

Kuranda Cemetery

At the Ordinary Meeting of the Mareeba Shire Council held on Wednesday 20th investigation to determine the viability of Lot 514 Plan SP248398 in Koah as a new February 2019, a resolution was passed that: That Council undertakes further investigation to determine the viability of Lot 514 Plan SP248398 in Koah as a new cemetery to service Kuranda and surrounding communities (see Map back page).

Information provided, in a report by the Manager of Technical Service, in the Agenda for the Meeting stated: "The Kuranda Cemetery is approaching its functional capacity and with initial investigations indicating no viable opportunities exist to extend the current facility; planning for the future needs of the community

A preliminary review of correctly tenured land parcels indicates no useable open spaces currently exist within the Kuranda township. However, a potentially suitable site has been identified near Koah which has the potential to provide for the long term needs of the community."

"The existing facility is reaching capacity, consideration as to how to meet the long-term needs of the community is required."

Due to environmental constraints Council is unable to extend the capacity of the existing facility.'

"Council officers will invite quotes for development of concept plans and cost estimates to confirm long term suitability and capacity of the proposed location."

Background supplied in regards to the existing Kuranda Cemetery is stated as: 'The existing Kuranda Cemetery is located at 1300 Kennedy Highway, Kuranda. The 5.3 acre parcel of land is a Cemetery Reserve and is bounded by the railway to the north, Kennedy Highway to the east and rainforest South and West, which limits its capacity for growth.

The remaining capacity of the Kuranda Cemetery is anticipated to have the ability to service the community for a period of 12 - 18 months. Initial investigations indicate no viable opportunities exist to extend the capacity of the current facility."

The report goes on to say: "A preliminary review of appropriately tenured land parcels indicates that no useable open spaces currently exist within the Kuranda township which are suitable to meet the long-term requirements of the community." And a recommendation is made: "That Council undertakes further

cemetery to service Kuranda and surrounding communities.'

No more details are supplied as to why Council feels there is no possibility of extending the life of the Kuranda Cemetery, what investigations have taken place or what criteria is used to determine if extending its life is viable or not.

Long term residents will no doubt be experiencing a sad sense of déjà vu in regards to this announcement. We went through much trauma and outrage over this very issue twenty years ago and following a concerted effort by the Kuranda community an agreement was made with the then Mareeba Shire Council and the Queensland State Government with the result that in the December 2001 edition of The Kuranda Paper Dr Lesley Clarke, then Member for Barron River wrote: "It has given me great satisfaction to assist the community in the resolution of an issue of major concern to the community, namely the future of the Kuranda cemetery. I am pleased to confirm that the Department of Natural Resources has now recommended approval for the road closure that will allow the cemetery to be extended, thereby guaranteeing that burials can occur locally for at least the next 30-40 years and bringing peace of mind to Kuranda families.

This outcome which the community believed put to rest, for a number of generations at least, the threat of burial in the Kuranda cemetery being denied (as happened in 1999) now seems to be in question. The Council at least in this case appears to be looking ahead which did not happen previously leading to refusals for grieving families. However, it appears that Council has moved ahead with a decision of gravest importance without consulting with our community, or learning from the past. In 1999 an ecumenical delegation including Father Chris Wright OAM, the late Milton Brim, Pastor Nigel Ackland, Krishna Buhler and Mark Freeman impressed upon the Council just how vital the Kuranda Cemetery was to this community. That importance has not lessened. Council is urged to consult with the Kuranda community.

It may also surprise many to find that the Kuranda cemetery is not Heritage listed in spite of its obvious significance. It is not even listed as an historic site within the Mareeba Shire.



Petition To Council

This week I presented to the Mareeba Shire Council meeting the petition containing over 1000 signatures asking for electoral divisions across the shire. The petition was worded by Mayor Tom Gilmore but did not quite reflect the Kuranda ambition that, regardless of divisions in other areas of the shire, Kuranda wants to be an electoral division in its own right. Mayor Gilmore had stipulated that he would only accept petition wording that called for whole-of-shire divisions. At the presentation, I was able to emphasise our desire to select our own person for representation on Council.

The sitting Council accepted the petition and agreed to have a report prepared to be presented at a later meeting.

This is a first step. You, the community, have done your bit and showed overwhelming support for the notion. This is going to be hard for Council to ignore.

We won't just sit and wait for a Council decision on our request (which could well be negative). We will now take our cause to the Minister for Local Government, well supported with arguments as to why a voice for Kuranda is needed, along with a copy of the convincing petition.

The next Local Government elections are in March 2020 and we'll be pulling out all the stops to be voting for our own voice at that time.

It's thanks to our *Kuranda Paper* that the petition did so well. With a clear and understandable explanation of what it was all about and the full-sized petition sheet on p.3 in last month's edition, most of Kuranda's population was reached. About half of all the petition sheets presented to Council were on KP's newsprint.

Another great asset to this community is Jo Martin's <u>kurandaregion.org</u>. It was via this online medium that 167 signatures were collected. Thanks Jo.

Kuranda Cemetery

Twenty years on and once again the Mareeba Shire Council wants to close the Kuranda Cemetery and move it west. Last time it was Lamb Range National Park, this time it is Koah.

I understand that the Kuranda Cemetery is costly to maintain. Much of it needs to be maintained by whipper snipper instead of

Kuranda's present cemetery has deep cultural and societal importance to our citizens. I have seen hundreds of mourners leave church and walk to the graveside to bury their dead. I have done it myself. I know of several occasions where mourners have walked the coffin to the graveside. Over a century of our dead lie here close to our village. Members of every Kuranda Aboriginal family, Diggers from the first and second world war, and Vietnam and others, entire families of our early settlers – the Austins, Veivers, etc. Many of my friends. Koah isn't really Djabugay land. Burying off-country is not good.

