July 16 we witnessed a spectacular event, the best total eclipse of the

Moon since 1953. This event is unusual in that it was not only visible from all parts of Australia, but it happened reasonably early in the evening - the main part of the eclipse started around 10 pm AEST - so it was easy for almost everyone to see it.

This was not only the first total eclipse of the Moon all Australia saw in it's entirety since 1993, it was the last until 2011. Moreover, the Moon was very close to the centre of Earths shadow, making it the longest, darkest lunar eclipse since 1953! Totality lasted 107 minutes, making it longer than any total lunar eclipse in the 20th century.

A lunar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes into Earths shadow. This can only occur when the Moon is full, as this is when the Moon is opposite the sun, in the direction of earths shadow. We do not normally see eclipses, as the Moon's orbit is tilted, and the Moon usually misses the shadow. However, when the Moon's orbit crosses the shadow, we have an eclipse.

The eclipse started with the Moon

entering the Earth's outer shadow. The moons disk darkened somewhat

when the disk was full immersed in the outer shaddow, but it was not obvious. The main attraction was when the Moon entered the Earth's inner shadow, and the Moon began to darken dramatically, and take on a reddish hue.

Finally, the Moon entered into complete totality. However, the Moon did not become completely dark, because, while there was no direct sunlight, some light was still reaching the Moon, and the Moon became a dull copper-red. This was caused by light from the Sun bending slightly as it hit the Earth's atmosphere, red light was then bent into the Earth's shadow and the shorter, blue wavelengths were filtered out. The stars that were previously hidden by the Moon's light were then visible, making the sky quite dramatic.

The Moon left the Earth's inner shadow 107 minutes after it entered and the eclipse ended 1 hour and 10 minutes later when the Moon finally cleared the Earth's outer shadow.

This was a remarkable, once in a century lunar eclipse that we hope you didn't miss.



NOTES FROM ABROAD

NEW DELHI, July 16 (AFP) - Tens of millions of Indians watched as the earth's shadow swept the moon Sunday in the longest lunar eclipse in 150 years, but most of the subcontinent missed the celestial show due to monsoon clouds.

The eclipse, which began before sunset at 5:27 p.m. (1153 GMT), was visible over eastern and fareastern India where tens of millions of Hindus observed the phenomenon with religious rites and holy dips in rivers.

"It is indeed a rare celestal event and our regret is that the clouds played the spoilsport in most parts of the country," a society spokesman said.

In Winston-Salem, N.C., dozens stared from the sidewalk in front of SciWorks science museum, some shivering in the subzero wind chill.

They were rewarded with the most impressive lunar eclipse in years, according to SciWorks planetarium Director Duke Johnson: "It's a much brighter eclipse than we've had in recent years. It's a nice red color."

Scientists had predicted it would be relatively bright, saying the atmosphere had finally purged darkening chemicals spewed skyward in 1991 by the eruption of Mount Pinatubo in the Philippines.

In Springfield, Mass., more than 100 people, mostly in families, took shelter inside the Science Museum

to view lunar eclipses in its planetarium, craft paper eclipse wheels and learn about the astronomy of the lunar eclipse that was spoiled by cloud cover and snow.

With perfect timing, clouds draped over Los Angeles cleared just in time for a perfect view of the eclipse as it reached its darkest stage. In Griffith Park, near the famous Hollywood sign, hundreds of people, many clutching small telescopes or binoculars, cheered approval. The moon took on a reddishorange glow around its edge, while blackness engulfed its center.

Wherever skies were clear, the eclipse was visible across a huge expanse of the globe: North and South America, as well as parts of Africa and Europe. An eclipse happens when the Earth casts its shadow on the full moon, blocking the sunlight that otherwise reflects off the moon's surface.

For science, eclipses once helped prove the Earth is round, because its shadow on the moon is curved. Today, the subtle coloration of an eclipse can give tips about the chemistry of the atmosphere.

