2016 State Referendum – Fixed Term Parliament


The Electoral Commission of Queensland will conduct a State Referendum on Saturday 19th March 2016 in conjunction with the Local Government Quadrennial Elections. The referendum seeks approval from Queenslanders to change the term of Queensland State Parliament.

Currently, Queensland's State Parliament sits for a term no longer than three years. The referendum calls for electors to either vote 'Yes' or 'No' to approve the Constitution (Fixed Term Parliament) Amendment Bill 2015 which seeks to change parliament's term to a fixed four years.

Arguments for and against are now available to be viewed on the Commission's website at <http://www.ecq.qld.gov.au/elections/2016-state-referendum>.

Copies of the arguments will also be mailed to each Queensland elector in the next week along with the Voter Information Letter, which contains important information about the Referendum and Local Government Elections.

A Cautionary Note to Aspiring Kuranda MSC Candidates

You cannot win a place on Council if you are depending on the Kuranda vote. The population base for the Mareeba Shire is in Mareeba. If you win a place it will be because you attracted the vote from Mareeba. Look at the numbers: Mareeba and surrounds' voting population is over 12,000. Kuranda's is about 3000. Even if everyone in Kuranda votes for you, which they won't, you won't stand a chance.

This is because Mareeba Shire no longer has divisions. Kuranda used to be Division 4 and we had a local representative for that reason. In those days, if the majority in Kuranda voted for you, you won the seat. That has now changed. The wisdom behind eliminating divisions is that all councillors should represent all corners of the shire with equal dedication. Admirable but unrealistic. Kuranda has been in this situation before – we had no voice. We were consulted to some extent, but we were powerless. Now, it's back to those days.

If you are part of a team, you might pick up Mareeba votes from voters supporting all members of a team. But, voters tend to vote for who they know. If you are not known in Mareeba you are not likely to do well. Please prove me wrong.

If you want to do something for Kuranda, lobby for a Kuranda division. It's too late for the next three years, but maybe there's a chance to change things in the future.

Road Works

Ratepayers are well aware of the impact Rates notices have upon their budget twice every year, and no doubt struggle accordingly. So the expenditure of these funds is critical.

This letter is about the irresponsible and profligate expenditure of some of this money.

Anyone using Myola Road would be well aware of the dangerous problem facing motorists once crossing the Owen Creek bridge and the big dip past the bridge – with NIL visibility for motorists driving up the incline and with the same NIL visibility for motorists leaving High Chapparal Road, turning right onto Myola Road.

There was at one stage a mirror in place to assist motorists exiting High Chapparal, this was removed and left drivers to take "pot luck" when exiting.

Well, the powers that be making decisions with our Capital Works Funds have come in with a BIG BANG theory, to the extent of leaving onlookers aghast. With NO consultation with the local residents who repeatedly over the years have brought this to the attention of Council.

All that was needed (the KISS principle – Keep It Simple Stupid) whereby the top of the rise is removed by about a metre and bitumen replaced – no bypassing roads, no curbing and channelling and problem solved. KISS.

This Capital Works expenditure simply ticks Council's box, at no time addressing the serious and dangerous visibility problem that has/is and will remain on the completion of these

extravagant roadworks.

To the motorists using this section of our roads and to the residents of High Chapparal Road, we will hold the Council responsible for the outcome. This profligate use of our scarce capital funds could have been better spent – starting with a shade cover over our pool during the summer months.

Response to Nadine O'Brien 'Environmental Concerns'

Re Letter to the Editor, *The Kuranda Paper* February 2016 Issue 273.

As the developer of eco@jumrum in Kuranda I would like to provide an official response to Nadine O'Brien's letter that was published in Issue 273. The letter point blank refutes the truth of our communications message which is based on eco@jumrum's integrity as an environmental development. She incorrectly infers that what we claim is purely marketing 'spin' and questions our ethics as developers.

Real estate development is a very broad term for an industry of people and organisations who cannot be pigeon-holed or packaged. Yes, I agree that there have been many ill-conceived developments that have forsaken the environment in lieu of financial gain. I, for one, am not that person. I have worked hard all my life and it is with an empathy and passion for the environment that we as a family based development company go about our business.

It was with these intentions in mind that we set about the challenging negotiation with the Urban Development Institute of Australia (UDIA) to ensure that what we were offering was an environmental development. The word 'environment' is not used lightly but taken seriously. As such we spent a lot of time, money and hard work to ensure we achieved EnviroDevelopment certification – the first in north Queensland in fact. EnviroDevelopment is a scientifically-based assessment scheme that independently reviews development projects and awards certification to those that achieve outstanding performance across four or more of six distinct sustainability measures – Ecosystems, Waste, Energy, Materials, Water and Community.

When Adam Gowlett, UDIA (Queensland) Cairns Branch President, presented us with our certification in November of last year he was publicly quoted as follows:

"What the UDIA's EnviroDevelopment certification does is create a structural framework for developers to promote assimilation and protection of the natural environment.

"We applaud Mr Taylor for his highly sensitive and forward thinking approach – an example of which is the restriction of a 2000 square metres building envelope (of each allotment, which range in size from 3000 square metres to 7000 square metres), with the remainder of the land protected by a strict covenant for perpetuity. Added to this, the covenants dictate that lots cannot be fenced beyond the building envelope.

This is another protective measure being undertaken to ensure connectivity or the free movement of fauna," he said.

It is hard to imagine that 20 years ago there was nothing on the eco@jumrum site – it had been totally cleared. Since then regrowth has created a leaf canopy that will allow the regeneration of a natural rainforest. We will be doing everything we can to ensure it is protected and improved. This even includes partnering with EnviroCare to undertake rehabilitation works for Jumrum and Ulysses Creeks.

We have also put a number of incentives for buyers in place to do their bit in protecting their environment while creating a legacy for the future. This includes the presentation of specific design plans for each lot showing buyers the best place to build according to sun and prevailing breezes, subsidising native landscape packages up to \$2,000 if purchased from Envirocare, and the provision of a compost bin.

I trust this letter has satisfied your readers as to the extent in which we are working to deliver sound environmental outcomes for this very special piece of land.





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Land Clearing Accelerating in Queensland

Land clearing has returned to Queensland in a big way. After concern was expressed [by *The Conversation*] that policy changes since 2012 would lead to a resurgence in clearing of native vegetation, this outcome was confirmed by government figures released late last year.

It is now clear that land clearing is accelerating in Queensland. The new data confirm that 296,000 hectares of bushland was cleared in 2013-14 – three times as much as in 2008-09 – mainly for conversion to pastures.

Alarming, the data show that clearing in catchments that drain onto the Great Barrier Reef increased dramatically, and constituted 35% of total clearing across Queensland in 2013-14. The loss of native vegetation cover in such regions is one of the major drivers of the deteriorating water quality in the reef's lagoon, which threatens seagrass, coral reefs, and other marine ecosystems.

