Dear Kuranda Paper ...

Kuranda Future Planning Concerns

Friends of the Earth Kuranda are concerned that the Tablelands Regional Council draft document, the community planning review, was made available for comment for only a few weeks during the holiday season and did not give the Kuranda community sufficient time to consider the ramifications of the plan on their security and lifestyle.

FOE Kuranda believe that some of the key proposals that are articulated in the document amount to the WRONG plan for this area. In our view, there's much that is truly wonderful about this area, the biodiversivity, the unique aboriginal culture, its attraction to tourism, the infrastructure, services and skills should be conserved, treasured and nurtured.

There are also significant problems in Kuranda and its environs that need to be addressed, over time. Wildlife remains threatened by exotic species – both plant and animal – and human activities such as pesticide/herbicide use, road kills and vegetation clearance. The Kuranda area is chronically cardependent and the Barron River, source of drinking water supply for the Kuranda township, serves as a sewer for agricultural run-off from the Tablelands.

A frequent comment is that the "village is dead", meaning it lacks people and vibrancy, especially out of daytime trading hours and the region has no effective system for minimisation and/or recycling of solid waste. Additionally the development of Welcome Pocket senior residential centre is a major mistake for the area.

The FOE Kuranda made a submission to the Council with a comprehensive list of suggested solutions to the challenges ahead but seek the support of the wider community. To read the entire FOEK submission and log in to have your say visit the Friends of the Earth website at **foekuranda.org**.

I would like to thank Marc Sleeman, Tourism Kuranda, for his short article in last month's Kuranda Paper about the C-47 DL aircraft nestled in the trees at the Kuranda Heritage Markets and for bringing it to the attention of those in the community who were perhaps not aware that it is there. I am pleased to be able to add some more information relating to Geronimo's arrival in Kuranda

My parents, Vic and Rita Tonkin (Tonkin Steel) donated "Geronimo" to the Kuranda Heritage Markets and this community.

After the film was completed Tonkin Steel was approached by John Lammond Productions to purchase the plane as the production company did not want to have to return it to Canberra. Recognising the historic value of the wartime plane, when it was purchased by Tonkin Steel scrap yard, the last thing my parents wanted to see was this historic relic destroyed. They still have in their possession the nose wheel of this plane.

Several years ago Vic and Rita were contacted by a retired American ex-serviceman visiting Kuranda on holidays, who much to his amazement recognised the plane at the Heritage Markets, as being his during the war years. You can only ponder at his surprise and joy at finding this aircraft located here in the rainforests of Kuranda.

Being appreciative of the value to communities and future generations, my parents have donated many items to various locations/museums. To mention a couple: the majestic old steam engine now located at the Herberton Historic Museum, and ships propellers to several Maritime Museums. My parents donated altar brassware for our local St Saviour's church in Kuranda when the church had its brassware stolen.

It has always been the policy of my family and the company to donate, when and where possible, items of significance back to the community.



Candidates for Barron River - 2012 Election

Steve Wettenhall – Australian Labor Party

49 year-old Wettenhall is a lawyer and founding member of the Cairns Community Legal Service before being elected to represent Barron River at the 2006 election. He first joined the ALP when he was a teenager and in his spare time before entering parliament used to play violin with a local folk group. His wife is also a lawyer and lectures at the Cairns campus of James Cook University. Both his grandfather and great grandfather served in the Victorian Parliament in the later 19th and early 20th centuries. Wettenhall was appointed a Parliamentary Secretary after the 2009 election.

Michael Trout - Liberal National Party

Born in Chinchilla in 1963, Trout was raised on a Central Queensland cattle property and attended The Southport School as a boarder and in his final year was House Captain, School Prefect and also Captain of the school rowing team. He has lived in the Barron River electorate with his family since 1996. He has more than two decades in small business and tourism and has held numerous positions on tourism boards in North Queensland. His family owns Mungalli Falls on the Atherton Tablelands where he operates a successful outdoor education centre. His family also operates the Aeroglen Sunshine Daycare centre and also operates Blazing Saddles Adventures. This last venture entered the news in 2011 following an outbreak of the deadly Hendra virus amongst horses on the property.

Brendan Fitzgerald – Katter's Australian Party

Fitzgerald was born in Brisbane and spent many years touring Queensland as a professional musician before settling in Port Douglas in the early 90s. There he joined the fledgling local tourism industry as a tour guide taking visitors into the Daintree Rainforest, Kuranda and the Atherton Tablelands and built a particular business catering for people with disabilities. These days he runs a small business producing websites and multimedia presentations.

Mike Squire – North Queensland Party

Squire started his career with the Victorian Police before leaving as a Senior Detective Analyst with the Bureau of Criminal Intelligence. He then worked in the early years of mobile phones in Australia (when they cost thousands) before working overseas as an information technology consultant. He is a qualified IT Forensic Expert, runs an Internet design company in Port Douglas and is Director of Marketing for the local radio station.

Elaine Harding – The Greens

Dr Harding has more than two decades in communications practice, organisational planning and performance, and a decade as a sustainability educator and consultant. She runs her own consultancy Thrivability, having established herself in the region a decade ago after previously lecturing at James Cook University. She began her career as an editor for several publishing companies, as well as a writer of specialist and generalist articles on environmental topics.

Neighbourhood Centre News March 2012

KNC Volunteer Training Friday 2nd March, 1.00-4.00pm

KNC is offering an afternoon of volunteer training on Friday 2nd March. If you are interested in attending please contact the neighbourhood centre to reserve your place.

