LAST MONTH this paper ran a front page story about the pedestrian refuge in Rob Veivers Drive and Barang Street and how unfortunate it was that its appearance was not in keeping with the plantings and street art in the rest of Kuranda.

Recently there have been several initiatives: firstly, *The Kuranda Paper* has contacted the council with what we think is a workable proposal to modify the refuge, satisfying both council safety concerns and our residents' issues with its appearance. Council has agreed to consider the matter at a regular meeting on Wednesday 2nd December which is unfortunately after the paper is printed, so we publish without knowing the results of the meeting. Secondly, an enterprising new group has been formed, named "Spirit of Kuranda". It has over 160 members and is dedicated to improving Kuranda's ambience. A letter from Hannah Wattel at left refers. Thirdly, members of the Kuranda Advisory Precinct committee are calling for people interested in a community garden to get together and we publish a notice regarding this also.

The common theme running through all this is that of Kuranda taking control of our own destiny and accepting responsibility for how we want to look and live. Some five years ago the Garden Group put a proposal to the then council, suggesting the group take responsibility for the various plantings around the village, choose the plants, maintain and replace them. The council accepted the offer but the initiative stalled and nothing further was done. The Garden Group remains supportive but its members are getting older; the average age is already over one hundred and eight; the spirit is willing but the flesh is weak. Many members would be happy to advise younger and fitter residents about what to do however and Spirit of Kuranda would seem to be the ideal venue for this. We recommend everyone who is interested in what Kuranda looks like to read and contribute to Spirit of Kuranda and those who want to be actively involved to go to the Precinct meeting. For our part, as soon as we know what the council decided regarding Green Island we will post it on Spirit of Kuranda.

Lastly, this is the final issue for 2015 and is where we traditionally wish everyone a happy festive season. So **MERRY CHRISTMAS** and a **HAPPY NEW YEAR** and we'll see you all again in January 2016.

Dangerous Section on Oak Forest Road

There is one particular section in a turn on the Oak Forest Road just before Mantaka that is very notorious for accidents after rain. I think that a majority of locals are very aware of that section but as it happens there are especially the Horse and Pony Club members coming from other areas, driving their vehicles while towing horse floats and, as shown on the recent photo from 22nd November, sliding off the road is very easy, even while driving slowly.

As a local resident I have contacted the Mareeba council and requested something being done but to no avail. So after a bit of rain my family is constantly on edge every time we hear a vehicle's tyres sliding on that turn in the road. Sometimes there is a bump as a vehicle crashes into the trees and so far there has been no serious injury to anyone but something has to be done to make that road safe. I would seriously suggest for anyone being involved in an accident on this patch of road to lodge a complaint to the Mareeba council because the next driver or a family member may not be so lucky and walk away from an accident.

The Mareeba Council has been contacted by me and my husband on several occasions. We have supplied photographs of accidents but apparently there is no funding as the council has made some major roadworks in the area. I just cannot imagine what the council would seriously provide as an explanation to a family who should lose their loved one because our council members had turned a blind eye. At the last accident there were a lot of resources called to the site, all of which costs precious funding that could be spent elsewhere on important projects. And unfortunately, as with most problems which are pushed to the side and not resolved in time, it has to come to some very serious consequences before anything will be done.

Village Signage

The "Green Island" may appear to be an ugly blob of concrete and steel but there are two gaudy signs pointing to it as a "Refuge Island", both also with a people sign (what else?). Why does it need signage? Is it incomplete? Will it be roofed to provide a safe haven for little people during cyclones? If not take an angle grinder to both of the useless and unhelpful signs.

I am equally appalled by the other fatuous new signage littering the village. Why the ubiquitous children and cyclists signs which state the bleeding obvious and apply to every town and street in the country? Entering the village before the service station there are signs for "Aged on Side Road" (do we need one in every street?), "Kuranda Traffic Area 3P" then "Area Parking Control" and "Watch for" cyclists/pedestrians. Is the village so tourist unfriendly? These are all road safety graffiti especially as the parking spaces are already fully signed.

Continuing along Rob Vievers Drive at the park why is there a high vis pedestrian crossing sign (replace with 30/40 speed limit) duplicated 10 metres later (remove) then two more signs at the actual crossing another 30 metres hence? Contrast this with the busier crossing at the toilet block which has a single sign obscured by palms and a sign for amenities/information centre.

On Coondoo Street why is the Mareeba/Cairns sign at Venom Zoo duplicated 50 metres later? Have others misread the sign near the fire station 40 END SHARED ZONE? What is the point of END 3P sign on corner of Barang Street? A high vis directional sign to village centre before the turn from Barron Falls Road at the Church is long overdue.

The traffic engineers graduated from Nanny State School but not the School of Common Sense.

I shudder at the outcome of developing the charming Therwine Street.

Library Openina

On Saturday 21st November the relocated Kuranda Library and Council Service Centre was opened at the Kuranda Community Precinct by the Mayor of the Mareeba Shire Council, Tom Gilmore.

This is a significant milestone in the redevelopment of the old Primary School site. The Primary School was moved nearly 10 years ago to help form the College on Myola Road. A key part of the community's acceptance of the move of the Primary School was the purchase of the site by the old Mareeba Shire Council for community use.

Although there has been some intermittent use of the site and a considerable investment in the consolidation and

refurbishment of some of the facilities, the fittingout of the lower storey of old C block to turn it into a first-rate library facility gives the Kuranda Community Precinct a beating heart.

It is a tribute to the many community members, Councillors and Council Officers who have sat on committees, attended meetings and provided feedback at formal and informal community consultations on the future of the site.

A special thank you goes to Mayor Tom Gilmore and

Deputy Mayor and local Councillor Jenny Jensen for their strong and ongoing support of the project.

The vision is by no means complete. An incomplete list of possible future projects which have been suggested includes:

- · Development of a hightech video conferencing room in one of the upstairs rooms in C block
- Seeking a grant to assist in the installation of a lift to allow access for all, to the upstairs rooms
- Further plantings perhaps with botanical labelling
- · A series of public signs outlining the history of the site and surroundings as a school, its Indigenous use, the early white settlement and also the natural history of the area • A children's playground

• Bench seats, picnic tables and BBQ facilities.

