator.

NOTE: Another 'sign' of a stroke is this: Ask the person to 'stick' out his tongue. If the tongue is 'crooked', if it goes to one side or the other that is also an indication of a stroke.

A Shed for Men's Shed

Mareeba Shire Council resolved to provide an offer to the Kuranda Men's Shed Group to lease the Council shed adjacent to the Kuranda Water Treatment Plant.

"The Men's Shed is a nationally recognised association which provides for opportunities for men. A group of men in Kuranda have been in discussion with Council trying to

establish a Men's Shed in Kuranda," Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

"Council is in the process of relocating its two works crews (Maintenance and Parks) to a single site. The site where the maintenance crew are currently based, adjacent to the Water Treatment Plant at the end of the Kuranda Heights Road, has an existing shed on it and this will become surplus to our requirements," Cr Gilmore said.

"The shed that will become vacant is ideally suited for them. It is reasonably accessible and in a position where the activities will have limited impact on residents," Mayor Gilmore said.

The transfer of the staff is likely to occur in early December and the existing shed will be made available to the Men's Shed for their use at a peppercorn amount.



"Coconut Mamma"

A now well-known identity around Kuranda Village is our profile for this month. It is Hannah Wattel, commonly called "Coconut Mamma". So where did she get that name from, you ask. Well, when she first came to Kuranda about 10 years ago, she met her partner Dwayne, and they went into the "coconut" business in the Heritage markets. They opened and sold fresh coconuts to tourists. The name simply stuck even though they are no longer in that business. But that is jumping ahead. Let's first tell her story up until that time.

Hannah was born and brought up in Holland, the Netherlands. As a student, she undertook a psychology course at the Free University in that country. But then she decided, like so many other young people at that time, to travel. She visited most of the countries of the world. The result was that she decided to come to Australia, which appealed most to her. She arrived in Sydney in 1969 on her own. After travelling around Australia for a year, she enrolled in an Arts degree at Sydney University, majoring in psychology. She was awarded the degree but has never practised psychology.

Hannah took a job as a Multi-Cultural Welfare Officer with the Department of Immigration. She speaks seven languages. Then she became Federal Minister Al Grasby's multilingual assistant. She met an Ecuadorian man, they married in 1975 and after a spell in Ecuador, returned to Australia. The marriage broke up. Hannah has two daughters. Hannah then worked firstly at the Royal Institute of Technology in Melbourne, setting up the interpreters course. Then she worked with the State Department of Justice using her languages. She retired from there in 1989.

Hannah took her daughters to Holland so that they could learn Dutch and other languages. While there she married a second time. Upon return to Melbourne, she was dissatisfied with her life in the City. She was now widowed. Her two daughters had gone to Ecuador. She drove to Cairns to meet some friends. Stumbling upon Kuranda, she fell in love with the Village



and environment, a beautiful paradise as she sees it. She likes the people, the bush and the environment. She moved to the caravan park and met Dwayne. They opened the first of many stalls in the Heritage Markets, beginning with the coconuts. Later she was to move to the original markets to sell her own arts and craft work. Dwayne made and sold his own didges and Hannah made and sold her own mandalas (I have one in the Bookshop, a nine pointed Baha'i star) and her arts and crafts. Hannah collects her own bush and beach nuts which she uses to make various craft items, such as her "dangles". She also collects suitable sticks and makes them into her magic staffs and magic wands. She does timber carving. Her stall is now at the back of the original markets where she can often be found working or talking. Her daughters now live in the locality.

Hannah is a quite active writer and commentator and is a political activist. She was active in the anti fluoride campaign, including through facebook. She hosts five facebook sites, including "Good for You" and also "Poison in your Soup", highlighting the good and bad in available foods. She is active

in the anti coal seam gas mining movement. She enjoys voluntarily helping other people using her previously acquired skills. A spiritual person who does not belong to any community groups, she prefers to retain her independence of mind and action. She loves music and plays a number of instruments. She enjoys living in the rainforest and outdoors, appreciating as she does the wild animals and the rainforest environment.



raying Mantids The Master Predators

Praying mantids are among the most voracious and violent hunters in the animal kingdom. Their methods of prey capture are brutal, but are countered by the grace and splendour of their movement and body form. They are charismatic animals and appear to engage visually with us. This is largely due to an optical phenomenon in the eyes known as the pseudo-pupils - it appears as though they are always making direct eye contact with us.

