

# Shortage of Camping Areas for 'Grey Nomads'

Recently there has been some discussion regarding what should happen with the old Kuranda Primary School area. The Chamber of Commerce should seriously approach the Shire Council to make the land available as a camping ground for grey nomads. There is already infrastructure in place, such as toilet facilities and sheltered areas within the school grounds and it would not take much to upgrade the grounds and facilities for this purpose. The grounds are easily accessible with sealed roads leading right up to the entrance.

As Kuranda entirely relies on the tourist industry, this would benefit businesses in the town by attracting more people to spend time in the area. This can be controlled by setting a time limit on length of stay, so that the area will not be turned into a permanent caravan park. A caretaker could be appointed and a small fee charged to cover maintenance.

Kuranda would make an ideal grey nomad stopover as it is an attractive village with all the necessary facilities, including a supermarket, cafes, markets, restaurants and hotels. It has a comfortable climate and many natural attractions, such as the Barron Falls and rainforest walks, and is almost directly opposite the Skyrail and Railway Station.

#### **The Community Plan**

I would like to thank Friends of the Earth Kuranda for their comments on the draft Tablelands Community Plan.

Council has sent a comprehensive response to FoE Kuranda's submission, but I wish to address a comment made by the group in the March edition of your paper, particularly in relation to the comment that "key proposals articulated in the document amount to the wrong plan for this area".

The Community Plan was developed as a result of an extensive community consultation campaign which involved some 89 events across the region through which more than 11,000 people gave their views.

In Kuranda, a regional survey was conducted, two community voting stalls were held near the Post Office, an Indigenous survey was carried out, a town survey, a community planning workshop, and an Indigenous planning workshop. A separate community planning workshop was held at Koah and another at Speewah.

Overall, 750 people from Kuranda, Koah and Speewah participated through these actions to provide Council with the ideas and aspirations of our community.

I am very proud of the efforts of staff members who undertook this project and am confident that we have a Community Plan that truly reflects the views of Kuranda residents and Tablelanders.

I urge the community to view their plan on the website (**www.trc.qld.gov.au**) or at the Kuranda Library.

These wonderful organisations are proof of people "coming together" to make the changes they would like to see. Let's see a more positive pro-active approach than the current bagging of this fantastic town that we are all so lucky to live in.

Kuranda's Easter in the Park is at Centenary Park from 10am to 4pm on April 7.


# **RADF FUNDING SECOND ROUND 2011 - 2012**



# Gardening Kuranda



**APRIL**, and the Wet is certainly with us. The heavy rains with their run-off and compaction of soil only reinforces the benefits of mulching.

Again, the combination of very heavy rain and winds has brought down trees, confirmed in the local SES report, and highlights the need to carefully remove trees

potentially hazardous to structures and power lines and the foresight needed in any proposed tree plantings.

It is usually better to overestimate height and width of subject as too often resolutions to keep in bounds go by the wayside until too late.

One of the joys of gardening (as well as its therapeutic benefits) is in making new friends and learning the secrets of their successes.

This is why Gardening Groups, generalist or specialist, are so beneficial. I note here the great program for 2012 planned by the Kuranda Gardening Group.



Another notable characteristic of the gardening fraternity (and sorority) is their remarkable generosity in sharing - plants, cuttings and advice. Often this generosity extends to sharing specialist knowledge developed over years of study

Plant of the Month: Platycerium superbum, the "Staghorn fern" (Polypodiaceae family) occurs naturally in lowland rainforests in Queensland and northern New South Wales and like the more commonly seen P. bifurcatum, the "Elkhorn fern", makes an impressive garden subject.

Basically, *P. superbum* is epiphytic (grows on trees) or sometimes

lithophytic (growing on rocks) and can obtain huge 'nest' fronds and considerable weight. The 'nest' fronds are designed to collect falling leaves, bird droppings and insects, giving valuable sources of potassium and calcium.

The 'nest' attaches to the host tree, protectively wrapping the rhizome and short roots, clasping onto the furrows in the bark with root like structures. In season fertile antler fronds emerge from low on the nest frond and during summer produce

Best seen to advantage attached directly on trees or mounted onto hardwood boards and hung in suitable positions, their eventual size and weight (particularly when wet), must be calculated for.

Of the easiest cultivation once established – small plants can sometimes be difficult to transfer to host from pot or basket – an occasional good watering during the drier months and some topping, if required to the 'nest', sees them thrive.

Some gardeners swear by the application of banana skins for their potassium yield. Taking some morning sun, but preferring dappled to shade, scorching and yellowing of plant can occur in too harsh sunlight.

Unlike many species P. superbum doesn't produce plantlets and must be cultivated from spore so small plants can be expensive.

With more keen gardeners in the area collecting a range of Platycerium species, the following listing by habitat, provided by Louwrens is extremely useful and consideration will save money and heartbreak.

From wettest places: Platycerium madagascariens (Madagascar cloud forests), Platycerium hillii (Tropical rain forests of North Queensland, Platycerium alcicorne was (vassei) (West African coast), Platycerium ellisii (Western Madagascar), Platycerium ridleyii (Borneo, Sumatra, Malay Peninsula)

From places with wet and dry seasons: Platycerium coronarium (Vietnam, Burma, Thailand, Philippines), Platycerium bifurcatum (Eastern Australia, along the coast, and inland in some places/an under story plant.), Platycerium willinckii (Considered to be the most primitive Platycerium. Native to Java.), Platycerium andinum (Isolated pockets of Peru and Bolivia/Tropical dry forest), Platycerium elephantotis (Angolensis) (Equatorial Africa except the Congo basin), Platycerium stemmaria (Central and western Africa), Platycerium superbum (Australia only. About the same range as P. bifurcatum), Platycerium grande (True grande is only from the Philippines), Platycerium holttumii (Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam, Thailand), Platycerium wandae (Only in Java/Largest Platycerium), Platycerium wallichii ( India, Burma, Thailand, Yunnan Province of China).

