



he years of planning, submissions and increasing demand have paid off with Mareeba Shire Council agreeing to commit 50% of costs to a base \$750, 000 Facility, with the opportunity now open to attaining the other half through the Department of Sport and Recreation. All sources of funding and assistance can go ahead with the assurance that in the summer time of 2006/2007 we can all be splashing around in the first season of our own POOL. The feasibility study compiled by much of the evidence our local committee gathered found that: - "there is a need for an aquatic facility to meet current and future needs of the communities of Kuranda and districts", in short justified by,

- 1. Population growth (estimated to double between 2001 and 2016)
- 2. Equitable access to a range of sport and recreation opportunities
- 3. Equitable access to learn to swim and other learning programs to increase skills in the community
- 4. Safety
- 5. Indigenous Health.

Next steps will include procuring the land from Kuranda State High School. Setting up the community precinct site on land adjacent to the school, so that it becomes a separate entity that the local people can begin to prepare the grounds and access to the site for surveying and concept designing for the most effective and environmentally friendly Facility we can come up with.

Within a year all funding of the major kind will be secured and a continued commitment to local efforts would continued right up to the stage

of completion of capital works. This means from now on the KURANDA AQUATIC CENTRE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE will be a more active, visual and in your face outfit for the next 2 years or so because we can be assured every cent of money and value of the labor provided will help make the centre a Quality place.

The base \$750,000-\$800,000 provides for a 25m pool and Toddler Learn to Swim pool with toilets, change room/first aid, kiosk and administration. Now the harder we work as a community the more we add to base model e.g. shade cover, roof protection or enclosures, solar heating and lighting, better landscape designs, earthworks and low chlorination maintenance methods.

I've also invited two teachers from Cairns to talk about their new system called Tea Tree, which is drawn from various sources with the aim of creating a high quality innovative, community based education. It is designed to be run as a "mini school" within an existing state school (although it could just as well be offered in an independent school). This model is expected to be up and running in a Cairns primary school very soon and could offer a very accessible alternative.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

I refer to an article written by Kuranda Range Defenders featured in the November edition of the Kuranda paper, titled "Warren Entsch slams Road."

In the interest of accuracy I submit the following.

I was visited by the Kuranda Range Defenders, Sarah Isaacs and Dianne Horsborough, seeking my opinion and support. I informed them in no uncertain manner that it was an issue that would need to be taken up with the four Labor State Members in Cairns, and that I was not prepared to engage in the debate at this point.

I did say that I had other priorities in relation to roads i.e., the Cairns Southern Access Road which is clearly a Federal Road, and that I would not be supporting any federal funding to the Kuranda Range, as my priority is clearly those federally funded roads that are currently being upgraded.

I did express concerns about long term impacts of urbanisation of Koah in particular, and suggested that as a means of reducing the traffic volume through the urban sprawl to the west, they might like to support my endeavours of promoting East Trinity as the next urban node for Cairns.

In doing so, the urban sprawl would be capped at Gordonvale, therefore reducing the impact on the hill slopes and presenting a raft of other environmental and social benefits. I suggested that by developing East Trinity this could be a way of slowing development to the west and possibly be a catalyst for delaying the necessity for immediate upgrades. I also suggested that over time as the population increases, there may well be opportunities for other options, including tunnelling, that aren't available at present.

All the while, I continued to restate it was an issue which needed to be directed at the State Government and that my comments were purely to encourage them to involve themselves in a little lateral thinking. It is unfortunate that they have appeared to be single-focussed and immediately rejected out of hand, any concept of the East Trinity option.

During the entire meeting, my guests were madly writing notes, therefore there is no excuse for the inaccuracies they have presented. I would therefore suggest if the Kuranda Range Defenders want to maintain a level of credibility they should accurately report one's position rather than editing and sensationalising to suit their own position.

GRANDMOTHER WINNIE BRIM

Winnie Brim will turn 70 years old this month. Many of her 13 children, 36 grandchildren and 45 great grandchildren will be with her to celebrate. This is the first and only birthday party for Winnie and it will be a celebration of her life, with her family and friends.

