Dear Kuranda Paper,

I am writing in reply to Barry Hodson's letter in the October edition of Kuranda Paper in which he attacked me for working for more social housing in Kuranda.

I make no apology for making housing one of my priorities in Kuranda Although work will soon commence on a major new housing project at Top Kowrowa, more needs to be done.

Lack of suitable serviced land in the Kuranda area limits the opportunities for new social housing however the state government has allocated funding that will enable a new rising sewer to be constructed between Kuranda and Top Kowrowa. This may expand the pool of suitable land for housing

The new sewer will service the school, Welcome Pocket and the residential communities from Myola to Top Kowrowra.

The Department of Communities has also commenced a fortnightly outreach service operating from the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre. Applications for housing assistance are being taken and information is being provided about departmental services. In addition fortnightly visits to the surrounding Indigenous communities of Koah, Mona Mona, Top Kowrowa, Bottom Kowrowa and Mantaka have commenced.

I have also worked closely with Jim Turnour MP and strongly supported Kuranda as the location for new housing under the Federal government's Nation Building Economic Stimulus Plan for new social housing in the area.

Tourism Kuranda Monthly Update

It has been some time since we produced an article for the paper, but we hope to keep everyone a bit more informed in the future on the many things that Tourism Kuranda has been doing to attract more visitors to the village.

As most people are aware a new committee was appointed in August, with Melanie Wicks filling Chris Wright's shoes as the new Chairperson. The new committee is currently preparing a strategic plan to identify the areas we need to address, our core markets and how to best promote Kuranda into the future. Many of the promotional activities we participate in are still continuing while the plan is being developed and we will use this opportunity to make you aware of a few of them.

Tourism Kuranda engages a company called Pro-active Marketing to represent us at many of the consumer travel shows held throughout Australia and NZ each year. At these shows we are talking directly to potential tourists. Many people appreciate this opportunity, as they tell us they can only get very limited information from travel agents outside North Queensland, which predominantly consists of packaged tours. Pro-active Marketing attends about 12 shows throughout the year on our behalf. To give you an indication, 78,000 people attended each of the Sydney and Brisbane Caravan and Camping Shows, and about 60,000 attended the Melbourne Show. This gives us an excellent opportunity to communicate with a huge group of people that we perhaps would not be able to reach

Neighbourhood Centre News - November 2009

New KNC Management Committee members: We wish to welcome three new members to our committee: Rachaell Kelly (KNC President), Rachael Wyld (General Member). Kellie McBride (General Member) – and welcome back Cate Lamont (Vice-President), Linda Davis (Treasurer), Peter North (Secretary) and Gerald Hobbler (General Member). We truly appreciate the time and commitment Management Committee members dedicate to this important governance role, which they do in a voluntary capacity.

Broadband for Seniors: There is a new service available at KNC - it is a Broadband for Seniors Kiosk that has two computers for broadband internet and email access for people aged 55 and over. It is a free service funded by the Queensland Government. There is some tutor/training available and we will be getting sessions up and running this month. There are a few teething problems as the computers are plugged into a statewide mainframe, but we are working through them and both computers are operational. Drop by and have a look or even better – have a go!

STEP FORWARD: Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs Service (ATODS), Step Forward is an ongoing program that commences in the 1st week of each month on a Friday. It is a free relapse prevention group that includes harm reduction skills, understanding and planning for your triggers and cues, prevention management, goal setting, relaxation skills, motivation to change and alternative activities.

Free Lifeline Counselling: A Lifeline Counselor is coming to KNC each Thursday to see Kuranda people. There are up to 6 free sessions available with no obligation to have ongoing counselling. If you think this may meet your need or you want to know more, you can ring either Ceri or myself or you can contact Lifeline directly on 40504955. All contact with KNC or Lifeline staff is strictly confidential.

ITEC Employment: Is renting office space three days every second week to meet with Kuranda clients. If you have an appointment, please let reception know when you come in. If you need to ring ITEC outside these days regarding your appointment, please let staff know.

Price change for copying: After conducting a review of our costs associated with printing and copying we discovered that we were not quite covering our expenses to provide this service. It would seem paper and toner costs have gone up. For this reason, the cost has gone up from 10c to 15c per black and white copy and the colour printing up to 50c per page.

Family Support Items Needed: Thank you to those who have generously donated items including washing machines, beds, mattresses. We have an informal way of linking up families and individuals with different items of furniture and household goods etc that they need. Right now we know families who need: a small freezer, a sofa bed, small washing machine, double beds, shelves and cupboards. If you have any of those items that you no longer need, please give us a call.

