


Goodbye...

Dear Kuranda paper.

The proposed 4-lane Kuranda range highway is the wrong solution for a wrong planning decision.

The 2010 plan calls for 50,000 to 90,000 people in the Kuranda area. Surely that many people and their tens of thousands of dogs and cats would be having a devastating effect on our water resources and very diverse and sensitive fauna and flora. Such huge development would undoubtedly destroy Kuranda as the village-in-the-rainforest tourist destination which supports so many of us. It makes sense to have any big development in less environmentally sensitive areas like Mareeba, where there is already significant infrastructure anyway.

High speed rail leading from Mareeba through a Davies Creek-White Rock tunnel to Cairns with drive on/off carriages, space for bikes & motorbikes as well as passenger seating will allow for 30-40 minute commuting. This will make development around Mareeba feasable, saving Kuranda's Cassowaries and tourist industry. A rail tunnel will save hundreds of million dollars in car costs and millions of man hours simply by reducing the distance by over 15km.

It will also enable the international airport to be shifted to the Mareeba area in time for the inevitable sea level rise as well as having many other benefits (environmental, tourism, greenhouse emissions, extra Tableland access, less accidents, less maintenance, shorter construction time, no 10-20 years of traffic delays during construction etc). Its huge long term savings and benefits will more than repay any possibly higher construction costs. And with Peak Oil looming, electric rail with regenerative braking is a much smarter transport option.

The existing road should get a couple of extra overtaking lanes now to alleviate increasing traffic until the tunnel is built. Once all big trucks will have to go on the train our range road will be a joy to drive.

Tourists wouldn't like the proposed highway with its 1.7 meter high concrete and steel barriers which would feel like an open roofed tunnel. How many tourists would still come on a 4-lane highway to suburbia in what used to be rainforest???

Let's not allow our future and our community to be destroyed for the profits of a few trucking companies and developers. Please speak up for our beautiful village and object to the proposed 4-lane Kuranda range highway "upgrade" with its devastating follow-on developments.



Interfaith Dialogue - the Alternative for all Communities

Whatever our views might be about the value of religion in the world, whether we are believers of one kind or another, skeptics or atheists, it is clear that religion is a permanent feature on the social landscape of all global communities. Totalitarianism and various other anti-religious movements and ideologies of various kinds have markedly failed to eradicate religion in the world. If anything, religious and spiritual beliefs are a growing phenomenon in both the West and the East. It is no use simply railing against the abuses of religion and just hoping the offending religions will fade away - this is simply not going to happen! A sensible society is one that accepts this reality, that religion and belief are an integral and permanent part of the life of many of its members. Society must learn to live with, respect and value religious plurality. It must look to maximize the benefits which this can impart to society and to minimize the detriment to

The one fact that is increasingly being brought home to us by much of the current debate about religious fanaticism and its damaging effects in the world is that much more needs to be done to establish genuine

interfaith dialogue. We need much better relations between the religions. Hans Kung the



A Thought for February

Why was Jesus baptized? The question has haunted Christians for centuries. If he was the Word made flesh, if he was the Incarnation of God, why did he submit to a rite which essentially addresses the salvation of the lost, the healing of the sick, the renewal of the broken. If he was neither lost nor sick nor broken, why was he baptized?

The question rises from our broad vision of the role of the Saviour. I suggest today that our unsatisfactory answers are the product of our narrow vision of baptism. Today our narrow view is challenged.

The water of baptism is, for us, still and peaceful. It is, at best, a few litres in a bowl or the calm waters of the Barron. Even for Baptists it is only a few hundred gallons in a tank. It is contained, limited, harmless.

In the bible, water is always a symbol of power. In the bible, water is always ambivalent. The water of God's creation is both perilous and life-giving. The water of the flood was deadly, although Noah and his crew survived it. When the Hebrews crossed through the Red Sea it was a dangerous crossing, although it led to life. In the book of Genesis the waters of chaos before the first word of creation: they are a raging ocean, covered in darkness. Psalm 29 suggests the rainpocked, white-capped surf, driven by the edge of a storm.

