

Climate Action?

An article from the Friends of the Earth FNQ, ("Time for Real Climate Action", The Kuranda Paper, November, 2018), urges "fundamental change to energy, agriculture, transport systems and pretty much everything that humans do" and quotes information from the IPCC.

What exactly does that mean for the "Village in the Rainforest"?

First energy. Wind and solar flicker on and off depending on the weather and time of day. No viable grid-scale batteries have yet been invented. The Musk battery in South Australia cost \$140 million and can power just 30,000 homes for just one hour. That's \$4,666 per household for an hour's power each calm evening.

We simply aren't rich enough to buy enough batteries, and all the wind turbines and solar panels to charge them, to have grid electricity in a zero carbon world. So Kuranda would have no more fans, no more air-conditioners, no more washing machines or dryers or dishwashers. No more town water, either. Manual housework and carrying water would fill every spare moment.

We could keep electricity if we were allowed zero emissions hydroelectricity stations here in the Wet Tropics, but we're not allowed to build the dams. Nuclear could keep the lights on without emissions, too, but that's not allowed either.

Second, agriculture. This means de-stocking the herds, so no more steak sizzling on the barbie. Just tofu burgers forever. It also means no more fertiliser manufactured from hydrocarbon feedstock, so crop production would decrease and food prices would rise. So, expensive, scarce tofu burgers forevermore.

Third, transport systems. The piston engine will be gone, so no cars, trucks, motorbikes, lawnmowers or chainsaws. Electric cars aren't going to be viable without a functioning electricity grid, so that means walking or cycling everywhere (but there'll be few new bicycles), including up and down the range. Horses are out for the same reason (methane) that the herds were culled and we all had to go vegan.

Finally, "pretty much everything that humans do". This is code for the introduction of a global government under the auspices of the IPCC's parent body, the UN, which is openly socialist. That means leisure time and personal property would be gone and full obedience to the global state will be required.

To summarise, the Friends of the Earth want you to voluntarily give up everything you like and enjoy in your life and to live a similar hard-scrabble life to those in early twentieth-century Russia. They want you to do this because the elites at the UN who will gain global power, seventy-odd years after World War Two, told them to.

Meanwhile the UN are cool with China and India continuing to increase their emissions, by a margin bigger than our total emissions, every year for the next twelve years before they're reviewed again.

It is time to set aside the tired habit of signalling our green virtue and instead embrace the reality around us - which is that none of the scary predictions about climate have ever come true. We are being conned into becoming the victims of the totalitarians of the future. If that's not the time to start questioning, to start finding out why the climate goalposts keep moving, then we will lose all the modern conveniences we now take for granted.

Those who want an "emissions-free world" should be very careful what they wish for.

On 28th October we had to say goodbye to the wonderful Betty Timmins.



And having been a breast cancer survivor she had a passion for fundraising activities for breast cancer research.

Betty was one of a few people, along with the late Gary Bresnan, who went door knocking on every place they knew in Kuranda to start the Kuranda Horse and Pony Club up in the early 80s, which makes it a fitting place to gather and remember her on the 1st December. May we remember Betty as an inspiration of community spirit.and honour her memory with countless volunteer hours on many endeavours!

Stop KUR-World Rally a Huge Success

Kur-Alert's Community Stop KUR-World Rally was held on Saturday 24th November in Centenary Park, Kuranda



President of KUR-Alert, Steven Nowakowski had a great announcement for the Rally. The Co-ordinator General in Brisbane announced an extension to the public submission period. Submissions were scheduled to close on 30th November, but have now been left open until Monday, 14th January, 2019.

The Rally was opened by Kuranda Traditional Owner, Willie Brim, with a passionate 'welcome to country' and a firm disregard for KUR-World's proposed development.

Our speakers for the day were locals, Jax Bergersen and Bill Sokolich, who outlined so many important issues for the entire Kuranda regional community about this proposed mega development in our midst.

Jax Bergersen from Kuranda Conservation, spoke about the problems that are expected on the Kuranda Range Road should this mega development be approved. The Range Road will exceed its safety design capacity in 2019, but there are no plans from our politicians to make any improvements. Jax stated that if improvements were started tomorrow, then it would take 10-15 years of battling through roadworks every day before the benefit of any roadworks could be felt. But KUR-World expect to have thousands more people on the road within five years.

Speewah resident Bill Sokolich explained to the Rally crowd that the proposed KUR-World development was actually interrupting Kuranda's normal cycle of growth through local and State planning schemes for our Shire. KUR-World will be asking for a "Variation Approval" to the town plan. They will effectively be granted a special town plan inside the wider Mareeba Shire Planning Scheme. Bill explained that there is a danger here in that this new town may become like many 'company towns' that are seen in mining areas etc, where the creeks and the environmental open spaces 'belong' to the company and no public land is set aside within the development for parks or community facilities as would normally occur in a standard subdivision. Currently, any

Kuranda locals who try to drive or walk up the road to the KUR-World property are strongly discouraged. There is also a danger that KUR-World's proposed KUR-Village will become a 'gated community'. This is definitely not 'the sense of place' that the Kuranda community now enjoys.

The speakers talked about the transformation of our 'Village in the Rainforest' to KUR-World's vision of another town at Myola called KUR-Village!!