Volunteering is a great way to get involved in our community, build skills and connect with other people. KNC was begun by a group of dedicated volunteers in 1992 and volunteers remain vital to our vision and day-to-day operation. Volunteering options at KNC include being on: reception shifts, gardening, furniture exchange program, website maintenance, administration etc. Volunteer training covers several modules:

- Role of the volunteer
- Rights and responsibilities of the volunteer and the organisation
- · Workplace health & safety
- Communication skills
- Dealing with difficult clients/customers.

The Volunteer application process includes applying for and being approved for a Suitability For Working with Children Card (Blue Card). We assist in this process and there is no cost. Please contact the centre if you are interested in becoming a volunteer at KNC.

Community Mental Health: Community Mental Health is renting a room at KNC to provide a base for Catherine Flannagan. She will also continue to provide an outreach/mobile service and therefore is not here all the time. Referrals to the service can be made via the Kuranda Medical Centre and by phoning the mental health service reception on 4226 4871. If you are an existing client, please make appointments using the above phone number and ask to be transferred to Catherine.

Narcotics Anonymous: Weekly meetings continuing at KNC on Thursdays at 6.30pm.

Step Forward: If you are having problems with drinking or cigarettes or other habits that are affecting your health, relationships or finances in a bad way, you might want to think about coming along to the Step Forward program at KNC. This program is run in a small group format in 2 hour sessions held weekly over four weeks. The program assists people to understand and take control of their own behaviour by exploring the concepts underpinning "the change cycle". Many people find that they can benefit from this course by attending more than once, to refresh their motivation for change. Face to face counselling is also available through referral to an Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs Service (ATODS) counselor if required. The next program commences on Wednesday 7th March 2012. Referral is necessary, so please contact us to find out more. The program is strictly confidential and we do not even need to know what behaviour you are seeking to change.

Uniting Care General Counselling (formerly Lifeline):Counselling appointments can be made for Wednesday afternoons at the centre through KNC or directly with Uniting Care on 4050 4955. All appointments and referrals are strictly confidential.

Women's group: The Kuranda Interagency Network is continuing to consolidate support to restart the local women's group meetings. Beading, sewing and fishing are some of the group activities that will continue to provide a focus for our women to get together, have a yarn, share a cuppa and get creative when enough keen and interested women have regained their energy after the long school holidays.

If you are interested, we can help put you in touch with other interested women to get the ball rolling for 2012. Also, keep an eye on the noticeboards around the town for further updates.

Gardening in Kuranda



ARCH and the Wet is still flaffing around with us – hard times when still watering through February. Pretty much too hot and humid to do anything too strenuous in the garden except keep the lawn down but the evening, when cool to sit out and enjoy the perfumes of night scented flowers, is bliss. Think about how you can enjoy the myriad evening scented flowers of shrubs and trees by judicious selection and siting and potted subjects.

Keep vigilant with water features and do not allow mosquitos to breed. For the environmentalist the native blue-eye or, if not fussed, the common guppie will keep control, making sure that the latter cannot return to local waterways in any run-off

Feral pigs are on the move again and can trash a garden overnight. A call to 4093 8834 will have Jax and her trusty hunters deal with the problem.

Plant of the Month: Aglaonemas are part of the very large and diverse Araceae (Aroid) family. This versatile and diverse family provide so many different plants for indoor and understorey garden planting. Personally I prefer Aglaonemas with their clumping habit, ease of propagation and maintenance to Dieffenbachia which tend to grow leggy and present bare stem and marred foliage in cooler weather. With approximately 50 or so different species of Aglaonemas throughout SE Asia, many not grown commercially, extensive hybridising has led to a plethora of leaf shape, patterning and colouring – enough to make the most jaded gardener take notice.

Requiring semi-shade or bright light – direct sunlight, particularly hot afternoon sun may cause some bleaching – good friable, well drained soil with regular watering and feeding during the warmer months sees rapid growth. Watering should be reduced during the cooler months but do not allow to dry out completely. Making extremely hardy potted subjects, a top quality potting mix and good drainage is all that is required. Note that all parts of these plants are toxic and care should be taken that pets do not ingest.

Of particular beauty and becoming more readily available are the seemingly endless patterns of highly coloured hybrid Aglaonemas coming out of Thailand and Indonesia. These are highly desirable and would make a fascinating collection since they are proving reliably hardy and require minimum care.

A vey good starting point to start with is OZ eBay seller neecie.0402 with very well established plants, great prices and very careful packing. Pics are from seller's site of some plants on offer.

Q @A. Dear Bill and Carol, Congratulations on the new house and empty yard – and yes, while certainly daunting, there is now the opportunity to create your own slice of Paradise. Scaling down from acreage to the suburban block takes a certain discipline and planning. Go slow and resist the urge to get the gardens to be filled. Step back and think carefully on how much effort and time you want to spend on maintenance/upkeep, such as lawn requiring mowing versus hard surfaces, paving and massed plantings. What balance or interest in flower/vegetable gardens – fairly high maintenance as against permanent plantings as shrubs/foliage. Have you a particular plant family you want to specialise in that requires certain conditions



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and how you might establish these?


Note how sun/shade varies as the year progresses, the quality of soils across the yard and where water lies or drains rapidly, any potential wind tunnels and cold dank spots so often the bane of cheek by jowl housing. Is there screening needed – a noisy road or nosy neighbours, are you planning on an outdoor living space – BBQ, a shade house, parking for a boat or visitor? Are there any particular plants, often carrying memories and dreams, a special vine or shrub on your "must have" list requiring the right spot – a lot of thinking so take it slowly.

