HE first day of the Chinese New Year — the Year of the Ox — fell this year on the 26th January 2009, Australia Day, and the strengths of its animal sign — calmness, hard work, tenacity, modesty, patience and industry — could well reflect those virtues needed as our community faces a predicted difficult year.

Traditionally, on this day departed relatives are remembered with a banquet dinner in a communal feast called "surrounding the stove" or weilu, symbolising family unity and honouring the past and present generations.

All debts should be paid out by this time and nothing lent on this day, to avoid lending all the year. Back when tinder and flint were used, no one would lend them on this day or give a light to others.

References to the past year were to be avoided as everything should be turned toward the New Year and a new beginning. Crying on the day of the New Year meant crying all through the year so children were tolerated and not spanked, even though misbehaving.

To ensure good fortune in the coming year, the entire house was cleaned before New Year's Day. On New Year's Eve, all brooms, brushes, dusters, dust pans and other cleaning equipment were stored and no sweeping or dusting was done on New Year's Day for fear that good fortune would be swept away. After New Year's Day, the floors were swept and beginning at the door, the dust and rubbish was swept to the middle of the parlour, then placed in the corners and not taken or thrown out until the fifth day. At no time was the rubbish in the corners trampled upon.

In sweeping, there is a superstition that if you sweep the dirt out over the threshold, you will sweep one of the family away. Also, to sweep the dust and dirt out of your house by the front entrance is to sweep away the good fortune of the family; it must always be swept inwards and then carried out, then no harm will follow. All dirt and rubbish must be taken out the back door.

Hopefully, the Year of the Ox will see our community grow in strength and tenacity and hard times out the back door, sooner rather than later.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

By all accounts it could be a tough year ahead for most Kuranda Village traders. It indicates a particular need for the whole Village community to pull together in harmony and unity to make the best of the situation, in the interests not only of all Village traders but also of all persons with an interest in the wellbeing of the Village, as well as of the tourists that visit here.

One issue that has been of recent concern is Village bus transport. I feel able to comment with some impartiality.on this issue as, while I have a shop front in the Baha'i Information Centre in Therwine Street, I am not a commercial trader, do not contribute to any existing bus arrangements and have not taken any particular view on this issue in the past. I am not out to criticize any particular person or group but only want to make a suggestion that might appeal and which might benefit Kuranda.

It seems to me that the best interests of all concerned might be well served if there was a single, regular, free and colourful courtesy bus service travelling around the commercial area of the Village to and from the Cable car/ Railway terminus between the hours that the Cable car and Railway operate. This service could have numerous pick up and drop off points throughout the Village run. It would cover both Coondoo Street and Therwine Street as well as the butterfly farm and the shops adjacent to it. It may well be able to be funded from the Kuranda Tourist levy and be controlled by the Council.

In my view such a courtesy bus service should be given sole access to behind the "log" at the Cable car so as to pick up old and disabled passengers with ease. We should be trying to make tourist visits as easy and as comfortable as possible.

If this suggestion was generally agreeable it would be fantastic if the Council would take a lead and initiate it. I am sure Kuranda would benefit.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

The Environmental Protection & Biodiversity Conservation Act Referrals Section of the Federal Department of Environment and Water Resources recently deemed the proposed development at 138 Myola Road to be a "controlled action" under the EPBC Act. The developer was then required to prepare an amended proposal to better protect threatened species that use the area and the biodiversity of its rainforest ecosystem.

This proposal is now available for concerned residents to read in the Kuranda Library, at the Shire Council Office in Mareeba and at the Environmental Protection Authority office, 5b Sheridan Street, Cairns. It is open for public comment for 20 working days – until February 18, 2009.

Comments from concerned residents can ensure that our threatened species and their habitat are protected into the future.

Dear Kuranda Paper.

It would greatly benefit our avian population if motorists would lower their speed when approaching birds who are exhibiting unusual behaviour.

Most birds fly off the road when a vehicle approaches, but, some ground nesting birds stay on, wings outstretched, defending their nest and/or nestlings.

We lost an entire family of Masked Plovers on Koah Road, before the Stock Crossing sign on 16th and 17th of this month. While driving I saw a plover in a defensive position guarding her chick which had been hit by a vehicle. I removed the chick hoping to keep the parent off the road. Unfortunately, at 6am the next morning, we saw both parents dead on the side of the road having been hit by vehicles. A search found a lone egg.

