

Governor's Banquet on Stony Creek Bridge Peter Ryle

In April 1890 the Governor of Queensland, Sir Henry Wylie Norman, visited the far north and was feted by the inhabitants of all the towns he visited. He was entertained at official festivities in Cairns and received deputations from the various councils in the district, but the highlight of his visit was a trip with a group of locals on the railway then under construction. The trip was organised and catered for by John Robb, the contractor for the second section of the line. The group consisted of the Governor's official party and some leading Cairns citizens. They were carried on a train consisting of two ordinary carriages and two open trucks fitted with seats "for the special convenience of those who were desirous of enjoying an uninterrupted view of the magnificent scenery they were about to pass through".

The Cairns Post of 28 April described the trip in the usual flowery language of the day: "Mr Robb's invitations had been issued on a lavish scale, and fully 150 gentlemen accompanied the Vice-Regal party. Between Cairns and Redlynch (the first section) the visitors were struck with the large area under cultivation, and the self-evident prolific nature of the soil. The appearance of Mr Draper's nursery at Lily Bank, and the rice mill caused much favourable comment, and now that the banks have been cleared, the 3000 acres of cultivation at Smithfield on the opposite side of the Barron River, is spread before the view like a carpet. We have often described, or attempted to describe, the beautiful and ever changing panorama of nature passed through by the second section, that the reiteration would only be tiresome. Suffice to say that long before the end of the journey had been reached the visitors' vocabularies of admiring adjectives were exhausted, and words had to be coined for the occasion. The word gorgeous led to considerable play. Gorgeous said all at the scenery, gorgeous said many at the different gorges, and gorge-us said a few when the luncheon came up for discussion. Professor Shelton, whose travels have been in many lands, was willing to back the view for sublime grandeur and magnificence for his bottom dollar.

"The day was as grand as the scenery, and by the time the party reached Stony Creek Falls, all, from His Excellency downwards, were in excellent spirits, and prepared to do justice to the many good things provided".

The banquet was provided by John Robb, and catered for by Mr George Hyde, of Hyde's Hotel in Cairns. Hyde was well known locally as "the Prince of Caterers". *The Cairns Post* described the banquet, which it said Robb described as "a luncheon", in glowing terms:

"Every luxury in and out of season was provided, and the table decorated with the same profusion of plate, and flowers, and glass, as if laid in the Cairns Hotel. The menu was exhaustive, the wine list ditto; everything magnificently cooked and splendidly served, and the liquor delicious and gold top.

"The spot chosen for the banquet was delightfully chosen. An open marquee had been erected on the finished portion of the Stony Creek bridge immediately in front of the beautiful falls. A more picturesque and beautiful spot could hardly have been selected, and the position of the company, 70 ft above rocks, commanding fine views in every direction, was an excellent one.

"Stony Creek Falls consists of three cascades, one falling 200 ft, the next 100 ft, and the third 50 ft, all nearly perpendicular, and their beauty excited the liveliest admiration. To reach Stony Creek the visitors had passed through thirteen cemented and fully completed tunnels, and the permanent way is finished to it. As soon as the iron bridge is completed rails can be laid over a great portion of the remainder of the second section, all other work being finished. The bridge, which has four 50 ft spans of iron lattice girder work set up on massive concrete piers, elicited great praise for its solidity and strength of construction, besides being rather a novelty in the engineering art, inasmuch as the curve on which the bridge is built is sharper than usual. This is necessitated by the formation of the ground, the line coming along straight and having to go round almost at a right angle. The Falls are in the very corner, and the bridge curves inward towards them".

The Cairns Post said that some members of the party rode horses as far as the Barron Falls, the trip taking about one hour. While they were away, a few people accompanied the Governor on a horseback ride a short way up the line to inspect the work. The party then returned to Cairns, delivering the Governor to Burns Philp wharf, where the ship Lucinda was berthed. The Governor occupied one of the open trucks on the trip up the range but travelled in a carriage for the return journey. The railway station at Redlynch was nicely decorated, and a triumphal arch with "welcome" on it erected across the line.