Before spending big, take walks around the neighbourhood seeing what does well, a particular planting or feature that strikes your eye. Be bold and knock on the door – most gardeners are a sharing, caring lot and a good way to strike up new green fingered friends.

Set priorities: What needs doing now — often times settling in plants brought from the old place or something particular that bugs and nags at you on a daily basis — neighbours looking in your kitchen windows or a noisy street and work out a guesstimate budget on what you may wish to spend over the next 12 months as this will also determine how you proceed.

Lastly, look around for the best plant prices particularly on the basic bones, repeat planting, anchoring the garden – save dollars and make sense looking at Mad About Plants, 25 Davis Road, Edmonton, 4045 5063 and local Country Markets while more specialised and harder to source plants might be found at the Cairns Tropical Garden Show in May or plant sales at the Flecker Gardens held throughout the year.

iar, but none the less brilliant paintings of Kuranda's Amber Moon, and the bent and twisted wire creations of our own Peter Jaensch. Lunar was there too, making music, but I also met a new Kuranda artist sharing the gallery, Sandy. Sandy is an emerging visual artist based in Cairns and Kuranda. He works with digital art, pho-

tography, mixed media, sculpture and painting. "I moved to Cairns in 1984 with my family and



grew up in Cairns. have a deep love for the region and most especially for Kuranda. Although always creative, my first serious foray



art and photography in 2008. I developed a love for photo-manipulation and photography that I still use in my work today. In 2010, I started to learn to paint and in 2011 I enrolled into Visual Arts at the Cairns Campus of TAFE where I am still enrolled and plan to have a diploma by 2014. The decision to study was instrumental in developing my own style as it was there that

I started to explore assemblage sculpture. I am now working on digital/

analogue hybrids by assembling the two media into 3D artworks.





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Bat Reach news The Three Musketeers



Three Northern Brown Bandicoots, dubbed the Three Musketeers, recently came into care at BatReach after their mother was killed by a cat. The orphans, just 60g, were also injured in the attack, but are recovering well.

Bandicoots are a small marsupial species, able to have up to four young at a time. They eat a variety of insects, earthworms, berries and seeds which they will spend their nights foraging for, resulting in them becoming the prey of domestic and feral cats and dogs.

Many of the marsupials brought into BatReach come from cat and dog attacks. This is one of the main threats to Bandicoots, Possums and Gliders.

The Three Musketeers will be released in a couple of months, as Bandicoots are fast growers, weaning at 60 days old.

P J Harvey: "Let England Shake" Shake indeed! This is a savage album. Powerfully committed to exposing the horrors and destruction of war – from the perspective of the dying soldiers; the ravaged landscapes, and the orphaned children. And sheets it back to the warlords, "words that maketh murder". Fierce beyond measure and not for the faint hearted.

And yet, it is light, ethereal, musically gorgeous and lyrically profound. PJ takes her voice into the soaring high range of *Kate Bush* (circa "The Dreaming") and into the otherworldly weirdness of Patty Smith (think "Horses"). So, if you can imagine a seamless blending of Kate, Patty and PJ coming at you with wardrums and bugles you'll get the idea.

This is ethereal; anthemic and just glorious in its musical integrity. You can feel it stirring the heart. The children who die; the homelands ravaged and a country on its knees – seen through the eyes and heart of a deeply sensitive woman. PJ rocks u as **England shakes!**



Full steam ahead for Mareeba Airport redevelopment

A staged plan and timeline for construction for the \$13.3 million redevelopment of the Mareeba Airport has been formally adopted by Tablelands Regional Council.

"We have finalised the design,

finalised the delivery mechanism that will be delivered over time in three stages," Tablelands Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

"The first step is to deliver a useful and useable airstrip for up to 45,000 kg and all the necessary facilities for the development of an aviation industrial estate."

Council has opted to strengthen the existing runway, main taxiway and apron to accept aircraft up to 45,000kg in weight which will allow for the landing of heavy aircraft such as the Dash 8-100, the C130 Hercules and some jet aircraft under certain conditions.

Cr Gilmore said redevelopment of the airport had the capacity to bring benefits to the whole region - both in the construction phase and once the works were completed.

"We want to this project to be job incubator for whole region – we would hope that local companies will tender for works associated with the construction and be cost competitive in that process, and once the redevelopment has been completed, there will be potential for jobs to be created in aviation-related activities."

A Report tabled at Council meeting outlined potential business opportunities that would flow from the redevelopment such as:

- Heavy maintenance of up to Code 3C aircraft, predominately Dash 8-100 aircraft
- Spray painting for up to BAe146-300 aircraft

• Helicopter maintenance and flying training

- International flying training school facility
- General Aviation maintenance, workshops and storage hangers
- Aviation support facilities and services e.g. avionics and aircraft sales
- Freight consolidation and distribution
- · Additional refuelling facilities; and,
 - Other aviation related activities.
 - Stage 1 of the redevelopment involves:
 - Undertaking stormwater drainage works
 - Strengthening the sub-grade of the existing runway and resheet with sprayed bitumen seal
 - · Construction of additional taxiways on the western, southern and northern sides of the runway
 - Construction of the helicopter apron
 - Construction of the Aviation Industrial Precinct, utilities, taxiways, aprons, fuel facilities, and access road at the western end of the airport
- Construction of a engine run-up bay at the western end of the airport including a hydrant style water outlet for agricultural aerial spraying and fire bombing operations; and,
- · Construction of a portion of the flight training school apron sufficient to accommodate up to 20 aircraft.