Laughter Yoga: Is currently being held on Tuesday afternoons at 2pm for 20-30 minutes – cost is \$2 per session. Laughter really is the best medicine.

Housing: We have a Dept of Housing worker here every second Thursday (22/10/09, 5/11/09, 19/11/09 etc) between 2-4 - no appointment necessary.

Tenancy agreements are a bit like relationships – no one ever goes into one on bad terms. However, on occasions the harmonious balance between tenants and property owners comes crashing down and Police are often the first to find out about it. Whilst Police are entrusted with specific powers of authority we are not issued magic wands to fix the complexities of a rental agreement. Verbal agreements carry little credence they really should be drawn up in writing. If you are considering going into a rental agreement can I recommend the Residential Tenancy Authority – it's sound free advice and provides all the required documents to protect both the tenant and lessor when and if things go pear shaped. Contact the RTA on ph 1300 366 311 or try the web.

Can you Help? Last month a new clothing shop in town was broken into and a considerable amount of property stolen, including silver jewellery, a green I-pod, a white I-pod, cash and alternative style clothing including a large red flag with the face of Che Guevarra on it. We suspect that there was more than one person involved.

Speaking of Transport matters - Did you know that if you are the driver and a passenger (of any age) is not wearing a seatbelt you can also be fined?

It can cost you as the driver \$300 and 3 points. Buckle up!

November Vege Column

Growing traditional European vegetables can be difficult at the end of year as the tropical heat kicks in so we have to look to our northern neighbours in Asia for inspiration. The edible bottle gourd Lagenaria siceraria is one of those old world vegetables that have spread throughout the world. It is known as cucuzini, New Guinea bean, Italian edible gourd and doodhi among other names, depending on where you live. The plant is a vigorous climber that loves the wet season. It can spread over 6m along a fence and likes a sunny, fertile position. The young fruit are best eaten when between 10-30cm long. It can be used similar to zucchini in stir fry and curry dishes, and has a similar texture and mild flavour, being rich in iron and vitamins B and C. One plant should be enough for a family. If the young gourds start dying off the flowers may need to be hand-pollinated. Mature gourds also can be dried and decorated.

Another wet season favourite to plant now is the winged bean. An attractive climbing perennial, all parts of the plant are edible — the pods, the beans inside, the shoots, the flowers and even the tuber. The mature pods can grow 20cm long, though they taste better when 10-15cm long. Older pods become stringy and tough, but the seeds inside can then be eaten like peas. The ripe (dry) seeds can be cooked like beans by first soaking them in water for an hour, then boiling for about 25 to 30 minutes. The tender shoots and white or pale blue flowers can be eaten raw and added to salads. Their nitrogen-fixing ability has winged beans used as a cover crop on banana plantations in Asia, both to enrich the soil and as a source of income. The seeds need to be soaked for several days on damp tissue paper or scarified to break the hard shell before planting. Seeds only remain viable for a year. The plants are rather slow to start but once established are prolific, with three plants usually enough for a family. And remember they are perennial so plant in a position they can stay in.

Also good to plant now are asparagus, rosella, Madagascar beans, snake beans and thorny coriander. Best of luck in the garden,

Kuranda was well represented – Chronic Haze kicked off, a big ask at a Bikers gig, but they were up for it with strong vocals, hard edge rock guitar and great riffs. We'll see more of them. Our local virtuosos, Great Balls of Steel mixed to perfection by local sound man Dave Hart, were a joy to the ears. Jerome, Kirk, Gail and Rudi did honky tonk, New Orleans blues and some good old rock and roll. Very classy and always well worth catching. Munition, 3 boys from the Tablelands really got the big bikes rumbling as they ripped into the classics: Deep Purple, Hendrix etc., in ya face vocals, a wicked bottom end and fierce energy levels. This band we'll see much more of we hope.

Los Pistoleros brought some local blues legends together. Headed by Ric Montgomery, ex Johnno's guitarist, with Dave Alcon on very throaty vocals. Joined, again, by two kids on guitar who really pushed the veterans along. Guitar boogie indeed!

Too many to mention. But what really impressed was the class of the young blues-rockers. We are in for many treats to come.

CD reviews: A couple of guys in Y-fronts tell it like it is...