Garden Jottings by Alectura

April with cooler weather hopefully on the way and a coming end to the Wet, the keen gardener, whether seriously growing vegetables or just pottering, finds plenty to do in renewing the fertility of garden beds, cutting back rampant growth, dividing plants. fertilizing, adding more mulch and starting to plant cooler weather crops. The heavy seasonal rains leach much goodness out of the soil and feeding is essential to

Check pH of soils. Often poor lawn growth can be a result of acid soils. Some soils are naturally acid while others become acid through the repeated use of fertilisers that contain sulphate of ammonia, or even manures. A dressing of lime or dolomite during cooler weather will help to reduce acidity, and can sometimes work a miracle on struggling grass. Apply only at the recommended rate as too much lime may cause other weeds to flourish. Water in well to avoid scorching

PLANT of the Month: Pisonia alba, Pisonia brunoniana. (Lettuce tree or Hawaiian Papala kepau) Family: Nyctaginaceae. Coming originally from the Andaman Islands, this small evergreen tree (3 -4m) Pisonia alba can be quite a spectacular addition to the garden. With very long pointed leaves, the tree is grown for its attractive foliage which, in bright sunlight, often turns an eyecatching chartreuse yellow colour, certainly a striking contrast against green forest. The tree, with judicious trimming, is often grown as a large shrub in Thai and Indonesian gardens giving a bright lift to plantings. As a coastal tree and preferring sandy soils, good drainage is of the utmost importance when planted in the average Kuranda garden. Reputedly, young leaves are used as a leafy vegetable and when cooked are eaten for medicinal purposes supposedly good for rheumatism and arthritis. Q & A: Dear Dana, Thank you for your interesting correspondence and question regarding host plants sought for the following:

Cairns Birdwing Butterfly (Ornithoptera euphorion) is Australia's largest butterfly. The larvae or caterpillars of this species breed on several species of pipe vine, including Aristolochia tagala and Pararistolochia deltantha. The latter species is more commonly used at altitude with A. tagala used at sea level. The introduced Dutchman's Pipe (Aristolochia elegans) will kill the larvae of this species.

Ulysses Butterfly (Papilio ulysses) with its electric blue wings and staggered flight is a stunning visitor to the garden. Larvae feed on foliage of Melicope elleryana a tall fast-growing rain forest tree with smooth grey trunk and masses of pink flowers along branches.

Hercules Moth (Coscinocera Hercules) with its females having near the largest wingspan of any moth and with transparent windows on its wings. Adult females emerge from the chrysalis without mouth-parts and during her 4-5 day life she does not feed. After unfolding wings to dry, she emits pheromones to attract a male. After mating, flying away, she will lay her eggs on the underside of the leaves of food plants

Homalanthus nutans (Bleeding Heart) and Glochidion spp. (Cheese tree) and die shortly after.

Boost to Agribusiness Training at and land management and also horticulture. Kuranda

Member for Leichhardt, Jim Turnour, has announced Australian Government funding of \$350,000 for an Agribusiness Enhancement Program at Kuranda District State College.

"This program will enable a broader and more diverse range of accredited Vocational Education and Training (VET) to be delivered at the College. It will increase employment prospects for students and provide skills that reflect the work and career opportunities of Kuranda, the Tablelands and broader region where agriculture is a major contributor to the local economy." Mr Turnour said.

The funding will be used to upgrade an existing stable, work area and lunch room. Existing yards and fences will be refurbished and additional sheds built. Additional farm machinery and equipment will also be purchased.

Mr Turnour said the program will equip students with industry-specific skills and knowledge that can be applied in the workforce. Students will be able to undertake training in rural operations, land conservation

The college expects to deliver training to an additional 197 students over the next 3 years in Certificate I and II in Rural Operations, Certificate II in Conservation and Land Management and Production Horticulture.

Kuranda District State College is partnering with the Mareeba Agricultural College to deliver the program, who will undertake the teaching component, as well as Kuranda Envirocare, a community organisation working to conserve and repair biodiversity in the area, and educating the community to do likewise.

