Monday 24th August saw the river at its lowest point for many years: something that caught more than a few people by surprise. The deliberate lowering, which had been well notified in advance, was to allow Stanwell to carry out maintenance work at the inlet upstream of the weir. If anyone was in doubt about where the sand from Big Sands had migrated to, what was left of it that is, they simply had to walk around on the newly revealed riverbed. Surprisingly, no mud, just sand.

For the first time in years the old, low level bridge was visible and we marvelled at how the sand island in the middle of the river above the present bridge was slowly covering the old roadway. Further downstream the riverboat forlornly sat marooned but not abandoned on its own sandbar.

By Tuesday mid-day all was back to normal.





Kuranda Range Road Closure

"The Cardiac Challenge" is a Cairns to Cooktown cycle ride, with the first stage, Cairns to Mt Carbine starting on Saturday 19th September, passing through Kuranda. Please note the Kuranda Range Road closure. The following is a statement received from the organisers:

The downward lane of the Kuranda Range will be closed from 5.30am to 9am. This special permit issued by DTMR came about because of the 1m legislation that was new for Cardiac Challenge last year. The permit has been issued in this way for a very short space of time - people who wish to travel to Cairns from the Atherton Tableland during this time frame are urged to use the Gillies or Rex Range. Only the fittest cyclists will be permitted to ride Kuranda Range and anyone who has not completed the Range in time will be taken off and bused up. The Foundation will endeavour to have all cyclists off the Range by 8.15am. In addition to this, cyclists and their



support crews — up to 600 people, will be stopping in Kuranda, having a coffee or breakfast, before departing for the next leg of that day's journey. The Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation is grateful for the support of the Tableland community and its visitors as they are aware they may one day use the cardiac services at Cairns Hospital, for which the cyclists are fundraising.

Message from the TRC

Ravenshoe Community Recovery Update

A Case Coordination Group has been established as part of the recovery process for the Ravenshoe café explosion.

This group consists of representatives from Ravenshoe Community Centre, Yabu Mija Aboriginal Corporation, St Teresa's Catholic Church, Uniting Care Community, Community Services Tablelands and other organisations who are providing case management to the injured, their families and the families of the deceased in their recovery.

Ravenshoe Community Recovery Group Chairperson, Councillor Shaaron Linwood said "The agencies assist with identifying support needs as well as preparing submissions and providing advice on their clients' behalf to the Ravenshoe Appeal Distribution Committee (RADC) for financial assistance from the official Ravenshoe GIVIT appeal".

The Ravenshoe Appeal Distribution Committee is the independent body responsible for distributing the official GIVIT appeal fund and for providing the appropriate checks and balances to ensure that appeal funds are distributed in an equitable, transparent and accountable manner.

Following the RADC meeting on 12 August, committee chair and Australian Red Cross Board member Lyndal Scobell confirmed the total raised through the official GIVIT Ravenshoe Appeal had reached \$530,575.20.

"This will provide much needed support and resources to enable the injured to rehabilitate over the longer term," Ms Scobell said

"Approximately 30 per cent of the GIVIT Ravenshoe Appeal Fund has already been distributed and is reaching those affected by the café explosion that left 18 injured and two fatalities".

"We are now getting into the phase of recovery where some of the longer term needs – such as specific home modifications – are being identified, with some of these expenses being met through the Appeal fund," she said.

This is in line with the decision taken by the RADC to allocate up to 15 per cent for immediate assistance, 80 per cent for longer term assistance and up to 5 per cent for wider community recovery.

As part of the wider community recovery, Cairns burns victim Carol Mayer, who sustained burn injuries to more than 80 per cent of her body in a house fire in February 2000, will give a presentation to the community later this month (August). This event is being funded from the 5% of the appeal fund allocated to wider community recovery. Cr Linwood advised that a number of community members had volunteered to assist the injured in their recovery.

"To date, a number of volunteers have been secured to assist with cleaning, household removal, yard maintenance, painting and driving," Cr Linwood said.

"People who wish to volunteer to help those affected by the Ravenshoe café explosion are urged to register their offers of assistance with the Emergency Volunteering (EV) CREW service provided by Volunteering Queensland, who is working in partnership with the TRC to manage all offers of volunteer assistance."

Ongoing support for community members affected by this event is available through the Ravenshoe Community Centre on 4097 6726. The Community Centre has been funded through the Department of Communities to provide counselling and support to assist with the recovery from the event which is still at the forefront of many residents minds.





Snake With Big Belly

IN APRIL we found this beautiful Amethystine Python coiled up in a grassy patch, sleeping off the effects of a large dinner. Never having seen such a large and marvellously patterned snake up so close and seemingly so unperturbed by our approach, we took many photographs over the next several weeks. Eventually, when the rain came back, the snake took to cover but it would generally be out, sunning itself on warm afternoons. We became attached to it and it became "our" snake. Three weeks ago I found it again, in the same spot it had originally appeared, seemingly lazily sunning its throat in the afternoon heat. I marvelled at its pale underbelly and again at how fearless it was and how unconcerned at my approach.

I told my wife of its return and a couple of days later, on a Sunday afternoon, she went to look. She was horrified to find it wasn't sunning its underbelly, it was arching its back in an attempt to raise its head from the ground. Flies were in attendance. Its head had been

partially severed from the body by a horrific wound, possibly administered by a machete or a shovel and the _____ animal appeared to be beyond help. Nevertheless, a friend with snake-

animal appeared to be beyond help. Nevertheless, a friend with snake-handling experience and a great heart bagged the now barely moving snake and took it home to have its wound cleaned and bandaged and to be placed on a warming pad. A vet was called out on a mercy mission but thought the injury was too severe and that the animal had suffered brain damage and had no hope of recovery. It was mercifully euthanised, but not before it had suffered days of incalculable agony and caused


much heartache to a number of ordinary people trying to save its life.

All snakes are best left alone. If you want

to stop a python from eating your chooks or your pets, call one of the volunteer removalists who will be only too pleased to help you. The best way to be bitten is to try to move a snake when you don't know what you're doing. To see such a beautiful animal and to straight away want to kill it with a shovel or a stick just beggars belief. I hope this sequence of photographs tells its own story.

Kuranda Pool


Mareeba Shire Council is urgently seeking quotes to replace the heaters at the Kuranda Pool.

"We realise the impact this will have on the users and are moving as quickly as possible to source a replacement heating system. We apologise for any inconvenience this has caused" he said.


Although the heaters are currently not working, the pool remains open.

Hazard Reduction Burns

Hazard Reduction Burns are a safety measure carried out by trained Voluntary Rural Fire Brigades to reduce wild fire incidents in Communities.

Mareeba Shire Council, QPWS and Urban fire crews all carry out hazard reduction burns. All property owners or occupiers are obliged to make their property safe. That applies to the home as well as the surrounding land.

A great percentage of wildfires throughout Queensland begin beside roads and highways. The most effective way of preventing these fires is to carry out hazard reduction burns. These controlled burns prevent the total devastation of flora and fauna as is frequently seen in Southern States.

