Dear Kuranda Paper,

I write in response to the article printed in your October o5 issue "Kuranda Bus problem" I would like to clear up a few misconceptions.

The courtesy mini buses have now been running for over 8 years. Pedestrian traffic used to move in both directions through the village - coaches dropped some people at one end (Therwine St) to walk to the station and other people walked from the station to board the coaches at the other end of the village. When skyrail opened this cross-flow ceased, so the mini buses were introduced to redress the balance in a very small way. The village tourist numbers are estimated at 1 million a year, so if the courtesy coaches are carrying the 15% of visitors that some businesses are stating, that leaves 85% that are walking through the village each year. If these businesses can not get by on the 85% walking past their door then, in my opinion, their problems are more than just the courtesy mini buses.

We believe losing the courtesy coach will affect restaurants and traders alike. That's why many of the businesses in the main street support mini buses, because the sooner the tourists get to the main attractions, the sooner they get back to the restaurants and shopping in the rest of the village.

The attractions such as Heritage Markets, Koala Gardens, Birdworld and Butterfly Sanctuary spend close to 800,000 dollars per year on advertising Kuranda Village locally and overseas. If you really believe "to each according to his effort" then we should actually be getting more than 50% of tourists walking past our

While we are all haggling over this, the main point is being forgotten - customer satisfaction. The customers are the most important factor in this situation, and it is these people we should consider and

As our Mayor Borzi said, everyone that leaves this village is an ambassador for Kuranda. So can we please get back to what is really important: - offering a fantastic experience to all tourists who come to our Melissa Bambacas, Kuranda Heritage Markets

Now is the time to put behind us the earlier pathetic objections of the minority and work together to ensure, as Friends of the Earth now is, that the new road is a viable, safe and effective engineering achievement for us all.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

Is there a "Kuranda Bus Problem?" As stated in last month's Letters continued article on "problem", around one million visitors a year come to visit our village. 15%, or 150,000, take the free courtesy bus to the market end of the village; visit the attractions that they come here to see, and then walk back to the railway and skyrail

This obviously means that 85%, or 850,000 visitors walk from the terminals up through the village, and all the visitors then walk back through town to the terminals. So, if some business operators at the railway end of Kuranda have a problem it doesn't lie with the buses,

An open meeting of Kuranda business people attract over 100 local business representatives. The free bus issue was fairly debated and around 90% of the meeting voted in favour of keeping the buses. The Mareeba Shire Council also held a meeting on the issue and decided to keep the buses running. So, both the players and the umpire have voted overwhelmingly in favour of providing this free service. If we do in fact, live in a village where a democratic "fair go" is respected, then the issue, I think, has been resolved.

A THOUGHT FOR **NOVEMBER**

This month we read a short passage from St Matthew's Gospel Chapter 22 verses 34 to 40 All of us have had the experience of listening to two people conversing and realizing that their views and assumptions are so totally different that they can never communicate with each other.

This passage allows us to eavesdrop on such a moment in Jesus' ministry. By now, well into that short ministry, there is no scarcity of antagonists. Already Jesus' attitudes and statements have attracted not only attention, but also deep resentment. This resentment comes from the many established and entrenched elements which were all around Jesus and exist in every society. Even more dangerous for Jesus, we see that two such groups, the Pharisees and the Sadducees, who were usually in disagreement, have come together to put pressure on him. While it is not quite true to say that these were two political parties, it will do to help us understand the situation.

As frequently happened, someone asked Jesus a question which was really a trap. This time it was "which of all the commandments in the Law was the most important". As he always did, Jesus pierced through the deceit and hypocrisy of the question. There were thousands of commands in the Law. It was and still is a magnificent system which penetrates into every conceivable area of human life. Indeed, when we are tempted to hear dismissals of the Jewish Law in the New Testament,

we should never forget that its very complexity was saying that every aspect of being alive is holy and God is involved in it. That is a most important spiritual insight and we are indebted to the Jewish Law for it.