Winnie was born at Mona Mona Mission on the 14 th of November 1934, one of 10 children. Aunty Rose Grogan helped Winnie's mother deliver her at home. Winnie did not leave her parents until she was 10 years old although, at that time it was the custom for children to leave home at 6 years for the mission Seventh Day Adventist school run by the church.

Early experience for Winnie at the mission were mixed, with some good and bad times.

Each person's story is different but all together they tell the same history (Winnie Brim, Nov 2004) Winnie does not wish to dwell on the bad times, as she believes they are lessons to be learned as well. Looking back in time Winnie feels discipline will not hurt anyone, as long as it is not cruel.

There has been much written on lives of Aboriginal women, many by white people. Much that is written is not true, according to Winnie's experience and she plans to write her own history

in a book for her children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren.

Winnie is a slight pretty women with a lovely smile.



She neither smokes or drinks and attributes her good health to a positive attitude.

At times her arthritis gives her pain and her

racing pulse is being investigated by her doctor, Dave Cuming, whom she meets on a regular basis with others to discuss the health issues of the Aboriginal people of Kuranda. Winnie feels these meetings are important, they highlight needs bringing positive changes for aboriginal people.

The highlight of Winnie's life was when she was 17 she met and later married Warren Brim in 1953. Warren Brim was a "bush tucker man" who knew the rainforest plants and animals all by name. He could name over a hundred plants but could never write or spell names. He loved nature and Winnie joined with him taking the children fishing and exploring the rainforest.

Winnie looks forward to her life with her loving large family, her birthday party and her church where she worships every week. Her life has at times been full of sorrow but, it seems the joy has been full to overflowing. It is with pleasure that the people of Mantaka celebrate this wonderful lady's birthday this month.

Perhaps you may see her by the side of the river fishing with her family at Mantaka. This is the place that gives her great joy and peace.

THE RETURNED & SERVICES LEAGUE OF AUSTRALIA LIMITED, FAR NORTHERN DISTRICT BRANCH

Dear Kuranda Paper,

Many thanks to our patients for constant feedback about the services we try to offer at the Kuranda Surgery. Over the past 12 months some things have improved, others not. I am constantly trying to bring more services to our local community so there is less need to travel in to Cairns. To this end we now have a visiting Dietician, Diabetic Educator, Psychologist, Podiatrist, Alcohol & Drug Rehab worker & a Cardiac Rehab nurse. We have also organized funding to allow many of our patients subsidized access to local Physiotherapy and in early 2005 Australian Hearing Services intend to start visiting the surgery to provide assessments for eligible patients. We have also invested in a mole scan camera which provides fantastic detail of patient's moles & hopefully will mean less travel to Cairns for any Mole Scanning.

We remain chronically short of female doctor consultation time but I'm afraid so do most of the practices in Cairns as FNQ still struggles to attract appropriately qualified GPs. We are constantly trying to rectify this situation and currently have Drs Angela & Julia working 4 half days each week. Contrary to popular belief, I am very happy to see lady patients about any problem if they can bear the thought of seeing me!

Batreach, Kuranda's own nationally and internationally respected and highly praised fruit bat and other fauna rescue, rehabilitation and release operation needs your help. Pam, owner, co-ordinator and principal worker and her dedicated volunteers Cel. and Flo. are presently inundated with the large number of orphaned flying foxes. This catastrophe has been precipitated by the massive kill by paralysis tick which transfer to the nursing mothers when they are feeding on the fruit of the introduced and now invasive wild tobacco.

The overwhelming number of orphans require regular four hourly feeding. As well, food preparation, care and maintenance of other species and their enclosures are ongoing demands before eventual release and return to the wild. Sheer numbers of orphans and the desperate need for more assistance has meant the temporary closure of this unique and famed attraction on the tourist trail.

Volunteers are now urgently required to assist in basic operations at Batreach. If you have the interest and time to contribute on a regular basis, at least during this emergency, please contact Pam on 4093 -8858.

Why Community Care and not Retirement Home

The vision of **Welcome Pocket Community Care** complex is really a **living** village of multi-age groups, sharing and benefiting from the facilities provided for them.