There is no reason to move it. The cemetery is built on a road reserve that parallels the railway reserve. It is easy to continue the cemetery to the next hill. Look at Google Earth to see the land available. Twenty years ago the Council came up with a cost of over \$300,000 to show how impossible it was to go to the next hill. It cost less than \$100,000. Sometimes Council reports reflect their desire – not reality.

Kuranda has always buried their dead differently to Mareeba, and many other towns. Most put their cemetery well out of town and that determines the culture of the locals' behaviour. In Kuranda we have it just 'across the road' and that has determined our behaviour.

Really, we are not asking much of Council to extend the existing site. We are only asking to bury our dead the way that we have for the last hundred years. It doesn't seem much to ask. It is what Councils are supposed to do.

Our Treasurer lost her father earlier this month so we are still catching up after her return. Apologies for any tardiness in replies – we will get back to everyone soon. We will be in contact soon to arrange pickups and answer any questions.

We are now ready to liaise with the Queensland State Library and The National Library in regards to allowing them to have access to our precious hard copies – we are even more determined (after a week where it was vital to access old information only available through past (hard print) copies of The Kuranda Paper) that we must pursue the digitalisation of our newspapers to make them accessible, sharable and searchable for all.

Recent news events have also shone a light on the lack of historic recognition of the Kuranda Cemetery and we have resolved to pursue local and/or State heritage listing to recognise its significance and importance to the history of this area.

We are still waiting to get back into our "home base" in the old Visitors' Information Centre space in the (almost) renovated ablutions block in Centenary Park. We are eager to get our digitisation equipment set up and to start collecting and cataloguing, as well as establishing training procedures for these and other tasks.

Members of the KHS Committee had a very helpful and productive meeting on Thursday February 21st with Dr Joanne Wills who is the Museum Development Officer for Far North Queensland (Queensland Museum Network). We have also been advised to develop a Collections Policy and we will be working on that in the next month. We also hope to develop a monthly newsletter for members



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"The view from here"

A monthly column by Michelle Murray-Beckman offering a glimpse into Kuranda's bespoke rainforest architecture along with interviews with residents who share with us why they have chosen to call Kuranda home.

Leon Cartledge

In life we are indeed fortunate if we can say that our profession is our vocation. Leon Cartledge describes being an Ambulance Officer as a vocation that chose him.

Leon has been a Paramedic with Queensland Ambulance Service for 35 years, 20 of those years as the Officer in Charge of the Kuranda station. The Kuranda ambulance station is the busiest two-man station in a region which stretches from Mission Beach in the south to Mossman in the north and west as far as Dimbulah and Georgetown. There are 22 stations in the region.

The Kuranda ambulance station is located near my house and I pass the station every day. Across the road from the station is a construction site that I have been watching with

keen interest over the last 17 months. I quickly made the connection that our local Ambo was involved in the build and so decided to pull over one day and say hello.

Modestly, Leon said "everyone knows my story" to which I replied that I don't, and it is quite likely that there are others in the community who are like me and who would like to "meet" our local paramedic through *The Kuranda Paper*. I added that I was curious about the Mediterranean design of his home and the second dwelling of the same style that nestles into the slope below the main structure and the story behind them.

Interestingly, Leon made the comment that the house design also chose him and his wife Belinda. This idea of being chosen for such important life decisions intrigued me and Leon agreed to be interviewed so we met a few days later.

We began with the story of how Leon became a Paramedic.

It was a tragic end to an evening spent celebrating Russell Muir's 19th birthday. Russell is Belinda's brother. Driving home together after dinner on wet roads in Victoria, Belinda (Leon's girlfriend at the time) and

Russell were involved in a serious car accident. The car they were driving in rolled several times and tragically Belinda's brother did not survive the accident. Fortunately, Belinda was unharmed.

Leon describes arriving at the scene and feeling an overwhelming sense of helplessness. At the time, he was a potter with the Bendigo Pottery and had never experienced such an event as this. Serendipitously, it was after this life changing moment that a close friend of Leon's had decided to sign up to become an Ambulance Officer and Leon knew that this was what he should do with his life.

Leon explains that the role of ambulance officer in the community is expanding into a paramedic practitioner model which is based around having a broader set of skills and expertise that will provide comprehensive care rather than more basic care such as emergency patient transport and treatment. He tells me that the Local Assessment and Referral Unit (LARU) will have an expanded scope of practice such as performing minor procedures and conducting follow up visits to patients. This will assist in alleviating hospital pressure and allow more patients to recover at home. It makes perfect sense in a small community such as Kuranda that our local paramedic can treat members of the community in their homes so that they can avoid a trip to hospital, particularly for cases such as thrombolysis (heart attack) where time is of the essence. This new model means that drugs can be delivered in the home that previously were only administered in hospital.

I feel deeply in awe of, and appreciation for those who work in healthcare, particularly front line health care.

We move on to Leon's other vocation that he shares with Belinda – that of designing and building their dream home. The inspiration for the design came from an eight-month sabattical the couple spent in Italy where they rented a villa on a seven-acre vineyard in Ponte a Moriano. Ponte a Moriano is a small, picturesque town near Lucca in Tuscany. My google search returns images of a classic Tuscan walled town on the Serchio river with a charming bridge spanning its banks. Of the 76 pictures on Trip Advisor, 74 of them are of food, so I can understand the attraction of settling in for some time.

Coming back to Kuranda the couple then began designing their Tuscan villa and collecting building materials over a four-year period. This project really is a Grand Designs episode. Arriving on site I felt like I was channelling Kevin McCloud as we made our way through the construction site. The buildings are at lock-up stage so the form is clearly discernible.

