



## NORTHERN TREETAIL BAT

These micro bats are found only in the tropics, they usually roost in hollow tree spouts.

They fly a considerable distance above the ground with a fast and direct flight in tropical Woodlands, but do not have sufficient manoeuverability to forage in dense vegetation. This fellow was found on the ground. He had an injury to his shoulder and was unable to fly. Physio and warmth have helped him considerably and he is now able to move his wings again. Another common name is Northern Mastiff bat, probably due to his resemblance to a Mastiff dog.

## DIADERN LEAFNOSED BAT

This large micro bat came into care after a butcher bird attack. We named her Miss D. She was in shock and had an injury to her leg. This beautiful bat is a chainsaw with wings, and eats a large variety of insects; a rhinoceros beetle does not stand a chance if caught by her. She has lovely soft dark fur with light coloured patches. Miss D has been released back into her habitat.

, A Planning Application notice has appeared on Koah Road, a little obscured by long grass and placed precisely on a bend and necessitating risk to life and limb in order to read the text. For those people who have not yet undertaken this feat, the gist of the application is a "Change of Use" for a large parcel of Rural Land bordered by Kennedy Highway, Koah Road, Palm Valley Road, Fantin Road and includes parts of Groves Creek to establish an outdoor entertainment centre:

A horse riding facility - an appropriate rural pursuit you think but wait - there is more! An ATV (All Terrain Vehicle -a four wheeled motor bike) facility is also proposed.

Many residents have recently purchased Rural Residential zoned blocks directly across from the proposed venue and the involved Real Estate agent has not advised them of this proposed development. The developers have made a glossy video of their proposal but the day-to-day running of such a venture is vastly different from the gloss of a video projection. Mareeba Shire Council should be shamed in even entertaining such a proposal in this area.

#### Dear Kuranda Paper,

#### INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND THE COMMUNITY

There is so much happening in our Kuranda State Schools at the moment it is hard to keep up with. What with a new Parents and Citizens committee at the Primary School and plans being developed for the relocation of the Primary School to the High School site for opening in 2007, negotiations and consultation are currently happening almost on a daily basis. We are all keenly aware that it is very important to get the mix of school and community facilities right at this planning stage so that when we call the two Kuranda Schools "one school", we are confident all the needs of our school community have been met.

In conjunction with this, it has been a priority for us to address appropriate behaviour within our school(s) to ensure that the rights and safety of everyone at school is at a high level. With this focus, a group of 11 staff including both school principals, guidance officers, teachers and parents, attended the first of a series of seminars in Townsville recently. The program will be adopted by our school(s) and implemented over the next 3 years. It is called the "POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR SUPPORT" program (PBS). It is based around positively acknowledging and rewarding actions that reflect our societal values and expectations and not taking for granted that students "know" how to behave (manners and respect) or that they are taught these values at home.

Soon a survey will come out to all members of the Kuranda community asking you to prioritise the VALUES THAT YOU FEEL ARE MOST IMPORTANT. Those highest on your list will then form the basis of the rules of the school(s) and will apply to everyone - students, staff and anyone working in the school.

The philosophy of the program is to consistently reinforce pro-social behaviours by SAYING, TEACHING and PRACTISING. For example, at the Primary School level, it could mean a teacher teaching and practising lining up at the canteen or coloured "zones" being marked out in the school grounds to indicate what behaviour is expected in those zones.

Experience shows that by spending more time on developing these pro-social skills, more time can be spent on the real business of teaching and learning with better outcomes for all in the long run. Just as we teach Maths or English to improve intellect we need to actively teach social behaviour to achieve better cooperative interaction within our community.

This is only the first information about the program and more will be reported to you as the school(s) begin implementation and collecting data. In the meantime, if you need more information about the program, please contact either of the schools.