There will be all levels of accommodation. Self contained independent living units where older people can have their own independence knowing that they can seek help if required. These units will have multiple bedrooms, full kitchen and laundry facilities and garage space for vehicles. Hostel type accommodation that has assistance with daily living, comfortable one bedroom units with bathroom facilities, kitchenette for tea making and entertaining visitors but with dining room facilities and laundry options available for choice.

The nursing section will provide both low care and high care nursing which will be available for anyone needing this type of accommodation. This means that not only the elderly and frail but also accident victims and those needing care as a result of medical conditions etc. It is planned to have a dementia specific section providing a pleasant environment for these patients with access to gardens and outside recreation in safety.

There will also be a special section to provide for those who require palliative care at the end of their life, we plan to offer care and attention in a comfortable environment.

Beyond this, the vision includes facilities required in the district. Facilities for visiting health workers such as community nurses for baby care and antenatal clinics as well as other areas such as mental health workers. There will be a meeting room available for exercise classes, health classes, meetings of local organizations etc.

It is hoped to provide child care on all levels utilizing current providers and offering extended facilities and opportunities for expansion.

The vision is to provide facilities that sit comfortably with all groups in the district, indigenous culture as well as other cultures. There is to be a Chapel as part of the complex and that will be available for use by all.

The **Welcome Pocket Community Care** centre will be run on a notfor-profit basis and any profits made will be returned to the community in a form the **community** sees as necessary. In other words any profits will benefit the local Kuranda community because it is a project for **KURANDA**.

It is for this reason that we ask for the support of the whole community. If you have any comments, suggestions or you may want to know more please contact us. If your organization wants to know more, please do not hesitate to ask, perhaps you may like to have input in the planning, feel free to contact us.

A Thought for Christmas

This month we read the Christmas Story from St Luke's Gospel Chapter 1 verse's 1-21

Augustus Caesar and Jesus of Nazareth form a fascinating duality. Both are seen at different times by millions as "Son of God." Both are looked to as "prince of peace." Yet each possesses a kind of power totally different from the other. One possesses legions, the other disciples. One issues a command to conquer, the other a command to love. For a moment these two lives impinge on one another, one of them on the throne of the world in Rome, the other alive in Mary's womb in Nazareth. Without knowing it Augustus sends the holy one on a journey that is to end at the world's end.

This journey could not have been other than inconvenient. We forget that it could have proved fatal. Those miles are demanding miles, some of them through raw, dangerous country. Yet the seed in the womb is asked to survive this, just as in our lives, a newly conceived resolution, a recently discovered friendship, or a special responsibility is tested at the very beginning. Often the seed of a newly found faith is tried in the plain and everyday reality of the institutional church. Yet in the struggle to encounter the humanity that is mingled with spirituality, the seed is given sinew and strength. Often, just as the journey of the child in the womb is made possible by the care and love of those who travel with him, so the seed of faith in a new Christian is nurtured and strengthened by those who form the local community with whom the dangerous yet rewarding Journey is to be taken.

The family goes to Bethlehem because they have no choice. The powers that be" in every age always intrude on our humanity. Industry decides and a work force travels a thousand miles to find jobs. Governments legislate and laws are made. Computers revolve and our tax

laws are made. Computers revolve and our tax forms arrive. Always into the intimate Nazareth's where we live, reaches the disturbing power of some distant Rome, demanding, directing, faceless.

Joseph is of Nazareth by all the practicalities of life, home, job, community involvement. But the computer says that by the legalities he is of Bethlehem. There is a providence that triumphs over the mundane decisions of bureaucracy, a destiny which has prepared this road to Bethlehem since the first moment of creation. What sometimes seems empty and pointless in the way that it directs our lives can offer new possibilities and reveal the design of God.

They come to an inn. There are lights, sounds, smells, loves, enmities, appetites, weariness, laughter, food and drink, sexuality, celebration, arguments, deals. On and on goes the whole spectrum of life. For this is



As Christmas draws near again it's a good time to reflect on 2004 and the year has 2004 has certainly been another eventful one for Kuranda.