However, as with everything in life, there is a but and the but is our humanity. The Law was becoming an end in itself rather than a means to help people live. Arguments were endless, the scoring of points the objective. Human life and human need were becoming engulfed by something originally designed to serve life. That is why Jesus goes to the heart of all law when he replies. For Our Lord the ultimate criterion by which all actions are judged is that of love. Notice that in loving our neighbour as ourselves we must realize that we do not always like ourselves nor approve of our own actions. Loving our neighbour is not necessarily being uncritical. Notice too that the basis of all human loving is possessing a love for God. Experience shows that without this latter, the former, loving one's neighbour, fades out. Without the element of love all law eventually becomes cold and sterile. Our Lord, as always, expressed the realities at the heart of life. Underlying all laws and sanctions is the primary law of love.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

As a recent longer-term visitor to your delightful village, I would like to respond to Mr. Darkes' letter re objectionable logos on T-shirts for sale on the streets of Kuranda (Oct Kuranda paper).

While commending his sensibilities and willingness to voice objection, I feel that he is possibly choking on a gnat while swallowing the camel!

A careful examination of merchandise for sale in Kuranda reveals as many T-shirts demeaning (or joshing) men. – and we do know that men are much more sensitive to any affront to their manhood and really, most feminists can take "the piss". I think it rather sad and too fine a political correctness if such concerns curtail a long tradition of smutty souvenirs so beloved of our Victorian forebears and apparently rather intriguing to our Japanese tourists. Sadly, much of the merchandise offered to visitors in Kuranda is meretricious - made overseas and gimcrack - truly a matter of "caveat emptor".

Of greater concern (in my opinion, objectionable), is the visual pollution that is foisted on both resident and visitor alike as one wanders about the town. Unfortunately with this, unlike the T-shirts, it is everywhere and in everyone's eye. A conservative estimate of signage in the village (posted and painted on street) is in excess of 300. Truly, more signs than street trees and for an estimated 600 village residents. At least the T-shirts are put away after the tourists have gone for the day!

Before any move on sexist T-shirts in Kuranda (too easily executed by the wowser brigade), I would suggest residents and KVPP carefully look at the visual pollution effected by Council and storekeeper that does so much to detract from the natural beauties of the town's setting.

From discussions with locals, it would seem that Kuranda's civic leaders spend more time arguing self-interest and minutiae while, time passing, further visual and planning blights are allowed to proliferate to turn Kuranda into vet another urban eyesore rather than the vaunted "unique rainforest village" of your advertisements. Maybe it's time some of the "old farts" retired or became more sensitive to the good of the town as a whole and not merely to their own hip-pockets. Of (the Goddess be praised!) women play a greater role in determining the town's destiny. The latter option, probably less feasible as men like their power, may have more hopes of raising the welcoming tone of your village, create a more favourable impression with visitors and then – let the moral tone follow!

This is a plea to the wider Kuranda community for help in our search for a school bus and driver. There are between 15 to 20 children from Kuranda who already travel down to Stratford each day to attend the wonderful Steiner school there. Unfortunately, the school's move up to Kuranda has been delayed, and the doors of the new premises won't be open in time for the start of the new 2006 school year.

The car-pooling situation the parents organized over the last 2-3 years was a successful military manoeuvre, but with more families joining, a bus is urgently needed. This would hopefully only be necessary for the first half of the year. The school starts at 9am and finishes at 3pm. We have children from Koah, Speewah and Myola, but can use the Myola road bus shelter as a pick up and delivery point for ease. It takes around 20 minutes for the trip to the school from this point.

The Tawny Frogmouth

Just a branch - look again it may be a tawny frogmouth.

A master of disguise the tawny frogmouth is so perfectly camouflaged it is quite possibly living in your garden without your knowledge. This night hunter is so well masked that it roosts in the open during the day, passing easily for part of the tree. To avoid detection during daylight hours it sits upright, completely motionless on branches in trees, with its head tilted up and eyes closed to slits.

The local Djabugay people call him the "Jilliblue", meaning 'big eyes'. He is said to be a messenger, telling the indigenous people of this region when a faraway relative is ill or injured. This 'bearer of news' will sing his 'ooom-ooom-ooom' song all night long until he is sure his 'sign' has been received.