Land clearing affects all Australians, not just Queenslanders. Australia spends hundreds of millions of dollars each year trying to redress past environmental damage from land clearing. Tens of thousands of volunteers dedicate their time, money and land to the effort.

But despite undeniable local benefits of such programs, their contribution to national environmental goals is undone, sometimes many times over, by the damage being done in Queensland.

Take the federal government's 20 million trees program. At a cost of A\$50

million, it aims to replace 20 million trees by 2020 to redress some of the damage from past land clearing.

Yet just one year of increased land clearing in Queensland has already removed many more trees than will be painstakingly planted during the entire program.

Species cannot recover if their habitat is being destroyed faster than it is being restored. But under Caring for our Country and Biodiversity Fund grants, the extent of tree planting to restore habitat across Australia reported since 2013 is just over 42,000 hectares - an order of magnitude less than what was cleared in Queensland alone in just two years.

We are running up a large environmental debt that will eventually have to be paid by all Australians, one way or another.

And some damage, like the loss of a species, is irreversible.

Previous native vegetation laws had successfully reduced land clearing, but were reversed in 2013 by the former Newman government.

The current Palaszczuk government in Queensland has repeated its election promise to re-strengthen native vegetation protections. The amendment bill is due to be introduced to parliament within weeks.

But the minority government relies on the votes of cross-benchers to pass its legislation—so for now, the future of some of Australia's most precious environmental assets remains uncertain.




I am standing for a position of an Independent Councillor for Mareeba Shire Council.

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Bee-haviour

THIS month we look at one of my favourite native bees, the Blue Banded Bee (Genus Amegilla). These delightful bees are a bit larger than a European honey bee (about 11mm long) and have iridescent blue bands of fur across their abdomen. They display a darting, hovering flight pattern, and buzz a little louder than a honey bee when flying.

There are around 25 species of the Blue banded bee that can be found in all parts of mainland Australia. These warmer months are the time to spot the adult bees in your garden. They are particularly active in the Kuranda area



right now, so keep an eye out on your herbs and vegetables and you will probably see at least one pollinating your crop.

You will not see these bees in winter as the adult bees die as the temperature drops. However, the young bees are dormant inside the nest and will emerge as adults when spring arrives.

They are solitary bees, (i.e. they do not live in colonies), although they do tend to pick nesting sites close to others and can form a kind of 'neighbourhood' of nests if a good nesting site is available.

After mating, the female Blue Banded bee builds a nest on her own, in shallow soil or clay and sometimes in bricks and mortar.

At the end of the nest tunnel she will lay an egg with a pollen/nectar mix which is food for the larva.

The males are essentially homeless! You may see a group of male blue banded bees resting on grass stems or reeds at night – something to look for if you are out spotlighting in your yard. The largest group of roosting bees recorded was 100!

Blue banded bees are one of three Australian Native bee that can perform a special type of pollination called 'buzz pollination'.

Some flowers hide their pollen inside tiny capsules. A blue banded bee can grasp these flowers and vibrate her flight muscles, causing the pollen to shoot out of the capsule. She then collects the pollen and carries it from flower to flower, pollinating as she goes.



Quite a few of our native Australian flowers require buzz pollination eg Hibbertia, Senna and Solanum and others, such as tomatoes, reproduce more successfully with buzz pollinators in attendance. Research has shown a 15-20% increase in yield from greenhouse tomatoes that have been buzz pollinated.

Blue-banded bees are very active foragers, and will visit around 1200 tomato flowers per day.

Blue banded bees are not at all aggressive

as they have no hive to defend but they can give a mild sting if you grab them or step on them.

To attract these bees to your garden, you can provide nesting sites and food plants that they prefer: a location with permanently undisturbed soil will provide them with more nesting and breeding opportunities, preferably near a dam or creek

They have a preference for purple or blue flowers, also Salvias, Lavender, Sage, Thyme, Mint, Borage, Basil, Alliums, Eggplant, Tomatoes.



Mareeba Hospital

Mareeba Shire Council has received a confidential briefing from senior officers of Queensland Health about the future provision of health services for both Mareeba and the broader Tableland region.

"Council had sought this briefing following concerns expressed by a number of community members that in the event of a new hospital in Atherton that the Mareeba Hospital would be diminished," Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

"We were informed that there are no plans to reduce the level of service or status of the Mareeba Hospital and we have received undertaking that Council will be regularly briefed in regard to Health services in the Shire," he said

Council will keep a running brief on the development.



Gardening in Kuranda with Alectura



MARCH and the vagaries weatherwise of the past unsettled month, while the wait for the Wet continues. A number of readers are reporting plant loss and foliage burn with the continued very hot days with potted plants extremely vulnerable to rapid drying out and soil heating.

Talking of plant losses, it seems some local gardeners experience repeated pilfering of plants especially along unfenced areas. From experience, most keen gardeners are only too happy to provide cuttings if asked. Such courtesy may also make a friend as well as helpful advice on successful growing.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: Cubanola domingensis (Portlandia domingensis) is a small growing tropical tree belonging to the family Rubiaceae which is also the same family for coffee and gardenias. Native to the Dominican Republic, Cuba and other parts of the Caribbean, this desirable garden or potted subject, growing to 3m, bears long pendant white flowers, fragrant in the evening and early morning.

Usually found growing in limestone areas, this slow growing plant requires alkaline conditions with rich, well-drained soil. These conditions also apply to its near relative *Portlandia grandiflora*, another white, large trumpet flowering gem, again suitable for a potted subject.

Both these highly desirable and elegant plants, frost tender, are occasionally found at specialist plant sales and, although still pricey, are commended to the keen gardener.



Q & A: Dear Sandy, Thank you for the specimen flower which even in death lives up to its common name the Carrion flower. Your plant is a *Stapelia*, a large genus of over 40 asclepiads from southern Africa. They have spineless, mostly upright, succulent stems. This genus has large star-shaped flowers that can exceed 20cm inches in diameter with hairy flowers varying from red to brown, often marbled and deceiving pollinating flies with the look of decaying meat as well as their foul smell. Requiring a well-draining succulent mix they make excellent and interesting potted subjects along with their close relatives, *Hoodias*, *Hunerias* and *Orbeas*, again with similar growth habits and intriguing bizarre flowers with their pungent odours.



Dear Graham, *Radermachera sinica*, also China Doll, the Serpent or Emerald tree, is an evergreen tree in the family Bignoniaceae, native to the subtropical mountain regions of southern China and Taiwan. It can reach heights of up to 30 m tall with a trunk diameter of 1 m. The leaves are bipinnate, 20 to 70 cm long and 15 to 25 cm broad, divided into numerous small glossy green leaflets 2 to 4 cm long. The flowers are white, trumpet-like, about 7 cm long, and resembling a large Bignonia flower in shape. Please pass on my thanks to Lorraine from Malanda for supply of the excellent Pics supporting this ID.