Leon and Belinda designed the two dwellings. Best-Overend & Associates (family relations of Belinda) drew the plans and Carl Neal and Sons is the builder. The main house is a two bedroom Italian villa. We make our way up the stairs with harmoniously curved hand rails, past a round window which Leon refers to as the snow globe because of the perfectly positioned view of the barn through it. The Master ensuite is a dream with its free standing copper bath. Back on the ground floor, the ceilings are lofty and the guest wing looks out through reclaimed, 130 year old antique hand crafted French doors with mortice and tenon joints that have been meticulously restored. Leon estimates that the doors have seen over 72,000 movements. This statistic demonstrates the level of investment Leon has in his

project.

Leon had an intention to use as much local timber as he could which honours Kuranda's early reliance on timber as an economic resource. He contacted local timber buffs and sawyers (a person who saws timber for a living) on the Southern Tablelands including Yungaburra and Malanda to source materials. Other materials came through local websites. The couple also travelled to Bali to source their "Saltito" tiles, the front door, bath and majestic seven-tier fountain.

The main posts in the living room of his house are from the Cairns Navy Wharf. Remainders that were surplus to the build have been set upright into the lawn and are affectionately referred to as "Woodhenge". If you look closely you can see remnants of shells in the bases revealing their watery history.

The verandah posts are from Freshwater Railway Station. Leon loves his timber. Bridge bearers cut from Syzygium Kuranda also known as Kuranda Satin Ash or Cherry Penda from the Kuranda Bridge were milled by Leon and cover the Master bedroom suite. He also designed and crafted the rustic, big boned timber fireplace surround and several ledge

and brace doors including the decorative iron door runners. Recycled Red Tulip Oak covers the floor in the kitchen.

The second, smaller villa is home to Belinda's father Barry Muir. Barry spends most of his days on site and I often see him on his mobility scooter pulling a trailer behind filled with building materials. He is clearly an asset to the team. According to Leon, the construction has given him a new lease on life and I can attest to his dedication to the project. Recently Barry built the perfect picket fence to delineate his studio from the remainder of the two acres that slope down to a seasonal creek and beyond.

In keeping with the main house, the Tallowwood posts on the verandah to Barry's studio were originally planted as a wind break in Millaa Millaa around the time of WWII. They were snapped off after a cyclone and stored until Leon gave them a new purpose. The same attention to design and detail here are a complement to the main structure.

Leon points out that the Builder Carl Neal, his son Rhuben Neal and the site foreman Justin Andreassend have all had an influence and contributed to the evolution of the build. He said that he encouraged creative licence where it fitted the vision. It helps when you have known your builders for years and have developed that trust.

This undertaking by Leon, Belinda and Barry is an intensely personal project and a labour of love. Leon refers to having some "skin in the game" when he talks about his contribution. Belinda is the chief interior designer and the colours that she has chosen such as Bora Bora for the turquoise blue doors and the Porters Paint colour "Potters Pink" for the exterior render show an understanding of the traditional Mediterranean style and her own flair for colour. Barry is a stalwart on site and as invested as Leon and Belinda.

The couple are documenting the process with photographs, drone footage with the intention of creating a book, just the kind that you can have on the coffee table of your Villa in the rainforest.

I ask the Grand Designs question – are you within budget? Leon looks at me sideways with a smile and says "we are on the edge, but I am confident we will make it".

We talk about the narrative of the build and the luxury of the house developing organically in some ways and controlled in others, where aspects of the design reveal themselves as it goes along. It's a little bit like your vocation and your house choosing you.

My final question is when do you expect to finish? His answer makes me smile – "It will be finished when it is done".



Another Walk for Cancer



ON 29TH SEPTEMBER 2018 I started to walk the Portuguese Coastal Cahmino up the coast of Portugal and into Spain, commencing in Porto and finishing in Santiago de Compostela. I walked to the Cathedral in the early hours before daybreak, the shadows dancing across the waters, the nerves in my stomach having a party. All I had to do was follow the yellow arrows and yellow walking man, it would be easy or so I thought.

The first day was long, hot and exhausting, my body still trying to adjust to the new country and leave jetlag behind. Thirty-two kilometres later I had to say enough was enough and accept a lift to my bed for the first night. Every bone and muscle in my body ached, every inch of skin bright red and wind swept but tomorrow would be another day and I would walk again. This was the life of a walker.

The next few days were long but the body started to adjust, the country was dry and beautiful, the coast rugged, the people friendly and welcoming. A rest day loomed and it gave me time to sleep, wash my two sets of clothes and taste the local food and wines. On the eighth day I crossed the water into Spain and a change of time. No wonder my body clock was upset. The days were still hot and long as I walked up the coast but I gradually changed route and I walked into Eucalyptus forests, a level above the coast so up several serious hills but always able to see the water.

The pilgrim walkers were starting to increase in numbers so my solitude was leaving me. The main reason I chose

this walk was to walk on my own. Walkers of all ages and nationalities, some with large heavy baggage on their backs, some with small day packs, some appearing to have walked a long distance, some fresh but all with one thing in mind and that was to reach Santiago. I am a slow walker; a dawdler who stops to takes photos of the alley cats and small insects, pats the guard dogs and stops to smell the roses. Santiago will always be there so I was in no hurry.





On the 12th October I walked into Santiago de Compostela. The temperature had dropped several degrees and it rained heavily all day as I marched through the vineyards with hundreds of other pilgrim walkers. I was wet through but elated at finally completing the walk, I had walked 356 kilometers. The next day after attending a Pilgrim Mass I collected my Compostela documents; these documents confirm that I had walked this pilgrimage or Camino.