Currently, our Mareeba Shire Council Planning Scheme describes in print that the community's vision of Kuranda is a Village in the Rainforest which must be surrounded by rural and rural/residential properties.

Our Village in the Rainforest needs to remain in a forested setting to retain its rainforest authenticity. Our Village just cannot be located in suburban surrounds!!

The Rally also had a large 'have your say' opportunity set up in Centenary Park to supply information about KUR-World's plans, with photos and the final KUR-World Concept Plan available. There were lots of 'have your say' forms to complete that KUR-Alert will forward to the Co-ordinator General.

There was much discussion about the issues of representation for our community. That we are a community that has had 'no voice' in local decision making for 40+ years.

The voices in power may wish to pay some attention to the entire Kuranda community as the Rally in the Park on Saturday, 24th November, demonstrated.

Those in opposition have sometimes conveniently referred to our community in terms such as 'hippies,' 'greenies' and 'dole-bludgers' in order to put us down. Those opposition voices need to take another look and see the middle of the road, hardworking, family groups, the creative, intelligent well educated people and pay some respect. Kuranda is a community of diversity with people who care. Everyone one of us deserve to be listened to.

"The view from here"

A monthly column by Michelle Murray-Beckman offering a glimpse into Kuranda's bespoke rainforest architecture along with with interviews residents who share with us why they have chosen to call Kuranda home.

Michael Quinn

It was a chance encounter with two young men on the banks of the Barron River that led Michael Quinn on a quest to learn about the mythology and the language of the Djabugay people of Kuranda.

The journey itself, however, actually begins in India. Michael was one of many young Englishmen who travelled overland to exotic East Asia. In his words he "ran away from Christianity" after having survived a Christian Brothers education. He tells me of a seminal experience in India where, after befriending some local people in Ahmedabad, he had all his money stolen. Immediately after, he visited a Hindu temple. He describes it as "entering into the realm of archetypes." The temple had spaces which were richly decorated with murals depicting ambrosial scenes of paradise, terrifying scenes of demons tormenting sinners and then finally a heavenly room devoted to Krishna playing his flute reflected to infinity by mirrors. Michael describes the feeling of entering this room as "a feeling of peace like I had just reached the still centre of the turning cosmos". "Like I had inherited the world."

He goes on further to explain that this experience made him feel that it was "an illumination whereby you are looking at your situation and the world talks to you". In Jungian terms – certain experiences open up a life of synchronicity. I take this as trusting in the universe for it has a plan and will provide.

Michael describes arriving in Kuranda after this experience in 1986 as timely. He came with his young family to settle and build a home and a life in the rainforest. He had a love of mythology and had been telling world stories for many years before arriving in Kuranda and he now wanted to understand the mythology of the place in which he had decided to call home. As a story teller, he wanted to learn the traditional stories of the people of this place.

The boys he met on the riverbank introduced him to Lalfie Thompson, the last initiated man of the Djabugay tribe. In Michael's words, "I hadn't talked to

any aboriginal people. I knelt down at this man's feet and begged him to tell me about his people". According to Michael, Lalfie laughed and said "No way migaloo, not unless you learn our lingo". And so he did.

By learning the Djabugay language with the help of linguists Ken Hale, Bob Dixon, Helena Cassells, Elizabeth Patz and Elders including Wanyarra Roy Banning, Nyuwarri Queen of the Djabuganydji, Wurrmbul Gilpin Banning, Warren Brim, Rhonda Brim, Rhonda Duffin and Gerald Hobbler, Michael also discovered a holistic

approach to storytelling. This is because the language and the stories of Djabugay country form the unique identity of this special place Ngunbay now called Kuranda.

Through his study Michael fell in love with the language and found what he was looking for – a philosophy and way of looking at the world.

Michael introduces me to the concept of Bulurru. And it is beautiful.

Bulurru is not one thing
– it has many meanings.
Bulurru is how the
Djabuganydji refer to the
Dreaming.

It can refer to places of significance. Each special place on the Barron River is a story water enshrined in the memory of the people and is described by Michael as "holding the spirit seed of memories". The story places provide an orientation to the

sacred geography of the place. These places are also associated with events in the Dreamtime when ancestral beings shaped the land, its rivers and mountains. It is, therefore, the country itself.

Bulurru is the time of these events in the ancestral past, the story time. Bulurru can refer to the ancestral beings of that time such as Damarri and Guyala.

Bulurru is the Law, the djumburru nyiwul – the one track put down by the Bulurru ancestors for the people to follow to ensure survival of both themselves and the bulmba – the country.

Bulurru is the living spirit of the Law, present in the rainbow Gudju-gudju. Bulurru sends storms and floods to punish wrong-doers (the manydja) or makes them sick or lose their way in the forest.

Bulurru is the Word sung out when as part of funeral ceremonies, the deceased's Story is told in song to the striking of the gugulu sticks. In this manner each bama (person) is linked with the ancestral past, the Storytime and the land itself – for the deceased's travels are part of the ongoing story.

According to Wurrmbul the moon gindan, the sun bungan, and all light ngandjal comes from one – from Bulurru.

It can be seen, then, that Bulurru is the relationship between the people bama , the world bulmba, its fauna minya, and flora ma. A relationship that links the ancestral past with the present and one that is everlasting.