Dear Frank, Thank you for your follow-up on last month's Q&A re the Climbing Frangipani, *Chonemorpha fragrans* and your sterling efforts to eradicate its rainforest escape, having tried both roundup and hand weeding with little success. Presently I am waiting on DPI advice on a possible, eco-friendly means of extermination.


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ALL IS ART

Kuranda's "Goldilocks" Pool – too hot, too cold. It's just not quite right.

Last week local resident Debbie Lawry posted in two Kuranda community Facebook groups asking for responses to her call out for a shade cloth to be erected over part of the Kuranda swimming pool. Debbie said it was so hot that it was unusable for most of the day during hot weather.

In addition the heaters which have not been working since before last winter meant that the pool was too cold during the cold weather of 2015. So the pool is under-utilised.

One post attracted 34 likes with 31 people saying they would definitely use the pool more if there was a shade erected. The other post attracted another 34 likes and 17 different people comments expressing a desire for a shade cloth to be erected. Many were parents complaining that their children had been sunburnt at the pool and so they were not using it at the moment.

In response to these comments, Cnr Jenny Jensen raised the issues of both the shade cloth and the non-working heaters at the MSC council meeting on Wednesday 18th and reported back that Council had resolved to "investigate options for erection of shade cloth for the Kuranda pool and report back". In addition Cnr Jensen advised that the quotes for repair of the heaters had been received and it was planned that the heaters should be functioning in time for the cooler months.

There was also significant "comment" about the pool levy paid by all Kuranda ratepayers.

A response from the MSC CEO Peter Franks is printed here outlying the ins and outs of the levy arrangement.

He also provides more details about the recent erection of a shade cover at the Mareeba pool (where 90% of the funds to erect a donated cover – \$46,000 – was a one-off State Government grant).

Hopefully Kuranda can access similar funding so the Kuranda pool can be fully utilised in all temperatures.

The Kuranda pool cost \$1.8m to construct. This was funded by a State Government Grant of \$592k and the balance of \$1.208m being funded by the Mareeba Shire Council. The \$1.208m was made up of a loan of \$783k and \$450k from general funds. An amount equal to the principle portion of this is loan, the \$783k, is being raised from the Kuranda community through a special levy.

The Kuranda levy is \$36 per annum per property and when it ends on the 30 June 2021 will have raised the \$783k. This levy only covers a portion of the original capital construction costs, with the balance of the Capital portion, \$450k, the ongoing operational costs and the interest on the loan being borne by the entire community.

The other two pools in the Shire were constructed in the days when divisional accounting was practiced by Council, which meant that the costs for their construction were borne by the residents of the particular division where the asset was constructed and not the entire shire community.

Council has requested that officers prepare a report detailing the costs of installing a shade structure over portion of the Kuranda pool. Last year the Mareeba pool had a shade structure put over portion of it. This was made possible by the efforts of Kevin Davies, as President of the Swimming Club, who sourced the old cover from the Tobruk Pool in Cairns and the then Member for Cook, David Kempton, who arranged for a State grant to have it installed, with Council acting as the recipient of the grant and as the project managers. Hopefully Council will be able to source a similar grant to deliver a similar outcome for Kuranda.

A recent Facebook post:

I was interested to see how many residents on here use our local pool or would use it more if there was shade over the main pool in summer. We have the only pool in the area, on the Tablelands and all the way to Cardwell that has no shade.

We need to talk to people like Tom Gilmore and his crew and push for shade and the heating to be repaired before winter.

The pool has been too hot of late compared to other pools in the area.

With FNQ having one of the worst numbers of skin cancer in Australia it is crazy that we have a pool with no shade for lessons to protect the swimmers and staff.

It become an OHS issue for the staff also when trying to conduct classes.

My family are regular swimmers at Kuranda pool and we train in the squad for local and interstate swimming events. It has become too hot to do our regular sessions and as a result we have had to go to other pools in the area that have shade and cooler water.

The pool is used for hydrotherapy and there have been situations where the Carer has been burnt despite using appropriate protection.

I've been burnt despite using sunscreen.

We have lost patronage of the aqua aerobics due to the heat in summer and the cold in winter. I also have a fellow health practitioner that would refer clients to hydro/aqua aerobics at the pool if it was still happening. We need to get this back up and running if possible

We have a high level of Diabetes and chronic health issues in the area and we need a useable pool that is a healthy and safe environment for all.

We have a fantastic facility that could be used for more community events such as pool and movie nights. We have the enthusiasm of the staff and regular users. We just need a healthier environment.

A yearly pass would be worth looking at to encourage increased numbers to the pool.

At this stage we have a motion passed to get quotes. We need to stay active in following this up to ensure that we have a result. It has taken a substantial amount of time to trigger the heating to be fixed. Quotes were in but no action seemed to happen.

Let's keep the momentum going now and look at more events and increasing the patronage of the pool to ensure the council see this needs to happen.

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"Cardiac Challenge" Update

Readers may remember the "Cardiac Challenge" bike ride From Cairns to Cooktown in September 2015 which entailed the closure of one way of the Range Road for the morning of Saturday 19 September.

As a result of the Challenge, two pieces of equipment – worth almost \$50,000, have been bought by the Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation for Cairns Hospital's cardiac services and are already being put to work.

Cairns and Hinterland Hospital and Health Service Cardiac Catheter Laboratory clinical nurse consultant Spencer Irvin said the Lucas chest compression device was a lifesaving automated CPR system that would be used in the lab on critically ill heart attack patients who are at risk of having a cardiac arrest.

As well, the Foundation has purchased a bi-pap machine for the Cardiac Care Ward, at a cost of \$34,000.

Foundation fundraising and marketing manager Glenys Duncombe said it was always rewarding to see the difference that the hard work by hundreds of cyclists and their donors, made to patients' lives.

"The Mt Franklin Cardiac Challenge is in its tenth year this year, and has raised more than \$2 million in that time towards improving outcomes for cardiac patients in the Far North," Ms Duncombe said. "Registrations will open soon for the 2016 event, which we are expecting to be huge due to the special anniversary this year," she said.







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Yellow Crazy Ants (YCA) – What's it to YOU ?

MIKHAILA JACOBY is coordinating about 70 Russet Park residents and other volunteers who have registered on the Envirocare website to be part of a community task force to control and eventually eradicate the YCA invasion at Russet Park, Kuranda. For now the YCAs are contained but inadvertent swapping of a pot plant or mulch, or flotsam containing a nest with a queen rafting down the river, could see them start a colony elsewhere. More volunteers and funding will be required to eradicate YCAs, and determination will be needed to get that last nest.

What does that mean to you and to what's around you in the Wet Tropics? Here are extracts from an article **"Too Much To Lose"** published recently in the Wildlife Australia magazine by Dr Lori Lack and Dr Conrad Hoskins of James Cook University.