As I wandered around the stone cobbled back streets and narrow alleyways of this interesting and very ancient city I watched the daily pilgrims stand before this majestic Cathedral, pleased with themselves at having completed the walk. I also was pleased that I had walked this short walk and raised \$1,000 for Cancer Queensland.

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Go To Sleep

You can hear the sound of your partner softly breathing, the whirr of the fan, the tick of the clock as you slowly drift off...or does the clock sound like thunder, your partner's breathing sound like a mack truck and the whirr of the fan more like a roar? And it just goes on and on and on...Maybe you drop off quickly but come 3am there you are, wide awake wondering what you did to deserve this? Awake again, before the dawn, being tortured for all your sins. You pick over every detail of every confrontation or dispute you've ever had. Arrrrrggghhhh...just go to sleep!

If only it were that easy! There are so many reasons that you either can't get to sleep or stay asleep. Stress, food and drink, health, hormones...all can disrupt our sleep.

What can we do to help get the sleep we need? Here's eight tips to get you snoozing!

- 1. Wake up at the same time every day! Research shows that it's not just the time we go to bed that is important but when we wake up to ensure we finish our last 90-minute sleep cycle. Waking before the last sleep cycle has finished can leave us feeling even more exhausted. Check out https://sleepcalculator.com/ to see when to get to bed!
- 2. Cut out tea/coffee/caffeinated drinks after 12 noon. This may seem obvious but how many of us resort to an afternoon cuppa to get through the afternoon slump?
- 3. Eat a light meal in the evening. This means your body isn't desperately trying to digest fatty or rich foods as well as get to sleep. You might find your liver getting jiggy with it about 3.00am trying to sort out all the fatty goodness or sugary fun you had before bed. All you'll know is that you're awake while the liver works overtime.
- 4. Skip the alcohol. Anyone else get 'the red wines'? It's waking at about 3.00am after a glass or three of alcohol. This is your liver getting extra active trying to process the alcohol. It also results in a much lighter, more disturbed sleep.
- 5. Before bed eat lots of tryptophan rich foods. This makes sure we have enough serotonin to help us relax and also to make melatonin which helps us sleep. Chicken, lentils, chickpeas, kidney beans, pumpkin, fish and seasame seeds are all loaded with typtophan goodness!
- 6. Have a look at some mindfulness meditation apps to sooth the mind after a long and busy day. Smiling Minds is a great free app with some short mindfulness meditations specifically for sleep.
- 7. Turn off the screens at least 30 minutes before bed or at the very least put a blue light filter on. We're very basic creatures. Our bodies respond to daylight by waking up. The blue light emitted from our screens mimics daylight. Put
- 8. Have a cup of soothing chamomile tea before bed. You can even add some passionflower to that. There are so many sleepy time teas available to choose from for your nightly cuppa that will nudge you into dreamland.

I'm feeling sleepy already! A cup of chamomile tea, a book and my bed are looking blissful...Good night!



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

Poison Free Kuranda – Roundup on Community Survey

Thank you to those residents who responded to our survey about the use of RoundUp and other Glyphosate-based herbicides in the Kuranda region. Respondents overwhelmingly (90%) support the transition away from toxic herbicides towards alternative weed management technologies. Residents also offered valuable feedback – stories, insights and observations from years of living in the region and witnessing the effect of spraying on human health and the environment.

Some of what you had to say:

"Having lived in Kuranda for 16 years, I have noticed a huge drop in insects that is alarming to me. We know it is a worldwide problem that threatens our very existence. . .time to get serious about cleaning up our act — we DONT need chemicals!!!!"

"I would like a council audit on how long and where they are using it...also an audit of doctors' records as well to coincide usage and disease rates..."

"Instead, we could replant the roadsides and shade out any weeds, resulting in no maintenance. On top of that we would have shaded roads with more human comfort for those driving or walking along them."

Time for Kuranda's Voice on Council

We hope that the petition for divisional representation in Mareeba Shire is successful. It's about time that our unique Kuranda voice is heard in Council chambers.

Taxpayers Bill of \$1.3m for Hinchinbrook Resort Clean-up

On its northern end, an old resort stands as a derelict eyesore and reminder of how successful – or otherwise – private enterprise has been on Hinchinbrook Island. The now abandoned Cape Richards resort was badly damaged in cyclone Yasi and its leaseholder refused to pay to clear up the mess.

Finally Kate Jones, Queensland Tourism Minister has committed \$1.3 million dollars to remove the resort ruins. However it looks as if the government remains inexplicably optimistic about private tourism on cyclone-prone Hinchinbrook. Tenders have been put out for 60 year contracts for tourism companies for not only Hinchinbrook but also the Whitsundays and the Great Sandy National Park.

FoE FNQ was informed by ministerial staff that the contract on Hinchinbrook would be for glamping and wilderness hiking – and that such a contract would allow for removal of rainforest for infrastructure such camping sites, huts and helicade

"Cape Richards is an example of how private term leases go wrong in National Parks," said Bill Sokolich, Kuranda local and Hinchinbrook campaigner. "It seemed to be incredibly hard for the government to revoke the lease and clean it up after it was abandoned.

"Term leases also run counter to the most basic tenant of National Parks: they are there for nature conservation in perpetuity and not to be privatised for personal gain."





Tiger Huntsman

Kuranda local Ruth Van de Velde is one of lucky few to encounter this beautiful Tiger Huntsman spider, and capture its beauty for us to share.

The Tiger Huntsman is one of Australia's most spectacular spiders. Local residents Alan and Deanna Henderson of Minibeast Wildlife (regular contributors to *The Kuranda Paper*) first collected this species in 2006 and at that stage there were no official records of it.


In December 2006, while on a field trip in North Queensland for Melbourne Museum they discovered this amazing spider, the likes of which they had never seen before.