The preceding explanation of Bulurru was taken from a text that Michael wrote titled Bama Nganydjin – Our People. He has been teaching Djabugay for such a long time now that he is teaching the children of his first students. He is completely devoted to the language and culture of this place – it is his vocation and he has developed many resources to assist in the learning of the language.

He patiently explains that Djabugay is a syntactic ergative language which is quite rare. What this means

is that the laws of syntax do not apply. I needed to be reminded what the law is and for those of you who also need reminding it is "who does what to whom" – subject, verb and object. Djabugay shares this particular form with, among a few others, the Basque language and the Inuit of the Arctic. According to Michael the ergative function gives the language more pliability. He tells me that "I find it quite beautiful to see into the patterns that form the meaning." It's all a bit beyond me to be honest, but I relate to the sentiment and certainly when I listen to Michael speaking

Djabugay the rolling r's and the intonation are indeed quite lovely.

Another way of keeping the language alive is through music. Michael was a founding member of the band Gudju-gudju. The band writes and performs songs in Djabugay language. He plays some recordings for me and explains the meanings of the songs, swaying with his eyes closed – the songs are beautifully arranged and recorded with Indigenous voices reaching out to me with their stories.

Michael tells me that through the exploration of the language he has been touched by a creative impulse and has reached a very deep understanding of himself and the country in which he lives. It reminds me of the beginning of the Mahabharata where Vyasa says "If you listen carefully, at the end, you'll be someone else".









Term four is at the half way point and as I write this article I can look out over the seasonal creek beside my house and see that some of the remnant rainforest trees are setting their fruit. A life time of observation tells me the flying foxes will soon be flying in. While nearly three decades in Education tells me that our year twelve students will be flying out.

Kids on Earth

"Look deep into nature, and then you will understand everything better"

– Albert Einstein

The value of nature playgrounds to a child's development is priceless. As opposed to a sterile, plastic and metal play area, children not only develop their motor skills and stimulate their imagination, they become more aware of their place in ecology.

The senses become alive, collaborative or team skills are learned in exploration and physical challenges, and their curiosity about living things is kindled.

There aren't too many adults who don't recall the utter delight of a school nature trail, or a family ramble in the bush. There's sounds and smells, birds and nests in branches, insects under every twig, flowers and seeds, funny shaped stones and sticks with stories to tell of years as a branch manager, brightly coloured fungus, frogs and babbling water and guppies and tadpoles, and... it's outside, it's an adventure.

So, when the nature playspace idea took seed at Koah, it only took a matter of time before the project grew, fed by a Queensland State Government 'Get Playing Places and Spaces' grant and a huge amount of enthusiasm, and of course, work.

Landscape Architect Simon Mahar of Landplan, who recently designed a nature park in Centenary Lakes, is working in partnership with WIP Construction of Cairns again to recreate a similar playground in Koah. WIP Construction is renowned for its support of environmentally responsible and sustainable projects, and is associated with Wildlife Rescue.

As a local resident living in Speewah, Paul Maujean, WIP Construction's project manager for the Koah playground is delighted to be overseeing the construction of the park, due to commence in January.

"We're more than happy to be involved in this type of project. Natural playgrounds encourage children to use their imagination, be creative, use their sensory skills, and discover. It's what being children is all about, learning through discovery and adventure.

"We need to get our kids back on earth and away from cyberspace, in touch with nature, in touch with each other, in fact grounded in the best sense of the word," said Paul

The project received support from the Mareeba Shire Council, with generous donations of seed funding, earth fill, rocks, etc.

Alicia Buckle of Koah Sport & Social Club Committee said support from both local and Cairns businesses had been outstanding, and the Koah community wished to express its gratitude to the project initiators: Organic Motion of Kuranda – Edible landscapes; Zed Architectural Services; Dream State Circus, and local artist, David Stacey.

For the next four months the ferry across the Daintree River will be free to regional residents.

The free ferry trip is the best incentive for local residents to get out and visit one of the world's most enchanted places – or make that much anticipated return visit to this unique tropical location.

The usual fee of \$28 will be scrapped for local residents until 28th February. Local is classed as residents from Cardwell to Cooktown, including the Atherton

Private motorists can apply online to Douglas Shire Council for a Douglas card, which will give them free return travel on the Daintree River Ferry.

The cable powered ferry near the end of the Daintree River is the only way to reach the region by road all year round and is the continuation of the Great Barrier



Reef Drive, a 140km long road, which stretches the coastline from the Northern Beaches of Cairns through to Cape Tribulation.

Tourism Port Douglas and Daintree executive officer Tara Bennett said the card was an incentive for local people to explore the astonishing Daintree Rainforest on their doorstep.

The importance of 'Sense of Place' and the KUR-World EIS

"That which this community has

protected and nurtured over many years

is consistently desired by developers."

The now abandoned Myola Planning Study (2006) called for the development of a concept layout and a package of codes/planning scheme provisions that could create certainty for the various stakeholders interested in the Myola locality. The issue of certainty for stakeholders manifests itself in a number of ways:

- For the planning authorities it is assurance the regional plan and planning scheme's aspirations for the area can be implemented efficiently and reasonably.
- For environmental agencies it is development that is responsive to and respective of the extraordinary biodiversity values at Myola.
- For the community, developers and landowners it is clear expectations about development form, process and their special responsibilities in investing and living in this special setting.