Its plumage is finely streaked and mottled in grey and brown and

it possess an owl-like appearance, but is actually more closely related to a nightjar; its feet being weak and lacking the curved talons of an owl. A nocturnal creature it feeds on insects, worms, small mammals and reptiles. Most food is obtained by pouncing to the ground from a tree or other elevated perch. Moths are caught in flight, which has led to them being hit by cars while chasing insects illuminated by headlights.

The tawny frogmouth is found throughout Australia and breeds from August to December. Both sexes incubate the two or three eggs, with the male sitting on them during the day. The nest is a loose platform of sticks, which is usually placed on a horizontal forked tree branch, making this bird vulnerable to attacks by cats. So if you hear that special song in your garden, see if you can spot this elusive bird, which may well be trying to tell you something.

'Cryptogams – the forgotten flora'



Cryptogams are those small organisms that give depth and texture to our beautiful bush. They are the mosses, liverworts, lichens, algae and fungi. These small – many are microscopic – largely unnoticed organisms play vital roles in ecosystem function.

Cryptogams make up a significant part of our terrestrial biodiversity – the botanical equivalent of the invertebrates. They are exceedingly diverse, not only in raw numbers of species but also in their biology and ecology. There are 28,000 known native species of cryptogams in Australia, but an estimated 183,000¹ are still to be discovered! This contrasts dramatically with the 15,970 known native vascular plants with only an estimated 4040 still to be found.

In Australia, our vast, arid environment developed with its fragile soils held together by a biological soil crust: lichens, algae, mosses and other cryptogams living together, preventing erosion. The loss of, and damage to, these cryptogamic crusts have significantly contributed to the dust storms of the past few years.

Cryptogams form vital links in ecosystems. For example, fungi play

two main roles in ecosystem function. Firstly, as mycorrhiza, which are symbiotic with most terrestrial plants, and secondly as saprophytes which, together with bacteria and protozoans, decompose and recycle nutrients. Bryophytes and lichens are not only photosynthetic components of an ecosystem; they also contribute to the overall productivity of the system and can be important habitat for invertebrates.

What is being done to discover, understand or protect these delightful organisms? Very little, unfortunately. The adage "out of sight (or in this case harder to see), out of mind" seems to ring true. Many cryptogamic groups do not even rate a mention in Australian Terrestrial Biodiversity Assessment 2002².

It seems all too hard to change the way we look at our natural world. The trees, it seems, are still in the way of seeing the whole wood. For those who have their eyes open and want to consider some conservation solutions for the cryptogams, read Scott³ *et al* (1997). Let's hope that if we just manage for the big things, the little things will take care of themselves. If not, the 'forgotten flora' may become the 'vanished flora'!

GETTING USED TO THE NOTION OF

GROWING TREES TO CUT THEM DOWN

While they're growing they produce fruit for people and wildlife; they sequester carbon from the atmosphere; they provide habitat for animals, complete with insects and nectar for food; they provide shelter and shade for crops, cows and chooks; they are lovely to look at, sit under and they provide privacy for us and our neighbours.

When we harvest them we use them for buildings, furniture, bridges, railway sleepers, works of art and toothpicks.

And then, we can repeat the process all over again and again and again.

This cycle provides us with purpose, industry and jobs. It embraces the latest computer technology and the oldest skills in the world.

BUT, we don't want to make the mistake of growing the wrong tree in the wrong place and ending up with a monoculture of weeds. We've seen this with Caribbean Pine plantations. Fifty years ago when we thought the world was endless, we planted these trees without a care for the future or the knowledge about their place in our environment. (Environment—how do you spell that?!). Nowadays, even while we watch these pines come up all along the highway—escapees from our neat little plots—the experts are still arguing about their weediness. While one arm of government has at last recognised their weed potential and declared them a pest, another arm is clearing native forest and planting more (all in the name of \$).

We're about to make the same mistake with African Mahogany (Khaya senegalensis and Khaya nyasica). Lovely timber, but not one we should be growing in our Wet Tropics, especially when there are so many native species we can grow with our eyes closed and hands tied behind our backs.