They knew immediately that this was something special, and it was no surprise to find on their return to the Museum that it was a new species to science. The initial female specimen was gravid and at Melbourne Museum they managed to raise and even breed from her offspring. Specimens have been submitted to Australia's huntsman taxonomists, and the species awaits classification.

The Hendersons have been keeping and breeding Tiger Huntsmans since 2007 and say they have learnt a great deal about the husbandry of these intriguing spiders.

Enter the Ozzie mammals. Many of our small mammals eat fungi as part of their diet, but some have become specialist gourmet truffle eaters. These include the bettongs and potoroos, small members of the kangaroo family. Over 90% of their diet is fungal and much of that is truffle. You may well ask how they locate the truffles when they are hidden from sight. The answer is another amazing adaptation of the truffle's underground lifestyle. As the fruit matures it emits pheromones, which are highly attractive for the bettongs. They sniff out the fruit, dig it up, consume the nutrient dense package and move on. They pass the spores in their scats as they go. This is a highly efficient spore dispersal mechanism, which includes delivery of the spores in a little dollop of moist fertiliser. The casual consumers of fungi – antechinus, bush rats, wallabies, even brush turkeys – contribute a small portion to this dispersal. However, the specialists consume a much greater diversity and quantity of truffles. So their role is critical in the ecosystem.



The next step in the story is that for the fungi to grow, they need the partnership of eucalypts. The trees produce sugars, through photosynthesis, some of which they trade with their fungal partners in exchange for water and minerals. A mutually beneficial arrangement indeed!

Clearly this interconnected relationship between tree, truffle and mammal is a very effective part of the ecosystem. It is also very vulnerable. Changes that affect any part of that relationship could potentially destroy the lot.



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Mareeba Airport Upgrade



Stage 1 of the Mareeba Airport Upgrade Project will be officially opened on Thursday 7 March 2019 by Senator Ian Macdonald, Cynthia Lui MP, State Member for Cook on behalf of the Hon. Cameron Dick MP, Minister for State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning, and Mareeba Shire Mayor Tom Gilmore.

- **Stage 1** includes the construction of a new 52-lot commercial precinct connected to water, sewerage, power and telecommunications. Stage 1 has also included connection of potable water supply and upgrades to the airport fire-fighting system. Surrounding roads and associated infrastructure have also been upgraded.
- Mareeba Shire Council received \$5 million from the Australian Government and \$13 million from the Queensland Government towards the upgrading of the Mareeba Airport.
- Last year, Council received a further \$5 million from the Australian Government under the Building Better Regions Fund to further enhance the Stage 2 upgrades.
- **Stage 2** work is underway and includes upgrade of the runway, taxiways and airfield lighting.


How To Become an Amazon Bestseller: seminar





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

Extinction Rebellion's aim and mission is to create a world that is regenerative and fit for generations to come through non-violent means that achieves this by challenging current power systems - "To spark and sustain a spirit of creative rebellion, which will enable much needed changes in our political, economic and social landscape."

The group is a support and encouragement organisation that can train and mobilise people to bring about positive change to current toxic systems. Currently this is to challenge our world leaders and governments on denial and planet destroying systems that they inexplicably keep supporting.

"World leaders have failed to adequately confront the existential threats posed by climate and ecological breakdown, let alone the causes of the crises. Polite lobbying, marching, voting, consumer- and shareholder-activism, have all failed. We are now on the brink. If asking the establishment nicely doesn't get them to act, then the only option left is civil disobedience, to disrupt the ordinary working of things, so that decision makers HAVE to take notice."

The 'social contract' between citizen and government has been broken. It is now normal for vested interests to dominate real world political policy leading to denial, politic rhetoric and dangerous inaction from our world governments. Therefore, people must take up the right and moral duty to bypass criminal governments and defend all of life itself. Some of our children are already trying to get their governments tried for of crimes against humanity. There are no excuses left.

"We have presented governments with pretty hard choices. We have pointed out the enormous benefits of keeping to 1.5C, and also the unprecedented shift in energy systems and transport that would be needed to achieve that," said Jim Skea, a co-chair of the working group on mitigation for the UN IPCC. "We show it can be done within laws of physics and chemistry. Then the final tick box is political will.'

Frustration and urgency are growing in many of us: we are wondering what we are doing going in our lives and work, many of us are feeling it is pointless and currently not where our energies should be directed, many of us are weary - of rhetoric, of stupidly, of a growing lack of compassion and tolerance. Many more of us are very frightened.

So, what to do... Join the growing requests that are flooding into the Extinction Rebellion site and declare International Non-Violent Rebellion Against the World's Governments for Criminal Inaction on the Ecological Crisis. https://ausrebellion.earth

Closer to home join the Australian Earth Laws Alliance (AELA) which promotes and supports Earth Jurisprudence or Earth Laws. Earth jurisprudence is a new legal theory and fast-growing social movement that proposes we 'rethink our legal, political, economic and governance systems so that they support, rather than undermine, the integrity and health of the Earth.' https://www.earthlaws.org.au

And join any of the environmental and justice groups that are fighting for the continuation of this planet for all species and life on earth. Write long letters full of grief and anger to your government and leaders asking why they are participating in crimes against humanity?

Or go further and join Xiuhtezcatl Martinez, and his peers in suing your federal government for violating your constitutional right to life, liberty, prosperity, and the pursuit of happiness or whatever your country's constitution says.

Stir up some civil disobedience and save a planet!