The outcome of the Cairns Education Renewal project carried out between July and September will result in big changes for education in Kuranda after Minister Bligh gave the green light to the development of a P-12 school with amalgamation of the primary and high schools as supported by the Kuranda community. The large Myola site was purchased with this concept in mind and year 7 students will begin to make the move up to the high school next year or in 2006. There will be many challenges to amalgamation along the way over the next few years and I am sure that the school and wider community will be closely involved in this exciting development.

Planning for new educational facilities on the high school site also provides the opportunity to plan for community facilities, like the swimming pool and maybe an indoor sporting complex or a child care centre which can be used by both the school and the general public. I commend the Council for their support for a swimming pool for Kuranda and hope that residents will accept the proposed \$16 levy on their rates to help fund the project.

I will start making strong representations to Sports Minister Terry Mackenroth in anticipation of the Council's application for a 50% subsidy under the State Government's Major Facilities Program. A contribution from the Federal government would be most welcome. Congratulations to Gary Davis and the local community committee for their dedication to this vital project in getting the support of the Mareeba Shire Council.

Tourism, the backbone of the local economy, has generally had a good year and the new Kuranda brochure is an excellent promotion tool. Congratulations to the KVPP committee, Dave and all the visitor centre volunteers for a job well done. Best wishes to Jim and Olive Mealing pioneers of the industry in Kuranda who finally retired down to tranquil Cardwell.

However, despite the new bus parking station I did note the complaint in the Cairns Post from a southern visitor that busses are again parking in the village and keeping their engines running creating polluting smelly diesel fumes. Locals will remember that this issue was the catalyst for formulating the Management Plan that has since guided infrastructure development, parking and

streetscaping in Kuranda. I hope that the transport operators responsible will deal responsibly with this problem which detracts from the enjoyment of a visit to the village.

Sadly, 2004 has been a year of ups and downs for the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre. Elation turned to disappointment when it was discovered that the cost of providing parking, disability access and appropriate fit-out for the house at 19 Thongon Street was exorbitant. Consequently, I am working with the management committee and Department of Housing to find another more suitable venue for this invaluable service and hope to have some good news before long.

Three Top Kowrowa families should each have a wonderful Christmas present in the form of a new house if the negotiations with Council over the new sewage scheme are successfully concluded. These colourful, modern detached homes will provide a vastly improved quality of life and 3-4 more will be built next year. I will continue to work with all levels of government and Ngoonbi Housing Co-op supporting strategies to increase housing stock and relieve the unacceptably high level of overcrowding in Aboriginal homes in the Kuranda District.

Some people will be working hard over Christmas on submissions in response to the Department of Main Roads application to the Federal government and the Wet Tropics Management Authority for environmental approvals required to construct the four lane road up to Kuranda from Smithfield. I recently presented a petition to the Parliament from the Kuranda Range Defenders with 2374 signatures calling on the government to abandon this project. I was happy to present this petition, indeed it is my duty as local member, however I am very mindful that I also represent other groups and individuals who want the road upgraded and I must ensure that their voices are also heard by the State government. My own support for the project is dependent on it conforming to all environmental legislation and approvals. Information on the project and the impact assessment is available on the Department of Main Roads web site: www.mainroads.qld.gov.au.

I am looking forward to Kuranda High School year 12 graduation night when we say farewell to another crop of wonderful young people as they celebrate their successes and prepare take the next step on their life journey. I hope they and all Kuranda families have a happy and

There would be:

- · Loss of beauty.
 - It would be a scar on the hill slopes and destroy a beautiful rainforest drive.
- More land clearing
 Even if the old road were
 revegetated (and this is not
 definite), this cannot replace
 mature trees.
- More edge effect and fragmentation at the narrowest neck of the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area. Increased numbers of exotic, feral and predatory species would colonise the edges with subsequent loss of native species.
- Sedimentation
 Erosion is likely during construction with increased sedimentation of streams and finally of the Great Barrier Reef.

Why the Highway is not needed:

Safety

A faster road with more traffic, bordered by concrete barriers (called "death traps" in recent research) is not necessarily safer.

- We can manage traffic better by having freight on trains and at off peak hours on roads
- We can improve public transport
- The highway is uneconomical Road freight transport savings only justify spending \$40 million without providing the benefits of a rail freight and public transport system. Spending \$300-500 million on this road cannot be justified

• FNQ2010 inaccurate and out of date

FNQ2010 Regional Plan estimated 3.4% population growth, which is not being realised. Therefore development in the Kuranda area with a new highway is not needed.