Australia has an estimated 160 species of praying mantids, ranging from miniscule hunters preying upon termites on their mounds, through to our local rainforest giants capable of capturing small vertebrates such as geckos and frogs.

Praying mantids are predatory and most are generalists – i.e. not specialising in any one prey type. Instead, they take prey within a suitable size range whenever the opportunity presents itself. Prey is located visually, using their two large compound eyes set well apart on their relatively large triangular-shaped heads. They have excellent visual acuity, and combined with the positioning of their eyes, they have superb judgement of both distance and the movement of their prey. Their degree of head movement is unrivalled within the insect world; it can move through 180 degrees, and swivels to face their prey.

Prey is captured using the powerful and spiny front (raptorial) legs. Depending on the species, mantids will wait for prey to approach within striking distance or move stealthily towards their prey. Some species will use both strategies. The actual strike is rapid and usually very accurate, however, the orientation in which the prey is seized appears to be completely random. The prey is gripped between the tibia and the femur, is held by an arsenal of spines, and a sharp curved hook. The delicate tarsi (used for walking), are folded back out of harm's way during this process. Mantids will often take several seconds to reposition and secure their prey once they grab it, to ensure that is unable to inflict any damage using weapons such as mandibles and fangs. Also in the first few seconds of prey capture, many species of mantid will inflict a frenzy of biting upon their prey. This appears to be aimed at reducing both the risk of damage to themselves and preventing prey escape by attacking and disabling structures such as limbs and wings.

Once the prey is secured the mantid will begin feeding. At this point the prey is still alive and is consumed in no particular order - head first, tail first; it all depends on the orientation of the grip mantid's grip. However, if the mantis can reach the head of the prey, this region is often consumed first. Mantids are equipped with powerful mandibles and are capable of cutting through extremely tough sections of their prey's exoskeleton and cuticle. Often, even structures such as the prey's own mandibles and fangs are consumed. These are cut, crushed and swallowed by mantids' specialised mouthparts. In fact, there is very little that goes to waste; usually only leg tips and wing fragments. Some will leave the digestive tract of herbivorous prey untouched, resulting in the entire tract being removed with the precision of a micro-surgeon.

Despite their prowess and aggression as hunters, mantids have abundant predators, vertebrate and invertebrate alike. Birds, mammals, reptiles, amphibians, and other invertebrates including other mantids are amongst those who will capitalise on them if the opportunity arises. Apart from their excellent camouflage, mantids have several defence strategies. Some expose of the inner face of the femur, which in many species is brightly coloured or has 'eye spots'. The mantid will rock back and open the raptorial legs to startle the threat, and this is often combined with flaring of the wings. Mantids are also equipped with a simple ear located in a cleft underneath the thorax between the middle legs. They are very sensitive to the ultrasonic sounds produced by micro-bats. Male mantids in flight will take evasive action on hearing the sounds produced by an approaching bat.

It's a well known fact that male praying mantids have a high risk challenge finding a mate. Males of most species are able to fly and can travel moderate distances on the wing to find mates. The larger, robust females however are usually limited to climbing about, and hence do not move great distances during their lives. Mating success for a male generally involves a lengthy and stealthy approach towards a female, followed by a rapid, almost desperate, lunge onto her back. Some species will always mount from the rear, whilst others will often initially mount head to tail and then right themselves. When secure he will bring the tip of his abdomen in contact with hers in order to mate. The period of mating varies between species, with some remaining locked together for over 12

One common misconception in mantid reproduction is that all female mantids consume their mate's head before or during mating. With some species this never or seldom happens, however, with others, it is a regular occurrence. In these cases, it is often more than the head that it consumed. The female will eat the parts of the male she has access to during the mating process, which can include most of the thorax and the raptorial legs. Amazingly the male continues to mate despite the loss of a good proportion of his body, and can do so successfully for many hours without his head. In some species of mantids, the male can be attacked by the female and partially eaten before he even begins to mate, yet his headless body is still able to make the right moves to successfully mount her and copulate!

Mantid eggs are laid within a protective foamy mass known as an ootheca. These egg cases vary in appearance for different species and may contain a dozen to several hundred eggs. Many species secure their oothecae to woody stems of plants, while some species produce tiny thin oothecae which are secured into cracks and crevices in stems and branches. Hatching usually occurs in mass, with all of the young emerging within a short period of time. They emerge as worm-like larvae from individual cells within the ootheca and hang suspended from fine threads. They immediately undergo a moult, and emerge as a tiny mobile version of their parents. Within hours they are ready to begin feeding by capturing small prey in the same manner as they will for the remainder of their lives.