This funding announcement complements the roll out of Building the Education Revolution, part of the Rudd Government's \$42 billion Nation Building and Jobs Plan which will modernise school infrastructure and generate local jobs.

"Under the plan, secondary schools like Kuranda District State College can apply for small scale building and refurbishment funding of up to \$200,000 and can also be considered in the Science and Language Centres for the 21st Century program, which will see up to 500 high schools funded to construct new laboratories and learning centres," Mr Turnour said.

Computer Column -

Brought to you by Carlos Computers

Often the most overlooked aspect of owning a computer is how to best protect your investment from the environment around you. Even though computers are becoming cheaper and more affordable, you don't exactly want to have to replace it anytime soon and expect a few good years of use out of it.

The first recommendation I often tell people is to look into getting a UPS or Uninterruptable Power Supply for your system. A UPS is basically a power board with a small battery in it. These devices condition the power to your system so that it always receives a clean supply of electricity. UPS's also catch brownouts, spikes and blackouts.

Have you ever been working on something on your computer and have the power suddenly go off? Well a UPS gives you enough time to safely save what you're working on and then shut down the system. A home UPS will set you back around \$165 for something that will give you around 15 minutes of standby power.

Now with a lot of us becoming more conscious of the energy we use you may think that shutting down your system every time you finish using it may be the best way to extend the life of your system and to conserve some power. My recommendation is actually to leave your PC running; the reasoning behind this is simple.

For starters living in the tropics means we have a lot of moisture in the air and this can adversely affect some parts in the modern computer. One of the most common problems I see is PC's failing to boot and often it is due to moisture settling on the RAM or video card connectors, simply unclipping, wiping gently and then re-seating these parts often fixes the issue most of the time. If you leave your PC running you're unlikely to encounter this issue as the computer will stay warm and evaporate any moisture build up.

Secondly, modern computers are designed to be power efficient. Computer power supplies are becoming increasingly better at managing the flow of current to your devices especially when the computer is idle. Modern operating systems are designed to power down devices that are not in use when idle such as the hard drives, fans and even networking adaptors. So you may think your computer is an electricity sucking monstrosity when in fact it isn't. If you head out or are not using the system simply switch off the monitor.

Thirdly an all too common situation I see PC's in is stowed away under the desk in an enclosed cupboard with no airflow. This is bad! Allowing air to circulate around the PC tower means that the fans don't have to work twice as hard to disperse the heat given off by the components. Putting your PC somewhere where it can get adequate airflow will not only save you power but also extend the life of the parts. Happy computing!

The Village, more than a hamlet yet less than a city the village was disposed at the top of a line of great hills that the locals called a mountain range. With a flourish of lightning and thunder that would do justice to a Wagnerian opus, there began a splendid season of rain.

Everyone, of course, had a different opinion concerning the value of the annual downfall. In India, sleep is called the "wet nurse of the world" because it is nurturing, nourishing, and regenerating. There are two types of sleep: deep dreamless sleep that restores the physical body and active dreaming sleep, called REM (Rapid Eye Movement) sleep, that helps clear the mind of conflicting emotions.

Sleep is a great healer and strengthens the body. Along with other positive lifestyle practices, adequate sleep helps to enhance a fresh, clean, vital and beautiful mind and body. It has many of the same elements as skilled relaxation and some of the side benefits of mediation which is why it is said that when you cannot get enough sleep, these practices will help one become recharged and refreshed.

The hours of darkness are the healthiest times to sleep. Sleeping during the day is not advised as it is said to produce toxins in both mind and body. There are some exceptions though, such as for the very young and the elderly, and for persons that are weak from illness, overwork, or emotional distress. A 10 to 20 minute cat nap can actually be helpful to recharge a busy Vata type person if it is taken in the early afternoon. Longer naps are also sometimes advised in very hot weather between noon and three or four o'clock in the afternoon - some cultures call it "siesta" time.