Urbanisation

Large-scale development is planned at Myola (12 000) with high-density development bordering the Wet Tropics World Heritage area and Koah/Clohesy (more than 30 000). This would result in an even greater loss of habitat, increased predation by domestic animals and greater weed and exotic invasions.

An additional 40-50 000 people would need

- More water and possibly dams
- Waste disposal
- More energy and associated infrastructure and more use of fossil fuel
- More roadsIs this sustainable?

Community Costs

Probable loss of:

- low crime rates
- · scenic beauty and tranquillity
- traditional and contemporary fishing/recreational sites
- revenue generated by indigenous and non indigenous ecotourism if Kuranda loses its appeal as a rainforest village.

Other community impacts

- Land resumptions are likely to be necessary
- Decrease in real-estate values during 10-15 years of construction
- Increased noise during construction

Planning a 4-lane highway and massive urbanisation in one of the most biodiverse places in the world and one of the most fragile corridors of the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area does not make sense. An independent, scientific audit is urgently needed.

IT'S HARD BEING GREEN BUT THE REWARDS ARE WORTH IT

On Thursday 13th November 2004, a fire wiped out 1000s of hours of the work of 100s of volunteers at Big Sands, one of the entrances to the Envirolink Wildlife Corridor at Kowrowa.

Thousands of trees were burnt.

Sadly, it was a fire we need not have had. If the fire had been contained in the early stages, the damage would have been much less. It is probably fair to say that the strategy of fighting the fire with fire (by back-burning) did more damage than the original outbreak. However, that's history and we're wiser now and we won't make the same mistake again.

But there is indeed a silver lining. There is not a blade of guinea grass to be seen (no chemicals used!) and the way is clear to plant it out with a wondrous mix of rainforest species just in time for a big wet Wet.

This is doubly delicious because the Natural Heritage Trust has identified the Envirolink Corridor as a significant project in the Wet Tropics region and is offering funding to EnviroCare to get on with the job for years to come.

MORE REWARDS FOR BEING GREEN

Envirocare has also been funded by the Worldwide Fund for Nature (WWF) to design and make quick and easy roadside signs warning that Cassowaries are on the road ahead. We've lost a number of large hand-painted sandwichboard signs which have been stolen for souvenirs. The new signs will be just as effective and easily reproducible, so we can keep getting the message out there when needed—TAKE CARE, CASSOWARY CROSSING.

AND EVEN MORE GREEN REWARDS

We've just heard that a project to rehabilitate the junction of the Clohesy Creek and the Barron River at Koah is also to be funded to the tune of \$9000. This ambitious project will see the creek and river banks cleared of weeds and replanted with all the right trees. But, very significantly, it will give purpose to an emerging environment group at Koah. The funding will buy the new group some tools and trees. Local volunteers have already done some clearing and tree planting. There'll be some whooping going on at Koah when this news gets out.

TALKING OF WHOOPING

Envirocare's end-of-year party is to be on Sunday 5th December at Big Sands (trees or no trees!). It'll be a bring-a-plate affair to go with the barbequed meat and veges provided by EnviroCare. THE QUALITIES OF FOOD



Materials: 51 gold beads, 90 coloured beads, 1 ½ metres 32 gauge wire Body: cut wire into 2 pieces. One x 1 mtr, one x ½ mtr.

First row is strung on single wire,

the rest are double, Wire comes through from both ends of each row. Do the rest of rows the same.

Body and Head: Starting from bottom row, thread beads as follows:


<u>Halo</u>: 14 gold, thread both wires through so that they are together, twist, trim off.

<u>Arms</u>: Using remaining wire, thread as follows: 1st Row 6 gold 2ndRow 5 pearls 3rd Row 4 pearls4th Row 3 pearls

Take one wire through 3 bead row below neck and other wire through 5 bead row below neck.

Reverse order of beads for right arm, finishing off the wire down both sides of right arm, twist and trim off excess wire.