SPREAD THE WORD: Easy Ways To Use Kale

Kale is well known as a SuperFood but don't let that put you off. It is also delicious but can require a little attention to unlock its potential. There are usually two common kinds of kale available – the Curly Leaf Kale (which must be as fresh as possible because it can get tough and bitter otherwise. Don't pick any bunches with yellowing leaves. Once you get it home, soak in cool water for a little while, drain and wrap in a damp tea towel until preparing). The other commonly available kale is the smoother, darker green Tuscan Kale. Either versions can have tough stems so it's best to strip off the leaves for most recipes (though stems can be chopped and frozen to add to soups etc later). Once you have your leaves ready there are recipes galore for salads, baked dishes, smoothies etc (Google away). Here are four recipes for kale spreads to have on hand for a daily dose of green goodness.

Enjoy – **Queenobeans**



Super Kale Pesto via cookieandkate.com

Makes about 11/4 cups

Ingredients: 2-3 cloves peeled garlic, 3 cups packed kale leaves, 3/4 cup hemp seeds or toasted nuts of choice, 2 tbsp lemon juice (about 1 lemon), 3/4 tspn sea salt, 1/4 tspn ground pepper, chilli flakes, optional, 1/4 cup flaxseed oil or extra-virgin olive oil (more if desired).

Method: In a food processor, add garlic and process until minced. Add the kale, hemp seeds, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Turn on the food processor and drizzle in the oil. Process until the pesto reaches your desired consistency, stopping to scrape down the sides as necessary. Taste and add more lemon, salt or pepper if necessary. (You can thin out the pesto with more oil, but if you're serving with pasta, keep in mind that you can also thin it out with reserved pasta cooking water.)

Kale Chimichurri Sauce via mantitlement.com

Makes up to 6 servings

Ingredients: ¹/₄ cup fine chopped parsley, ¹/₄ cup fine chopped kale (and other leafy greens if desired), ² tbsp fine chopped shallot, ³ minced garlic cloves, ¹/₂ cup olive oil, ¹ tspn honey, ¹/₄ tspn sea salt, ¹/₂ tspn crushed red pepper flakes.

Method: If you have the patience and time, chop by hand and mix together, otherwise blend in a processor taking care to keep a little chunky. Delicious sauce which has many uses.

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Curried Lentil and Kale Hummus

Makes up to 6 servings

Ingredients: 1 cup cooked brown lentils (fresh cooked and cooled or canned), ½ cup walnuts, ½ red onion, chopped, 2 cups organic kale leaves, ½ tspn curry powder, 2 tbsp lemon juice, ½ tspn fine sea salt, ¼ tspn black pepper, 1 cup water.

Method: Add all ingredients to a food processor or high powered blender. Blend on high for 2-3 minutes or until smooth and creamy or your desired texture.

Banging Vegan Kale Basil Sauce

via thismessisours.com

Yields 2 to 2½ cups

Ingredients: 1 cup raw cashews, soaked overnight, drained and rinsed, 1 poblano chilli pepper, roasted, seeds and skin removed, 1 cup warm vegetable broth, ½ cup fresh basil leaves, ½ cup flat leaf parsley leave and stems, ½ cup shredded Tuscan kale leaves, 1 medium-sized clove garlic, peeled and roughly chopped, 2 tbsp minced shallot, juice of 1 lemon, kosher salt and ground coarsely ground black pepper to taste.



Method: Place all of the ingredients in the order listed into a high powered blender. Blend until completely smooth. Use immediately or store refrigerated in an airtight container for up to three days.

KURANDA CEMETERY: Within the next two to three years, the current Kuranda Cemetery will have reached its maximum capacity and a new cemetery needs to be established. Council has carefully looked at the land parcels it has available in the area and the only one which appears to be suitable is at Koah. Council will undertake further investigation to determine the viability of the site located opposite the Koah service station off the Kennedy Highway as a new cemetery to service Kuranda and surrounding communities.

APPROVED ANIMAL INSPECTION PROGRAM: Council officers will be conducting a 'doggy doorknock' in a few months' time to ensure residents are being responsible pet owners. I encourage everyone to ensure their dogs are registered with the Council and comply with regulations.

RECYCLING EFFORTS CONTINUE: The Kuranda drop off point continues to be popular as is the drop-off point at the transfer station. Remember cardboard and paper is recycled through the general waste stream and not through normal recycling. General waste goes through a recycling process itself and over 50% of it is diverted from landfill, making us one of the highest recycling Councils in the State.

WASTE LEVY: The new State Government Waste Levy comes into effect on 1st July 2019. While its impact on residential waste is yet to be felt, all commercial waste will be impacted by the new \$75 tonne levy which is payable to the State.

I'D SET UP MY FISH TANK PERFECTLY. Crystal clear water, a fantastic variety of plants and plankton, rocks and reef, sand and gravel. Then I added the fish. They swam in a riot of colour and shapes. It was perfect ¬- a delicate balance. The fish gathered in small groups to protect their eggs in the gravel, and to harvest the plants more effectively, and the balance remained.

But then the goldfish began organising the other fish into schools. Arranging the gravel became a bit more efficient and collecting food was a little easier, and so the goldfish became fatter with the extra. It did create conflicts among the goldfish, and the schools would have to fight to gain the best food or gravel pits or sometimes just to prove they had the best goldfish.

The bigger their schools were, the fatter the goldfish became, so they encouraged the other fish to collect more edible plants and create more gravel pits for more eggs. Even though they became as fat as they possibly could, they still wanted more.

Goldfish are dumb.

Some of the inedible plants and plankton were destroyed by the fish to make room for the others; some were destroyed by accident. As gravel became scarce, the goldfish had the other fish break down the reef and rocks to make more. My tank was still OK – for a while.

Some of the other fish pointed out that the rocks and reef might be useful just as they were and the plants which disappeared could have been as well. The goldfish scoffed. They told the other fish that unless they kept getting more food, making more gravel pits and laying more eggs all the fish would grow thin. The goldfish urged this even though it was obvious that it could not last. When some fish pointed this out, the goldfish would say "That's ridiculous; it's a huge tank. Now look over here", or "Look over there", and the other fish would be distracted and they'd soon forget

Some of the smartest fish noticed the tank warming up and that the water was not as clear. They predicted the bad things that would happen soon. The goldfish scoffed again and did nothing.

