

(assowaries on the Kuranda Range Road

What's prompted this discussion?

In recent years and again right now, cassowaries are seen on the Kuranda Range Road, raising concerns about their safety and the safety of people. When an awesome cassowary is seen close by the road, it's a normal reaction to want to stop or slow your car to view it, take photos or even endeavour to direct traffic if the bird is in danger of being hit. There is heavy traffic on this road. Some drivers become annoyed and want to push past and pandemonium is the order of the day. Sooner or later the birds wander off and things return to normal. The police seemed not to want to be involved, the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) is slow to respond and if QPWS officers are available, they usually don't arrive till the birds have moved on. It hasn't been clear where the birds have been accessing the road.

In the past year, a good deal of the KRR has been fitted out with steel bump barriers, which have incidentally blocked off some of the points where cassowaries might have accessed the road. Because of this, it is now clearer where the birds can access the road and why.

We know there is a population of cassowaries that occupy the forest that stretches from behind the James Cook University (JCU) and is bounded by the Cook Highway and the KRR. This includes the Kuranda Rainforestation property. There is another population on the other side of KRR, bounded by the Barron River, KRR and may extend to the back of Redlynch. There doesn't seem to be much interaction with the Black Mountain Road population and birds from these areas. There are known populations further to the west that extend from the Barron Falls National Park through to Speewah. This discussion focusses on the cassowaries which share the KRR boundary.

How are they accessing the roadway?

The steel barriers that have been erected along the KRR in the past year have helped to block the cassowaries' access to the roadway, narrowing down the points where access can be gained. We are questioning the possibility of erecting temporary barriers across the sections without barriers. The birds forage along the slope bounded by JCU, KRR and Cook Highway. The area is fairly steep and the eastern side of the KRR is precipitous in some places. It is only where there is a gentle ramp up from the forest floor to the roadway that a cassowary can manage to get on to the road. There are only 4 or 5 places where this occurs.

The cassowaries are being seen this year between Water Point and the Henry Ross Lookout. Kuranda Conservation's Jax Bergersen is responsible for erecting "Recent Cassowary Crossing" signs when she receives confirmed reports of sightings. At present, the signs have been placed along this stretch of the KRR.

Why are they coming to the roadside?

A major drawcard for the cassowaries, and one that is repeated year after year, is food scraps discarded by "litter buggers" (no apology for using this term). When a cassowary is seen on the side of the road, it seems almost irresistible to people to want to throw food to it. It goes without saying that there is no good to come from this action. It teaches the bird that people in cars are a source of food. Furthermore, the food is bound to be the wrong sort of food, possibly even dangerous for it to ingest.

Fruiting trees and vines that overhang the roadway are also a seasonal and learned source of food. This does occur on the KRR.

When are cassowaries coming on to the road?

Sighting of cassowaries on KRR is seasonal. This year it is exceptionally late. It seems to occur when there are chicks in tow. However, juveniles have been seen, presumably searching for their own habitat. They may well have learned about the roadside from the parent bird. The last thing we want is for parent birds to teach their young about the availability of food (fruit or food scraps) on the KRR. This obviously prolongs the problem for years and over time, increases the number of birds which might seek to access the roadside, if they were to live long enough to breed themselves and bring their offspring back to this lucrative spot.

The cassowaries that we see on the road do not seem to be trying to get to the other side to access extended habitat. The roadside is the end of the line – a place where food can be found. When the birds leave the roadside, they follow the track back to where they came from. There are places where we do believe the birds move from one side of the road to the other. In these cases, it would appear that the KRR runs through their home range or that there are potential mates on the other side. We think Streets Creek is one such crossing place and that, for the most part, the culvert under the road at Streets Creek is where the birds are crossing over. We know there are a number of cassowaries on the Marshall's property and opposite that property, at Rainforestation. Both these properties have boundaries with extensive National Parks. Dedicated wildlife crossings at intervals along the length of the KRR are necessary if we are serious about reducing human threats to cassowaries.

Dismal Outlook

Thursday night (12th January) about 9.30pm I am driving home on Oak Forest Road and I come across a vehicle stopped in the middle of Dismal Creek bridge with its high beam directed at me (i.e. facing Kuranda direction). I could not see anyone around the vehicle. I waited for five minutes at a distance of approx 50 metres. Nothing happened (no visible activity). At this point I considered the possibility of a fallen tree and some considerate person was trying to warn traffic, then thought about alternate possibilities (some of which were not worth testing out), and reasoned most people would engage hazard lights and leave lights on low beam for safety). I decided to reverse back to a point I could turn around, drove back towards Kuranda a few hundred metres and parked in a driveway, and considered my options and what I should do if anything.

I waited about 15 minutes, and drove down again to see if the vehicle had moved or someone was visible, no, nothing changed. I returned to my driveway hideaway, and decided to ring 000 and ask/report what I had experienced to the police that answered, they said they would send a patrol out ASAP. So I waited and I waited (about an hour passed) and one other light coloured SUV did a similar thing during that hour (returned and rechecked 15 minutes later and then left for good). It was around 11.00pm by now, and I was considering ringing 000 again to check when the police patrol was expected — now thinking that Kuranda was unattended and a patrol from Cairns or Mareeba were on their way when finally a police patrol vehicle arrived at the scene.