Like so many things, Ayurvedic considers sleep needs to be individual. Vata people tend to have light, restless sleep that is variable in quality for short periods of time (4-6 hours nightly). As they love excitement and can easily overextend themselves, Vatas may need to take time for naps, relaxation, and mediation to supplement sleep. High Vata energy people must learn to nurture themselves with quality rest. An early night after a warm oil massage and a fragrant warm bath is an excellent way to relax and recharge and keep good looking despite a busy and rather chaotic lifestyle.

Next month we will be covering the sleep for Pitta people. You will recognize your type by the sleep patterns.

AYURVEDIC RECEIPE

ABOUT SOUPS:

Soups make an excellent, nourishing and usually easy meal. They can be made ahead of time and warmed up. Clear soups are easy to digest. They serve as a support to convalescence at any age and older age. They offer a good way to tonify the gut and nervous system which have been traumatized with many fast meals on the run. Milk-based soups are considered a little more challenging to digest, and so are recommended for times when the digestive fire is good.

VEGETABLE BARLEY SOUP

³/₄ cup barley, uncooked

1 tablespoon sunflower or olive oil

2 teaspoons whole cumin seeds

½ medium onion, red or yellow, chopped

1 clove garlic, chopped

3 stalks celery, chopped

7 cups water

1 cup peas, fresh or frozen

3 new potatoes, 1cm cubes

1 large carrot, halved lengthwise then sliced

1/4 bunch fresh parsley, chopped

1 cup string beans, in 1cm slices

3 large Shitake mushrooms, dried

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin

1/4 teaspoon fresh black peppercorns

1 ½ teaspoon sea salt

Warm oil in large saucepan. Add whole cumin, gently browning. Add, garlic, celery and sauté 3 to 4 minutes, till tender. Add water, bring to boil. Wash and chop vegetables. When water is boiling, put in barley and vegetables (if you are using frozen peas do not add them until the soup is nearly done). Crumble the mushrooms into small bits into the soup for flavour. Cover and reduce heat to low, simmer for 1 hour or until barley and vegetables are tender. Will make a thick soup, you can add more water if you desire a thinner broth. When barley is tender, add frozen peas, ground cumin and salt. Simmer 5 more minutes.



The baby bats have grown and flown (as in flapping their wings and learning to fly). They will eventually, we hope, fly off into the rainforest with other members of the Kuranda colony. This will happen after The Wet and body weight is good.

We're talking about the orphaned flying-foxes which were rescued from tickparalysed mothers early this breeding season. A female flying-fox is sexually mature (ready to have babies) at two

years of age and has only one baby per year. Mating occurs in February/March/April and six months later the baby (known as a "pup") is born. Female flying-foxes (megabats) and insectivorous bats (microbats) give birth while hanging upside down. The mother catches the baby in her wings and in the human equivalent of her armpits there is a single teat on each side. Bats are mammals and feed their young on milk. Flying-fox pups are usually born with all their fur and the eyes are open. They remain attached to their mothers for around five months and must hang onto mum with their large feet and strong claws, even when she is flying and foraging for her own food. When the baby is too heavy for the mother to fly with, it is left in a creche with other youngsters.

When the orphans arrive at BatReach, they are often dehydrated and must be given electrolytes as well as three-hourly feeds through a syringe nozzle. Sometimes they will spend time in the humidicrib before graduating to the "bat nursery" - Stage One which is a basket with swaddling and a handle so that the babies can learn to roost (hang upside down), Stage Two

is a clothes airing rack with containers of milk attached so that the youngsters learn to feed themselves. Once the babies can fly they move into the outside enclosure where they feed on tropical fruits, vegetables and native blossom.



On Sunday 24th August, Kuranda District State College held its Fete and Official Opening.


The College was officially opened by Mr Steve Wettenhall MP. The opening ceremony concluded with the ringing of the former Primary School Bell which had been restored for the event.