Justin Towns Earl: "The Good Life": Steve Earl's son, named in tribute to one of Steve's heroes, Towns van Vant, tragic troubadour of the lost highways, has done his dad and his namesake proud. A truly memorable record. A hard-living, dustbowl beauty, full of hardness and grace, fleshed out with strings, dobro, lap steel and more. This

one's on constant rotation. Joe Henry: "Blood from the Stars": Basically blues; gut bucket; New Orleans; sleazy late-nite New York bars and a bit Tom Waites minus the gravel. And some anthemic blues rockers. Fats Waller piano, muted Satchmo horns, strings and roaring, pounding, bottom end rhythms. The vocals are perfect and the Lyrics! To quote a friend, "There are no words to describe the words" Even the liner notes are a joy to read. The penultimate song, Stars, is a contender for song of the year. Joe is a treasure. Just go buy it. The Duke and the King: "Noth-

ing Gold can Stay" Simone Felices of the Felice brothers new group: The Felices have released two albums of classic Americana-roots in the tradition of The Band and the Nitty Grittys. This album has quite a different sound; original songs but with a sense of familiarity - like you've heard them before and you've always really liked them. To quote the London Telegraph, "The greatest singer- songwriter you've never heard. Goes


places few artists ever touch." Rare, firey, brilliant music. Exquisite. Bill Callahan: "Sometimes I Wish We Were an Eagle": This one slowly draws you in. Subtle and delicately structured. Bill is a Texan with a gentle approach to his songs. Sings in the lower register with a voice as dry as Leonard Cohens bleached bones in a desert.

And the music is lush: delicate rock with piano, Hammond, cello and horns fleshing it out. In the first track he sets the mood: "I used to be darker, then I got lighter then I got dark again...with the death of the shadow came a lightness of verse." Lots of gems here: Rococo Zephyr. Faith/Void. A lovely album that leaves you thoughtful and looking forward to the next time.

The Kuranda Archdeacon

HE VENERABLE CANON, Archdeacon Chris Wright, is this month's Profile of the Month. He is an ordained Anglican priest who has had close links to Kuranda since 1988, and who in 1997 became the full time priest at the beautiful little Village Church in the main street. He describes himself as a Christian (Anglican) by religion, although he was a comparatively late starter to the clerical life. He was not ordained as a priest until he was 37 years of age, having undertaken his theological studies by correspondence and weekend schools. He also spent some time in Jerusalem and Rome as part of his post ordination training.

Born in Wales in 1951, he left school at 15 and took employment with a Department store. He

emigrated to Australia with his parents in 1969. His early life in this country was spent in Tasmania, where he gained employment as an apprentice electrician. In 1976 he stood as a young man for the State seat of Braddon in the House of Assembly for the ALP but was not elected. He acquired an Associate Diploma in electrical engineering.

As an electrician, Chris moved to Cairns in 1981, working for North Queensland Engineers & Agents, and later for the Cairns Port Authority. It was in Cairns that his interest in religion as a vocation developed, as well as his love for Kuranda Village, which he says reminds him of village life in Wales, although warmer. These factors lead in time to his appointment as the Village Anglican priest after training and

ordination, a position he really likes. His clerical responsibilities were extended by his appointment as Archdeacon in 2007, a responsibility which covers most of the north of Queensland, answerable to the Bishop in Townsville. But his allegiances remain firmly attached to Kuranda, where he lives the single life in his own house, and where he hopes to remain the priest for the rest of his working life.

In terms of his clerical and religious views, he tends these days to lean more on the conservative side. While he favours ordination of women in the church, he does not favour ordination of gay priests. He has been involved in ecumenical activities with other churches from time to time as part of his duties, but has no strong views on the subject. He says he gets on well with other churches in Kuranda.

In terms of community involvement, Chris leads a very active life. He is chair of the Local Ambulance Committee, of the Kuranda District State School College Council, and of the Welcome Pocket Task Force. He says that planning for the proposed aged facilities at Welcome Pocket are proceeding well but slowly, as it is a very big project. He is also involved in the "Op Shop" at the rear of the Church. He was past chair and founding member of the Kuranda Media Association and is a regular contributor to the Kuranda Paper. He was a founding member of the Kuranda Information and Support Centre, now the Neighbourhood Centre. He was a member of the Kuranda Village Promotion Committee and for a time its chair. He is a member of Rotary and for a time the Kuranda president. All in all, an extremely busy community life.

It does not leave a lot of time for private interests. Chris reads, is interested in his family tree, and loves to travel. He has recently returned from a trip to meet relatives in Wales, during which he also visited Scotland and Ireland. He would like to garden but does not have the time.

Being socially active, he has some concerns about life on the Tablelands, such as the dilution of services by interchange of service providers. Although acknowledging that there are welfare concerns, he considers the area to have many attractions for living. He particularly likes the Kuranda atmosphere and the diverse community that lives there. Being in good health, he hopes to serve the community for many years to come.