I walked to within observation distance, and watched as those brave guys approached the vehicle, headlights still blazing, and no one in sight, trying to communicate with anyone in the vehicle - there was no response. One of the officers shone his torch into the side window of the car (remember it is pitch black - lights blazing, and I think the engine was still running - and on a narrow bridge - water level about three metres straight down) and luckily found a person asleep at the wheel. More brave stuff – they woke him - and questioned him etc, moved the vehicle off the bridge so that traffic could pass, just in time for another small sedan to pass, I then walked back to my car, and knew I could get home finally, drove up to the police, and they waved me on - i.e. suggested with hand signals to move on. I decided I needed to tell them that it was me who called the incident in, and this might be useful to the police.

They told me that no one from ooo contacted them at all – it was a regular patrol or they were on the way for another reason (can't quite be sure what they said). So I responded as anyone would with "thank you"... and thought about the incident on the last few kilometers home.

Two significant thoughts kept repeating in my head – first and foremost – thank you to those police (who I now assume are from Kuranda). What would we do without them. I guess they are presented with lots of similar situations on a very regular basis (and sure I would have been a little more likely to approach the vehicle if I had a bullet proof vest and a firearm – that has issues of its own) but they would not know how many men could have been waiting for them or what their intent was. Thank you Kuranda Police. The second thought was not to assume that a ooo will get the response you need in every case. If the time marches on and nothing happens, ring again, and again. In this case I am glad that the situation was very static and no urgency or emergency eventuated.

I am pleased to report that TMR (Main Roads) contacted me recently to ascertain the whereabouts of the stolen and vandalised brass plaque which used to sit on the currently bare concrete plinth at the Henry Ross Lookout. The plaque (erected in 1952) commemorates the Battle of The Coral Sea and takes the form of a starburst compass marking important places and distances to them.



Since the plaque was found again through *The Kuranda Paper* in 2014, it is fitting that I can now report here that TMR, and Craig Crawford MP, have confirmed to me that the plaque will be reinstalled following the upgrade of the Lookout, which is being funded through the Premier's State Scenic Lookouts project.

Many thanks go to the local Kuranda family who salvaged the plaque from the fire pit of the thieves' bush camp, helping keep our hidden history alive.

Last month Mareeba Shire Council Mayor Tom Gilmore officially opened a marine debris awareness art project in Kuranda.

The stunning mural by artist **Zane Saunders** (pictured at right with Mayor Tom Gilmore) highlights the impact of rubbish and pollution on the rivers and rainforest ecosystem of the Great Barrier Reef.

Mr Saunders said there is a lot of meaning within the work itself. "Essentially it's about marine debris and that awareness that we need to care for the country and how we dispose of rubbish or any waste and how we interact with the land," he said.

"Just being mindful of the land, it was here before us and also the animals that occupy it."

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the artwork is a commitment to protecting the Great Barrier Reef. "This mural means to me a deep abiding commitment by our community and the Kuranda community and our indigenous friends who are deeply committed to exactly the same thing as we all are, and that is to ensure that we pass to the future generations a Great Barrier Reef that is worthy of them and worthy of us having been the custodians," Cr Gilmore said.

This artwork was developed as part of the Great Barrier Reef Cleanup which was funded by the Australia Government's Reef Trust, in partnership with the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority and the Mareeba Shire Council.



Skyrail Closing For a Month

SKYRAIL is preparing to temporarily shut down for an important upgrade. It is closing from **8th May to 5th June** for its longest period of scheduled maintenance since the rainforest cableway opened 22 years ago.

The time will be spent upgrading the cableway's original lift technology and changing their main communications pathway from old copper technology to fibre optics.

However, there has been some criticism from local tourism operators and local Kuranda businesses, with some saying there had been a lack of communication with the local tourism industry about the month-long closure, particularly operators who were still taking bookings during the period.

"I don't mind when it's off for two days, but when it comes a month of no Skyrail, that's different," he said. "How do the people in Kuranda operate with two trains, and that's it?" Cairns luxury Coaches owner Peter Hodgkinson was reported as saying in a recent *Cairns Post* article.

Such a long shutdown is a matter of concern for Kuranda businesses which rely so heavily on Skyrail and QRail to maximise visitors to the village.

For Kuranda and Far North Queensland residents who might have family or friends planning a visit from 8th May to 5th June, we print this to give you a heads up that you may have to alter holiday plans around this extended close down period.

Recent heavy rainfall once again triggered concerns about water quality in Owen and Warrill Creek.

Both creeks flow into the Barron River via the former Barnwell Estate (site of the proposed 'Kur-World' development) and are known habitat for the highly endangered Kuranda Tree Frog. The species was located in both creeks as recently as a year ago, although by then some gullies had already been degraded by site works undertaken by Barnwell's new owner, developer Ken Lee.

The Kuranda Tree Frog has only been found in a few creeks along the Myola Valley, including these two. It is not found anywhere else in the world; this is truly OUR unique species (and not the only one!) Turbid water threatens the frog's survival, so ensuring creeks run clear is an obvious priority if we wish to save this iconic local frog from extinction.

Kuranda resident and professional wildlife photographer Steven Nowakowski visited lower parts of both creeks in mid-January. His photos indicate that once again the water is very muddy.

The KRPG issued a press release publicising this, which was picked up by various local media including the Cairns Post. The developer's environmental consultant responded that according to his data, water flowing into the Barnwell Estate is actually cleaner than the water flowing out.

Local volunteers simply don't have the resources or access to get to the bottom of this apparent mystery, but the situation should not be allowed to drift. As the frog is a Federally-listed endangered species, we've written again to Environment Minister Frydenberg calling for immediate action. We've also asked the developer's environmental consultant to release his water quality data so we can all better understand what's happening. Whoever is polluting these crucial streams should stop immediately.