The plan recognised that the significant environmental values of the Myola Valley could not be retained unless the necessary urban infrastructure

was developed including the Kuranda Range upgrade. The plan was abandoned and stakeholders were given certainty for future planning in the region.

People, both individually and in communities, together with their association with and in the natural environment develop a "sense of place". This sense defines who they are and the values in their personal and community attachments to place. This is about:

certainty... values... community... expectations... investing

The "sense of place" could be described as their personal and community investment in place. The Kuranda community has consistently defended incursions into their sense of place which is embodied in the following descriptions contributed by survey respondents answering the:

KUR-Alert community survey regarding KUR-World (2017).

- 1. The very thing that I moved here, saved money, and built my life here for is being threatened by this development. I am a zoologist and tour guide. This will directly impact my business. Our culture is linked to our environment and the special natural treasures it offers; this development will ruin all I have worked so hard for.
- 2. Makes me cry, terrified for the future of our wildlife and rainforest. I love Kuranda so much, my home for my whole life and my grandad bought our land just to have a piece for the animals. Frik off and go and do this somewhere else!
- 3. Once the environment is gone, the essence and appeal of the region is lost.
- 4. I value the separation afforded by the Kuranda Range Road. I don't always enjoy the commute every day, but the Range keeps the suburbs away and gives me a place to live where my values are respected. I want to live IN my environment and within this community.
- 5. We moved to Kuranda for a lifestyle. We live in Monaro Close and moved here for a quiet rural life. If land is rezoned to residential we will potentially be built out. There will be increased people, traffic and potentially, crime.
- 6. Totally in conflict with the values and ethics of the local community.
- 7. Disaster for native flora and fauna in a high conservation value area.
- 8. Disgrace. Destroying everything that is precious to this region.
- 9. We do not want to be like Cairns and have small blocks and no trees. We want Kuranda to stay as it is.

10. Came to live up here to get away from this type of development.

There is compelling evidence here of the community's "sense of place" and the importance of a connective social glue. Communities with a consistent "sense of place" are resilient and self-supporting. In the Kuranda region, there is a sense of "who we are" and the value of "where we live".

This is a community that has consistently been harangued at local, state and federal levels of decision making. This is a community that has been bereft of proper democratic representation for more than 40 years; yet this is a community that has consistently stood firm. The values embodied in Kuranda's "sense of place" are not

superficial.

That which this community has protected and nurtured over many years is consistently desired by developers. The future social impacts of the KUR-World project will be measured in a loss of cohesion and resilience within the community and loss of

connection to that which has great value to this community: the natural environment. There are strong links here to well-being in those associations between nature, social and economic life.

The Proponent has shown no respect for OUR values; rather he has come and imposed his values upon us. They do not belong here.

The Proponent has not contributed to the values embodied in landscapes such as the EnviroLink Corridor. The Proponent has not risen in the early hours every Saturday morning for 25 years to plant young trees; he has not stood in the hot sun tending seedlings or carting water to thirsty plants in the dry season. He has not been covered in scrub ticks, picking rainforest fruits on seed-collecting trips. The Proponent has not stood in night rain down at the river to assess frog population health; he has not slogged in the mud after the floods to tend young trees. He has not rejoiced in the arrival of colourful birds come to feed on the nectar of trees he has planted. He has not contributed, yet he wants to take.


The economic value which is desired by the Proponent will be a loss from the Kuranda community. This loss will be a value transfer to the KUR-World Proponent. To the Kuranda community, this feels more like theft rather than opportunity.

Suggested Solution

This is not a community which will reject development. This is a community which will embrace the GOOD development; that which shares OUR value system and respects the natural environment.

Kuranda has a significant natural environment with a strong communal 'sense of place'. The community would welcome the Proponent if the desires were to SHARE this landscape with appropriate development, and if designed WITH input from the community it may be embraced with benefit for all.

Hinchinbrook - Thorsborne Trail is Not for Sale!

It is disappointing that Queensland Government has thrown several national parks up for development. These include Hinchinbrook, a stunning and pristine island off the coast near Cardwell. There is an isolated walking track running through its length – the Thorsborne Trail. At present, to conserve its wildlife values, only 40 hikers are allowed on the island at any one time.

Plans to clear areas of forest for roads, bridges, a luxury campsite and facilities exist according to staff at Kate Jones' office and the State Government is calling for expressions of interest for \(\) a tour company to run glamping holidays. Apparently no cap ≥ has been put on the number of tourists allowed in each group and no monitoring is planned of the ongoing operation of the development. It is probable that buildings and other supplies would need to be brought in by helicopter.

HINCHINBROOK ISLAND **NOT FOR SALE**

As Peter Ogilvie, president of the Wildlife Preservation Society of Queensland notes in his letter to the Minister for the Environment Leanne Enoch, 'These plans have nothing to do with the primary purpose for establishing national parks, namely the protection of our native animals and plants, landscapes and cultural resources.'




the animals and each other with a magical box full of locks and keys. Follow the clues on the box to find the keys around the room. There are costumes and games inside and fairies to find, of course. There will be



Teaming up for this year's Summer Tour, Old Man Luedecke and Lucy Wise are equally excited to tour Australia's Small Halls. "It's an absolute honour to share this tour with an artist as established and talented as Chris Luedecke. We both can't wait to play in so many special places neither of us has been to before," said Lucy.