HEALING MEDITATION:

The following meditation is suitable for addressing physical problems as well as emotional and spiritual difficulties. Practices similar to the one presented here are now used in hospitals and clinics where practitioners recognize the value of meditation and imagery in the healing process. The format presented here is common to many Tibetan practices, but has been placed into a more generic vernacular by a Tibetan Ayurvedic physician.

- Relax the body by tensing then releasing each muscle group. Start with the feet and move to the calves, abdomen, hands, arms, jaws, and facial muscles.
- For a few moments, sit in silent meditation.
- Then, for a few minutes, contemplate why you are doing this meditation. Bring to mind the particular problem you need help with and any associated feelings, worries, desires, and so on.
- Think that you are not only asking for yourself to be healed, but for everyone everywhere who suffers.
- Bring to your mind the image of your ideal healer. This may be a
 particular therapist, a spiritual teacher, God, an enlightened being, or
 deity. It can even be a geometric form, colour, and/or vibration that you
 associated with healing energy. Take a few moments to bring this image
 to your minds eye.
- With a sense of respect and invitation, let the healer know that you and other beings are wanting their attention.
- Imagine that the healer is pleased to be asked and agrees to help. This makes you feel happy and you take a moment to feel this good feeling and experience a sense of gratitude.
- Now see white light going out of the ideal healer in all directions to all possible sources of help for your condition. The light returns in rainbow colours, (especially dark blue) to the heart or centre of the healer making them even more powerful and full of wisdom and healing energy then before
- Now the light comes from the heart or centre of the healer towards you. As you breathe in, imagine that you are taking in coloured light, letting it travel throughout your body, especially to problem areas.
- The light dissolves all problems into small dark particles that forms a smokey cloud and leaves your body and passes into the ground as your breathe out. Repeat these last two steps 3, 7 or 21 times.
- Have confidence in this process. Feel yourself getting stronger, clearer, more balanced and self confident than before.
- Pause a moment in gratitude for the help the healer has offered you and others. Then let the image of the healer dissolve completely into space.

QUICK AND EASY COOKING RECIPES:

We continue the theme of Gladbag cooking with: GLADBAG CHICKENS: NUMBER TWO AND THREE!

ATTENTION!!

Place the bird in the bag.

Pour on top the juices of one orange and one lemon.

Throw in a handful of blanched almonds (from the Supermarket). Add salt, and grind away at the pepper mill, or toss in some

Seal with the foil tie provided.

ATTENTION!!

Place the bird in the bag...get the feeling you have done this before!

Toss in more mushrooms, some onion (you have to make some effort by chopping the onion), then some chopped celery and capsicum chunks, some fresh pineapple pieces, a large dollop of tomato paste.

Sprinkle in a packet of Sweet and Sour sauce.

Add the juice of a lemon, or wine, or stock (made from a stock cube). Add also salt to taste.

Seal and perform the same ritual as before.

NOW TO THE OVEN WITH THEM.

Set the oven temperature at 150c NO MORE PLEASE. Place the birds on a baking platter or tray. NOTICE WE DO NOT PUNCTURE THE BAG.

WE STRESS AGAIN ONLY COOK AT THE ABOVE TEMPERATURE SO THE BAG WILL NOT BURST, thus making your oven look like Mardi Gras.

You will probably need two hours for the cooking.

Remember cook SLOW...LONG...LOW!!

A Thought for November

This month we read a passage from St Mark's Gospel Chapter 10 verses 17 to 30. There is a difference between being religious and possessing a spirituality. Sometimes we will be with somebody who, from their lifestyle, we know to be religious. They go to church, perhaps are a member of a Bible study group. But as we chat together, we begin to realize that this person has also internalized the faith as well as observing it outwardly. We are with a person who is at peace with themselves because they have used the things of the faith to work on their own inner being.

This is what concerns Jesus when a person comes to him and asks, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus chooses a certain level on which to approach this unknown person. We might call it the level of religion. There are commandments this man knows from childhood. Does he keep them? Yes, he does. But somehow he hungers for something beyond rules and regulations and observances, good and necessary though they be. There is in him some internal agenda that cannot be dealt with at this level.

This is exactly what Jesus sees. Perhaps it was obvious to Jesus that this man was very wealthy. Jesus may already have discovered something about him; some hint that he was

searching to be more. We don't know. But we do see clearly Our Lord piercing to the heart of this man's life. There is something deep down inside him he has to deal with. In his case, it is the way he handles his wealth.

Very often we hear people exclaim, --- The Bible says that you should sell all you have and give it to the poor." Jesus certainly said that to this man. But the real issue is that Jesus saw into the man's heart. Looking into my heart or yours, Jesus might see as we struggle to internalize our faith. Jesus might say that we must deal with some particular inner agenda which may be blocking us from a relationship with God.