"Cool burns" are ideally carried out in the early part of the year after the wet season and a great deal of preparation goes into their organisation. Each Brigade area is mapped out and divided into sections and burns are carried out every three or four years depending on the fuel loads.

Initial planning begins at the Mareeba Fire Management Meeting with respective bodies such as Ergon, QRail, Telecom, Council, TMR, Rural Ops, Rural and Urban, QPWS and other representatives of infrastructure attending. Proposed burns throughout the Shire are then discussed.

Brigades are contacted by concerned residents or residents of problem areas are contacted by Brigades. All Brigade members and Wardens are Volunteers who take time out from their busy lives to keep Communities safe from wild fires.


Immense organisation goes into planning the selected burn. Mapping of areas; consultation with land owners/land occupiers; Permits are written for all involved – TMR (if beside highways), RoadTek (if traffic control required); emails sent out to all members requesting assistance on given dates; requests for support members to cater for crews on the fire line throughout the day.

All this can take days and sometimes weeks to complete and then inclement weather could intervene. Departments, land owners, volunteers are notified again and everything is put on hold until favourable weather and volunteer crews are available once again.

So next time you are held up by smoke on the highway for a short while think of the hours that volunteers have put in to keep their Communities safe from wild fires often started by a thoughtless cigarette thrown from a passing car window.



A BEAUTIFUL NEW BOOK showcasing the endemic species of our region has naturalists and wildlife enthusiasts buzzing with excitement.

Eternal Endemism – the Wet Tropics, is a visually stunning celebration of the unique wildlife found only within Australia's World Heritage listed Wet Tropics. A labour of love between local authors and conservationists Craig Ward and Tim Hawkes, the book is the first in a series of comprehensive photographic compilations of every extant vertebrate of the focus region.

While Craig's vision is to create awareness for conservation on a global scale, he decided to start with his own back yard. "I wanted to showcase species that are only found in this region", Craig explains. "The Wet Tropics is probably one of the most critical of the World Heritage areas that are subject to the devastation of climate change."

While the book demonstrates every endemic frog, bird and mammal within a collection of full colour photographs, it's the cover photo of the elusive White-lemuroid, captured by Ravenshoe-based contributing photographer Jonathan Munro that has caused a stir amongst wildlife enthusiasts.

"Jonathan and I were staking out on Mount Lewis near Julatten," Craig explains. "It was pouring with rain and we had just about given up on photographing local possums when I caught a red eye flash with a very light body attached. When we realised it was a White-lemuroid we were like two little kids jumping up and down. Thankfully the possum just sat there having dinner and Jonathan was able to get the shot that appears on the front cover."

It was December 2014 and the survival of the Lemuroid Possum had been widely questioned over the past decade. Thankfully these recent photographs has brought new hope to the species recovery. "The White Lemuroid is the new 'Polar Bear' of climate change concern" Craig says. "It's reinforcing how vulnerable it is to even the slightest temperature change."

However it's not only our mammals that are facing the possibility of an uncertain future. The Kuranda Tree Frog, which has an extremely small distribution in the vicinity of Kuranda and is highly endangered, is now confronted with the additional threat of the Yellow Crazy Ant, one of the world's most invasive species. In fact Yellow Crazy Ant Community Taskforce Coordinator Mikhaila Jacoby recently photographed a Kuranda Tree Frog in Russett Park, crawling with Yellow Crazy Ants. "This book represents the wide range of endemic species in the Wet tropics, which strengthens the importance of eradicating Yellow Crazy Ants and protecting this region", Mikhaila says.

For many gardeners, pruning is sometimes a very much cut and miss decision. Important is the right tool and time for the job: Hand Pruners to cut branches to thumb size, Loppers on branches up to 10cm and for anything larger, a Pruning Saw.

Correct timing is essential for pruning success and except for spring flowering plants, the best time to prune most shrubs and trees is in late winter when they are in near dormant state. Before you start, think whether the plant needs a simple trimming or needs to be reduced to a more manageable size? Sometimes only dead branches and old flower heads need to be taken out.

Make sharp, clean cuts at a 30 to 45 degree angle, above some growth on the plant, such as a bud, a stem or a branch where new growth will develop at the site of the cut. For the plants to become better branched or to achieve a desired shape, you must determine where you want the new growth to occur. Just trimming the top of the plant will only result in new growth appearing mainly at the top. Selected pruning cuts at different heights and locations throughout the plant result in a better shaped and more vigorous plant. Check whether plants flower/fruit on old or new growth and prune accordingly. Roses should be pruned when the "eyes" or buds on the canes begin to swell and colour.

DATE CLAIMER: Sunday 6th September — Carnival on Collins, a must for both the novice and fanatical gardener. The whole family can find plenty to see and do so you won't have to feel too bad spending some time looking for that elusive "hard to find" for your plant collection. The Friends of the Flecker Botanical Gardens Plant Stall always carries a great range of interesting plants and expert advice is readily available from the hardworking Friends.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: Angiopteris evecta, **the King fern**, endemic to the rainforests of Queensland and the Northern Territory, is usually found along creeks where its roots can enter permanent water. With the world's largest fronds sometimes up to 7+m, these, when stressed, will become lax but regain turgidity when well-watered.

With Angiopteris spores having an extremely short viability, propagation may be effected by removing oracles, the ear like structures at base of the fronds. Removed in warmer weather with a clean, sharp cutting tool and pressed onto a very open potting mix (one part grit, sand, fine charcoal and perlite), and kept watered and covered, plants should be well established in under six months. When well grown, well watered and in a suitable spot (room should be maintained for frond spread), Angiopteris evicta makes a striking garden feature. Sometimes available and also known as the King or Potato fern is the close look-alike Marattia salacina. Smaller growing but requiring similar conditions, underground parts were used as an indigenous food source.

Q & **A**: *Dear Colin: Malpighia glabra*, Acerola or Barbados Cherry grows as an evergreen shrub or small tree requiring full sun and is fairly tolerant of most soils but dislikes poor drainage. Prune after fruiting and keep well watered and heavily mulched for good cropping. Subject to nematode infestation otherwise relatively pest free.

Dear Heidi: Thank you for your enquiry re flowering vine and the provision of pictures of flower and fruit – it certainly makes identification much easier and surer. The plant is *Stephanotis floribunda*, the Madagascan Jasmine or wedding flower as it is much used in wedding bouquets.

In order to provide the optimum environment for your Stephanotis, plant care should begin with the soil. These plants require a rich loamy, well drained soil that retains constant moisture. Plants should be fertilized with a half strength solution twice a month during the growing season, and the plants should be misted regularly since they demand a relative humidity level of 40 to 80 percent. Because of their need for warmth and constant moisture, Stephanotis plants are also susceptible to both mealybugs and scale. Summer temperatures are more flexible for Stephanotis flowers as long as averages remain around 70-80°F. (22°C). They prefer cooler nights of 55-60°F. (13-16°C). Since they are tropical in nature, they require medium to bright light, but tend to burn in direct sunlight.

Easily grown from seed sown in warming weather or somewhat slow to take off. Semi-hardwood cuttings maybe taken in spring. Allow ends to dry off and then plant in sandy mix.