Neighbours said the plovers had been nesting there for years and the locals were aware of them and their behaviour. This was a sad situation for all concerned. These birds had survived birds of prey, cats, dogs, quolls and snakes, but could not defend themselves against motor vehicles.

Please be observant and lower your speed when approaching these birds. They quite willingly get off the road when you slow down, they are merely being protective good parents.

Anniversary of the Cyclone at Kuranda – February 1920

On the night of Monday 2 February 1920 Kuranda was ravaged by a severe cyclone. In that period not all cyclones were named, and this one was not "christened". The cyclone caused significant damage on the coast from Mossman to Gordonvale, and inland as far as Chillagoe. Reports issued by the weather bureau earlier that day gave little warning of what was to come. At 12.30 p.m. the advice was "Conditions very suspicious this morning north-east from Bowen". A later report at 5.15 p.m. said "This afternoon's observations confirms existence tropical disturbance centre north-east from Cardwell, course not yet apparent, but probably approaching coastline between Cooktown and Townsville". A more general report released that day appeared in *The Cairns Post* on Tuesday 3 February, after the cyclone had wrecked the area. Under the heading "Track of Disturbance - Not Stated as Dangerous", the report went on to say: "To-day's chart, based on the 9 a.m. observations, leaves hardly any room for doubt of the existence of a tropical disturbance, and the afternoon's reports give complete confirmation. It can't yet be definitely stated if the new disturbance is a dangerous cyclone, in its popular sense, and its course is not yet apparent, but the coast between Cape Flattery and Townsville appears to be threatened, and warnings have accordingly been dispatched".

The Cairns Post of Tuesday 3 February carried all the weather information, including a small article under the heading "Midnight Gales Reach Extraordinary Velocity". The article stated "as night wore on, the gales increased in force, until at midnight they reached a height of over 80 miles (100 kilometres) an hour. Up to 11 o'clock, anxious groups struggled through the windstorm to the post office, where they inspected the barometer, and found it had fallen considerably since the Patrick F. Kinnealy, who was officer in charge of the police station at Kuranda at the north-west. Telegraphic communication south of Townsville has been difficult after midnight".

Although there were some small references to the damage caused by the cyclone, *The Cairns Post* never really covered the story on the morning following the cyclone. However, on the Wednesday the story had extensive coverage. The lack of coverage on the day following the cyclone was no doubt due to the fact that all printing at that time had to be type set by hand, a time consuming and tedious job. By the time the cyclone struck Cairns, the typesetting would have been done, leaving no time to change the paper's format and report the story properly.

The story in The Cairns Post on Wednesday covered the damage in all areas. The situation at Kuranda is given here as it appeared in the paper:

A railway relief party left Cairns on Tuesday morning in charge of Mr. Hooper, District Superintendent, to see what relief could be given a long the line. It was learned that Kuranda had felt the full force of the cyclone, and many anxious inquiries were being made as to the welfare of friends residing there. Stratford appears to have missed the fury of the gale. Councillor Moore's verandahs were damaged. The fences and station at Redlynch were severely damaged and the station building was blown down and the goodshed unroofed. At Jungara very little damage was done. At Stoney Creek, the lengthsmen's trolley shed had disappeared, and all the fruit had been blown down from the trees. A magnificent body of water was going over the falls. Barron Falls never looked a fitter sight, in the memory of the railway guards and officials, who had been travelling there for many years. Throughout the entire journey large trees had been uprooted, and all telegraph wires were down.

At Kuranda, the damage was indeed very severe. Remilton's Hotel was partly unroofed. Hunter's residence was unroofed. Dodd's Hall was moved off the blocks, and portion of the residence unroofed. The School of Arts was blown down, and was completely wrecked. Pearce's Hotel was unroofed, and the Carruthers' family lost their verandah. Harriman's house was blown down. K. Beavis's house was blown off its blocks, and a similar fate befell the Rest Home. Newbury's house was unroofed, and Gummow's partly unroofed. Brookman's was also unroofed. The Barron River had risen 22 feet by three o'clock, and was still rising. The Mantaka school was blown off its blocks, and the shelter shed blown away. J. Veivers' house was blown down. Mr. Smith's residence at Kuranda was demolished. The goods-shed, station roof and refreshment rooms also suffered severely.

early hours of the night. Overhead the clouds scudded away with great force to the time of the cyclone, wrote of the ordeal in the North Australian Monthly in January 1959:

On the day of the cyclone I had been on patrol to Koah, about fifteen miles from Kuranda. During the day there were light showers of rain and small gusts of wind, not at all unusual weather for North Queensland in February. But at about one o'clock great masses of black cloud covered the sky. The rain became heavier and the wind began to rise. When I reached home late that afternoon, I knew that a cyclone was on the way.