It might be our appetites, our vanities, our snobbishness. our behaviour toward others. Whatever it may be, we must apply the things of an outer surface faith to deal with this inner agenda.

The man turns away, and Jesus reflects on the incident. When he speaks of riches making it hard for us to enter the kingdom, he is referring to many kinds of riches. Whatever is of ultimate value for us is our "riches." To offer those riches, be they abilities or possessions, for God's direction and purpose, is to discover a kingdom of meaning and satisfaction in our lives. Jesus tells us that we must do battle with those things which prevent us from deepening our relationship with God.








Kuranda to Granite Creek Road

▼ ven though the first European settlers arrived in Trinity Bay in 1876, reasonable road access ✓ over the Kuranda Range was not available until the late 1930s. However, some intrepid people took considerable risk to drive vehicles over the route before that time. Even after the Kuranda Range Road was opened it was not used extensively by civilian traffic until much later. During the Second World War several factors restricted the use of civilian vehicles. Wartime rationing of petrol forced motorists to restrict the use of their vehicles to essential travel only. Motorists were further restricted during the latter period of the war when the Cairns district was declared a restricted area. During this emergency period civilians required a permit from the military authorities to travel into or out of the area.

While the history of the construction of the range road is well known, there appears to be little reference to the road to Mareeba, on the other side of Kuranda. Despite the lack of information, this road has a history that dates much further back than the range road. In 1876 a track was blazed from the Hodgkinson goldfield at Thornborough to Trinity Bay. Over the years other tracks were made, and some were even called roads, but none of them were really suitable for general wheeled traffic. While the port of Cairns was much closer to the growing mining areas on the Atherton Tableland, most of the goods and minerals carried to and from the mining communities went through Port Douglas, which had better roads.

In November 1890 the second section of the railway, which was to finish at Kuranda, was nearing completion. Many people in the area proposed the construction of a road from Kuranda to Granite Creek (now Mareeba). They argued that if it was built the road would expedite the construction of the third section of the railway, as it would allow building material to be carried to the construction site. A road would also allow cargo to be carried from the Atherton Tablelands to the railhead at Kuranda to be sent on to Cairns by rail.

Mr. Wimble M.L.A., the Member of Parliament for the area, interviewed the Colonial Secretary, Mr. Tozer, in an attempt to secure a grant of £1,000 to allow the Cairns Divisional Board to construct the road. The Cairns Divisional Board covered the area from the Smithfield area to Granite Creek. Tozer recognized that a road between Kuranda and Granite Creek had merit, but said the Government had no funds available for the project. The locals were not deterred. A group consisting of representatives of the Cairns Municipal Council, the Cairns Divisional Board and the Chamber of Commerce met in the Divisional Board Hall to plan a campaign to secure the funding. Among those attending the meeting was Callaghan Walsh, the Mayor of the Municipal Council and Mr Tills, the Chairman of the Divisional Board. Mr Tills moved: "That the Divisional Board renew their application to the Government for a grant of £1000 for the purpose of making a road fit for wheel traffic from Kuranda to Granite Creek."

A Public meeting at Cairns was told: "If the Minister for lands saw that his department would get a return, he would of course ask the Minister for Works to grant the £1,000. They always ask what they were going to get

back when asked for money. This road would assist the Government and feed the second section. The £1,000 would be ample to do the work, if it were not too much." The consensus of the meeting was that as soon as the road was built it would allow Cairns to take trade away from Port Douglas. The meeting claimed that after the railway line was constructed the road would still be used extensively by timber-getters and packers.

An editorial in *The Cairns Post* in November 1890 commented: "Surely if the line was in the hands of a company instead of the hands of the State there would be no hesitation about the outlay. Were the line in the hands of the syndicate

suggested by Mr. Robb, which would be compelled to work on commercial lines in order to ensure success, would not this inexpensive sprat to catch a goodly mackerel be forthcoming? Without a road the second section must remain unproductive until the third section is completed. In short, a judicious outlay at the present time would anticipate the traffic of the third section by two years and the game is worth the gamble."

The route of the proposed railway line was from Kuranda to Granite Creek and then over the Atherton

Tablelands to Herberton. The councils and local businessmen felt that the construction of a road between Kuranda and Granite Creek close to the route of the proposed railway would have many advantages. They argued that a road would expedite the construction of the railway as building materials could be carted to the site cheaper and quicker. They also said that there was an abundance of agricultural land along the route, and with better access the Government could sell the land at a much higher price than the present value.