Often when we start a project at home we are feeling pretty relaxed, may have even had a drink or two, and we get out hours later we find ourselves waiting for attention at the emergency 2005. room.

on for our protection, but at home we often break all those rules are planned for 2005-2006. for convenience sake. I know it seems obvious, but the ladder is just as high at work and the ground still needs to be even, and that power saw spins at the same speed at home as it does at work. So, if you are a bit of a DIY (do it yourself) expert, then also become a DIY safety person too. Because if you don't I will be sure to be seeing you sooner or later as it is just a matter of when, not if.

Also the home is the site of many poisonings and burns, especially in young children. The risks can be minimized by placing all suspect chemicals in a high child lockable cupboard, and scalds can be minimized by turning the maximum temperature of your hot water service down. The correct placement of pot handles while cooking is also good standard practice. So give safety a try and stay out of the emergency room and hopefully the next time we talk will be via the Kuranda Paper.



Do you want to learn more about your local area? Need things for your out-of-town visitors to do? *Djabugay Country Tours* is up and running! We commenced operation in late April, and you may have seen our guides and signs in town recently. Now is the time to get to know us and our products- we are offering an opening special for our Bare Hill tour until the end of July!

**About Us:** The Djabugay people are the traditional owners of the area around Kuranda. This was recently recognised with the 2004 native title determination over Barron Gorge National Park, in favour of the Djabugay people. The Kuranda indigenous community has been involved in tourism for a long timegoing back to the days at Mona Mona mission when groups of tourists would come to visit. Since then there has been the experience of being part of Tjapukai Dance Theatre and running tours to cultural sites for educational groups.

In order to better share in the benefits of tourism, the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation has spent several years developing the concept for an indigenous owned and operated tour-guiding business, based in Kuranda. The aims of the business include:

- provide employment for indigenous people in Kuranda
- provide an income for the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation and for the indigenous community
- getting back onto country; walking and talking culture!

Following preparation of a Business Plan in 2001, we delivered tour guide training to many of our local youth. Local trainer, Rob Macalister, and Djabugay tutor, Willie Brim, delivered the Certificate 3 in Cultural Guiding in 2003 and again in 2004, with a total of 13 graduates.

At this stage we would like to acknowledge the support and assistance of a number of organizations. Firstly to the Board of the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation (DTAC) who have supported the business and helped with training. Thanks also to Mareeba Shire Council, Mareeba TAFE, QPWS, Sky Rail and Kuranda Scenic Rail, and also especially to the management and staff of the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre, who helped us organise practice tours in 2004. Thanks to local landowner Bob Colefax for his support of our operation. We also have been fortunate to receive some grant funding from the Sustainable Regions programme to help with business establishment.

Our Tours: So what are our tours?

Jum Rum Rainforest Walk: At last there is a chance to do the Jum Rum walk with a local indigenous guide. The tour departs from the Information Centre most weekdays, and transport is provided back into town. As this tour takes only 1 hour it is the ideal introduction to Kuranda - especially designed for the day visitor.

**Bare Hill:** The best cultural experience in the Cairns region! Bare Hill is a very important cultural and rock art site, in the Davies Creek area. Visitors can only visit this site with a Djabugay Country guide. Our current tour starts and finishes in Kuranda and takes four hours, including 3 hours on site. An experience you wont forget in a hurry!

The Budadji Experience: This 1 and half hour tour has been developed with Kuranda Scenic Rail. Passengers will have the option of getting off the train at Barron Falls, and joining a Djabugay Country guide for a rainforest walk, including some special old growth forest, and then by bus onto Kuranda village and morning tea at the historic railway station.

# TALES FROM THE KURANDA VISITOR INFORMATION CENTRE

Day 2 of the North Queensland's Tourist Information Centres Conference. We had all been



invited by our host Queensland Traveltrain [or as we locals like to call it, 'the Kuranda Train'], for breakfast at Freshwater Station. I was looking forward to trying breakfast at the station for myself, as it is hard to talk about and encourage visitors to eat out at this early hour if you don't know whether the food and service is good enough to warrant this extra effort, and being a fussy eater, in my mind, my evaluation is paramount. Christel and I turned up early, but the enthusiasm of the out-of-towner volunteers to start the day meant that we were one of the last to arrive. With time to spare we investigated the museum [which I didn't even know existed], and had a good look at the whole station. There have been major upgrades to the entire location since I was there fifteen years ago and, hard as it is to say, its beauty rivals our own Kuranda Station.

