

The 1st of May saw Kuranda Koala Gardens celebrate their first anniversary. It's been a whole year since the "boutique" style wildlife park, nestled in the rainforest, right next door to Birdworld, opened its doors to the public.

In the past year management and staff have been working hard to establish gardens and continuously upgrade this wonderful attraction. A full year of grazing macropods and wandering tourists has done little to deter the lush green grass and rainforest species from taking hold.

New additions throughout the year included Digger, the Common wombat. He was introduced to the two female Common wombats, Sandy and Jemima in October 2002. The girls are now enjoying the pleasure of his company, making him feel very welcome with courtship displays and even a mating on the first day!

Two hand-raised Pademelons, Georgie and Moko as well as Ellie, the Swamp wallaby are now basking in the attention of visitors to the park each day.

In December 2002 several Freshwater crocodiles were released into the former bungee pond, making our saurian population 24.

Just in time for 1st birthday celebrations, the Monitor enclosure inside the walk through reptile house has been completed. Two juvenile Mertens' Water monitors were introduced to their new surroundings this week and have settled in very well.

Modifications are about to begin on the walk through reptile aviary to make way for the housing of some venomous snake species. Two recent arrivals to the park are a pair of Red-bellied Black snakes, which are currently off-display until the renovations are complete.

Locals receive a 20% discount at Kuranda Koala Gardens, so if you would like to see a wide variety of wildlife in our own back yard, make sure you visit this lovely, relaxed and friendly attraction.

You can hand feed the wallabies or for a small cost you can cuddle one of the cute koalas or wrestle with a placid python and have your photo taken to capture the moment.

Have you seen that funny looking lumpy car driving around town? That belongs to the ATHERTON CRYSTAL CAVES. What a great way to advertize their fantasyland caves.

Don't leave yourself short of time when you visit, there is LOTS to see. After donning your miner helmet with its swivel light, you enter a dim world of sparkling delights. With the information card in your hand giving the name and history of each of the numbered crystals/fossils it helps you to understand and really appreciate just what you are seeing.

The outside world no longer exists as you are captivatingly drawn along the winding trails into each hidden pocket-sized room with its dazzling treasures. There is no rush, each display is more spectacular than the last, demanding your unhurried attention.

On the way out you can read the amazing story and look at the photos taken during construction showing the creation of this wonderful exhibit, before checking out the solitary stones and jewellery on display for sale.

Boost to Tourism Promotion Welcome.

Member for Leichhardt Warren Entsch has welcomed the injection of an additional \$2 million in federal funding to the 'See Australia' promotional campaign.

Mr Entsch said today's funding announcement by Federal Tourism Minister Joe Hockey was part of a cooperative plan with State and Territory governments that would result in an Australia-wide domestic tourism marketing campaign worth \$7 million.

"Today's funding boost couldn't have come at a better time with tourism operators throughout Far North Queensland doing it tough in the wake of the Iraq war and the impact of the SARS virus," Mr Entsch said.

"With international visitors clearly very hesitant to travel at the moment it makes sense to do everything we can to boost domestic tourism here at home. We should never forget that domestic tourism accounts for 70 percent of all tourism activity in Australia. If we can build our domestic tourism base it will certainly help tourism operators through the international impact of SARS and terrorism."

Mr Entsch said Minister Hockey's recent visit to Cairns for talks with local tourism operators had influenced today's funding announcement.

"The Minister came to Cairns to listen to the concerns of tourism operators and business leaders, and he was left with the clear message that an increase in funding for tourism promotion was required. The \$7 million nation-wide 'See Australia' campaign will run throughout May and June and will encourage people to get out there and take a short break in their own backyard, so to speak. It is amazing to think that if each year every Australian spent and extra \$10 on one more night away on a 'See Australia' Short Break, domestic tourism expenditure would increase by a whopping 20 percent, delivering a \$10 billion boost to the Australian economy," Mr Entsch said.

When asked if he did not find the manners of the English rude and awkward, compared with those of the East, 'Abdu'l-Bahaha' said he had not felt this. As a nation increases in spirituality, the manners become different.

A Thought for June

This month we open our bibles and read from St Johns Gospel Chapter 10 verses 11-18 Of all the images which Jesus used for his person and his work, the image of the good shepherd has shone most over the centuries of the Christian tradition. The role of the shepherd became very much linked with such values as trust, faithfulness, dependability, gentleness. However, the role of the shepherd also requires tenacity, strength, courage, leadership. If these values are placed beside the others, we avoid childish images of a Jesus who is merely meek and mild.

