

What can I say? Stunning scenery from Skyrail, a true world class experience.

Arriving in Kuranda expecting "lots to see and do, there is a surprise around every corner" (as quoted in one tourism brochure), indeed there was! Disappointment at every corner. Tourism brochures everywhere extol the virtues of "Charming Kuranda", "Home to the Kuranda Markets and Heritage Markets", "Unique and fascinating gifts to take home with you". From where we come in Tasmania (Hobart) the Salamanca Markets are what we consider to he true markets, with individual vendors producing locally handmade and original products. Pottery, paintings, craft work, local produce, hand crafts and leric a brac. Perhaps it is an individual thing, but I am afraid my wife and I do not consider walking into an area similar to the Cairns Night Markets the true style of markets. In fact my wife visited this same area 13 years ago and was expecting (incorrectly) to have a similar experience as then, but up to date and bigger. Following the sign to the "Home of the Original Kuranda Markets" what did we find? Emptiness, yet the muzak was playing and there was not one stall open. The other experience was equally disappointing. Hoping that the stalls had moved to the new location, all we saw there were basically the same stalls that wore at the Night Markets in town. So disappointing! A great lunch was had at Kangazims, and the coconut ice cream seldom available anywhere) was equally great.

Staying with locals and treating one of our hosts to the Skyrail train experience, he too agreed, and was equally disappointed. Make no mistake: they won't he recommending a visit to Kuranda to their interstate visitors. Nor will we recommend it to our friends who seek an opinion on Kuranda Markets. The trip there and back on the train is truly worth making the effort, but please try to make the Village experience a far more happy one. In fact we spent longer at lunch eating than we did in exploring the "markets". With only one train trip back on Saturday, we had to wait an the station for 11/2 hours before we could leave.

As you are probably aware, the dry season has well and truly started and as a result the fire hazard has increased dramatically. You will find letters in the post office this week in regards to pre-grassfire season prepartion for Rural areas - keep an eye out for these. All backyard fires are currently banned unless they are in an enclosed incinerator or BBQ area. Further information on this and permits can be obtained from the station 4093 7406 or 0417 773 829.



With the increased fire hazard, some you may find yourselves in a position to have to call for the fire brigade - the following points, if followed, will help to ensure a speedy dispatch.

- 1.Do not contact for any fire station directly - always call ooo for any fire or other hazardous situation
- 2.Stay calm and speak clearly. You will be asked a series of questions; these will be asked as the brigade is being dispatched and are essential to ensure that the correct resources are sent to your emergency. Knowing the correct address and nearest cross street/inspection are very important. 3.Do not hang up until instructed to do so. A Thought for July

This month we open our bibles and read from St Matthews Gospel Chapter 9 verse 35 to Chapter 10 verse 8. Nothing we read in the scriptures is merely about the past. The event in scripture, past though it may be, is also very much with us in the present. In scripture Jesus is speaking to us, not merely has spoken to people in the past. In today's gospel reading from Matthew the writer has brought us to the point where Jesus realizes that the time has come to name those whose responsibility it will be to work with him on his mission. There is a hint that the demands of that mission are getting beyond one pair of hands, even if those hands are the most loving and gracious hands ever to touch this world.

We know that these people have already become disciples of Jesus. But now something more must be done. There needs to be an actual moment when these same disciples are given what the scripture calls "authority". This is not seen as an authority merely to give orders, which most of us like doing, but an authority to serve others, which we don't always like! Jesus then names the twelve, carefully and deliberately, and sends them out. What does this deceptively simple scene say to us? As a Christian, each of us is part of the Body of Christ. But there must come a moment when we ourselves freely realize what this means. We must own our baptism, and take responsibility for it. The experience we call confirmation is meant to help us toward that, but in actual fact taking complete responsibility for our baptism may not come for a long time. We are already disciples by our baptism, but have we fully realized what disciples do?

In verse 35 we see what Our Lord's work is. It is teaching, preaching, healing. We may not be called to do all these things. Teaching could be in many forms of handing on the faith, even if only to our own small children. But we teach by being who we are. Healing can include any act of service to another or to society. We are named. How? In baptism. But we need to hear Jesus name us again. It can happen in many quiet and unexpected moments if we will only listen. When we hear our name we will know what Jesus wants us to do. Then, with his grace, we will be able to do it. As Our Lord named his original disciples, so he names us to do his work in our time.



And when guilt arises, the only way is to cover it up by worshipping, by giving respect. The same Jews turned Christiansthey were the first Christians.

Hindus succeeded far more cleverly. They did not crucify Buddha, although they tried many times to kill him; they could not succeed. But philosophically, metaphysically they succeeded.



MATERIAL CHANGE OF USE

THE INTEGRATED PLANNING ACT WHAT'S IT ALL MEAN? HAS IT GOT ANYTHING TO DO WITH YOU?

You wake up one day to the sound of a bulldozer next door and trees crashing down. What on earth is going on? How come you are the last to know!

Yes, it does have something to do with you, and yes, you probably are the last to know - but only because you didn't know where to look for information and, if you had seen a notice, you probably wouldn't have known how it might impact on you and your environment.

You are part of this community and along with many others of us, our collective knowledge is what gives us the capacity to take control of (and responsibility for) what goes on around us. But, we need to know what the rules are and what our rights are. The law is actually on our side - if it is enforced.

There are some subdivisions around Kuranda that are, in fact, illegal. This occurred in the past because we, as a community, were unaware of the rules and did not challenge the decision-makers of the day (our local council). Now it's history and can't be undone.