A choice of breakfast was on offer: breakfast cereal, juice, scrambled eggs and bacon, of course toast and tea and coffee, or all of the above. To really check out the cooking I needed to try the scrambled eggs. Over the years I have tasted many batches of this wonderful food totally ruined by 'fast food cooks', over cooked, over salted, in fact many times totally inedible rubber or watery-slops. So it's great to be able to honestly say that theirs was the best scrambled eggs I have tasted after my own. If you like your bacon crispy, you'll get that too. With a full day already been planned we weren't able to travelling on the train that morning, was an experience to be done on another day.

Bundling into the a bus we travelled to Kuranda. Our first stop the Butterfly Sanctuary. Unfortunately there wasn't time to start the sightseeing with one of the most interesting aspect, the usual talk from the tour operator about how the Sanctuary was set up and how they breed the butterflies, but we caught up with the information as we walked around the enclosure marvelling at the beauty of the butterflies, especially at close quarters when they landed on our clothes or even closer on our glasses.

Next to the Rainforestation. First a visit to the Wildlife Park to see Aussie animals that fascinates the rest of the world so much. Then the Dreamtime Walk, where everyone can have a try at throwing a boomerang and a spear. My boomerang throw was as good as when I tried four years ago, straight down to the ground in front of me, twice, no improvement, so with such success I decided to just watch and cheer on the people with a strong throwing arm and the expert Aboriginal as they threw the spear instead.

The Pamgirri dancers delight the spectators, and the snake dancer scared a young Japanese girl [in a delicious, giggling way], when he came into the audience and attacked her as prey. Near the end of the show the compere called for volunteers to learn their dance, and I, as a doer and not a watcher, went onto the stage to participate, much to the embarrassment of some in our group who probably didn't want some old woman cavorting on the stage.

Rides on the Amphibious Army Duck is a huge attraction for tourist from all countries. Once you are aboard and away from the Fruit Orchard you could be in the wilds of Papua New Guinea or even Africa so intense is the tropical forest that surround you. The trip DOWN to the made-made lake from a great height has all the excitement that the youngest crave with all the security that us oldster require. In between a running commentary of information and jokes it was probably more fascinating for me than others to see the huge changes and improvements from my ride fourteen years ago. When we arrived at the Colonial restaurant for lunch the place was packed and people piled their plates up from a huge variety of hot and cold food on offer. The food I was able to consume was delicious but it is time like this I wished that I had a second stomach so I could not only try everything, but go back for seconds. It had been a intensely filled two days, and the out-of-towner volunteers still had many hours of driving ahead of them as they started their trip back home. Next year Mareeba is hosting the conference and I'm not only looking forward to revisiting their area, but also reuniting with the people we have already met this time. What will Babinda come up with next time?

This month we read a short passage from St Matthew's Gospel Chapter 11 verses 25-30.

In this passage we hear Jesus voicing a frequent theme. Jesus wants us to understand something contradictory and often puzzling, something about the way God and our lives can be in contact. He says that to keep such lines of contact open we must be as children, and he actually took a child on his knee to emphasize it. That does not mean being childish; it means being childlike, which is very different. What is the essence of childhood which diminishes with adulthood? It is trust, that ability to trust in oneself, in other people, and in God. It is also the capacity to love unconditionally. Thirdly, it is the feeling that anything is possible. Frogs can become princes, people can change. On the other hand, it is the capacity to take people exactly as they are.

All such things are of the kingdom of God yet they don't exist easily in the kingdom of everyday adult life! They are considered naive and unrealistic, yet Our Lord calls us to nourish

and treasure them. Jesus tries to show us that between him and his father there is a deep and intimate relationship. Jesus then suggests that, if we wish to see a portrait of the nature of God, we look at Jesus himself. That statement is deep and mystical and it can speak to us about all our human relationships.