Water speaks of the extremes of creation. Water both threatens and sustains life. Water is unbridled power. It also calms and cleanses the body, and quenches thirst.

Water defines the conditions of humanity, the beauty and the ugliness, the tranquility and the storm. The baptism of Jesus affirms and confirms the humanity of Jesus. He is no interloper from another world; he is one of us in every detail of our lives.

We should note, however, that the story of the bible does not end with creation. It is a story of new life, new possibilities, beyond the limits of the old creation. That is why each of our three readings today speaks not only of the water of baptism but also of the presence and power of God's Spirit. Every reference to the Spirit of God is a reference to newness, to unexpected creativity, to life in new and fuller terms. Today's readings are telling us that God is making a new creation out of the old creation, a new human race out of the old human race.

The baptism of Jesus demonstrates his share in our humanity. The Spirit of God affirms him as the pioneer of a new humanity, whose profile he will determine in his life and death.

Christian baptism must always reflect this pattern: the water of God's creation and the Spirit of new life. When we ask. 'Why was Jesus baptized?" we miss the point, especially if we think of baptism only as a corrective, only as a medicine for ills. The baptism of Jesus, in water and Spirit, proclaims the inauguration of a new age and our baptism is admission into what he is. He did not stoop to be baptized. In our baptism God's Spirit took us by the hand and led us into that new world which was first seen in the baptism of the Lord. And all our longings and aspirations for love, and peace, and justice, and even fun, are longings for the realization of that new world. Amen.

famous theologian said there would be no peace in the world until there was peace between the religions.

The interfaith movement has made great strides in recent decades under pressures created by intolerance, religious exclusivity, division and hatred, terrorism and other gross abuses perpetrated in the name of religion. The late Pope Paul made a special effort to promote inter-religious dialogue and good interfaith relations, work that may well be advanced further by the new Pope. The centenary of the World Parliament of Religions in 1993 also contributed to this work, and many groups are pursuing this by ongoing work since. The World Council of Churches has recently held a landmark international interfaith conference. The United Nations held a conference in 2005 on interfaith cooperation for peace. Many other interfaith activities are being held around the planet, including in many communities in Australia. They are reaching down to the grass roots. Muslim communities are increasingly adopting a more conciliatory approach in Australia and elsewhere to participate in, and to explore the need for better relations with, the wider community. 



Friends of the Earth Kuranda Action Alert PHASE II: KURANDA RANGE 4-LANE HIGHWAY PUBLIC CONSULTATION

The proposal to 'upgrade' the Kuranda Range Road to a 4-lane highway has entered a new phase.

As well as requiring environmental approval at a Federal level, the Highway project requires an amendment to Wet Tropics World Heritage legislation. This is because part of the proposed new alignment traverses areas of World Heritage that have been zoned for special management to protect the high conservation values within that zone. The zoning system is designed to restrict infrastructure development in the WHA and ensure the ecological integrity of the area is maintained. Rezoning undermines the very purpose of this zoning system.

Currently, the Wet Tropics Management Board is considering an application from the Department of Main Roads to rezone approximately 25ha of high conservation value land from Zone B to Zone C, where infrastructure may be permitted. IF the application is approved, it will be only the 2nd time a World Heritage Zone has been downgraded in this way in the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area:

Without the rezoning approval, the proposed 4-lane highway cannot be built. A public submission period began in December and ends **Friday**, **March 3rd**. This is a chance to express your view as to whether a zoning amendment should or should not be allowed.

Whilst this is a long, drawn out process, it does at least provide an avenue for citizens to have input into decisions which concern them personally and affect their community generally. For democracy to function, we the people have to participate – otherwise instead of things being done for us, we get things done to us. Please engage in this process if you want to see Kuranda spared from becoming just another satellite town on a major freeway.

