

Dear Kuranda Paper,

I wish to reply to the letter in your last edition about domestic pet owners. I have lived in Kuranda for 21 months and have often seen this issue re the destruction of Wild Life by domestics cats and dogs arise in the paper with some pretty vehement expressions of anger, and lack of tolerance or understanding, which does not win friends with pet owners. Most "Consciously Aware People" would agree that straying uncontrolled domestic pets are a danger to wild life and themselves. Yes I have seen stray cats, and been disturbed by hunting dogs.

The problem lies with HUMAN BEINGS not the animals that are dumped or left to roam throughout a very beautiful and special rain forest habitat. Please, Please get your emotions in the right place - PEOPLE NEED EDUCATING about the basic rules for keeping pets as outlined in Government Regulations. Government Legislation requires cats to be locked up between sunset and sunrise, a fact that many people seemingly do not know or adhere to. Also responsible pet ownership involves de-sexing, de-worming, vaccinating, collar and name tag, bells, registration, and most of all training and keeping the animal in secure enclosure. Animals will follow their natural instincts, and if left, dumped or not cared for will kill for food. A Human Being if dumped or not fed will soon resort to killing wildlife for food or stealing if no other choices. We all eat every day, so do animals, have you been to an abattoir lately, or gone fishing, or perhaps killed a chicken for the dinner table? It is still life eating life.

While I think the protection of Wildlife is very important, I also think that there is a need to get things in perspective. Responsible Consciously Aware People try in every way to live harmoniously with nature, and I believe that this can be done with regard to having a domestic pet.

I have a very dear Burmese Cat which lives inside, is vaccinated, wormed, microchipped, bathed, taken for a walk on a long lead and not allowed outside without. His litter is disposed of responsibly to prevent any interference with the frogs or other creatures.

I love the wildlife around the house, use an "Elliot Trap" to remove mice, don't poison weeds, or animals, keep frog ponds, fence my plants to protect them from pademelons etc. To me all life is precious not just a selected segment.

SO PLEASE REALISE THAT NOT ALL PET OWNERS ARE IRRESPONSIBLE, and there are positive constructive ways to deal with this issue which should be promoted.

A THOUGHT FOR OCTOBER

This month we read a passage from the Gospel according to St Matthew Chapter 21 verse 33-43

Jesus during his earthly ministry offered the people of his time a vision. Today in our time Jesus offers the same vision to us. The vision is of a kingdom, what he always calls the kingdom of heaven. It is another way of living life, a kind of alternate universe. Jesus didn't just talk of that vision, he was the vision. He didn't just speak of the demands of that kingdom, he did them!

So why didn't it all work out in a wonderfully successful way? Why didn't everybody think that Jesus and his vision were just what the world needed? It's difficult to frame a simple answer to this but we can try. In his Gospel John has two phrases which express the tragedy without necessarily explaining it. He says---The world knew Him not ... his own people received Him not. ---Why? John later reports a statement of Jesus which seems to answer that question. Jesus says, "This is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light" [John 3.19]. There it is in the starkest and simplest of words - the tragic heart of the human condition. The Bible's word for this condition, itself simple and stark, is Sin.

This is what this parable of Jesus is about. In it he tells his own destiny. Jesus had no illusions about the consequences of his words and actions. He knew the dark depths of the human nature which surrounded him. The ironic contradiction in human behaviour and experience is to reject that which is utterly in our interest to accept. Our judgement is deeply flawed, and our choices are apt to be terribly wrong. The kingdom that Jesus offers us is not taken from us by some grudging God; we ourselves choose something else. But even as we paint that grim portrait of our human nature another face shines through it, that of Our Lord. The face is a promise that in him our humanity is also capable of a shining glory. Through Jesus we can if we choose set foot from time to time in the very kingdom we refuse most of the time. We sometimes have to make tough choices about the kingdom God offers us and the kingdom we ourselves want.

Vale John

Some of us knew him as Vadim, most of us knew him as John. Some knew him as a spiritual man, an intellectual, a poet and a Jazz freak. Others knew him as a radio presenter, A Frank Sinatra fan, a teacher, a writer, a corporate executive, a wine lover. But one thing we all called him was "friend".

John's real name was not Kotow but Weiss and he was born in Tschelyabinsk, Russia, before the Second World War during which his father, as a foreigner was ordered to leave Russia leaving behind Sophia, his mother, John and his sister Erica. The War ending, the family fled to Austria via Poland where after a long search Sofia found her husband in another relationship.

.During the family's stay in an Austrian refugee camp, Sophia met a fellow Russian by the name of Kowtow and after the birth of John's half-brother Alex., the family migrated in 1949 to Loxton in South Australia.