Dear Mark: Sorry, maybe a Reader is able to help as plant or seed in Australia and seed only occasionally appears on O/S listings. Bauhinia grandidieri, the Blue Orchid tree, hailing from Madagascar is a prime Bonsai subject given its small, bluish-cast leaves, elegant form and ongoing flowering during the warmer months. Frost tender, if planted out it will grow 2-3m, requiring full sun and good drainage.

Cook Shire Council votes against Genetically Modified Canola being grown in Cook Shire

The Cook Shire Council Mayor Peter Scott said after the vote, "The introduction of crops which have been genetically modified to withstand pesticides and herbicides goes against our region's clean green branding, which is a selling point for many of our producers and is something Council will not support."

"Although canola isn't grown in Cook Shire, continued expansion of agriculture at Lakeland and potential development of Cape York earmarked in the Northern Australia White Paper all point to increased agricultural growth in the near future; and the potential negative repercussions of genetically modified crops is something we need to be aware of. Use of this crop would encourage more broadacre use of Roundup, which has negative flow on effect to the environment and the clean, green marketing image of our produce.'

Submissions Now Due On a 20,500 Hectare Cotton Farm **Proposed for the Gulf Country**

A \$200 million cotton farm and cotton processing plant proposed for Glenore Station, 90 km south of Normanton, also known as the Three Rivers Irrigation Project, will bid for the allocation of 150,000 Mega/litres annually from the Flinders River. As cotton is one of the heaviest users of pesticides a large chemical storage facility will also need to be built.

There is growing concern by some that the chemical and sediment runoff from this project will damage the aquatic ecosystems of the Flinders River as well as the important Gulf of Carpentaria fishing industry. The Coordinator-General has released the draft Terms of Reference for public and government agency comment. The public and government advisory agencies are invited to comment on whether the draft TOR adequately covers all the matters the project proponent must address when preparing the EIS. Submissions close at 5 pm on 31st August 2015.

Council Now To Allow Bats to Stay In Their Nursery and **Roost Trees by the Cairns Library**

After recently spending \$150,000 trying to remove the threatened flying-foxes from their home beside the Library by heavy pruning and cutting down their roost trees, the Cairns Council has now agreed to let them stay there. The Council has announced a new \$165,000 plan for managing the flying-fox colony in the heritage-listed fig tree known as the "nursery tree" – with the setting up of a Cairns Flying-fox Advisory Committee to guide and oversee their care The over-pruned and now damaged nursery tree and management.



At the time the Council were told by bat experts that it would be a waste of time and money trying to disperse this colony because it would just spread them all around the Cairns CBD – which is what happened. The Cairns Council and their contractors are now facing prosecution and fines from the Department of Environment and Heritage Protection for eight charges over allegedly noncompliant pruning last year - with the council now facing maximum penalties of nearly \$500,000 if convicted.

Mission Beach Cassowary Centre Given Enough Funds For Another Three Months

Queensland Environment Minister Steven Miles has made available \$50,000 of emergency funding to enable the Garner's Beach Rehabilitation Facility to continue accepting cassowary chicks for another three months. This however is not enough money to enable the centre to accept injured adult cassowaries, which will have to be euthanased instead.

The State Treasurer Curtis Pitt said of this \$50,000, "This isn't 'reinstated' funding – it's new funding – because the Garner's

Beach Rehabilitation Centre was never funded by the government previously (in fact the former LNP Government refused to even acknowledge the endangered status of this magnificent bird)." He also added, "The Palaszczuk Government is committed to the long term future of the centre and to supporting efforts to care for Queensland's endangered wildlife, including our iconic cassowary."

The Rehabilitation Centre has been operated by Rainforest Rescue since 2014 who wanted to prevent the government from closing the centre down then. However without long term funding being actually committed for the centre and for rangers to be able to pick up injured or orphaned cassowaries - these birds will have to be put down. This is unacceptable considering there are thought to be from 1000 to 4000 cassowaries left in the wild. Injured cassowaries can be reported to EHP on 1300 130 372.





creativity. When making soap, the creative possibilities are endless. Choosing & combining ingredients or materials, colours, textures

and combining them to create a new product is what artists do - they use their imagination and skill to create something new and unique.



special form of art. Unlike other forms of art where all stages of the creative process can be controlled, the outcome of the soap making process is often unpredictable.

Thorough knowledge of the chemistry and science behind the saponification process as well as precise calculations and temperature control are necessary to achieve a desired design. Sometimes however, unpredictable reactions can still occur, even with



enough experience, such as the batter thickening too fast and this making it impossible to achieve a certain design.

Unlike with most other forms of art, to see the

final product, the realisation of one's imaginary

creation, patience is required. It often takes one to two days for the soap to be hard enough to be cut and the internal design to be revealed, and then another 4 weeks of curing until the soap can be used.

Soap making is an elaborate process, but for me it is a passion and a labour of love, Erika.

Day 1 - character design, cotton and latex wounds, *lunch*, sculpted wounds.

Erika's Soap making (left) is just such an art. Sure her creations look good, but they also have a distinctive aroma and texture that can take you to far away places. 

Ripples in the billabong

Once an angel stood at the gates of Eden, the Garden of Delight, humming a heavenly song, but now beneath a baleful blue flashing light the cops control the road to and from the billabong as if it were a crime scene, an outlaw bikie den or a place that is contagious and not a place of harmony, a haven where pilgrims meet in love and peace, and mutual respect

moving to a primaeval beat awareness growing of the ties that bind us to each other and the world around us.

Yet all who enter and later seek to leave are presumed suspect, as agents of disorder, of chaos and the unruly and duly asked to show their driver's license or some form of identification, to give a sample of their breath, a swab of their saliva as proof of their insobriety, of their intoxication.

Within an hour or so of entering the festival the subject felt lighter, like a balloon shedding ballast as anxiety dropped away he freed himself from gravity's sway.

The subject felt feelings of mental stimulation and enhanced sensory perception. and put it down to aesthetic direction and not the bottle of Corona purchased at the bar and consumed within parameters marked out with tape watched over by custodians of happiness the poker-faced security who all looked glum observing others having all the fun.

Lotus lanterns floating in the billabong like a dream or a meditation.

> Luminous datura flowers hanging from the trees along the path casting psychoactive pollen from their angel trumpets.

The subject became aware of distortions in time as the hands of his watch kept stopping.

> He lost twenty minutes here and an hour there the subject did not care.

In his ears he heard melody and rhythm wafting across the waters so entrancing like an invitation to rejoice in timelessness, eternity and to dance like Shiva Nataraja free from ignorance and the sway of gravity.

The subject felt out of his body quite ecstatic as though the ripples in the billabong were waves of love and communitas. He felt waves of empathy welling up in him when strangers smiled or when he heard the sounds of human laughter.



Alabama Shakes: 'Sound and Colour'

■his knock-out second album, debuting at No. 1 in their own country, clearly shows why this band has risen so high in the last few years. Its stuffed full of cool stuff - old and new, brimming with songs recognisably of their roots but spinning into wild new forms. It draws you in with a classic-sounding feel before flooding you with delicious puzzlement as to where the songs are actually going. It's choice stuff.