There were no wireless reports or cyclone warning systems in those days. The nearest weather station was at Willis Island, three hundred miles to the East, and our only link with Cairns was by telephone. By the time I reached the station, the telephone line was already out of order. The police station at Kuranda was built on a slope, the highest part of the house being about seven feet from the ground and the lowest part practically on the ground. The office was situated in the latter part of the building, in the most sheltered position. On the opposite side was a small fig tree in which two doves had nested.

The cyclone struck at about six-thirty and ravaged Kuranda and district for nearly thirteen hours. Rising to almost ninety miles an hour, the wind howled round the house like a living thing. About eleven o'clock the side wall of the living-room began to bend with each gust of wind, and I knew that at any moment the wall might be blown in and we would be swept into the night. So during a lull I moved my family into the office, which seemed to have a good chance of withstanding the terrific force of the wind. About two chains away from the station was a two-storey wooden building which housed the families of men who worked in Cairns and returned home by train each night. No train could get through that night so I decided to see how the women and children were faring.

Taking a hurricane lamp, I set off. I got only a few feet when a great gust of wind swept me off my feet and against the side fence. The lamp was blown out so I returned to the office, re-lit it and set off again. This time I crouched low to the ground, bent almost double. The families lived on the upper floor of the building and the stairway was on the outside of the building. I had to crawl up the stairs with one arm round the railing. Finally I made it, and found the women all awake and worried about the safety of their husbands. A sheet of glass from one of the windows had been blown across the bed in which one child slept, missing her face only by a few inches. Having reassured the women as best I could, I returned to the office.

When dawn broke, the wind still howled and tore at the house like a mad creature, but its force was beginning to spend itself. About seven o'clock the wind began to die down and the rain ceased to a steady drizzle. Inspection showed that the only dry place in the house was the stove recess. Rain was pouring in everywhere, as except for a few sheets of iron the house had been unroofed and shifted about six inches from its blocks. The fig-tree was stripped of all foliage and the doves' nest had disappeared. A poignant postscript to the cyclone was the incessant crying of the parent birds, as they called for their lost nestlings in the days that followed.

The cells, a solid timber structure, had been overturned, the clothes boiler had disappeared, and a 500 gallon tank was lying near our back fence. The owner of this was never traced. Nearly every house in Kuranda had been unroofed, several were partially destroyed, furniture, clothing and China being scattered around the surrounding bush. One man's front verandah was found in the vard of the Barron Falls hotel, two hundred yards away. The School of Arts had been blown away, leaving only the flooring. The piano was literally in pieces, the white and black keys being torn apart and blown, one by one, about the town. I kept several of the piano keys as souvenirs. At Street's plantation

Free Lifeline Counseling: A Lifeline Counselor is coming to KNC once per fortnight to see Kuranda people. There are up to 6 free sessions available, however, many times, only one or two are necessary to sort through personal issues. There is no obligation to have ongoing counseling and generally most of us need to sort through things every now and then. New Funding: KNChas been successful in an application for \$35,000 additional recurrent funding. This application was made when it was determined that the additional costs of running a larger centre were not being met within our current funding. The new funding is \$11,000 short of the original request and therefore revenue raised from the bookshop and other small fundraising ventures still must go on to filling this gap. There are also other costs that are not met within our funding that we need to consider such as additional worker hours for the Family Support Worker, Youth work hours, other program or activity costs or building modifications etc. We are seeking interested community members to participate on a Fundraising committee to investigate other income generating ideas. If you have expertise, time or ideas, please come and see me.

Kowrowa Community Day: Lolita Hunter from the Medical Centre coordinated a day at Kowrowa for kids health checks with input from Ngoonbi Sports and Recreation, Kuranda Justice Group, KNC, Queensland Health, Queensland Police and the Kuranda Medical Centre. The day was well attended with approximately 50 kids and 20 parents. Well done Lolita!