SEEDS TO CARRY ON THE NEVER-ENDING CYCLE

The nursery thrives on the seeds you collect and bring in to us. Many trees are fruiting now or are in flower (which means they'll be forming fruit and seeds soon). You'll be helping enormously if you can pick up some of the native seeds on your property and drop them around to the nursery at Pademelon Lane or, if you give us a call on 4093 8834, we can collect them from you.

It'll help even more if you can bring with the seeds a twig with some leaves attached for identification. We'd also like to know where the tree is located (eg. Boyles Road, creek bank, huge tree) as this will help with ID and provenancing (geographic location).

SATURDAY MORNING WORKING BEES

We've been on many properties of late and made some wonderful new friends—and been well fed for our efforts. This program of helping landholders select and plant trees on their properties is a great way to learn and share knowledge. It also helps to involve the community in working towards enhancing our environment generally.

In the hope that we'll get a "normal" wet season with rain in the next month, we need to get lots of trees planted in our project sites in the Kuranda Envirolink Wildlife Corridor around Myola and Kowrowa.

5 Nov—Barron River / Clohesy River junction, Koah (very end of Koah Road)

Home Treatments: Nature's way of taking care of inner and outer beauty:

WATERCRESS:

This green vegetable is often used as a garnish, bit it should be eaten every day as part of a salad, or squeezed in with other vegetables as a daily drink. Water cress is rich in minerals and contains a great deal of Vitamin C and several of the B vitamins. Watercress is too strong an intestinal cleanser to be used alone, so always add it, when juicing, to such vegetables as carrots or celery.

Five sprigs of watercress soaked in a pint of boiling water and allowed to cool makes an excellent mouthwash.

WATERMELON:

Watermelon has exactly the same neutral acidity as the skin, and it therefore tones up the skin. This fruit is also surprisingly high in Vitamin A. Less than half a normal slice has almost 600 International Units of Vitamin A and also contains many important minerals and some Vitamin C and Vitamin B - all of which can help the skin internally and externally.

A watermelon facial requires care, for this is a watery fruit. First cleanse the face, then clip back your hair and lie down on a towel. Now you can place paper-thin wedges of the fruit on every part of your face. Cover either with gauze or two men's handkerchiefs. Wash off this reviving facial with tepid water after twenty minutes.

WHEATGERM:

Wheat germ is the part of the wheat that can sprout a few new grain, and therefore contains the essence of the wheat. A small amount of wheat germ - half a cup for instance - has as much protein as a quarter Matrix ... pound of beef or turkey, and it is full of important B vitamins and Vitamin E.

Plant profile: Lemongrass is an aromatic tropical grass from India. It is well known as a flavouring ingredient in Thai and Indian In India, the grass is used in traditional medicine to help reduce fevers and kill infections, and also as an insect repellant. The leaves are chopped just above ground level and, as with all the grasses, new shoots are then produced very quickly.

Fragrance profile: A very strong, 'lemon sherbet' aroma that is zesty and sweet with a slightly heavy undertone.


Main uses: eases muscular aches, pains and stiffness; eases stomach cramps, indigestion and constipation; lifts depression or anxiety and improves the mood.

Do you know your road rules?

We are often contacted by the public regarding inconsiderate drivers, "road rage" incidents & other driving matters but sometimes we find that the caller might also be at fault. So, do YOU know your road rules?

Everyone should know that the speed limit signs on the side of the highway are the maximum speed allowed, but what is the minimum? How many times have you been frustrated by someone driving too slowly?

The "Transport Operations (Road Use Management - Road Rules) Regulation" (snappy title, eh?) states that a vehicle does not unreasonably obstruct the path of another vehicle because they are driving more slowly, "unless the driver is driving abnormally slowly in the circumstances".

So, is the campervan in front of you driving abnormally slowly, or is it just because the driver is not used to the road?

How often does someone drive too close behind you, or how often do you drive too closely?

That same regulation states that "a driver must drive a sufficient distance behind a vehicle travelling in front.....so the driver can, if necessary, stop safely to avoid a collision...

If the car in front stops suddenly, can you stop in time? It's not always practical, but a safe distance can be judged by the "2 Second Rule".