To secure a future for Myola's highly endangered endemic species, we need urgent, co-operative and well co-ordinated action. Ideally, a Species Recovery Program would detail actions needed to maintain healthy populations of the frog throughout its known range. Regular monitoring of water quality and population numbers is obviously required - and while locals can help with much of this, government has a responsibility to authorise and support the work.

The term 'Anthropocene' is increasingly used to describe the planet this generation has inherited. It's a world in which the survival of wildlife is increasingly a matter of human choice. If we care enough, we can conserve our environmental heritage. If we don't, much of it will perish on our watch.

We believe the Kuranda community, as a whole, does care - but there's little evidence that conservation of biodiversity is a genuine priority for local, State and Federal Governments.



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EBRUARY and an uncertain start to the Wet. Although some good falls, rapid drying out takes place this time of the year and raised beds and potted and basket plants are vulnerable. It pays to keep an eye on watering.

Getting children interested in the garden provides the source of a lifetime joy and interest and an engagement with the cycles and wonders of nature. Remember that our children are the guardians of the future and our natural environment.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: Petraeovitex bambusetorum Syn: P. bambusitrum, P. wolfei. Common name Nong Nooch Vine. Family: Lamiaceae.

This stunning climber apparently from Kedah, Malaysia and was introduced into the Singapore Botanical gardens in 1938 and has only recently come into general cultivation and is still extremely rare in Australia. Although of tropical origin, it promises great potential as it is easily cultivated and takes readily to container growing.



Originally placed in the Verbenacea family as in flower, leaf and growth it is very similar to some clerodendrums, DNA results posit its placement in Lamiaceae. Petraeovitex is extremely long flowering from early Spring through to late Autumn with its long to 1m+ inflorescences opening over many weeks, forming on the tips of the vining stems and carrying persistent yellow bracts and short lived white flowers. Once established in any good soil and taking full sun to dappled shade, while early growth appears somewhat slow, once away, training of its supple stems can result in a spectacular display.

Given apparent ease of cultivation and its relative short period of introduction, careful observation should be maintained as to seed set/distribution as a high proportion of introduced, rampant and declared weeds are climbing plants which pose significant threat to the rain forests.


Q&A *Dear Areka*, The stunning foliage you saw on the footpath planting was *Browneopsis ucayalina*, a compact tree native to rainforest areas of Ecuador, Colombia and Peru with its long drooping flushes of new growth in beet reds and golds turning to a sombre green on maturing. Somewhat slow in initial stages, requiring a sheltered position and average soil. Still difficult to source and somewhat expensive, it is stocked by Equatorial Exotics and seed is frequently available on the internet.



Dear Kylie, Welcome to the area. Moving from down South is a big change and gardening here in the tropics requires adjusting to the seasonal Wet and Dry with sometimes prolonged and heavy rains and then months without rain. As well there is adjustment to a range of garden visitors, some rather persistent and destructive of planted area. Also you should enjoy the scope of new and unfamiliar plants.

The old Latin adage *Festina lente* is a good one to adopt when planning and planting your new garden. Visiting local Markets for plant sources and joining the local Kuranda Garden Club will both save effort, time and money as well as making new friends.



Apparently there were two separate burn-offs at Hancock Plantations recently. One was near McKenzie Pocket road (40 hectares) and one near the end of Black Mountain road near Quaid's road (13 hectares). Friends of the Earth FNQ is concerned about these apparently unannounced burnings. In 2010, Queensland Government sold 99 year leases of Forestry Plantations to Hancock's Timber Resources: 350,000 hectares in all. The plantation near Kuranda is situated right next to Wet Tropics World Heritage.


We are campaigning for the Kuranda plantations to be re-vegetated for crucial wildlife corridors and habitat. We are not against forestry but these plantation are in the wrong place. We aim to have a meaningful and cooperative dialogue with HQ plantations to get the best outcome for our area and for our wildlife.

Update on Mareeba Bat Colony

Following pressure from community and environmental groups, the Mareeba dispersal has been postponed. The camp was set up last spring by Spectacled Flying-foxes, a Vulnerable species under State and Federal Law. The Spectacled Flying-foxes gave birth here and are currently nursing their young. The Little Red Flying-foxes arrived more recently and now number a fair proportion of the colony.

When all Spectacled Flying-fox pups are flying out at night, Mareeba Shire Council plans to re-assess the camp to see if dispersal is needed. Dispersals are costly and have a large failure rate.

The colony is opposite the




In the meantime, the nightly fly-outs are spectacular and provide an ecotourism opportunity for any enterprising local businesses.

see and understand illnesses and links them to


the appropriate antidote cure, by using various medicinal plants still thriving in the Amazon Rainforest.

NBN Comes to Kuranda & Surrounds!

Well, it has certainly taken its time, but finally for most of the surrounding areas NBN has finally arrived, with Kuranda village and surrounding streets due to come online in around mid February!

With that in mind The Kuranda Paper has taken up an offer from Kuranda local computer guru Thomas Verfuth to answer any questions readers might have regarding NBN including types, options, pluses and minuses and troubleshooting. Thomas will also address another other tech questions you might have.

So what exactly is NBN?

NBN or otherwise referred to the National Broadband Network is rolling out fibre-optic, fixed wireless and satellite infrastructure to replace the existing broadband infrastructure with a much faster and more reliable broadband service. NBN has the capability of offering download speeds of up to 100 megabits per second (which is more than four times faster than the fastest theoretical available ADSL2+ broadband, but realistically when considering average consumer ADSL connection speeds NBN can be up to 15 times faster!) The rolling out of NBN is a game changer, offering a whole new world of what we can use the internet for!