Child Related Services: We are receiving an increase in enquiries about child related care or other services. We are trying to compile a list/directory that we can then hand out for what is available for Kuranda families. If you know of any service or activity, can you please ring in and talk to Ceri Hughes. Our unit is next in line for a new vehicle, most likely a five seat Toyota Troopcarrier. I've applied to TRC for a budget submission to be prepared for a building extension to provide an extra four metre wide enclosed space across the front of the existing building.

This would provide the following benefits-

- The vehicle would have a permanent parking space in the new area and would be able to be driven forward or backed straight in. Either of the two trailers would be able to be hitched on under cover. One trailer could also be permanently parked in the new area.
- The increased size of the "lecture" space would enable us to cater more easily for our increasing membership and for sessions such as CPR.
- The "lecture" space could be permanently set up with data projector and other teaching aids.
- The above space is also a food preparation or equipment drying area, so it could be more easily utilised as such.
- More space would enable us to address Workplace Health and Safety concerns with equipment storage.
- Better ventilation could also provide a cooler work environment.

Its been a very busy few months at BatReach with many orphaned flying foxes (the majority losing their mothers to paralysis ticks) and furless gliders needing 3 hourly feeds. Another little fellow needing quite a bit of attention was Elmo, a juvenile Squirrel Glider. In early December we received a call from a lady near Forsayth who had rescued the glider from a barbed wire fence. The membrane had wrapped around the fence and he was unable to free himself.

The lady and her husband did a great job of minimising the damage by gently disentangling him. Elmo needed medical attention so the next problem was how to get him to the coast. The Trans North bus departing Karumba kindly collected the patient in Georgetown and brought him to Kuranda. Elmo sat in an icecream container next to the driver for the long journey.

Apart from the damaged membrane, Elmo was dehydrated and thin. Treating the membrane and giving him antibiotics wasn't too hard for the first few days, however, as he began to feel stronger he definitely wasn't going to co-operate. We are pleased to say he has gained weight and the membrane has healed well.

The Squirrel Glider is the larger cousin of the Sugar Glider. They live in dry sclerophyll forests and may occupy wetter eucalypts. Conservation status is "uncommon", possibly due to clearing of woodland habitat. Elmo is particularly attractive with his pale fur and lovely bushy tail. He will be returned to his natural habitat for release and thanks to his

rescuers and Trans North for his transportation into care.







A Thought for February

This month we read from The Gospel according to St Mark Chapter 1 verse 14-20 As Jesus once called people in the midst of their working hours, so he can speak to us.

We never know when the course of our lives will be changed by something that happens outside our lives. It happens here with Jesus. For nearly twenty years he had presumably led an ordinary life in Nazareth. It is obvious from the person we encounter in the Gospels that those early years were really far from ordinary. There was the cultivation of a deep intimacy with God. There were endless hours spent in meditation on the insights of the kingdom of God. As his hands shaped wood, his growing spirit was already being shaped. But nothing of a public nature was done in those hidden years

Suddenly John the Baptist is arrested. Jesus had immense admiration for John. John's preaching of a coming kingdom had drawn and fascinated Jesus. Now Jesus in some mysterious way that same kingdom realizes that is embodied in himself. Something stronger than himself seems to take over, and the great journey begins which will continue to Calvary and triumph in the garden tomb.

Jesus' first act is to involve others. The community which will one day spread across the world begins to take shape. Jesus' shaping of this first small circle has much to teach us.

Why did Jesus begin by gathering a few people as he did? Because he realized that any vision of the kingdom of God must be tested in the reality of human relationships. He was telling us that the kingdom of God is about relationships. It is discovered in relationships - our relationship with ourselves, with others, and with God.

Jesus calls seemingly ordinary people. None of these men is an intellectual giant. None has great knowledge of public affairs. All of them are very human indeed, and at times they will show it obviously. That says something to us about the possibility of Jesus calling and using us in spite of our humanity.

Finally, we see Jesus calling these people in the midst of their daily routine. That is the very last place and time we expect Our Lord to approach us. We may ask why this is so. Maybe Jesus is approaching us in our working hours and working relationships and we don't realize it. That is the Good News for this week.

As Jesus once called people in the midst of their working hours, so he can speak to us here and now in 2009.