The singer has one of the greatest voices we've heard in many years - reminiscent of the sly

soul of Macy Gray or Prince, sometimes falsetto, then busting out gutsy and raw like Janis Joplin or Etta James. She says her vocal style comes from Bon Scott. No mistake though, Brittany Howard's got her own very special thing - check out the casually heart-wrenching song 'Gimme all Your Love' for a strong taste of what she's capable of doing to you.

The other **Shakes** ain't no slouches either, slipping from jazzed out soul and street blues to manic punk and Who and Stones Brit rock. Alabama Shakes are pretty tight and intense; their energy levels high, quivering with each song's mood. They have rock band line-up coloured with soaring organ chords and catchy vibraphone lines, fuzz guitar power chords and some beautifully weird tempos.

'Sound and Colour' is sure easy to like with its southern soul rock feel but they sound absolutely modern - never comfortable or lazy with reverence. They play up and muck around with your mind, keeping your ears on their toes. Fearlessly eccentric, with a spring of fresh ideas and heaps of raw panache this young band has made an album that will you leave you delightfully shaken and stirred.





Big Emotions. Little Bodies. Pranayama For Kids.

Breath is the energy of life. When we learn how to harness and control this very important life force it is called Pranayama. There are so many different pranayama exercises we practise in yoga.

When we change our breathing we can change our moods and relax our muscles. If we breathe slow and deep we can calm down. If we breath fast and short it can make us energised and more alert. When uncomfortable or emotional situations create a reaction in our body, we can learn how to control that reaction and change how it makes us feel. Learning yoga breathing helps with stress, anxiety, intense emotions, self control and brings about a more focused and calm mind. When yoga movement is combined with yoga breathing the body responds with less resistance and tension. The outcome is a more relaxed and progressive practise. Bringing a mindful and meditative state into each movement.


Below are just three practices that we use regularly in class when exploring the breath. We do at least three cycles of breathing. One cycle consists of a full inhale and a full exhale.


LION BREATH: This one is good for frustration. Sit on heels or in lotus pose. Place hands on thighs or on the mat in front of you with fingers stretched out. Breath in deeply thru nose. Exhale with effort through mouth and

stick your tongue out as far as you can while you look towards the sky. Lean forward into your hands. If in lotus come up onto the knees and lean forward during exhale. Lion breath exhale is almost like screaming silently. It can remove tense energy. This breath is fun for kids to practise and often leaves them feeling happier.

BALLOON BREATH: This breath is more focused on the belly. Imagine you have a balloon in your belly. As you breathe in, the balloon inflates and makes your belly fill with air. As you exhale your balloon deflates and your belly draws in as all the oxygen leaves the lungs. It may be easier to practise this one with a weight on the belly like an eye pillow or just your hands. This allows you to notice the rise and fall of the breath. Often when you ask someone to take a deep breath they draw in the belly and puff up the chest. We are so use to shallow chest breathing, deep belly breathing can feel strange at first. Drawing oxygen all the way down into the bottom of the lungs creates a calming effect on the brain and changes our mood as we focus on our breath. Great for times of high anxiety or nervousness. So if you're stressed try balloon breath.

ART: Other ways we can explore our breath is with straw art. Take a straw and some watered down paint. Dip the straw into the paint and let it drop onto the paper. Blow into the straw to move the paint without touching it with anything but the breath. (For very young children, put a hole in the top side of the straw to prevent accidental paint drinking).





Osteoporosis

OSTEOPOROSIS is a common disease affecting over one million Australians. This disease makes bones become brittle leading to a higher risk of breaks than in normal bones.

Osteoporosis occurs when bones lose minerals, such as calcium, more quickly than the body can replace them, causing a loss of bone thickness (bone density or mass).

When this occurs bones become thinner and less dense, and even a minor bump or fall can cause a serious fracture. A 'fracture' is a complete or partial break in a bone. Any bone can be affected by osteoporosis, but the most common sites are the hip, spine and wrist.

Osteoporosis usually has no symptoms until a fracture occurs this is why osteoporosis is often called the 'silent disease'.

Women are at a greater risk of developing osteoporosis because of the rapid decline in oestrogen levels during menopause.

When oestrogen levels decrease, bones lose calcium and other minerals at a much faster rate, resulting in bone loss of approximately 2% per year occurs for several years after menopause.

Men also lose bone density as they age, however testosterone levels in men decline more gradually so their bone mass remains adequate till later in life. Both men and women may have certain 'risk factors' that can make them more likely to develop osteoporosis.

Risk factors can include but are not limited to:

- A family history of osteoporosis
- Low calcium and vitamin D levels
- Your medical history (medical conditions such as early menopause, low testosterone, hyperthyroidism or hyperparathyroidism, conditions leading to malabsorption e.g. coeliac disease or IBS, some chronic diseases e.g. rheumatoid arthritis, chronic kidney disease)

- Certain medications i.e. corticosteroids, some medications used to treat breast cancer, prostate cancer, epilepsy and some antidepressants.
- Also certain lifestyle factors i.e. low levels of physical activity, smoking, excessive alcohol intake, weight conditions.



Anyone with specific risk factors for osteoporosis or anyone over the age of 50 who experiences a broken bone from a minor bump or fall should be investigated for osteoporosis. There are multiple treatments available from the GP which can help people with diagnosed osteoporosis.

Prevention is better than cure

To ensure healthy bones adults require 1,000 mg of calcium per day (preferably attained through diet). This amount increases to 1,300 mg per day for women over 50 and men over 70. Vitamin D plays an essential role for bone health because it helps absorb calcium, a lack of sun exposure can mean you are not getting enough vitamin D which your body needs to absorb

calcium.

With our sun in North Queensland sun exposure of 5-15 minutes (depending on your skin colour) is adequate to obtain the daily requirement of vitamin D.

Calcium supplements vary widely in their strength, the form in which the calcium is available and the all important cofactors that assist the body to absorb

calcium adequately.

The type of calcium product you choose will contain calcium in a certain form e.g. calcium carbonate, calcium gluconate, calcium hydroxiapitate, calcium citrate etc.

Each form of calcium is absorbed differently in the body, some far more absorbable than others, resulting in the body having different levels of calcium uptake despite ingesting the same dose of calcium in a supplement.

It's preferable to take a more absorbable form of calcium such as the hydroxiapitate and the citrate, over less absorbable calcium in the carbonate form. 99% of the body's calcium is stored in the bones and teeth and people are likely to become aware of deficiency through breaks or

It is more successful to preserve the bodies bone density by consuming adequate calcium and reducing the risk of osteoporosis than trying to rebuild calcium when the bones are osteoporotic.

Calcium requires cofactors (other nutrients) to assist in calcium absorption.

These include Vitamin D3, magnesium, boron and vitamin K. Vitamin D has shown to increase calcium absorption in the intestine which is why it is an important partner to calcium in preserving bone



reatures of Kuranda

This handsome chap, very likely to be an unknown nocturnal visitor to your own backyard, is the Eastern Tube-nosed Bat (Nyctimene robinsoni).