Next month's edition of The Kuranda Paper will discuss the types of NBN and answers to your questions.



Blue & Lonesome: Rolling Stones



nd it's goodbye to... Kuranda's Rolling Stone, Graeme Thorburn.

Graeme loved the Stones, and John Lennon and Bob Dylan, outlaw country and had his own home-grown cynical humorous take on life and livin' in Kuranda.

Graeme's one gripe on passing was he was going to get to Rock'n'Roll heaven before Mick and Keef. Never mind bro – they, unbeknownst perhaps to them, have celebrated your life with their first and only pure blues

album, released at the time of Graeme's passing and with Mick and Keef and Charlie and Ronnie and friends going right back to their roots and honouring the black American bluesmen who gave them their inspiration some 50 plus years ago: Mick moaning and howling to the blue songs of the wolf; Little Walter, Willie Dixon, Magic Sam and company. Playing a wicked harp deep into the blues. **Keith** and **Ronnie** sharing licks, riffs and just

What might be done to prevent them accessing the roadway?

The ultimate remedy to the situation is to rebuild the road as planned years ago with tunnels and bridges to allow for free-flowing wildlife movement and a road dedicated to traffic. However, in the shorter term, to seriously address the issue of cassowaries accessing the KRR, permanent barriers, dedicated wildlife crossings, such as on-surface crossings (traffic would have to slow down considerably at these points), and overpasses (possum ladders, tree kangaroo overpasses) would have to be built. This would be expensive and some would see it as inconvenient that they would be required to slow down or stop from

But it does not necessarily require such dedicated measures – at least just now. Cassowaries on the KRR is a seasonal thing. There are several measures that we might take to deal with this issue, including inter alia:

- Temporary barriers that could be rolled out at the first seasonal sighting and kept in place for say three months would probably prove to be adequate. The barriers could be made from plastic bunting. In some places 100m of the material might be required to block off where we know the bird is gaining access. If the bird then moves on to find another access point, then we put up more bunting at that point. It's not difficult or expensive. It just requires putting a plan in place and being ready to activate it when needed.
- It's probably a Cairns City Council task to organise regular litter pick-up to reduce available food scraps. The verges of the KRR are a disgrace and an embarrassment. Cleaning them up should and could be a regular activity, unless we can come up with a plan to stop litter-buggers from making this task a necessity. Now there's a project that needs an innovative leader.
- At the same time cassowaries are seen on the KRR, several trees and vines are fruiting, including Faradaya, quandongs and figs. Should we consider removing those trees or, at least, removing limbs that overhang the road. For every tree removed, ten more can be replanted within the range of the affected birds, just not beside the road.
- Another solution to keeping the birds off the road may be to keep the fruit off the road. This would require us citizens to sweep fallen fruit off the road and rake it off the pullover bays and over the embankment. This only needs to be done during the season. Sounds simple enough – and it is.

What is the urgency of this issue – what's at stake?

Cassowaries are a threatened species. We are obliged to protect them. So is the TMR. It is the raison d'être of QPWS to do so.

- Cassowaries on the KRR are at risk of physical injury or death by vehicle hits.
- Cassowaries on the KRR, which are eating food scraps are at risk of injury or death, not only from poisoning from inappropriate food and pathogens, but also from ingesting sharp objects, even gravel, which can cause ruptured bowel injury. We have lost two cassowaries in the last two years due to their bowels rupturing, apparently from gravel.
- People are at risk when their attention is diverted by seeing a cassowary on the side of
- People are at risk when they stop and try to direct traffic. It's not a matter of "call the police" or the authorities to deal with the incident; it's an urgent situation that the people there, at that time, feel they must deal with.
- People and cassowaries are at risk when a startled bird might dart onto the roadway, an event the consequences of which are enormously exacerbated in wet weather – just when the cassowaries are out on the KRR.

The situation can be remedied – and must be. It is achievable and inexpensive. Let's put our minds to it.

Environmental Surveys

Fauna, flora and water quality surveys are currently underway. These will be complemented by an aquatic ecology survey once streams have flowed for enough time to allow seasonal aquatic communities to mature. Further, frog surveys will be conducted on and off site by Dr Conrad Hoskins of JCU. These studies will provide an indication of the relative health of the aquatic systems on site and the extent of historical impacts.

Social and Community

The EIS project team met with the newly formed Community Reference Group during December and briefed the Mareeba Shire Council on project updates. A site meeting was also held recently with the Wet Tropics Management Authority to discuss potential impacts and mitigation strategies.

A number of community events and studies are planned in the coming months including:

- Neighbours Day Tuesday 7th February
- Public Open Day Saturday 18th February
- Cultural Heritage Surveys (Indigenous and Non-Indigenous) will also commence in February.

The First Flush

The first flush is the first event of the wet season when all streams on a site flow. Therefore, it is when any pollutants present are likely to be mobilised. This event occurred on the 9th January after several days of rain.

Up to 12 sites across the property and downstream were selected and the samples have been analysed for over 30 physical and chemical parameters relevant to assessing water quality against Queensland and Australian aquatic ecology guidelines.

A critical parameter for the protection of frogs and fish is total suspended solids (TSS) which measures the sediment load carried by a stream. On 9th January the TSS flowing into the site from Haren Creek was 29 milligrams per litre (mg/L), the TSS leaving the site in Owen Creek was 12 mg/L and the flooded Barron River ranged between 34-38 mg/L. Further details of the monitoring program are available on the website.