From a youth spent on the River Murray, through the Lutheran Teacher's College and then in the late 50's and 60's John attended Teacher's College and Adelaide University. He also became a great supporter of the Adelaide Jazz Club and helped to bring leading American and Australian Jazz musicians to Adelaide. Even when teaching in the country, to fulfill his obligation to the Education Dep't after graduation, for years on weekends, John would hitch hike 200 kilometers to be with his friends and take part in the Adelaide scene. And it was at one of these parties in 1962 that John met Daina, a graphic artist working at John Martyn's. John and Daina ended up marrying in the mid 60's.

In the late 60's he returned full time to Adelaide University to finish an Honors Degree in the Arts ... majoring in, oddly enough, German. Armed with his Honors Degree and fluent in English, Russian and German, John put his academic years behind him and applied for a job with General Motors Holden. He was accepted in the first ever intake of graduates into the company.

Over several years, John quickly rose from Personnel Manager at South Australia's Woodville Plant to become the Human Resources Manager at Head Office in Melbourne. And, after successful trips to New York and GM's Detroit operations, John was

appointed by the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors to join GMH's Executive Task Force.

It was while John was in New York that he played chess with some of the world's best players. He also met jazz idols like Dave Brubeck and gained an appreciation for Black American Gospel music. In fact, it was not long after the infamous Harlem riots that John was walking down the street in Harlem when he heard his first Gospel Choir. Not being shy, John entered the Church and listened, enraptured by the harmony. When they asked him where he was from and what would he like to hear the first song that popped into John's head was 'Swing Low Sweet Chariot' a Black American Funeral Hymn. Sadly, it was also around this time that John and Erica's brother Alex passed away at the young age of 27.



Back in Australia, after several years with GMH, John resigned and took up another position with Kemptron - manufacturers of consumer durables and industrial products and soon after in 1977, he was offered a position as Personnel Manager with David Syme and Co. Ltd., publisher of 'The Age' and other newspaper, magazine, audio and video products. It was a position he enjoyed for three years.

In 1980 John returned to Adelaide, ahead of Daina, and took up a position with a small, family owned, specialist wine wholesaler. Then in 1984, he moved on to become Text Book Manager at the Standard Book Company. After 4 years of selling books, he and Daina traveled north to Kuranda in 1988.

With Daina at his side, John put his Epicurean talents to the test when he opened Mrs Millers Restaurant in Kuranda. Then, in 1991, he took over the lease at Frogs and began to amaze one and all with unique recipes like his 'Paw Paw and Coconut Soup'. In 1997, he took over the kitchen at Tuna Towers in Cairns, and eventually returned to work in Kuranda with Una at Billy's. He spent several years at Billy's cooking for locals and tourists until he could no longer physically work. And next to GMH it was probably the longest time he'd worked anywhere. And part of the reason is probably because he always said that Fitzpatrick's is where the real locals go.

During those years in the far north John Kotow presented the *Book Review* with Pat Morrish on ABC Regional radio. He interviewed and made friends with local and famous authors like David Malouf. And he wrote more book reviews for Tony Hillier's *Barfly* and the occasional article for interstate publications. Another of his passions was presenting the *Opera Program* and *Jazz Specials* on 4CCR Community Radio.

John also had one of the best private LP record collections in the Far North. A close friend recalls enjoying a coffee on John's balcony and being challenged: "Go on ... pick a record ... but pick something decent". And picking the most obscure album he could think of and smiling called: "1969 Eurovision Song Contest Winner Freda Boccaro's album *Les Enfants*" Beyond belief, a smile split across John's face and he said "I've got it"... he had the album I'd spent 15 years looking for!"

One can imagine John's now in Heaven saying: "Enough of the loaves and fishes. I've got a great idea for a new menu and hush the harps -time for some Jazz!"

John is survived by his wife Daina, his sister Erica and her children Kerry and Shane.

What is Tea Tree?

Tea Tree is an eclectic blend of ideas and practice designed to be a "best of the best" of community based alternative education. In particular it draws on: * Dr. William Glasser - an American Psychiatrist who believes that positive relationships are at the heart of the educational process;

* The schools of Reggio Emilia - which espouse dynamic, flexible and innovative education that recognises each individual child as unique, capable and full of potential.

What would a Tea Tree school be like?