Lucy Wise has delighted audiences across Australia and internationally with her soulful voice, masterful storytelling and intricate ukulele, guitar and Appalachian dulcimer playing.

Having toured two albums and two EPs in Australia, New Zealand, USA and the UK over the past 8 years, **Lucy** has developed a great reputation for her songwriting, which

weaves together traditional folk and pop influences with a strong focus on storytelling. She has played to packed venues at Sidmouth Music Week (UK), The National Folk Festival (ACT), Port Fairy Folk Festival (VIC) and Woodford Folk Festival (QLD).

Lucy Wild's third album, "Winter Sun" (2018) draws upon Lucy's experiences touring and meeting people from all over, as well as her times spent at home, walking the streets and creek paths of Melbourne. In her solo show, she explores themes of love, joy and sadness, friendships and the relationships people form with their environment.

A two-time JUNO Award winner, **Old Man Luedecke**'s songs are melodic gems blending old time sensibilities with an unusual vision and poetic sense. His music belies someone more than slightly ill at ease with modern life and he performs with a gentle and endearing charisma, stories littered with a canny oblique humour; he's a sly entertainer with almost a hint of contemporary vaudeville about him and he plays a mean claw hammer banjo clearly derivative of the old

time and Appalachia. He's a revelation!

From the music rich maritime province of Nova Scotia on the east coast of Canada, a banjo songster like **Old Man Luedecke** is a rare type of musician. A song writing one of such hopeful goodness is rarer still. In the tradition of solo banjo men and women of days gone by like Doc Boggs, **Old Man Luedecke** sings his songs accompanied only by his loving five-string, foot stomps and the occasional yodel. This is a bizarre type of music Doc Boggs might have made if he'd studied poetry.

His latest recording "Domestic Eccentric" is his seventh, and is recorded with and produced by legendary old time and bluegrass musician Tim O'Brien.

The album is inspired and dedicated to his family, which is characterised by Chris as somewhat an "eccentric domestic" existence.

The tour's executive producer, Ms Rigden said the show is not to be missed as "Old Man Luedecke and Lucy Wise have been chosen, not only because of their beautiful musicianship, but because they have the ability to really connect with people through storytelling, the ability to tell a joke, as well as a wonderful warmth and real interest in visiting places a little off the beaten track.

Ok, So relax. Breathe. Our stress levels are rising as the first Christmas packaged shortbread (which are available all year round incidentally) are placed on the shelves...in October! We go into a buying frenzy and not long after a feeding frenzy. Just as the supermarkets like it!


Cairns Regional Gallery Holiday Season Exhibitions

Goobalathaldin Dick Roughsey: Stories Of This Land 15th November 2018–10th February 2019

This is the first major retrospective exhibition celebrating the work and life of Goobalathaldin Dick Roughsey, and is delivered in partnership with the Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art (QAGOMA).

The exhibition brings together seventy works from major institutions and private lenders including barks, paintings, ceremonial and historical objects, draft illustrations from the *Rainbow Serpent* children's book and three story book films; *The Rainbow Serpent* (1975), *The Giant Devil Dingo* (1977) and *The Quinkans* (1982).

Goobalathaldin Dick Roughsey was a figurehead and pioneer of Indigenous art and culture. Throughout his career, Roughsey explored traditional practices, stories and ceremonies, social effects caused by missionary activity, everyday life on Mornington Island, and his journey through Cape York with Percy Trezise and Ray Crooke.



Cartonography: Fruit Cartons of Far North Queensland 30th November 2018–6th January 2019

Cartonography (a combination of carton and cartography) is a project by Sydney-based artist Sean Rafferty, which involves the collection, mapping and cataloguing of Australian fruit and vegetable cartons.

Rafferty is an eclectic artist who has collected more than 800 cartons and is driven by a desire to explore connections between objects, and their relationship with mythologies, histories and the landscapes from which they come. His recent installation at the Cairns Art Gallery is based on fruit and vegetable cartons from the Far North Queensland region, which he sees as place markers that convey stories about the people who grow, harvest, store and transport produce, from the farm or orchard to the consumer.

In 2018, Rafferty undertook a research visit to Far North Queensland and collected data, stories and information that have informed this exhibition. Rafferty believes that the process of collecting fresh produce cartons is an opportunity to connect with a farmer and/or a community, and that, as well as a device to transport produce from the land to a city, the carton can be a device to access and contain their stories.



Destination North: Contemporary Illustration 23rd November 2018–13th January 2019

At the turn of the twentieth century there was a global explosion of pleasure travel due to more accessible modes of transport, and a new genre of lithographic travel posters emerged. In the 1930s and 40s the Queensland Government Tourism Bureau produced destinations posters that promoted Far North Queensland as a tropical paradise. Destination North is a contemporary take on this advertising campaign.

For this exhibition, the Gallery has worked with and commissioned seven early career artists to design a series of illustrations that offer contemporary interpretations of Cairns as a lifestyle and holiday destination.