The councils said that when the railway reached Herberton it would open the area for exports, but if the road was constructed immediately it would bring prosperity to the region at least two years earlier. There was a guarantee of at least one coach service once the road opened, and this alone would justify the expense of building the road. The road would also allow red cedar logs from the Herberton scrub to be carted to the rail head at Kuranda. The feeling in the area was that the councils would build the road anyway, but they believed that the ratepayers should not have to pay for it. The ratepayers were already burdened with having to pay for the roads and streets in the towns, and could not afford further impost.

r Behan said he knew the route intimately and could vouch for its attributes. He said "For miles and miles chocolate soil was found and he could stake his reputation, and would tell them so in Brisbane, that every bit would be taken up and pay back £5000 or £6000 for the £1000 expended." "If the Minister for Lands saw that his department would get a return, he would of course ask the Minister for the money.

The Government Commissioners traveled the old gazetted road from Herberton to Kuranda through Granite Creek in December 1890 on an inspection tour, and found it unsuitable for general traffic. *The Cairns Argus*, in reporting the trip, commented: "This road, as has been asserted in these columns, is unfit for dray traffic, being mountainous, and of an exceptionally rough [route]." There is little evidence to indicate just

where this road was.

The need for the road became more urgent when the Government announced in December 1890 that the second section of the railway, from Redlynch to Kuranda, would not be opened until the third section was completed. The range section would need special engines with automatic brakes, like those used on the Toowoomba Range, and these were not available yet.

Good news came in January 1891 when The Cairns Argus announced that the Colonial Secretary had promised £500 towards the cost of the road, "with a half-promise of assistance from the Minister for Railways." *The Argus* hailed the decision:

We have long and patiently waited for the Herberton traffic to be brought to Cairns, and now there is a partial consummation of our hopes, efforts — our best efforts — must be made to achieve that effect by diverting the traffic, by means of this road, from Granite Creek to the second section. With a coach running along this road in conjunction with the train to Kuranda, a large passenger traffic to and from Herberton would result, to the direct benefit of our town and port. — Again, the transmission of heavy goods to Herberton would share in the benefits offering — a big item to Tinopolis (Herberton), especially as regards mining machinery.

An editorial in *The Cairns Post* in January 1891 commented:


On the one hand the outlay would anticipate the Herberton and Montalbion traffic by two years; on the other, without the outlay, it was felt the Cairns district would be pegged back for a similar period. At the eleventh hour a grant of £500 is made by the Works or Lands Department, we are not certain which, but the matter of a similar grant by the Railway Department is still under discussion. Very properly, the Cairns Divisional Board has voted £500, and the question of the Municipal Council contributing £250 is being considered.

Y FEBRUARY 1891 the papers reported that a small party under the supervision of Overseer O'Leary was clearing the Kuranda to Granite Creek road. It said when the weather cleared more men would be employed to expedite the job. At a Municipal Council meeting in February, A.J. Draper moved "That a sum of money not exceeding £250, but equal to the amount voted by the Divisional Board, in case it was under this amount, be voted towards the Kuranda to Granite Creek road."

An inspection tour by Severin and Telford from the Municipal Council and Kenny, Tills and O'Leary from the Divisional Board inspected the road in July 1891. They were told the job was nearing completion, and that the road was "one of the best ever opened in the district." It was well grassed and watered, and would provide good feed for the packers' animals when they carted over the road. Several teamsters had already advertised that they would cart from Herberton to Kuranda for £4 per ton, and were willing to sign contracts at this price for 12 months. The inspection team found that the road was well adapted for coach and buggy traffic.

By August 1891 The Cairns Post reported that: "Cobb

and Co's traffic with mails and passengers between Herberton and Cairns via Kuranda and the railway line, is so great that the coach service has to be supplemented by a large buckboard buggy. Between mail and passengers both conveniences are generally full." An advertisement in The Cairns Post announced that Cobb and Co's coach left Henry Shaw's Belle Vue Hotel for Herberton twice weekly. The Cairns Post also advised visitors to the Barron Falls that they could travel on further, or to Herberton if desired, as E.D. Ellis had opened a livery and bait stables adjoining Remilton's Hotel. First-class hacks etc were provided at reasonable cost.

Surveys open door for new era in sport and recreation

Sport and recreational facilities across the region will come under the spotlight as Tablelands Regional Council seeks to develop a new plan that will guide the future use of existing facilities and provide strategies to increase participation.

Residents and sporting organisations are being asked to help in the preparation of the new Sport and Recreation Plan by completing one of two surveys now available on-line and at Council offices.

"There are two different surveys – a Community Survey and a Club Survey", Mayor Tom Gilmore said. "We need sport and recreation organisations to complete the Club Survey to inform us about issues that are affecting these community groups, what their specific needs are and how Council can help make their important job easier. Residents should complete the Community Survey to indicate what their sport and recreation preferences are, and how they believe Council should support the community's sport and recreational needs."