We have only to read the first sentence of this passage to hear Jesus define the reality of the shepherd's role with chilling foresight. "The good shepherd," says Jesus, "lays down his life for the sheep." To do anything less is to betray the flock, it is to "care nothing for the sheep." "I am the good shepherd." What might that be asking of my life?

If a shepherd cares, then the question is whether I am becoming an essentially caring or a self-centred human being. That may seem obvious. Yet patterns of behaviour change in our lives, and we need to examine them from time to time. Again, if a shepherd leads, then in what sense am I leading other lives, perhaps those younger than myself. Leading can be an exercise in ego and power. It can be domineering.

Obviously, Our Lord's pattern of shepherding does not call for that. Rather, are there vocations in our lives that we could give some time to? Is there some aspect of Counselling, Hospital visitation, Pastoral Care, children of alcoholic parents -- anything like this that we could be involved in to guide others? In terms of adults, could we give time to Bible study?

Is there a self-help group that we can give something to? All of these things are shepherding. Such vocations may seem very tame and pedestrian compared with Jesus laying down his life as the good shepherd. But we are not all asked to do what Jesus did. To lay down one's life can mean many things at many different levels.

One thing is certain. You and I are never going to lay down our lives for anything until we give even a small part of ourselves for something! Surely there is not one of us who cannot respond in some way to Our Lord's call to be a shepherd. *Chris Wright*

Flower Show.



I was unceremoniously presented with a Centenary Medal as I sat on the steps of the Kuranda post office, deep in conversation about natural resource management on my mobile phone. A large flat box, a bit like a take-away pizza box, was handed to me along with charade-like gestures which led me to sign a form to say I had taken delivery of this registered mail. Still preoccupied with the conversation I was having, I prised open the box with one hand and found an impressive certificate which read "To Jax Bergersen—Whereas Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second, Queen of Australia, has instituted an Australian medal to commemorate the centenary of federation of Australia; I do by this warrant award you the Centenary Medal". The certificate was signed by the Prime Minister and the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia. Also in the box was a case holding a silver medal suspended from a blue ribbon with crimson and yellow stripes. A letter in the box informed me that the medal was "For long service to the natural environment".

Since this medal came to me on behalf of so many of you, I do want to share with you what it represents and why. The Centenary Medal was designed by Balarinji of Sydney. One side of the medal shows the seven-pointed Commonwealth Star, representing the six Australian states becoming one. The Star is a major element of the Australian national flag. At the centre of the Star is an indigenous styling of Aboriginal traditions at the heart of the continent surrounded by the words "Centenary of Federation 1901-2001". Around the rim are 100 dots representing the 100 years of federation. My name is inscribed on the other side. The colours used in the ribbon represent crimson, for Federation, and blue and yellow for the beginning of the 21st Century. The seven stripes symbolize the pathway with which the state became one.

But, this medal is awarded to a great many people in Kuranda and throughout the region, simply via my hands. In fact, I would not accept it for myself. What the medal represents are the achievements of many teams, of which I am but a member. It comes to Kuranda EnviroCare, the largest community group in Kuranda, which I, along with a number of other people prepared to take a chance, founded nearly ten years ago. We have an environmental focus, a great deal of dedication and steadfast commitment to improving the environment. This is demonstrated by planting of thousands of local, native trees and by projects which are being undertaken in our local schools.

The Medal is also for the Barron River Integrated Catchment Management Association (BRICMA). This is a group of community members (not paid, just doing it for its own sake) who have a catchment-wide focus. This group facilitates projects which are undertaken by farmers, landholders and community groups within its flanks, including Kuranda EnviroCare.

It is also for the community members (again, not paid, just volunteers) who link those of us "on the ground" with governments at all levels. These people sit on the NRM Board (Wet Tropics) and worry about ensuring that the projects we do in Kuranda or Atherton or Mission Beach fit with the environmental values for the wider Wet Tropics bio-region.

The Medal acknowledges the environmental work being done by individual teachers in both the Kuranda High and Primary Schools, the community members who are in some way a part of the farm forestry project being undertaken at the High School, whether they are working on the site or gifting money to enable this work to be done. It acknowledges the people who regularly plant trees on Saturday mornings as well as those who can't make it but toot their horns in encouragement as they drive by.

