### Dear Kuranda Paper,

If only she'd taken the time to look around at this fantastic green place she'd chosen to be in and accepted its values instead of trying to change it... [Kuranda Paper 165 Envirocare article].

An innocuous proposition, but, on analysis, it may pose some potential difficulties that the writer and the reader may not have considered.

What values, whose values and why are we expected to accept them?

Values are constructed – human made. Let's not kid ourselves. No place, per se, has values. Values are constructed through our own particular experiences and beliefs and we invest them in and on the spaces we occupy. Values shape our actions. We place them (our values) on a place.

A good illustration of the differences and potential divisiveness of values is the recent and protracted herbicide debate. All persons involved cared passionately for the environment (shared value) but, as passionately, divided over spraying (different values).

Again, some persons growing exotic plants (different values) may care passionately about the environment (shared value).

Both illustrations demonstrate the hierarchical nature of the individuals' suites of values - while there may be some overlap of values, there are also differences.

Values are rightly often and strongly contested and may prove dangerous when imposed or accepted unquestioned.

If agreed that these propositions are correct and logical, the above excerpt can read with the substitution of *my values* for *its values*.

However, if the writer and reader do not hold as valid the substitution of my values (its values = the writer's/readers' values), it would seem that there is agreement then with my proposition that a place per se has no values.

As for trying to change things – well maybe we are all involved in this – each according to one's own values! Otherwise we'd all be silent, inactive, and take the world as it is - again a value Peter North - Kuranda

- Mareeba Shire Council or State Counter Disaster and Rescue Service will take Α whatever action is necessary to provide alternative facilities.
- Q In an emergency does the high school's radio broadcast and at what frequency?
- No, all relevant information will be broadcast on Radio 4AM -A

Kuranda's SES group leader, Mr Bob Hammond, will be attending Mareeba Shire Council's Local Diaster Management Group's debrief of Cyclone Larry and will be addressing areas of concern he has for this group.

### **RE: KURANDA SWIMMING POOL**

[Dear Mr Davis] While I do not usually respond to letters that are not addressed to me, I have to point out that the statement attributed to you in the latest issue of the Kuranda Paper does nothing to help the cause for the Kuranda pool.

It should be noted that:-

- Mareeba and Dimbulah did not require the rest of the Shire ratepayers to pay for their pools. However, on-going maintenance costs are borne from general revenue and the same would apply to Kuranda.
  - Therefore a case could be developed for no contributions from general revenue to initially construct a pool at Kuranda.
- Council has committed \$200,000 from general revenue towards the cost of the Kuranda pool. If Kuranda wants a pool it must be prepared to pay for the balance of the cost less State Government subsidy and Council contribution.
- There are many who have made it clear to me they do not want a pool and do not want to pay 3.
- Therefore, instead of being critical of Council you might better direct your energy towards 4. convincing the community at large to support the pool.



### **A Thought for May**

This month's Bible reading is from St John's Gospel Chapter 10 verses 11-18.

Of all the images which Jesus used for his person and his work, the image of the good shepherd has shone most over the centuries of the Christian tradition. The role of the shepherd became synonymous with such values as trust, faithfulness, dependability, gentleness. However, the role of the shepherd also requires tenacity, strength, courage, leadership. If these values are placed beside the others, we avoid childish images of a Jesus who is merely meek and mild. We have only to read the first sentence of this passage to hear Jesus define the reality of the shepherd's role with chilling foresight. "The good shepherd," says Jesus "lays down his life for the sheep." To do anything less is to betray the flock, it is to "care nothing for the sheep."

"I am the good shepherd." What might that be asking of my life? If a shepherd cares, then

the question is whether I am becoming an essentially caring or a self-centred human being. That may seem obvious. Yet patterns of behaviour change in our lives, and we need to examine them from time to time. Again, if a shepherd leads, then in what sense am I leading other lives, perhaps those younger than myself. Leading can be an exercise in ego and power. It can be domineering. Obviously, Jesus pattern of shepherding does not call for that. Rather, are there vocations in my life that I could give some time to? Is there some aspect of youth formation, a Sunday school class, a Scout or Guide group, children of alcoholic parents - anything like this that I could be involved in to guide others? In terms of adults, could I give time to leading Bible study? Is there a self-help group to which from my experience I have something to give? All of these things are shepherding.