Destination North presents the creative underside of one of Australia's most popular tourist destinations.


I let out a scream into poor Graham's ear "Oh ..#\$%&!! a land mullet is attacking the chick" as I ran to rescue

But, unfortunately, I can't stop getting older.

My mother used to say, and she still says, every week in fact, "Getting old is a curse". She's right, and for me, one of the worst things about getting old is losing your eyesight. By some miracle, I had mobile reception in that tiny spot where there was none on the main part of the track.

But technology still has its glitches. I was talking to Emergency Services, who I think were situated somewhere near Saturn. Look, they do a fantastic job, but sometimes there is no place for technology, centralisation and generic, robotic answers, and you just need to talk to someone with local knowledge. Most of us know the Douglas Track has many different sections, and I gave up trying to say we were nowhere near the Speewah campground when told not to worry, as Emergency Services were on their way to Speewah Campground. 

As Haig highlights one of the keys to this age of anxiety is space,

Increasingly the world wants us as consumers not people, wants our wallets not us. Which means we must consistently defend our right to spaces that are not primarily economically relevant. Places like libraries, galleries, museums, parks and state forests etc. Those places where 'just being' is still allowed.

We also importantly need non-cluttered spaces. Spaces that allow us to breath and not think, that just allow us to be, with no distractions nor expectations. That is why looking at the sky (or sea) is so therapeutic. Why nature bathing is gaining popularity for health, both physical wellbeing but more importantly mental wellbeing. Even non-physical space is being filled up – digital space, time space (think work). All this is a threat to our mind space where we need room to think freely, think calmly or not think at all.

If we want peace on earth, we need space on earth first. So, this Yuletide season consciously seek out, (or gift to someone), some space. Some quiet uncluttered space. Space to just be. You will have to switch off the phone, close your computers, escape reality with a good book, have a long bath, get enough sleep, walk among trees, practice some yoga or quiet meditation, experience a float tank, dance, make art or cloud gaze – do whatever works for you.

This Yuletide I wish you peace on earth, but you will have to deliberately seek it out and make space for it!



CASH FOR CONTAINERS SCHEME

Kuranda Dates and Times

With the introduction by the Queensland Government of the Cash for Containers Scheme on 1st November this year, eligible drink containers can now be returned to approved outlets for 10 cents per bottle. In Kuranda, there is no permanent facility at this point in time.

Negotiations by community members with the authorised receivers responsible for the Tablelands region, including Kuranda, have led to an arrangement to trial a 'pop up' mobile service to operate from outside the Arara Street recycling bins area at the Kuranda Cultural Precinct (old school site). It is imperative that Kuranda district supports this local service to keep it going. The operators only receive six cents per bottle, so volume and consistent patronage is essential. The proposed Kuranda service is to be available on the first Saturday of each month.

December and January dates and times are: 1st December 8am-3pm 5th January 8am-3pm



Fresh Mango Chutney

(vegan, gluten-free) Makes 1 jar via <u>elephantasticvegan.com</u>

Ingredients: 3 cardamom pods (or use about ¼ teasp cardamom powder), ¼ teasp nigella seeds, ½ teasp coconut oil, 1 red onion, finely chopped, 1 garlic clove, finely minced, 1 mango, peeled and diced, 1½ teasp apple cider vinegar, 1 teasp maple syrup, ¼ teasp seasalt, ½ teasp cinnamon powder, ¼ teasp ginger powder.

Method: Add the cardamom pods to a mortar and crack open. Remove the shells,



Ingredients: 4 green mangos (peeled, seeded, cut into strips), 3cm piece fresh ginger (peeled, chopped), 3 cloves garlic peeled, ½ cups sugar, 1 teasp seasalt, ½ teasp dried chilli flakes, 1 teasp cumin seeds, 2 cardamom pods, 4 cardamom seeds, 1 cinnamon stick, 5 whole cloves, 1 cup white vinegar, 5 black peppercorns, crushed.

Method: Place the mango into a large pot. Crush the ginger and garlic using a mortar and pestle until they become a smooth paste and add to the mangoes. Stir in the sugar, salt, chilli flakes, cumin, cardamom pods and seeds, cinnamon stick and cloves. Cover and leave to stand at room temperature overnight.

The next day, place the pot over medium heat and cook, stirring occasionally for about 30 minutes or until mixture begins to thicken. Stir in the vinegar and peppercorns and cook for 1 minute more. Cool before spooning into sterilised jars.

Simple Homemade Mango Jam (vegan, gluten-free)

via sharmispassions.com Makes 1 cup

Ingredients: Mango, big (chopped roughly), ¼ cup sugar, 1 tblsp lemon or lime juice.

Method: Blend mango cubes until smooth. In a pan, add mango puree, sugar and juice. BEWARE: keep stirring for at least 15–25mins, so as to avoid sticking, until the mixture reaches a jam consistency. The mixture will turn glossy at this stage. Take off heat.

Cool completely and store in a clean airtight container. Refrigerated after a day (if any left).