#### **Artists Beware**

Most artists would consider themselves lucky to be exhibited, but new proof-of-ownership laws mean they 'need to think again'. When a Melbourne gallery went bust last year, the accountant helped recover works for almost a dozen artists from the receiver.

Most artists sell their work on consignment, with any not sold remaining their property. But since 30 January 2012, when the Government's Personal Property Securities Register (PPSR) came into effect, any unregistered artworks left with a failed dealer can legally be sold by the liquidator. Recovering money from those sales is another thing.

One artist, trapped in this scenario, said "The new laws need to protect artists otherwise we are left in a world where everything is made in China and bought on the net". Source: "The Week" 24 Feb 2012.






Bosko & Honey: "Pretty Please"







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# The Healthy Kuranda-ite

# **Essentials for Rising above** the Rainy Days

**WATER** is a fundamental part of life, however, living within the rainforest (in the rainy season) can bring with it some challenges. Beautiful flowers flourish, but so does the mould!

We all know too well what it looks like but did you know that mould spores can become air borne and cause damage to our health and well-being: primarily compromising our body's immune system by adding on it an extra load to process. This can create respiratory issues like nasal congestion, lung infections, worsen asthma and allergies.

## How to kill/prevent mould!

Fill a spray bottle with 80mls of water and 20mls of white vinegar. Add 10 drops of Clove Oil and 10 drops of Eucalyptus Oil. Spray on and wipe clean with a cloth in all rooms of the house.

Having recently moved premises, my previous shop had little issues with mould after completing this process 2-3 times. After a while the residue builds up and remains on the surfaces preventing the mould growth. I have had to start this process again since moving. I anticipate a few cleaning sessions specifically for the mould, then, by adding this into my regular cleaning regime it will be ample to keep it at bay.

Place three drops of Clove Oil into the water of the washing machine to prevent mould on clothes, bedding etc. Add three drops onto a tissue and place in drawers to prevent during storage. Spray a fine mist onto carpets/rugs to prevent growth here also.

Other issues that can arise are tropical skin conditions, just like mould, other fungal and bacterial organisms flourish in warm and damp environments. These can enter our body when we have an opened wound, causing a

fast growing infection i.e. impetigo, tinea and many forms of staphylococcus. There are several ways of treating such

infections. Essential oils like Tea Tree, Kunzea and Neem Oil can be very effective. Add one drop of essential oil to every 10 drops of coconut oil and apply. Lavender Oil is also a very good disinfectant that helps with scaring.

Lavender can also be useful for calming and insomnia. If you enjoy being active and find the wet restricts your exercise, then sometimes this can led to feelings of sadness, lethargy or stress. What I refer to as 'cabin fever'. Exercise is so important for a healthy mind and body. Mood enhancing essential oils include: Sandalwood, Jasmine, Bergamot, Lemon and Lemongrass (having a euphoric effect on the body).

Note: When buying essential oils make sure they are not 'fragranced' oils and are 100% pure to ensure they will have the desired therapeutic effect. Most oils will cost between \$4 and \$16. With a basic collection of 2-3 oils they will usually last for years, great for cleaning and a cheap and personalised way to manage many health conditions.

NB: some essential oils are not safe during pregnancy or when suffering from different health conditions. Check with your local aromatherapist/ health professional before creating a blend that best suits your needs.





# **Book Review**

"A God of One's Own"

by Ulrich Beck (2010, Polity Press) ISBN 9780 7456 4619, RRP \$21.95

This book by German Professor Beck, a leading European thinker, is now available in English. What makes it interesting is that Beck writes as a sociological secularist, but does not accede to the secularisation theory that religion is at best of no value (and at its worst positively dangerous) and that religion is approaching its demise in the contemporary world. Rather, he sees religion having an ongoing and useful role, notwithstanding the secularisation of public life. His comments are mainly directed at the position in Europe.

In support, Beck draws upon the experience of Etty Hillesum, a secular Jew in the Netherlands during WW II, and her diary. As the Nazi horrors unfold, she developed her own internal conversation with God, which enables her to respond to her inevitable fate in the concentration camp with equanimity, without bitterness or hate.

Beck uses this to illustrate the trend towards personal religion, the development of a God of one's own, free of the churches and synagogues, inflexible dogmas and rituals, extending to new age and other esoteric beliefs and practices.

As an atheist, he personally regards this trend as banal and trivial, but he sees a need for an internal life of one's own in the modern invasive world.

This can include the choice of one's own private "sacred canopy". Membership of the existing universal priestly religions is confining and a restriction on individuality and free choice.

Moreover, he views the entrenched beliefs of these priestly religions as being inimical to the goal of peace and mutual tolerance.

He fortifies this view by observing a contemporary revival of a wide diversity of individualistic religious beliefs in Europe, largely based on a decoupling of institutional religion and subjective faith, but with transnational or global links.

Beck proclaims his goal as being peace, not truth. The trend to individualisation in religion he sees as a self-civilising process capable of leading to a new degree of toleration and peace, an unforeseen consequence of the individualisation and cosmopolitisation of religion. Truth is regarded by him as being of much lesser importance.

There is no doubt that the much publicised attacks recently mounted by

prominent members of the New Atheist Movement against organised religion have disturbed many people, indicating the rise of a new, secular, aggressive form

Beck is to be congratulated for adopting, as a secularist, a much more tolerant approach to religion. But his views will offer little comfort to the vast numbers of people throughout the planet, including in Europe, whether members of organised religions or otherwise, who do believe in the existence of a Higher Power or greater Reality, some form of transcendental, supreme deity, "God" or however called. To them, the truth of this belief is critical.