Young Australians Launch Into a Green Corps Project in Kuranda

Ngoonbi Farm in Kuranda will receive a boost thanks to an Australian Government Green Corps project. Member for Leichhardt Jim Turnour welcomed the announcement of the Ngoonbi Farm Bush Gardens Project that will give 10 young people the chance to take part in enhancing the capacity of Ngoonbi Farm environment.

"The overall goal will be to develop and ensure the ongoing viability of the Ngoonbi Farm producing food, medicines and other traditionally used plants for the benefit of the local indigenous population," Mr. Turnour said. "The young people participating in this project obtain accredited and on-the-project training in courses such as Horticulture, Conservation and Land Management, and are paid a weekly Training Allowance."

During the course of each 26-week project, participants work towards a minimum of a Certificate I qualification in horticulture or conservation and land management.

Job Futures is the service provider of the Ngoonbi Farm project. Job Futures is Australia's only national network of community based and not-for-profit organisations which provide employment, training and related services. They have been running Green Corp projects since 2002.

Ngoonbi Farm project participants will take part in activities including developing and constructing an indigenous garden near the entrance of the farm, cleaning up creek debris, weed control, establishing an area for a bush tucker garden, fencing, assistance in the creation of educational booklets on the operation of the Ngoonbi farm and participating in native planting with bush care groups.

Green Corps is a federally funded program which provides young people aged 17-20 with the opportunity to participate in projects that conserve, preserve and restore Australia's environment and cultural heritage. Green Corps also aims to help community groups with restoration and rehabilitation of the environment and heritage assets.

Nationally, Green Corps participants have propagated and planted more than 15 million trees, put up more than 8500 kilometres of fencing, collected more than 11000 kilograms of seeds, and built or maintained more than 6000 kilometres of walking tracks and boardwalks. My room is cool and a fresh breath of air blows in as I cast my mind back to remember the summer that did not seem to end. The air, to me had felt still and heavy. Every time I inhaled, it was hard work and the hot air stuck in my throat. I could not drift asleep, try as I might. I tossed and turned, but every position made it hard for me to breathe.

Beyond my window a promising, tantalizing sunrise was beginning. It was still playing on the brink of dream and I gazed at it through curtains. I yearned and wished for that promising warm day with its fresh sweet air. My mum, told me not to open the window. The window will let in the bugs, she said holding my hand tight. I still gazed at the window, I wanted to see the sunrise and breathe that air there, waiting for me. My mum knew if she opened that window I would climb out of it.

Hesitantly and slowly, yet surely she opened the window. The air rushed in, making my head spin. The light flooded in, blinding my eyes. The clouds were coated in gold and the sky painted with every colour. Like a photograph.

I shook my head to clear it and turned back to my room to thank my mum for opening the window. She was leaving. She smiled in reply and left the door ajar.

A breeze blew through my room, cooling it, moving a paper and stirring the dust. I had to blink the spots from my vision and squint to see in the dim room. My eyes adjusted however and I could see clearer. Photos on the walls showed me a happy life, and books filled the shelves, and things were scattered in a familiar way on the desk and floor. My mum's voice chattered in the kitchen downstairs to her husband and my sister wondered in to watch my TV as she was bored.

The clock was ticking.

I sit on the windowsill now and a cool breeze brushes my cheek softly like silk, bringing with it the bite of winter's return. Brightly coloured leaves venture in and swirl about while night falls with a horizon of orange patterned with black silhouettes of leafless trees. Night fall is slow as there is no rush. It will rule for five months more.

The clock is ticking.

I look out my open window where my sunrise awaits still, but it is mature now and always changing, showing clouds and sky, un-deciding. It might rain, it might shine. I watch the faces of my family and friends, heart aching, mind struggling. I memorize every detail, every expression, every gesture. I can see the fireworks reflected in their eyes. I smile a watery smile.

Happy New Year. I'm seventeen.

The alarm wakes me with a start. I sit in my bed, calming my pounding heart. I'm still home. The calendar still shows December. The 24th is circled with red and green. I don't want to look past that date to see the days (or hours) left...