To China Through Steiner

This morning I had peanut milk and coco flakes for breakfast. I looked up 'How often do Chinese get diabetes' and the search engine told me 30%. I was expecting a lot higher as these days the Chinese seem to have a bit of sugar added to many things they consume such as soy milk and bread products. Thankfully the steamed buns are still savoury! The reason I looked up this statistic is because I was reading the ingredients for everything I've been eating and drinking and the drinks I found are fine as I've been drinking water and milk, however some of the snack food I've been eating has a shocking amount of sugar.

I was driven to school by the home stay Dad from the home where I'm staying. We started the day with Tai Chi. Even those that haven't learned all the moves yet spend 20minutes of their school morning in silence and the teacher is pretty impressive. The main lesson was good. I had main lesson with the grade 9s and 10s today because the Principal of the school was teaching them and invited me in. Everyone else had electronic translators to help them understand but I didn't really need one as my Chinese is pretty good. That class was pretty interesting. I took a few notes in the class. After morning tea, Callum, Jenna and I had Chinese poems to learn. It was one of those classes that didn't go to plan. The teacher got a bit angry at us for talking while we were doing our work. Chinese teachers can be quite strict and they really want students to take their lessons seriously. Our Chinese language teacher has been patient with us while we learn her teaching style and likes the effort we are making with our Chinese diaries. After that we played soccer and it was pretty close game with the final score was 3-4, my team came second. After sport, we had Maths and woodwork. Then lastly we had choir. During choir Yashoda had a birthday and everyone sung Zhu Ni Sheng Ri Kuai Le (Happy Birthday in Chinese) and we shared some cake. School days are longer in China. We started at 8.10am and finished at 4.30pm when you clean up the school and everyone gets to go home at 5.00pm.

We woke up at 7.00am at the hotel and had breakfast there and all of us got on the bus. It took us three hours to get there and then we started our hike to the top of the Yellow Dragon road. Along the way we stopped a few times and had some

Along the way they had oxygen bottles for people who could not handle high altitudes. It was about a four kilometre walk up to the top. At the end of the day we were exhausted but we still had a great time. The whole trip was a really great life changing experience. I loved the noodles, they were fantastic. I also enjoyed the freedom and being able to travel around wherever you want without much difficulty. Public transport in China is awesome! The culture and the performances throughout our trip were amazing. Thanks to our teachers for supporting us.

That adventure was to go up the mountain to where it was really cold and the snow was light and puffy. This year my school, Cairns Hinterland Steiner School, took on a huge new project — a trip to China. An amazing dream at the beginning of the year, but now as the year draws to a close, it has been a great adventure that was realised. Early in October 2015 after much fundraising, planning, more fundraising, art auctions, car washes and some more planning, we finally go on a plane to visit a Steiner School in China! China is not a place that any of us expected to be going to let alone find another Steiner School in.

Steiner is an alternative style of learning, which follows the philosophy that learning happens through experience. We saw so much from Giant Pandas, baby pandas, rock climbing areas, beautiful snowy mountains in the JiuZhaiGou area and some great nature walks. We watched Chinese Opera with many cymbals, much singing and even more acrobatics and danced around a fire at the Chengdu School's Autumn Festival (a common Steiner tradition). We navigated the subway system, museums, public transport, including tuktuks and really had fun exploring local markets where we had to learn bargaining skills. The food was amazing, full of flavour and often spices. Our host school and families were really very gracious hosts to us. Though we have now come home from this amazing trip, we are buzzing with the high it has left us on, that or jet lag after our 24 hour red eye commute home. We have now been adjusting ourselves back to English and the heat but

Kuranda Shines At TEDxJCUCairns

KURANDA local Georgia Bruce recently took to the stage and gave a talk at TEDxJCUCairns. Her talk has since been uploaded to YouTube. Technology Entertainment & Design is a non-profit organisation devoted to 'ideas worth spreading'.

The two annual TED Conferences invite the world's leading thinkers and doers to speak for 18 minutes or less.

In the spirit of ideas worth spreading, TEDx is a program of local, selforganized events that bring people together to share a TED-like experience. These are branded TEDx, where x = independently organised TED event.

TEDxJCUCairns is organised by The Cairns Institute, James Cook University to showcase local ideas and achievements to the global online audience. Other presenters included NAIDOC Scholar of the Year Michelle Deshong; chronic disease prevention researcher Klaus Gebel; community development and social revolution advocate Jesse T Martin and musician Naomi Wenitong.

Georgia's talk titled 'How to really click with people, horses or lions' outlined the best methods to train horses and other animals.

Georgia is a bronze medal winning paralympian who has been training horses from wild brumbies through to elite performance horses for more than 20 years. She has also worked with exotic animals including cheetahs, lemurs, spider monkeys and rhinos.

Georgia uses positive reinforcement techniques (Clicker Training) and demonstrates these techniques at trick shows and training demonstrations around Australia with her quarter horse gelding, "Rumba the Wonder Horse."

Today promised new sights, smells and sounds. Today our teachers with the help of the school had organised a guided tour of the centre of Chengdu. Our teachers told us the previous day to make sure we were on time, 'be there at 8.30am, no later'. So I left the warm apartment and entered the cool, dry air of Chengdu, China. It's like stepping out of a sauna on a cool day with air chills cutting through your layers and touching your bones. Before this week we've had warm weather but the season has changed. It's not all that pleasant. It dries your throat, makes you cough and shiver all the way to school about a ten minutes walk for me, past shops, apartments, pubs, bus stops an so many other things like marjong playing areas, tuktuks, etc. I arrived at school right on time, at 8.28am to be exact. I met my classmates and a few Chinese students who had decided it was a good idea to go in a tour through their own city. The thing was though they looked more excited than we did! We walked to the bus stop and you could smell the food stalls before you saw them. The food stalls were getting ready for the morning rush of people on their way to work. The smell was of so many different things. Deep fried, steaming, boiling and roasting... they were the smells that made our mouths water. We caught bus number 3 and after about 45minutes travel by bus it was time for us to hop off. Since it was the last stop and the bus was full and of course the Chinese being very impatient to exit the bus, we decided to wait on the bus and watch all the Chinese try to exit a one meter wide doorway all at once. It ended up being extremely amusing and a few people seemed rather impatient to not wait a few seconds to exit the bus behind others. The bottom line is the Chinese people are very hard working and every second is important!