Such vocations may seem very tame and pedestrian compared with Our Lord's laying down his life as the good shepherd. But we are not all asked to do what Jesus did. To lay down one's life can mean many things at many different levels. One thing is certain. You and I are never going to lay down our lives for anything until we give even a small part of ourselves for something! Surely there is not one of us who cannot respond in some way to Our Lord's call to be a shepherd. There is not one of us who cannot in some way respond to Our Lord's call to shepherd

search nature inscape and its distinctive pattern. the exploration nature's signposts, metaphors and symbols.




is the beauty that he is interested in, not

Stylish swingin' tunes, affordable drinks and plenty of dance floor action. The first Amphitheatre event for 2006 was a great success. Members old and new and a few new faces from around the region were out for a good time and Cairns outfit, The Swingin'Alley Catz delivered. They played a tight first set and, after a subtle wink and nudge to the crowd from Kirk the keyboard player (ie. "the Catz are a dance band... dance;)" the crowd loosened up and took to the dance floor. By the third set the floor was crowded. The energetic swing and sultry sounds of the horns went from strength to strength, much to the great pleasure of dancers and drinkers alike. A jazz arrangement of 'Take Me To The River' ended to appreciative applause and was followed up by a few funked up sixties tunes that left revellers asking for more. The membership drive was a success and bodes well for upcoming member's nights in 2006.

Easter Saturday saw a different pace altogether with an appearance by touring artist, Peru the Singing Woman. The atmospheric performance was very well-received by the relaxed crowd who enjoyed chai and cake and hung on every well-placed note. Peru's voice was smooth and polished as she wove story and song with chant. One song included a rare treat with a performance by Kuranda Belly-dancer, Susan Breeze. The addition of Rob Hart on Djembe and Dave Cook on Didge, amongst others, fleshed out the sound on a couple of songs to give a more organic, full sound. Cliff De Silva opened the show with his soulful brand of fusion slide guitar.

Coming soon to the Understage is Zenith, a young, exciting Kuranda band making waves on the Australian music scene. A feature of the Kuranda Reggae Festival last year, just back from Mt Carbine, on the Yungaburra line-up and about to support Boney M, they are the subject of an SBS doco currently under production. They will play to their home town for the next Amphitheatre Understage Member's Night, 12th May 2006. Zenith is Aden Brim (songwriting/ vocals), Richard Bing (vocals), Robert Donahue (lead guitar) Isaac Crowley (bass), Lindsay Snider (drums) with a little help from Willie and Astro Brim (Gudabah) on percussion and vocals. The music crosses genres from indigenous roots music to hip hop to rap by Ancient Instincts.

Doors open 7pm for a 7.30pm start, support local talent before they leave us for bigger things.

In other news, Salsa dance classes start at the Understage on Thursday April 27th, 6.30-7.30pm. The program will run for 8 weeks and is designed for beginners, with or without dance partners. ### Ditch the Range Highway - FNQ deserves smart and sustainable transport solutions!

Friends of the Earth Kuranda is somewhat gratified the Wet Tropics Management Authority (WTMA) Board is seeking further information before making further decisions on the proposed Kuranda Range 4-Lane Highway.

"Obviously, we'd have preferred a clear decision against the Highway, but we'll keep campaigning" said Sid Walker for FoE Kuranda.

FoE Kuranda made a short presentation to the WTMA Board during its meeting in Cairns on 10<sup>th</sup> April 2006. A Briefing Paper was prepared for the presentation. It can be viewed online at http://foekuranda.org/web/modules/ news/article.php?storyid=23

"We've been told the exact matters on which the WTMA Board seeks further information can't be revealed. We hope that the Board is looking hard at our key concerns – especially 'big picture' issues that didn't generate much discussion until the broad implications of the Highway proposal became clearer to all concerned."