"Australia's Wet Tropics rainforests pulse with life. Butterflies flit, spiders attend their glistening webs, skinks dart into the leaf litter, insects of myriad sizes and colours scurry. Quiet observation may be rewarded with a frog camouflaged in leaves or a praying mantis stalking prey."

Now picture walking into a rainforest invaded by yellow crazy ants. The ground and tree trunks still teem with life, but of just one species. The diversity seen is mainly in the prey carried by ants – spiders, beetles, earthworms, other ants. If

an animal is too heavy, the ants eat it in place, seeking out the moist tissues such as eyes to begin their formic acid assault. Quiet observation is nigh on impossible because standing in one place for too long will have you covered in the little beasts.

Knowing what these ants have done elsewhere gives us plenty of reason to be worried if they are not eradicated.... Several traits contribute to their success. They're omnivorous and aggressive, readily spraying formic acid from their abdomen when on the attack. And apart from some aversion to strong sunlight and low temperatures, they'll forage day and night, on the ground and in the canopy... Adding to their success is an unusual social structure. Native species such as green

ants have territory wars and defend to the death their patch....This prevents their colonies from getting too big. Yellow crazy ants act like...a big happy sisterhood or supercolony...By saving aggression for others, they spend more time and energy finding food...Queens will start new colonies...and the colony boundary can advance by a metre a day.

...A Bentley Park couple had their new airconditioner burnt out when the ants nested in it. Paul Devine an avid gardener in Russett Park, surrendered his garden to the ants because it's not just unpleasant to be there, its impossible.... Cane farmers in Edmonton have found growing cane money losing and Frank Teodo, a cane farmer, has twice been temporarily blinded by yellow crazy ants invading his bed and spraying formic acid in his eyes ...(because he was the last protein source available in his cane fields)."

Note: These YCAs are not Electric ants, which Biosecurity Queensland assert have been nearly eradicated. Attempts at YCA eradication and management were abandoned by them in 2012 (which State MP Curtis Pitt now agrees was a mistake.) Wet Tropics management Authority picked up the challenge and received federal funding in 2013 till the end of 2016. Beyond that, no-one knows about funding. What we do know is we face the real

possibility of loss of our tourist industry as the rainforest becomes impossible to visit and live near and our World heritage listing is withdrawn.

What YOU can do:

Ask your local councillors what they are doing (elections in three weeks), ask your local Queensland State MP what they are doing, ask your Federal MP what they are doing (elections later this year)

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

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Double-eyed Fig Parrot

At times when one is strolling around downtown Kuranda, one encounters what seems to be a cloud of sawdust floating down from the fig trees. On very close inspection you may see a flock of Double-Eyed Fig Parrots lurking amongst the foliage.

We have seen tourists and locals alike standing under a particular fig outside St Saviour's, staring intently into the foliage, vainly attempting to see what creatures are gnawing silently into the figs and causing the sawdust remnants to drift gently to the footpath.


They are a bird of 'fleeting glimpse'. With their camouflage and unexpectedly small size they are extremely difficult to see, blending amongst dense foliage. They are also 'here today, gone tomorrow' following the fruiting fig trail.

One day a tourist festooned with cameras and lenses approached me as I was leaving the Paper office and asked if I could direct him to a likely haunt of the Double-eyed Fig Parrot. He had especially journeyed up to Kuranda to photograph them, as he was told that this was the time of year for them to arrive. I pointed to one of their favourite trees and its surrounding footpath coated in sawdust, and honestly told him that he 'should have been here yesterday'.

This is our smallest Australian Parrot (yes, smaller than a budgie), at about 15cm including tail. They are predominantly green with red, yellow and blue markings. The 'Double-eyed' part of their name comes from someone in the misty past declaring that the markings under the eye looked like a second eye. I leave it to the reader to judge that assessment.

They like to nest in existing tree cavities, although there are plenty of recorded observations of them digging their own hole in decaying branches or trunks.

The three Australian sub-species are found mainly in rainforest areas, i.e. the eastern tip of the Cape (*Marshalli*), around the Cairns general area (*Macleayana*) and (*Coxeni*) a coastal region north of Brisbane. This latter sub-species is on both State and Federal endangered lists, with only about 200 sightings in the last 150 years). The other two sub-species are reportedly relatively common throughout their limited ranges. Of course the clearing of rainforest areas is the main concern for the long-term future of the species.



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The Velvet Assassin

There is a kind of local animal that looks much like a caterpillar with a dozen or so extra legs. However, this animal will not pupate into a butterfly or moth, and it is not the harmless leaf-eating larva that we are so familiar with. This is a stone-cold killer – if you're an arthropod. A deadly hunter, the animal in question is a key species in the evolution of the arthropod (but itself is not one). It appeared on Earth around half a billion years ago, which is no mean feat, making it one of the first invertebrate animal species to evolve. It is known as the Velvet worm (phylum Onychophora), and though described in 1826 as a slug, it is neither worm, slug nor caterpillar.

In Australia, the adult Velvet worm is between 20 and 40mm in length (depending on species). The local Kuranda species is at the upper end of this size scale. Pigmentation can vary depending on species, but is generally a brown or grey base colour with intricate patterning over the top. It appears to have up to 14-16 caterpillar-like legs, but these contain no actual joints or muscles. They achieve motion by the body's water pressure (hydrostatic) pressing against them and keeping them extended, and then by the contraction of inner-body muscles. The head can be identified by the presence of two stumpy precursors to antennae.

Unlike today's arthropods, the Velvet worm has no hardened exoskeleton. Its skin is composed of a membrane of dead cells covered in tiny hairs, which are in themselves covered in tiny scales that give it the appearance and feeling of velvet. These hairs function in a sensory capacity and respond to touch. This covering is also water-repellent, which makes it perfect for living in a very moist environment – seconded by its inability to regulate water loss. It is therefore very easy for a Velvet worm to succumb to desiccation, and as such, it is only found in Australia's tropical and temperate rainforests.

The Velvet worm is interesting to science not only for its evolutionary status, but also for a sticky, glue-like secretion it produces. This 'glue' is made up almost entirely of water, but also contains a few key proteins. Originally, these proteins are kept from chemically interacting by the water acting as a shield. However, this 'sticky' property is present for a reason, and the Velvet worm's prey of small arthropods get to find out first hand. After locating prey, the Velvet worm shoots this sticky liquid from tubes near its face. It lands on the prey quite harmlessly, but after a few moments, they arthropod's water-repellent exoskeleton causes the water in the secretion to evaporate and the proteins interact, stopping the victim in its tracks with an impossibly sticky web.