Today it is much easier for us. We not only have KURANDA *EnviroCare*, we also have the Environmental Defenders Office of North Queensland. EDO-NQ is a body of solicitors whose charter it is to help the community understand the rules and regulations that govern development (the Integrated Planning Act (IPA)) and to assist us to make submissions (used to be called "objections") if we are concerned about impacts on ourselves or our environment. EDO-NQ can assist us with the process of ensuring that our voices are heard.

To this end, EDO-NQ's solicitors are offering to run a seminar or workshop for us in Kuranda in July. It's likely to take a few hours and KURANDA EnviroCare will put on lunch for all participants. What we need to know is if you would like to come and what day would suit you best. Please call us on 4093 8834 to register your interest and we'll be back in touch with final details. If there is any charge at all, it will be around \$5 to help with catering.

THE 4Ss (Sustainable Society, Schools and Sawmills)

We have at least jumped the first hurdle towards getting funding for our project to have our Kuranda schools become schools of excellence in environmental studies using native forestry plantations as the practical way to achieve this. There is a little more polishing to be done before the project gets the nod.

SEEDS - NATURE'S EXTRAVAGANCE

From time to time we put out a call for seeds and seedlings from your native rainforest gardens. The response has, and continues to be, pretty amazing. The best part is realising that so many people are interested in the work going on in the nursery and are prepared to make the effort to collect some seeds and/or plants and bring them to us.

For instance, on the day this column was being written for the Kuranda Paper, some 350 seedlings were potted up and placed on the nursery racks to grow to a decent size for planting in the EnviroLink Wildlife Corridor - somewhere near you!

The thousands of seeds you bring us are carefully planted by our dedicated volunteers, watered and tendered, until they are ready for transferring into pots. (The seeds, that is, not the volunteers!). You are probably unaware that the young trees you see along Myola-Oakforest Road and the Barron River, might have come from your property.

some more awards.






KURANDA MUDSLINGERS

many ways to be in solidarity with the refugees

In 1951 Austalia was not only one of the first countries to sign the United Nations Convention on Refugess, but also helped to write this document. The convention has provided hope and given protection to over fifty million people all over the world who have been forced to flee their homes and livelihood. 50 years later, however, the Australian government has increasingly turned its back on the humanitarian principles enshrined in this convention. Refugees are incarcerated, dehumanised, belittled and now steered off to small Pacific nations with inadequate infrastructure.

Many of us are disagreeing with the government's policies of mandatory detention, the 'Pacific solution' and the discriminatory nature of temporary protection visas, which promote the government's basic premise that asylum seekers are hostile aliens and a threat to society, which again leads some in our communities to embrace extreme ideas.

Refugee rights supporters and welfare organisations are promoting alternatives which emphasise the need for respect for asylum seekers, consideration for the trauma and hurt they have suffered, the provision of services, permanent residency and th right to live in the community while their applications are considered.

Refugees flee their homes because of serious human rights abuses. Refugees are not criminals.

Most refugees are women and children.

Many refugess face violence after the have fled their countries. Some will never be able to return to their family or their home. Refugees have no choice but to flee.

You can do something to promote refugee human rights. You can add your voice to the growing support for refugees in Australia. You can speak up for those whose voices are silenced.

Amnesty International Australia has initiated "FACES OF HOPE"- a photo collection and exhibition as one opportunity to express your support for the Universal Declaration on Human Rights and the United Nations Conventions on Refugees by contributing a photo of yourself. This project was launched on 28th of May this year and will travel around Australia, growing larger as more people add their photograph. For Barron River the most exciting hard
announcement of the second of For Barron River the most exciting budget \$7.8M from the Queensland Bio-discovery Fund for the establishment of the \$33M Australian Tropical Forest Institute on State land adjacent to James Cook University at Smithfield. The Institute partners consist of the Rainforest Co-operative Research Centre,

James Cook University, the Wet Tropics Management Authority, commercial investor, BioProspect and the

Australian Tropical Mycology Research Institute directed by Dr Ceri Pearce and located at Speerwah.

The establishment of the Australian Tropical Forest Institute will bring the Smart State to Far North Queensland and provide the catalyst necessary to develop the local fledgling biotechnology industry and create a high tech future worth multi-millions of dollars for our region. It will also confirm our reputation as a world leader in rainforest research and management.

The budget also contained a number of other benefits for the Kuranda District including:

\$3.7M for the upgrade of the Barron Gorge Power Station.

\$350,000 for design, investigations and environmental approvals required for the four-laning of the Kuranda Range Road.

\$1.14M for upgrading of road, water and sewerage infrastructure in Aboriginal communities in the Kuranda District.

Commencement of public housing project at Top Kowrowa, Kuranda.

\$19,500 additional funding to the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre.

\$30,000 subsidy for extension of the bike lane on Myola Road Kuranda.

\$75,705 over 5 years to lease space in the new private Kuranda Medical Centre for the delivery of Queensland Health Services.

An additional ranger for the Barron Gorge National Park.

The next edition of the Clark Report will contain information about other the State budget initiatives. Other important State government news is the passage of the Personal Injuries Proceedings Act to address the spiralling public liability insurance premiums. The Act contains a number of reforms to the way lawyers and the courts deal with claims and awards by capping payments, banning "no win no fee advertising, encouraging mediation rather expensive legal battles to settle claims and protecting volunteers. The federal government must now ensure that the Australian Consumer and Competition Commission keeps a watch on the insurance industry to ensure these reforms translate to cheaper premiums. The State government is also proceeding with its group scheme for community organisations which should start by September ıst.