New Facilities at Candlenut

During October, students and staff at Candlenut Steiner School celebrated the opening of their High School buildings which include a Science and Manual Arts building, built with the help of \$528 000 in Australian Government funding.

The Hon Warren Entsch MP opened the new facilities on behalf of the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Education, Senator the Hon Scott Ryan.

The buildings, totalling nearly \$2 million, were funded through \$528 000 in Australian Government grants, a \$907 209 contribution from the Candlenut Steiner School community, and a \$528 000 contribution from the State Government.

The developments involved the construction of a science laboratory, a science preparation room, a manual arts building, general learning areas, an office, a veranda, undercover learning areas, covered walkway and amenities.

Mr Entsch said the new facilities are an important part of ensuring that students get a great education.

"The Government believes in an education system that puts students first. We are committed to building a world-class education system that will equip all Australian students with the skills they need to succeed in an increasingly competitive world."

"These new facilities here at Candlenut Steiner School show exactly what can be achieved by a school with strong leadership and a clear vision for the future."

Australian Government funding was provided through the Capital Grants Programme.



Inside My Studio

A clown's character, his face, is created by the use of makeup, as well as his costumes and developing his clown's personality. Paris-born Kuranda artist Danny Simony, comedian, mime, magician and pick pocket, shows his versatility in demonstrating the timeless appeal of 'entertainment', the mastery of this unique artist. A series of fortuitous events during his life advanced his career. Today Danny Simony is a leading performer in the Far North and has worked extensively in television, on stage, and in a myriad of venues throughout Australia and overseas. His unique style is interactive and hilarious to all ages, whether on stilts or on the ground.

The other side of Danny's coin is his figurative painting. With a talented use of simple strokes, his lines are sensuous and colourful. The abstract images are reminiscent of Japanese ink wash paintings. The brush strokes and mark making create an energy and haste that is contrasted with the soft hues and light that fall on the paper. Danny Simony captures these patterns of life.

Where is your current studio?

Everywhere within my home in Kuranda. In every room is a workshop. I try to confine my work to one area but I manage to spread it out. It is how I like to work.

Do you work alone or with others?

Alone, it is my preference. I think my brain works differently to other people and I need my own space to think clearly. However, when I am performing it is essential that I have an audience, so in that respect, I am not working alone.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Space, organisation, music, colour, good coffee and my view.

Describe your work pattern – hours/ days/weeks.

My work pattern is very intense. I can literally accomplish three days work in one. Then I may not achieve anything in a week. I cannot be regimented and I work when the inspiration is there. However, when I perform I have to be in focus and with what is asked of me and I need to meet other people's timetables. Returning to my

studio it is nice to relax and not meet deadlines and generally go with the flow.

I enjoy the usual domestic obligations that must be attended to and I get pleasure from working outdoors, maintenance building and in my garden.

Describe the works you do in your studio


Lots of my creative time is spent on costume making, puppetry, prop making and painting. Painting is a bit of a passion, like the little bit of saxophone I play. Then add food to that lot.

Why is entertainment your chosen medium?

Performing...destiny or luck? I was living at Yorkey's Knob at the time and I handpainted t-shirts. A friend in the food industry asked me to give him a hand as a

'clown' during a local Festival in the Park. I went to an Op shop; found some suitable clothes – big wide pants and a pair of enormous shoes and I bought some make-up. Then on the night of my first performance I traded in my reality and got lost in the world of spontaneous clowning.

After that I moved to WA and continued clowning and busking. In the course of my performances I was asked one day to do a show for Marcel Marceau, the French world-renowned master of mime, then we had lunch together and a chat. He invited



Jazz, especially saxophone, is my favourite. I also enjoy Reggae and classical music with guitar and flute. Sometimes I need silence. I find it meditative and appreciate that state of mind while I am working.

Your favourite tool?

My small spatula. It is nothing special and has no provenance.

I purchased it. I use it each time I paint, in fact, I would use my spatula more times than I would my brush.

How do you identify your work?

I hand sign my paintings 'Danny Simony' – simply.

How do you sell your work?

Very rarely. Like many artists I don't sell it. I gift a lot of my paintings as it is the end of the journey for me. I do not get attached to most pieces.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

Sell from my studio, No. Teach from my studio, also No. However, I occasionally do 'Clown Workshops' for all ages. It's about discovering your inner clown.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid work?