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
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

Meningococcal Disease

What is meningococcal disease?

Meningococcal disease is a rare but potentially very serious illness that usually appears as meningitis or septicaemia. 'Meningitis' means an inflammation of the meninges – the layer of protective skin wrapped around the brain and spinal cord.

'Septicaemia' means blood poisoning, which is a more widespread infection throughout the body. Meningococcal disease is caused by bacteria called 'meningococcus'; it is very nasty! There are a number of different groups of meningococcus: A B C W X & Y

How serious is meningococcal disease?

Although meningococcal disease is uncommon, it is a very serious disease. The infection can develop very quickly and can be fatal in 5-10% of cases. Most people make a complete recovery if the infection is diagnosed early and antibiotic treatment commenced promptly. The early signs of the disease can look like other milder illnesses, so sometimes it is hard to diagnose early.

Where do meningococci come from?

Meningococci are common bacteria and around 10-20 % of people carry them at the back of the nose and throat without showing any illness or symptoms. Carriers are more often young adults and less often children and older people. Meningococci are only found in people and never in animals or the general environment.

What is a meningococcal 'carrier'?

Almost all adults and children can carry these bacteria and most will not get sick with meningococcal disease. People become carriers without knowing they have caught the germ and will get rid of it naturally, without treatment, after a few weeks or months.

Who catches meningococcal disease?

It's really random; only some people who catch the germ become sick. It is not usually clear why a particular person becomes sick instead of just becoming a carrier.

Meningococcal disease can occur at any age, but babies and children less than five years of age are most at risk. Teenagers and young adults aged 15-24 years are also at increased risk.

For the people who become sick the average time between being infected and becoming ill is about three to five days, but can be up to seven days. Rarely, small outbreaks may occur affecting more than one person, but usually each case is unrelated to any others.

What are the symptoms?

Someone with meningococcal disease will become very ill, usually feeling sicker

than they have ever felt before. Signs and symptoms sometimes appear very quickly and people with meningococcal disease can get much worse within a few hours. The symptoms of meningococcal disease may include:

- In infants and young children: fever, disinterest in feeding or lack of appetite, leg pain, cold legs and hands, unusual skin colour, irritability/fretfulness, extreme tiredness or floppiness, dislike of being handled, vomiting and/or diarrhoea, turning away from light, drowsiness, convulsions, fits or twitching, rash of redpurple pinprick spots or larger bruises. Unfortunately young children will not be able to complain of symptoms, so fever, pale or blotchy complexion, vomiting, lethargy (blank staring, floppiness, inactivity, hard to wake, or poor feeding) or rash are important signs.
- In older children and adults: Headache, photophobia (dislike of bright lights), fever, leg pain, cold extremities, unusual skin colour, vomiting and / or diarrhoea,

neck stiffness or aching backache, joint pains, sore muscles, cold hands and leg pain, general malaise, off food, drowsiness, confusion, rash of red-purple pinprick spots or larger bruises. In meningococcal septicaemia a rash is a very important but late sign. The rash can appear anywhere on the body and may vary from just one or a few small spots, especially early on, to later covering large areas of the skin. Absence of the rash does not exclude meningococcal disease.

You know your family and best friends better than anybody else. If somebody close to you has some of these signs and appears to you to be much sicker than usual, seek medical help immediately. Children and young adults should not be left alone if they are sick. Early diagnosis and treatment is vital. If you are

sent home by the doctor or hospital, it is important to return promptly for further assessment if symptoms get worse or do not improve in the time suggested by the doctor.

How is meningococcal disease treated?

If a case of meningococcal meningitis or septicaemia is suspected, an antibiotic is given immediately by injection and the patient is admitted to hospital.

Can meningococcal disease be prevented?

Yes the vast majority can be prevented via immunisation. Six serogroups of meningococcal bacteria (A, B, C, W, X and Y) account for most cases of meningitis or meningococcal septicaemia. Vaccines are available in Australia for serogroups A, B, C, W and Y meningococcal disease..

- Meningococcal C conjugate vaccine (MenCCV): Available through the National Immunisation Program & is recommended for all children at 12 months of age.
- Meningococcal B vaccine (MenBV): Available on private script. Recommended for infants and young children, adolescents, young adults living in close quarters, some laboratory personnel and individuals with certain medical conditions.
- Meningococcal serogroup W: quadrivalent meningococcal vaccines (4vMenCV and 4vMenPV) which protect against serogroups A, C, W and Y. Available on private script. Recommended for occupational exposures, travel and certain medical conditions. This can be also offered to those who wish to protect themselves or their family from these serogroups of meningococcal disease.

veb Spiders

Funnel-webs are the subject of fear, fascination and myth. They are a group of Australian spiders belonging to the family Hexathelidae. They include some of the most venomous spiders on the planet and are generally shiny black spiders with a relatively sinister appearance.

Despite there being around 40 species, the most well know and notorious species is the Sydney Funnel-web (*Atrax robustus*). Prior to the development of the antivenom in 1980, 13 human deaths were attributed to the males of this species. Male Sydney Funnel-webs have a component in their venom which the females lack. This toxin known as Robustoxin (d-Atracotoxin-Ar1) is the chemical that makes these spiders so dangerous to humans. For some unknown reason, this chemical affects primates (humans and our relatives the monkeys and apes) severely, but has relatively little effect on other mammal species. The other unfortunate part of this equation is that Australia's most populated city was founded in the heart of this spiders' natural habitat. Despite the distribution of these spiders and toxic venom, since the development of the antivenom the real danger of these spiders has greatly diminished. There have been no deaths as a result of Sydney Funnel-web bites in 35 years, yet the fear of these spiders remains extraordinarily high within Australia. It is certainly a case where the perceived danger far outweighs the real risk, and some perspective is required. Few people fear motor vehicles which have caused almost 70,000 deaths in Australian within the same 35 year period.