* An environment which reminds us of a small country school

* A lower student-teacher ratio: classes of 25 with 1 registered teacher and 1 full time teacher aide, allowing relationships to remain the focus of the educational process

* Gradeless classes fostering relationships between students of all ages (between 6 and 12)

* Parents/families asked to participate in an ongoing educational partnership,

contributing according to their skills or interests

* Students as active participants in the learning process around a negotiated curriculum - self directed learners

* Learning as a cooperative social activity

* The school community modelling and practicing the 7 caring habits: supporting, encouraging, listening, accepting, trusting, respecting and negotiating difference

* Values taught explicitly

* People's behaviour guided by real choices and consequences as well as respect for and by others

* Quality work created from quality resources

* Self evaluation and joint reflection

* People reflecting on lifestyle practices - slow foods, restricted use of screen devices, environmental practices

* Strong emphasis on creative expression and a slowing of the learning process - a relaxed approach to time

* Large blocks of uninterrupted time to explore topics in depth across a number of weeks, or months

* A multi-sensory approach to learning and work

* You would be unlikely to see: punishment and coercive practices, teaching subjects as separate units, competitive activities, work sheets or text books, fast food, students sitting in desks for long periods of time, or lots of tests.

Is Tea Tree new?

Yes, Tea Tree has been developed in Cairns over the past four years and in 2006 will see its first classroom open at Balaclava Primary School in Cairns. The philosophy needed a unique name and Tea Tree came up as something that, like the philosophy, took root and grew in Cairns. It is intended that the name tie together a future network of schools that adopt the philosophy.

Will there be fees?

For each class, Education Qld will only fund a teacher plus part time teacher's aide. In order to have a full time aide in the classroom, the difference has to be made up by the Tea Tree school. At Balaclava this will be done through a low fee of about \$300 per term per student. Other options could also be looked at in Kuranda depending on the needs of the community.

Is Tea Tree in competition with the proposed Kuranda Steiner School? I don't believe that it is. Tea Tree and Steiner have some fundamental differences and will not appeal to exactly the same people. With Kuranda in dire need of more educational choice there should be room to offer both options.

I'm interested, what do I do next?

Batreach's Latest Guests



Mini is a Feathertail Glider (*Acrobates pygmaeus*), a marsupial, and the smallest gliding mammal in the world. The adult weight is 10 to 14 grams, with a body length of around 70mm (about the length of this) and tail about the same length as the body. It is called a feathertail glider because of the long feathery fringes on either side of its tail.

Feathertail gliders are found in the tall forests and woodlands of eastern Australia, but they are hard to see in the wild as they are so small and agile. They live in family groups and feed mainly at night on nectar and small insects. As with many other animals their habitat is in decline.

When we collected Mini she hadn't eaten for 2 days and was very cold. She weighed only 6 grams. She was fully furred with her eyes open. From her weight and appearance we knew that she was out of the pouch, but would still have been suckling and would not yet have left her nest. She was found alone on the ground. There was no sign of her mother and siblings and she had a small injury on her side, so the nest had probably been attacked. Predators of the feathertail glider include birds like kookaburras, cats and foxes, and reptiles,

5 weeks later, after a shaky start, Mini is thriving. She now weighs 9 grams so she is approaching her full adult size. The fur on the sides of her tail has developed into a gorgeous feathery fringe. She loves her fresh flowers and is looking very plump and content. She will soon be ready for release in an area where other feathertails are known to live, so she can get out there, find a nice fella and

start her life as a wild feathertail glider.

Cleo is a squirrel glider (*Petaurus norfolcensis*). Although she only weighed 8 grams when she arrived at Batreach, she will reach an adult size of 190 to 300grams, that's around 30 times bigger than she is now.

Squirrel gliders live in dry sclerophyll forest, coastal forest and on the edge of rainforest. They live in family groups of one adult male, with one or more adult females and their young offspring. Their status is rare, particularly in the southern part of their range in Victoria.

Cleo's mother and sibling were killed in a cat attack. The mother was dead already and the other baby died from severe injuries shortly after arriving at Batreach, Cleo was completely bald with her eyes shut, and should have still been in her mother's pouch, firmly attached to a teat.

We made her up a pretend pouch of a cotton bag with soft cloth suspended over a heat pad. She needed to be kept warm as though she was in her mother's pouch, but not too hot. She has to be fed every 3 hours on special milk replacer formula, as normally she would have a constant supply of her mother's milk whenever she wanted it. She was a wonderful baby from the start, eating well and being very adaptable to her new circumstances. Cleo gets very excited when she knows it's time for her milk and makes soft grunting noises as well as friendly clicks. After 3 weeks she's gaining weight, she has a nice covering of beautiful soft baby fur, and her eyes are just starting to open and look at her strange foster mother.



CLARK'S CORNER

As you may be aware I have announced my intention to retire at the next election after first entering State politics in 1989. Kowrowa and deliver a P-12 school for Kuranda at Myola that meets community aspirations.

But most importantly I want to see Labor candidate Steve Wettenhall elected so that Kuranda continues to have a strong voice in government and I will be working hard to achieve that goal.