There are people around us through whom we can catch glimpses of God, people in whose lives and actions and attitudes we come in contact with the same love and grace which were found by those who came in contact with Jesus. We also need to remember that this same love and grace can be found in those around us who may not acknowledge Jesus as their Lord. It is very easy to forget that. In verse 28 Jesus says something so beautiful and appealing it has never been forgotten. It is his invitation to follow him and his way. He lets us know that he fully realizes the struggle that human life can be, the restlessness of it all, the challenge and the drain it can be. He then offers himself and his way to us as a resource for living our lives. His way is not complicated. It is not a long list of don'ts. It is a simple deciding that we will accept him into our lives as Lord.

The invitation to us is to look to him, then to follow his way in the world of our time.

## Words of Wisdom from Osho. Ten Commandments'

"You have asked for my Ten Commandments. It's a difficult matter, because I am gainst any kind of commandment. Yet, just for the fun of it, I write:"

- 1. Never obey anyone's command unless it is coming from within you also.
- 2. There is no God other than life itself.
- 3. Truth is within you, do not search for it elsewhere.
- 4. Love is prayer.

- ★ To seek the employment of the coordinator/ recreation officer to oversee the operation of structured activities and the general operation of the facilities after school hours
- X To investigate the provision of all-hours bus transport for both the school and all other activities at the site.

#### **Background**

We are in the throes of planning for the amalgamation of Kuranda's Primary and High be located at Myola at the site of the existing

A rare opportunity exists for us, as a community, to coordinate the provision of education, sport and recreation facilities, particularly a swimming pool, ovals for soccer, junior rugby and a community hall for the Kuranda community.

A steering committee made up of teachers, parents and other community members has been charged with ensuring this opportunity is not missed. The committee is the "work horse" for the community, taking your "needs" and "wish' lists to Education Old, Mareeba Shire Council. architects and engineers. All meetings are open to everyone every time. We are currently meeting at either the Primary or High School every Tuesday from 6pm-7pm.

EQ has promised \$3.4M to replace the primary school and add money to construct the prep school, expected to be between \$600,000-

Very soon the investment at Myola will be \$24M. There is no doubt that this investment should benefit the whole community above and beyond school hours.

## Where we're up to

Every other day there are meetings between teachers and school staff, representatives from EQ, Q-Build, MSC, State and Federal MPs and interested community members to develop the footprint for all foreseeable facilities on this site.

Kindergarten and after-school care are to be accommodated.

We're going for large covered areas in which indoor sport, community meetings, extra classrooms as well as dance, music and displays can be held. The walls can be built later, but the space will be literally set in concrete.

We are committed to pursuing the absolute best facilities to replace the old primary school and ensuring that much of the history of that school is transported to the new site. That also includes the lovely Kauri trees that were planted by students some 50-60 years ago. While we are already planting new Kauris in the 4Ss project (timber plantation) at Myola, it would be good to see the timber of the mature trees incorporated into furniture and features within the new school. Certainly that's a better option than selling them where they stand. The money earned would only go so far, but the timber would endure for almost ever.

We're applying for a grant to build stage 1 of and indoor sports centre/hall that will serve both the school and the community.

Public transport to and from the new facilities is of the utmost importance. Meetings will be called with all Kuranda's bus services in the very

# Clarks Corner

I am pleased to report progress on a number of local projects that I have been working on with the community for some time.

The Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre will finally have a permanent home after a Dept of Communities budget allocation of \$600,000 to purchase the house at number 6 Rob Veivers Drive from the Department of Housing. This double-story weather board house opposite Centenary Park in the heart of the village is perfectly located for easy community access. The house will be built in underneath and disabled access provided when modifications are completed. The money transferred to the Department of Housing will be retained in the ATSI Housing program for Kuranda residents.