Once we finally exited the bus we were met by our tour guide. She was a young woman in her late 20s and athletic looking at first appearance. We were all handed a small ear piece that we could hear her through instead of her yelling over the noise of the other few thousand people walking or shopping. Our guide took us down the main road and on each side was food, clothes, jewellery and shoe stores all full of customers. Our guide led us into a mall street which used to be the old American Embassy. The Embassy itself was still standing and was a traditional building, not a new concrete box that is built in one day. While on this tour you could really see how China has progressed with the way that skyscrapers reach the clouds but still tower over the small alleyways and hutongs of daily life, almost as if they were not there anymore. It's quite sad to know that all that was before: buildings, houses, shops, markets will soon be knocked down to make way for more high rises. The tour of the magnificent city was almost depleted but so were our stomachs! SO our guide took us to a small noodle shop famous throughout this area of China as being the best noodles. They were not wrong! The smell of the broth was divine and the consistency of the noodles was to die for, I really think I could have gone for another two bowls. Our tour concluded with a short walk to the shopping malls and streets known as Chunxi Road and it was packed with people. It was sort of like Cairns Central but about 12 times bigger and without a roof. It was a great experience never the less.

We met back with our teacher and had a final photo in front of an old Chinese building. We said our goodbyes and thank yous for the informational tour of their massive city. The bus ride back was unadventurous with the exception of the two women who hopped on after us started yelling at each other. The rest of the passengers on the bus found this amusing, I guess you don't really see much public exhibition like this in China, people are good at keeping face. The arguing ladies hopped off the bus soon after. I think that day was one of my favourites because it was a lot of things to see, smell and hear, all in all a good day in Chengdu China, home to 14 million people!

As we got off the bus we were given orange ribbons around our necks and greeted with "yashidele`" (local way of saying Tibetan Tashidelek). Then the boys were told to line up on the left of the staircase while all the girls were told to line up on the right. We then went past the prayer wheels and a prayer ball which we were all told to spin and touch with our left hand alone and then we had separate photos taken with a monk before we came inside. Inside they had hotpots (spicy stew), low bench seats, a microphone, a radio, dried ingredients for the hotpots, rice wine and tea.

As soon as we started eating they started singing and after one finished they would get us to say "yaso yayaso, oh-yeah oh yeah oh-oh yeah!" After this they invited us up to sing so we sent Taneesha over to the microphone and she sang 'Hit the road Jack' and we all cheered. All of us boys rang out a drum beat on the low bench seats. Layla had a turn with the mic too and Alan, (our music teacher), was happy to see us sharing our performance with our host performers.

After the drumming we all got up and went back down the stairs (not including blondes because the priests and everyone in the China like blonde hair and they had chosen to have a side party with them... today I got out of it because I wore a beanie for the whole time) and we had a group photos at the bottom of the stairs. As well as many Han Zu people, the people that were sharing a bit of their culture with us while we were in the mountain areas near Jiuzhaigou, were the Qiang Zu and the Zang Zu people. There are 54 recognised minority groups in China and we are grateful for your amazing hospitality.

New Broad-based Group to Work for Better Planning. Join Us!

Kuranda to discuss an issue that can all too easily send people to sleep, despite its intrinsic importance: planning.

Last month's Kuranda Paper reported the concerns of some residents about the Mareeba Shire draft plan, in particular our view that there has been inadequate (no) consultation over major revisions to mapping of our region which appear in the latest draft of Council's plan.

We reject Council's insistence that the community has already been asked its opinion, and that this latest document must be regarded as more or less final.

At the public meeting, concerned residents had a chance to present our concerns to Councillors and senior Council staff. We were grateful for their attendance, but not greatly reassured by what they had to say.

We believe the new draft plan, if approved in its current form, would be a disappointing endpoint to a process that's now nearly a decade old - and that whereas the Kuranda region deserves the highest standard of planning, we're instead being offered an unsatisfactory plan which is the outcome of substandard process.

Towards the end of the public meeting residents held a discussion, with Council representatives absent, to decide on our next steps.

It was agreed to write to Deputy Premier Trad, whose responsibilities include both Local Government and Planning - and to ask that at this stage the State Government doesn't approve the Mareeba Shire draft plan.

We believe it's imperative that mapping of the region's environmental and heritage values is re-done to a high standard. This plan is expected to last for 10 years and should not be based on inadequate data.

On 10th November a public meeting was held in Likewise, we want a plan that can truly be considered state-of-the-art - and which is geared to conservation of the Kuranda region's quite exceptional biodiversity.

> So far there are encouraging indications that this appeal by a broadly-based group of residents will receive a sympathetic hearing by the State Government. Especially over the last decade, Kuranda has had a raw deal, forced to rejoin the resuscitated Mareeba Shire Council despite our clearly expressed desire for different arrangements.

> This community has a different demographic with different priorities from the Mareeba Shire as a whole. We live in an environment rich with endangered species which constitutes a boundary zone to the World Heritage Wet Tropics. There's a lot of evidence that conserving the region's unique environment matters to locals.

> Part of Mareeba Shire Council's pitch is that it simply has insufficient resources to ground-truth and accuracy-check the maps of the Kuranda region's biological diversity it is using. That may well be so.

> However, both State and Federal Governments DO have the necessary resources – and both share responsibility for protecting the Wet Tropics and its 'outer skin', which like the Great Barrier Reef is of global concern.

> Whether this last-ditch attempt to improve the planning of the Kuranda area succeeds may depend

> If enough residents demonstrate a strong desire for something better than the current draft plan, we're likely to achieve our goal.

and power-lines, dead palm fronds, garden furniture and children's play equipment, hanging baskets – all potentially serving as damaging missiles carried in gale force





PLANT OF THE MONTH: Geogenanthus poeppigii, commonly called the Seersucker plant belongs to the family Commelinaceae or spiderwort family. It is a native to Amazonian rainforests and its wandering unbranching growth seldom attains to 25cm. An amazingly long, jaw-breaking name for such a small plant, its broad dark green ovate leaves are puckered and quilted and marked with wavy longitudinal lines of silver or grey.


Requiring an open, humus-rich mix and good moisture during the warmer months, this plant makes a stunning ground cover in shady situations and an excellent potted subject. Easily propagated by division, the plant is sometimes available at nurseries or from house plant specialists.