Steve and his family lived in Kuranda for several years and will be well known to many of you. Steve runs his own law firm with partner Rowan Silva and now lives in Stratford. He has my total support and will make an excellent Member of Parliament and a great successor in the seat of Barron River. Steve understands well the needs and issues in the electorate and the importance that so many Kuranda residents place on the sustainability of both the environment and the tourism industry. STONE MASTIC ASPHALT

Friends of the Earth Kuranda have responded with concern to the proposed use of stone mastic asphalt (SMA) on the proposed Kuranda Range Road 4-lane highway, which is currently awaiting the outcome of environmental approval processes.

We recently became aware of several reports damning the use of stone mastic. Our investigations have revealed that this road material is considered so dangerous that it has been banned in Europe with Ireland restricting its use to roads with 30 mph (48 kph) speed limits because of poor grip.

Stone mastic is widely used on Queensland roads despite the Main Roads Department admitting in June this year that it had made a mistake in choosing SMA, stating that they had laid the material because it lasted longer but that it had not handled the wet weather or the traffic well. The use of stone mastic has been directly attributed to a 10-fold increase in accidents in which eleven people have died since stone mastic was laid in 2002 on a stretch of road on the Sunshine Coast.

The geometry of the Kuranda Range Road and the wet-weather experienced in the Wet Tropics means that whatever road surface is used, it has to be of a quality and type that will provide maximum grip immediately and for the long-term. So, short or long-term, SMA is unlikely to be the appropriate road surface for the Range Road.

An independent review commissioned by Transport and Main Roads Minister Paul Lucas found that stone mastic asphalt is a safe road surface.

How independent can the review of road building practices be when it was commissioned by the practitioner? Ms Horsburgh asked. Unfortunately, lack of objectivity is what we have come to expect of reports commissioned by developers and government agencies that have a financial or political interest in a particular outcome. In this case, the State is facing potential legal claims from road accident victims and from the families of the deceased.

We trust that the proposal to use Stone Mastic on the Kuranda Range Road is not based on monetary considerations. The road is currently officially classified as having an average safety record. The proposed increased speed and volume of traffic, coupled with an inferior road surface, may well see this record downgraded with associated loss of life. This newly identified risk to human life just serves to widen our concerns and reinforce our opposition. It will be interesting to see if Main Roads re-evaluate their choice of road surface in light of these findings.

THE KOALA

Cute, 'cuddly' and endearing, the Koala is surely Australia's most well known ambassador. However as any Koala handler knows, the term 'cuddly' applies only to captive 'well trained' koalas, as their first instinct is to dig their well-endowed claws into anything to get a grip.

At birth the Koala is only about 2cm long and weighs less than one gram. Like all other newborn marsupials it is naked and blind when it climbs up into the mothers backward facing pouch where it attaches itself to one of two teats. Once the infant is too big to fit into its mothers pouch, it rides on her back, where it clings on for dear life while mum moves awkwardly across branches. The female Koala produces a special, very sloppy faeces called PAP, which contains the microorganisms needed by the young Koala to digest gum leaves. The infant will consume this mixture just prior to eating its first solid food. Eucalypt leaves are particularly tough, dry and unpalatable, with very little nutrient value, so the Koala had to come up with some remarkable adaptations to allow digestion. Within that expansive midriff the Koala has the most colossal digestive system in the animal kingdom, including a liver that can deal with chemicals that would kill us in hours.

The caecum is up to 2 metres long and occupies most of the available space in the abdominal cavity, giving the Koala its characteristic rotund appearance. The best way to exist on food so low in nutrition is to conserve as much energy as possible, which explains why Koalas never seem to do much. The average Koala spends up to 20 hours sleeping and resting and four hours feeding. Koalas are very fussy eaters and carefully smell each leaf before deciding whether to eat it or not and they only eat a small number of the hundreds of Eucalypt species found in Australia. Their teeth are highly specialised for dealing with tough plant material, more adapted to grinding than to tearing. Two of three pairs of pre-molars found in many other marsupials are absent altogether, leaving a large gap between the front and back teeth called a diasthema.


Koalas have a large, flattened, bare



nose which is not only their prominent feature, but also one of its most important sense organs, both for food and the mating ritual. Male Koalas use their sense of smell to detect whether or not females are in the breeding cycle and to recognize the presence of other active Koalas. Mature males have a scent gland in the skin of the chest with which they mark their territorial boundaries. This gland is visible as a triangular patch of bare skin in the centre of the chest, which oozes a clear, oily, strongly smelling liquid. The male's territorial call can only be described as a thunderous bellowing, especially during mating season.