Goldfish are dumb.

The smarter fish said that the problems with the tank were because of excess food collection and breaking rocks and reef into gravel and sand. When their predictions came true, the goldfish had to admit they were wrong and some got together to solve the problem. They decided to break only the cleanest rocks into gravel and to increase the efficiency of getting food. How else would all of next months' eggs be fed?

Some fish pointed out that if all the fish laid fewer eggs, the main problems with the reef, gravel, plants and plankton would just go away. The goldfish would still be fat and there would be plenty of food for all. But the goldfish said, "Look over here" or "Look over there" or "Look at this bright new thing", and the other fish got distracted and forgot.

Even when the smart fish discovered the tank was getting dirtier and hotter faster than they first predicted, and even though all the fish could now see the terrible effects already happening, the goldfish did virtually nothing. They'd say "Well, I'm doing more that that goldfish" and "We need another gravel pit over here, more eggs are coming", or "Look over there" or "Look at this bright new thing". And the other fish would look around and get distracted and forget.

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EXPANDING THE NURSERY

With gifts of nursery benching (thanks Tony Osborne), we're in the process of building more potting benches to ease congestion in the work area.

More and more people are bringing in seeds that we can't bear to waste so we're always sowing seeds. Then there's potting the seedlings and then potting them up into larger pots for more advanced sizes.

On top of that, we have more volunteers, so we need more room to move.

Fortunately, the plants move out as quickly as new ones grow to take their place, so we are maintaining our nursery area, just making it more efficient.

HEAT WAVES

No amount of watering will save some plants in heat wave conditions. If this level of heat is a way of the future, it may be indicating which plants can survive and which can't. Reading the signs and adapting accordingly may be showing us the choices we need to make from now on.



There's something primeval about new life emerging from a seed pushing up through the soil. Here is the lovely Maniltoa lenticellata, Cascading Bean, coming to life. This seed came from the tree outside the Kuranda Post Office. It is notable for the brilliant pink bunches of new leaves that cascade over the tree.

The KCons community nursery is nearly always open at 1 Pademelon Lane (cnr Fallon Rd and Kennedy Hwy).

Oh boy! Hasn't it been hot, dry, wet and windy! Yet the nursery has stood up to the lot and hardly a plant has suffered too badly. It's been a good year for seeds resulting in a great deal of new growth. We're potting madly at the moment, but still the seeds come followed by the tiny new plants. It's a race to keep up.

> > There's little to report on **CASSOWARIES** on the Kuranda Range Road because NOTHING HAS **BEEN DONE** in the last month. We wrote a strong letter to DMR and DES, holding them to account for any ill that might befall the adult (Karl) and his chick on the roadside. We pointed out that a wiremesh fence can be erected off the road, out of sight, to prevent the birds from accessing the roadway, effectively blocking off the space between the existing Armco barriers. No response. Dept Transport & Main Roads works to formulae. There's not much in the way of innovation. If the formula doesn't fit, then basically whatever needs to be done, can't be.

> > Cassowaries on the roadway doesn't fit any formula, so there's no way to address the problem. You can sense our frustration.

We're working on identification templates to help us describe the cassowaries that appear in our neighbourhoods. Along with this, we're creating family trees for the groups of birds, e.g. the Black Mountain Road birds (Dad with Missy then Gertie and their offspring) and the Speewah group (Cadagi Boy with Cadagi Ma and their offspring Lucas and his offspring, Zorro). It's hard because we lose track of the juveniles when they leave the parent birds. Now there's a project!

This is a safe, fun way that you can contribute to eradicating these pests and protecting our unique wildlife and forests.





Vigilance – the Price for our Lifestyle and Forests

There's been a discovery of a Yellow Crazy Ant (YCA) infestation site at Green Forest Road, Kowrowa. It's probably two to three years old, judging by the spread, not fully defined yet.

Our regenerating rural residential forested blocks are ideal habitat for these ants which are on the list of the 100 most invasive species in the world. The YCA threaten your lifestyle (just ask long term Russet Park residents about the impact, driving residents away from their gardens). YCA can ultimately eliminate all creatures in our forests. The eradication will depend on your direct help. Don't assume someone else will sort it.

Qld Biosecurity gave up the fight in 2012. Now WTMA has a great success story, with a community based approach. BUT... Funding for the current Wet Tropics Management Authority treatment program is ceasing in June this year. Lobbying for further funding, by our local MP's is assured, but we will need to add our voices and try to find any other sites sooner than later.

We are devising a more precise way for you to monitor, right across Kuranda, to determine if there are any further undiscovered infestations. For now — keep alert for ants which you haven't seen before especially if you notice all other ants seem to have vanished except one species. It could be YCA



(Ngawunggu djugabal ganil bidjirra.) I'm tying up a djugabal (framework for a bayu a shelter) with split lawyer cane. GARRAY: to come. (Garran!) Come! (Ngawu garrang.) I'm coming.

GUNBIL: to weave or plait. (Wulam milba yimbi gunbil.) Wulam is good at weaving yimbi.

GUNDAL: to make. (Nyurra ngayang mundu gurii gundal.) You make my spirit good.
MAGAYIY: to climb, to rise. (Gindan magaying.) The moon is rising.
MAGARRIL: to pick up. (Nyurran gambi magarri!) Pick up your clothes!

MARRIY: to cross. (Wawun djumburru-la marring djalabagirr.) Brush turkey is crossing to the other side of the road.

NAMBIL: to hold. (Djandal nambi! Magayin!) Hold on the fig root! Climb up!