I wrap my fingers around the straps of my carry-on bag. Passport, ticket, phone. Leave the keys on the table.

The window is wide open and cold air is filling the room. My bed is unmade and comfortable. It looks warm but the sheets feel cold at the touch. My bookshelf is half empty, books lay on their side. The room is bare of clutter, and me. It isn't mine.

The room door is still ajar, just as my mother left it. The window is swinging on its hinges, just as I left it.

I press my nose against the cold glass of the plane window and watch the lakes and forests disappear below clouds.



Beware of Household Stimulus Package email scam

Minister for Human Services, Senator Joe Ludwig, today warned the Australian community to be on the lookout for a hoax email seeking personal information.

The email suggests people need to complete an attached application form to receive payments under the Federal Government's Household Stimulus Package.

The form requests a person's name, date of birth, address and bank account details.

"This email is a fake. Anything that suggests you need to submit an application form to get the Household Stimulus Package one-off bonus payments should set off alarm bells," Senator Ludwig said.

"Centrelink already has the information it needs to process these payments to eligible families, students and farmers, so people do not need to do anything."

"It's also important to note Centrelink never asks people to lodge claim forms via email."

Centrelink and the Australian Federal Police are investigating the hoax email and making every effort to ensure the community is adequately protected.


"While we are only aware of a very small number of cases at this stage, you can never do too much where people's personal information is concerned," Senator Ludwig said.

"If people receive this hoax email, do not open any attachments, click on any links or reply. Delete the email immediately from your mailbox, including your deleted or trash folder.

"I would urge anyone who has received this email and already disclosed their personal information to call Centrelink urgently so it can act quickly to safeguard people's privacy and stop fraudulent activity."

People can call Centrelink on 1800 050 004 if they have received the hoax email.

exposed branch on the tree.

I found a male Green Ringtail Possum (*Pseudochirops acheri*) with severe head wounds on Myola Road last night which died in my arms. These possums are uncommon. They are mainly nocturnal; they eat a variety of rainforest leaves and ripe figs. They sleep during the day and they curl upon an

These possums have a body length of 150mm with a tail length of 330mm and they weigh 1100g. Their fur is green-grey with two lighter stripes down the back. There is a white reflective patch under the eye and ear.

It has been said that there are no Green Possums in the Myola area, however this reminds us that they do travel at night and attempt to cross roads. The most important thing to remember is that these possums are uncommon and extremely vulnerable with night traffic on Myola Road where many people tend to speed sometimes at 100kmh.

Now that we know this we must ensure that we become more aware of all wildlife on Myola Road, Kuranda and I urge everyone in our community to take care on this road.

I have repeatedly asked for a Wildlife Sign to be erected to help people become aware that these nocturnal animals do cross the road and move about at night, but it has been refused. It is now time to make another request with the hope that this may be achieved. Everyone can help achieve this by supporting the idea and perhaps a petition. **Contact Joanie 4093 9039**



KURANDA VILLAGE TAX TIP

TREASURER ANNOUNCES A BUSINESS TAX BONUS

On the 3rd of February 2009 the Treasurer announced a tax bonus for small businesses. Small businesses will be able to claim a bonus deduction of 30 per cent for eligible assets costing \$1,000 or more. This is great news for small businesses. The bonus deduction is on top of the usual capital allowance (depreciation) claim.

The asset must be acquired between 13th December 2008 and 30th June 2009 and be installed and ready to use by 30th June 2010. Eligible assets acquired between 1st July 2009 and 31st December 2009 will qualify for a 10 per cent bonus deduction. Motor vehicles used for business will qualify however second hand assets will not qualify.

Example

Miranda has a small business undertaking secretarial services. She purchases and installs a new computer costing \$2,000 on 20th June 2009. On top of the usual depreciation deduction Miranda will be able to claim a further \$600 (\$2,000 at 30%) bonus deduction in her 2009 tax return.

A minimum expenditure threshold of \$10,000 will apply to businesses who do not qualify as a small business (less than \$2 million turnover). At the time of writing the Treasury had released draft legislation for public comment.