I would like to express my appreciation to all the volunteers, management committee members and staff, who over all those years have dedicated themselves to the Centre and its clients and who have endured cramped conditions and uncertainty for so long. Special thanks to past coordinator Cherry Ferrari who did so much to lay the groundwork for a permanent home for KNC.

This new funding, which we have all worked so hard to secure, will ensure the future of the Centre and enable it to continue its fine work for the Kuranda community. I would also like to particularly thank Ministers Pitt and Schwarten for their great support for this project and I hope they will both attend the opening of the new KNC later this

The budget also included an allocation of \$90,000 for planning to create a Prepto-Year 12 school on the site of the Kuranda High School. This school was designed for 370 students but only has an enrolment of 168 so there is spare capacity there at present. Year 7 students will be moving up to the High School in second semester. Additional classrooms, including those for prep year students, will be built with an allocation of about \$4m next financial year in readiness for 2007.

I commend Ken Harley for his work chairing the community committee that is working along side the principals and P&C's of both schools, the Swimming Pool committee and Mareeba Shire Council to ensure that in addition to the P-12 School there are community recreational facilities and a Community Hall included on the site in the future.

Everyone is working together to enable the Council to lodge the funding application with the Department of Sport and Recreation later this year for a subsidy to construct the 25m swimming pool which will be built next to the school. Other community facilities on the site will be developed over time as funding becomes available.

The third project just commenced is partnership between the Kuranda Medical Centre, Queensland Health and Ngoonbi Co-op to improve access for Kuranda residents to the dental service at Smithfield Community Health. I have been pleased to support the Kuranda Health Action Group get this new service off the ground. It is necessary to have a health care card to access the dental service and people should first contact the Kuranda Medical Service to a make an appointment.

There is always more to be done and I will continue to work with the Council and the community on these and other projects. It is encouraging to see what partnerships, hard work and good will can achieve.

The state budget had lots of good news for the FNQ region, for all the details contact my office or visit www.budget.qld.gov.au.

# **New Kuranda Book A Walkers Guide to Plants:** Cairns - Kuranda

Kuranda resident John Beasley has just completed a book, which for the first time provides a simple guide to plants in the Kuranda area. While written for bushwalkers, the guide should also prove of great interest to local residents who want to know more about the plants growing in their neighbourhood. John said "I have always felt there was a need for a guide to local plants, that did not require much botanical knowledge to use. That is what I have aimed to produce in this book."

260 of the most likely to be noticed plants from the Cairns and Kuranda area have been included, with colour photographs and a simple-to-use key to making identification easy. The guide offers a lot of information, yet is small enough to be carried in a back-pack. Plants are listed under their common names, but the scientific name is also provided. While most of the plants are native to Australia, some introduced plants are included, including a number of


Within the book, plants are grouped according to the vegetation type where they are most likely to occur. Many Kuranda plants are located in the Rainforest and Inland Open Forest sections. There is also a brief selection of plants in the Chillagoe area, some of which also occur in

open forest near Kuranda. The area covered in this book is otherwise defined by the walking tracks listed in "Tropical Walking Tracks - Cairns and Kuranda" by Kym Dungey and Jane Whytlaw, with whom John collaborated in writing his book.

John took most of the photographs for the book himself, in a four month period from November last year to early March this year. Having expected to take a year, he was surprised that so many of the photographs he needed could be acquired so quickly. The information to accompany the photographs came from many sources, including the internet. John was fortunate to have a number of friends with botanical knowledge who could help with identification of the plants he collected.

John's book will be available for \$14.95 from bookstores and other outlets in the area. He is already working on a sequel that will introduce walkers to the plants found between Port Douglas and Cooktown.





# **Termites**

## Story by **Petra Lovey**

Take a bunch of willing, blind workers, add some dutiful soldiers and a constantly hungry, non-stop feeding queen and you have an average termite colony of about one million inhabitants, living in most elaborate, bizarre castles any architect would admire.