When the car in front of you passes a stationary object (a road marker, say), you should pass that same object at least two seconds later. Any closer and you are not allowing yourself enough reaction time.

A final reminder - if there is someone behind acting like a fool, let them pass. It's safer and easier to do that and ignore them, than end up in an accident.

Tell the police and we shall try & help.

Tennis Tournament With Evonne Goolagong

Girls aged 7-11 years from Kuranda's District State School will have an exclusive opportunity on Monday 7th Novembert to meet and play tennis with Evonne Goolagong-Cawley, founder of the "EGGS" Evonne Goolagong Getting Started, Tennis Program.

An Evonne Goolagong Tournament will be conducted on the 7th November between 10am - 2pm at the Kuranda Tennis Club on Fallon Road with all participants in the current program being conducted at the Kuranda State School. The girls will compete against other girls from Mareeba, Mossman and the Gulf Region. This is our third community tournament with previous tournaments held in Kuranda and Port Douglas.

"EGGS" is a Tennis Australia and Tennis Queensland initiative with the aim of increasing the number of young girls participating in tennis, and with an emphasis on attracting girls who have never played the sport. This program provides coaching to girls who have never been exposed to tennis before in a comfortable and friendly environment. Girls will be taught the skills of tennis as well as fundamental motor skills. The program also opens the sporting door to young girls so that they reap the rewards of regular participation in sport.

Evonne Goolagong Cawley, member of the Wiradjuri people and is one of Australia's greatest sporting heroes. Evonne, a former world ranked No. 1 reached the finals of a Grand Slam singles event 18 times. She is the first Aboriginal Australian to win Wimbledon in 1971, which she went to capture again in 1980. Evonne had a very successful Tennis career winning four Australian Opens and one French Open. She was the second mother in history to win the Wimbledon title following the birth of her daughter and in 1972 was awarded an MBE and also named Australian of the Year.




Awards and Celebration Evening – Wednesday 30th November>



Garden Jottings for October by Alectura

Things to consider this month

November is a testing month for the gardener. With increasing temperatures and awaiting the Wet, the gardener faces the demands for increased watering and vigilance in protecting plant growth from multiplying hordes of leaf munchers and sap suckers. Between slapping at horse flies, most gardeners, if following a regimen of mulching for soil protection, will be enjoying the excavating delights of the duo travelling orange-footed Scrubfowl (*Megapodius reinwardt*) and the brush turkey (*Alectura lanthami*)

Discreet fencing, netting and other barriers will lessen their depredations and protect more precious items. These setbacks provde a good opportunity to rationalise plantings and establish protected growng areas for rarer plants.

Watch plantings in pots and baskets. With increased temperatures, drying out occurs more rapidly. Avoid leaving water in pot saucers as this leads to waterlogging in pot, souring of soil and root loss leading to eventual demise of plant. Consistent fortnightly low level strength of foliar feeding of house plants and ornamentals will provide a more successful display over time than a six monthly dose of slow release fertilizer.

Time to look at trees around the house and sheds, evaluating what could come down in a big blow. Also check for dead and dying palm fronds. Now is the time to get ready and start taking measures that will minimse damage during the cyclone season.

A couple of old tips to keep your gardening tools up to scratch. Plunging blades and tines of gardening implements after use several times into a tub of sand and old motor oil mix will clean and help maintain edge while regular spray of moisture displacing silicone spray on tools and moving parts of garden machinery wil keep rust and corrosion at bay.

Plant of the month

Aglaonema - Chinese Evergreen. A large genus of over fifty species belonging to the Araceae family - the one characterised by spathe and spadix, distributed throughout Southeast Asia through to New Guinea. Often confused with their near relative Dieffenbachia, the dumb canes, Aglaonemas are of much easier cultivation and give a more successful year-round display. Closer inspection of these two familes will show Aglaonemas usually shorter and stockier in growth, stems clothed to the ground and more prolific in suckering, usually clumping up

successfully into elegant mounds whereas the Dieffenbachia grow longer trunks, losing lower leaves and somewhat reluctant to sucker. RAINFALL 26/09/05 TO 23/10/05 19 mm

While enjoying good conditions and adequate moisture, once established Aglaonemas are remarkably tolerant of drought and dry air. With their mulitude of patternings in greens, greys, silvers and whites, these plants are excellent for understory plantings and with tightly packed small whitish flowers followed often by bright red or orange berries pack quite a punch for such an easy care plant.