Dear Kira: The gratuitous plant in your market purchase is *Pseuderanthemum* alatum, sometimes called the Chocolate Plant, coming from Mexico. I have mixed feelings about the plant, despite its pewter, silvered mid-vein leaf and changeable colouration throughout the season. My reservations are as to its abundant seed-set from its purple-flowered spike and the prolific, tough-as-old boots seedlings. Grows anywhere although fertilising during warmer months will produce a better specimen. May have possible weed potential.



Dear Stan: Your plant is Justicia brandegeana (syn. Beloperone guttata), commonly known as the Shrimp plant, less frequently seen today as once a standby filler noted for its toughness and near year long flowering. A low to 1m perennial shrub, lasting for several years, it has thin woody upright stems covered with velvety, evergreen foliage. Frequent pinching of growing tips encourage a more bushy plant. Some direct sun promotes better flower colour and firms up stems. Cultivars 'Yellow Queen' and 'Fruit Cocktail' with yellow/green bracts and pink flowers are available at most nurseries

Gas Pipelines Planned For Cape York and Across Northern Queensland

Two members of FoE Kuranda and CSG Free Kuranda along with 120 people from around the country attended a Lock the Gate conference in Lismore. Some of the new gas proposals for our region that were discussed was the gas pipeline from New Guinea through Cape York as well as the gas pipeline coming across from the Northern Territory and on down to export facilities at Gladstone. These pipelines would also enable gasfields to be developed all along their route. Currently over half of Queensland and Australia is covered by coal and gas licenses and could be turned into gasfields.

Naomi Hogan from Lock the Gate said these pipelines were "nothing but a gas giveaway to wealthy overseas companies that want to frack our land and send our gas offshore. Fracked gas is expensive, risky and facing increasing scrutiny and bans across Australia and the world".

Environment Centre NT director Anna Bousted said in a statement, "The pipeline would lock in climate pollution for decades to come". She called for a stronger renewable energy sector, which she said would "create far more jobs than the oil and gas sector, and ensure that benefits flow back to local communities, rather than line the pockets of overseas investors".

Japan Doesn't Know How to Decommission Their 'Melted-Through' Reactors

The findings of a report, which has been given to the International Atomic Energy Agency, were revealed by the Yomiuri newspaper, described a "melt-through" as being "far worse than a core meltdown" and "the worst possibility in a nuclear accident".

Water that was pumped into the pressure vessels at Fukushima to cool the fuel

rods has been confirmed to have leaked out of the containment vessels and outside the buildings that house the reactors. The plant operator Tepco said it is trying to contain this highly radioactive contaminated water and prevent it from leaking into the sea, but elevated levels of radiation have been confirmed in the ocean off the plant. The radiation has contaminated the soil and plant and animal life around the facility with the estimated cost of dealing with the accident over the next 10 years alone is around \$250 billion. Despite this disaster Labor and the Liberals haven't changed their policy of selling uranium to nuclear reactors that are built near earthquake fault lines.

Value of America's Weapons Manufacturers Soar as France, US and Australia Call for War

World leaders are calling for escalated military attacks in Syria and Iraq in response to the Paris attacks as they prepare to repeat the same failed strategy they have been pursuing for more than 2 decades in Iraq and Afghanistan. Their bombing strategy has certainly not created political stability in the region as bombing a country actually facilitates terrorist groups forming as well as increasing the refugee crisis around the world.

These war cries reveal the political domination of the arms industry and expose a major flaw of the current economic system where weapons manufacturers need increasing conflicts in order to satisfy their need for increased profits and governments now have a vested interest in calling for war to try and raise the value of their stock markets. Northrop Grumman's stock recently hit a record high after they were awarded a US government contract worth \$23 billion to build new stealth bombers that cost \$550 million apiece.

Hancock Pine Plantation Uses Simazine in Kuranda's Town Water Supply Catchment

A few people recently had a meeting with the manager of Kuranda Pine Plantation who informed us that Simazine is spot sprayed in the plantation. Simazine is a chemical of concern as it is listed as a ground water contaminant, a developmental or reproductive toxin and levels as low as 0.01 parts per billion can damage water-based ecosystems. This is about one drop in 5,000 barrels of water! Because of the way it impacts on hormone function it is also known as the "chemical castrator". Hancock Plantation says that they do periodically test their runoff for pesticides and that they may make their test results available to FoE.

rom the tender age of seven New Zealander, **Kryston Jones** played recorder, at eight he was learning guitar, and by fourteen had formed the first of many bands. By his late teens he had added piano, keyboards, bass and drums to his instrumental arsenal.

With the melodic warm sound of the saxophone, **Kryston** puts his trusty instrument





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The Eight Learning Styles

Each lesson plan in our yoga class is taught with eight learning styles in mind. Every child learns at their optimum in different ways. Hypertension

As we all know the heart pumps blood around the body through our blood vessels. With each pump of the heart pressure is exerted on the artery walls to allow them to dilate and transport blood (which contains different nutrients and oxygen around the body). In some individuals the pressure required to push the blood around is higher than others hence causing a condition known as high blood pressure or

This month's topic is on **hypertension**. This is the last topic for our health information series which is also wrapping up the heart health topic.

Hypertension is a common disorder of the circulatory system, affecting approximately one in seven adult Australians and becomes more common with age. As we age changes in our body cause the stretchy parts to become less elastic i.e. arteries and

Hypertension usually does not show any symptoms, which means most people don't even know they have it. Experts recommend that everyone should have their blood pressure checked on a yearly basis.

There are two main types of hypertension:

- 1. Primary or essential hypertension: which is caused by both unmodifiable risk factors (i.e. aging and family history) and modifiable risk factors (i.e. increased salt intake, lack of exercise, excessive alcohol intake, obesity and smoking)
- 2. Secondary hypertension: results from an identifiable cause i.e. kidney disease which is the most common cause but can be also caused by endocrine conditions such as hyperthyroidism, hypothyroidism. Secondary hypertension can also be caused by obesity, sleep apnoea, pregnancy, certain prescription medications, herbal remedies and illegal drugs.

Hypertension treatment starts with you! Reducing your modifiable risk factors, increasing levels of physical activity to the recommended 30/5 rule, (30 minutes of moderate level activity on at least 5 days per week), quit smoking, reducing salt intake and limiting alcohol intake, reducing stressors in life. Lifestyle measures are usually trialled for a minimum of three months (depending on the severity of hypertension) and if there is still no improvement then your GP may prescribe oral antihypertensive therapy.