Entertainment provides me with an income. I perform at schools, kindies, private parties, festivals, conferences, events and in shopping centres.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I would like one big room to accommodate one big mess. At the moment I am limited to my space available. I would like a room specifically for props, so I need more storage space. I would like to purchase more materials, experiment with new ones and have more space to use them.

If you were not working with entertainment what would you be doing? This question appeared to really 'throw' Danny, he shrugged his shoulders and leaned back in his chair thoughtfully and just smiled. He obviously has no wish to change his lifestyle, in fact, change anything – TR

No, it's kind of the end of the road for me in Kuranda. But who knows, tomorrow is a new day!!!





Water – Our Most Precious Resource

Australia is the driest inhabited continent on earth, with the least amount of water in rivers, the lowest run-off and the smallest area of permanent wetlands of all the continents.

National Water Week celebrated its 21st anniversary recently; a community reminder to protect and conserve our precious water supplies. Here in tropical North Queensland water is vital because unlike normal four seasons, we only have two seasons – the wet and the dry. So combined with the El Nino system indicating a drier than normal October to December dry season, we need to store or conserve whatever natural rainfall we get and not depend exclusively on town water.

Station owners, farmers and rural residents have always collected wet season rainfall in dams and water tanks, to survive into the dry season. But with the changing

weather patterns, have you noticed the late start of the wet season, closer to January, not November.

Water Conservation for Inside the Home

Last month's article highlighted collecting and conserving water for our gardens and outdoor use (the major area for water wastage). Now let's look at water conservation for inside our homes, starting with personal hygiene. So where to start?

First, change your family's water habits and become more water-wise so your children know your reasons why. Include a few facts for them to visualise. e.g. the average shower uses 20 litres of water per minute, so a 15 minute

shower uses 300 litres of water per person, enough to fill two bath tubs! A 4 minute shower uses only 80 litres.

And a tap leaking, at one drip per second wastes 12,000 litres of water a year.

Remedy

- Upgrade to more efficient products
- Buy the correct sized plugs
- · Search out and repair hidden leaks
- Investigate where you are wasting water

Consider this: How many seconds do you wait for hot water to arrive before you wash dishes, wash your face or rinse your hands, or shave? That hot water leaving the hot water system is displaced by incoming cold water. Wasting 30 seconds worth of hot water to get 5 seconds worth for your hands? It's quicker and easier to wash your hands in cold water! The actual benefit of hand washing in sanitation comes from the soap and the action, not the water temperature.

After toileting: Teach your children to be water-wise, not just when water restrictions are in force. Surprise them or play games to make the changes enjoyable! Put an out of order sign on the hand basin with instructions 'to wash hands, use this spray pump'. Give them their own personalised large spray pump bottle of water with a dash of liquid soap, and use this specifically for hand washing after going to

Showering and bathing: A low flow shower head is inexpensive and easy to install starting at \$13. A 19 litre solar camping shower is cheaper! Here's a game. Challenge children to a competition who can do this faster and use less water. I tried this Navy shower method standing in two round 7kg plastic containers from the supermarket, being careful not to slip and slide. I captured the cold water until hot water arrived, got wet, switched off water, soaped up, switched on water, rinsed off the suds, switched off water and got out. I filled 11/2 buckets but forgot to time it, then when dressed, I put the water on the garden.

For lazy teens or adults who prefer a quick dip and a spray deodorant from a can, insist they use soap and try the Navy shower method. Smelly teens or workman's clothing needs to be soaked or pre-washed, so collect their shower rinse water and re-use it for this purpose. For teens that spend too much time under the shower wasting water, install a timer to automatically switch off the water after 4 minutes.

Bathe small children together or in a large round bucket under the shower.

Don't drain bath water when you are finished (but if you have children this is not recommended – it's a drowning hazard.) Quickly use a bucket to collect the water and reuse the water in your washing machine or washing tub, as a pre-wash for grubby clothes, washing pets, pet beds, or onto your garden.

Shaving in the shower with the water running! Just don't do it! Turn the water off. Even better shave before/after showering.

Brushing Teeth - Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth. If a tap leaking at the rate of one drip per second will waste more than 12,000 litres of water a year - how much water are you wasting? To encourage children to brush their teeth properly, buy them an electric toothbrush that automatically switches off after 2 minutes. Teach

> them to clean up their toothpaste splashes on and around the hand basin.