I trust you are proud of the acknowledgement the Centenary Medal confers on us.

Sustainable Society, Schools and Sawmills (The 4Ss Project) A community/Kuranda Schools project

The project will plant local, native tree species on the Kuranda State High School grounds for timber production, bush tucker (fruits and nuts), medicines, resins and fibres and for their indigenous cultural relevance. The trees, to be grown in plantation format, will provide a practical teaching aid in Studies of Society and the Environment (including Place and Space, Systems, Resources, Power, Culture and Identity, Science, Biology, Agricultural Studies). Techniques will be used that underpin social, environmental and economic sustainability. The project will also demonstrate to local landholders how farm/agro forestry might be applied to their properties.

500 trees will be planted each year, i.e. one tree per child per year. In about ten years the first trees will be ready to be cut down and used by the school students to learn new practical skills. While we'll be removing some trees, we'll still be planting. Only then we'll be on the wheel of sustainability. It seems like a long way off, but if we don't start, we'll never get there.

The first 500 trees will be planted this month (June). Each class in both the schools will come to the site to plant their trees.

Sunday 27th July is National Tree Day. On this day, we'll hold a field day to display the project. You're invited to inspect the first planting and to learn why the species have been chosen. Equipment will be on display and experts will be on hand to answer questions about growing trees for timber production. Join us for a BBQ lunch.

This project is initiated jointly by KURANDA *EnviroCare* INC., Private Forestry North Queensland Inc. and Kuranda's Primary and High Schools. It is being supported by the community both financially and practically.

KURANDA EnviroCare, in conjunction with the Wet Tropics Management Authority (WTMA) and Mareeba Shire Council is holding a field day all about weeds at the Speewah Fire Brigade shed at Roscommon between 10am and 3pm on Saturday 21st June.

It will be a racy day with time for discussion about many different ways to deal with weeds. Many people are looking for organic ways to control unwanted invasion by unwanted plants (could that be a good definition of a weed?). Take Singapore Daisy, for instance. Some say the only way to control it is to mow it constantly. Others say it can be shaded out by planting rainforest trees, while others find the only effective way is to hit it with chemicals. Let's know what's worked for you on Saturday 21st.

Then there are all those new plants that arrive on your property, some with pretty flowers and others with an enormous ability to take over. Wot's a weed and wot's not? There'll be experts on hand who'll be able to identify those mysterious intruders. Bring a sample secured in a bag for ID. Sid Clayton of Mareeba Shire Council knows all about weeds.

WTMA, through its Landholders and Neighbours Liaison Group, has made available to Mareeba Shire Council a u-beaut weed sprayer. This unit, which is available to World Heritage Area neighbours, will be demonstrated

The highly regarded Nigel Tucker will also share with us his wide knowledge of weeds and their control in areas adjacent to the WHA. He'll be getting good practice in Malanda on Saturday 14th June when another weed sprayer, provided to Eacham Shire, will be demonstrated. Douglas & Johnstone Shires have both received one of these sprayers from WTMA.

This is a family and neighbours day. Refreshments and lunch will be provided by WTMA and WTMA's much sort after weed books will be available on the day.

MORE Ws-THE WORLD WIDE FUND (WWF) FOR NATURE

At our next meeting (Wednesday 4th June), we'll hear how WWF operates and how we fit in with this highly respected organisation. One speaker will be Noel Ainsworth, WWF's regional manager, based in Brisbane. He is keen to discuss local issues and identify how WWF can partner with local groups and landholders to maximise conservation outcomes in the managing, protecting and restoring areas of important vegetation, riparian areas, wetlands, and sensitive areas for threatened species.

With him will be Russell Kelly whose focus is on developing partnerships with groups, agencies and landholders to demonstrate cooperative management agreements over important areas, particularly wetlands.

This promises to be a most interesting and informative connection, and it's hoped you'll come to hear these speakers, even if you don't stay for the whole meeting.

NATIONAL TREE DAY-Sunday 27th JULY-DATE CLAIMER

KURANDA *EnviroCare* will be participating with Private Forestry NQ and Kuranda's schools on National Tree Day to promote the use of local native tree species in farm forestry in conjunction with the 4Ss project. This is another family event where there'll be a great deal of information to share as well as a BBQ lunch.