"There are a large number of critical problems associated with the Highway proposal. It's an ill-considered road lobby exercise in 'biggism'.

"If, heaven forbid, it's ever built,

it would cut a concrete scar through one of the most environmentally important parts of Australia, wreck one of our finest scenic views, cause endless delays during construction, lead to inappropriate urbanization around Kuranda, damage tourism and foolishly lock our community into car dependence for decades to come.


"Planning for our area needs to get a whole lot smarter. Accordingly, we call on the State Government to revise the long-term plan for the greater Kuranda area and scrap current plans for step-bystep urbanization.

"With 21st century public transport infrastructure, this unique Village in the Rainforest and surrounding area could buzz - in a way that doesn't damage our world class environmental and heritage assets.

"The 4-Lane Highway idea is a leftover from failed transport policies of the last century which have had a disastrous impact worldwide.

"We ask Premier Beattie to bring the "Smart State" up to Kuranda.

I am sure I am not alone on wishing for some blue skies and sunshine in May after the constant rain and cyclonic activity so far this year. Whilst the tourists didn't look too unhappy in the rain when I was in Kuranda recently I'm sure business will improve with a change in the weather.

As people would be aware the northern end of Coondoo Street is currently being upgraded to bring it to the same standard as the lower end which will be welcome by businesses and visitors alike. But the task of providing tourists with information about attractions and activities is vital in helping tourists enjoy their time in Kuranda come rain or shine.

The Kuranda Advisory Committee that works with the Council to plan the provision of tourist infrastructure using funds from the Kuranda Tourist Levy is also planning to upgrade the visitor centre which does such an excellent job in somewhat cramped conditions. As Chair of the Committee I have been facilitating our discussions and there seems to be agreement that the present visitor centre needs to be extended but that a smaller information kiosk should also be constructed in a section of the railway/skyrail car park. Approximately 75-80% of visitors to Kuranda arrive this way and are often seeking more information before they

A workshop is being organised from Council, all the key stakeholder groups, visitor centre staff and consultants to consider this project in completed over the next two years.

The swimming pool project overcame the hurdle of land tenure Labor candidate Queensland to give the land needed for the pool to the Council so they could qualify for a 50% government subsidy. But there are other hurdles still ahead before any Kuranda kids get to swim in their pool.

The biggest one is all the other communities that also have applications in for the limited bucket of money for major sports facilities. We need to make sure that the Sports



Minister realises just how important this pool is to Kuranda, That's why Steve Wettenhall has launched his petition to the Parliament in this issue of the paper. As your local member I will table the petition but we need at least a couple of thousand signatures to send a strong message. I have checked with the Speaker and anyone can sign regardless of age so we want kids to have their say too – so please get busy and send completed petition forms back to my office. Steve will also be in Kuranda collecting signatures so I urge you to give him your full support.

The other hurdle is the extra cost of connecting power which has to go underground so that it does not interfere with the flying doctor communication tower in that locality. The Council may have to put this extra cost onto the benefited area rate levy that Kuranda residents will pay.

Finally I would like to give you an update about the progress of the governments fully-funded \$6.4 billion Health Action Plan to improve health services and recruit more doctors, nurses and allied health professionals. I was very disappointed with Prime minister John Howard's decision to offer only 50 extra doctor training places in Queensland, well short of the 325 extra places we need.

All governments need to face up to the fact that Australia simply hasn't trained enough doctors for a generation.

Our Health Action Plan is a plan for the future. It includes more funding

- o **DOCTORS**: an extra \$904 million for doctors working in our public hospitals – *signed off by doctors*;
- **NURSES**: package to increase pay by 25.3 per cent (compounded) to attract and retain nurses - offer currently before nurses;
- o IMPROVED SERVICES: \$1.817 billion in additional funding to improve services, perform more operations and address key areas such as emergency departments and intensive care units -fully budgeted and committed in the Health Mini-Budget.