Toilets

Upgrade, repair or maintain. Look and listen for dripping or running toilets. Next: Not everyone can handle the "If it's yellow, let it mellow, if it's brown, flush it down" idea. But for night visits, let it mellow until the morning. Then only one flush is needed and if you are reusing shower water to flush the toilet, even

Composting toilets have the lowest water usage – almost no water and little electricity is required (depending on the model)

Upgrade older toilets with water efficient models, replace old seals, install an over the cistern hand washing basin which fills up your toilet cistern, or install an Australian invention - the dual flush toilet that is now globally

accepted. It uses 25% less water - a short flush for liquid only and a full flush for

Don't use your toilet as a rubbish bin. Don't waste precious water flushing unsoiled tissues down the bowl – save water and put them out with the general household rubbish collection.

Is the toilet cistern leaking into the bowl? Put a few drops of food dye in the tank. If the dye appears in the bowl (without flushing) the flush valve needs replacing.

Beware of water displacement ideas using bottles or bricks; they can interfere with proper operation.

Collect shower or bath water and use for flushing toilets when water restrictions are required by your Shire or City Council.

Know what you are paying per kL of water - toilet leaks can waste 100 to 2,000 litres a day.

Laundry

Buy more efficient products. A top loader washing machine uses approx 131 litres water per cycle. A five star front loader uses as little as 52 litres.

Use your washing machine only with a full load or match the water level to the size of the load – the economy cycle.

Save water and don't pre-wash general laundry unless you have already collected the shower rinse water or have your own tank water.

Too much powder or liquid (over-sudsing) in your washing uses 50% more

While washing a large load of pale bed sheets in the machine – hand wash pale underwear then rinse together in the same water. Learn how much water you use for a small, medium or large load.

Collect the rinse cycle water (grey water) and siphon it out onto your garden (not the vegetable garden).



It is hoped that the Country Kitchens project with a travelling team will help to highlight and maybe reduce, through education, these statistics.

Council Meeting in Kuranda: On October 15th, for the first time ever, the Council Meeting was held in Kuranda. Thank you to all who attended to observe proceedings and to all groups who presented to Council to inform Council on their projects and activities (and a few requests also!) Thanks to Kuranda District Chamber of Commerce, Kuranda Amphitheatre Society, Tourism Kuranda, Bendigo Bank (community Wi-Fi), Kuranda Conservation, Kuranda Recreation Centre, Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation, and Kuranda Envirocare. Councillors now have a better understanding of Kuranda matters.

New Water Reservoir for Kuranda: Council has identified the need for additional water storage reservoirs at Kuranda following the assessments in a recent Consultant's Report of water capacity across the shire. The plan is for two new one mega litre reservoirs at Myola Road to meet current and future water requirements. The two new Kuranda reservoirs will be constructed in a staged approach with the first of the new reservoirs to be constructed during the 2014/2015 financial year. The tender was recently awarded for the amount of \$954,347.00 (this is to be funded from the Water Reserves Fund)

Men's Shed: Council has agreed to offer the Kuranda Men's Shed Group a Lease (at a "peppercorn" rental amount), to use the old Works Depot near the Water Plant. The old depot will no longer be required for Council use and will soon be vacant. It is expected that the Men's Shed group will be able to get into their shed before Christmas.

Kuranda Community Precinct: The Advisory Committee has continued its work to progress Stage 1 of the development of the Precinct. Recently the two small blocks which housed the former Pre-School have been sold and all funds will go into a special Reserve for further development of the Precinct. The plans for the Library move are finalised and it is expected that the move will occur within the next 6 months. It has not yet been decided what the current Library building will be used for.

Are You prepared? It's that time of year to start getting ready for the cyclone and fire season. Every household needs to have a "plan" and an emergency kit. Know what you will do in the event of an emergency or an evacuation. The time to get ready is now. Council has a comprehensive Disaster Management Plan and staff have been trained in readiness. Really important to remember that there are no official "evacuation centres" and everyone needs to consider where you would go if your home was not safe or you were asked to leave your home before a cyclone. Have those important phone numbers ready!

Road Safety: Following my comments last month regarding traffic speeds along Warril Drive, many people have mentioned the issues of other streets and roads around the Kuranda district. If the traffic count data collected by Council shows speed related concerns, the information is passed on to the police. Time to slow down everyone!

Construction work Intersection Rob Veivers Drive & Morton Street: Once works are finalised, please be aware of the new arrangements for traffic exiting and entering Morton St from Rob Veivers Drive. There will be signage to indicate the changes.