Tenders for the drainage works will be advertised this weekend, with works expected to commence by the end of April and be completed by the end of June.

Tenders for the works associated with the runway, taxiways, aprons, and industrial park will be advertised in April, with works expected to be completed by December 2012.

Council supports funding application for Malanda **Falls Visitor Centre**

Council has supported a funding application to Regional Development Australia that, if successful, would double the funds available to re-build the Malanda Falls

The former Malanda Falls Visitor Centre was destroyed by fire in 2010. Council will now seek to leverage its insurance payout against the \$1.3m funding application to the RDA.

If successful, the centre will be constructed to be an exceptional attraction in its own right, with world-class interpretive facilities, examples of alternative power supply, natural rainforest trails and swimming holes and an amphitheatre for indigenous and other spectacles.

It will also act as a "launch-pad" for many other attractions in the region, allowing visitors to choose particular themes of interest and obtain itineraries that take them through the region to the associated attractions.

The centre would feature technologically-based interpretive displays that

feature the creation of the Atherton Tablelands through geological time, through to the unique flora and fauna of the Wet Tropics Mabi rainforest.

Bringing the region's violent geological history back to life, the educational displays would provide a dramatic insight into the volcanic origins of the landscapes seen on the Atherton Tablelands today.

If the funding application to RDA is successful, the new centre could be completed by early next year.

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Approvals begin to flow for disaster funds works

Tablelands Regional Council has received approval from the Queensland Reconstruction Authority for \$9.64 million of works to repair roads damaged in the 2011 wet season.

The approvals are part of \$58 million of grant applications which were submitted to the authority after Cyclone Yasi. Council is still awaiting approval on the remainder of the applications which include works to 83 roads throughout the region. Council is still to make another two submissions.

Works that have been approved include Springs Road, Chewko Road, Bilwon Road, Euluma Creek Road, Channel Road, Chisari Road, Springmount Road and the Tolga Kairi Road.

Council has already completed restoration works at Barang Street, Kuranda and has completed the new Fig Tree Close Bridge at Malanda.

Tenders for Chewko and Springs Road have been awarded, while tenders for the remainder of the works approved by the authority are expected to be advertised in the next month.



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

Dengue and severe dengue: key facts

- Dengue is a mosquito-borne viral infection.
- The infection causes flu-like illness, and occasionally develops into a potentially lethal complication called severe dengue.
- The global incidence of dengue has grown dramatically in recent decades.
- About half of the world's population is now at risk.
- Dengue is found in tropical and sub-tropical climates worldwide, mostly in urban and semi-urban areas.
- Severe dengue is a leading cause of serious illness and death among children in some Asian and Latin American
- There is no specific treatment for dengue/severe dengue, but early detection and access to proper medical care lowers fatality rates below 1%.
- Dengue prevention and control solely depends on effective vector control measures.

The Aedes aegypti mosquito is the primary vector of dengue. The virus is transmitted to humans through the bites of infected female mosquitoes. After virus incubation for 4-10 days, an infected mosquito is capable of transmitting

Infected humans are the main carriers and multipliers of the virus, serving as a source of the virus for uninfected mosquitoes. Patients who are already infected with the dengue virus can transmit the infection (for 4-5 days; maximum 12) via Aedes mosquitoes after their first symptoms appear.

The Aedes aegypti mosquito lives in urban habitats and breeds mostly in man-made containers. Unlike other mosquitoes Ae. aegypti is a daytime feeder; its peak biting periods are early in the morning and in the evening before dusk. Female Ae. aegypti bites multiple people during each feeding period.

Dengue fever is a severe, flu-like illness that affects infants, young children and adults, but seldom causes death. Dengue should be suspected when a high fever (40°C/104°F) is accompanied by two of the following symptoms: severe headache, pain behind the eyes, muscle and joint pains, nausea, vomiting, swollen glands or rash. Symptoms usually last for 2-7 days, after an incubation period of 4-10 days after the bite from an infected mosquito.

THERE is an ongoing and important debate as to whether, as part of the evolution of all living things, human beings are just another animal species, albeit a slightly more advanced animal than others, or whether they are really in a different category or "kingdom" to that of animals even though they share many genetic similarities.

That is, whether human beings are unique in themselves in some very important respects, with special qualities and attributes beyond those found in animals, and which so differentiate them from the animals that they should be separately categorised and regarded. This is not a debate about whether human beings have evolved over a long period of time – the scientific evidence is fairly clear that we have so evolved over millions of years. Rather it is a debate over the correct categorisation of human beings in their modern form and species.

Much turns on this debate, extending to the very nature of civilisation and its future. Those that advocate the former view that we are just animals will stress the animalistic qualities and attributes of humans – the struggle for survival, the potential for anger, self protection, greed and even violence and savagery – said to be inherent/inherited traits. Those that advocate the latter view that humans are unique in certain important respects will downplay (but not dismiss) these negative qualities and attributes and will stress the potential for humans, properly educated and guided, to exhibit higher qualities and attributes – appreciation of art and beauty, spirituality, love and compassion, tolerance and respect, justice and selflessness, foresight and vision, investigation, discovery and innovation, organis ation, cooperation and helpfulness.

Dr Read, a distinguished Professor at the University of California and a mathematician and anthropologist, brings a fresh new perspective to this debate. Taking the cultural approach, he examines the existence of rudimentary culture that exists in the higher animals, a factor that can be seen from one perspective as finding its logical evolution and culmination in human culture. On the other hand he examines the question whether the human transition to a much more highly developed culture is so radical a jump as to make a comparative consideration of

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rudimentary animal culture of little relevance.