Koalas are found in patches ranging from South Australia and up the East Coast as far as Cooktown where the population is naturally sparse. Our northern Koalas are much smaller than their southern cousins and lighter in colour. There have been recent sightings in the Yungaburra and Koah areas but not much is known about these resident populations, so reporting possible sightings is imperative.

Much more research needs to be done to understand all the mysteries surrounding this remarkable marsupial for only through knowledge can we ensure the future status of our unique fauna.

BALANCING FUN, INDUSTRY, RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

Some of the regular Saturday morning team after a work-out on the corner of Myola and Barnwell Roads. The new "Billy Goat" will help us slash the guinea grass and keep it under control until the trees form a canopy and shade it out. We'll experiment with planting the trees in rows so that we can get both "Blue Holly", the tractor, and "Billy Goat" easily between the trees. Once the trees take shape they'll make it hard to see the rows because of all their different shapes and sizes. Wildlife won't mind.

Working with QR

Queensland Rail is making it easier for Envirocare members to access the sites we're revegetating where the Kuranda EnviroLink Wildlife Corridor intersects with the railway corridor. They're putting us through an induction course which will inform us of the rules of working near the railway line. We are also developing a Memorandum of Understanding with QR about our respective roles and responsibilities regarding maintenance of vegetation for our mutual benefit in special areas.

Eco-tourism in the Real Sense of the Word

Bunda Bundarra, an extensive and World Heritage equivalent property on Black Mountain Road, has been awarded Federal funding to work with Envirocare, QPWS and CSIRO to develop a plan which will see the environment pay for its keep by involving tourists in research into Cassowary survival. The plan is to attract a special type of tourist who wishes to experience the Wet Tropics rainforest at its most intense, day and night, while participating in collecting information, propagating seeds and planting trees to extend and enrich Cassowary habitat in Kuranda.

Intense Residential Development for Douglas Track

Developer Bob Norman has submitted a proposal to Council for a 51-block "Park Residential" (1-acre blocks with town water) subdivision with "town water" supplied from local bores. It'll be interesting to see how Council will decide on this in the light of its refusal of a similar proposal from the Cardinia Estate proposal, also in Speewah.

"Top of the Range" is a Park Residential subdivision with a long history of sewage disposal problems and is now almost entirely using bio-cycle systems because of the failure of most septic systems and costly later connection to town water at residents' expense.

There are also other critical constraints on such intensive development of the Douglas Track subdivision because of its location in the Kuranda EnviroLink Wildlife Corridor and its known population of Cassowaries.

EnviroCare is guzzling weeds

KANASUIR YU KARATE

For anyone considering taking up karate perhaps the most intimidating term associated with this martial art is "full contact". The words tend to conjure up thoughts of broken bones and missing teeth. While karate as a contact sport does involve some risk of injury (as does football or jogging) for a novice the prospect of stepping on to a competition mat is distant enough that it barely merits consideration. The aim of any good karate instruction will be to raise the fitness and confidence of the student without any pressure. This said, it is worth looking at the different concepts of karate competition in order to understand the emphasis different styles and teachers place on particular types of training.

Karate competition falls into two broad categories, full-contact and non-contact. In non-contact competition a bout is controlled by a referee with judges at each corner of the mat. Punches and kicks exchanged between contestants are stopped short of contact and when two or more judges deem that a blow would have been effective had it been carried through a point is awarded. Under non-contact rules competitors usually score with punches and kicks directed to the head and torso, with excessive contact incurring penalties for the offending fighter. Protective equipment is usually limited to shin pads and groin protectors.

Full-contact rules are more rugged. Punches and kicks are delivered with the intention of

knocking down an opponent. Full power punches and kicks to the upper legs and body are permitted. Punches to the head are generally illegal but full power kicks to the head are allowed, kicks tending to connect with the side of the head whereas punches would be much more likely to cause damage to the eyes and teeth. Points may be awarded but the punch or kick is usually required to at least stagger an opponent. Compulsory protective equipment is usually limited to groin protectors.

From a spectator's point of view the most obvious difference between the two systems of competition is that non-contact karate tends to be a much more stop-start affair than the full-contact version, as a punch or kick that scores a point and halts proceedings in non-contact competition will achieve nothing in a full-contact bout unless it floors an opponent. Full-contact competitors also tend to vigorously attack the thighs of their opponents with kicks, but as this degree of contact is illegal under non-contact rules the technique is not used in that style of competition. Most obviously, full-contact bouts are much more likely to end with one of the competitors being knocked down.