The Cyclone. Contd from P.3

across the Barron River, the cyclone had cut a triangular path about a chain wide through the scrub, great trees having been uprooted as though they were shrubs. The Barron River was a torrent, trees and a mass of debris tossing in the water. The main street was littered with torn sheets of iron, rafters and battens.

All the telephone lines were down, so a patrol of the surrounding districts was a necessity. I had to walk to Myola and Mantaka, some miles away, where normally I rode, cutting my way through the scrub with a brush hook. Trees of up to four feet (1.2 metres) in diameter had been torn out by the roots and strewn over the track. At Myola the blocks which supported one house had been pushed up through the floor, narrowly missing one man who was asleep. One woman at Mantaka, whose husband had been stranded in Cains, had decided to take her family to her brothers' house nearby shortly after the cyclone started. The distance was only a few yards, but her three-year old girl was blown away almost as soon as they left the house. Her brothers went to search as soon as they were told and found the child lying against a wire-netting fence which surrounded the house. A creek ran nearby and the fence saved the child from being blown into it and drowning.

For several days no trains ran to Kuranda as the line to Cairns was blocked by debris. There was no loss of life in the cyclone in Kuranda but the material damage totalled thousands of pounds. Though later I was in cyclones of greater intensity, I still have vivid memories of that first experience of the "Scourge of the North".

It is clear that Patrick Kinnealy's recollections differ slightly from the reports in *The Cairns Post* on the Wednesday following the cyclone. While Kinnealy said no train got through to Kuranda for several days, the *Post* reported a relief train getting through next day. The *Post* also reported that a train from Chillagoe had travelled through to Cairns on Tuesday, the day following the cyclone. The discrepancy in the two accounts is a small point, but it shows that recollections of events, even by credible eyewitnesses, should not be accepted as fact. This is especially relevant when the recollections are given so many years after the event.

A report in *The Cairns Post* on Thursday 5 February gives an account of the damage at Mona Mona:

The cyclone which devastated so many other places, also visited Monamona Mission. It started about 8 p.m. on Monday, blowing from the west. During the night it veered around to the south, and then to the east. From four to five on Tuesday morning it was blowing from the east and it was during this hour that the damage was done. All the native cottages, except one, one mission house, a barn, a large dining-room, and a kitchen, were levelled to the ground. The sawmill was unroofed, and all the crops were blown away. The country round looks bare and bald. Quite half the trees are uprooted, and those that are left standing are limbless, and leafless. One old native woman died from exposure, but other than this they had not serious injuries. The superintendent, Mr. J.L. Bransford, estimates the losses are about £1800 (\$100,000). He adds: "We have not up to the present time asked the public for any help, but in this terrible trial donations from any interested persons would be thankfully received".

Government reports indicate that the infrastructure at Mona Mona was rebuilt very quickly and the farm was back in production within a year.

Sleeping Warm in Afghanistan

This was beside the dirt road that runs down the east side of Afghanistan. It was dreadful. Two day's bus journey on the worst road I have ever been on. So bad that the passengers soon gave up from the pain of being bounced in their seats and took to standing. The whole bus load of them. It was cold!

I had left Kabul a few days earlier where the footpaths were solid slippery ice about six inches deep.

Finally, at the end of the long, long day we stopped for the night. There was a tea house and beside it a strange fifteen foot square building made of rock, three feet tall. In the middle of the front wall was a mini-door made of solid timber.

One by one the entire bus load of passengers wriggled through this doorway. There were no women. Nobody seemed to mind me, a foreigner, joining them.

Inside there was a smooth rock floor, which to my amazement I found was heated. The result being that this strange room with its three foot high ceiling was pleasantly warm.

Even so, we snuggled up against each other to share each other's warmth. Someone shut the mini-door and we slept.

MEDITATION:



Pita people, being very visual, enjoy meditation that use colour, images, or beautiful objects. As in all activities they should guard against getting too intense or competitive.

Kapha people find it easy to sit quietly and contemplate. They have a naturally compassionate and devoted nature. To help avoid sleepiness, use incense or perfume in the air to keep the senses alert and take periods of walking outside in between periods of sitting.

For those of you new to the idea of meditation, next month there will be some brief instructions for sitting meditation. They are basically from the Tibetan Buddhist tradition, but included are a few other ideas that have been found useful over the years.