The Velvet worm's mouth is located on the underside of its body and is composed of outer lips with internal teeth. As the worm begins to feed on its immobilised prey, it covers the food with saliva which contains enzymes that cause the prey to break down outside the body, before it has even been chewed. As a result, the worm ingests a semi-liquid concoction that is easier for the simple digestive system to cope with.

Mating in Velvet worms is largely unstudied, but can be supposed to consist of, in most species, depositing of the spermatophore by the male to the female for fertilisation. Curiously, the males of studied species carry the spermatophore on their faces in a set of ever-present dimples. It has been likened by researchers to a kind of crown, or trophy.


After mating, eggs are often laid, but some species keep the eggs internally and give birth to live young, like a mammal. The babies are miniature versions of the adults, and they will continue to shed their skin every 14 or so days into adulthood.

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



A book on the life of Michael "Tarzan" Fomenko will be launched at the German Club in Winkworth Street in Cairns on Sunday 28th February.

Time of launch is 2.00-4.00pm. The book was written by local historian Peter Ryle, who was given access to a collection of information and photographs collected by the late Harold Jung of Cairns. Anyone who is interested in Tarzan's story is welcome to attend.

Michael Fomenko roamed the area between Innisfail and Cape York for over fifty years, living rough in the bush. He became famous in the late 1950s and early 1960s when he paddled a dugout canoe from Cooktown to Merauke in what was then Dutch New Guinea – now Irian Jaya. He was arrested by police in 1964 near Laura and spent several years in mental asylums, although he was later proved quite sane. In his later years he could be seen regularly jogging along the highway between Cairns and Innisfail with his bag over his shoulder. His story is one of endurance, rugged determination and persecution by the authorities.

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Inside My Studio

Speewah's 14-year-old **Evie Clinton** is taking her exercise and dance to new heights with her aerial silks.

Aerial silks began in the circus and is a beautiful combination of circus and dance. Sophisticated and elegant, the combination of strength, flexibility and artistry has Evie floating on air in her studio while toning her entire body.

This performance is not for the faint-hearted or the weak of limb, but the lithe, confident and competent Evie Clinton, performing her energetic aerial skills, is a joy to watch.

Where is your current studio?

My aerial silk hangs under the roof of my 'studio' on the deck beside the pool at my home in Speewah. It was in my bedroom for a while but as I grew my legs got too long and I hit the wall. I needed more space to perform. This covered area out here where my silk hangs now is perfect for my art.

Do you work alone or with others?

I work alone at home, however, I train with others at Aerial Dynamics, which is operated by Louise Kiiver, once a week at the Tanks Art Centre in Cairns. I started with Louise six years ago. I perform solo on occasions but mostly I perform with the Aerial Dynamics group and Louise calls us "Air Cats".

What are the essential features your studio has to have?


I need height and a wide space of 4-5 metres. When we train as a group we have crash mats but we do not use them during performances. I do not use one at home. A three-metre length of material is essential. I would have chosen a black silk but one of my teachers gave me the bright red 'rope' and I love it.

Describe your work pattern – hours/days/weeks.

At home I train a few hours each week. With the group and my teacher I train on the weekends sometimes. I have my school commitments and I play volleyball and that all takes time.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

I practice my aerial tricks and my stretch exercises if there has been a few lay days between practices. But most importantly, I have fun.



List three things you listen to while working.

I listen to my breath and my heartbeat while I am on my aerial silk. We are taught this and it is something that is in the back of my mind while I am working. It is automatic now. I like to listen to the sounds in the trees surrounding our property. It is one of the good things about working outside. Also, I have a passion for rap music – loud!!!

Your favourite tool?

My aerial silk. Apart from my body it is my only other tool.

How do you identify your work?

I have a signature trick called 'hip hop, tick tock'. It is a falling trick and I incorporate it in my performance.

How do you sell your work?

This sort of art is not something that can be sold and my group does not get paid for performances. Sometimes our expenses are covered for public events.

Do you teach from your studio?

I have been to Tully with my teacher and group to teach other students but I have not taught alone, only under supervision. It would be great to teach at a later stage and it is something I look forward to.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I would like to have my aerial silk higher so that I could do more advanced tricks with more controlled fall space. There are a couple of places in the garden, which I would prefer. [Evie points enviously to a very tall straight hickory tree in the garden with a fork at approximately 15 metres. My mind boggles as the top of this tree is not visible under the roof line of the covered deck where Evie currently works. TR]

If you were not working with Aerial Dynamics what would you be doing?

I would still be doing circus performing or modelling. I have just started and signed with a modelling agency. While I don't have any formal experience yet, a visiting overseas photographer and a make-up artist asked me to take part in a photo shoot recently and so I have received some photos to add to my portfolio. I guess it is what every young girl dreams about.

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Counselling Options: There are several counsellors using rooms at the Centre. There is a psychologist and a social worker who can both provide counselling with no cost to the client under a Mental Health Plan through a GP/Doctor utilising Medicare. There is also a new psychoanalyst using process work (in training and with insurance) who can provide free counselling – information is available from Marg or Ceri at KNC.

Gambling/Financial Counselling: Susan Cook from the Salvation Army is coming to Kuranda every second Wednesday to assist people with gambling and financial issues. If you require any information, advice or advocacy, Susan provides a strictly confidential service – please phone KNC to make a booking.

Computer Support and Equipment: Tracey is still available at KNC each morning until 1.00pm providing assistance with computer repairs and issues (including virus removal) and also has a range of parts and re-conditioned machines that have been donated. Come in and have a chat – you never know – she might have exactly what you need.

Mareeba Housing Support Service: A worker is currently coming to Kuranda two days per week (usually Tuesdays and Wednesdays) as part of the Street to Home program to provide intensive support to people requiring urgent or imminent accommodation. Assistance and support is provided to identify affordable and suitable accommodation options and includes applications for housing through the Department of Housing, community housing programs and the private rental market. Please contact Ceri or Marg for a referral.

No Interest Loan Scheme: Just a reminder that the Kuranda NILS program has just introduced Queensland Motor Vehicle Registration and school laptops as new NILS items. A current payment notice is required along with documentation including Centrelink Income Statements and Bank statements. The NILS is strictly no fee and no interest, up to \$1000 for essential items including fridges, freezers, washing machines, dryers, bed furniture, lounges, dining and other items that are considered essential. Please phone 4093 8933 or drop in and ask for more details. Notice of specific clinics will be in future Kuranda Paper articles or available at the centre.

Kuranda Recipe Book: We are still looking for a number of recipes for a local community book. We are requesting family favourite recipes with a story and/or picture including details on how long the recipe has been in your family and where it came from. Essentials of Succession Planning

It is inevitable that someday you will leave your business, whether you sell up, retire or leave due to health reasons.

A survey by Bond University found > 40% of family businesses are looking to transfer their operations within five years. 93% intend to transfer their business to family, only 39% have a succession plan. Research also shows that > 65% of family businesses fail in the second generation and another 20% fail in the third generation.