Your submission is a statement of your views and concerns. Below are issues you may wish to include:

- This is yet one more pressure diminishing the natural integrity of the World Heritage Area and the ethical integrity of World Heritage management and international obligations
- Changing the zoning to suit demands of the day makes a farce of the zoning process.
- Subsequent urban development of Kuranda region would destroy reality and perception of Kuranda as the Village in the Rainforest. The freeway will have far-reaching and irreversible impacts on community and ecological values
- It is essential that the already limited rainforest habitat be maintained to increase the resilience of the forest ecosystems to the variety of threats including the impacts of habitat contraction due to global warming.
- The freeway will visually dominate the range landscape and completely destroy the current rainforest drive experience with continuous concrete barriers and numerous bridges above the treeline.

This is an important and pivotal time for Kuranda. No change that has occurred in Kuranda up to now can be compared with what would eventuate should this rezoning approval be successful. The subsequent intensive urbanisation would change the character and community identity of the Kuranda area, forever.

Everywhere I looked bright green creatures with webbed feet and yellow eyes surrounded me. To top it off they were showing off their vocal skills. Talk about serenading me to sleep.

Yes, litoria caerulea has made a comeback! With many of our frogs declining at a rapid rate, the sight of countless green tree frogs was welcome to say the least.

The causes of their decline are poorly understood or not known. What we do know is that frogs are affected by loss of habitat and pollution. Compounding the problem are introduced predators such as cats and cane toads. Unfortunately cats eat frogs and toads eat frog tadpoles.

Green tree frogs breed between November and February, when eggs are

The other night my home was laid in clumps and deposited in still water. Tadpoles are a mottled brown colour and reach lengths of 45 to 100 mm. They are completely developed in about six weeks. Adults are capable of reaching sizes of up to 10 cm with a lifespan of around 25 years.

> One way to get frogs back into your garden is to create a healthy ecosystem. Getting rid of predators such as cane toads is a good start.

> In Gladstone a dedicated group of kids have captured a record 10,000 toads over the last few years. Week by week the children would go out in the evening and collect the pests from local parks and waterways. Their dedication has paid off; native frogs have finally made a comeback. Inspired? FINDING **FOREST**

FUNGI

Despite the sparse rain over the festive season, a walk from Barang Street to Jumrum Creek on the 30th of December 2005 revealed enough fungi to keep us all busy for nearly two hours!

One of our fungal finds was the glorious bright orange, fan-shaped fungus Laetiporus sulphureus. Europeans call it the 'sulphur polypore' although the Northern Americans have a far more unusual name for it - chicken in the woods! In northern climes this large, conspicuous fungus often heralds the start of the fungal season as it needs very little rain to trigger fruiting. It seems that it has the same modus operandi here as it fruited at the end of the driest December on record! Hopefully some of you who enjoyed the Creek walk saw many specimens covering several large logs it in all their glory. Some specimens we saw were up to 30 cm in diameter.

The tiered, fleshy fans are hot orange in the centre, fanning to a pale cream colour at the edges and the undersides. As these bracket fungi age the brilliant oranges fade to sulphur yellows. Specimens become more wrinkled and their radial zones become more pronounced. Their flesh also becomes considerably tougher.

spectacular cosmopolitan polypore is commonly found from the Wet region, although it has occasionally been reported from New South Wales.

The "body" of this wood rotting at Kowrowa. Look out for our signs. fungus is in the log, breaking down the tough woody fibres and releasing nutrients into the ecosystem. They are often eaten by log, producing fabulous orange fruiting and mulch around it. spores that are carried by air currents, allowing the fungus to spread to new woody substrates such as newly fallen trees.

the 15^{th} January 2006,was very successful strategically located fire breaks saved it. Microporus elegans, Oudemansiella radicata and Stereum MULCH ostrea. Pictures and descriptions of these can be found on the internet at http:// fungimap.rbg.vic.gov.au/fsp/fsp.html>.