Beck is entitled for himself to assume that these beliefs are false, but there is something odd about an argument that says that false beliefs can be tolerated if they lead to peace. Surely any lasting peace must be based on the truth.

While the world is still subject to many violent expressions of religious intolerance and prejudice, Beck does not examine whether this could be changed by reconciling the variety of religious beliefs on the basis of a central core of truth.

For example, he could have considered whether the contemporary Interfaith Movement, extending to most religions, offers any hope for the future. This Movement at the World Parliament of Religions has recently proclaimed a Common Global Ethic.

He could have gone further and examined whether the various great religions are in fact linked, a progressive and cyclical unfoldment of the will of the one supreme deity to humanity through the chosen founders in different ages and places, although in each case then burdened with man-made additions and alterations to introduce the elements of exclusivity, sectarianism, fanaticism and bigotry.

More and more people are coming to the conclusion that there is, and can only be, one "God" of all humanity, and that the differences between the religions only relate to the non-essentials or to man-made alterations and additions.

In a world that is rapidly becoming one community, a global village, as a matter of rationality and common sense as well as of faith in the one God, there is a great need for the abandonment of the causes of disunity, prejudice, hatred and violence, including in religion.

But then, Beck's stated position as a secularist presumably prevents him undertaking the search for such a truth, to be abandoned to his more pragmatic and limited offering. But the book does provide much to think about.

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# **Kuranda Aquatic Centre News**

Swimarathon hosted by Rotary International – Over a thousand dollars was raised for the END POLIO Campaign by 22 swimmers on Saturday February 25th. Swimmers, during a set period from 1.00pm to 5.00pm, needed to complete laps and be sponsored by

supporters, family and friends.

Many of the participants were children and we thank their families for letting them get involved in a positive cause to rid Polio from the Planet once and for all. Overall 1240 laps were swum, or over 30km. Most laps completed were 120 by Rhys Krockenberger and Leonie Durrant. 100 laps were swum by Faye Brim (middle school), Aurora Clark (grade 6), Rhys Ki Stone (grade 6), Wil Davis (grade 2), Nelson Clark (grade 3), Juliet Headley (80 laps).

Many of these were close to exhaustion, on the hot afternoon, when finished. This was a mighty effort and matched by the stirling effort to gather \$1,000 for this great cause.

In April 2009 a girl by the name of Melanie Schlanger came to our pool as part of a Health promotion

program with the FOGS boys (Former Origin Greats). She was the first to sign our comments book, after having a training swim and coaching session with students from the Kuranda District State College. She now is the fastest woman swimmer in Australia after a stunning win in the 100m Freestyle at the Australian championships. She will be off to her 2nd Olympics and could well be the fastest woman in the world soon, best of luck to Mel and all the team in London. By the way, her time of 28.56 seconds for 50 metres is still the fastest time by a woman in our pool. Only Olympian Matt Welsh has gone quicker.

We fast approach Easter and the end of first term swimming programs. We will still offer lessons for Term 2 after the Easter two week break, and as the days shorten, we begin to fire up the heaters toward the end of the month and this will level us out at around 29 degrees, as we like to keep our little ones comfortable as they continue any developmental programs we have on offer. Mornings 2 or 3 days a week are offered for the bubs and toddlers and all afternoons after school are

available for learners and stroke development groups. Squads are usually the first thing in the day and last in the evening.

Water exercise classes are available for Cardio and tone. Aquafitness runs Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 6.15pm and Saturday mornings at 8.30am, Aquatonics, a gentler form of water therapy is available on Fridays at 11.00am.



# Inside My Studio

The cultural expressions of Aborigines form a central core which, through the media of the storyteller, the artist, keeps alive the beliefs of the tribe, and at the same time provides the people with a wealth of creative pleasure that enriches their lives. Talking with the proud, young Kunju and Djabugay artist, Briana Enoch in her studio/gallery, certainly enriched mine.

#### Where is your current studio?

I paint in my Din Din Arts Gallery at 1/40 Coondoo Street (main street), Kuranda. I started painting at 15 years of age and have been painting, and learning, ever

#### Do you work alone or with others?

I paint alone. There are, of course, international and local visitors coming into the Gallery during business hours so I am not always alone. I find much inspiration from young local Aboriginal people; they all paint at home but I hang and sell their work in my Din Din Arts Gallery. I encourage the much younger ones to paint bookmarks with traditional and contemporary Aboriginal designs.

#### What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Music. I listen constantly to the traditional guitar and lyrics of Geoffrey Gurrumul. I find it harmonious and relaxing and it gets me into the 'zone'. I have a connection with this musician, he is a blind Aboriginal man from Northern Territory. I find it meditative as I pray while I am working. My art is inspired by my Christian beliefs. God is the greatest creator and I ask Him for creative guidance to guide my hands and my thoughts to express the truth and His image in my art. I pray to Bulurru, the creator and Christian God in my Djabugay language.

#### Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

I try to be very disciplined as I have difficulty working at home. I have the Gallery open from 10.30am - 3.00pm Monday to Friday, six day per week and I paint during that time.

# Describe the works you do in your studio.

I paint on canvases, large and small, with acrylics. I have been using only traditional Aboriginal designs and colours - browns and yellows, however, I have started introducing a little purple and blue, the colours of the sunsets, sky and sea. I would like to travel and collect ochre from the land. To do this it is important that I consult and go through the protocols and seek permission from my elders. The collection site may be sacred. I would love to branch out and learn other mediums, perhaps

# Why is painting your chosen medium?

My Aunty Coralie Wason produces great works and I wanted to learn from her. She has been my teacher and my inspiration. My family has always carved and painted to financially support the family during the years when my parents were in the Seventh Day Adventist ministry. My father still carves and I paint his finished pieces for sale in my Gallery.