Common causes of business failure are:

- a lack of management skills
- failure of parents to "let go"
- failure of the parents to share knowledge with all relevant parties
- a dissatisfied family member who constantly undermines authority and management, and
- family members looking critically at what one is receiving compared to what another receives.

A simple to-do checklist for family businesses considering succession.

1. **CHOOSE A SUCCESSOR**
Think about what is best for the future of the business. Don't let emotions cloud your judgement – difficult, but vital.
2. **TRAIN THE SUCCESSOR**
Owners often make the fatal mistake of giving the business to their children with minimum training.
3. **COMPLETE A SUCCESSION PLAN**
The plan has to incorporate the core values of your business and also financial and legal issues.
4. **SHOW YOUR FAITH**
If you do not show your confidence and trust in this nominated person, your business is not likely to succeed after you're gone.
5. **CONSIDER EXTERNAL OPTIONS**
If there is no one suitable within your family, look externally. There is no benefit in having an uninterested person running things.



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

Chapter 38

The Original Kuranda Refreshment Rooms

The Kuranda Refreshment Rooms which is part of Kuranda Railway Station was purposely built to cater for the increasing tourist traffic. Kuranda Railway Station, including the Kuranda Tea Rooms, is heritage listed. Back in the day the proprietor of nearby Kuranda Hotel operated the rooms which were not an uncommon arrangement at the time. The most popular offerings of the day were beer which proved very popular with the Tablelands to Cairns services where Kuranda Refreshment Rooms was a designated pit stop. Beer on tap was served until the late 60s after which new strict liquor licensing laws came into effect.

Chapter 39

Tourist destinations in the 1950s

Cairns high tourist season in the 1950s has been and still is one of Australia's most popular tourist destinations. The most popular attractions at the time were Green Island and its underwater observatory, Lake Placid, the Crystal Cascades, the Cook Highway to Mossman and Port Douglas, Fairyland near Kuranda, the Atherton Tableland, the Palmerston Highway and Millaa Millaa to Innisfail, the Crater Lakes and Falls on the Tablelands and also, last but not least, the train trip from Cairns to Kuranda. Not much has changed in the last 60 years apart from the addition of Skyrail Rainforest Cableway!



Chapter 40

Kuranda Scenic Railway was not part of the Queensland Railways timetable until the 1960s

During the peak tourist season in the 1930s the tourist train departed for Kuranda from Cairns Wharf and Cairns Station on Thursdays, Fridays, Sundays and if required Mondays. The journey generally took two and quarter hours. A First Class single fare cost 4 shillings and one pence from Cairns Wharf. The train had consisted of unique vintage carriages which featured open end verandas, sun shades over the windows and short wheelbases on the carriages were part of their distinctive charm.



It wasn't until 1963 that the regular year round tourist services was included in the Queensland Railway timetable for the section between Cairns and Kuranda. A modern 2000 class railmotor nicknamed the 'Silver Bullet' was used. Due to phenomenal tourist growth to the region in 1981 Queensland Railway dedicated 28 carriages of similar outline to be overhauled and used exclusively for Kuranda Scenic Railway.

Chapter 41

Railmotor robbed 1973

Thursday 6th December 1973 the RM1819 Railmotor departed Cairns for Ravenshoe with 15 passengers and the payroll for the fitters who were working on the Cairns to Ravenshoe railway line.

As the railmotor exited Tunnel number 5 the driver saw a large rock on the railway track. As the guard Clive Abdy climbed out to investigate the rock he noticed it was chained to the track at about the same time two masked robber's exited Tunnel number 6 with sawn-off shotguns.

The robbers entered the railmotor and ordered all passengers to the ground as they made their way to the paymaster and demanded: "This is a holdup. Give us the money." The robbers fled by foot with the 2 payroll boxes worth—in today's value—\$50,000, through a drain beside Tunnel number 6 entrance, never to be seen again.

Fur Coats Are Not Chic

Years ago, my business, Word Factory, was ensconced in an office in the Pentagon. Every evening I would return to the Home Office. Two very impressive addresses for a mere journo, but at the time, I could chuckle inwardly when people asked me how to find my office. The airconditioned Pentagon in Grafton Street was a far more comfortable option in the depths of summer than the sweaty interior of the home office.

I'm feeling the heat in the Home Office today, despite a breeze blowing through the back window, strong enough to have me place a pair of pruners on one pile of papers as another pile (hopefully the bills) sails like a flock of white geese out the window towards the horse paddock.

The fact is, it's hot. It's very hot. I shouldn't be surprised, after all, I live in the tropics, and one of the many reasons I've lived here since Moses was a boy, is the predictability of a preponderance of sunny days. Who needs airconditioning in the Tablelands? Well, just this afternoon, me.

I'm looking at the three black and white bodies spreadeagled within a metre's circumference of my desk. Shaved with a no. 10 blade, they are as comfortable as I can make them.

If I had airconditioning in my office, they would be shut in with me. At least without airconditioning, I have some idea how they are feeling through the day; only some idea, as I'm not wearing a thin fur coat. This leads me to my subject for this week: clipping. To do or not to do, that is some pet owners' quandary. It shouldn't be if you care about your long haired pet.

If I had just one Frequent Flyer point for every time someone has said to me, "His thick coat is insulation against the heat", I could have circumnavigated the world for free. A slight exaggeration perhaps, but I'm trying to make a point here about what a common misconception this is. Okay, let's say Wagga Wagga and back. Anyway, we're

straying from the point of my tale.

Huskies were designed to work in the snow. As a young teenager, I collapsed in sobs at the sight of a pack of huskies lying in thick snow at the very top of Jungfrauoch in Switzerland, nearly 11,400ft above sea level and with temperatures reaching minus 13 degrees Fahrenheit (centigrade only came into vogue with decimal currency).

My poor father was very near to calling security to prevent his daughter freeing the entire dog sled team.

Border collies originated from Northumberland on the Anglo/Scottish border. It's bloomin' chilly up there, I can vouch for that. It's thick socks, woolly beanie and sheepskin coat country. Dogs dress accordingly, and they never expected to take a different wardrobe overseas, as we do when we travel to a different climate.

That's just two long haired breeds, and of course there are many. When people give me the argument that the double coat is there for insulation, and that their dog is fine, I refer them to the women of the Arabian Gulf, where I lived for nearly eight years.

A black abaya over layers of clothing is no fun in 40 degrees centigrade, and don't let anyone tell you otherwise.

For those who won't clip their dog or even long haired cat because "It looks silly", don't even start me. I place those people whose personal vanity exceeds their compassion with the owners of show horses who double rug their poor animals in our tropical summer, and people who leave children and dogs in hot cars.

I'm not a vet, I'm not an expert. I can often tell how an animal is feeling where I can't pick what a human is feeling, as the former doesn't know how to mask their feelings.