MULCHING TIP

One purpose of mulch is to supply growing plants with food, as it breaks down (there's a whole fungi story waiting to be told here). Other purposes include keeping moisture in the soil and suppressing weed growth. Yet another is to prevent erosion of exposed sloping areas. Yes, it's a good idea to cover areas which could erode before heavy rain, but if you want to get moisure into your soil, wait till AFTER the good soaking rain before you mulch to keep the moisture in the soil.

To get the best value for mulch money, lay just one or two sheets of newspaper on the ground and cover it with the mulch. The thin newspaper covering will help to keep the weeds from shooting but will allow follow-up rains to soak through.

SINGING IN THE RAIN what a glorious feeling

plant plant plant plant plant plant plant plant We can't complain; we've had some good rain during the 'dry season', and the 'wet season' is now with us. This is the period we have been working so hard for in the nursery-to have the seedlings ready to plant out so they can get a good root hold

SATURDAY MORNING WORKING BEES

while the wet weather lasts.

For the next few months, we'll be spending every available hour planting trees. We'll have to put off some of the tree planting we've been doing on residents' properties till after the 'wet'. These plantings can be looked after and watered by the residents while the corridor projects (see below) need the community.

If you've always promised yourself that you'd come to a tree planting one Saturday morning, now is the time. Please make the effort—just once. We do it every Saturday from 8am-9am, then enjoy a cup of billy tea. Wear covered shoes and gloves (if you have them, but Tropics south to the Queensland border we have some extras) and, of course, a hat. You'll find us along Oak Forest Road (continuation of Myola Road)

We have a good routine: the ground you'll be planting into has already been prepared. We dig holes, spill in a little invertebrates. The fungus remains in the fertilizer, plant the tree, water it in, tag it with coloured tape

Mulch can be both your greatest garden ally or bring your worst nightmare to reality. In small isolated garden patches, mulch can turn your garden into a splendid thing, but when used widely to protect the soil through the long dry months (and the fire prone months), it can carry a fire through a planting and wipe it out. (see Tip on Mulching)

TWO MAJOR 'CORRIDOR' PROJECTS

The Green Corridor: A partnership between the Cairns Port Authority, Barron Catchment Care, Conservation Volunteers Australia, KURANDA *EnviroCare* and other groups will, over the next 20 years, undertake environmental rejuvenation of the Barron River from top to bottom (140km of it).

Envirolink Wildlife Corridor: A 10km link around Kuranda which connects the northern and southern sections of the Wet Tropics World Heritage area. It runs from Kowrowa through to Speewah. We're working at the Kowrowa end now.

KNOW YOUR SKIN



SES Headquarters and Equipment. Mareeba Shire Council's work in building the toilet extension (disabled shower/toilet and male and female toilets) make us better able to meet the needs of volunteers during training and when coming from other SES groups to provide emergency help to our local residents. SERVES 6-8 2kg Fillet of Beef

2kg Fillet of Beef Butter for basting

Butter for basting 3 cups beef stock

2 tablespoons basil, chopped

2 tablespoons tarragon, chopped

2 tablespoons parsley, chopped3 egg yolks, beaten

1 teaspoon freshly ground pepper

ROAST the fillet, basting it with butter. When it is done, remove the meat and keep it warm. Pour the stock into the roasting pan, scraping the entire residue back into the stock as it begins to boil. Add the herbs

and simmer, covered, for 15 minutes; then strain the stock into a saucepan, heat some hot stock with the egg yolks, return to the saucepan, and cook over low heat, until it has thickened. Add pepper and salt if needed. Carve the fillet and pour the sauce over the slices

THAI-SPICED GOAT & NOODLE SOUP

350g goat tenderloin 375g thin egg noodles 2-3 garlic cloves 11/2 -2 tbsp. Red curry paste ½ tspn turmeric 700ml coconut milk

700ml coconut milk 21/2 cups stock

21/2 tspn fish sauce 1 tspn palm sugar 1/2 cup canned sliced bamboo shoots

½ cup canned straw mushrooms, drained. 1 large lemon, juiced

11/2 tbsp fried shallot flakes

3-4 spring onions, sliced

½ bunch coriander leaves

COOK the egg noodles in a large pot of boiling water. Drain, rinse in cold water and set aside.