## List three things you listen to while working.

Mainly Geoffrey Gurrumul's music. He speaks about God through his music. I listen to my prayers and my

I also involuntarily hear the traffic noises of cars, buses and trucks. I hate it. I much prefer to paint at the family property Minya Mulla (Hands that Provide) at Boyles Road owned by June and Finley Grogan for more than 20 years. I am in the process of setting up a studio in my parents' vacant home.

#### Your favourite tool?

My paint brushes; I have a few. All with thin, long bristles to enable me to get a constant paint line. I am learning to use a new paint brush. (Briana hands me a brush with multiple length soft squirrel 'hairs'- made

My paints all have a dry matte finish, giving the quality and appearance of traditional finishes.

#### How do you identify your work?

Aboriginal artists are given a language name at birth. At 3 weeks old I was named 'Jarawee' meaning "pretty little bird" in my Djabugay language. I sign my paintings

'Jarawee' and the year date.

## How do you sell your work?

I sell my own paintings from my Din Din Arts Gallery and I am also asked to do commissioned works through the Gallery. Because I am seen painting in the Gallery, this adds credibility and authenticity to my paintings. Customers commission a work with a theme, a specific colour, a particular animal or a size, to their specification. I have been painting and selling here at the Gallery for just over a year now.

## Do you teach or sell from your studio?

I only sell other artists' work from the gallery. I do not teach here. My little 4yr old son comes into my work area on occasions and sits, observes and paints. He has his own canvases and paints and has sold 7 paintings so far.

#### Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

I teach craft to the very young members (the 'Cradle Roll') of our SDA Church on the weekends. It is part of their Bible lessons. They do creative learning from these lessons. I really enjoy the opportunity to see these little artists create.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? I would like a bigger space. I am too confined and limited in the size canvases I can paint on here. (I note behind the counter is an extremely large cellophane wrapped blank canvas- 48 x 60 inches just waiting for Brianna's brush strokes and a commission.)

# If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing?

I would be at University doing a teaching degree. I have already completed a small business management course which has helped me considerably with the operation of my Din Din Arts Gallery.

# More Than Meets the Eye

**THE HUMBLE COCKROACH** is thought of as one of the lowliest creatures on the planet, but did you know that this remarkable animal has conquered some of the most uninhabitable places on earth? Cockroaches are found in the driest deserts, wettest rainforests and coldest peaks of the alpine region. Their ability to evolve and adapt to their environment has given them the reputation of being the only animals to survive a nuclear war.

Most people would agree that cockroaches are not much to look at; fairly boring, brown or black in colour, and we don't see much of them anyway since they love dark places and only come out at night. Well, if cockroaches were to hear that, they would very likely march in protest – what a way to stereotype a group of animals!! Cockroaches are amazingly diverse, and they play an important part in our lives. They perform a number of different jobs for us such as helping to pollinate our plants and decompose our wastes – without them and their insect cousins carrying out these roles, humans could not survive.

And as for boring, they are far from it! Cockroaches come in a myriad of sizes and colours. There are more than 600 species in Australia alone, and our largest species is the Giant Burrowing Cockroach, (*Macropanesthia rhinoceros*), found only about 30 minutes inland from Kuranda. These cockroaches grow to 80mm in length and can weigh 30gms, about the weight of a mouse. A few days a year, these cockroaches will surface en masse to find a mate. During this time, people have mistakenly reported sightings of small turtles crossing the roads! These cockroaches are extremely good parents. The female gives birth to live babies, and both parents care for them for many months before the young leave home.


Mitchell's Cockroach (*Polyzosteria mitchelli*) is one of Australia's brightest coloured cockroaches and is found in the semi-arid regions of southern Australia. It has a green back with yellow lines, and bright blue legs. It is also a sun-loving species, and will bask in the sunlight during the day, instead of hiding away in dark places. They can be seen feeding on flower pollen and make no effort to hide themselves. We can only assume that they must taste awful to birds.

If you think it's too cold in the alpine region for cockroaches, think again. The Kosciusko Metallic Cockroach (*Polyzosteria virridisima*) lives in the sub-alpine zone, and while it is not very active during the snow season, it is able to tolerate very low temperatures. It is also remarkably coloured, with a bright metallic green back and loves to sunbake upon plants during the day.

David Rentz, a local entomologist, is currently writing a CSIRO Guidebook to Australian Cockroaches. On his property in Kuranda, he has found 91 species of cockroaches and almost half of them have yet to be described and given scientific names.

Australia's cockroaches are truly diverse, and whether they have ornate colours and textures, incredibly flat bodies, or the ability to produce strong chemical defences they aren't at all the dull pests they are often assumed to be. Unfortunately it is the half dozen introduced pest species that have given our native cockroaches a bad name.

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# ANZACDAY

Each year on 25 April people all over Australia celebrate Anzac Day. Most people know that on 25 April 1915 Australian and New Zealand troops landed at Gallipoli, at a place now known as Anzac Cove. These Anzac troops were part of an English attack that was supposed to take Constantinople, the capital of Turkey. The ill-planned mission failed to gain its objective, and the Allied forces eventually withdrew after many lives were lost. Despite the defeat, the landing at Anzac Cove became a rallying cry for many Australians, who saw it as somehow "proving" to the world that we were a worthy people.

Given this attitude, it is not surprising that there was a call to commemorate the event. With the passage of time Anzac Day has become a part of Australian life, but how many of us know when this commemoration was first held, and where.