The exception to this is when an animal is hurt physically: in the wild, to display physical weakness can mean death.

What I can tell you is, if you have never clipped your long-haired animal, give it a go, and revel in the new playful, happy, energetic animal you have unleashed.



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Grants

I read with great interest the stories of the Kuranda Australia Day Award Winners on the front page of the February issue of *The Kuranda Paper*. One point that stood out to me was the accolade given to one of these winners for being good at getting grants! I have had experience right here in Kuranda in the expenditure of two such grants. We have all heard stories of political failure coming from a bridge to nowhere!

Well I built such a bridge for another well known Kuranda identity that is clever at getting grants. This bridge is now spanning an inaccessible hidden creek mouldering in the jungle! The materials were bought at my direction with money from the grant and I proudly, singlehandedly built a splendid 8 metre all steel bridge complete with handrails and balustrade plus a number of fabricated steel step risers for the accompanying walking track at my house free of charge for the people of Kuranda! The bridge was to be installed by 'Work for the Dole' members, supervised by a presumably paid local (I was invited not to participate).

I built and disassembled the bridge under my house so it could be taken away in modules by the installation crew. Anyway the upshot was the installation was poorly done, especially the step risers which were bashed almost to death being hammered into the hard clay rather than digging them in and at the end of the day the Council condemned the whole project.

Had I been allowed (and I offered) I could have installed the whole kit and caboodle at no cost as I had previously done on my own property and as had been inspected by Council before this project was approved.

I call this grant failure number one and I have only been involved in two such grants. I will now relate grant failure number two.

Some years ago there was an advert in *The Kuranda Paper* requesting Kuranda residents lodge suggestions for a beautification project for the turnoff from the

highway into Kuranda. I sent my letter off and was duly invited to a meeting to discuss the community inputs.

In the event it turned out I was the only resident to have responded so the meeting in the Council room at the other end of the Library building was only attended by me, the same well known grant getter, a Mareeba Councillor and a paid Kuranda community facilitator.

I was quite passionate about this project and had already recruited the assistance of one Keith Green, the then proprietor of Kuranda Raw Materials who was then clearing roads and lots in the Kuranda rainforest precinct.

The plan involved transplanting 100 or so mature Licuala Fan Palms in groups on the corners of said intersection. Keith had agreed to collect these palms each with an earth ball and cart them to the site where he would stand them up in pre-dug holes over a period of time as they became available instead of pushing them into a pile and trashing them, as was the practice.

Keith, like me, thought this was a good plan and so agreed to do it for a very cheap price per palm as his gift to the people of Kuranda. These iconic and extremely slow growing palms unique to this part of the World can live for more than 400 years so I often gaze lovingly at the ones in the grove I live in and speculate which ones may have been here when Lieutenant James Cook sailed past on Trinity Sunday in 1770.

Anyway I explained myself and the costs that were well within the grant only to be told the sole idea from Kuranda was not approved as they already had an alternate idea that involved a wood carver making a sign (I wouldn't even contemplate the evolution of this arrangement).

The sign sadly can still be seen on said corner



gradually mouldering away whereas a magnificent stand of the iconic Licuala Ramsayi would be mature, growing from strength to strength and sending up seedlings! Shouting to all and sundry: "You Have Arrived – This Is the Rain Forest – This Is the Village In It – This Is Kuranda!"

Such is my experience of grants I feel any such money now would best be spent on reducing Australia's debt which costs us all more than one billion dollars a month in interest alone.

God help our children!

Environmental Concerns – in response to Nadine O'Brien's letter

Good question – how did it happen that a rural residential DA approval was granted on a rural zoning? Many years ago residents may not have submitted against the rezoning or they may have and lost. Too late to make any further objections to this. Be watchful of our shire planning scheme and Development applications to achieve the best environmental outcome we can. Join the Friends of Kuranda Planning group to learn how.

Do we think this is a good environmental outcome? Rather we could ask, was this the best environmental outcome we could achieve under the circumstances and within the environmental protections we have. The developer took advice from Kuranda Envirocare to refer his development to the Federal EPBC Act check. Public submissions were made against development aspects, ecology experts were consulted but in the end the EPBC officers allowed the developer his requested building envelopes but required Jum Rum creek water quality monitoring for 10 years.

The blocks are not and will never be restored rainforest unless left to regenerate for 600 years but they can become better habitat than they are now with revegetation and covenants respected by prospective new residents to Kuranda. As have many blocks which were carved up for rural residential zoning in the 70s and 80s as the farmers moved out.

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Keeping Kids Healthy at School

Children (and teachers) spend about 180 days at Australian schools a year – let's make it pleasant, safe and healthy!

Heavy School Bags!

According to chiropractors and physiotherapists, heavy bags are leading to serious backache and scoliosis ailments. The most you should carry is around 10% to 15% of your body weight. If kids (or you) are carrying more than this, STOP! Use lockers, use online text-books whenever possible, use a trolley, but stop future back problems!

Warning Signs: Headaches, backaches or tingly feelings in your arms or back.

Not Enough Outside Play!

Children are spending less time outdoors particularly with the advent of electronic devices. Research shows that playtime and walks in outdoor settings makes for kids who are better behaved in class, are more focused and have much better attention spans. Current studies say sitting for long periods whether in school or offices greatly increases poor health and even risks premature death. Think about it...most of what we do is sedentary – driving, eating, phoning, watching TV, catching up with friends, working, reading...so everyone get standing up, get playing outside!

Warning Signs: ADHD, unfocussed learning, being unfit while young.

Too Much Sugar!

Homes and schools need to provide and foster good foods so as to educate and nourish kids. Teachers know that teaching is easier and calmer if non-sugared, high nutritional food is supplied. Make sure you and the school tuck-shop serve only healthy nutritious foods. Make sure you particularly limit or eliminate sugars. Watch 'Jamie Oliver's School Dinners' programs if you need further convincing.

Warning Signs: Malnutrition, ADHD, sugar-fuelled disruptive behaviours.

Lack of Sleep!

Huge do-or-die culminative tests or final exams at the end of semesters encourage students to 'cram' all night. As do excessive school workloads. Many Grade Sevens are now pulling all-nighters and gulping down caffeine! Children need on average nine hours sleep per night for proper health. Lack of sleep leads not only to poor

academic performance but also to depression, obesity and increased accidents (and that's accidents to you too – think sleep deprived teens behind the wheel of a car)! And sleepy adolescents are significantly more likely to overeat carbohydrates, fats and sugars. Enforce bedtimes. Limit social media and devices after dark. Talk to your school if you feel this is an issue.

Warning Signs: Unable to get up in time for start of school. Kids falling asleep in class, at recess and at other untypical times. Grumpiness.

Too Much Homework!

Six hours in school + 2 doing homework = 8 hours a day! This is full-time job hours people!