You will need: Head: 1 large pearl Bead (13cm diameter) Antennae: 16 small beads

Body:_30 Tri-star beads

Tail:_3 medium round beads, 1 small round bead, 1 pair of small eyes

Approximately 35cm x 24 gauge wire

1 pair of small pliers.

Method:

Thread wire through small bead of tail.

Bring the 2 ends of the wire together & thread through the 3 round beads, through the tri-star beads, through the pearl bead.

Separate wires and thread on 8 seed beads & 1 contrast bead on each wire. Using pliers twist wire around contrast beads to hold on, trim wire if necessary. Glue eyes in position on pearl bead, twist worm to sit up.







Garden Jottings for December

- by Alectura

Great growing gardeners! Well it's that time of the year when gardener and gardens wait panting for the beginning of the rains. A difficult time, when one is trying to keep up the water to tender treasures, ward off the destruction of nesting bush turkeys and more secretive excavations of the scrub fowl. Gardening is getting hard so take time to sit back, to think and to plan. What needs to be changed to make my garden upkeep more water-wise, less vulnerable to the dry, less demanding in terms of time and effort but packing more punch and colour? What isn't proving worth its space and what to replace it with?

What to sow:

At this time, care needs to be taken in selection and sowing of seeds and seedlings as the combination of heat and humidity build-up and possible delay in the hoped-for advent of early rains makes a difficult environment for the establishment of young plants. Soak any seedlings in weak soluble fertilizer solution before planting out and remember to shade until established.

Ornamentals - seeds or punnet: Coleus, Cosmos, Impatiens, Petunia, Salvia, Vinca.

Vegetables - seeds or punnet: Beans (Snake and climbing recommended), Chillies, Cucumber, Ginger rhizomes, Pumpkin, Squash, Melons, - if space is at a premium look for bush (non-running) varieties, Sweet potato, Taro, Tomato, all Asian greens.

Consider planting up a polystyrene box of mixed Asian greens in enriched soil where you can give extra care and water. Young leaves may be used in salads and mature leaves in stirfry. Or try seed sprouting to have crunchy and tasty greens for Christmas salads - who wants to pay top dollar for soggy lettuce! Remember to buy seed specially for sprouting. Most ordinary garden seed is chemically treated and you should only buy at a Green or organic/healthfood shop or Chinese emporium. A little seed goes a long way and the variety is endless. - the traditional mustard and cress, all the grains, brassica family, radish, beans and peas, alfalfa, fenugreek, coriander, onions and shallots as well as the traditional Oriental favourites such as the Mung bean, Perilla and Radish. Germinating in light will usually produce green, less crisp, yet more nutritious sprouts while germinating in darkness will produce paler, crisper sprouts.

Things to consider this month:

Keep applying mulches and regularly check that water is penetrating as some mulches tend to develop water resistant surfaces. Fertilizer may still be applied and well watered in to commence action before onset of rains with their severe leaching.

Carefully check pot plants and hanging baskets. These quickly dry out in present conditions. For that special fern or beloved begonia or gesneriad from granny, think about double potting. Place plant pot inside larger ornamental container on layers of paper or absorbent material. When watering, excess will be absorbed by underlayer and keep up atmospheric moisture. Be certain that you do not have free water at roots in larger outside container. Not only will you "drown" your treasure but also provide a welcome home for breeding mosquitoes.

Think about the hoped for wet and often heavy winds that are part of the cyclone season. What plants are likely to suffer from prolonged moisture at their roots and should they be moved to better drained sites or potted up to carry over? Do I need to take cuttings now - yes they will require a little attention or am I going to have to purchase new plants next spring - coleus and favorite impatiens, begonias, episcias and other gesneriad are likely candidates for rotting off in the rains!

Plants of the Month Exotic: Strongylodon macrobotrys (Leguminosae) Jade Vine, Emerald Creeper

Originating in the Phillipines, this gem of the plant world is a vigorous liana creeper which over time forms heavy wooded trunks and long solid ropes, climbing to the tops of trees. Grown for its spectacular pendulous flowering racemes up to a metre in length, the flowers are an incredible teal/blue-green, very seldom seen in floral colour, offset with purple/mauve stem and calyx. The plant display is enhanced by regular new leaf flushes of purplish growth turning to large dark green lobed leaves A definite must-have for the tropical gardener but requires thoughtful placing on account of its future heavy growth and to gain best from its floral display. Display structures must be strongly constructed and ideally allow maximum exposure of pendulous flowering.