RECYCLING

Discussions have taken place with Cleanaway with a view to setting up a place in Smithfield where Kuranda residents can leave their recyclables, such as plastic and glass. Mareeba Shire does not have a recycling system, but Cairns does. There's more to come on this project—we're on to it.

A MONUMENT TO THE ENVIROLINK WILDLIFE CORRIDOR

Kuranda High School students are currently designing and making tiles for the top of a concrete table and seat set which will tell the story of the project. It'll be placed at a picnic spot for all to enjoy.

NEWS FROM THE NEIGHBOURHOOD CENTRE

Hello Everyone

Its time to fill you in again on what happens here. The next Kuranda Interagency meeting is on

Monday 2nd June, (first Monday of every month) at 2.30pm when all human service organisations in Kuranda get together to discuss important issues affecting the community and what we can do about them.

On 23rd May, Lifeline's Gambling Help Program presented "Working with the Problem Gambler" a workshop designed for human services workers who may come in contact with problem gamblers. Bob Baker addressed a full house: thank you to all who attended. Problem gambling is a widespread social problem throughout Australia and right here in Kuranda. It is often hidden as people feel embarrassed and ashamed so they don't want to talk about it. There are often no obvious signs as with other addictions like alcohol and drugs. Problem gambling can mean that there is no money for food or rent or other essentials. People gamble for gain, but they can end up losing everything including relationships, family and friends. If you want to talk about a gambling problem that affects you, you can phone Lifeline Gambling Help on 4050 4955.

Would anyone like to learn LINE DANCING?

Lisa Harper is an experienced teacher from Cairns who could come up to Kuranda on Wednesdays, but she needs 10 people to start. If you are interested, phone Dorothy on 4093 7290.

The first half of the "Living with Cancer Program" was presented on 20th May and the 2nd half will be held on 27th May. The Queensland Cancer Fund presented the Program, which covers an explanation of what cancer is, and conventional treatments, ways of managing stress and healthy eating.

Fifteen people attended and the feedback from participants indicated that everyone learned something new. We looked at the impact of cancer and the process of adjustment and coping. This included the specific techniques of managing our thinking and learning how to relax. The way we think affects how we feel emotionally and physically, and by observing our thoughts we can recognise the ones that are not helpful and make us feel worse. These thoughts can be replaced with more realistic and rational thinking, which is more balanced and focuses on the positives. Relaxation is a skill, which can be learned like any other, eg driving a car, and with practice, like driving, it eventually becomes easy and automatic. The benefits of relaxation are physical, emotional and psychological. Breathing is closely connected to other bodily functions (heart rate, muscle tension, nervous system) and to emotions. By regulating breathing you can regulate emotional reactions and other bodily processes to produce a calming effect. Relaxation techniques reduce tension, anxiety and stress, and increase a sense of control.

The 2nd half of the program on 27th May will cover the impact of cancer on relationships, how to access community resources, coping with pain and supportive therapies including relaxation. We will be using relaxation techniques to experience the effects of slow breathing, muscle relaxation and visualisation.

On Wednesday 21st May, we were honoured to host a meeting with two State Government Ministers, Judy Spence, Minister for Families, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Policy and Disability Services, and Rob Schwarten, Minister for Housing and Public Works. Amongst the issues discussed were the need for additional funding and a permanent home for the Neighbourhood Centre.

And just to remind you about us, Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre and what we do. KNC provides information and referral, counselling and support, groups and courses as well as fax and photocopying facilities, the book exchange and 2nd hand shop (all donations gratefully received). Grace Richards has settled in well here and is available for Family Support Services. So if you are interested in any of the above please drop in!

Speewah Television Service Officically Opened

The official opening of the new TV transmission facility took place on Wednesday 21 May 2003 at the Rural Fire Brigade building at Speewah.

The President of the Speewah District Residents Association, Jan Birkgaard, opened the ceremony, where some of the residents of the area were in attendance. Jan then introduced the Hon Warren Entsch, Federal Member for Leichhardt, followed by Cr Mick Borzi, Mayor of Mareeba Shire, both gave backgrounds to how the project progressed. Bob Madden then added more details of the action that had taken place over the past ten years that finally led to the project being accomplished.