The comprehensive Health Action Plan also contains a commitment to recruit 300 doctors, 500 nurses and 400 allied health professionals by December this year. We are ahead of schedule and already have more than 1000 new staff working in our health system.

We will continue to push the Prime Minister for an extra 325 undergraduate places in medicine courses in Queensland - to provide the doctors we need for the future. SEE PAGE 16 PETITION



### **PAIN AND GAIN**

### The silver lining to the cyclone cloud.

Events such as the weather we have experienced very recently can have some interesting side effects. Those "in the know" are predicting that there's likely to be an explosion of forest fruit and seed in the coming months.

It seems that when the forest is stressed and its viability threatened, it redoubles its efforts to reproduce and perpetuate its species. We're expecting to gather good quantities of seed resulting from this abundance and give Nature a helping hand. We'll store some seeds and propagate others to plant out in our various projects.

If you're on the look out you'll probably notice the trees on your property behaving in this way. We'd be very grateful if you could either collect the fruit/seed and bring it to the nursery or invite us to come and collect it. We might be able to identify other trees on your property and give you some information about them.

We're particularly chasing *Aleurites rockinghamensis* (Candlenut), *Rhus taitensis* (Sumac), *Alstonia muelleriana* (Hard milkwood), *Ficus racemosa* (cluster fig. Any figs).

We're keen to propagate "pioneer" species at the moment. Pioneers are the first trees that you see appearing at the edge of the forest and across cleared ground that's left to regenerate on its own. The idea is to plant up to 70% of the fast growing pioneers to get quick canopy cover. The shade from these trees slows down the weeds and provides the right environment for more variety (diversity) in the future. The birds which move into the habitat provided by the pioneers drop an amazing mixture of seeds which will come up of their own accord.

### TWO MAJOR CORRIDOR PROJECTS

With your help, the seeds we propagate in the coming months (and years) at our nursery will be planted around Kuranda in ...

### The GREEN and the ENVIROLINK CORRIDORS

The Green Corridor is the rehabilitation of the Barron River from top to bottom, both sides. It is the initiative of the Barron Catchment Care group, of which we are a part, and is being supported by corporate sponsors. The guinea grass plains bounded by Myola Road, McKenzie Street, Barnwell Road and the river will soon be transformed with a rainforest make-over as part of this project.

The Kuranda Envirolink Wildlife Corridor is a 10km long swathe of forest that connects the northern and southern sections of the World Heritage Wet Tropics west of Kuranda (from Kowrowa, Myola to Speewah). We've been busily working at the Kowrowa end, at Big Sands, for the past 7 years to make the front door of the corridor inviting to the likes of Cassowaries so that they will move through it to meet up with other Cassowaries and do what comes naturally in a healthy, plentiful and safe environment.



# Far North Queensland has a New Publication

You may ask with all the tourist and street media that abounds whether there is really a need for another.

It was apparent that with the demise of the long running "Barfly" last year the Arts and Music sectors were largely un-catered for, there was no media to tell residents of, or visitors to, the region where their local art gallery, performance organization or music venue was.

The Far North Queensland Arts Guide came about after discussions with Eve Stafford and Melissa Robinson from the Cairns based Arts Nexus in Brisbane last September. As a result of those discussions, the formation of an interesting and strategic partnership between Arts Nexus and the Queensland based national Arts Media company 3E Innovative began.


The promotion of *Arts Nexus* as the peak body in the region gives it a broad platform on which it may speak and bring to light issues that effect the region was one benefit. However the bringing together of a large number of both commercial and non-commercial entities and individuals within one publication that will benefit a large number of practitioners at the grass roots was a large driver for both organisations. Whether it be the young musician working a day job while honing his craft on Friday and Saturday nights at a local resort, or the jeweller, potter or painter studiously working away for recognition, these practitioners, many operating as cottage industries, are the grass roots of the arts.