He is labelled as one of the "megabats", but at 50 or so grams he is somewhat overshadowed by his much larger relatives, the Flying-foxes (up to 1 kilo).

Inhabiting the east coast in patches from the Cape down to northern NSW, primarily in rainforest and wet woodlands, he is also found in urban areas with plentiful native fruits, figs and flowers.

In contrast to his larger relatives, the Tube-nosed Bat does not live in large colonies: rather he is a solitary creature although may gather in small groups where a food source is plentiful.

Also in contrast to his larger relatives, he is not nomadic as is, for example, the Little Red Flying-fox, which is known to travel hundreds of kilometres to follow the flowering seasons of various natives.

The little Nyctimene is generally a home-body, and prefers to find a food source such as some native figs or other fruiting or flowering natives, and set up home within a few hundred metres – a short flight from pantry to bed, you might say.

As can be seen from the photos, the Nyctimene is a colourful bat, easily distinguished by a dark stripe down his spine, light to dark brown body gradating to grey on the head; yellow and green spots on wings and ears that are amazingly effective in camouflage. A mate of ours was a tour guide on one of the Daintree River boats, and for many months used to delight in taking tourists to a Nyctimene who regularly roosted on a particular branch overhanging the river, at eye level. In dappled sunlight, nine out of ten tourists couldn't spot the beast in the branch only a few metres away, until carefully pointed out. (Obviously ol' Nyc didn't mind being the object of tourism papparazzi or he'd have found somewhere else to roost.)



The purpose of the dual tube nostrils has been debated by science and researchers over the years. Originally it was thought that it was merely a breathing aid developed to allow the bat to gobble greedily into messy, juicy fruit, but observations have shown that they do not actually eat messy, juicy fruit, but are rather dainty eaters of figs, small fruit and nectar. Opinion now is that the nostrils, which can move, open and close independently, are used to carefully scan for aromas to locate their preferred food.

The wings of the Nyctimene are

short and broad and suited to brief, manoeuvring flights through the forest, in contrast to the Flying-foxes which are adept at high altitude, long distance flight. This gives the Nyctimene the rather unique ability to actually 'hover' for a few seconds, and have even been observed to change direction whilst hovering.

If you have any native figs, guava, soursop trees or flowering natives in your yard, chances are you will no doubt have an Eastern Tube-nosed Bat or two roosting nearby.



The Earth's True Rulers

Although we humans have colonised almost every part of this planet, wiped out many other species and even changed its appearance so much that evidence of our activity is visible from space, we still don't rule the roost. This title belongs to a group of animals which we often see as insignificant, however, they comprise of 99 percent of all animal life on Earth. This group of course is the invertebrates.

The term invertebrate actually means 'without vertebrae' – without a backbone, and it is these little creatures which we rely on for the lives we live. The roles these animals play are critical in our survival as we know it, but most of them go about their business without being appreciated or even noticed by us.

I am often asked by people in regard to an animal, "What is its purpose?" What they usually mean is, "Does it directly benefit me?" Sometimes the 'purpose' of an animal or the role it plays within in an ecosystem doesn't seem to directly benefit humans. However, this does not mean that it is not a critical part of an ecological jigsaw puzzle. Often this species may benefit another species which in turn benefits us. More often than not, the ecological interactions are so complex we cannot know for sure what impact each species has until we upset the balance in some way, usually with disastrous consequences. Nevertheless invertebrates are often ignored, and many conservation activities tend to revolve around single large vertebrate species which in many cases do not have the same ecological significance – they are just big, cute and cuddly, so we figure they must be saved.

Invertebrates perform some critical roles essential for life on Earth to continue the way we are familiar with it. It is not a single species performing these roles, but masses of them all doing their bit. Without invertebrate pollinators we wouldn't have flowering plants, agricultural crops, or the forests which we rely on to survive. Millions of small creatures clean up our wastes and work away breaking down all sorts of organic things back into the soil. Each day billions of

Honeybees are a good example of an invertebrate which we have come to rely on. They pollinate orchards and crops and have a value to the Australian economy of around 3.8 billion dollars per year. Of course, they have the added bonus of producing honey. However, the Honeybee is currently under threat from the Varroa mite (Varroa destructor) – a mite which attacks bees in their hives. In many countries, agricultural industries are being brought to their knees as the bee numbers plummet, but as the mite has yet to reach Australia, we are not yet affected. The quirk to this story is that because we knowingly rely on Honeybees so much, we have bred them into much greater numbers than ever before and spread a once European species all over the world. Nature doesn't tend to allow this without some form of recoil, and through some means a balance is usually restored. We are now resisting the balance and fighting the Veroa mite to protect our beloved Honeybees.

Balance means that each species functions with some form of natural control in place. Often the natural control consists of other species managing the numbers by predation, parasitism, or transmitting disease. Invertebrates, due to their size and number, are often pivotal in controlling other species, as well as each other. As humans we have worked very hard to remove or block our controls, and we have subsequently bred and expanded all over the planet. One thing is for sure - our supposed reign cannot go on forever and at some point, whether it is the destruction of our planets ability to sustain us or some other self-made disaster, our species will be brought back to Earth with a thud, and the invertebrates will be there to clean up our mess.





PROFILE Steve Dominikovic

Our profile this month is of Steve Dominikovic, well known as the proprietor of Kuranda Real Estate. It is a story of hardship, tragedy, grit and hard work - the story of a self-made man who has made the most he can out of a very difficult early life.

Born in Croatia during the War, the country at that time was in turmoil. It had been occupied by the Germans and the Italians. When they were pushed out the country turned communist under Tito. His father was part of the anti-communist partisan resistance fighters, with the result that their house was burned down. The father left, and Steve as a sole child was brought up by his mother in very poor circumstances. Then his mother was taken to a slave labour camp when he was six years old, leaving him in the care of his grandmother. They did not have enough to eat. Steve had some schooling up to grade six but had to grow up fast, working to raise a little money. Later the

grandfather immigrated to Australia, and he in turn sponsored Steve to immigrate here in 1960 as a teenager. His mother followed the next year.

Steve had hoped to continue schooling in Australia but the family's financial circumstances did not allow it. He went cutting cane around the north coast at 16 year of age. It was hard work. Steve was becoming stronger and very determined. Enough money was saved to buy a house in Cairns. The family was a close one in the Croatian tradition.

In 1970 Steve and his wife Helen moved up to the Mareeba region to share-farm tobacco. He met his wife Helen from New Zealand and they married there in 1969. In 1971 Steve was able to buy a small tobacco farm in Koah with house, on which he began his own tobacco crops, later adding mangoes and lychees. At that time Koah had about 16 tobacco growers. It was more hard work. But the writing was on the wall for the tobacco industry, so Steve eventually sold his tobacco quota. Instead, he did the real estate salesman's licence course and then joined Reef Coast Realty in Cairns in 1978. A few years later he undertook the TAFE two year part time course to get his real estate licence.

In 1983 he and another formed the partnership comprising Barron Falls Realty. It was a small start but soon was selling properties all over the Tableland. He found he had the right attributes for the business. Then he sold out of that business and the property on which it was located in Kuranda and purchased the block on the corner of Coondoo and Thongon Streets with Post Office. He then started up Kuranda Real



Estate on his own from that property, developing the buildings and moving his office there. He has been there ever since.