Which system is better? Well, equal but different might be a good answer. Non-contact enthusiasts point out that their system minimises the risk of injury and contend that it would be dangerous to attack an opponent

with blows that break bricks and boards in demonstrations. Full-contact devotees respond that their system is more realistic as they too can break bricks and boards and experience shows that the same blows just bounce off well conditioned muscle. And the bricks and boards don't hit back

Comparing full-contact and non-contact karate is somewhat like comparing touch football to rugby. Both are legitimate sports in their own right and both are available to whatever level a competitor might wish to aspire. Having competed under both systems my personal preference is for the full-contact version. Full-contact karate involves plenty of knocks, bruises and bright lights but facing an opponent under knock down rules leaves you with no excuses and in no doubt of where you stand – or lie.

In October of this year more than eight hundred competitors from scores of styles will converge in Mei, Japan for the fifteenth Kansuiryu Karate Full-contact Championships and once again a number of local students will attend under the Kansuiryu Scholarship Program which provides airfares and accommodation to selected Kansuiryu students from Kuranda and Cairns. Students of all ages and abilities are eligible for scholarship places, the main criteria being good attitude at training and overall commitment to karate. 



October sees the garden "Springing" to life and the winter sleepers coming back into leaf – a month of promise and future hopes. But the fruition of one's dreams requires hard Yakka! October also sees a slew of Open Gardens in nearby areas to give ideas and encouragement to both experienced and new gardeners alike:

Not a bad mix of gardens combining "drier" and "wetter" conditions and a great opportunity to see how others realize their Edens.

Things to consider this month:

Shrubs and climbers that have passed their winter flowering should be pruned to maximize new growth for next season's flowering. A general fertilizer can be applied to boost growth coming in, remembering to water well before and after application.

Leafy subjects like Aroids and Anthuriums can be pampered to achieve maximum growth with weekly application of a foliar feed.

Look at those potted plants probably needing a clean-up and repotting. Either make up or purchase basic potting mix, supplement with water saving crystals, slow release fertilizer granules and river sand, perlite or well composted material to introduce body and lighten the mix. An old test for a potting mix is to water well, take a handful of mix and squeeze. The mix should fall apart when released. Or if all too much and the pocket can stand it, buy a premium potting mix. Remember that in Nature, no plant is a "houseplant", so care in providing a rich but open potting medium is essential and efforts to maximize suitable positioning brings results. Thus thin tender leafed plants like the Maidenhairs (Adiantums), other ferns and many other foliage plants will benefit from massed display where atmospheric moisture is maximized while xerotropic plants, such as the Adeniums, most succulents and cacti, used to harder conditions, will benefit from good air flow, direct sunlight and spare watering.

Watching with interest several new vegetable gardens started by friends in cut-down tank rounds. With good preparation and annual topping of mulches and fertilizers, these gardens are a great way to enjoy the benefits of home grown vegetables as they as easily covered to protect yield and are also moisture retentive, so necessary for maximum yield. Even without this convenience, Choosing, if space is limited, the bush growing, sow seeds of pumpkin, marrow, squash, cucumber or watermelon in a well prepared and sunny spot, keep up the water, feed and stand back for a crop to be enjoyed by you and some bush critters.

Plant of the Month

Croton - *Codiaeum variegatum* (Euphorbiaceae). The original wild form of *Codiaeum* (C. 'Mollucanum') is believed to have originated in the Molucca Islands of Indonesia although other authorities say that crotons are native to the Malaccan Islands, between the Philippines and New Guinea. More than 700 species are to be found throughout SE Asia. The original plant sporting a yellow spotted type 'aureo maculatum, which in turn sported the narrow leaf spotted variety 'punctatum' and as a result of much cross-breeding, newer Thai hybrids in remarkable leaf forms are slowly being introduced locally. For colour, zing and excitement in your garden consider crotons. All are relatively slow growing and range in height at maturity

from the smaller Thai hybrids at 2-3m to the 6m or taller older types. This hardy and adaptable family is of easy care and low maintenance. With remarkable diversity in colours and forms of leaf, crotons, along with cordylines, should be considered as intrinsic to the structure and colour of the tropical garden.

Easily grown from short tip cuttings taken in summer with bottom leaves removed and individually potted up in a good striking mix, these should be planted out when roots emerge from drainage holes. Local markets are also a good source for the more common although still colourful plants. However, more recent hybrids still command higher prices and are harder to find, particularly the more intricately leafed forms. Smaller growing varieties make excellent potted subjects but will require attention to maintaining even moisture.