These mounds contain subterraneous streets and canals, bridges, provision chambers, nurseries, guardrooms and a royal palace. The first Europeans to study these termite 'cities' were so impressed that the examiners credited the insects with an intelligence comparable to humans. These sophisticated cities are inhabited by soldiers and civilians, who have such specialist skills as those of architects, chemists, surveyors engineers, andwell borers. Found primarily in the worlds tropical and subtropical regions, termites are primitive insects forming the order Isoptera, which contain between 2000 and 3000 species. They are often called white ants, but are not even closely related to ants; their closest relative being the cockroach. Once a colony is well established, eggs and work 24 hours a day for several are produced almost continuously, up to 2000 a day. The same king and queen continue to produce the entire population and the first brood assists in the rearing of the subsequent broods. Termites are an important food and nesting source to many of our native animals, including the lace monitor lizard, which uses the termite mounds to incubate its eggs. Some kingfishers and parrots nest in chambers tunneled in the walls of termite mounds.

But as most Australians know

termites have a dark side. Some species eat through the centre of susceptible timbers, leaving nothing but a thin veneer of timber and/or paint. However not all termites attack houses; out of the 246 species found in Australia, nine species in Queensland are responsible for damaging timber structures. Many of the most destructive varieties build their nest completely below ground level and build subterraneous tunnels to domestic and commercial timber. The workers are the ones that do the most damage; they are a creamy, translucent colour, soft bodied and carry out all work in the nest, including gathering food from timber, constructing tunnels, doing repairs and grooming each other. They are 3mm to 4mm long, have no wings, are sterile and blind, years. Many of the destructive species build their nests out of sight in tree stumps or root crowns of living, dead and debilitated trees. A large colony in an urban environment is most often unseen, and a far cry from the elaborate mounds gracing the Kuranda and Mareeba areas. So next time you look at one of these termite mounds give some thought to the amazing activity taking place inside their 'cities'. They are certainly an insect to be in awe of.

# SHOWING OFF and pretty proud too

Last month we reported on plans for a revegetation project which will see the Barron River banks revegetated from top to bottom, that is, from where it rises at The Crater in Eacham Shire to its mouth at Machans. The project is called the Barron River Green Corridor project.

During June we invited the major investor in this project (it's still a secret until they officially make the announcement) to look over the work we've been doing for the past seven years along Myola/Oakforest Road, at Big Sands (Kowrowa) and at Queens Creek where it flows into the Barron River. We were able to show them some of our outstanding successes, where proper site preparation and continued maintenance for 2-3 years has turned wasted weed-infested land into lush forest, with a great diversity of species and a healthy floor of leaf litter.

We were also able to show them the stretches of fire-prone grass and eucalypts that still require extensive work.

It is unclear whether it was what we showed them or the wonderful afternoon tea of billy tea, cheeses and crackers and fresh fruit invitingly displayed by Cathy and Margaret under the shade of a Candlenut tree at Big Sands which won them over. But it is clear that they were mightily impressed and want all their employees to spend a day or two each year to give us a hand. That means thousands of helping hands digging in the dirt, planting trees and making a difference.

FNQ NRM Ltd, the Barron River ICM Association and Conservation Volunteers Australia are our partners in this project.







by the Mayor Mick Borzi will be an excellent opportunity to communicate many of these initiatives to all sections of the Kuranda Community and the Tourist Industry.

On July 1 KVPP will commence its largest integrated advertising campaign ever. The cornerstone of this will be four new cinema graphic television adverts depicting the length and breadth of what Kuranda has to offer. Adding depth and reinforcing the TV message will be an extensive print media campaign in Cairns , Townsville and Mackay.

In addition to the Advertising Campaign the new Kuranda VIP card will be launched, encouraging tourism orientated staff in Cairns and Port Douglas, to visit the village and experience first hand what Kuranda has to offer.

To derive full potential from the Advertising Campaign KVPP has engaged a media broker to professionally target and manage advertising, and a public relations journalist to gain greater exposure for the village, in all segments of the media. Another recent KVPP initiative has been to engage a well known and respected marketing consultant to represent Kuranda at many of the Nations' camping and travel shows, targeting the growing self drive market and short break travellers.