His wife Helen ran the Post Office for seven years. They had three children. Regrettably his daughter, a psychologist, was tragically killed in a car crash. His other daughter lives in Cairns. His son now works in Kuranda Real Estate. That business has expanded into property development, with a large five acre subdivision in Koah. They still live in Koah.


Steve has been active in the Kuranda community for many years. He was a member of Kuranda Lions from 1978 to 1988 with two terms as President. He was an inaugural member of Kuranda Rotary, serving one term as President and seven years as Treasurer, an office which he still holds. He has been on the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce since 1984, except for one gap in time, was Treasurer for

five years and is still a member. He and his wife sponsor a child in World Vision. Helen also does volunteer work at the school. In spare time Steve plays golf.

Steve avoids politics, including in respect of his homeland. He is a naturalised Australian and is here to stay. Brought up as a strict Catholic, he is now nonpractising. His philosophy in life can be explained largely by his history. He says that if you really want to get somewhere, you have to plan, work hard, believe in what you do, and stick with it to do well. He believes in looking after yourself and being honest to yourself. But it is not a purely selfish philosophy as it embraces helping others in need if you can. And when doing so, it must be without any prejudices based on the person. He illustrates this by noting that he successfully employed Aboriginal workers on the farm on normal working terms and conditions over a long time. He strongly believes in ethics in life and business, including being honest, and sticking to your promises, including those made on a handshake. Some people may regard him as a tough businessman, but he prides himself in also being ethical, and away from work he is happiest spending his time with his family.

Inside My Studio

Local Kuranda artist, **Raewyn Roberts**, has been active in the field of art since she was a child. She has always been drawing, colouring and painting. After involving herself in a number of mediums she realised she must return to that field in which she did best, which is acrylic painting. Raewyn chooses to paint at her open veranda easel where there is always that ever changing light and form that can only be found outdoors, a freshness that is frequently missing in an enclosed studio. There is so much beauty to be shared and relived on canvas and Raewyn finds a blank canvas is an irresistible challenge. Her statements and colour are rich and strong and she works on a creation of a moment in time for others to enjoy.

Where is your current studio?

My studio is on one end of the upstairs veranda at my home in Kuranda overlooking my rainforest garden. I have just over an acre of extensive tropical rainforest and I am lucky to have over 200 *licuala ramsyii*, (Kuranda Fan Palm), most over 100 years old. I love them and will always take care of them. They are such a beautiful palm.

Do you work alone or with others?

I always work alone but did take a year away from my solitude to work in collaboration with a local aboriginal artist, Roslyn Serico. A series of 10 paintings were created and can be viewed at the Yuku Baja Muliku Land and Sea Centre, 142 Charlotte Street, Cooktown or on www.artoftheearth.com.au along with some of my current work still available for sale. It was a most rewarding and interesting exercise – two artists on one canvas, two egos trying not to overpower but indeed complementing each other's style for the good of the painting and the message we wished to convey.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

I really need room to move; to be able to stand back from my paintings and take in the process. I need good natural light, and most of all now, my lovely outlook. I could not be without that peace for my inspiration.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

I usually start painting in the morning. If I am 'into it' then I stick to it all day. Time in my studio is precious and I paint as often as I can. I have family responsibilities on certain days during the week and my grandchildren delight me most weekends with their visits.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

I paint varied subjects with acrylics on canvas, whatever takes my fancy at the time. My early works were mostly of people. I was interested in the colours that could enhance skin tones. My clown series took this to the maximum. Then I briefly moved on to old trucks but scenery was beginning to fascinate me too. Reflections and the colours in water are still holding my interest. Back in the 80s I had a very successful hand painted T-shirt business. This extended to belts, shoes, swimsuits and lots of hats. I enjoyed creating new designs but tired eventually of the repetition. I yearned to go back to my first love of creating paintings.

Why is acrylic painting your chosen medium?

I like to paint fast and acrylic dries very quickly allowing me to go over any colour that I feel is wrong or could be better. I also love that I can wash up in water.

Growing up I was fascinated with my mother's beautiful drawings of 1930s movie

stars. I greatly admired her skill at capturing their likeness. She even let me colour in some of them when I was too young to know better. Even back then I needed to see colour. [Raewyn produced a couple of pencil drawings, encased in protective plastic, which her mother did so many years ago. They are remarkable, although the paper is now discolouring



slightly with age and climate.] I attended Otahuhu College, New Zealand to do a University Entrance art course and passed. I won a scholarship at Sydney Art school. Another year was spent under the tuition of Joy Stewart in Cairns. But really I'm self taught. I've won a Cairns Show prize and placed second in a Mareeba Art Society exhibition. I also painted and won best shop window for the "Cairns Fun in the Sun" (as it was called then). Over the years I should have entered more competitions but didn't see the need.

List three things you listen to while working.

I am really into Roy Orbison and Adele. I find their DVDs addictive and play them over and over. I sometimes have the TV on but I am only listening, not watching. I have a CD in the car by local musician Dave Cook. I love it and play that continually.

Your favourite tool?

I have more than one favourite, but my paint brushes top the list. I always buy good quality brushes, mainly sable or the likes. Cotton buds would feature predominately too as I use them all the time for tidying up any fine line work. Chalk sticks, just plain white, are necessary in my initial grafting up process once I've painted in the background. When I block in the colour and wipe away the excess, the rest just seems to disappear into the paint. I couldn't work without any of these items.

How do you identify your work?

I used to sign just 'Raewyn' but now I use my full name 'Raewyn Roberts' as a signature, that way people will be able to find me if they wish. I date my artworks and add the copyright sign also.

How do you sell your work?

I sell privately, through galleries including the Kuranda Arts Co-op and the Cooktown Gallery, commissions and through my two websites. I can also be found on the "Colour in Your Life" site – a remarkable TV program for artists to display their works and learn from others.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

I used to teach primary school children, 9, 10 and 11 years of age. There was nothing for them in the way of specific art tuition at their school and I was approached by the parents to fill that void. I have not taught for a few years, in fact, not since I moved to Kuranda, as any available time I have now is of the essence and is committed to my own art practice.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid work?

I am a rostered volunteer at the Kuranda Arts Co-op gallery and a volunteer at Possum Corner in Kuranda. The last four years I've been carer for my brother and this has allowed me more time to paint and garden. I don't have much time for anything else.



I am currently having 'turkey wars', catching and relocating scrub turkeys at a rate of knots. They are so destructive as any gardener knows. I dream that one day I may be able to take down all the ugly wire fencing protecting my new plants.




(hapter 17 The Barron River Valley was the site of the working quarry where the builders of the Cairns to Kuranda Railway sourced their ballast for the railway tracks.