On Cyclone Larry - Kuranda community emergency calls to 000 were redirected through the Mareeba Shire Council Disaster Coordination Centre to Kuranda SES HQ on a Message Form by fax (while the phone lines were operational) or by the excellent radio communications provided through our new repeater. We were lucky to have only eight requests for assistance. One of those was completed by a passer-by with a chainsaw; one was assessed as too risky; one residence was tarped although severely damaged; the rest were comparatively minor, involving trees blocking driveways or resting on roofs. Throughout our responses, we enjoyed working competently as a team (chainsaw and working at heights) and were impressed with the contributions made by new members Ernie Brandt and Steve Birch and Rural Firie, Kevin Rojan.

Some observations. Fallen Kadagi trees (both with some rot in the base) severely damaged one home and comprehensively blocked a driveway in Kuranda. These trees were also obvious victims of cyclonic winds around Milla Milla and Malanda. Other trees commonly causing damage to homes and powerlines and blocking roads were pines and tallowwoods in plantations.

### **Attendance at External Courses**

Two members completed a Chainsaw Tree Felling Course and QSES Work in an Emergency Operations Centre. One member completed the QSES Land Search Bridging Course. (Total of 61.5 hours) Cyclone Larry caused cancellation of an Air Observers Bridging and Urban Search and Rescue Courses and the Regional SES Conference.

### **Night Training**

We've had a maximum of 9 members at night training, where we've revised- Storm Damage Control (roof construction, safety issues, ladder use and tarping); radio use; Map Reading and GPS use. Currently we're completing QSES Safety, one of the Foundation Skills units. (Total of 102 hours)

### Maintenance including building alterations

As well as routine general maintenance (vehicles, trailers and generators), work included modifying a section of the mesh security area, relocating the existing door and shelving to allow the construction of a 3M X 3M air-conditioned, secure operations room. (Total 43.5

Weather and emergency situations permitting, the operations room and a security fence will be completed soon after the publication of this edition of the paper.

### **Community support**

Three members received Certificates of Appreciation from Cairns City Council for their support during the Melbourne 2006 Queen's Baton Relay on 4 and 5 Feb. We also assisted at Kuranda's Anzac Day march.

# Garden Jottings by Alectura

Things to consider this month:



ay 2006.

With the coming of cooler nights and mornings and lower humidity, kaempherias, some gingers and caladiums will be yellowing off for their winter dormancy. Mark places so as not to damage these plantings.

The next few months are a good time to remove the old flowering stalks of heliconias, costus and gingers and take time

to observe what is flowering or colouring well during the cooler months. Noticeably, some Cordylines and Anthuriums will show better leaf growth and richer colourings. Also benefiting from the cooler weather, plantings of coriander, dill, parsley, Perilla - both purple and green should be made immediately either in pots or raised beds.

Sow a range of Asian greens, Chinese Broccoli, Chinese Cabbage, Mustard Green to name but a few. A great web site identifying and illustrating a range of Asian vegetables is: http://www.nre.vic.gov.au/trade/asiaveg/thes-oo.htm. Visited a keen gardening friend the other day and was shown a plant which had evidently come in with a load of local mulch. He had identified it correctly as an orchid and asked for its correct botanical name. In exploring its nomenclature, I developed the idea for this month's feature. Howard, by the way, your orchid is Geodrum pictum with two endemic species occurring from the Endeavour River to NSW North Coast. These plants were an important food item for Aboriginals known as 'Yeenga' or 'Uine'.

**Plant of the Month:** The vast Orchid family provides the tropical gardener with a number of terrestrial gems of easy to more challenging garden cultivation. These may, with a little care in siting and attention to soil conditions, provide the beauty of flowers and often striking foliage. Probably the most spectacular and readily available is Phaius tankervilleae, "Nun's Orchid". This magnificent species is a very wide spread terrestrial, being found along the eastern seaboard of Australia from northern NSW, right along the east coast of Queensland and on into PNG, Indonesia, through to Northern India. The plant is a large one to 1.5m with stout fleshy pseudobulbs, and several large pleated leaves. Inflorescence is a simple raceme which may attain 100cm in height, and bear up to 20+ large (10cm) shapely blooms. Needing copious water during its spring and summer growth and thriving on heavy feeding, it also takes well to pot cultivation. Propagation from division or spent flowering spike, cut into sections with at least one eye on each, and

planted into sphagnum moss, a high proportion of the eyes will develop into plantlets. *P. australis*, now rare, is the largest Australian terrestrial orchid. *P. flavus* with yellow flowers and variegated foliage, from Northern India and Japan and other species are well worth seeking out and all are of relatively easy cultivation.