On 11 January 1916 a public meeting was called in Brisbane by the Queensland Recruiting Committee to discuss the promotion of a celebration on the first anniversary of the Gallipoli landing. The meeting was attended by many influential people, including Premier Ryan, the Governor of Queensland, Sir Hamilton John Goold Adams, the leader of the Opposition, J. Tolmie, and General J.W. McCay, Inspector General of the Australian Forces. A committee was formed to organise the celebrations and make the necessary arrangements. The committee consisted of the Mayors of Brisbane and South Brisbane, the Premier, the leader of the Opposition, the chairmen of the Queensland Recruitment Committee and the Patriotic Entertainments Committee, and Canon Garland.

In subsequent meetings the committee formulated an official plan of observance:

- (1) That the object of the observance of the day be the commemoration of our fallen heroes, the remembrance of our wounded, the recognition of the gallant courage displayed by Australia's sons in fighting for the preservation of liberty and civilisation.
- (2) That all the religious bodies be requested to observe the day by such religious services as each such body shall decide.
- (3) That in the evening a public meeting be held in every town in Queensland, when the events of the day shall be brought before the people, a uniform resolution submitted at every such meeting, and simultaneously throughout the State during the meetings, every person and all work come to a standstill for a period of one minute at 9 p.m. in honour of our fallen heroes. (a) That the Mayor or

shire chairman be requested to constitute forthwith a local committee to program the observance of Anzac Day, and to carry out this plan in such manner as to ensure united action in every part of the State. (b) That at such public meetings, the place of honour be given to the relatives of those who have died in Gallipoli, and those who have enlisted.

The Minister of Public Instruction undertook to educate the children in the historic value of Anzac Day, and to produce a special edition of the School Journal devoted exclusively to Anzac Day. Copies of the journal were to be issued to private schools also.

The State Commandant agreed to a parade of all available troops through Brisbane, on condition that the parade was not used for raising funds or for jubilation. It was to be a sombre affair.



The Cairns Post of 13 January 1916 carried an article informing the public that a memorial day was to be held to commemorate the landing at Gallipoli: "It is pleasing to note that the citizens of Brisbane have taken up the

question of celebrating Anzac Day, and it is hoped the proposal will be heartily received in other parts of the Commonwealth and New Zealand."

The article said that some people had questioned why we should celebrate a failure, and the Premier, Mr Ryan, replied that the dearest memories of nations had sometimes occurred when events "had not proved an entire success." He said that "it was a day when many of the flower of Australian manhood were cut down, and when others, who were more fortunate to escape the withering fire of the enemy, rushed ashore and accomplished deeds which will live for all time."

The call was taken up enthusiastically, and almost every small Queensland settlement arranged to commemorate the first Anzac Day in 1916. Many small towns near Cairns, including Mareeba, Ravenshoe and Innisfail had their commemorations. Unfortunately, there was no record of a separate commemoration at Kuranda, but from the fervour with which the people of the town supported the war effort it is safe to assume that the residents were well represented.

Some businesses advertised that they would close in honour of the occasion, and a call was made for the day to become an official holiday. However, there were a few anomalies in Cairns on the first Anzac Day. Some people complained that the dredge continued working that day, but the captain said he had not received permission to give the crew the day off. It seems the message did not get from the Harbour Board to the captain.

The idea of a commemoration of Anzac Day even reached London, where a service was arranged in Westminster Abbey, attended by the Royal Family.



The world has changed dramatically since 1916, and it is difficult now to understand how such senseless slaughter of the cream of our youth could be seen as something to be proud of, whereas it would now be seen as a crime against humanity. However, in that era many Australians regarded themselves more as British than as Australians, and answered the call to arms "for King and country" without question. The utter disregard by many senior officers for the losses their own troops suffered appears to have been common, especially in those countries like England, France and Germany, where the armed forces operated on the class system. "Good breeding" was more important in the "officer class" than competence, as can be seen by the significant blunders that were accepted without reservation. Imagine how the public would react now if we suffered thousands of casualties in one day, as happened many times in World War One, especially when the casualties were caused by incompetent officers on both sides.

Despite the incompetence of many of their officers and the fact that the young soldiers were often used as "cannon fodder", they deserve every honour they receive, and much more. One sad aspect is that when the war was finished most of the politicians and community leaders conveniently forgot the promises they made to the youth they so willingly sent to fight. Even today, those who go to fight "for the preservation of liberty and civilisation" find that when they come home, they frequently have to fight for fair treatment against the very system that sent them into conflict.

Col Jeanes: from Disability to Enlightenment

Most of us know Col Jeanes from seeing him in his wheelchair in Coondoo Street Kuranda, selling his joke books and other things. He is the choice for this month's profile. He has a story to tell about his personal tragedy. But he also has a story to tell about hope and positivity.

He was born in Atherton to pioneer farmers immediately after World War II, the youngest of four children. His parents had to do it tough, carving a dairy farm out of the virgin rainforest scrub. It was a struggle, but Col learnt the virtue of hard work and self-sufficiency. His life was enhanced by the presence of a former Kanaka slave, who lived with the family until the age of 104, when he was gored by a bull. Col was an active young fellow, helping on the farm, fishing and hunting, attending Cubs and then Scouts. Later on his parents took on the school bus run. Col was not very good at schoolwork, leaving at 15 and going his own way looking for whatever work he could get. He first went to Victoria, doing various jobs, returning to Yungaburra where his folks now lived and finding various jobs on the Tablelands. He then moved on to other places to work - Mt Isa, Julia Creek, Gumlu, Mareeba and Gordonvale.

At Gordonvale, he met his future wife Carol, who was then a 15-year-old schoolgirl. Col says it was love at first sight. But they had to wait until she was 18 to get engaged and marry. They went on to have three

children. Col continued to move with work, although after injuring his back in Julia Creek he had to slow down a bit. He continued, however, to hunt and fish and led an active life playing tennis and cricket and swimming.