To the left of the Barron River Valley is where the original township of Smithfield was located on the Barron River. In its heyday, Smithfield was a town much larger than Cairns. Smithfield was a traveller's town, with many hotels and lodging houses. It was considered by some to be a "town of sin". Palmer Kate brought her girls down from the Palmer River, when the gold ran out and she set up her house in Smithfield. A very wealthy Madam, she boasted a chamber pot of solid gold for her exclusive use. Her house was called the Golden Pot and was washed away by a severe flood in 1879 and to this day, the gold pot has never been found.

few hundred metres below Barron Falls Station stands a rock so impressive that it came to be recognised as a monument to the skill of the builder, John Robb. John Robb, the man who built the Cairns to Kuranda Railway line had a successful track record with railway lines that he had built in Victoria, New South Wales and South Australia. He was known to be a deeply sensitive man who effectively had a way with managing his workers. Upon his departure from Cairns he was



farewelled with great regard from civic and business leaders, his workers and the community. Robb's Monument still stands today which passengers are able to see on their Kuranda Scenic Railway journey. Many English, Irish, Chinese and Italian workmen laboured relentlessly on the construction of this line. At one time the Italian flag was flown from Robb's Monument to let all know of their presence and courage.

(hapter 19 Riding the Cowcatcher to Barron Falls!

A local author named Ellis Rowal had claimed in her book *Flower-Hunter* to have travelled on the Cairns to Kuranda railway line when it was built up to Barron Falls Station in 1887, on no less the cowcatcher of a locomotive. She recalled: "I have now travelled on the



cowcatcher of an express engine. I wouldn't have missed the experience, but have no wish to try it again. The line by which I have travelled has only been open for four months, and it is by far the most beautiful, they say, in Australia."

Chinese Pioneers

The Chinese presence in the far north dates back to 1873 when the days of gold were discovered on the Palmer River and throughout the Etheridge shire. However the gold rush was over nearly as quickly it began. Many Chinese returned to mainland China with great fortunes or



remained to find alternative occupations. The area of Freshwater Valley saw many Chinese settle and grow large scale crops of bananas, pineapples and citrus fruits. In 1887 the Cairns to Kuranda railway line had reached Redlynch so the Chinese market gardener would send their produce to Cairns on the new rail line which was then shipped south each week.



The Cairns-Kuranda Railway line opened for goods traffic

On June 15th 1891, Mr Johnstone, one of three Railway Commissioners at that time, opened the line for goods traffic only. Just ten days later, the Cairns-Kuranda Railway line was opened to tourist traffic. Kuranda became very



popular with holiday makers and was advertised as "The Niagara of Australia". Kuranda also became a very popular honeymoon spot for the locals who would travel to Kuranda via rail after their wedding ceremonies. Soon Kuranda Station became known as "Honeymoon Station" due to the considerable flood of newly married couples.







The Language of Pets

Animal Language not only allows our pets to talk and understand each other, it's a vital form of communication for creatures that live together. Many examples of communication take place between members of different species. Animals talk to other animals with various signs: visual, sound, echolocation, vibrations, body language, and smell. Obviously each different kind has their own type of language and the majority of animal communication occurs within a single species.

Dogs for example are social creatures that live together in the wild. As such, they need a language in order to get along as survival depends on every dog in the group staying healthy and productive. To a doggie pack, conflicts are dangerous as they cause physical injuries and a weakened pack which is something no pack can afford. This means that dog language not only allows dogs to communicate and understand each other but practice effective conflict resolution. In fact we humans could learn a lot from our canine companions. Not only do dogs talk to each other via a intricate system of sign language, vocalisation and scent which includes body posture, fur elevation, tail semaphore, and use of eyes but they are very adept at using calming signals to ward off possible fights. Dogs have an incredibly rich vocabulary using specific signals in stressful situations they encounter with other dogs – and humans. Yawning, licking, turning of the head, sniffing the ground, laying down with the belly against the ground, making the face round and smooth with the ears flat against the head, are all signs the dog is trying to calm you, itself and or another dog. Added to



that, much dog-to-dog communication is done through smell, hence, much to our disgust, butt-sniffing or in doggy language the 'doggy handshake.' When one dog greets another with a nose in his bottom, it's basically getting a brief biography of its new friend, written in molecules and pheromones. To the sides of a dog's butt are pouches called anal sacs; these contain glands which secrete chemicals that can tell a sniffer a lot of information about their owner, like gender, reproductive status, and clues about its health, diet and even emotional state.

Cat talk and cat language on the other hand is a little more puzzling. Feline communication is predominantly a silent language, however like dogs, they do use a complex language of sign, vocalisation and scent cues. As well as meowing, purring, hissing and growling cats use their eyes, ears and tail to communicate intent. Just like our canine companions, a cat's posture indicates everything from confidence to fear and submission. Even the height of the tail as well as the motion has meaning. A flailing or thumping tail is usually a signal to keep your distance.

Even horses will hold their ears, heads and tails to convey their mood. Ears that are slightly forward indicate that a horse is relaxed while ears pricked forward means he's interested. On the other hand ears that are flattened back are a clear signal your horse is upset. Added to that, the way a horse is holding its head means different things. If your horse is shaking his head and lowering his head slightly and moving his neck from side to side he is showing signs of aggression. Tails swishing can also indicate agitation and a warning for other horses to keep their distance.

While birds mostly communicate by making vocal sounds, such as thrills, squawks, clicks and singing, they also communicate by beating their wings and performing visual displays. Evidence suggests that singing, in part, is to proclaim and defend their territories. Studies have also shown that songs play a crucial role in attracting and impressing potential mates and as in humans, singing in birds is often a chance to simply show off.

We may have more in common with our furry companions that we realised.

Dog Registration Renewal

Council issued a number of infringement notices to people who failed to register their dog or update their dog registration details by the due date of 30th June 2015. Council has decided to withdraw these infringement notices as a result of a minor administrative error in the renewal notices where an incorrect BPAY number was provided.

"Dog owners now have until Friday 4th September to pay their dog registration or update the details. After this date any person with an outstanding dog registration or found to be keeping an unregistered dog will be issued with a fresh infringement notice," Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

"Where Council impounds your unregistered dog it will cost a minimum of \$210 to have it released, plus registration fees and microchipping costs as well as sustenance fees if impounded for longer than 24 hours," Cr Gilmore said.

"Where Council impounds your registered dog it will be returned at no cost on the first occasion (provided you have a proper enclosure) and at significantly lower costs (starting from \$80) on the subsequent impoundment," Mayor Gilmore said.

The Animal Management Act requires for all dogs to be registered, so Council is encouraging everyone to register their animals before Friday 4th September to avoid any fees or fines.

The Happy Potter

A new mini-film, *The Happy Potter*, featuring a notable local artist, is scheduled for broadcast nationally on ABC News24 at: 11.55am, 5.55pm and 4.25am (following day) Sydney time, Wednesday 2nd September.

About the film:

Deep within the rainforests of Kuranda, Far North Queensland, lurks a master ceramicist.

For forty years, Peter Thompson has laboured long and hard in the tireless pursuit of art, no matter the cost.

The bulk of Thompson's days are spent gathering the raw materials — digging up clay from rivers, creeks and road cuttings, and collecting and stacking wood — in the heavy tropical heat.

Next, a carefully selected mix of minerals from across the region is lovingly fermented in a French porcelain bathtub. The matured soft clay lulled into wondrous organic shapes on a simple stick wheel.