"Kuranda Day" Celebrations: Congratulations to Marc Sleeman and all involved in providing another successful Kuranda Festival. Well done Tourism Kuranda!

Nominations for Australia Day Awards: Nominations for Australia Day Awards are now open. Make the effort to nominate someone from your community. Nominations can be made in the following categories: Citizen Award, Young Citizen, Senior Sports, Junior Sports, Arts & Cultural, Community Service, Environmental Excellence, Quiet Achievers Award. Nomination forms are available from Council offices at Mareeba & Kuranda, or at www.msc.qld.gov.au/australia-day-awards/. Nominations close Thursday 15th January.

Christmas Carols Event: If anyone in the community is interested in organising a Carols event in Kuranda, Council can provide assistance with a venue, equipment, advertising. It would be great for the kids in our community. Anyone willing to put their hand up? Mayor's Community Appeal: As in previous years, the Mayor's Appeal will assist needy families in our community at Christmas time. The Appeal provides funds for Christmas hampers for those in need. Over the next two months, you are invited to donate to the Appeal. Donations are tax deductable and certainly help others in your community. Great news on the health front this week, with the announcement that the Cardiac Catheter Lab at Cairns Hospital will operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year following the recruitment of a cardiac specialist and other key staff. The move to a 24-7 service means the cardiac catheter lab will have increased from

just two days a week under Labor. The full-time service will operate from March next year.

Since the LNP has been in government, Cairns & Hinterland Hospital and Health Service have seen significant improvements all round:

- surgery long waits have been reduced from 393 to 42
- dental long waits reduced from 1307 to 0
- 99% of urgent patients are seen within 30 days (up from 85% under Labor)
- 97% of semi urgent patients seen within 90 days (up from 58% under Labor).

At the same time, there were 17.6% more residents receiving care since the ALP's last year.

With 26.6% of Queensland's kids aged between 5-17 overweight or obese, and 57.7% of adults over 18 in the same boat, we need to take charge of our futures. I signed up recently for The Celebrity Pledge. The seven of us involved were asked to make a pledge to do something positive and healthy in our lives over the 8 weeks of The Pledge. Mine was to refrain from alcohol and run every morning. I firmly believe we need to be role models for our kids, and I've been encouraged by how many people have been motivated to join me. I've dropped 14 or more kilos, and improving my running time every morning over five or so kilometres, and have never felt sharper. I thoroughly recommend it.

A Thought for November

▼HIS month we read a short passage from St Matthew's Gospel Chapter 22 verses 34 to 40. All of us have had the experience of listening to two people conversing and realizing that their views and assumptions are so totally different that they can never communicate with each other.

This passage allows us to eavesdrop on such a moment in Jesus' ministry. By now, well into that short ministry, there is no scarcity of antagonists. Already Jesus' attitudes and statements have attracted not only attention, but also deep resentment. This resentment comes from the many established and entrenched elements which were all around Jesus and exist in every society. Even more dangerous for Jesus, we see that two such groups, the Pharisees and the Sadducees, who were usually in disagreement, have come together to put pressure on him. While it is not quite true to say that these were two political parties, it will do to help us understand the situation.

As frequently happened, someone asked Jesus a question which was really a trap. This time it was which of all the commandments in the Law was the most important. As he always did Jesus pierced through the deceit and hypocrisy of the question. There were thousands of commands in the Law. It was and still is a magnificent system which penetrates into every conceivable area of human life. Indeed, when we are tempted to hear dismissals of the Jewish Law in the New Testament, we should never forget that its very complexity

was saying that every aspect of being alive is holy and God is involved in it. That is a most important spiritual insight and we are indebted to the Jewish

However, as with everything in life, there is a but and the but is our humanity. The Law was becoming an end in itself rather than a means to help people live. Arguments were endless, the scoring of points the objective. Human life and human need were becoming engulfed by something originally designed to serve life. That is why Jesus goes to the heart of all law when he replies. For Our Lord the ultimate criterion by which all actions are judged is that of love. Notice that in loving our neighbour as ourselves we must realize that we do not always like ourselves nor approve of our own actions. Loving our neighbour is not necessarily being uncritical. Notice too that the basis of all human loving is possessing a love for God. Experience shows that without this latter, the former, loving one's neighbour, fades out. Without the element of love all law eventually becomes cold and sterile. Our Lord, as always, expressed the realities at the heart of life. Underlying all laws and sanctions is the primary law of love.