For others, the eclipse was largely a reminder of the wonder of the heavens that can transform the familiar fixture of the moon into a mystery.

"It's an astronomical phenomenon that has great influence on the Earth, that serves to remind us of

where we come from," said Julio Nieto, who watched with dozens of others from a plaza in Mexico City.

A Local Astronomy Group, along with JCU staff,

joined scientists from the Center of Space Physics of Boston University, and gathered at the Koah Community Hall to observe the eclipse enjoying one of the best views due to lack of city lights. This makes the night sky darker facilitating greater brightness and visibility to those observing. The scientists were also observing the Lunal Sodium Trail around Jupiters moon and conducted research on Mercury's surface which is similar to that of our Earth's Moon. WAIT-A-WHILE REPORT BY LESLEY CLARK

STATE MEMBER FOR BARRON RIVER

This year's budget delivered a record capital works program for Far North Queensland, demonstrating the State Governments commitment to our region.

Of the \$5.3 billion allocated for capital works statewide, 64% was directed to the regions with our share being \$439 million for health, housing, police, education and transport infrastructure. Barron River residents, including those in Kuranda, will benefit from the employment and community facilities that will be generated by such items as \$23 million for the next stage of the redevelopment of the Cairns Base Hospital.

Closer to home, more than \$700,000 will be spent on the upgrading of the Black Mountain Road intersection. This project has been on hold, waiting for the Mareeba Shire Council to replace the old wooden bridge on the road. I understand this work should be completed by the end of August. I know that residents living at the "Top of the Range Estate" will be relieved that the end is in sight and they can look forward to their peaceful way of life being restored when traffic no longer has to detour through their subdivision.

As expected, money has been provided for the completion of the Kuranda Range Road Study which is expected next month. However, it is unlikely that the final government decision regarding any upgrading will be made until next year when both the Kuranda and Southern Cairns access transport studies and the Myola Feasibility study are completed and the costs and benefits of the settlement pattern proposed in the FNQ 2010 Regional Plan can be thoroughly assessed and modified, if necessary. It would appear that the preferred tunnel option, funded by private enterprise and paid for by a toll is just not viable. I believe that the very high cost of the tunnel, at \$744 million makes it unaffordable, but the environmental impact of a 4-lane road is also of great concern to me.

I was impressed by the submission in response to the Kuranda Study IAS from "Envirocare," which put forward an alternative, more modest upgrade combined

with management of heavy vehicles and improvement in public transport.

Please let me know your thoughts on what the State Government should do about the Kuranda Range Road and get involved with the Myola Feasibility Study. It's important that Kuranda residents have their say about the future growth of this area.

The budget also provided another \$400,000 for the continuing development of visitor facilities and walking tracks in the Barron Gorge National Park. The construction of the link track and boardwalk at the lookout has been seriously delayed by rain this year, but should be completed by September. The work at the Speewah end of the Park is also progressing after Ron and Pam Elgar kindly donated some additional land to improve on plans for visitor facilities. The new road is complete and will open up this end of the Park making it much more accessible, although the Barron Gorge Park's walking tracks are already becoming much more used thanks to a great publication by Kuranda company Footloose which has maps and details of all the existing walking tracks.

I am working closely with Kuranda's local doctors and the recently formed Health Action Group to address a number of health issues confronting Kuranda.

As most people are aware, Dr Ashley Peake's general practice has been for sale for some time. I am attempting to find a solution that avoids the worst case scenario's of no general practitioners at all in Kuranda and also increase the service provided by Queensland Health and non-government health organisations. The Well Persons Health Check being coordinated by the Tropical Public Health Unit will provide valuable information about the current health status of people in the Kuranda region.

The Mareeba Shire Council has been actively addressing the issue of access for Russet Park residents when the Barron River is in flood. Their preferred option of an emergency road out to Black Mountain Road will require the approval of the Ministerial committee of the Wet Tropics Management Authority, to change the present Wet Tropics Plan that prohibits road building in that area. The future of the cleared rural land in that area is currently being considered by the Myola Feasibility Study. If significant residential development is recommended there, it will have an important bearing on the best long term access situation.