Funnel-web spiders are ambush hunters and live within silken retreats either underground, or in the case of a few species, within hollows and crevices in trees. The majority of species are found in relatively moist habitats such as shaded gullies in forested areas. Species are spread from South Australia (Adelaide Hills) through areas of Victoria and up the east coast into Queensland. The most northerly known species was only discovered relatively recently and lives in the remote mountains west of Mossman.

Most ground dwellers will occupy naturally occurring spaces beneath rocks and logs, and line the interior with silk. Many species have multiple entrances which are tube-like openings of silk, usually with some distinct silk strands (trip lines) connected to them. These lines alert the spider to the presence of prey when they are hunting. Insects, spiders and small vertebrates such as lizards and frogs are taken by funnel-web spiders. The prey is simply ambushed and overpowered, bitten and dragged back inside the retreat to be consumed.

Regardless of their fearsome reputation, in nature these spiders don't have it all their own way. They have their share of predators, even some which will take them on within their lairs. Centipedes are expert funnel-web predators, and will readily enter the retreat, attack and consume the occupant. Outside their retreat, funnel webs are far more vulnerable and wandering spiders have a whole spectrum of hungry animals quite willing to deal with them. These include birds, small mammals and reptiles.


Funnel-web spiders are super-sensitive to vibrations in order to hunt in the manner they do. Approaching human footsteps are usually enough to send these spiders scurrying back inside their secure homes. They are certainly not looking to take on anything our size. Human encounters are usually as a result of people digging the spiders up accidently, or with male spiders that are roaming looking for mates during the breeding season.

Funnel-webs have a very distinctive appearance; they are glossy black and the front half of the body is relatively hairless. They have the same basic shape as Australian trapdoors and tarantulas, but unlike funnel-webs, these are usually brown and are quite hairy.





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Freatures of Furanda

This month we look at one of the largest of our gliders, the **Squirrel Glider**. Quite often understandably mistaken for his smaller relative, the Sugar Glider, the Squirrel Glider is much larger: body length up to about 23cm, and weight 23og, compared to the Sugar Glider's 18cm and 14og and the Feathertail 8cm and 12g. The Yellow-bellied glider, also found on the Tableland, can weigh in up to 700g.

The Squirrel Glider's tail is much bushier and wider (almost the width of the body at its base) and is more prehensile than its Sugar cousin. The Squirrel also has a sharper face to the Sugar's comparatively snubbed face.

Given these differences between the two gliders, plenty of experts still confuse the two. Seeing them side by side highlights obvious variation.

They are not strictly a rainforest glider, preferring drier forest areas or wet forest bordering onto the rainforest. Generally they are found through south east Australia to northern Queensland.

As with most of his relatives, he dines nocturnally on insects, pollen, nectar, and also is partial to eucalypt sap which he extracts from drilling into the trunk with claws and teeth.

Observers have recorded glides up to 50m on flat terrain, and over 100m with sloping down hill assistance. The membranes running between back and front legs (Patagium) are also used to steer and can be independently adjusted, with the tail adding rudder assistance.

Again, as with most of his relatives, he builds a nest in a tree hollow which he will share with one, two or more females and any offspring up to about two years old. Nests have been found with 10 residents.

It is important for all landowners to appreciate the necessity of the 'old' forest trees with their essential hollows and nooks and crannies to house not only our unique gliders and possums, but nesting birds, insectivorous bats, reptiles and the numerous other creatures, great and small, that inhabit them.

The Squirrel Glider's status in some parts of Australia is "Threatened" or "Vulnerable", however in Queensland is classified as "Least Concern', indicating that he is not considered under immediate threat — although many wildlife observers dispute this status. As usual, with most of our wildlife, threats are mainly man-made, such as habitat clearing, barbed-wire fencing and introduction of predators.

One unusual killer of gliders and other small mammals is outdoor water containers, particularly stock water troughs and tanks. In search of water, especially in the hot months, small mammals can drop into such containers and be unable to escape. If your property has troughs, open-top tanks, or any water receptacle with smooth internal walls, please position a rope or stick into the container to allow critters a chance to save themselves from drowning.





The Silent Wildlife Killer...

A common killer of not only gliders, but possums, birds, bats and flying-foxes are landowners fencing their land with fences topped with one or two strands of barbed wire.

It is a mystery why this practice is so common, especially on numerous properties where there is no stock to contain.

It certainly wouldn't deter even the laziest of trespassers, especially when you might notice that many of such barbed wire-fenced properties usually have a 'normal' (un-barbed wired) gate, or even a permanently open or non-existent gate.

To exacerbate the situation, many landowners then plant flowering natives such as bottle-brushes, grevilleas, flowering gums, along the fenceline to disguise its ugliness – thereby unintentionally luring unfortunate fauna to the deadly entrapment of the barbed wire to undergo an agonised death by starvation and thirst.

Who discovered the Barron River

James Venture Mulligan discovered the Barron River in 1875. Mulligan was on expedition from Cooktown, seeking to find another payable goldfield, as the Palmer River Goldfield was reaching a stage where most of the easy pickings were nearing their ends.

Mulligan found the Barron River, high up the in river system and as the river was in close proximity to the already known Mitchell River system, presumed it to be the headwaters of the Mitchell River and didn't place a name on its waters.