KVPP has also been busy on the local scene engaging a liaison person on a part time basis to call regularly at many of the tour operators in Cairns and Port Douglas keeping them up to date on Kuranda happenings and the diversity and quality that Kuranda has to offer. These projects have been worked on tirelessly over a period of several months and it will be great to see everything finally come together.



#### **Home Treatments:**

The most enduring hand softener is lemon. This tart fruit is a skin softener and whitener; using lemon on your hands after washing in water does return some of the needed acidity to the skin. Keep a small piece of lemon by the sink and twist it over your hands and especially over your nails and cuticles every chance you get.

There is an old-fashioned combination which works very well: rose group and 4.45 to 5.45 for the senior group. water and glycerine. Add honey sometimes too, as honey is softening. Honey is sticky, however, and must be washed off after treatment.

Mashed banana with a small amount of soy margarine (or safflower or corn margarine) can be made into instant hand cream. Use a tablespoon or less of the margarine and blend together. Apply to your hands.

Mashed potatoes with rose water, oil, and glycerine are a food combination that works magic on the hands. Cucumber and glycerine also work well together for hands. Mash one teaspoon of the peeled cucumber and blend in one teaspoon of glycerine, and one teaspoon of rose water. Blended cucumber and witch hazel in equal proportions is an old remedy for chapped hands.

Apple-cider vinegar and water will soften the hands. Use eight times as much water as vinegar.

A chapped hand water can be created by soaking a handful of bran in a pint of water overnight. This infused water can then be applied to the roughened hands. Keep the strained water in the refrigerator for future use.



# Garden Jottings for July by Alectura

July and August reveal to the gardener the bare bones of their garden where falling temperature, drying winds and shorter days cease the exuberant growth of summer and a number of plants take their winter sleep. The change in the sun's angle also brings into focus considerations of plant placement and the viability of established microclime niches. Especially striking at this time of the year for their colour are the cordylines and many bromeliads entering their mature flowering phase. If leaving kaempheria, caladiums and other bulbous species in place, mark so that they will not be accidentally injured if digging or overplanted. The nocturnal scratchings of bush fowl will also make short work of many of these sought after bulbs so some protection is wise.

#### Things to consider this month:

Dear Garden Lovers,

With most costus, gingers and heliconias finished flowering, these plants are becoming increasingly ragged. However resist the urge to hack back especially, if like me, you tend to be a little heavy handed once starting to prune. Better to wait until new growth has emerged and is well established then, old flowering and spindly canes may be cut and used to mulch. Then, with a sharp spade, leading eye sections of favourite parent plants may be cut off and replanted. With application of an all purpose fertilizer or, better yet, well aged animal manure, ensure good growth and flowering in the warmer months to come. Please be responsible and do not dump these or any other plant material in bush areas as many have the potential to re-establish and become invasive pests.

Talking of garden pests, a long time resident has pointed out to me a future 'Singapore Daisy' of the rain forests. This is Syngonium (lizard or arrow head vine) in its many colourful incarnations, sold in most plant outlets. Once established and climbing most, if not all forms, tend to revert to type and become increasingly aggressive. This reversion may be seen in a street planting outside the shop Tropical Fever in Coondoo St, where a very attractive white form (White Angel?), while providing a colourful ground cover, is reverting where climbing the old fig tree. Amazingly robust, the smallest eyed section of this plant stem will reproduce and already is colonizing sections of roadside forest and river plantings. This plant requires the utmost care if used in any of its forms and utmost vigilance in disposal.

With sap movement slowed, now is the time to take Frangipani cuttings. Cuttings should be allowed to dry for a couple of weeks before planting, 25 -30cms cuts until established in pots containing a sharp draining mix or in situ if longer branched cuts taken.

Feed Citrus with citrus and fruit tree fertilizer at approx 125gm for each year of tree growth to a maximum of 1.25 kg, applying to ground surface covered by leaf canopy, watering in well before and after application.