Spectacular but in a more subdued way, is *Peristeria elata* "Holy Ghost" or "Dove orchid", the national flower of Panama, so called from the miniature dove visible at the centre of its cupped, waxy white red dotted flower. Similar in growth to Phaius, it prefers humus rich soil, sharper drainage and kept dry till new growth starts. Again a real stunner, adapting well to pot culture but maybe a little more challenging to achieve regular flowering.

Calanthe and Spathoglottis, both of tropical origin, growing to 60cm and each with at least one Australian representative are of the easiest cultivation and when in flower are often offered at local markets. Requiring sharpish drainage, but good moisture during their growing season, morning sun to dappled shade, their plicate leaves in clusters and white, through pink to purple spikes of flowers make excellent displays when allowed to clump. Both these families have evergreen and deciduous species with deciduous ones requiring resting while the evergreen types require moisture throughout the year.


Of great interest and more challenge are the unique Nervillia species, with four endemic to Australia, N. discolor, N. holochila, N. peltata and N. uniflora. All are deciduous with subterranean tubers that produce flower before the leaf. Very amenable to cultivation provided the tubers are rested dry after the attractive leaves fade away. Probably best pot grown, before spring, repotting into fresh gravelly soil and leaf mould will promote healthy growth and flowers. A little animal manure sprinkled on top of the fresh media may be of great benefit. Water heavily until the leaves have reached their maximum size and then slowly lessen until the leaf fades and water is totally withheld. During dormancy, the medium should be dampened occasionally to prevent complete drying of the tubers.

Last, but not least, is the exquisite tribe of evergreen low ground hugging "Jewel Orchids" grown mainly for their stunning foliage displays although their flower spikes have a quiet refinement. Foliage is often glistening with intricate veinings in golds, pinks and silvers. The most easily obtainable is *Ludisia* (*Haemaria*) discolor. From Burma, this little gem with fleshy stems and succulent leaves runs along the ground surface and needs a rich humusy soil, medium shade and high humidity. It grows well in very shallow pots which is probably the best way to acquaint oneself with its cultivation. Once mastered, other spectacular leafed gems

are available in the genera *Anoectochilus, Dossina, Erythrodes*, and *Goodyera*. Take care however, these botanical treasures can become a consuming passion. **Dear June**, You can certainly try growing the cacao tree Theobroma cacao but it would probably thrive better on the coast being somewhat cold sensitive as it is native to tropical South America - not tolerating much below 18C. It is from the pods, each up to one kilo in weight which grow directly on the trunk, that the beans are extracted, which processed and ground yield the commercial cocoa which in turn is the vital ingredient used in making chocolate. The extracted bean - like seeds and the sweetish white pulp are fermented together and roasting brings out further flavour. This small growing tree (6-8m) often has attractive blush new growth and seems irresistible to leaf munchers. The varieties Criollo and Trinitario seem particuarly insect prone while the hardier but less flavorsome Forastero seems more pest resistant. A well-grown tree may yield in excess of 20+ pods but, like the vanilla orchid, is probably more an ornamental talking point than crop rewarding in the average garden. Cuttings taken in the warmer months are easily struck and plants are sometimes available at Limberlost Nursery.

# Seasonal Gardening by Aleisha

As the rain pours down gardening is not at the top of the list of things to do, yet. However, I have sorted through my seeds for planting when the rains slow down a bit. In the meantime I like to use and experiment with the tropical fruits and vegetables that are in production now.