Col decided to do a Station Master's course at Townsville, which he passed with some difficulty in 1974. He continued to move around with work, this time with the railways. He managed to take a second honeymoon to Fiji and other Pacific places. In 1980 he became assistant Station Master at Kuranda where Col became active in the local Lions Club, and Carol in the CWA, in 1982.

The accident that changed his life occurred in 1984. Col and his brother acquired a hang glider and had a few lessons. With the instructor absent, Col took a turn, ascending quite high until a gust of wind upturned him and he crashed



to the ground. He severed his spinal cord at the neck and was in hospital for a long time with considerable pain. He was paralysed from the chest down and had difficulty moving his arms. The daunting reality was a future lifetime in a wheelchair, but Col is grateful for the assistance of his wife and the local Lions Club in dealing with this. Col brought his present house in Kuranda in 1985.

Col was not a religious man, but in his wheelchair he began to attend the Cairns Spiritual Group. He was introduced to the concept of Satori, or "enlightenment" in Japanese Zen Buddhism, engaging in meditation and prayer. He reported an incredible surge in consciousness as part of three deep spiritual experiences he had. This was of considerable help to him in dealing with his injury. Then in 1998 he travelled with his son to Brazil to consult a "miracle man". Much more recently he went to Bali with a carer and also on a cruise around New Zealand with daughter Sandra, granddaughter Christine and sister Irene, still in a wheelchair (now electric).

Col is mostly known for his activities in Coondoo Street, selling his own joke books and other items, mostly for the Lions Club, Hospital and other local organisations. He also distributes his own booklet "Far from Heaven", which tells of his physical and spiritual journey. He likes meeting people from all over the world. He feels at peace with himself, has

no hang-ups from the accident and has no enemies. Being now more orientated to his own version of Christianity, he says that what is most important to him is to understand the promises of God and the return of Lord Jesus in the Bible. After that, his family is the most important part of his life. This now includes six grandchildren. He enjoys life.

For a very active person who, at still a relatively young age, suffered such a devastating injury, Col has a remarkably positive approach to his life. Good luck to you Col, you deserve it.

# **Vets Issue Warning on Dog Obesity**

Veterinary experts are urging Kuranda pet owners to combat a growing trend of domestic canine obesity.

Brisbane Veterinary Specialist Centre founder and leading veterinarian Dr Rod Straw said pet obesity is often overlooked as a serious issue by pet owners.

"BVSC has recorded a steady increase in the number of overweight and obese dogs requiring treatment recently. Approximately 30 percent of dogs treated at BVSC are either overweight or clinically obese," he said.

Dr Straw said obesity in animals can be linked, in part, to a busy lifestyle which leaves little time for pet owners to exercise

"Like humans, dogs will gain weight if they fail to expend sufficient energy to burn off the calories they consume. To help counteract dog obesity, pet owners are encouraged to walk their pet regularly. Pet owners can also make gradual adjustments to their dogs' diet but are advised to seek advice from their vet before reducing an animal's food intake. A vet can provide a recommended diet to ensure pets consume the nutrients they require," said Dr Straw.

According to Dr Straw, obesity poses many health dangers for dogs and contributes to a shorter life span.

"Canine obesity can lead to a number of serious health issues including respiratory problems, arthritis, heart disease, skin problems, diabetes and urinary problems.

"Obese dogs are also more likely to be tired and lethargic, greatly reducing their quality of life. As dogs are not capable of regulating their own weight, the onus is on their owners to look out for their health. Owners can check their canine for a possible weight problem by feeling its ribs cage. An indication that a dog is overweight is if the ribs cannot be easily felt," he concluded.

# **A Thought for April**

I often get told: "Oh you don't know what it feels like. You have never experienced anything like what I have been going through". It is a not an uncommon reaction from people who have been facing up to tragedy in some shape or form. We can try to sympathise. We can try to draw on our own experiences or observations but sometimes they just don't connect with the experience someone is facing. What they need is someone who can draw alongside them who will be able to sympathise and to fully understand. Even as a Priest I sometimes find myself at a loss in such situations. I know, however, that I can point them to God as someone who will understand and with whom they can share their feelings.

Jesus is at the right hand of God interceding for us, St Paul reminds us in Romans 8, and he is someone who in his life here on earth experienced suffering in many of its forms. At his birth he was a refugee, as his family fled to Egypt. He faced up to temptation in all its forms – and faced that temptation to the full, because, unlike us, he did not give in to it. During his ministry he experienced misunderstanding and persecution. His followers were slow to understand him, his enemies quick to attack him. He was even rejected by his own family who labelled him a madman. He experienced hunger and thirst, poverty and homelessness; He knew grief as he wept at the death of his friend Lazarus. There's quite a few of the pressures we face in that list.

It is his 'Passion' that we see Jesus plumb the depths of human suffering, however. Over the next few weeks we turn our eyes upon the cross of Jesus and the arrest and trials which led up to it. There he experienced betrayal by one of his followers. All his friends ran away, leaving him to face the music alone. He was falsely arrested, accused and condemned after a rigged trial. He was abused, mocked and mistreated. He faced physical agonies - beaten and scourged, nailed to a cross - his mobility taken away, feet and hands nailed to a cross, fighting for every last breath as he hung there, until his heart gave up. He even experienced the spiritual pain of feeling deserted by God. (He was bearing the judgement of God on our sin, a judgement that came between him and the Father with whom he had always lived in perfect fellowship.) Physical, mental, spiritual, emotional pain - Jesus experienced them all.