Dr Read states that he begins the book from the premise that human societies are in fundamental ways unlike any other animal society. They are unique, as evidenced by the increasing complexity of their social organisation. Yet what makes for that uniqueness cannot be measured in any simple way. It is much more complex than the capacity to use tools or to develop a fully-fledged language ability. The differences, he says, do not lie in any one behaviour, but more broadly in the cognitive and conceptual capacities that humans bring to bear on their specific forms of social behaviour, not based on genetically determined behaviours. Human societies have evolved and become much more elaborate since the Upper Paleolithic period without additional genetic changes, in ways that our ancient ancestors would find unimaginable.

He concludes:

"The key innovation ... marking the transition from non-human primate to human social systems and making us humans and not just another primate species is the introduction of cultural ideas and relation systems upon which human systems of social organisation and structure are founded"

The approach taken in this book no doubt reflects Dr Read's expertise in the field of cultural evolution and kinship. Others would argue that the aspects of cultural uniqueness and organisational capacity are only some of the aspects that constitute the uniqueness to be found in human beings. But Dr Read does help to dispel simplistic and commonly held notions as to the difference between human beings and the higher animals. In doing so, he also helps to dispel the simplistic view that human beings are just another animal, a view which in the reviewer's opinion holds little credibility, and worse is positively dangerous.

The book makes an important contribution to this debate. And in the process it makes excellent but challenging reading.

Many years ago, when socks were darned and bandaids were the remedy for almost fatal dog attacks, and salt water could cure a sickly tummy, there were old men down the road where we lived who had an answer for everything. These days we call that class of being a politician, but back in the day they were men content to garnish praise from mending little Jimmy's bicycle or tuning a motor car with a hammer handle stuck to

Still we are not fundamentalists looking to turn the clock back to day one - we just want things to work beyond their warrantee expiration date, and I for one don't think that that is too much to expect. While I know that many of you are so disgustingly wealthy that you throw away your paper plates after one BBQ, well not me boyo! If it doesn't work, regardless of whatever 'it' is, off comes the cover and in I dive.

Inside My Studio Interview and Photograph by Toni Rogers

Rob Macaulay was quietly stalking a female Birdwing butterfly, camera in hand, as I pulled into his driveway. I sat in the car for a few minutes watching his beautiful subject fluttering from one flowering tree to the next flowering shrub. Rob's wife Lisa has built a haven for her wildlife photographer husband and her garden design, dedicated curatorial skills and ongoing garden maintenance is such a gift to Rob's passion for photography.

Where is your current studio?

In our garden in Kuranda Springs. The native trees and shrubs, and the pond, attract so many species of butterflies, frogs and birds. To satisfy my appetite for wildlife photography I very rarely have to venture out of this garden.

Do you work alone or with others?

Alone, but it is really me and my many photographic subjects. I do not need formal membership to this peaceful society.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Wildlife. Butterflies, frogs, insects, birds – I have so far identified and recorded 79 different species of

butterflies, 11 frogs (not including cane toads) and 75 different birds. This garden teams with wildlife.

Describe your work pattern – hours/days/weeks.

There is no particular work pattern, but when the opportunity occurs, my camera is close by. Perhaps I should clarify 'night time for frogs and daytime for birds and butterflies'.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

Over the years I have also painted, both watercolours and oils. [At this point in our conversation Rob draws my attention to the framed watercolour paintings on the wall; the most delicately painted botanical specimens and birds.] However, photography has now taken over. I guess it is the instant results that are so attractive, although still time consuming. I would now have to be in a different 'head space' to start painting again.

Why is photography your chosen medium?

Because it gives me so much pleasure. I have no formal art training and I could easily be called a 'point and shoot' photographer, but I am dedicated to it. I also share a living space with these many beautiful creatures and I am a naturalist at heart. I have always been very interested in butterflies and have a number of framed collections.

List three things you listen to while working.

I hear the peace and feel the quiet tranquillity of my surroundings. I listen for the bird sounds – we had a catbird calling from the garden early this morning and I

dashed out with my camera to photograph it. In the evenings I am attracted to the croaking of the many frogs around the lilypond that Lisa has created.

Your favourite tool?

My two cameras. I have a Canon SLR Digital 500D and a 1000D. They are always with me. There are many destructive factors associated with living in the tropics when it comes to the storage of negatives and photographs. We can only hope that with the introduction of digital images and the ever changing storage facilities, photography, as we know it today, has been made so much more attractive and permanent.

How do you identify your work?

On the reverse side of my work is my label "Papillio Photography" by Rob Macaulay. This is also printed on the back of my cards, however, I sign the front of my works on canyas.

How do you sell your work?

Mainly locally in galleries, shops, the Post Office and the Newsagency. I am also an involved member of the Kuranda Arts Co-operative and I have my largest display in the Co-op's gallery.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

I do sell some cards from home but I do not teach.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

No I don't. I am now retired and I am thoroughly enjoying the opportunity to express my interest in photography. I also have time now to help my wife Lisa to maintain the garden.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? I wouldn't change anything in my studio garden, but I do have a wish list for a couple of rather sophisticated macro telephoto lenses. They are a long way off yet. I currently only have a standard 75-30oml lens and an 18-55mm lens.

If you were not working with photography what would you be doing?