In the interim, I believe there should at least be a good standard walking track to Black Mountain Road and some means of securing residents vehicles there in emergencies. **Continued on page 5**

A Thought for August

This month open your bible to St Johns Gospel and read Chapter 3 verses 1 to 21

'Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?"'

Probably Nicodemus felt hard done by, to receive such a rebuke. Yes, he was a teacher of Israel, a Pharisee, a theological scholar of the first rank, entitled to wear elaborate, tasselled robes, which marked him out to everyone as someone very special. People revered him, and asked his opinion on innumerable theological matters, and believed what he said. He had been intrigued by the latest theologian - a Man who had appeared from Galilee; some said he was a carpenter; others said, No, the son of a carpenter. Either way, he appeared not to have been to university - yet he was preaching to some effect, and drawing large crowds. So Nicodemus came to check him out.

And Jesus launched into advanced doctrine of the Holy Spirit, and re-birth - and then was surprised when Nicodemus floundered. 'You - a teacher of Israel - you should know all this!' Nicodemus and his fellow Pharisees were conversant with the old scriptures; but their view of a priestly Messiah, a kingly Messiah, a glorious Messiah, did not square up to a carpenter - or even the son of a carpenter.

But, recognizing that in Jesus is someone who knows something better than all his book knowledge, Nicodemus is man enough to stay and hear more. At a time when those listening to him were largely simple country crowds, Jesus must have appreciated the opportunity of

getting his message across to a member of the prestigious Council the Sanhedrin. At last the true gospel was going right to the heart of the nation.

Yet Nicodemus was not a 'one-off': throughout Christian history, there have been those who have long been deeply entrenched in their beliefs - yet who, on coming to Jesus, find that there has been something missing in their religion. The turning point may be a new version or translation of the Bible, which brings to light a truth they had not previously recognized. Or it maybe a meeting with someone whose theological outlook is different; suddenly a new slant on an old truth comes into sharp focus ... and we hear God telling us, as Jesus told Nicodemus: 'Ah, but you should have known this all along!' And - like Nicodemus we should not become affronted or despondent: it is God's way of leading us on.

As a child learning to walk is not required to scale Everest, so every Christian is on a learning curve from the cradle to the grave. Like Nicodemus, we have a future of learning ahead of us. This side of death, no one is justified in believing he knows all there is to know. Robert Browning wrote "A man's reach should exceed his grasp, or what's a heaven for?" God being God, teaches us in his own way, in his own time.

When a particular truth does strike us, God still drives the point home with that extra challenge, keeping us on our spiritual toes to meet the next challenge. Instead of merely saying: 'Well done!' God has the habit of making his point very firmly, if ever so gently: 'Are you a master of Israel, and don't you know this already?'

HYDROPONIC GARDENING

My tomatoes are continuing to produce a bumper crop, the only trouble is supporting the plants I have to get up on a ladder to tie them up. They are an open pollinated variety called Tropic, which due to its disease resistance is well suited to growing up here. My lettuce look beautiful at the moment. They are all different colours and varieties and together with the herbs and other plants my vegetable garden looks like a flower garden. The plants really appreciate the cooler weather. The only problem I have is the seeds do not germinate as quickly. At the last Hydroponics Society meeting, which was held at Speewah, one of the members brought some information on a new hydroponics tablet which was advertised in the Practical Hydroponics magazine. If it works it would be a boon for the hobbyist. All you do is dissolve one tablet in five litres of water which gives a strength of 10-12 CF which is suitable for lettuce, and quite a few herbs. To increase the strength, all that is necessary is to add another tablet. The only problem is that they are a bit expensive. Twenty tablets cost \$12.50, which makes about 200 litres. Bought in bulk they of course would be much cheaper. I have obtained some to experiment with so I will let you know what happens. For Information Ph 4093 0394.