Once a year, the completed pots are fired for three days straight with temperatures reaching over 1300 $^{\circ}$ C in a home-made Anagama kiln — a traditional Chinese high temperature wood-fired tunnel kiln.

During the firing, wood ash and volatile salts settle on the clay, and the interaction between flame, ash and minerals creates a rich natural glaze. And as all the clay and wood is sourced locally, Thompson's works are wholly unique with a distinct provenance and flavour.

Thompson has studied in China and elsewhere, plus he helped make India's



first Anagama kiln. After many years of dedicated experimentation, Thompson has achieved international standing. Overseas students travel to Kuranda to work alongside him, and collectors in the know hunt him down in his hidden studio to pounce on his pots.

But most of all, Thompson's very own being has been shaped and given lustre in the knowledge — indeed, the hallowed bliss — he is truly living a life well-lived.



Local Marketeer Helps Truckies

I retired 18 months ago from driving long distances interstate, all over Australia (1200-1400kms a day, every day).

When 'my Man' died in 1999 (he drove Brisbane/Sydney/Melbourne) there was no help or support for partners or families.

The Trans-Help Foundation, National Transport Support Service, began in 2006. The founder (Dianne Carroll) was given an OAM (Order of Australia) in 2010, for her outstanding contribution to the Transport Industry.

Trans-Help have a small fleet of Ford Transit vans, decked out with medical equipment (like an ambulance) and staffed by volunteer medical personnel, visiting major Roadhouses around the country, giving checkups to drivers.

It is not possible to pull up a B-double or Road-train in country towns or anywhere, so the driver can visit a doctor. Also it is almost impossible trying to make an appointment in advance, in the city or the bush. He may not be in the right part of town, free of work, able to safely leave his truck, at the correct time.

If I can pay for another tank or so of diesel, to keep a van on the road just a little longer, then perhaps I can save a life. This is my way of giving back. So I sell quality 18k Gold & 925 Silver jewellery to raise support for Trans-Help.



August was a very busy month which saw my time divided between Finance and Administration Committee and Budget Estimate Committee meetings at Parliament and meetings in the electorate.

A big thank you to the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce which called a public meeting to address issues which resulted in the Kuranda Range Road being closed for lengthy times last month due to accidents.

The meeting raised a number of issues that I am currently addressing with Main Roads and I will continue to liaise with the chamber.

Several weeks ago I showed Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey the shabby condition of the Henry Ross Lookout on the Kuranda Range. As a result of the visit he established a \$3m Scenic Lookout Fund with up to \$300k available per site with a council contribution.

I have held meetings with the Mayor who is very supportive and also staff from Wet Tropics Management who have indicated they will provide interpretive signage to inform tourists of the unique local environment.

The Cairns Post ran a story on my advocacy for the lookout and as a result I was contacted by members of Rotary who informed me about the history of the vandalised cairn at the lookout.

It was the first memorial to the Battle of the Coral Sea and was unveiled in 1952 which was attended by Australian and American military and dignitaries from Rotary International. This is a very significant memorial and amazingly, due to the recent publicity [Kuranda Paper, September 2014 edition] it has turned up having been found a number of years ago at the tip, albeit in need of some restoration.

Still on the subject of Kuranda, congratulations to KurandaCoots, a Circus, Comedy, Cabaret entertainment group which has been successful in receiving \$18,000 funding from Annastacia Palaszczuk in her capacity of Arts Minister.

You're losing chickens to those clever, fast birds of prey and the bush turkeys are digging up your garden as quickly as you're planting. Then there are the bandicoots – holes everywhere.

It's not their fault – it's ours! They were here first and we're growing their favourite food.

They've got small brains and are hard-wired to pursue their food with the same old techniques, time after time. It should be an easy act to follow.

We, on the other hand, have big brains and are super bright. We can outsmart almost anything and that's what we've gotta do to manage these natural pests whose purpose in life seems to be to undermine our every gardening effort.

If you don't want the hawk to get your chickens, keep them safe under a chicken-wire roof. Let them free-range when you're there to supervise. Chicken-wire is also helpful on top of your garden mulch to keep the bush turkeys off and placed around your plants (or plant through it) to discourage the bandicoots. Don't expect to win the battle every time - we're not that bright.



Volunteer Day Out: Cattana Wetlands

Our nursery volunteers hung up their aprons and gloves for a day out seed collecting and a BBQ lunch at Cattana Wetlands.

Cattana Wetlands started out as a sugar cane farm and sand mining quarry and has since been purchased by Cairns Council, primarily to protect the 30 hectares of lowland rainforest on the western end of the site. This forest, described as the Feather Palm

Forest, is a remnant of a once extensive forest type that is now confined to only a few remnant patches in the Cairns region. Council and State govt. spent \$3m on the site restoration with construction of 420m boardwalks, walking tracks, bird hides and viewing platforms, picnic areas, interpretative signs, car park, access road and toilet facilities.

Council has planted over 70,000 native plants and undertaken extensive weed removal to form an enjoyable 80ha nature conservation park salt water lake with abundant plant and birdlife. If you haven't been to this hidden gem it's definitely worth a visit.





A Thought for September


HIS month we read from St Mark's Gospel Chapter 7.verses 31-37. There is utter simplicity about this healing. One cannot probe the text for possible ways in which it was accomplished. There are no mysterious techniques to be examined. Two figures are slipping away from the crowd. Eventually they turn and face one another as we look from a distance. Jesus gently takes the man's head between his hands, adopting the timeless stance of what to this day we call the laying on of hands. Fingers probe the blocked ears. A hand touches the extended and partially imprisoned tongue. A prayer is offered, a word is spoken, and the world changes for one human being.

What is it that speaks to us across the centuries? The presence of Jesus heals. We discover this in prayer, in meditation, in worship, in sacrament. Countless Christians have found a sense of release when they have felt the sacred bread on their tongues as they receive Jesus in the form of that bread. They may not have gained freedom from actual inability to speak, but rather from many other ways of being dumb, being unable to say certain things that should be said.

There are all sorts of reasons why men and women may need their ears opened and their tongues released by the grace of Christ. We may need our ears opened to hear things which at the moment we are incapable of hearing. Perhaps a spouse is telling us something about our relationship, something to which we are completely deaf. Perhaps people are saying things to us in connection with our job. If we could hear them, we might respond by improving our performance and our professional relationships, but we are incapable of hearing. Perhaps Our Lord himself is trying to get us to hear his voice in our spiritual experience. But we are deaf to him because of busyness or the illusion that we have achieved a high spiritual level.

Likewise there are many reasons why we may need our tongues released. We may need our tongue freed to say certain things that must and should be said. We may need to say simply that we are deeply sorry. Many are not able to say that most precious and necessary word. We may need to tell someone else that we love them. We may need our tongue released from certain things as well as for certain things. We may need to be freed from filthy language, from the tendency to gossip, from a need to pull others down. In all such ways we can become

the figure slipping away from the crowd with Jesus, standing before Him, being touched by His hands of grace, and being healed. There are many ways in which we have need of Jesus' grace to open our ears and free our tongues.