Take 150g of the noodles and deep fry until golden, drain, and crumble into small pieces. Leave aside to garnish the soup.

Gently fry the garlic in 2 tbsp of peanut oil. Spoon approximately 200ml of thick cream from the top of the cans of coconut milk and add to the garlic. Combine with the red curry paste and turmeric and stir until smooth. Add the goat and cook for a further 3 mins. Add the remaining coconut milk, stock, fish sauce, palm sugar, bamboo shoots and straw mushrooms. Bring to the boil and simmer to establish the flavours. Stir in the lemon juice.

Divide boiled noodles between bowls and spoon soup over them. Garnish with the fried onion flakes, fried noodles, spring onions and coriander.

Garden Jottings by Alectura

ebruary 2006.

Another year starting, the monsoon influence here and a good time for the keen gardener to re-examine their hopes and dreams and possibly take a more realistic evaluation of what is feasible in terms of maintenance, watering and general care of their gardens. A close look at most gardens will reveal unthrifty areas with either poor choice of planting or positioning.

A simple summary of gardening in the area would boil down to its care and maintenance during the Wet and the Dry - drainage during prolonged rains and then ability to keep moisture up to plantings during the drier months. These two requirements suggest that the gardener should think carefully about grouping plants requiring similar conditions, moving and grouping more thirsty plants to positions where watering and mulching is more easily maintained, with hardier, less water hungry plantings again gouped together.

A temptation on the larger block is to open too much garden at once. Advocating a go slow approach, careful examination and reflection over time on your site will pay dividends. Better to establish new areas sequentially over time, attempting to improve soil texture, establish sheltering and microclimes for the introduction of more exotic and tender plants into the basic framework of established gardens.

If visited by various diggers and scratchers, think about permanent fencing or netting. A lttle late when a favourite specimen or crop ready to bring in is taken.

Consider costs. What time have I to spend in the garden? What watering will be required? How much mulch will be needed across the year to maintain moisture and fertilizer for vigorous growth? What amount of lawn needs maintaining? Is it cheaper to buy vegetables and flowers than growing my own? How many plants in pots can I keep in good condition? And remember that none of us are growing younger.

Finally, remember to work with Nature. While not deriding the contrary wish of gardeners to grow their favourite plant even if it comes from Alpine regions, be reasonable. Forget the mannered approaches of most gardening magazines and revel in the great range of tropical native and exotic introductions and plant closely. Nature abhors a vacuum and vacant soil is always an invitation to weeds.

Presently a great time to set out divisions of costus, gingers and heliconias.

Plant of the month:

Calathea and Maranta - Marantaceae.

Calathea is a large genus with an estimated 300+ species with Maranta coming from a smaller genus of approximately 40 species. Both families hail from tropical South America and are grown mainly for the diversity and beauty of their leaf patternings . Sometimes it is difficult to distinguish between the

two families but often the leaves of Marantas will draw inwards at night. All are cold sensitive and require even moisture but with good drainage as rather susceptible to root rot. Ranging from ground huggers to a metre+, the smaller beauties make excellent ground covers and fillers. Most will take some morning sun but prefer dappled shade. Some of the Calatheas have interesting bracting patterns while actual flowers are mostly small and insignificant and always three lipped. Both families are easily propagated from division and take easily in the Wet. Both Calatheas and Marantas, easily grown, are wonderful additions to the tropical garden.