The Barron River is therefore sometimes referred to as 'Mulligan's Mistake'. Mulligan also discovered the payable Palmer River Goldfield (1873), Hodgkinson River Goldfield (1876) and named nine rivers in the Mareeba and surrounding areas.

Answer: Aboriginal – Mayula = 'clever-men', 'medicine men', 'sorcerer' (Robb's Monument).


The storywater for this refers to a man and a woman breaching etiquette by


Answer: European – Robb's

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


11 books to reshuffle you, reconfigure you and maybe renew you!

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

A Grinter's Tail

Horse Power – v – Horse Power

It's not a pretty sight from any angle when a horse collides with a car. An average horse weighs around half a tonne, about the same as a grand piano. A large male kangaroo weighs around 90kg, and we've seen the damage they can do. Do the mathematics, and I think that tells you a horse, or a grand piano through your windscreen is no picnic.

Horses weight is high, and they won't go through your radiator, they'll go through the windscreen and onto your lap. Half a tonne in your lap, or your child's lap. It doesn't bear thinking about, but it seems that's the point, so many of our local drivers don't think about it.

If a young child was standing right next to the road, or even on the road, I guarantee most people would take a wide, wide berth, as young children are unpredictable. Let me tell you now, horses are equally, or more, unpredictable. They are flight animals. If something frightens them, even the most experienced rider can be taken unawares.

Everyone needs to know there are strict rules about traffic and horses.

We've chosen to live in a natural environment. There's controversy over cassowaries on the range and whether they warrant a mention as a road hazard. Well, for what it's worth, I can't see any difference posting that there's a cassowary on the range, than posting someone is walking or cycling down the range, or a car has broken down on the range – it's a road hazard.

Probably like so many others, I go up and down the range constantly. Time to think and chill, and there's a therapeutic rhythm to the bends, so much so that you can be hypnotised by the serenity, and if your mind's on your working day, it's easy to forget the possible presence of cassowaries, especially, if like me, you have never seen one on the range in almost forty years. So a little reminder doesn't go astray.

So back to horses. There's a huge difference between a horse and a bike. A bike is inanimate. As such, the rider has control. Despite this fact, fairly recent legislation tells us to give bikes a wide berth, one metre in fact, and yes, to cross double white lines if it means avoiding collision. Any person with a modicum of intelligence however, would perhaps hang back for just a moment or two, if it meant crossing the double lines coincided with the crest of a hill, or another situation in which visibility of oncoming vehicles was impaired.

We choose to live in a rural area, because supposedly, we enjoy and appreciate the rural environment and all that comes with it. Now, of course, you don't take your horse on the road if you know it is nervous in traffic, but the horse is an unpredictable animal, and where sixty cars might go by a normally bombproof horse without incident, the sixty-first might just have the qualities of a leaping predator.

It is totally foolhardy, dare I say stupid, to drive within a metre of a horse. It might not be you who causes the problem, it might be someone popping up by the hedgerow with a whipper snipper just as you go by, or, as happened to me, a trail bike starting with a bang in a driveway (fortunately that horse did not react – his blood was worth bottling as that would have caused the most placid horse to shy into traffic). It might be a flapping ute tonneau cover, or the rattle of a trailer wheels, or just the wind rush accompanying a larger vehicle.

Death is almost instant if the horse turns into the path of the vehicle, and that's for horse, rider and driver. Believe me, it happens a lot. Just Google the words horse and collide.

If you recognise someone on horseback, don't hoot or yell out of the window as you go by. That could just be the trigger that sets a horse off.



Give horses a wide berth, a wide, wide berth. While horse riders always ride on verges where possible, sometimes there are no verges, and there's no alternative but to ride on the road. We'd rather not, but more and more tracks are being closed to horse riders.

It's a sign of the times, and the lack of information available that the internationally recognised downward wave of the hand to request 'Slow Down Please' is met by a friendly wave as a car or motorbike sweeps past just centimetres from our horses' flanks. 'P' platers are completely ignorant of the danger, probably a sign of the times. Please parents,

educate your kids.

Please take the time to visit https://www.qld.gov.au/transport/safety/rules/other/animals/, and these are the basics:

"Vehicle drivers must stop at the side of the road and turn off their motor if a horse rider signals that their horse is jumpy or agitated. The horse rider can signal to the driver by raising a hand and pointing to the horse. The driver must not move the vehicle until the noise of the motor, or the movement of the vehicle, won't aggravate the horse.

"If you need to take evasive action to avoid an animal on the road, assess the situation and take appropriate action that avoids or prevents risk to yourself and other road users. You must not unreasonably obstruct the path of other road users or cause a traffic hazard.

"You may safely stop or drive on the road shoulder to avoid hitting an animal, and if you have a clear view of approaching traffic you may safely:

- drive to the right of the centre of the road to avoid hitting an animal (if there is no centre line) or
- drive to the right of a dividing line, a dividing strip, over a single continuous line, over two parallel continuous lines or over a painted island to avoid hitting an animal.

Any evasive action you take must be considered necessary and reasonable." *P.S. Thought for the New Year: How can Kuranda possibly contribute to peace on earth when half the time we can't even be civil to each other on Facebook community pages?*



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So well known are papayas (pawpaws) to us that this month we will just share some recipes. Though little beats a fresh ripe papaya with a squeeze of lime, nature sometimes conspires to give us green fruit not ripe so here are two recipes for hot and cold green papaya fruit. Helpful if you don't beat the birds to harvest. There is also a cocktail and dessert - both delish.