Cr Gilmore said the information gathered would help develop the Plan which would provide a strategic framework for the future use and provision of sport and recreation services and facilities across the new regional council area. The surveys will be available until 13 November.

The Sport and Recreation Plan, which is being prepared by Cairns-based consultants Strategic Leisure Group and will be co-funded by the Department of Communities (Sport and Recreation Services), will aim to maximise use of existing facilities and identify future strategies to increase and enhance participation in active sport and recreation.

Plan for Multicultural Community Centre under way

Plans for a new Multicultural Community Centre at Mareeba are under way, with Tablelands Regional Council committing \$1 million and land to the project.

Council will now seek more than \$1.8 million from the next round of the Federal Government's Jobs Fund to make the project a reality.

The Jobs Fund is a \$650 million initiative to support and create jobs and skill development through projects that build community infrastructure.

Under the proposal, the Multicultural Community Centre would be established on three blocks of land in Constance Street, Mareeba (at the former bowling club site) and another parcel of land from Council's reserve.

The centre would house the relocated Mareeba Library and community support services as well as having meeting rooms for community groups.

If the Jobs Fund application is successful, Council would have to complete the project by 30 June 2011.

New regional events strategy

A Regional Events Strategy covering the next five years has been given the tick by Tablelands Regional Council. The strategy outlines events to be managed by the Council over the next five years, including the development of a Festival of Flowers, Faces and Places of the Tablelands, and a special event to mark the 2012 Solar Eclipse.

The strategy outlines how events will be managed within Council and recommends an advisory committee, made up of members of the events sector, to be established to assist with the long-term vision for Tablelands events. Clubs should complete only one survey for their club, but club members should still complete the community surveys.

Born 4th of August, 1931, died September 21st 2009



N Monday evening 21st September, my mother, Rose, died. Mum would often fall asleep reading, glasses still on her nose, still holding a book or newspaper. And so she left us, reading *The Australian*, a pile of books by her bed and one on her bed (an Amy Tan novel). I feel grateful that she left in the way she had wanted. "One day I will wake up dead" she would say to me with her mischievous grin, a bit softer at the thought of that unknown... Mum was completely accepting that it was getting close to quitting time...I was the one who wasn't coping at the thought of losing her...and now that she has gone, her presence has been palpable many times...my garden so enriched with her plants scattered amongst mine, her music CDs lifting my heart (classical, jazz, blues), some of her belongings in my home somehow warming the atmosphere throughout...it's hard to express how it feels losing someone with whom you have done so many hard yards, and loved so dearly, and battled with often, and who was so deep, and full of life, wonder, interest, and mischief, and also had suffered greatly in her earlier life, causing her the health issues in her later life.

I thought after mum died, that she had many daughters, although I was the only biological daughter. Mum had many female friends that were much younger in years, and somehow there was that relationship of equals, but Mum also nurtured and gave so much to these friends.

Mum's friends, male and female, were from all walks of life, and I am sure you would all say that your lives were enriched with her as your friend. Mum also loved deeply to the end, as we all do, and she is a reminder to us all that although the body ages, the heart remains constant. Mum used to say that falling in love was like having the flu – read into that what you wish (!), but I have to say she had the flu a few times!

Well, now one of Kuranda's great women has left, and something will never be the same again, for me at least, as I drive in to Kuranda, and pass her lovely little unit with the million dollar rainforest view...I will never see her tiny figure standing, hand on hip, waving at me...I will never see her at her favourite coffee shop with her very dearest of friends...solving the world's problems...a little in love with Barack Obama (who shares her birthday – she would want you all to remember that little fact!)...a little peeved at Kev and Julia's shortcomings, very interested in all that happened around. What has Rose left us? Although I have lost my mother who loved me like no other (as is the way of mothers), the pianist who played wonderful classical music from the heart, the artist never seen, the writer never read, the dreamer unknown, she has left us knowing that love is all there is...and Mum, I love you.

The first step taken by TFNQ was forming a steering committee designed to co-ordinate things until local initiatives have stabilised enough so that their representatives can take this role.



Latest contenders for the Darwin Awards

Named in honour of Charles Darwin, the father of evolution, the Darwin Awards commemorate those who improve our gene pool by removing themselves from it.

30 May 2009, Lousiana. Back seat drivers beware! Annoyed at how slowly her boyfriend was driving, Tamera B, 22, encouraged him to pick up the pace so she could get to work on time. Joking that it would be faster to walk to work, she opened the door of the pickup and stuck her foot out before falling to her death. Deputies of the jurisdictional Sheriff's Office stated that the truck was travelling at highway speed at the time of the incident. Her death was ruled accidental.