Calathea burle-marxii cv "Blue Ice" - famous for its ice blue bracts like carved plastic. With plain green foliage to 1 metre, when well grown gives a stunning display. However it can be difficult to maintain in top condition and propagation of new plants is recommended to replace old specimens. Easily done by striking cuttings of flowered elbows with some leaf removed. Less attractive but more hardy and vigorous are cultivars "White Ice" and "Green Ice".

Calathea crotalifera "Rattle-snake plant". Inflorescences rise directly from the ground reaching

to 1 metre with yellow and orange-red bract forms.

Large growing Calathea lutea "Cigar plant" is even taller, up to 2.5 meters with green leaf and unusual cigar shaped brownish bracts.

Calathea makoyana "the Peacock plant", C. ornata, C. roseopicta, C. stromata and C. zebrina, are a clutch of fabulously patterned and coloured leaf forms, all easily grown and excellent to bring colour to the shaded garden. All are smaller than above plants.

Maranta bicolor and the varieties of M. leuconeura (the old original "Ten Commandments") are exceptional ground covers to about 15cm, again preferring dappled to full shade.


Dear Louise, Thank you for your letter. The Aristolchia you are wanting to attract the Cairns Birdwing is Aristolochia tagala. Plants are usually available at Envirocare, Limberlost and other good nurseries. If you know somebody with the vine, ask for seed which can be a bit

fiddley with quite good germination but very prone to damping off. The introduced and common Aristolochia elegans (Dutchmans Pipe or Calico Flower) is to be avoided as it is poisonous to the Birdwing larvae. The South American Aristolchia family has some stunning flowering vines and opinion is divided as to whether all are inimical hosts to the Cairns Birdwing. Responsible gardeners should pay close observation.

Here in the far north our "wet" season has only just begun but as last year's rains tapered off well into the winter months, we have hardly had time to miss it. The grass around our place only began to dry off in late November but since August of last year regular watering of the vegetable garden has been necessary.

We first started our current fruit and vegetable garden during the last part of winter in 1999. We had just moved to the tropics and my experience of gardening in clay soil was next to nil having grown up in a sandy area of the midwestern USA and then having lived in a sandy coastal town in NSW before moving here.

As I soon found out, clay is not the most forgiving surface, in fact it would be more accurate to say it can be down right impenetrable. My first attempt at working clay soil began when I watered a potential garden site, in the hopes of loosening the soil, and then spent several minutes digging a hole approximately 2 cm in depth. Having been told that the main growing season was almost over I was a bit anxious and resorted to drastic measures as we hauled in loads of compost and garden soil (the type you can easily dig in) to fill raised tank beds and topdress the hard clay soil. Later I learned a little patience would have made this process much easier as the rains do wonders for loosening hard soil.

Yet the results were worth the effort as a steep slope was terraced for 3 garden beds and 5 raised tank beds were added near the house. Only within the last year

was an attempt made to plant vegetables directly into clay and this time the rains had already loosened the soil and the use of compost greatly aided the growing process.

Next on the agenda was discovering what vegetables did well in the tropics especially during the wet season which was almost upon us. One of my favourites was discovered early, jicama, a root vegetable which has a mid to long term growing season (4-9 months), and is sold by Green Harvest in Maleny QLD. Jicama, which also goes by the name of yam bean, is especially good as it sets lots of seed so there is always an abundance for planting regularly throughout the year. It also self seeds easily without getting out of control as the seeds fall to the ground and are not blown or carried to other areas. Care does need to be taken with the seeds as they are toxic, but it also means that they can be planted directly into the soil and won't be eaten before they have a chance to sprout! Each month I plant a section of jicama so we are able to harvest roots all year and if planted in well composted soil harvested roots can weigh over 1.5 kg. We primarily use the root raw in salads or as a snack and guinea pigs love it.

Another bonus I find, especially with root crops, is during cyclones I cut the tops back to 6 inches or so and they survive the winds much more easily with less interruption to the growth cycle.