Strawberry Mango Lime Jam (vegan, gluten-free)

via <u>seedtopantry.com</u> Makes 4 jars

Ingredients: 2¹/₄ cups roughly mashed ripe strawberries (about half kilo), ³/₄ cup mashed ripe mango (1 large), 2 cups sugar, 3 tblsp lime juice.

Method: Add ingredients to a large heavy pot. Slowly bring the mixture to a boil over medium heat stirring until the sugar is dissolved. Turn the heat up a little and cook rapidly, stirring often to prevent sticking, until the jam reaches the gelling point, about 15 minutes.

Be careful not to overcook. Spoon the hot jam into prepared sterilised jars, leaving 5–6mm headspace.



Council has been working hard throughout the year on a number of projects in and around Kuranda surrounds to improve the amenity of the area. I am excited for 2019 as we continue to revitalise the Village through the Kuranda Infrastructure Masterplan and the Kuranda Community Precinct Masterplan.

Congratulations to the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre on another fantastic year, being named a finalist in the Queensland Community Achievement Awards – well done.

Australia Day: There is still time to nominate an individual, group or community event you think is worthy of an Australia Day Award. Nominations can be made online through the Council's website and close on Monday 17th December. Nominees and award winners will be announced at Council's Australia Day Awards and Citizenship ceremony on Friday 25th January.

Speewah Bridge: The bridge at Grove Creek Speewah has been repaired and opened last week. Line marking to go in shortly. Thank you to everyone for their patience.

Flaggy Creek Crossing: The crossing at Flaggy Creek Mona Mona will be closed while works are carried out to construct a new concrete bridge. Council awarded a tender to a suitable contractor at the November meeting the design and construction of a new single lane concrete bridge, which will replace the existing timber bridge over Flaggy Creek on Mona Mona Road. Although the temporary crossing will be removed shortly, residents will still have access via Black Mountain Road. Works are set to begin as soon as possible, weather permitting.

Dog Registration: A reminder that all dogs in the Shire must be registered under Queensland law. Also you must let Council know of any changes to your dog's registration details including change of contact number and address, if you no longer own the dog, you move away or your dog dies. Failing to update your details may result in a fine when it comes to registration renewal time.

If you don't have one already, make sure you have an emergency kit handy and an evacuation plan for yourself and your pets should you need to leave your home. 

Monitoring of YCA continues with a new technique on the horizon - sticky traps will be used to lure, trap and therefore detect YCA density in an area. We are calling on volunteers to help with the construction of some 12,000 sticky traps. See below for upcoming activity.



Tropical biologist Dr Conrad Hoskin said that despite the Kuranda Tree frog (KTF) living up against the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area, very little of its distribution is formally protected.

"The Kuranda Tree Frog is a highly localised species that needs urgent conservation attention. Impacts to a single creek population impacts the species as a whole. Actions to ensure stable and healthy waterways and increase stream buffers and surrounding forest will also benefit other local species like the Cassowary, Myola Palm, and Lacelid Frog".



NGIRRMA EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND

The Bama (people) of this area (bulmba) shared a common ngirrma, language.

The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like the archaic English word

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have people been able to preside continuously in one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual world 'bulmba' has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of the year, the season and the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for help with selection of wordsearch words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation for its work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

A Thought for December

'N December 1903, after many failed attempts, the Wright brothers managed to get their `flying machine' off the ground. They were the first to fly. They immediately sent a telegram to their sister, Katherine, to tell her the great news. It said: "We have actually flown 120 feet. Will be home for Christmas." Katherine immediately rushed to the editor of the local newspaper and showed him the telegram.

He looked at it, and said: "How nice, Katherine, you will have your brothers home for Christmas." He missed the big story that the Wright brothers were the first to fly! It's very easy to miss the big story at this

Christmas has a habit of taking over our lives. There are just so many preparations to make, and presents to buy, and so little time, that by Christmas Eve we are exhausted. It is very easy to miss the big story that Christ is at the centre of Christmas because it is his birthday.

For the first 300 years of Christianity, Christians didn't celebrate Christmas. They celebrated Easter and the message that Christ had risen from the dead. But later on, Christians began to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, and various customs grew up in different parts of the world. Some of these reflected the Christmas story and involved the use of candles to show that at Christmas we celebrate the birth of the Light of the

St Nicholas, who was a popular saint known as Santa Claus, was gradually changed from being a bishop and patron saint of children to a red-clad and bearded Father Christmas. Over the years, the religious side of Christmas has been gradually eroded as the commercial world sees it as the big earner. Winter Wonderland, Frosty the Snowman and even a new bird Suzy Snowflake (even in 35 decrees of heat) have replaced the carols telling of the birth of Jesus.

One of the earliest carols, written by St Ambrose in the fourth century, is Come Thou Redeemer of the Earth. It tells the big story of Christmas and how God came to live on earth, and it recognises Jesus as both human and divine. God reveals His love in the birth of a baby.

It is because God got involved in the world that Christians have a duty to get stuck in. It may mean feeding the hungry and caring for the poor and it may mean fighting for peace and justice and speaking up for the voiceless.

Christianity cannot be an escape from the real world, and the birth of Jesus in the stable and His death on

the cross are reminders that the Christian faith is rooted in poverty and pain. At one Christmas Eve Eucharist, a young single parent brought her baby. The baby cried and cries and screamed, and mother and child received disapproving looks from some of the congregation, and then to everyone's astonishment the Priest thanked the young mother for bringing her baby to church and reminding us of what Christmas is all about.