Photography would still come into it, but I can see myself on a round the world trip on a large yacht sailing up the Amazon, or somewhere similar, chasing butterfly studies

Rob Macaulay was a major award winner in the recent 2012 Tablelands Australia Day 'Faces and Places' Photographic competition. Almost scooping the pool, Rob took three awards including two First Prizes and a Second prize. In a catalogue for the exhibition "Pommes d'Or" in 1990, Bohnenberger's work was described as being "the metamorphosis of a profane, everyday object into a sacred artwork". Gallery owner denied that the French fries had any value. However, the court ruled that the French fries had "economic value".

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Miniature Armies on the March

MAGINE an army hundreds of thousands strong, with new recruits being produced every minute. They are fast, tough, equipped with body armour and all have chemical weapons at their disposal. They work with absolute discipline and are biologically programmed to follow orders, all striving for the one goal —

survival of the group. This is the life of black ants, and everyone who has tried to eliminate a large colony from their property will know how resilient they are. They are not taking over however, they own this country already; they are everywhere and there are literally billions of them.

Although most small black ants look much the same to us, there are many species of them throughout Australia, and several in our local region alone. They belong to the genus Iridomymex, and are one of the most significant groups of ants in the country. Some species have incredibly large colonies spanning enormous areas, their trails running hundreds of metres with a multitude of nesting sites all linked together. Other species have colonies which are quite compact in comparison, and the whole colony may be located under the bark of the single tree in which they forage.

Black ants generally dominate the habitats they live in and play vital roles in our ecology. Many

interact with other invertebrates and have mutually beneficial relationships with them. There are a number of plant eating insects that are protected by black ants, which get to drink sugary solutions secreted by the insects as a 'reward' for their protective duties. Black ants are also important to native plants as they play a role in the dispersal of seeds and in pollination.

Unlike some ant species where there is only one queen, many species of black ants have super-sized colonies with multiple queens – even hundreds. Each queen will continuously lay eggs; they are simply 'breeding machines'. Worker ants care for the eggs, larvae and pupae and go about the daily duties of finding food, expanding the nests and protecting the colony. Black ants are extremely aggressive towards invaders; this includes larger animals, other species of ants and even

other colonies of their own species. Aggressive species will patrol and protect their territories with their lives, and even the largest of intruders will be attacked. They will swarm onto the intruder, biting and spraying formic acid into the wounds. This acid gives them that familiar 'ant smell' that most people have experienced, when

they have either upset black ants or squashed them.

We would have to describe black ants as part of nature's cleaning system, and they are extremely effective. All sorts of organic wastes are picked up and swept away by these industrious little workers. Throughout the country it would be literally tonnes each day. Dead animals are those most usually collected. but all sorts of organic material is taken into their nests. Recently I trimmed my fingernails in the backyard and watched in astonishment as black ants collected every single nail and struggled with them until they were cooperatively dragged into the nest. The aim of this mass collection of course is for food, but not for the adult ants; it is to feed the larvae. Adult black ants feed mainly upon sugars, which are found naturally within plants, but is one of the reasons they make their way into our kitchens!

Finding their way to and from the nest is achieved by an ingenious method of communication these

ants use – scent trails. Chemicals are left on the ground, and passed between ants, and when one ant finds something of significance, very soon the chemical message is spread to many others. If the chemical trail is lost (or wiped away on the kitchen bench), scout ants are sent out to find the food again and re-establish the trail.

As frustrating as these little acid-filled insects may be to us humans, it would be us that would struggle to survive without them. Imagine the build up of carcasses without these ants to clean them up! On the other hand, if we were to disappear they would barely miss a beat.



When East Meets West - the Gohs

This month's profile is of Tony and Sylvia **Goh** of Kuranda, a truly likeable couple. Tony is of predominantly Chinese descent, perhaps with some Indonesian blood also, and was originally from Singapore, where he still has family. Sylvia was originally from England, from an old, distinguished, Anglican family with a proud military service history, and she still has some family there.

Tony grew up and was first educated in Singapore in the 1940s and 50s where his family observed a mixture of Chinese and Malay customs and were Catholics. At that time Singapore was a British possession (apart from the period of Japanese occupation from 1942 to 1945) and Singapore was a very different place to what it is today. It already had a sizable Chinese population but it was not

the modern metropolis that it is today. Tony later on trained to be a teacher in Sabah as a bonded trainee teacher, and upon graduation began teaching there. Sabah at that time was still a British possession and most of the teachers were ex pats. He was sports-mad so he taught physical education.

During this time Singapore gained full self-government in 1959, and it, plus Sabah and Sarawak, became part of Malaysia in 1963, so Tony became a Malaysian citizen. In 1964, after graduating in England, Sylvia came out to Sabah with the VSO scheme and began teaching at the same school as Tony. They became friends. Then, after one year, Sylvia went back to England, attending Hull University to get her formal teaching qualifications. She returned to Sabah in 1966. She and Tony decided to marry there, a decision that flew in the face of prevailing attitudes. But they went ahead and married anyway.

Marriage between peoples of different races was still not common at that time, particularly in colonial situations where one of the partners was a European, and even more particularly where the female partner was European. Tony recalls the case of one European colonial officer who married a local girl and kept it quiet, but when the employer found out he was dismissed from his post. Generally there was a lot of discrimination against Asians in the colonies. It is hard now to envisage the prejudiced attitudes of the times, things having changed so much in a comparatively short time since, but it took a lot of courage at that time to marry the person you loved across those perceived boundaries. Tony and Sylvia had plenty of it, despite



some opposition within their families.