Set in parsley seedlings and divide and clean up mint pot or bed, remembering to keep up the water. Care in watering is a general observation, as with the prolonged drizzle, it is too easy to assume that potted plants and sheltered beds are getting sufficient moisture. While a general rule of thumb is to water less in winter as transpiration is generally lower and top growth in some subjects has either gone or is rather tatty, bright sunlight and wind can quickly dessicate plantings and potted plants.

#### Plant of the Month

To answer a recent question, the creeper presently in sheets of orange flower is Pyrostegia venusta (Bignoniacae). Flame Vine. This is a vigorous hardy tendril-climbing evergreen vine that, once established, will give a guaranteed display year after year. Needing as much sun as possible and drought hardy, this vine makes an excellent screening plant given suitable strong support. Out of flower, the thick leaf cover is somewhat plain but, each year, the walls of bright orange flowers are stunning. Propagation is by semi-hardwood cutting in spring. The plant seldom sets seed lacking its natural pollinators. However care should be taken in its planting as its vigor will see it climbing to the top of the tallest tree and its drought hardiness makes it a potential escapee-danger in drier country areas. Dispose of any prunings carefully.

A needed correction: I recently enjoyed a privileged visit to Misty Glen Nursery where Mark and Allison are busily growing and propagating top quality and sought after orchids, bromeliads and carnivorous plants for sale each Sunday in the Original (Honey House) Markets - not the Heritage Markets as previously advised. Keep looking as there are many more treasures to come from here in the months ahead!



Hello again, with such a wet last month you'd think For the past month police from Kuranda have received complaints of trail bikes being ridden on public roads. In particular, persons have been charged with riding without a licence and the motor cycle being unregistered and Firstly our Street Stall was a huge success with Pat and uninsured. Police would like to inform the community that persons riding trail bikes or for that matter any vehicle her wonderful helpers baking a mountain of cakes and on any road without the appropriate registration or licence commits an offence. The maximun penalty for unlicensed driving/riding is one (1) year imprisonment or three (3) thousand dollars. Although this may seem a high penalty the consequences for such actions can be far greater.

> For example: Adults allowing young persons to ride bikes on the road without the appropriate licence or registration and cause an accident by their actions may find themselves or the owner of the vehicle being sued by the innocent party. This is why it is imperative that all vehicles using public roads be registered. (Part of the registration consists of compulsory third party insurance). So as a warning to all responsible persons, think of the consequences before allowing someone to use your vehicle.

> On the topic of traffic, a number of accidents have occurred on the Kuranda Range where persons in the slow vehicle lane have merged back into the path of vehicles travelling in the same direction due to their lane ending. The rules are: whoever occupies a slow vehicle lane (which is marked) MUST give way to all vehicles when

merging back into the single lane.

We have another officer on our team. Senior Constable Jeff Magnus has taken up his position at Kuranda after transferring from Cairns scientific section. So all persons contemplating committing a crime, think again, cause Senior Constable MAGNUS will identify YOU!!

# Fricassee of Farmed Rabbit with Sherry and **Mushrooms**

(4 serves)



125 g mushrooms (preferably field), butter 50 g, dry sherry 125ml, double cream 125 ml

1 egg yolk, Flour 25 g, Light stock 250 ml, 1 rabbit (cut legs/into 2 pieces neck/shoulders/saddle cuts

Place seasoned pieces in pan with butter and gently seal without browning. Sprinkle with flour, stir and cook a further 2 minutes. Add stock and sherry and gently simmer until cooked, adding further stock if necessary to keep rabbit just covered. Add quartered mushrooms. Beat cream and egg yolk adding a little of the liquid and mix well. Pour into the rabbit, returning to heat but do not allow to boil. Correct seasoning and consistency. Served garnished with basil or parsley. Goes well with minted potato pieces, glazed carrots and

Remove lime deposit in a kettle or electric jug by boiling up equal parts of vinegar and water, leaving to stand overnight.