Astrology The Stars in December & January

THE paper covers two months, so we'll look ▲ a little further ahead. Into 2019 in fact. December has the Sun and the planets again concentrated into just half the zodiac circle. The Kuranda Paper wishes all a safe and happy holiday season. May you make wonderful memories, and enjoy those with whom you share them. See you in 2019! First edition out January 31st.

DECEMBER 2017 (Issue 294)

Our front page asked for help for one of Kuranda's most giving and caring, long term residents Betty Timmins, who had fallen ill. With a year's passing we have had to say goodbye to Betty, with heartfelt gratitude for all her years of selfless service to the community. We also reported on the completion of the Henry Ross Lookout upgrade, including installation of a replica of the 1953 Battle of the Coral Sea plaque – the stolen original found through this paper.

JANUARY and FEBRUARY 2018 (Issue 295)

February's front page was a tribute to the Kuranda Range Updates Facebook group volunteers. Arrival of The Wet (with rain, lightning and massive phone damage in January). Renewable energy projects in the Mareeba Shire. And an article on Fantastic Fungi.

MARCH 2018 (Issue 296)

Our front page applauded the long overdue refurbishment of artist/blacksmith Hans Pell's iconic Kuranda street furniture. First of our RSL local profiles featured Mick Forde. Controversial plan for increased flights from a private airfield Koah was raised. Horse and Pony Club's Di Curtis received MSC Australia Day Award. Winners of our "Wet Season" Short Stories competition published, Ann Harth's "Dam Cow" a standout.

APRIL 2018 (Issue 297)

Our original front page was to be What A Wonderful Wet but with an historic, traumatic for some, flood event two days before we put the paper to bed, we changed it to Wild. A massive 1170mm recorded for March as we closed the Paper on March 27th, with an incredible spread of photos from residents, Kuranda to Koah. Launch of local app Spidentify. World's Greatest Shave events in Kuranda. And the first of a series of Ngirrma (local language) WordSearch puzzles. Our last Gardening in Kuranda column from Alectura (Peter North) who reluctantly put down his pen after many years.

MAY 2018 (Issue 298)

Front Page: Community Standing Against Ice March. Kuranda Men's Shed finally got a home thanks to MSC. TECH talk Thomas talked password security. Rechronicle asked "Do you eat fair" while Queenobeans featured "Cheap Fills" recipes. And Kuranda's Mayi Wunba Aboriginal Dance Troupe wowed them at the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast (*The Kuranda Paper* proud to support them in this endeavour).

JUNE 2018 (Issue 299)

Our front cover captured, with some amazing photos submitted by locals,

a thankfully rare event – the Barron River's almost bare riverbed from upstream of the highway bridge to the weir. Caused by a oops! moment during maintenance by Stanwell Corporation with the "taps" left open far too long. Certificate of Excellence awarded to Kuranda Visitors Info Centre. Bulmba Rangers secured three year funding for their important work with Country.

JULY 2018 (Issue 300) - OUR 300TH EDITION

27 years of almost uninterrupted community news (Cyclone Justin did wipe out one month in 1997) and a full page of thanks to all our volunteers, contributors and advertisers since 1991. Kuranda Historical Society paid homage to the late Shep Humston, a co-founder of the Paper and lead author on the iconic "Kuranda: The Village in the Rainforest" history book. NBN rollout loomed for Kuranda residents. Electric Ants in Kuranda alert.

AUGUST 2018 (Issue 301)

"Because of Her We Can" 2018. NAIDOC celebrations in Kuranda. ABC TV's Gardening Australia visited Kuranda Conversation. A Grinter's Tale spoke of the worry felt across the community at the financial situation with our Foodworks store, and our ever decreasing choice as consumers in Australia. A lucky Striped Possum road "hit" survivor nursed back to health at Batreach.

SEPTEMBER 2018 (Issue 302)

Kuranda's magnificent "Avenue of Fig Trees" on Coondoo Street finally protected through listing on the State Heritage Register. We provided some historical background in a wraparound cover. Cr Nipper Brown, in our regular column from MSC councillors, explained how the State Cash for Containers scheme would work. Envirocare alerted residents to the imminent release of the KUR-World Draft EIS release for public response. "The View From Here" profiled local scientist Margaret Humphrey.

OCTOBER 2018 (Issue 303)

A sad farewell to Kuranda's Martha "Cookie" Brim, who was an outstanding cultural ambassador for her community, and Kuranda. Also a tragic loss to the community, the sudden passing of Ann and Rudi Husek, while in Nepal. World Cassowary Day came with a warning to be aware that chicks are about to join their dads on travels, so slow down drivers. The future of the historic "Grevillea House" (Mrs Miller's Hostel) unknown.

NOVEMBER 2018 (Issue 304)

A call for residents to take the opportunity, a final chance for community input, to respond to the KUR-World Draft EIS before the end of the month. This major project a hot topic of interest for over two and a half years, moving towards final assessment by the Coordinator-General in Brisbane. Kuranda Men's Shed received both State and Federal grants. A plea by the local Kuranda Kindy for community support to stay open.