Whatever our problem we can take it to Jesus. We can be assured of his understanding and of his love. His death and resurrection enable us to know God's love and presence in our lives. Having dealt with the judgement on our sin, the barriers between us and God have been broken down. God can come into our lives. Jesus is Risen from the dead, he is alive for evermore. He has overcome all the evils of this world. There is hope for the future where sin, sickness and sorrow will all be done away. That gives us hope for the future but now we can know he is there for us. It is to this Jesus that we can turn in prayer. We can be sure that he understands and cares. Those around us may not understand our troubles but Jesus can. His life, death and resurrection are a guarantee of that.

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

# BatReach news of Pod



Pod, a Brushtail Possum, recently came into care after being found by Mareeba ambulance staff. Pod was only 50g, furless and eyes unopened when he arrived at BatReach but has since thrived to a healthy 350g - still on milk, he will eventually be weaned onto solids.

Brushtails in the wild have a varied diet of eucalypt leaves, flowers, fruits and seeds, and on occasion eggs and insects.

Possums are nocturnal, arboreal marsupials with prehensile tails and despite spending most of their time in the trees; they often have to come to ground to cross roads that fragment their habitat. This often results in accidents and young in the pouch becoming orphaned.

As soon as its tail was in, its middle bit was wrapped around someone's arm or leg. When the long snake was unwound from their legs or arms, the tail end had found its way out of the bag. And, so the scramble continued. They were all wee-d and poo-d on and stank, but they finally managed to get it all in the bag and tie it off. (The reward: another snake was saved).

# She's seen some big ones has our Jax ! A SNAKE STORY

We get a call about every second day to remove a snake – usually pythons – usually around chook houses. One caller warned us "it's big!". "They all say that," yawned Jax. She's removed itsy bitsy ones, the size of large worms; simply scooped them into a bag. Most are 2-3 metres long, about as thick as one's wrist. On this occasion, when she arrived at Jim's chook house, her eyes opened wide. Had she not had helpers she wouldn't have even attempted to catch this one. It was huge, measured at 4m, but she swears it was 5-6m long and as thick as your thigh.

She nudged it with her broom and it didn't even blink. Some more aggressive nudges got it heaving its long body up a nearby small tree, its long neck cantilevered more than a metre high into the tree. When it had most of its weight in the small branches, down came snake and bush crashing to the ground. # AN INSPIRING CASSOWARY STORY

A call came in from Christine: a regular bird with his two chicks was limping badly. He had sliced himself from his foot up the back of his leg. The chicks were boisterous and he was having difficulty keeping up. What to do? We phoned QPWS and wildlife caring vets. Being a Sunday, there were no immediate responses. We were on our own.

The cassowary was used to people and Christine was able to get close to it. We decided to try to douse the wound with Betadene in the hope of stemming infection in the hugely swollen lower leg.

Remarkably, this was achieved and Christine reported the next day that the swelling had reduced dramatically.

During the ensuing days, the QPWS ranger had suggested it might need antibiotics. We wondered how they might be given to the bird.

"In a rat", explained the ranger.
"You should see their eyes light up when you give them a rat."

Apparently, the antibiotics are sewn up in the (dead, of course) rat and there is no doubt the bird gets the full dose.

# Peace loving Wildlife desperately seeks Corridors to extend mutually beneficial relations

The value of Wildlife Corridors has been proven once again following the late afternoon sighting of a Lumholtz Tree Kangaroo (LTK) by an observant resident on a Kuranda property backing onto the Barron Falls reserve. The LTK's sleepy standoff at 2-3 paces lasted for around 2 mins. There's also been a sighting on Black Mountain Road, another from the Kuranda Range Road and one on Boyles Road by keen naturalists over the years. The Lumholtz – one of only two varieties in Australia – is usually found in the Malanda area of the Atherton Tablelands and rarely leaves that district, which makes this sighting so significant.

This variety of the species is rarely seen on the ground during daylight, spending the days curled up in the fork of a tree. It's very slow moving, "ambles" rather than hops and has a very distinctively shaped head and thick muscular forearms. For a clearer copy of the identifying features go to the TK group website

## Nursery News Golden Pendas

We've a good supply of Golden Pendas ,(Xanthostemon chrysanthus), a native of Cape York. It prefers plenty of sun, well-drained, moisture-retentive soil, is sensitive to phosphorus so use fertiliser designed for natives with low (<4) P. In gardens, they're rounded shrubs of about 5-8 metres, given room to spread. With attractive acid yellow flowers they bring the birds and insects. **Hungry Birdwing caterpillars** eating your vine to the ground? Please try taking them to the "railing diner" at our nursery shed where we have 7 healthy leafy vines waiting to provide a meal! And we have seedlings ready to plant for the next crop of younguns.

# Local Government Elections 28 April 2012:

Council elections will be held on Saturday 28th April. These elections will be conducted by ECQ (Electoral Commission Qld) and voting will be by Postal Vote only. You do not need to apply for a Postal Vote as Postal Voting Papers will be mailed directly to you at your enrolled address on April 2nd.

If you do not receive your voting papers by soon after Easter, please check with the local Post Office and/or you can phone the Electoral Commission ECQ Hotline 1300 881 665 to request that your voting papers be reissued to you.

The Ballot papers need to be mailed back in the envelope supplied before 6.00pm on Saturday 28th April. You can check your electoral enrolment on the ECQ website www.ecq.qld.gov.au.).

#### Council Budget 2012-13:

One of the first tasks of the new Council will be to finalise the 2012-13 Budget. The current Council has been working on the development of the Budget for some months.

I have submitted a long list of funding projects with the hope that many of them will be funded. If there is anything that you would like Council to consider adding to the list for Budget consideration, please let me know.