The most commonly prescribed antihypertensives are angiotension converting enzyme inhibitors, angiotension 2 receptor antagonists, beta blockers, calcium channel blockers and diuretics.

Prevention Is Better Than Cure

As mentioned above, lifestyle measures are always the best way to reduce one's blood pressure. If your high blood pressure is due to stress

there are many different relaxation techniques that can be used to reduce this.

Saliva miltiorrhiza, commonly known as Danshen, Chinese sage, and red sage has been used in traditional Chinese herbal medicine for a variety of different diseases such as angina, hyperlipidaemia and hypertension.

The main active chemical in Danshen where the focus is on cardiovascular effects is tanshinone IIA. Danshen is also undergoing clinical testing in America for an alternative medication to typical western antihypertensives but further testing is required before it can be proven effective/ comparable to typical products and before a safe product can be produced.

Hawthorn is a flavonoid-rich herbal supplement which is also commonly used in traditional medicine. Hawthorn has been shown to be of significant benefit in symptom control and physiologic outcomes for people with cardiovascular disease and has undergone multiple studies showing its effectiveness. Hawthorn is thought to work by improving the ability of your heart to pump blood through your body.

We have touched on the following supplements in previous issues which have been shown effective in having cardioprotective effects and helping to maintain a healthy circulatory system; fish oils, magnesium, CoQ10 and certain types of plant

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Freatures of Furanda

The Wompoo Fruit-dove is best described as a big colourful pigeon. With its green, purple and yellow colouring you might think it would stand out like a sore thumb in the rainforest. Nine out of 10 Kuranda-ites have probably heard and recognise its distinctive call, but may never have actually seen one except for perhaps a fleeting glimpse.

There are other colourful doves and pigeons lurking in our rainforests (e.g. Emerald Dove, Purple-crowned Fruit-dove) and sometimes these are confused with the Wompoo, but the Wompoo is much bigger.


Similar to many rainforest birds, the Wompoo does not migrate or like to travel any distance from its chosen home. It adapts its food intake to whatever is in season in its area – any variety of figs and fruits are fair game to the Wompoo, and much is swallowed whole, making the bird one of the important seed dispersers of the rainforest.

The Wompoo is relatively common within its widespread range in North Queensland and is listed as "Least Concern" on the Australian Threatened Species list, however it is listed as "Vulnerable" in its Northern New South Wales range due to habitat destruction.

Its excellent forest camouflage combines with its rather secretive preference of keeping firmly out of sight and only allowing its rather human voice-sounding "hhwaampoo" — something like a phlegmy throat clearing — to give away its presence 'somewhere' in your back yard. It very rarely goes to ground so is relatively safe from most predators except the airborne raptors and the odd oportunistic python.


Reputedly first named by early explorer Edmund Kennedy as "Whompoa Pigeon" in 1870, he apparently cited this as the name given by the local indigenous, and this was most likely based on its call.














That's No owl!

Ever heard of a bird that has a mouth like a frog and has camouflage which enables it to look like a tree stump? Such is the Tawny Frogmouth. Its wide beak gapes open like a frog's mouth, and its tawny grey-brown plumage helps it to blend in perfectly within its environment.

The Tawny Frogmouth (*Podargus strigoides*) is found Australia wide, including our very own backyards! They are nocturnal birds with large rounded eyes, and are often confused with owls. Owls, however, have large strong feet with curved talons which they use to catch their prey with. Frogmouths on the other hand have weak feet and use their strong beaks to capture their prey. They feed on nocturnal insects such as moths, slugs, snails and worms, but will also eat small mammals, reptiles, frogs and even other birds. Some of their prey is actually caught while in flight.

Tawny Frogmouths are a true master of disguise. If you happen to spot one during the day and start to approach, it will change its posture (if it hasn't already done so) with its head tilted upwards to try to mimic a broken branch or a tree stump, and its big yellow eyes closed to slits. The colour of its feathers helps this amazing bird with its mimicry as there is no one solid colour, but a mottled blend of grey and brown. If you get too close, the Tawny Frogmouth may adopt a threatening pose, fluffing up its feathers, showing its bright yellow eyes and opening its beak wide to reveal its yellow throat. It may even screech at you if it is protecting eggs or chicks.

These birds have very interesting breeding behaviours. A male and female Tawny Frogmouth will usually pair for life. After mating between August and December, a flimsy nest is built which consists of a platform of sticks placed in trees five to 15 metres above the ground. The females will lay 2-3 eggs in the nest, and the male will sit on the nest by day, showing unusual parental care for a male bird. At night the pair will share the time on the nest as they both need to feed. While defending a nest, Frogmouths are known to mob predators and spray pungent faeces at them to deter animals like large reptiles coming to devour the eggs or chicks. Such is the devotion of Tawny Frogmouth parents, that once the young have left the nest, the family will still roost closely together.

Tawny Frogmouths rely on humans to keep their habitat intact. They need us to keep mature trees in our backyards and parklands, and to plant new gum trees for future generations. They also need us to keep our cats and dogs in at night to prevent attacks. We also need to be alert when driving at night, as Frogmouths may swoop down to catch moths illuminated by car headlights. Let's do our bit to keep these wonderful birds circling our night skies.



PROFILE OF THE MONTH (athy Retter

Many Kuranda-ites will already know Cathy, even though she has only lived in Kuranda with husband Garth Owen for some 12 years. And even then she was regularly travelling back and forth to New Zealand. But in that comparatively short period of time she has become heavily involved in the local Kuranda community, well justifying this profile. These profiles place considerable emphasis on such involvement.

Cathy was born in New Zealand to a fifth generation New Zealand father and a post-war Scottish immigrant. She had a rural upbringing in a family with three siblings, where they were largely self-sufficient. She shared a love of horse riding with her father. After school, she began a BSc degree in maths at a NZ university, finishing her degree in Melbourne University when she moved to Oz. Her main field of study was computing. Her career has spanned the range from programming to business analysis and project management. Amongst these various computing jobs, she lived from 1980 at Comalco Weipa for eight years. On the way up there she encountered Kuranda for the first time and was greatly attracted to the Village, where she met an old primary school friend.