They went on to have two children in Sabah, a girl and a boy. Tony went to England in 1967/8 to concentrate on his phys education studies so as to acquire recognised qualifications. He represented Sabah at the Borneo Games and again at the Malaysian National Games as the assistant manager of the teams. He coached in athletics. But he also put in for immigration approval to move with his family to Australia, which was granted. They did not move straight away. When Singapore left Malaysia, Tony suddenly found himself without a permanent position in Sabah, so in 1971 he successfully put in for a threeyear position at the prestigious Singapore International School, regaining his Singapore nationality. Sylvia taught there also. Then they

all left after two years at that School and moved to Australia.

Settling in Rockhampton, Tony and Sylvia both took up teaching again at local schools. Then Tony decided to take on a change of work so he acquired a small farm near Rockhampton. Tony has green fingers and loves gardening, so he began growing vegetables for sale. He was moderately successful but it was hard work. He and Sylvia made friends in the area and Tony still likes going down to visit them from time to time.

Tony retired in November 2003, sold the farm and they both moved to their lovely property in Kuranda where they now live. They have four grandchildren. The family of one of their grandsons lives in Brisbane, and the family of the other three grandsons live in England. Despite both of them slowing down, with some vision problems, Tony still likes to potter in his garden and is often seen giving potted plants away to friends. Sylvia also works hard to keep the property trim and tidy. The garden looks beautiful, with extensive rolling lawned areas, flowers, fruit trees and vegetables. Sylvia keeps busy with her activities in the CWA and they are both active members of the Catholic Church.

Always welcoming and friendly, they are a great addition to the cultural blend that is the Kuranda community.





A Thought for March

HIS month our reading is taken from St Mark's Gospel Chapter I verses 40-45. Did the early Christians remember this episode of Jesus healing the leper because of something special about Jesus' response to the leper? The words that leap off the page for me are those words Mark uses to describe Jesus responding to the request. Mark says that Jesus stretched out his hand "in warm indignation." I find my mind wants to explore that, to try to picture that scene, to feel the texture of that beautiful moment. Why warm indignation?

The way you and I are approached for anything can make a tremendous difference to our response, as we all know. Somebody approaches us demandingly, arrogantly, selfishly, and we close up. Listen to this leper approaching Jesus. "If only you will," he says, "you can cleanse me." There is something enormously attractive

Here is a human being who has retained the capacity for trust in the face of all that he has been through with this hideous affliction. Friends have gone, family has been cut off, and others avoid him at all costs. Yet here he is quietly and graciously - albeit, I am sure, desperately and anxiously making his plea to one in whom he can see love and grace, and from whom he knows healing to be possible. His approach evokes an immediate response of affirmation from Jesus. 'Indeed I will," he says, "Be clean again."

What does the episode say to us? All of us are in some sense "lepers." If to be a leper means to be wounded or cut off from others in some way, then all of us are touched by various forms of leprosy. The very heart of the Christian faith is the conviction that Jesus can be approached in our day as surely and effectively as during his earthly life. Jesus is not merely a past source of grace. Jesus is a present help.

How then might we make our approach? If this longago leper has anything to teach us, it is that we should approach Jesus in a spirit of trust. "You can cleanse me," said that magnificent suffering man. I suspect Jesus' warm indignation arose from seeing such a fine human being suffering such affliction.

Again, we are only beginning to realise today the infinitely complex relationships between our physical life and our attitudes. Perhaps Jesus, with his healing power, realised immediately that there were immense resources in this man to effect his healing. They had only to be released and they would affect his body. Such realities are happening every day in the continuing work of God's healing among us. So the long-ago encounter of this suffering man and Jesus becomes for us the Good News for humanity.



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
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Principals Message

Obviously we are extremely proud of the OP scores our college achieved in 2010/11 with the college topping the region for percentage of students on the OP1 -10 ranges. Whilst our numbers are small in the senior year our school continues to deliver quality outcomes for students.

Our college has moved a great distance in the last couple of years with our data reflecting a completely different picture for the upper year levels. Below is a data story showing the percentages of students achieving a QCE (Senior Certificate) or Vocational qualification. The progress is brilliant and sets the benchmark for this year and into the future.



A big welcome goes to John and Kristina who have moved up from Machan's Beach to our lovely township and have joined us at Kuranda SES.


Don't forget, it is still "Cyclone Season" so don't be scared – BE PREPARED.



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


The next day we woke up and saw a stranger sitting around the fire. Brom was lying on the ground bleeding.

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
A Tribute to John Beasley **Living Life to the Full – Gone too Soon**

Council Budget 2012-13: Council is currently developing the 2012-13 Budget. I have already submitted a very long list of projects which hopefully will be funded. If there is anything that you would like Council to consider adding to the list for Budget consideration, please let me know. In particular, please let me know of any suggestions for major road works (understandably not all will "get a Guernsey" this coming year).

Local Government Elections 28 April 2012: Council elections will be held on Saturday 28th April. Please note that the date has changed due to State Government elections on 24th March. These elections will be conducted by the Electoral Commission and in the Tablelands Regional Council area, voting will be by Postal Vote only. You do not need to apply for a Postal Vote as Postal Voting Papers will be mailed directly to you at your enrolled address and you should receive the papers in mid April. If you do not receive your voting papers by that time, please check with the Post Office and or you can also phone the Electoral Commission ECQ Hotline 1 300 **881 665** to request that your voting papers be reissued to you. You can check your electoral enrolment on the ECQ website www.ecq.qld.gov.au).

New Kuranda Visitors Centre: Funding has been approved by Council for the construction of a new Visitor Information Centre and funds will come from the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund. Tenders for the Architect design will be advertised in early March. The new (larger) Centre will be a "purpose-built" building located separately to the current toilet block building. The design brief also requires that the building be designed to complement both the community use and the tourism use of Centenary Park. The new building will not take away any park green space. A feature will be new technologies for displays and interpretative information about the area. I am very hopeful that we will see construction of the new building before the end of this year.