AYURVEDIC RECEIPE

ABOUT ALMONDS: Almonds are highly valued as a rejuvenative in Ayurveda. Ayurvedic practice recommends that almonds always be blanched as they are in this recipe, as their skins are difficult to digest.

REJUVENTATIVE ALMOND MILK:

5 almonds soaked overnight in about cup of water.

1 cup milk

1/2 teaspoon ground cardamom

In the morning drain almonds and peel them. (The skin comes off easily when rubbed with your fingers).

In a small saucepan bring milk to the boil. Pour hot milk, almonds and cardamom in blender. Blend well.

COMMENT: This very restorative drink is especially useful after a period of major exertion, also in fall and winter.

IRON-RICH YOGHURT DRINK:

1/4 cup raisins

1/4 cup unsulphured dried apricots, peaches or figs.

1 cup water

½ cup yoghurt, plain

Soak fruit in water overnight. Then blend all ingredients in blender, mixing well

COMMENT: This drink is an excellent digestive aid and toner. It is also mildly laxative in action.

TABLELANDS REGIONAL COUNCIL



News Briefs

A MEETING between parties concerned with straying cattle at Kuranda was an important step towards a resolution to the long-running issue, Tablelands Regional Council Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

Cr Gilmore said he had called the meeting with residents of Monaro Close and the Barnwells, owners of a property where the cattle are believed to be straying from, to help both sides gain a clear understanding of the issue.

Council recently began a process to impound straying cattle in the area after complaints from Monaro Close residents. However, lawyers for the Barnwells had requested more information on two orders recently served by Council on the property owners.

Cr Gilmore said he had offered Council's resources to help the Barnwells brand and tag their cattle.

"They indicated that they would take care of this but the offer of help still stands," Cr Gilmore said. "This issue has been complex and challenging, cost Council a lot of money and caused distress to all parties involved."

Division 8 Councillor Jenny Jensen said the Council was determined to work with all the parties to find a resolution to the issue.

A bull found straying on the road has already been impounded.

The region's small communities will benefit from the Federal Government's one-off infrastructure grant.

Tablelands Regional Council will use its \$1.3 million slice of the \$250 million Regional and Local Community Infrastructure Program on work at public halls, toilets, visitor centres and tourist attractions.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the

money was going where it was needed most.

The following projects will be funded:

Atherton Chinatown, \$15,000; Chillagoe Hall, \$80,000; Dimbulah Caravan Park, \$130,000; Herberton Mining Centre, \$150,000; Irvinebank School of Arts Building, \$60,000; Julatten Hall, \$80,000; Kuranda Old Primary School, \$200,000: Malanda Show Pavilion, \$120,000; Malanda Falls Pool, \$30,000; Mareeba playground, \$100,000: Millaa Millaa RSL Hall. \$30,000; Millaa Millaa Falls Circuit \$30,000; Mt Garnet Hall, \$58,000; Tarzali public toilets, \$55,000; small or rural parks \$50,000 and Yungaburra Library and Visitor Information Centre, \$120,000.

Work will be carried out on Platypus Park at Atherton, if funds permit.

Council also resolved to put forward a funding application under the government's Regional and Local Community Infrastructure Project -Strategic Projects for a multi-purpose community centre in Mareeba.

A new skills based-advisory committee for the Tablelands Regional Gallery has been endorsed by Tablelands Regional Council.

Members are Cr Shaaron representative). Linwood (Council Louise DeMarzi (gallery patron). Deborah Godfrey (gallery director/ Truppermauer curator), Ben (Ravenshoe-Herberton/individual member), Helen Hume (Malanda/ Atherton Arts Society), Margaret Wallen (Mareeba and outlying area/Mareeba Art Society), Ludij Peden (Yungaburra artist), Toni Rogers (Kuranda artist), Anne-Marie Williams (Community and rural artist) and Susan Harris (Herberton).

The committee will assist the gallery in everyday management issues

and advise Council on matters relating to the gallery. It will meet for the first time in February 2009.

Tablelands Regional Council will seek expressions of interest for an independent traffic and parking study in Kuranda.

Division 8 Councillor Jenny Jensen said the proposed study would provide recommendations to Council on changes to current parking arrangements and further development of parking within the Kuranda village.

"There are a number of factors to be considered due to the physical limitations of the town's current parking allocation," Cr Jensen said. "We need to balance the needs of local residents, local businesses and tourism operators.