After Weipa she went to the UK for two and a half years, contracting in computer work, moving back to NZ when her father passed away. She helped her mother move to a smaller property and took work with Air New Zealand, where she met her current husband Garth, a pilot. She was impressed with his skills, wide knowledge and easy humour. Cathy and Garth married in NZ in 1996 and although she has never had children, Garth had four daughters from previous marriages, and they became her step children. She now has six step grandchildren and five, soon to be six, step great grandchildren.

The two of them came to Cairns on a holiday and then came regularly to the east coast for holidays after that. But it was not until 2003, when Garth retired, that they decided to move to Oz. They looked around the Tablelands and bought their present property in Kuranda to live. But Cathy continued to fly to NZ, working on contracts. They also had a vending machine business there and also owned a backpackers in the Bay of Islands. More recently Cathy worked for the Cairns City Council for four years, but is now retired.

Cathy's keen interest in the environment stems from her rural upbringing. She remembers a remnant stand of native NZ bush in which she spent quiet time. Her first engagement as an environmental activist was trying to stop the raising of a lake in the South Island for electricity. She also supported other campaigns such as Greenpeace. She says she has always believed in getting the best environmental outcome possible, looking to creating a balance, protecting the environment with



the most sensitive development.

Her community activities have mushroomed since coming to Kuranda. She has been a very active member of Envirocare, of which she is President. She is actively interested in the identification, cultivation and planting of native species and the preservation of habitat for flora and fauna, so important in a place like Kuranda. Her input into Envirocare has led to other activities. For example she was active in the campaign to keep Myola as rural land and is currently discussing the proposed Kuranda (Mareeba Shire) Planning Scheme. She was also active in liaising with the Barron River Integrated Management Association and has participated in many tree plantings in the Barron River Basin.

She is a member of the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee as a Community representative. She was previously Secretary of the Kuranda School P&C. She was also on the committee of the Kuranda Film Club and has volunteered at the Kuranda Information Centre.

On the professional side, she continues to be a member of the Project Management Institute and is a project management professional.

She is the organiser with, and founding member of, the Kuranda Cohousing Association, with plans to

develop cohousing in Kuranda. It is planned to construct a display house soon. She is seeking interest in the project.

Her approach to life has been affected by a number of sources. Brought up a Presbyterian, she has looked into Zen and other eastern philosophies as well as some of the great religions. But she does not adhere to any one religion or philosophy and dislikes the formal administrative side of religion. A favourite quote is Desiderata. Alan Watts is a favoured author. She has a keen sense of justice, especially relating to issues involving children, refugees and the environment. She sees life as a learning journey and seeks to be true to herself. She believes in the power of the team more than that of the individual. Service, tolerance and honesty are key principles.

"And whether or not it is clear to you, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should. Therefore be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be.

And whatever your labors and aspirations, in the noisy confusion of life, keep peace in your soul. With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world. Be cheerful. Strive to be happy."

Make Your Home Work Harder For You

Turning your residence into an investment property

Many Australians own their primary place of residence, but an increasing number are making the swap from living in their property to using it as an investment for their future.

There are a number of key factors that should be addressed to gain the maximum benefit from renting out your home:

Your tax situation will be transformed

When an owner decides to turn their primary place of residence into an income producing property, their tax situation will change:

- Expenses in holding the property will become tax deductible
- If an owner has only rented their property for part of the year, deductions for this portion the year can still be claimed
- If any improvements are made while the property is being rented, these may also entitle the owner to depreciation deductions.

Common misconceptions

- While it is true that newer properties may receive higher deductions, all investment properties will earn depreciation deductions for the property owner
- When a property is not brand new, owners will still be able to claim depreciation on the structural component for the remaining time within the forty year effective life period
- Investors who own properties that are built before 15th of September 1987 can still claim depreciation on the fixtures and fittings within the property and include any recent renovations, even if the renovation was carried out by a previous owner.

Capital gains implications

- When a home becomes an investment property a Capital Gains Tax (CGT) event may be triggered if the property is sold
- There are various situations were properties will attract a CGT exemption. It is best to discuss your CGT situation with a professional accountant as each individual scenario is different.

Consult with an expert

- There is a common misconception that wealthy people get more tax deductions. They have the same rules to comply with as you or I but they just make sure that they get the best advice on what they can claim.
- Make sure that you get a professional depreciation schedule for the property when you decide to start renting it out.
- You will need to tell the tax office what you are earning so you would probably benefit from the assistance of a professional accountant. The ATO make it quite possible for you to do all the reporting yourself but it's hard work to make sure that all you claim can be claimed and that you are claiming all you should. If you get it wrong, the penalties can be very expensive and, just as bad, the process can be very distressing.



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
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

Kuranda Popular Attraction early 1900s

In the early 1900s Kuranda was a popular holiday destination with Queenslanders. Tourists would quite often stay for two weeks at a time. One of the popular tours included a visit to Fairyland Tea Gardens which was situated opposite side to Kuranda. The Dick family which operated the gardens would commence the tour in the village and have their guests walk a mile and half along the railway track until they were opposite the gardens. A loud coo-ee brought out Miss Lorna Dick who would then row a boat to the other side of the river to pick up the guests. Fairyland was a maze of leafy trees, palms, ferns and luxuriant



grasses that led to a gigantic Kauri pine which had a girth of 21 feet and the first limb was 80 feet from the ground. The was under tree the protection of the Government. After which the group would sit for afternoon tea where the fairies had just been before being rudely interrupted by the group of tourists.

Grandstand Carriages

The Grandstand carriages were the only type of its kind constructed in Australia, and demonstrated Queensland Rails commitment to capitalising on significance of tourism in the Cairns area. The interior had scenic glass windows along one side of the carriage, lavatory at one end, and



two rows of longitudinal seating that was tiered. This design allowed passengers an undisturbed view of the spectacular climb up the Barron Gorge. A small cabinet was fitted for the use of an announcer, and all carriages were fitted with loudspeakers so that the announcer could provide a commentary on the climb up the Barron Gorge to Kuranda, and all other points of interest along the way. The entire train became well known as the Grandstand Train. The innovative service was unfortunately cancelled with the outbreak of the Second World War, when Cairns became part of the war zone in the South Pacific. The carriages were converted into Hospital carriages for service during the Second World War. At the end of the war, the carriages were converted back into passenger vehicles, but not as the popular Grandstand Train.