Although hardy when established, the best display comes from careful soil preparation, good drainage and consistent moisture level. Many of the older varieties take considerable light exposure, essential for maximum colouration but fierce afternoon sun may cause some bleaching particularly in the more tender hybrids so an eastern position is most suitable. A careful shortening of terminals during the warmer months will help produce a bushier shrub and prevent the legginess often seen in older plants. Remember that all parts of these plants are toxic and some persons may find the sap an irritant. For your delectation some Web sites to follow up:

Q & A: Dear Gillian re suggestions for potted displays for Christmas.,

Thank you for your kind words and I am pleased that your vireyas are thriving. Congratulations on your success with these often temperamental beauties. You do know the definition of "expert" - a drip under pressure, but to your question. December is a hard gardening month with increased heat and humidity and the "Wet" beginning or the "Dry" holding on. In planning your Christmas display, firstly consider the shape, size and depth of your pots and plan plantings to complement their dimensions and colour(s). Think about strengthening and maximizing visual impact by tying colours together both in individual pots and across the display to avoid a haphazard look.

A factor in getting the best from your display is investment in the best possible potting mix, ideally one with water crystals added and of open texture – if necessary add perlite or coarse river sand to lighten. Dilute weekly feedings will bring your displays on quickly.

The trinity here for me would be crotons, cordylines and coleus for their colour, leaf shapes and general durability and with their added advantage of being able to be planted out in the garden after the season has passed. Depending on pocket and pot size, the investment in focal plants will make the centre piece with either multiple planting or large single specimen. Personally I would consider foliage plants as the backbone of any display for their lower maintenance and range of foliage and colour. Planting up now, encouraging good growth and situating in temporary position to maximize colouring will enable you to think about complementary filler plantings closer to Christmas so as to cover surface and/or cascade over side of pot. Some of these plantings could consist of caladiums, impatiens, (don't forget the yellow flowered "Singapore Dragon" with its trailing and excellent ground covering growth) or more daring, try Achimenes or low growing and colourful members of the bromeliad family. I am always somewhat reluctant to recommend flowering plants as timing is crucial for flowered display.

A fun and utilitarian display for the children or grandchildren would be a large pot with appropriate conical

trays in many different sizes, and can be crushed easily.

Crush ice cubes by wrapping them in a tea towel then hitting it on a wall or floor, or with a hammer or rolling pin. Electric and hand-operated ice crushers are also available.

For ice cubes with a difference, place lemon wedges, fruit pieces or olive slices in water in ice tray. Allow to freeze, use in cocktails.

MINT JULEP:

5 mint leaves
5ml sugar syrup
5ml water
Ice
60ml bourbon



or tower support planted up with tied-in running cherry tomato and bordered with parley. As well as being a cheerful display, the kids can eat the display.

If you are very bold and willing to accept that timing may not get it all together, a couple of feature pots with tall conical trellises could be planted up and tied-in with the night-blooming and sweetly scented Ipomea bona-nox (The Moon Flower). Under-planted with white or red dwarf Impatiens or the larger NG hybrids, white or red flowered bronze leaf bedding begonias or another filler could be the gold leafed sweet potato, these would create a memorable talking point. A soon-to-open bud of the Ipomea placed at each guest's dinner place will open from the heat of their hand to create a treasured experience. Take care with the Ipomea as trimmings and seed pose a risk to the forest if not carefully disposed of. Please, photographs of your displays when at their peak to share with and encourage other gardeners!

COCKTAILS "ICE"

Ice is used in nearly all cocktails to have clean, fresh cubes, blocks or crushed ice. Remember, a warm cocktail is, quite simply, Undrinkable.

Well iced drinks are best because they have more body; the ice improves the texture by thickening the drink. It is important, however, to always add the ice first so it chills the liquid quickly and thoroughly and doesn't overflow the glass.

Prepare ice in the size and shape desired then freeze it; melting ice is of little use.

Cubed ice can be prepared in freezer

Crush mint leaves in glass with sugar syrup and water to extract mint flavour. Add ice and bourbon. Stir for 30 seconds until glass frosts.

Glass: 180ml highball
Garnish: mint leaves

BARRIER REEF

30ml Cointreau
Dash Angostura bitters
2 scoops vanilla ice-cream
Dash blue Curacao
Ice

Pour all ingredients into shaker, shake, then pour into serving glass.

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


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Kuranda Chamber of Commerce

DOUBLE CHIN: Nothing adds more to the age of the face than a flabby or loose chin. It is best to look after this part of your body from an early age. Every night, do a bit of kneading under the chin along the jaw line, and a bit of patting with the back of your hand under the chin and along the jaw line. Pinching under the chin helps to keep it firm, but remember not to stretch the chin.

All the exercises or massaging movements on the chin should be towards the bone, and not away from it. Sometimes a crepe bandage can be used too, as a chin strap. When you have some time to yourself take a crepe bandage and tie it around your chin by taking it up both sides and keeping it tied for ten minutes every day. You will soon be pleasantly surprised with the results.