Australian students are spending more hours doing after-school homework, according to a new international study. Our prep and Grade Ones are getting homework now! Australian academics Richard Walker and Mike Horsley's new book Reforming Homework say "homework's not very beneficial for primary school kids, [has] very limited benefits for junior high school kids, and reasonable benefits for senior high school kids." Free time plays a key role in fostering both creativity and emotional development, factors just as basic to long term success as academic gains." Talk to your school if you feel this is an issue. (http://www.alternet.org/story/9682/back_to_school%3A_why_homework_is_bad_for_kids)

Warning Signs: Anxiety and stress levels rising. Play time put aside for study. Sleep time put aside for study. Pulling all-nighters (once only the realm of university students).



Infrastructure work

The Mareeba Shire Council has completed a mixture of Parks and Gardens maintenance as well as bridge works during the month of January.

"Work commenced on the Grove Creek Bridge on Speewah Road in November. Following an assessment of the bridge a number of issues were identified resulting in the immediate imposition of a 5 Tonne load limit on the bridge," Mayor Tom Gilmore said.


"Given that this is the only access into Speewah, urgent works had to be undertaken to enable heavier vehicles to enter Speewah. Work is progressing on schedule and the contractor will stockpile the stage one concrete girders this week, with the intention of placing them early next week," Cr Gilmore said.

"This is welcome news to everyone who uses those roads, and this upgrade has a number of benefits for residents, industry and road users. For instance, once this bridge is complete, work can begin on the installation of the 60 metre NBN tower which will service the area." he said. "This major piece of important infrastructure is being partly funded by the Commonwealth Government with a grant of \$425,000."

"Parks and Gardens has carried out general repairs and maintenance at the Bi-Centennial Lakes, Town Hall Park, Dimbulah, Centenary Park, Arnold Park, Mareeba. General repairs and maintenance has also been carried out on Kuranda Parks, Library, CBD and streets," Mayor Gilmore said.

"The installation of an underground electrical conduit at Therwine Street in preparation for the undergrounding of power commenced in November and was completed this month with minimum disruption to business and tourism in the town.. My congratulations to the council workforce for their efforts in very trying conditions. The work extends the full length of Therwine Street from the intersection of Coondoo Street to the bottom of Therwine Street.," Cr Gilmore said.

There was also an injury to the tail, to which a splint was applied. Although Cherie still looks battered and bruised she has settled well into care and is quite calm despite her ordeal.


Well, we are back again after our Christmas break. Our crafters were happy to see the doors open again and have already started on their show crafts.

As we move into the second year of this parliamentary term I have taken on two new roles.

I have been appointed to sit on the Parliamentary Ethics Committee which deals with complaints about the ethical conduct of particular Members and deals with alleged breaches of parliamentary privilege by members of the Legislative Assembly and others.

I have also had the honour of being appointed to the position of Temporary Deputy Speaker of the 55th Parliament. I join a team of 6 MPs who under the guidance of the speaker and deputy speaker will take turns throughout each speaking day to ensure the professional and consistent operation of the parliament.

I also remain on the bipartisan Parliamentary Finance and Administration Committee (FAC) which scrutinises Bills tabled by the Premier and Treasurer. Last year one of the major roles of the FAC was travelling around the state holding public meetings to hear the views of people regarding four year and fixed terms of parliament. As a result of that work Queenslanders will be voting on a referendum to extend the terms of parliament to four years with a fixed date – in much the same way as council elections occur.

The referendum will be held March 19, the same day as the Local Government elections.

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

Community Planting Day

Another great morning with fellow tree planters at a beautiful site near the banks of the Barron River. The holes were dug to make the planting nice and easy and 20 volunteers braved the early morning to plant 480 trees.

A huge thank you to all of our volunteers, without you this would not be possible!

We run community plantings 3 or 4 times per year, and most other Saturday we dig holes and plant up to 20 trees each. So you too can easily plant 1000 trees a year to extend wildlife habitat.

Our aim is to plant 5500 trees per year, which we have been exceeding, as part of the Biodiversity Project. The project is into its 4th year and at completion we will have restored and / or revegetated 10ha native riparian (river) species. Connecting wildlife corridors, minimising erosion, filtering sediments, building stronger community and more resilient environments are among some of the reasons we do what we do.

Plant of the Month

Kuranda Quandong (*Elaeocarpus bancroftii*: *Elaeocarpaceae*)

This plant is flowering around Kuranda at present. The flowers hang upside down under the twigs and resemble cream coloured skirts. They have a very pleasant smell. The fruits are large green drupes with very dry flesh. The husk inside looks like rugby ball and has very thick walls. These giant trees can grow up to 45m tall and dominate the rainforest canopy. The Djabugandjii had special nut stones they used to crack open these delectable nuts.

There is an idea floating around to create a dwarf variety but this slow grower will surely create some shade for our grandchildren.

A Thought for March

THIS month we open our Bibles and read from St Luke's Gospel Chapter 6 verses 39 to 48. We are listening to the heart of Jesus' public ministry. Every word of this passage, and of what comes before and after it in this chapter, will be relevant for human life for all time. Here Jesus communicates a vision of human life and human relationships which challenges all our normal levels of acceptance.

"Love your enemies, do good... bless... pray for those who abuse you." This whole passage stands like a mountain peak in the moral and ethical imagination of humanity. It is a statement of the ultimate: it is not possible to reach above or beyond it. Perhaps that is why He repeats the challenge in image after image. Loving, doing good, blessing, praying, offering the other cheek, offering one's shirt, responding to begging – each one of these images repeats the demand for the ultimate moral response not merely to friend but also to enemy, to the attacker, the abuser, the thief.

The question we must ask ourselves is can we respond to this demand? All of us are quite safe in saying No! Then why does this seemingly impossible demand haunt us. Why does it continue to shine like a light in all the darkness of human experience? For two reasons. Jesus did not just say these things to us; He lived them among us. To give oneself totally? He did. To pray for those who abuse us? He did. To love one's enemies? He did. This is why this passage can never be dismissed as idle dreaming for human life. We cannot dismiss something as unreal and visionary if it becomes real in front of our eyes and walks among us as Jesus did.

The second reason this vision of human response will not go away is that there is something in us that responds to it even if we cannot reach its ultimate heights. That something is perhaps the most wonderful and valuable element in our human nature. Saint John once spoke of it as "the light that lightened every man that cometh into the world."

It is a light that, though it can be brought very low by our own will and our own self, can never be extinguished. It is this lesser light in our lives which reaches out for the greater light which is Christ. Jesus' light blinds us but we are attracted to it like a plant bending towards the light. As Isaiah said centuries before the time of Jesus, "The people who walk in darkness have seen a great light." Who are these people? We are.

Jesus shares his vision of human behaviour totally obedient to God. We cannot live this vision but it will be light and grace to us for ever.

Kuranda’s regions aren’t very different.