Cr Jensen said funds have been set aside over the years for further development of parking in the village.

Work to resolve pumping issues at the Kuranda town water supply is continuing, Division 8 Councillor Jenny Jensen said today. Following recent heavy rain, the water intake pipes which take water from the Barron River to the Kuranda Water Treatment Plant blocked with sand.

Cr Jensen said a water pump was continuing to take water direct from the river to the treatment plant while Council worked to clean out the pipes.

"A combination vacuum and line washing truck and dive crew were brought onto the site earlier this week to start clearing the sand from the pipes," Cr Jensen said. "Unfortunately, the changing heights of the river from continuing rain made it unsafe for the divers. There were also issues with the truck."

Cr Jensen said it was likely the current temporary pumping arrangements would remain in place until the end of the wet season. Building statistics for the period from 21 November to 20 December 2008 show more than \$5 million worth of approvals were granted. Tablelands Regional Council issued 85 approvals including 20 new homes in Mareeba, Julatten and Speewah.

A decision on a new logo for the Tablelands Regional Council has been deferred until the next Council meeting in February

Tablelands Regional Council signed off on more than \$26,000 worth of donations late last year.

The 15 donations were made during the period 6 December 2008 until 12 January 2009, to a raft of community, sporting and cultural organisations and events.

The Tablelands publicly honoured its community, sporting and cultural achievers at the 2009 Australia Day Awards ceremonies.

Winners were announced in 12 categories at four separate official Australia Day functions in Atherton, Mareeba, Ravenshoe and Malanda.

Tablelands Regional Council Mayor Tom Gilmore said the calibre of the nominees was amazing. "This is one of the opportunities we as a community get to formally and publicly recognise the people who do so much for the community," Cr Gilmore said.

Under the VGP, funding of




"Volunteering is very popular in the Tropical North which reflects our strong sense of community spirit," Mr Turnour said.



Rescue package for Neighbourhood Centre **Funding**

The Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre plays a vital role providing support and assistance to people in the Kuranda community including information, referrals, community living support, community cultural group development as well as service sector support and development. Due to increasing demand for their services and rising costs, I was very pleased to be able to help the neighbourhood centre obtain additional funding of \$35,000 per annum over the next three years and a one-off grant of \$35,000 to cover immediate needs.

Extra funding for local schools for 2009

Sale of Cairns Airport

The \$446 million redeveloped hospital for Cairns is full steam ahead following the successful sale of Cairns Airport. The sale of the airport for \$530 million, to the same consortium that bought the Mackay Airport as well as additional equity investor JP Morgan, was finalised late December. I have already met with the new owners and put forward a number of issues of concern to locals. Importantly, I urged continued support for community conservation projects including the green corridor project which is re-vegetating the banks of the Barron River through Kuranda.

The proceeds of the sale will go directly into the redevelopment of the Cairns Hospital which will include additional cardiac care facilities, full day surgery unit, specialist clinics and pathology services, as well as integrated mental health and cancer care units. By 2014, the redevelopment will mean 168 extra beds. The cancer units include new radiation oncology units which means, for the first time, Cairns residents will no longer have to travel to Townsville or Brisbane for treatment.

Australia Day Awards:

Great to see some nominations from the Kuranda district for the Australia Day awards. There are so many people in our community who give willingly of their time and effort and it is good to see them recognised. Congratulations to all the successful nominees, particularly to Georgia Bruce, Cathy Retter and Helen Coleman (now lives in Mareeba, but is certainly a Kuranda-ite.)

Federal Government Funds:

Late last year the Tablelands Regional Council received an additional 1.3 million in federal government funds for local infrastructure projects such as halls, parks and gardens, community facilities. Council has now allocated these funds for projects across our region and I am very pleased that approximately \$200,000 of this amount will be allocated for works at the old Kuranda Primary School.

Old Primary School:

The Advisory Committee has now commenced the task of moving forward with developing options and arrangements for the site. As I have always said, this will be a long process, but things are now underway. Please take the opportunity to continue to discuss your ideas with members of the Committee. Along with myself and Matt Hyde (General Manager: Community Services TRC), the group will be working on a strategic plan and costing for the development of the site.