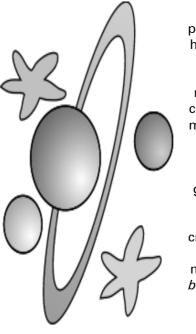

C.G. (Paddy) Taylor 1909 - 2000

Artist C.G. Taylor - Paddy to his friends - died peacefully on 20 July. Paddy was born in 1909 and completed his training at the East Sydney Technical College of Art in 1932. Portraits and landscapes were his favourite subjects. Fourteen portraits were hung in the Archibald Prize and fifteen landscapes in the Wynne competition. In 1964, he was runner up in the Sulman Prize and followed this with entries in the next four competitions. He was a consistent prizewinner in Australian Exhibitions from 1944 onwards. Paddy also travelled widely in Europe and the Torres Strait accompanied by his wife Nora. They were married in July 1931.

Paddy's work is in many private collections, the Esso and Caltex collections, and the Brisbane National Gallery. The Australian War Museum displays some of his drawings and paintings.

KISC ALCOHOL & DRUG BULLETIN

The following information comes from the well-known book The Relaxation Response by Herbert Benson MD. "We live in an age of anxiety. And because we are confronted with more and more situations that produce stress, increasing numbers of people at younger ages are suffering from high blood pressure, heart attacks and strokes. Furthermore, all of us must deal with our own emotional upset and tension caused by the everyday pressures of living. The Relaxation Response has helped people give up smoking, decreased their drinking and turned them off pills and narcotics. The Relaxation Response is a simple meditative technique, which can bring inner peace and calm. This technique can be easily learned and needs only to be practised a few minutes each day, either at home, in your office, or on your way to work. And no matter whether you are profoundly religious or a non-believer, the Relaxation Response is congenial with your principles and way of life.

HOW TO BRING FORTH THE RELAXATION RESPONSE:

The four basic components necessary are:

(1)A quiet environment: -this makes it easier to eliminate distracting thoughts.

(2) A mental device: -to shift the mind from logical, externally oriented thought, there should be a constant stimulus - a sound, a word, or phrase repeated silently or aloud, or fixed gazing at an object- Attention to the normal rhythm of breathing is also useful.

(3) A passive attitude: -you should not worry about how well you are performing the technique. Adopt a "let it Happen" attitude. Distracting thoughts will occur. Do not worry about them. The passive attitude is perhaps the most important element in eliciting the Relaxation Response. (4) A comfortable position: -this is important so that there is no undue muscular tension. If you are lying down there is a tendency to fall asleep. The various postures of kneeling, swaying, or sifting cross-legged are believed to have evolved to prevent failing asleep. You should be comfortable and relaxed.

It is important to remember there is not a single method that is unique in eliciting the Relaxation Response. Tests at a laboratory at Harvard have shown that a similar technique used with any sound or phrase or prayer or mantra brings forth the same physiologic changes: decreased oxygen consumption, decreased carbon-dioxide elimination, decreased rate of breathing.

The Technique: (1) Sit quietly in a comfortable position. (2) Close your eyes. (3) Deeply relax all your muscles, beginning at your feet and progressing up to your face. Keep them relaxed (imagine you are a floppy rag doll). (4) Breathe through your nose. Become aware of your breathing. As you breathe out, say the word "ONE" silently to yourself. For example, breathe IN...OUT "ONE"; IN..OUT "ONE"; etc. Breathe easily and naturally- (5) Continue for 10 to 20 minutes, You may open your eyes to check the time but do not use an alarm. When you finish, sit quietly for several minutes, at first with your eyes closed and later with your eyes opened. Do not stand up for a few minutes. (6) Do not worry about whether you are successful in achieving a deep level of relaxation. Maintain a passive attitude and permit relaxation to occur at its own pace. With practice the response should come with little effort. Practice the technique once or twice daily, but not within two hours after any meal since the digestive processes seem to interfere with the elicitation of the Relaxation Response.