Cairns - Mulgrave Tramway and The North Coast Line 1924

In 1911 Queensland Railway's Cairns division, anticipating the pending completion of the Brisbane to Cairns railway line purchased the Shires Tramway's. These southern tramways serviced the Hambledon Mill from Aloomba estate and other cane plantation areas in the region. Queensland Railway then extended the line from south Babinda to Daradgee in 1919.

Construction was then halted waiting for the southern line to be built for twelve years. Finally in 1924 a bedecked B13 class 4-6-0 travelled the 1,043 mile long line from Brisbane to Cairns. The Cairns Railway's isolation ceased to exist after thirty-seven years of being one of the Oueensland Railway's northern outposts.


Railmotors 1927

Railmotors have played an important part in the operation of the Cairns railway since 1927. Would you believe Queensland Rail had semi-suburban services

running from Gordonvale to Aloomba and Cairns to Redlynch daily, these services became so popular that they increased the schedules to thirty-three times a week!

The Cairns to Kuranda railway line was also an integral part of passenger movement for residents in the 1930s with regular services travelling on a railmotor from Cairns to Mareeba then Atherton. In the 1950s a monthly shopper's service provided by railmotors to Cairns from the Chillagoe and Forsayth lines.

Responsible Pet Ownership

Owning pets can be lots of fun and pets can provide us with company, stress relief and unconditional love. Pet ownership also teaches children responsibility and helps them develop their social and nurturing skills. While pets can bring us enormous joy they come with a big responsibility. Too often the RSPCA and other rescue organisations are left with the aftermath of impulse buying. Last year 130,000 animals were surrendered to the RSPCA alone, while 250,000 cats and dogs were euthanised in Australia because there were not enough homes for them. Many two and four legged Christmas presents have ended up on the scrap heap.

While owning a pet is a privilege, responsible pet ownership also requires commitment to the relationship for the life of your animal, as well as an investment of your time and money. In addition to providing adequate nutrition, care, exercise, mental stimulation and socialisation, it's important not to contribute to our nation's pet overpopulation. If you are not a registered breeder please spay or neuter your cat and or dog. Desexing isn't just about preventing unwanted pregnancies, it can actually make your pet happier and healthier. Dogs in particular are less inclined to roam and are generally less aggressive towards other canines if they've been desexed.

If you're certain you want to add a fur baby to your family, why not check out the many rescue organisations and give an unwanted animal a second chance. Nevertheless if you've got your heart set on acquiring a designer puppy, please make sure you're not contributing to the problem of puppy farms. Puppy factories are intensive breeding facilities that house their animals in appalling conditions. A good breeder will offer to take back unwanted animals within a specified time period and also offer to accept animals returned as a result of problems arising from inherited disorders.

Make certain your pet is properly identified with tags, microchips or tattoos. It's also a good idea to make alternative arrangements if you can no longer provide care for your pet. We actually have one elderly costumer who has bequeathed her dog to us in the event of her death. Many a time I've witnessed a precious, often old pet surrendered to the RSPCA by surviving family members. I can assure you most of those pets were not re-homed to live happily ever after. It's tragic to witness.

Another important aspect of responsible pet ownership is adequate restraint. Poor management of domestic animals can impact severely on animal welfare and the environment. An untold number of wildlife is killed and harassed each year by unrestrained pets. The health of our environment relies on the harmonious interrelationship of all species within a given habitat.

Please remember that pets are a life-long commitment but, given the chance, they will love you for life.

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CYCLONE SEASON TIPS

You may have read that the Bureau of Meteorology is predicting a less active cyclone season this year due to the presence of a strong El Nino. While this means that we may have fewer cyclones than the average year, it is certainly no cause for complacency. We could still be faced with a severe tropical cyclone hitting our region. Here is some advice for Kuranda householders based on guidelines issued by Emergency Management Queensland:

• First the good news. Planning an evacuation because of a possible storm surge should not be an issue if you are a Kuranda resident! However, evacuation ahead of an advancing severe tropical cyclone can be fraught with problems and certainly should not be a last minute exercise. There are no official government cyclone shelters in Kuranda. If you know that your residence is old or has structural weaknesses you may a family member or friend who gov.au/getready/plan.asp has a stronger home ahead of Or type EMQ cyclone advice into the cyclone's arrival. - and branches close to the house removed - preferably by a professional tree lopper as this can be a dangerous exercise in itself. The bulk of the jobs to which Kuranda SES members are called every storm season are the result of damage from trees – a price we pay for living in a beautiful, leafy green environment. If a cyclone is approaching remove dangerous debris from your property and store or secure loose items such as garden furniture and children's toys.
- Make sure you have adequate fresh non-perishable water, food, cash, batteries, essential medications and generator fuel. After the cyclone, being without power for up to a week or more is not unusual. Have important family documents and mementoes in a secure container as part of an evacuation kit.
- If you do suffer damage to your property during a natural disaster call the SES on 132 500 and SES crews will secure your home against further damage where it is safely possible.

I Heard the News Today Oh Boy!

What's with the news anyway?

Doom and gloom, corruption, disasters, misery, thieves, cutthroats and dastardly deeds— is the world really like that? Do people really want to read about it; listen to

According to evolutionary theory and the media, Yes!

Evolutionary biology theory argues that we are predisposed towards focusing on negative or survival-relevant information because the potential costs of ignoring negative information are dire. Think cavemen scanning for threats.

Certainly negative news tends to increase both arousal and attentiveness and newspapers exploit this by feeding us a daily smorgasbord of negativity. Magazine sales increase when the cover is negative rather than positive while good news covers actually result in decreases in readership. Scaremongering and sensationalism by the media to compete for ratings sees negative stories outnumber positive stories by

Interestingly though social media users tend to forward positive rather than

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negative information which may point to the fact that when we are the editors we prefer the positive story. But here's the catch!

So are there consequences to daily doses of doom and gloom?

Rolf Dobelli writing for *The Guardian* believes that 'news is to the mind what sugar is to the body.' He states, 'It grinds us down until we adopt a worldview that is pessimistic, desensitised, sarcastic and fatalistic.'

Most negative news we come across is remote, generalized and you can't really act on it, so it generates feelings of hopelessness. George Gerbner, a pioneer researcher on the effects of television on society, coined the term 'mean world syndrome' which describes a phenomenon whereby violence-related content of mass media makes viewers believe that the world is more dangerous than it actually is.