Civil Works and Roads:

During the past month, our road crews main have been very busy due to the heavy rains. It is expected that longer term projects such as work

on widening sections of Koah Road and Myola Rd will commence soon. Our crews are doing their best to keep up with mowing, but that grass just seems to keep on growing at a rapid rate!

New Playing Field at Junior School:

The work on the Playing Field at the Junior School Campus at the Kuranda District College has now been completed and the area has been seeded with grass. I anticipate that the field will be ready for use fairly soon. The facility will be available to the community and will be administered by a Management Committee.

Tourism matters:

For some years, Council has received funds via the state government to fund tourism related infrastructure in the central Kuranda Village area. Expressions of Interest for membership of the advisory committee (known as the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee or KIAC) were called in December. The successful nominees are Fay Allen, Terry Pates, Cathy Retter, Kim Forde, Peter Potter and the new Committee will commence meeting in early February. Work will commence soon on progressing the projects approved by the former Committee and the Minister. These include upgrade to Therwine St, Toilet facilities for the Barron Falls area and covered walkways in the village.

Parking Review for Kuranda:

Council will soon be conducting a Review of Parking needs for the Kuranda village area. The review will look at all aspects of parking and will definitely consider aspects such as the needs of local residents, tourism related traffic and parking, loading zones etc.

Nursery extension

The Envirocare nursery at 19 Kullaroo Close now has a new shade area extension so all plants can be located there. A big thank you to the Envirocare volunteers, the Greencorp team and the Mission Australia participants who have all had a hand in completing this, and to Mission Australia for their funding. It's working well, the trees are in great health and many plants are now ready for hardening off in preparation for planting. We have plenty of plants suitable for residents' blocks and gardens so come and check us out.

Fruiting this Month

River cherry (Syzygium tierneyanum)

Found naturally by rivers and water courses, this tree is fruiting now. The fruit is about 2cm long, pear shaped with a typical syzygium indented cross on the bottom. Red fruit are more common but some trees bear white fruit. It's fast growing, frost hardy (not necessary here) and an essential species for rehabilitation of river bank erosion in the Wet Tropics. It can be used in garden plantings where it probably grows 10-12m and has a coppery red flush of new growth contrasting with dark green mature leaves. It has masses of creamy white flowers in spring which attract the butterflies and honeyeaters.

So if you find fruit, bring them to the nursery and we'll exchange them for other plants for your garden.

Australian Rules

Based on the award winning novel 'Deadly, Unna?' by Phillip Gwynne, 'Australian Rules' speculates on the deep rooted racism of the small rural fishing community of Prospect Bay, South Australia, where winning the football premiership is the most exciting thing to happen since the community won a tidy town competition. The film is viewed from the perspective of Blacky/Gary, a quiet, sensitive, and questioning youth who is best friends with football team mate Dumby Red, a brilliant Aboriginal footballer and idealist, apparently unaffected by the animosity of older cousin Perry towards the whites. The status quo changes after a farcical grand final presentation in which one of the goonyas (whites) is selected over arguably Best on Ground Dumby. The football field proves the town's racial arena whereby gunyas (blacks) are tolerated for their superior football prowess - off field, the small minded community is a pressure cooker of racism and hostilities which explode after a tragic event. Blacky's relationship to Dumby's sister Clarence also proves a point of contention with his abusive, belligerent and racist father. A thoughtful and passionate film, 'Australian Rules' is as much about friendship, intolerance, and life in an isolated community as it is about racism.

Die Drei Von Der Tankstelle = Three from the Filling Station

This operetta of everyday life involves three friends, Willy, Kurt and Hans, who, finding themselves bankrupt, open a petrol station. They are all attracted to the same woman in a roadster. This musical comedy is considered one of the finest example of the early German sound film, thanks to the innovative use of sound, the combination of music and images, and experiments with high-angle shots which later became famous in US musicals. At first glance, the film's success could be due to its optimism, particularly in the period immediately following the world economic depression when unemployment was still widespread in Germany. The authors Franz Schulz and Paul Frank have cunningly included even this detail: the story starts with a bank that goes bankrupt and then continues with three men whose entire possessions have been seized by the bailiff, only their car being left to them. Everyday reality definitely features in the film, yet it cannot be accused of escapism, despite its optimism. Even the heroes themselves are highly ambivalent characters. Musical highlights are provided by the popular singing group. The film was banned in 1937 in Germany.