The cost of the project was \$150, 000; this was paid for by the Federal Government out of funds set aside from the first sale of Telstra shares. Mareeba Shire Council was responsible for the administration of the project, and they have done an excellent job. The ongoing costs of power, rent paid to Telstra for the use of their site, and maintenance of the transmitter will be the responsibility of the Mareeba Shire Council at the direction of the Federal Government. The media were in attendance, and after some interviews, all present enjoyed viewing the crystal clear TV pictures on two TV receivers, set up especially for the occasion, as they munched on a delightful morning tea hosted by the Speewah District Residents Association which was prepared by Jan Coulter and Yvonne Thomson.

Most residents of the Speewah area are now able to receive the excellent pictures from all five free-to-air television stations.

Those residents who are not able to receive the pictures are either behind a physical barrier of some of the hills or surrounded by dense vegetation. The consultant for the project was aware that wherever the transmitter was sighted there would be residents who would continue to be without reception. This was also attributed in part, to the fact that the signal was to be transmitted on the UHF (ultra high frequency) band which requires direct line of sight of the transmitter to receive a high quality signal.

Many of the Speewah residents thought the upgrade would never happen, but it has! Many thanks to all who made it happen.

Organic Gardening

Those of us who are worried by insects in our garden should perhaps look at these little beasts in a different light. As Dr William Albrecht said "Insects and diseases are the symptoms of failing crop, not the cause of it."

Generally speaking plants destroyed by insects are better off being destroyed. They are the weaker unhealthy plants. Nature exists on the survival of the fittest to insure the survival of the species.

The first method to ensure strong healthy plants is to provide healthy soil. Fertilise with animal manure and liquid seaweed, add compost and mulch. Encourage healthy predators such as ladybirds, lacewings, praying mantis, lizards birds etc.

Eventually you will reap the rewards for your efforts with lots of healthy plants.

DR DAVE

"It is common knowledge that medical evidence exists to prove that certain habits, e.g. cigarette smoking and excess alcohol consumption significantly increase our risk of suffering major illness. The statistical evidence now exists to prove that physical inactivity plays an equally important role in creating ill health & maybe the equivalent of smoking 20 cigarettes/day.

The Australian Institute of Health & Welfare ranks physical activity second only to smoking in terms of the burden of disease in Australia.

The following statement may seem implausible but there is now hard scientific evidence to confirm that regular exercise will reduce your risk of heart disease, stroke, cancer, diabetes, blood pressure, osteoarthritis, fractures, weight problems & mental health disorders.

How much physical activity is recommended to achieve health benefits? Every adult should manage at least 30 minutes of moderate intensity exercise most days (at least 5) of the week. This means a steady sustained walk not jogging or mountain climbing.

I would be very keen to support a "Just Walk It" program in Kuranda. This is a very simple program of early morning organised walking. Similar programs exist in Mareeba, Walkamin, Atherton. If anyone in Kuranda is keen to help structure such a program, please let me know at the surgery.


Liberty Drag Steeplechase






Kuranda students to fight poverty

FIRST EDUCATION PROJECT For **TEDC**

Called Stepping Forward - improving pathways for all young people," she said.

"TRAN is new, but what we are doing is setting up a support base to make that desire for collaboration across government departments and industry sectors a reality at the grass-roots where it counts," she said.

"We will be announcing the hiring of a local coordinator shortly." Other members of the TRAN executive include Nick Faigniez, principal Angela Toppin representing secondary schools, and Mary Lyle as the TEDC representative, supported by a broader advisory group.



Who Cares?

Far North Queensland Wildlife Rescue is an independent, non-profit, incorporated volunteer organisation operating under the permit from the Queensland Environmental Protection Agency. FNQ Wildlife Rescue was founded in 1993 in response to a public call from the DEH for volunteers to assist with the care and rehabilitation of a growing number of native fauna being referred to the DEH for attention.

Today, ten years later, FNQ Wildlife Rescue boasts over 200 members, many of whom are active wildlife carers located as far south as Cardwell and as far north as Thursday Island and all over the Tablelands area. Although Australian wildlife is technically owned by the Crown, the care of the wounded and sick is left in the hands of volunteers who tirelessly and selflessly invest their time, energy, love and money into ensuring a healthy future for the nation's natural treasures.

Why Care?