27 June 2009, Pennsylvania. A severe storm damaged power lines and left 17,000 homes without electricity. Mieczyskaw Mil, 64, was one of the affected parties. His power line serviced only 17 homes and therefore was one of the last to be repaired. Seven hours after the line fell, Mr Mil finally lost his patience.

The old man had been shooed away repeatedly by firefighters who were guarding the power line. "Police and firefighters literally chased him away. We did everything we could," said Dick Martinkovic, commissioner of public safety in Sullivan County. But they were not prepared for the homeowner's sudden bold move.

Frustrated with waiting, Mil emerged from his home shortly after midnight with an industrial circular saw in his hand and plastic bags on his feet. He stood in a puddle of water and attempted to saw through a 4800-volt feeder line that was dangling off the pole. He fell and became entangled in the hissing and buzzing live wire. While emergency responders waited for utility workers to shut down the power, Mil was busy being killed by continuous electrocution.

The story says it all. He was repeatedly shooed away from the power line, but insisted on cutting it while standing in a puddle, and now is safely out of the gene pool.

5 February 2009, India. For lottery agent Pravin Kuse, his number was up when he followed his dream and decided to dig for a pot of gold. A bachelor, Kuse, 32, lived with his brother's family in Vasai, India. According to his aged mother, Kuse had learned in a dream that an ancient pot of gold was buried beneath his abandoned 100-year-old house, located a few meters from his current residence. He warned his mother not to tell anyone about the dream, fearing that it would result in a fight over the fortune.

Some legends hold that a pot of gold lies at the end of the rainbow. But Kuse's dream told him to dig beneath the staircase of the old house. After lunch, every day without fail, Kuse would take his spade and dig a few meters further beneath the stairs. This innovative gold-digger had even purchased a toy car and attached a flashlight to it to assist him while digging in the dark. The neighbours had no idea that days and nights of digging had resulted in a 15-feet deep tunnel.

One day Kuse did not return home. His worried relatives lodged a missing persons complaint and police were dispatched to the old house. Within a few hours an earthmover had evacuated Kuse's body from the debris. At a depth of 15 feet, the soil became moist due to its proximity to the sea, and it was determined that the floor of the house had caved in over Kuse. Authorities registered a case of accidental death and recovered the spade and the innovative mobile flashlight from the site.


In searching for a pot of gold, Kuse may not have had the luck of the Irish, but he does have the distinction of winning a Darwin Award.

An oldie but goodie: 1982, Texas. At the Amarillo Fairgrounds, some buildings were in need of a coat of paint, so local contractors were hired to do the job.

Between the buildings was an angled culvert, designed to drain rainwater away from the buildings. Because of the slope, the wheeled painter scaffolding tended to roll downhill, so the painters removed the wheels on the scaffolding. They were in the process of moving the scaffolding when the metal structure met a transformer. The painters were killed.

The story made the headlines. The town was abuzz with talk of the tragedy, how it had come to pass, and whether the city was liable for damages. The city officials decided they needed to conduct an investigation.

With much fanfare, they arrived at the scene of the incident, prepared to personally recreate the circumstances. Two officials grabbed the scaffolding in the exact same location as the two painters, began to move the scaffolding... and were promptly electrocuted.



The Bligh government has introduced new laws to protect the Great Barrier Reef by regulating the amount of fertiliser, pesticide and sediment run-off entering reef waters. PLANT OF THE MONTH

Aristolochia acuminata

Native Dutchman's Pipe

This native vine is the host for the Cairns Birdwing butterfly, Australia's largest butterfly and one which is a welcome sight in all gardens. The caterpillars often defoliate the whole plant, before pupating to emerge as the vivid green males or large black females. Aristolochia is a twining vine which can grow quite large on trees or a trellis. The leaves vary from 100 to 300mm in length. The flowers are purple/brown in colour with a distinct shape. The fruit is a spherical pod with six segments each ending in a 30mm twisted tail. Numerous seeds are "winged". This vine can be found from Cape York to Proserpine and throughout Northern Australia and SE Asia.

BEWARE; there is a Dutchman's Pipe introduced from Indonesia which is poisonous" to the Cairns Birdwing Butterfly. These plants are sold to unsuspecting gardeners who think they are helping the butterflies by planting them in their gardens. Kuranda EnviroCare have in stock the NATIVE PLANT so call in and collect the correct specimen. I have witnessed the beautiful butterflies enmasse on my flowering Schefflera actinophylla (Umbrella Tree).