Of the easest propagation from stem cuttings or division, there are a multitude of species and hybrids to choose from. Of particular interest are soon to be released Thai hybrids, probably of A. rotundum x parentage. These beauties carry a much wider colour range including red, pink and orange shades and rival the croton in colour and leaf form. However, time will tell whether these high colourings are mantained in our cooler winters.

Aristolochia tagala - Dutchman's Pipe and host plant to the Cairns Birdwing butterfly (*Ornithoptera priamus*). This native climber has been featured before in this column but enjoying the graceful, soaring beauty of these errrant flying gems as they circle and mate around these vines and the females depositing their eggs is such a joy that every gardener should find space for several of these vines. Vines are easily established from seed or plants obtained from most nurseries. In earlier stages, plants require good waterings and provision of netting or lines to climb. However once established and into a tree or on trellis, vines are fairly hardy. Although the flowers are insignificant, the flying flowers of visiting Birdwings will refresh your soul!

Q & A

Jim - one recipe for an organic garden spray for leaf munchers is to take about a dozen cloves of garlic, half a dozen hot chillies and two or three onions. Boil for up to ten minutes in a couple of litres of water and then let stand for 12 hours, Strain and add a small quantity of milk or liquid soap for foliage adhesion. Some gardeners also swear by adding a maceration of pulped grasshopper and /or other target nasty to your standing mixture as an additional deterrant.




KURANDA TENNIS CLUB

Candid cameras have turned us all into happy snappers. Retailers say the 35mm camera has become the latest casualty of the digital age.

Some events may mean less and less to us as the years go by, but the pictures that announced particular moments to the world still hold a binding fascination. They are images indelibly imprinted on our subconscious, images that move, inspire and, in many instances, haunt us. As an example you will remember naked and terrified, tears burning down her cheeks, a nine year old girl runs down the road in Vietnam fleeing the scorching napalm clouds; in October 1984, an image of the 'Iron Lady' Margaret Thatcher wiping away tears reveals a compassionate side after the death of five friends and colleagues in the IRA Brighton bombings. Each of these profound moments of 20th century history was captured on film and produced in newspapers, magazines, journals and seen on TV screens around the globe. These images and many others helped push us to change the world as we know it. Such pictures are worth a thousand words - and each extraordinary image was created by a 35mm camera.

The 35mm camera may have been one of the most important inventions of the past 100 years but we are told it is soon to be a thing of the past. It has succumbed to the digital revolution. With sales of digital cameras outstripping film cameras by 15 to one, many stores are announcing that when the current stocks are gone, they will not be replaced.

As well as bringing us vivid images of history as it unfolded, the 35mm SLR (single lens reflex) camera turned us into a nation of amateur photographers. The 35mm was a 'camera of the moment'. The rawness and the spontaneity of its product fired our imaginations, whereas with digital cameras we can retake a picture and airbrush and sharpen bits - play around and manipulate.

Almost all of us will remember our first camera; perhaps it was a simple, foolproof, point-andshoot which generated blurred snaps of our pets, or a compact 'auto focus' ideal for producing strangely angled shots of a raucous night out. Most families have a stack of fading photo albums, charting birthdays, weddings, first day at school, sun-kissed (and rain-drenched) holidays and family gatherings.

However, as retailers clear their shelves a new era of instant, film-free digital photography gathers strength. World renowned photographer Lord Lichfield has, after 40 years of shooting film switched to digital cameras six years ago with great enthusiasm and fantastic results. However, he is quick to add "I am sad that film will go because it was the way I grew up and in many ways it's a purer art form."