Probably best in dappled or light shade especially when establishing but able, when mature, to take full sun although some bleaching of foliage may result. Quick grower with flowering expected, if pushed along, in second season. Usually has sequential flowering bursts from early spring through summer. When in growth, benefits from regular deep watering and heavy feeding. Lightly prune after flowerings to restrain and maintain shape although its vigour and eventual size is not for the faint hearted gardener.

Propagation is from seed (seldom set and having very short viability - (14days?)), stem cuttings in summer and layering in spring. Established plants should be priced under or around

The beauty and plant habit of Strongylodon macrobotrys may be seen in the established specimen on the front of the Noctarium in the main street. The numerous tourists that stop and pick up fallen flowers from this beauty are a testament to someone's foresight and plant sense and make a stark contrast to the mean and "bitty" plantings in the new main street gardens.

Priveleged to live in or near the rain forest, the battle with various wild life over who owns the ornamental garden and vegetable patch is an ongoing demarcation dispute that requires persistence, perseverance and a sense of humour. Do not encourage visitors by setting out food scraps and ensure that compost heaps and any burial of food material is well covered and prevents being dug-up. Any nest making efforts should immediately be raked clear and prospective nesting site fenced off. Clear any quantity of heaped materials, mulch or leaves and distribute well away from nest site. The erection of bird netting on temporary staking is a cheap and easy method but remember that the turkey is able to fly in and will persist with its efforts for some time. You need to be as persevering and don't let the turkey make a turkey out of you! As well as fencing off the nest site, deterrents may include fencing off plantings attractive as food sources. These fences may be quite low and unobtrusive, even gutter guard with closely placed stringing across will prove a barrier. Use synthetic stringing here as jute will rot in the wet. Foliage quickly covers this measure. The placement of plastic fencing directly on soil, allowing new growth to emerge through the mesh, can be disguised with mulch and prevents the uprooting and destruction of bulbous plants and corms. Alocasias, colacasia, caldiums with their tasty below ground food sources are all extremely vulnerable as are some Heliconias, particularly the common dwarf "Jamacian Red". Remember that these unique forest visitors are protected. If proving too destructive and failing to curb, you may trap and release at a new site. However, the critters were here a long time before us and new visitors will move in to occupy the vacated niche, so use ingenuity in barrier building, more persistence than the visitor and patience.

New School for Kuranda

The Minister for education announced on Wednesday 12th November approval for a P-12 school at Kuranda. This is the culmination of many years work by school and community members. It will mean that in a number of years time. all Kuranda students will be taught at the Myola site presently occupied by the High School. New air conditioned classrooms will replace the old, high maintenance rooms at present used by Years 1 to 7. The Primary school classes will ultimately be located on a separate campus immediately adjacent to the present High school buildings. It is also anticipated that a new Prep Year facility will be constructed for the introduction of the state wide implementation of Prep in 2007.

No timelines for the construction of facilities has been announced by the government as yet, however it is anticipated that the first step will be the movement of Year 7 students to the present High School site. There is adequate classroom space to accommodate the Year 7 s without any construction. Following the very successful precedent set this year, the Year 7 group will start coming to the High School site one day a week (Thursday) from the beginning of 2005. This will let them join with the Year 8 to 10 students for the popular Thematic Studies which offers a variety of options for 2 hours every Thursday.

Early in 2005 both schools will meet with Year 7 students and parents to talk about the next step from this.

There is also considerable excitement in the 2 schools at the announcement that the Mareeba Shire Council has committed to the construction of a 25m pool at the Myola site which would be built adjacent to the 2 school campuses. This will fill a big hole in the Physical Education curriculum which the lack of easy access to a pool has created. The school thanks the many parents and community members who supported the consultation process carried out by the State Government recently as part of the Cairns School Renewal process. There is no doubt that the strong support shown by the community for the P-12 concept has been instrumental in the quick decision by the government.