What makes Far North Queensland unique to this planet? Our wildlife. We have species here that do not exist anywhere else in the world. Unfortunately quite a few of these are on the rare, threatened and even endangered list. Our region's economy depends primarily on tourism generated income. Tourists are drawn to North Queensland by the natural wonders of our environment. It goes without saying that preserving these assets makes sound financial sense.

Last year alone, 1370 birds and 388 other sick or injured wildlife species were brought in or reported to the FNQWR Centre on Hoare Street and passed on to carers. Not included in these numbers are the birds and animals taken directly to vets or carers, nor do the numbers reflect the after hours calls. Janet Dean, devoted wildlife coordinator in charge of the after hours phone line, has recorded 837 after hours calls in the last five months. The calls reported 594 birds, 70 bats, 44 macropods and 129 other injured or ill creatures. Totalled, these impressive figures average out to 313 ill or injured creatures reported in the Cairns area every month

When to Care RIGHT NOW! How to Care

Join or donate to FNQWR and any other local conservation and wildlife groups. Even if you can't be an active member, your membership fees and/or donations will go a long way towards helping our wildlife.

If wildlife caring sounds appealing to you, FNQ Wildlife Rescue offers "hands on" training workshops on a regular basis that relate to different species-birds, macropods, reptiles, etc. You will also work with a carer "buddy" who will provide encouragement and advice throughout your training.

If you don't necessarily want to feed squirmy furless or featherless creatures around the clock, you can still contribute to the healthy future of our wildlife by getting involved with a group that is concerned with wildlife habitat conservation and rehabilitation, tree planting, community education or land management.

HYDROPONIC GARDENING

A program was recently shown on the ABC Landline about Hydroponic Tomatoes grown in S.A. It referred to a variety called Tradiro, a highly productive and hardy French variety. These trellised plants grow to 12 metres long and are more like jungle vines. A friend of mine from the Hydroponic Society managed to get some seeds. I have planted them and am waiting to see what happens. I don't know what I am going to do if each plant grows that long. These tomatoes are sold as a truss, so people can take them home and pick the tomatoes off themselves. They ripen gradually similar to a bunch of bananas.

I have just planted some Snow Peas. They are

lovely, fresh and never make it to the kitchen.

Coriander is now growing. It seems to only want to grow in the cooler weather. Coriander is very rich in potassium and is very good for you.

Watercress is thriving too. It is another one, which likes the cooler weather. Watercress is a top source of Calcium, Vitamin C, and Potassium.

Station News Over the past month all of us at the station have been enjoying a reasonably quiet period, with few people finding themselves in dangerous predicaments. In July we will see the introduction of the long awaited community ambulance cover scheme, and while this has had some interesting press over the past month, I think all will agree that it is better to have a scheme where all Queenslanders are covered and the organisations funding is assured, the funding will come from electricity accounts and will grow as Queensland does. All of us here at the station are fully supportive of the scheme and we hope this will reverse the trend of people not calling an ambulance and risking their health purely because they weren't covered.

The role of the committee is to raise awareness in the community about the ambulance service and its products, and to also inform the Ambulance service via the commissioner as to the effectiveness of the local service. The LAC is also a significant fundraising body that raises funds for the purchase of equipment for use in the local community. Our next fund raising function will be a QUIZ NITE to be held at the CWA hall on the 14th of June 2003. Ask anyone who has been to one and they will tell you that it is a great nite for all the family, with fabulous

prizes on offer, so get a team of 4 together and start studying. The competition is always fun and fierce, with lots of things to win along the way.

Leon's Tips This month we will get a little more serious and talk about one of the most common killers of people at home CHEST PAIN.

While not all cases of chest pain will kill you, this is something that can be only determined by a Qualified Doctor following a range of tests usually conducted at a hospital. So if you have pain in your chest that lasts for more than five minutes you need to stop all physical activity and get someone to dial 000 and get an ambulance to take you to hospital, if this should occur to someone you are caring for the advice is the same. Get them to rest and get them to a hospital/Doctor sooner rather than later. Should things progress further and the person becomes unconscious you should:

- * Lay them on their side
- * Tilt the head back to open the air passages to the lungs
- * Loosen tight clothing
- * Stay with the person until help arrives
- * Ensure the person is breathing

When a caller contacts the ambulance service the call taker can give comprehensive advice over the phone and help those with limited experience get through even the most intense type of situations.