There is no educational requirement or aptitude necessary to experience the Relaxation Response. Just as each of us experiences anger, contentment, and excitement, each has the capacity to experience the Relaxation Response. It is an innate response within us. There are many ways in which people bring forth the Relaxation Response, and your own individual considerations may be applied to the four components involved. You may wish to use a syllable or phrase that may be easily repeated and sounds natural to you, or a prayer from your religious tradition. For some, a quiet environment with little distraction is crucial, others prefer subways and trains! Some people choose to practice the technique at the same time or place each day. Some people have found they can use the technique to help them fall asleep, however it needs to be noted that the Relaxation Response is different from steep.

This month's book extract from the shelves of our lending library comes from the book Eight free Families, by Dr Janet Hall, published by Lothian:

Is it normal for families to fight?

"The Jones family are so good. They don't even wrinkle the sheets when they get into bed. They don't squabble or bicker or argue about anything."

True? NO WAY ... In fact, it's too good to be true. The truth is that fighting is normal. It can also be very useful. There are many good reasons to fight:

To fight is to be human: No family is fight-free because fighting is the nature of the human condition. Fighting comes from a natural expression of individuality.

To fight is to grow: A lot of fights are appropriate to a developmental stage. Toddlers in the Terrible two stage are asserting their individuality through fights just as adolescents do ten years later. Fighting is a natural phenomenon that accompanies separation from any strong bond. It is as if the fight is a symbol of the separation. It's a ritualistic letting go. To fight is to get what you want: Sometimes fights happen just because people are contrary. More often, individuals want something that they think others have which they don't. Or people want to keep something for themselves.

To fight is to clear the air and make a new start: If you are in some-body else's space often enough, eventually, you're bound to step on that person's toes. It's only natural that, over time, somebody's habits may become annoying. You may bottle up numerous upsets and frustrations - finally, just one more little thing bursts the dam and you explode. Once it's all out, you can start being loving again!

Fairytales about fighting

It's bad to fight: Untrue ... fighting can be healthy, fighting is a wonderful tension release, fighting is also a way of gaining some psychological space. And most importantly mental sparring can be a wonderful source of creative ideas. Children may be able to challenge parents to think laterally.

Families that fight need counselling: Untrue ... Regular fights may simply be a pecking order reshuffle- CAUTION: Do seek counselling if fights result in lasting pain, lack of growth or go on too long without resolution

All family fights can be settled by a win/win solution: Untrue ... Many people wear 'rose-coloured glasses' and wish to have a 100 percent fight-free family. They believe (because their mother used to say it): "we should never go to sleep without having had a kiss and made up". In reality, fights in families often last for a while. People do just sulk or harbour resentments. They want life to be FAIR ... Well bad luck! The truth is, life is not fair and not every person's needs may be able to be met at all times.

All fights are over forever, once they have been fixed: Untrue... Parents should not be surprised that children continue to break the rules. Fights can always be prevented: Untrue ... There is always going to something about which children will fight.

LAC & Jund-raising News: Since our last contribution to the paper the Kuranda Local Ambulance Committee (LAC) have been hard at work as usual. The street stall continues to be popular and we thank all people for their support. It takes a lot of effort to raise funds in a small community and it also takes a community that cares about what is going on. The QAS continues to be grateful for the support shown for our fund raising efforts and we hope to live up to your expectations and provide the community with the level of service that it deserves.

The LAC has a raffle going on at the moment so keep an eye out for that.

The end of the financial year is here which also means we are preparing for next years activities. I would Like to extend an invitation to all interested people to attend our Annual General meeting to be held on August 10 at 7.30 pm, at the station.