LOOSE FACIAL MUSCLES

Home Treatments: Regular face massage with upward movements, and a bit of taping all over the face is very beneficial. But facial exercises become a must in this condition, as massaging alone cannot help very much. You should try the following exercises:

1. Close your eyes tight, and then open them as wide as possible. Do this five times. Now frown tightly, and then relax.
2. Raise your eyebrows and relax them five times.
3. Smile tightly and then form a light 'O' with your lips. Do this five times.
4. Fill up air in the mouth, take it from one side to the other and blow out slowly - five times.
5. Try to touch the tip of the nose with your tongue - again, five times.
6. With your first finger under each eye draw the parts of the eyes under your fingers close together towards the nose. Then relax. This exercise should also be performed five times.
7. Open your mouth and relax your lower jaw, then take your lower jaw up gradually, and tightly, five times.

These exercises should be done twice a day. Since the facial



Kuranda Bus Problem

A STATEMENT FROM CONCERNED SMALL BUSINESS OPERATORS IN KURANDA VILLAGE

Despite assurances to the contrary, a number of Kuranda business operators remain very concerned that the bus issue and its short and long term effects on smaller business operators in the town will continue unabated. The issue came into prominence when complaints were lodged regarding the use of buses by a number of larger operators to ferry tourists arriving at Kuranda Railway and Skyrail straight through the town directly to their businesses, ignoring other operators and businesses in the town.

Kuranda Hotel Motel operator and spokesperson Barry Smith said that the issue has become a major one as the operators providing the bus services continue to keep their passengers as a "captive audience". This largely denies their passengers the opportunity of visiting other businesses in the town and experiencing a more complete Kuranda experience, he said. With around one million visitors coming to the town each year, there is no need for practices that come an unfair percentage of the market to the exclusion of other tourism oriented operators. The large businesses that operate these buses seem to feel that they are entitled to first shot at the tourist dollars, and leave small operators what is left. The so called courtesy buses take football teams or anyone else regardless of prior booking to various establishments, and they cannot and do not provide transport for wheelchair bound persons. The previous excuse given for these buses was that they were for disabled persons, but not one bus is fitted for wheelchair access.

Many of Kuranda's businesses and ratepayers feel that this on-going bus issue concerns more than a few big businesses in Kuranda. Kuranda is one of the most visited destinations in NQ, apart from The Great Barrier Reef, and it should be a showcase to encourage domestic and international visitors to venture further to Mareeba Shire, Atherton Tablelands etc and hopefully become return visitors. There should be a more cohesive effort from all operators rather than practices on the part of major operators that are to the detriment of other tourism businesses in the town and result in disunity and animosity among smaller operators.

The Kuranda Village Promotion Program (KVPP) spends hundreds of thousands of dollars promoting the *More than a Village in the Rainforest* theme. However if all the town's tourism business

operators decide to run buses exclusively to individual establishments there would be hundreds of bus trips up and down Kuranda's streets, extra diesel fumes, pollution for safety issues with the pedestrian traffic every day. Suddenly the theme will be shot to pieces. Visitors' perception of the town being a pristine and friendly village will turn to thoughts of a Reg Varney "On The Buses" movie gone bad. Business operators who are currently being denied access to courtesy bus visitors are concerned with the long term viability of Kuranda as a pristine tourist destination. We ask that the large business operators ensure that Kuranda village goes back to basic grassroots.

Mareeba Shire Council spent approximately \$7 million of the Tourism Infrastructure Levy on upgrading the main street, Centenary Park and the Environmental walks around the village. Good Australian made, locally produced products and an environment that is visitor friendly is being denied to our courtesy bus visitors. Buses taking approximately 15% of tourists past the majority of businesses equate to the loss of approximately 3000 potential customers each and every week to small business operators in Kuranda. This is a clear disadvantage for the small operators, The question has to be asked that, apart from self-interest, why is there a need to operate buses at all?

The tarmac area in front of the Railway and Skyrail should not be cluttered with buses but be reserved for emergency vehicles, a pick up point for wheelchair visitors and for pedestrian traffic. Suitable signage at the tarmac would give people the knowledge that they were in the village already and would not need a bus to get there. Buses should be relegated to the Arara St. bus parking facility 60 meters away. This purpose-built parking cost around \$500,000 so why not use it for the purpose intended?

The staged meetings that are stacked with supporters who uphold loaded motions to achieve desired outcomes provide no real solutions to the current problem. The Lepage Report commissioned by the KVPP mentions making the village "pedestrian friendly" and the possibility of a people mover which would not detract from the *Village in the Rainforest* theme. This would alleviate bus traffic and cut down on the diesel fumes. Hopefully Mareeba Shire Council will take charge of this situation and do what is in the best interest of long term tourism in Kuranda and North Queensland.