This fear makes us less adventurous, more likely to see our own situations as negative and causes stress. As we know stress hormones cause illness and prolonged exposure to negativity causes anxiety, depression and inhibited thinking. Then our brains get stuck in grooves, and it's difficult to reprogram them to healthier pathways.

And guess what? The world is actually not such a bad place and is not getting more violent; it's just that the media is highlighting the violence. Actually people have never lived longer, healthier, safer, richer, better lives in human history than they do today.

So can we retrain the gloomy brain?

Yep! The science is called neuroplasticity. It means that our thoughts can change the structure and function of our brains and, more importantly, positive thoughts and activities can rewire and strengthen the brain. So lets steer those 70,000, mostly unaware, thoughts per day into more positive waters. Pinch a secret from genuinely happy people and concentrate on things that truly matter, avoiding any unnecessary stress, i.e. switch off the news.

Mindfulness training, looking for positive news each day and showing kindness to others are all ways to retrain our brain to be more positive.

Making your own good news story!

So this Christmas let's turn off the catastrophe and calamity and consciously chose better stories. Let's have a mentality based on positive notions instead of fearful melodrama. Let's make a New Year resolution to frequently surround ourselves with positive, uplifting, enriching and heartening news.

And joyfully this will translate into, as Rob Brezany puts it, 'manifesting the ultimate goal: to create a heaven on earth in which everyone alive is a healthy, free, self-actualized, spiritually enlightened millionaire dedicated to living sustainably.'

Sounds good to me.



Wishing everyone a very Happy Christmas: I wish everyone a very enjoyable Christmas season and sincerely thank you for your support during 2015. We are blessed to live where we live and hopefully everyone will have the chance to take some time out over Christmas to enjoy time with family and friends and reflect on the true spirit of Christmas.

"Community Precinct begins": With the recent opening of the new MSC Library/Service Centre, community life at the KCP Kuranda Community Precinct has now finally begun. The new library is much larger and forms the central hub of the Community Precinct which will develop over the coming years. The community is already using the facility at a high level and I do hope that this will continue for years to come. We do ask that you talk of the "Community Precinct" rather than the "old school". While the site has a rich education history, it is now 10 years since it was a school and the space is now truly a "community" place.

Speewah Bridge upgrade: Good progress has been made on the new bridge at Speewah. The next meeting of the Speewah Residents Association is at 6.00pm on Monday 7 December at Ros Common. All welcome.

New MSC Planning Scheme: Thanks to all who attended the meetings and/or contacted Council Planning staff with questions and comments. The new overlay mapping is State produced mapping (this mapping has been changed by the Qld Dept). It is also important to note that the Planning Scheme should be considered in total (not just the overlay maps) as the Planning Scheme Codes are the key criteria in assessing any development. The new Scheme has much tighter controls over land-use activities, thus building in levels of environmental and lifestyle protection that promote sustainability.

Recycling Drop off point in Kuranda: Council is working towards placing a drop off point for recycling materials in Kuranda. There is already a drop off point at the Transfer Station and the additional point will make it easier for some residents. The recycled materials do not need to be separated before you deposit them, as all are transported to the plant in Cairns and sorted there.

Christmas Shutdown and after hours contact for emergency repairs: The Council Offices will close early on Friday afternoon December 18 and will also be closed for the period between Christmas and New Year. In any cases of emergency repairs (eg Water, sewerage), please phone Council at 1300 308 461

Mayors Christmas Appeal: Donations can be made at Council's service centres or by contacting Council. Funds are used to provide hampers/vouchers for needy families within our community. The Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre is assisting Council in the delivery.

Disaster Management: It's that time again! Please prepare your kits and home/family disaster plan. Remember the key contacts (Triple Zero 000 SES 125000). The Local Disaster Management Group co-ordinates any responses. Please note that there are NO centres that are open as shelters while a disaster event is happening. Residents should have a plan to relocate to family or friends. Evacuation Centres may open after the natural disaster event has passed. You can also register for the EWN (Early Warning Network) to receive free alerts about severe weather and other emergency events relevant to our area.

Australia Day Awards: Nominations for the Australia Day Awards close at 4.30pm on Friday 15 January 2016 (forms available from the Council offices or on the website), but good idea to do the Nomination before Christmas. This is your chance to recognize the efforts and achievements of community members. Nominations can be made in the following categories: Citizen Of The Year Award, Young Citizen, Senior Sports, Junior Sports, Arts & Cultural, Community Service, Environmental Excellence.

Have your vehicle safety checked before Christmas – FREE: There will be a pre-vacation Safety Vehicle Inspection day on Saturday 5 December from 9.00am to 1.00pm (approx.) in the Heritage Centre carpark, Mareeba. Dept of Transport staff, as well as QPS officers, RACQ, Motor Industry representatives and Mareeba Rotary Club members will be in attendance.

Kuranda Visitors Centre another Award! After having won the category for Visitor Services & Information at the Tropical North Queensland Tourism Awards for three consecutive years, the Kuranda Visitors Centre has now been inducted into the TTNQ Hall of Fame. Well done Kuranda VIC!

Again I have had a couple of very busy weeks in parliament and also the Finance and Administration Committee which has been examining the introduction of four year parliamentary terms which would bring Queensland in line with other states.

A highlight this month was a domestic violence forum I convened at James Cook University which was attended by the Honourable Shannon Fentiman MP, Minister for Communities, Women, Youth, Child Safety and Multicultural Affairs.

At the forum we had representatives from many local organisations that offer ongoing support to victims. The forum gave the organisations the chance to network and the Minister was able to hear firsthand the experiences and problems these people face on a daily basis. I was also able to recount domestic violence from my perspective as a paramedic as I would have attended domestic violence call-outs on nearly every shift I worked.

On the subject of paramedics I was happy to announce the establishment of a Low Acuity Response Unit (LARU) for the Queensland Ambulance Service in Cairns. The LARU will respond to non-emergency calls and can treat patients at home or transport them to their GP or a bulk billing medical centre for treatment, thereby reducing the number of patients at the hospital emergency department.

Another highlight was the North Queensland Economic Summit which introduced local businesses to foreign investors with the potential to benefit a number of Barron River projects requiring a capital investment.

Congratulations to Tjapukai which was voted Queensland's number one indigenous tourist experience and congratulations to all the school leavers I have met at various awards nights and graduations who are all embarking on a new phase in their lives.