Subscriptions: As most people would know, if you need the services of the ambulance it does not come cheap! While we can't do anything about the service charges, we do offer everyone the opportunity to insure themselves against the huge cost of using the service, and we hope that you take advantage of it. An ambulance subscription gives you unlimited cover right across Australia and includes cover for the use of an air ambulance and the helicopter. Lots of people think their private health insurance will offer the same cover and in a lot of cases this is not the case. Some offer cover for the cost of the subscription and some cover you for the initial emergency call. However, depending on the circumstance you may find yourself being transported for a long time afterwards for rehabilitation, and a lot of private health funds attach a ceiling to this or don't cover it at all. I urge all to ensure that you know exactly what kind of cover you have against the cost of ambulance services, and if it is limited then subscribe at your local Post Office. Be secure in the knowledge that your pocket won't hurt more than your injuries.

Leon's Tips

One of the most common injuries to occur at home is a burn. Burns come in many forms and include:

- * Friction (eg rope burns) * moist (steam. hot water) * Dry (flame, stove top, etc.)
- * Radiation (heaters, sun) * Chemical burns (acids etc...

The first aid management for burns after removing the cause, is the same for all types of burns and we remember it by the three C's: * Cool (the burnt area with gently running cold tap water) * Cover (the area with a clean dressing) * Carry (take all patients with a burn larger than a fifty-cent piece to a Doctor or call an ambulance, especially if the injury is on the head, neck, hands, feet or genitals.

FOOD FOR CASSOWARIES

There are pockets of Cassowaries around Kuranda which are believed to be finding food in short supply. Some residents whose properties are part of the habitat of the local Cassowary population say that cyclone damage has resulted in fewer trees bearing less prolifically this season.

The best fruit will come from native trees you have in your garden. The next best is soft fruit like melons, grapes, tomatoes and mangoes. Apples are OK, but citrus are not. If you can't deliver it, a call to 4093 7570 will have us come and collect it.

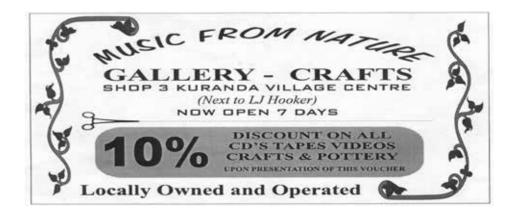

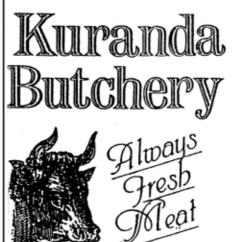

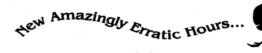

Autumn, hundreds of books like travel guides will be sold on the Internet in parts - chapters, maps and even paragraphs - that can be mixed and matched a la carte by readers. This will let you make up your own book with all the right mix of things you could wish for. Win95/98 Tips If you forget your Windows **password**, just press Escape at the password box, bring up the MS-DOS Prompt and enter dir *.PWL at the WINDOWS folder to find your .PWL files. Delete the one with your name in front of it. Restart your system and enter a new password when prompted. putting your desktop and file system on a menu. When you **click the button** this tip creates, you'll see everything on your computer mounted on a pop-up menu, and as you pause your mouse pointer over "container objects," like My Documents or My Computer, a cascading submenu appears -- revealing all the drives, files, folders, programs, and other icons at that level. What's more, you can keep delving into lower levels of your PC, so you can reach every single folder and file on your every drive of your computer, including CDs and ZIP drives, even network volumes. There's really only one catch: You have to have Internet Explorer 5.0 installed. The Desktop on a Menu tip takes only a few seconds to configure. Right-click any empty part of the Taskbar. Select Toolbars > New Toolbar from the context menu. Scroll upward, click on the Desktop icon, and click OK. The new toolbar will immediately spread out across your Taskbar, using all the available space. And it's kind of ugly at first, but we're not done -and this is the tricky part. Grab the handle just to the left of the Desktop label and slide it as far to the right as it will go, so all you see is the word "Desktop" followed by the chevron (>>), which indicates there are more items available but not currently visible. With that done, all you have to remember to do is click the double greater-than symbols of the chevron beside the word "Desktop" on your taskbar. That opens the powerful pop-up menu.