Another media photographer agreed "Digital has so many advantages; fantastic quality, an amazing capacity to enlarge and so instant, but for me there will always be a sentimental attachment to film. Aside from waiting to find out the sex of my child, nothing will come close to the nail-biting anticipation of waiting to find out whether you have managed to seize the moment and got the picture. We have all stood in a lab, unable to get past the person at the front of the queue rifling through their pictures, pulling out one and smiling, shuffling through them in a trance-like state. Digital allows you to do fantastic things but that raw excitement has gone.'

Photography became available to the masses only in 1888 when George Eastman introduced the Kodak, the world's first point-and-shoot camera. Within three years Kodak introduced the film roll film that could be loaded into a camera in daylight and in 1900 launched the Box Brownie. But it was in 1925 that documentary photographers became more mobile and less conspicuous with the invention of the 35mm, or 'candid camera'. Colour negative film made its debut in 1942, followed in 1947 by the Polaroid Land camera which could produce a positive print in seconds.

Today with digital and mobile telephone cameras available, people are all busy downloading, cropping, doctoring and scanning their images. While the benefits of digital outweigh film, the margin between amateur, semi-professional and professional is blurring. Now that we can all manipulate images we can turn a reasonable picture into a good one and a good picture into an excellent one with a bit of tailoring. She grunted and frowned which didn't worry me, though the woman who I now know to run the Shop, came to me and said it should be hot since it just recently had been taken out of the main oven and put in the pie oven. Not intending a debate, I did say that yes, it should be heated to 60 degrees to comply with health laws, but that I didn't mind asking for it to be microwaved. The woman rudely responded with a comment like "she's doing it for you isn't she so what is

your problem?" and I said that the attitude I got when I simply asked for the roll to be heated was very unfriendly. Then another Shop assistant came racing across and took the temperature of the pie oven and becoming involved, said rudely, there- it is 60 degrees so what is your problem? Why are you creating such a drama? I now got in on the act and said that I didn't create the drama, but just so you are aware, the oven should be hot for sure. More importantly the product you are selling is what the customer wants to be hot.

Now the one thing through all of this is, I simply asked for my sausage roll to be microwaved since it was almost cold. I DID NOT wish to complain or become involved in a debate. The SHOP OWNER was the one who came dashing over to critically justify the situation and lo and behold the whole Shop adds to her criticisms of things. I felt that there was a bunch of people who obviously did not want to be in business and I went away feeling sick and not wanting either the pie or the sausage roll as a consequence. I live locally and WILL not go back there again

and wonder how a Shop, in such a small village, can afford to be so rude especially when there were no other customers around, and it would have been easy to say "sorry- we will be glad to heat it for

I have told lots of people, and have heard a number of stories of rudeness from that Shop from some people. I have never complained to a "paper" but this was so blatant, it must be told. Thanks for listening.

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
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KVVP News

Village to Village by Graham Nicolson

We are frequently told these days that the world has become a "Global Village", that we are all becoming more interdependent, regardless of race, religion, nationality, etc, etc. Globalisation is the catch-cry. Humanity is increasingly being seen as one race inhabiting the surface of one quite small, fragile planet in the immensity of

But living in a nice village in Kuranda, with a pleasant climate, reasonably comfortable living conditions (for most people) and relative peace and quiet, located on an island continent that itself seems a little removed and protected from the wider world, this broader vision can sometimes seem a little remote from reality.

But the marvels of modern technology keep drawing us back to this wider vision. We have for example, the net to surf and emails to answer, giving us a wonderful opportunity to enter right into the inner workings of the global village even if we don't all have the time and capacity physically to travel widely beyond Oz shores. There is any amount of world information out there in cyberspace, just waiting for us to access it. And more and more people are only an instant away in any part of the globe. What is more, the technology is improving dramatically. Where will it be in ten or twenty years? It is truly mind blowing!

One consequence is that village life is no longer isolated. People all over the world are coming in contact, not just at the higher levels of society, but also at much more local levels. There are any numbers of schemes to facilitate this. You can sponsor a child in a third world village. You can offer charitable assistance to villages through these programs in the third world. Many global non-government organisations have contacts that reach down into local life. You can visit villages yourself in many parts of the world, either as a tourist or on a more meaningful level.




Add tin fruit salad. To strengthen, add only Vodka or White Rum.