In the last article I mentioned jicama (pronounced hick-a-ma), a root vegetable that thrives this time of year. Jicama is best eaten raw as it takes a long time to cook or bake. After its great taste the ease with which it is peeled is a plus and you can do this by cutting almost through the top and pulling gently down. If the peel is thick enough it will come off in a few wide swathes. A simple salad is made by dicing one jicama (10 cm diameter or larger), adding 1 to 2 hot chillies removing seeds and dicing finely, grating the peel of one lime and then juicing it and pouring the juice over the jicama, chillies and lime peel and mixing in 1 teaspoon of salt. Blood oranges and a whole range of other tropical fruits can be used to replace the lime.

Yacon (pronounced yak-on) is another tropical root vegetable from South America that is sweet and is

best eaten raw in salads. It does have a tendency to turn brown after peeling or cutting so immerse in a bowl of water or sprinkle lime or lemon juice over it and toss well. Yacon has a lovely crunchy carrot like taste but a slightly latexy tasting skin so peel until you come to the translucent light orange coloured flesh. Yacon is also good for diabetics as its sugars are easily digested. I haven't used yacon in salads as it tastes so good it doesn't last very long.

For green salads or cooked as a spinach african lettuce is really versatile and as a bonus it is not slimy as are some tropical greens. The plant has a lovely dark green crinkled leaf and if cut back regularly it is a lovely ground cover even in some shade. For salads just use as regular leaf lettuce and when cooking only immerse the leaves for a few seconds in boiling water or they will go dark brown in colour. If necessary dunk the leaves in cold water right after cooking to stop the excess heat from turning the leaves brown.

Even the simplest of vegetables can make a great meal if fresh out of the garden. Cnjoy!



"With the growing presence in both domestic and international markets, it is essential that all operators and residents do their utmost to support and improve the KVPP marketing endeavours which certainly are "kicking more than a few goals" particularly in recent times," Fr Wright said.





### LOCALS FEAR FOR BAHAI'S IN IRAN

Members of the Baha'i community in Kuranda have expressed fear for the safety of fellow Baha' is living in Iran, following the release of a confidential document that shows Iranian authorities are taking steps to identify and monitor all Baha'is still living in that country.

"We are shocked and fearful at this latest development, which suggests the Iranian authorities are preparing to unleash a new wave of persecution against our Baha'i brothers and sisters in Iran", said a member of the Kuranda community, speaking on behalf of Baha'i members in Kuranda.

"It is ominously reminiscent of the early 1980s, when many Baha'is in Iran were imprisoned, tortured and executed solely on the basis of their faith". The document, released by the UN Special Rapporteur on Freedom of Religion and Belief, conveys an instruction from Iran's Supreme Leader, Ayatollah Khamenei, to the Iranian Armed Forces, police and other governmental agencies, to identify and collect information about members of the Baha'i Faith.

The Special Rapporteur, Asma Jahangir, expressed concern that the results of such monitoring would be used as a basis for increased persecution of Baha'is. It follows mounting attacks on the Baha'is in state-sanctioned newspapers, radio and television programs in recent months." Australian Baha'is are appealing urgently to all people not to allow our peace-loving and law-abiding counterparts in Iran to be sacrificed to the grave danger they clearly face", said the member of the Kuranda Baha'i community. "People everywhere can raise their voices in response to this looming threat".

"Here in Kuranda, we will also be praying for our fellow Baha'is in Iran, including family members and friends".

Members of the Baha'is Faith, Iran's largest non-Muslim religious minority, have been persecuted in that country for more than 25 years. While the violent nature of the oppression subsided following an international outcry in the 1980s, community members have continued to be subject to a wide range of persecutions, ranging from harassment, arrests and imprisonment to the confiscation of individual and community property, desecration of cemeteries and holy sites, and denial of employment, pensions and access to higher education. Now the situation appears to be taking a serious turn for the worse.

The Baha'i Faith is the youngest of the world's independent religions and has been present in Australia since 1920.


with excellent ideas for changing the play and the cast's relationships start to go awry. Nominated for seven Academy awards, Won Best supporting Actress.