Old Primary School:

Local Advisory Committee meeting monthly to look at long term use of the site. Council is committed to providing more community facilities in the Kuranda area. Council has resolved to spend \$200,000 of federal government Infrastructure funds on community facilities in Kuranda.

Rates:

There may be some residents who may not have registered for Pensioner Discount. Please contact Kuranda Library or Council office to check if you are eligible as an Aged Pensioner. All rates notice were mailed at the end of February.

Bushfire and Flood Appeal:

Over \$55,000 raised so far from the TRC Appeal. Thanks to all who donated and supported the Benefit Concert last Sunday.

Community Housing:

Council has applied for Federal Infrastructure funds for additional Pensioner Housing. Additional 4 Pensioner Units for Kuranda have been listed. Council is also working on submission to access federal funds for social housing to address issues of housing affordability in Kuranda and other parts of the TRC region.

Tourism Infrastructure:

The KIAC (Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee) will meet again next week. The KIAC is working towards a Strategic Plan for Infrastructure development in the Village area and is commencing work on projects approved by the former Committee.

Roadworks:

Work to commence within next few months on widening sections of Koah Rd and extending seal on Speewah road. These works are already in the 2008-09 budget.

Budget:

Council is working on the 09-10 Budget which is expected to be finalized in early June. It will be a tight budget.

Safety and Signage:

Traffic Advisory Committee (Police, Council, Transport Dept, Main Roads Dept) meets every month to consider traffic, safety, signage matters. Residents are welcome to raise matters for discussion.

Youth Matters:

Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre is developing Youth Plan for Kuranda area. Council now has a Youth Development Officer who will be assisting.

Community Plan:

Every Council is now required to develop a 10 year Community Plan. TRC staff will be soon commence consultation with all local communities and interested individuals and groups. The plan will guide Council activities and planning.

The Kuranda Green Corps Team would like to thank members of the community and also EnviroCare volunteers that helped with the Bush Tucker Orchard planting on Sunday the 22nd and Saturday the 29th of February with over 1,000 trees planted.

The team recently went to South Johnston (near Innisfail) to attend a weed seminar hosted by Department of Primary Industries and obtained their Pink Card qualification (permit to work near railway lines) at the QRail depot at Mareeba.

All theoretical training is now finished and participants are currently exploring employment opportunities.

The Team also worked on a Green Corridor project at Yungaburra planting and managing native vegetation and recently started a project of erecting signs for community and tourist along the path to Kuranda Resort for plant identification. Skills learnt have included identifying weeds and native plants, construction methods, recording and collecting information for government departments and creating media releases.

The team have enjoyed working with and meeting people in the community as well as taking part in a plant interpretative walk with local council employee Sid Clayton up Emu Creek.

The team also have seen a few people in the community using a spray pack or brush cutting without protective gear so this is just a reminder to please lookout for your own health and safety and others around you.

The team takes this opportunity to say thank you to the community for all their help and support through the last six months. It has been a great learning experience and we recommend the course to any youth interested in this line of work for the skills and knowledge the course gives you for future employment.

Artists have always been at the forefront in expressing ideas about the nature of culture and society. Currently there is a very strong focus on the environment and how we might think and act to deal with the problems which have been created. "This is Cassowary Country" is a curated exhibition of new work by 7 local professional Australian artists which continues this tradition.

The exhibition complements the KCons study to identify and document the remaining cassowaries, their habitat and its condition in the Cairns/Kuranda area. This research makes a significant contribution to the overarching CSIRO Cassowary Recovery Plan for the Wet Tropics and is in addition to KCons' volunteer programme (commenced 13 years ago) of growing local native flora in its 10,000-plant nursery for public and private plantings.

The artists are: Mollie Bosworth – potter, Susan Doherty – found object sculpture, Barbara Dover – video installation, Terry Eager – glass artist, Margaret Genever – prints and installation, Gerhard Hillman - digital photo montage, Arone Meeks - paintings. Laurel McKenzie is the curator.