#### **Road Projects:**

Update on road projects: Fallon Road Bridge is planned for construction in the coming year; Morton Street/Rob Veivers Drive intersection is planned for July-October this year; Local Projects submitted for NDRRA (Natural Disaster/Reconstruction) federal funding are Ganyan Drive/ Speewah Road, Mona Mona Road, Black Mt Road, Koah Road. These may take some time to deliver, however, there is a strong possibility of federal funding for the projects

## New Kuranda Visitors' Centre:

Funding has been approved for the construction of a new Visitor Information Centre and funds will come from the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund (not ratepayers). Tenders for the Architect design have closed and the design work will begin soon.

The new (much larger) Centre will be a "purposebuilt" and will be designed to complement both the community use and the tourism use of Centenary Park. The new building will not take away any park green space. A feature will be new technologies for displays and interpretative information about the area. I am still very hopeful that we will see construction of the new building before the end of this year.

# Fluoride:

I know that many of us do not want fluoride in our water and I can assure you that I have tried and Council has tried to have this changed... but this is State Government legislation with severe penalties for Councils... and so the construction work has started on installing the Kuranda fluoride plant (State funded). This is expected to be completed by May 1st.

Before the fluoride is added to the water supply, by law, residents will receive at least one month's notice.

## **Recycling Strategy Plan for TRC:**

A strategy Plan for managing Recycling across the region is currently being developed for consideration by Council in June 2012. If you have particular comments regarding this, please contact TRC Environmental Planning Officer, Kirsty Lamperd at

kirstyl@trc.qld.gov.au or by phoning Kirsty at 4043 4390. In the interim, recyclables can be left at the special bin at the Kuranda Transfer Station.

#### **Tourism Kuranda:**

The tourism promotion group continues to do a wonderful job of promoting the Kuranda Village, with Marc Sleeman providing the hard work. (See you at the Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Saturday!)

Members of the TK Committee are all volunteers who devote hours to promote Kuranda. The current Committee is due to retire in August and nominations for positions on the Committee will be advertised midvear

#### **Transfer Station Hours of Operation:**

I am seeking your feedback on the opening hours. An increase in hours is important as well as finding the most suitable opening times. Would you like an increase in week-end opening hours? Would you prefer earlier or later opening times? Please let me know what you think.

#### **Library Hours of Operation:**

I am also hoping to see an increase in Library opening hours. As the Kuranda Library also provides basic Council office services, an increase is definitely needed. Please let me know your thoughts, particularly regarding the times and also possible opening on Mondays.

# **Strategic Plan for Coondoo Street Fig Trees:**

A comprehensive Management Plan for the future care of the Coondoo St fig trees has been approved by Council, along with a commitment to \$20,000 per year to maintain the trees accordingly.

The Plan provides a professional approach to securing the long-term health and life of the 14 trees, along with a budget to carry out the works and provide a regular maintenance program.

## **RosCommon Speewah:**

The small unisex toilet block will be constructed at RosCommon near the Children's playground before the end of June. \$32,000 has been allocated by Council for the construction. Roscommon has always been a real community park and it is good to see some more facilities there.

## **Kuranda Community Precinct:**

Applications for use of the community spaces in Building C (the newest building) have now been approved. Groups such as the Junior Rugby League and Yoga and Dance classes will soon be using the facilities.

Council has ensured that the current facilities available at the CWA Hall and the Kuranda Recreation Centre are not disadvantaged. Tenders for the removal of the older buildings (buildings A and B) are now open. Council is working towards the future construction of a purpose built facility at the Community Precinct. Planning work has already commenced for the establishment of the Library at the Community Precinct. The entire lower floor of the Block C building will be used to create a spacious community Library and resources hub, with space for small meeting rooms and additional library services for our community.

Thank you to the Kuranda Community for engaging in the extensive public consultation last year. The Advisory Committee will soon be reformed and will work towards a long-term plan for the facilities. It will take some time until the site is able to be used to the full potential.

## **New Aged Housing Units:**

The next Aged Housing units (2 units in Harriman Street and 2 units in Thoree Street) will be constructed before the end of 2012. Allocation of places in these units is made by Council in conjunction with Qld Housing. Enquiries: Bob Graham Ph 1300 362 242.

## Off-Leash area for dogs:

Many pet owners have asked about "off-leash" areas for their dogs. I have made a submission for funding of such an area in Kuranda through the 2012-13 Budget. The area would be fenced appropriately. The exact location has not been decided. Your ideas are welcome.

#### **Disaster Management Community Plan:**

I look forward to seeing as many people as possible at the Anzac Day services in Kuranda. The services are always quite sobering reminders.





# Living in Xuranda

A record deluge of 227mm of rain in 24 hours was recorded at Mt Sheridan and other heavy downpours that followed signalled the late but spectacular arrival of our 'Wet Season". As usual, the Emergency Services were kept busy, many roads were blocked or impassable and the Gillies Highway was closed. Traffic north and south of the Smithfield roundabout was blocked and traffic on the Kuranda Range slowed to one lane. Kuranda Railway closed for a few days, but Skyrail was fully operational. Disappointed tourists who managed to get here, instead of their planned day out on the Great Barrier Reef, arrived to a wet, almost depressing Kuranda, with a distinct lack of tourists.

A concerned resident commented on local TV that Kuranda is losing its appeal and the reason wasn't the weather. A Letter to the Editor in last month's edition of *The Kuranda Paper* commented on the amount of rubbish strewn along the verge of our Kuranda Range Road, now probably washed down into hidden hillside creeks and valleys, or now drifting in the brown muddy Barron River before being deposited onto Machans Beach.

Photographs of the white and muddy turbulent Barron Falls reveal our precious red earth scoured from farms, land development, and river banks swept from along the swollen creeks and rivers on the Atherton Tablelands. This cascading river of toxic water ruins our Great Barrier Reef and marine life. How many tourists are aware of this, I wonder? They may be more concerned at the inconvenience of a heavy downpour of rain, as they dash past dejected stall holders and shop owners who lose business.