NYINAY: to sit. (Nyinan gundii!) Sit there! (Ngawu nyinang gulun.) I'm sitting here. WALNGGAL: to float. (Ngudaa walnggal djin. gal-nda.) Clouds are floating in the sky. WUNA: to lie down. (Nyurra wunan gundii!)

WUNA: to lie down. (Nyurra wunan gundii!) You lie down there! (Ngawu wunang gulun.) I'm lying here.

WUNGAY:to drink. (Bana wungan!) Drink water! (Ngawu bana wungang-ala.) I'm drinking bana now.

NGIRRMA EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND

The Bama (people) of this area (bulmba) shared a common ngirrma, language.

The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like the archaic English word 'aye' for yes.

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have people been able to preside continuously in one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual world 'bulmba' has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of the year, the season and the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for help with selection of wordsearch words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation for its work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

For – Y conjugation verbs:

nyina-y belongs to the-y conjugation.

To make the present tense take off the -y and replace it with -ng.

Ngawu nyinang. I am sitting, I sit...(present)

To make the future tense take off the -y and add -na

Nyurra nyinana nguma. You will sit tomorrow...(future)

To make the past tense take off the -y and add-ny

Ngawu nyinany bugaarra. I sat down yesterday...(past) To make a command take off the -y and add -n.

Nyurra nyinan! You sit down! (command)

For –l conjugation verbs:

Ngawu minya dugal. I'm getting minya. The –l marks the present.

To make the future add-na:


Ngawu minya dugalna nguma. I'll catch minya tomorrow. (future)

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A Thought for March

We are listening to the heart of Jesus' public ministry. Every word of this passage, and of what comes before and after it in this chapter, will be relevant for human life for all time. Here Jesus communicates a vision of human life and human relationships which challenges all our normal levels of acceptance.


"Love your enemies, do good ... bless ... pray for those who abuse you." This whole passage stands like a mountain peak in the moral and ethical imagination of humanity. It is a statement of the ultimate: it is not possible to reach above or beyond it. Perhaps that is why he repeats the challenge in image after image. Loving, doing good, blessing, praying, offering the other cheek, offering one's shirt, responding to begging — each one of these images repeats the demand for the ultimate moral response not merely to friend but also to enemy, to

The question we must ask ourselves is can we respond to this demand? All of us are quite safe in saying No! Then why does this seemingly impossible demand haunt us. Why does it continue to shine like a light in all the darkness of human experience? For two reasons. Jesus did not just say these things to us; he lived them among us. To give oneself totally? He did. To pray for those who abuse us? He did. To love one's enemies? He did. This is why this passage can never be dismissed as idle dreaming for human life. We cannot dismiss something as unreal and visionary if it becomes real in front of our eyes and walks among us as Jesus did.

The second reason this vision of human response will not go away is that there is something in us that responds to it even if we cannot reach its ultimate heights. That something is perhaps the most wonderful and valuable element in our human nature. Saint John once spoke of it as "the light that lightened every man that cometh into

It is a light that, though it can be brought very low by our own will and our own self, can never be extinguished. It is this lesser light in our lives which reaches out for the greater light which is Christ. Jesus light blinds us but we are attracted to it like a plant bending towards the light. As Isaiah said centuries before the time of Jesus, "The people who walk in darkness have seen a great light." Who are these people? We are.

Jesus shares his vision of human behaviour totally obedient to God. We cannot live this vision but it will be light and grace to us for ever.




"The property has access off both the Kennedy Highway and Koah Road and is currently tenured as 'Reserve – Strategic Land Management' (refer Attachment 2), which affords Council the ability to utilise it for cemetery purposes. The site is approximately 37.9 acres in size, significantly larger than the existing location (5.3 acres), with a large proportion expected to be suitable for use as single depth burial.

Possible constraints affecting the location include an existing waterway which bisects the property and gradients which may restrict burial from some areas of the site, however sloping areas may lend themselves as suitable for the establishment of a carpark and roadway within the land."

Kuranda Cemetery History

The earliest date recorded on gravestones in the Kuranda Cemetery is 1910. However, it is thought that there were informal burials previous to that date as Kuranda waited two decades for the cemetery to be officially established and named. The first record of a community push for a cemetery appears in *The Cairns Post*, December 9th 1909: "MEETING AT KURANDA. A meeting of the residents of Kuranda is called by the Progress Association to be held at the Barron Falls Hotel on Saturday next, at 8 o'clock in the evening to arrange for procuring a site for a cemetery and to improve the town common." (source: Trove)

In a situation which seems timeless and familiar, the request is passed back and forwards between council/s and State but at some point, evidently after a number of burials had already occurred, the Kuranda Cemetery becomes a reality.

The first mention of the "Kuranda Cemetery", as such, to be found online appears in *The Cairns Post* on July 7th 1921: "Young Lad's Death. William Edward, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Watkin, Kuranda, died on Wednesday, aged twelve years, and will be interred this afternoon at the Kuranda Cemetery. Great sympathy is felt with the bereaved family."

Possibly the most "famous" grave in the Cemetery is that of Frederick Parkhurst Dodd, the magnificently named "Butterfly Man of Kuranda", known internationally as both an entomologist and a great Kuranda character. His grave is still the subject of occasional pilgrimages by admiring entomologists. Our photo of his newly cleaned headstone (2008) is by local entomologist David Rentz (bunyipco.blogspot.com). Another cleaning trip is being planned, such is Parkhurst Dodd's enduring stature in that world.

It needs to be said that in the hundreds of graves, be they famous, humble or even unknown, are people whose lives shaped Kuranda and district and each deserves lasting respect and thanks from we who have inherited their legacy. May they rest in peace.