Recycling Strategy Plan for TRC: A strategy Plan for managing Recycling across the region is currently being developed for consideration by Council mid 2012. If you have particular comments regards this, please contact TRC Environmental Planning Officer, Kirsty Lamperd at kirstyl@trc.qld.gov.au or by phoning Council.

Strategic Plan for Coondoo Street Fig **Trees:** A draft Plan for the future Management of the fig trees will be presented to Council on March 7th. This Plan will provide a professional approach to securing the longterm health and life of the 14 trees, along with a budget to carry out the works and provide a regular maintenance

Disaster Management Community Plan: Each local community across the Tablelands has the opportunity to develop a Disaster Management Plan specific to their local community. These plans are simple plans which focus on the specific needs of a particular local area and are designed to add to the overall District/ Regional Disaster Management Plan. With assistance from Council Disaster Management staff, four local Plans will be developed in the Kuranda area (Kuranda Village, Top of the Range, Koah, Speewah Myola). If anyone would like to be involved, please contact Council's Community Disaster Planning Officer, Cheryl Matthews at cherylm@ trc.qld.gov.au Ph: 4043 4162 or let me know.

RosCommon Speewah: \$32,000 has been allocated by Council for the construction of a small toilet block at RosCommon. The construction should be completed before the end of June this year.

Kuranda Community Precinct: Things are starting to happen at the Community Precinct! **Expressions of Interest** have now been submitted by community groups and individuals for use of the facilities at the Kuranda Community Precinct. A number of spaces are available, including internal carpeted areas and outside undercover areas (suitable for "wet activities") for either: long-term use up to 2 years, regular short-term use or one-off uses.

Council will be considering applications which will not disadvantage the current facilities available at the CWA Hall and the Kuranda Recreation Centre.

Tenders for the removal of the older buildings (buildings A and B) will also be considered at the next Council Meeting. Due to the high costs involved with repairs and long-term maintenance, as well as Workplace Health and Safety requirements to upgrade, Council resolved to work towards the future construction of a purpose built facility at the Community Precinct. Planning work has already commenced for the establishment of the Library at the Community Precinct. It is planned that the entire lower floor of the Block C building will be used to create a spacious community Library and resources hub, with space for small meeting rooms and additional library services for our community.

Thank you to the Kuranda Community for engaging in the extensive public consultation last year and for being so patient. This is a complex and costly project and it will take some time until the site is able to be used to the full potential. However, things are now progressing and we can all looking forward to the exciting new developments.

Pedestrian, Traffic and Parking Study: The consultants (Bitzios) have now completed their Final Report and there are 67 Recommendations for improvements to parking, traffic management and pedestrian access around the Kuranda Village. Many of the recommendations are for minor improvements (eg. improved signage). Some can be implemented fairly quickly with limited costs involved. Others will be more long term over a number of years. The Report will be considered by Council on March 7th and will be publicly available after that date. Most importantly, the study is focussed on the needs of both local residents and tourism operations. The study and any resulting works will be subject to Council decision and will be funded from developer contributions (not from general rates).

New Aged Housing Units: Tenders for the construction of the next Aged Housing units (2 units in Harriman St and 2 units in Thoree St) will be called in early March and building should commence mid year with completion before the end of 2012. Allocation of places in these units is made by Council in conjunction with Qld Housing.

Pet Registrations: In an effort to encourage responsible pet ownership, Council is encouraging all pet owners to have their animals registered. (\$11 for desexed animals and \$66 for entire animals). Council currently expends a lot of resources on responding to complaints about pet management.

New Vehicle for Kuranda Myola Rural Fire Brigade



Member for Barron River Wettenhall has welcomed the delivery of a new operational fire vehicle worth over \$100,000 to volunteers of the Kuranda Myola Rural Fire Brigade.

Mr Wettenhall said the new vehicle would enhance operational capacity in the Kuranda Myola area as well as surrounding districts.

"The delivery of this new vehicle reaffirms the Bligh Government's commitment to the hardworking men and women who make up our rural fire service," Mr Wettenhall said.

"This new vehicle is a purpose-built four

wheel drive which comes fully fitted out to help fight bushfires and includes features like a diesel powered pump and heat reflective curtains. With an operational life of around 20 years, it will be of great assistance in keeping the community safe for many years."

While the Kuranda Myola brigade already has an existing older vehicle, this will be relocated to the Lockhardt River brigade that currently has no vehicle of their

Mr Wettenhall said the body of the new vehicle was removed from an appliance that was written off during the January flooding.

"Although the cab chassis was written off, the body was still serviceable as a fire appliance. I'm sure it will be of great benefit to local rural fire service volunteers during what has the potentially busy fire season.'

Mr Wettenhall said the Bligh Government was committed to working with emergency services agencies to deliver safe and secure communities.

"The budget for the Rural Operations arm of the Queensland Fire and Rescue Service has increased by 77% over the past five years; from \$20.2 million in 2006-07 to \$35.7 million in 2011-12," he said.

"That's a significant commitment to supporting the 34,000 volunteers who make up the Rural Fire Service.

The Government is determined to continue working with emergency services providers like the RFS to ensure Queenslanders have access to assistance in times of need."

To her shock, the minute he was done, he marched back to his room without a word, and in no time, he was back hitting the books as hard as before.


This went on for some time, day after day, while the mother tried to understand what made all the difference.