Papaya plants grow in three sexes: male, female, hermaphrodite. The male produces only pollen, never fruit. The female will produce small, inedible fruits unless pollinated. The hermaphrodite can self-pollinate since its flowers contain both male stamens and female ovaries. Almost all commercial papaya orchards contain only hermaphrodites. For cultivation, however, only female plants are used, since they give off a single flower each time, and close to the base of the plant, while the male gives off multiple flowers in long stems, which result in poorer quality fruit.

Two kinds of papavas are commonly grown. One has sweet, red or orange flesh, and the other has yellow flesh. In Australia, these are called "red papaya" and "yellow papaw", respectively. Either kind, picked green, is called a "green papaya".

The unripe green fruit can be eaten cooked, usually in curries, salads, and stews. Green papaya is used in Southeast Asian cooking, both raw and cooked. In Indonesian cuisine, the unripe green fruits and young leaves are boiled for use as part of Lalab salad, while the flower buds are sautéed and stir-fried with chillies and green tomatoes as Minahasan. In some parts of Asia, the young leaves of the papaya are steamed and eaten like spinach.

Vegan Green Papaya Salad via mydarlinglemonthyme.com (Single serve portion)

1/2-1 birds eye chilli, 1 small clove garlic, 1/4 cup roasted unsalted peanuts, 1-2 teaspoons finely grated palm sugar or raw sugar to taste, 1 cup finely shredded green papaya, 4 cherry tomatoes, 4 green beans, trimmed and chopped into 2-3cm lengths, 1-2 teaspoons gluten-free or

light soy sauce or tamari to taste, the juice of 1-2 limes (or lemons) to taste, sea salt to taste.

In a mortar and pestle grind together the chilli, garlic, peanuts and sugar. Add green papaya, cherry tomatoes and green beans and bruise lightly with the pestle while using a spoon to scrape the sides of the mortar and mix everything. Add gluten-free soy sauce and lime/lemon juice to taste. You are looking for a beautiful combination of salty, sweet and sour, so add more palm sugar, lime/lemon juice, or sea salt, as needed. Scoop out into a bowl and serve immediately.

Kaplanga Curry/Raw Papaya Curry Kerala style inspired by http://www.nisahomey.com

Raw papaya: About 750 gms, cubed, Organic turmeric powder, 1/4 tsp Coriander powder, 1/2 tsp salt: 1 tsp water, 11/2 cups coconut, 34 cup scraped green chilli, 1 tamarind (lemon sized ball), mix with 1/2 cup water to make tamarind water or use tamaring paste or you can use 3 or 4 tbsp of natural yoghurt instead of tamarind water (vegan use coconut yoghurt). SEASONING: A few tsp of coconut oil for frying, shallots, 3 or 4, sliced, chilli to taste, black mustard seeds, ½ tsp (1 sprig) curry leaves.

Peel the skin of the papaya and remove the seeds. Chop them into medium cubes, put the chopped papaya in a pressure cooker with turmeric powder, salt, coriander powder, and water. Or bring to boil in a pot and cook until a good texture for mashing, cover and turn off heat. Grind scraped coconut, green chilli, and turmeric powder to a fine paste (add a thing of water, if needed). Lightly mash the cooked papaya, add in the ground coconut paste. Bring heat back to medium, and mix the coconut paste. Once it starts to boil, add in the tamarind water and mix well.

Heat a small pan with coconut oil, add in mustard seeds, shallot, red chilli and curry leaves. Pour this over the papaya curry, close with a lid so that the flavour does not escape. Serve hot with rice.

Sweet Sticky Rice Parcels with Red Papaya via ABC TV The Cook and The Chef (Ep 31)

Serves 4

125g Thai white glutinous rice, 175ml coconut cream, 2 tablespoon palm sugar (light Thai style), pinch of salt, 2 red papayas, 1 Banana leaf for wrapping, lime (optional)

Soak sticky rice in 250 ml of water overnight. Cook in rice cooker for around 20-25 minutes adding another 250ml water (approx.). Combine 2 tablespoons palm sugar and the warmed coconut cream until sugar is dissolved. Follow with a good pinch of salt. Pour this mixture over the rice. (The mix should be creamy, sweet, salty and slightly wet.) Tear long "shoe lace" strips from the banana leaf to tie up the parcels. Toast banana leaf over flame using a portable kitchen "blow torch". Alternatively you can put the banana leaf into a pot of boiling water or wave it over the stovetop. And cut the Banana leaf into 20cm (8 inch) pieces allowing you to make a "parcel". Peel and cut papaya into chunks and place the banana leaf on your bench, add a small handful of papaya and smear with the rice. Fold edges of parcel up to seal in contents, invert parcel so papaya is topmost and steam. Or my favourite is to char grill at a medium temp for 10 mins until rice is perfumed, caramelised and the papaya is mushy. A squeeze of lime if desired.

Per serve: To a mixing glass loaded with ice cubes, add 4 dashes of bitters, 4 parts of lime juice, 2 parts papaya juice, and 5 parts gin. Blend well and strain into a chilled wine glass filled with ice. Top off with club soda and serve garnished with a cherry.

Planning for a \$300,000 upgrade of the Henry Ross Lookout on Kuranda Range Road has begun with the Department of Transport and Main Roads consulting with key stakeholders before finalising the design.

The scope of work is yet to be finalised, but potential improvements include a new platform and weather shelter, extended walkway, upgraded fencing and installation of new information signs.

Works will also include the removal of long grass on the embankment in front of the lookout and the installation of weed matting and low maintenance ground cover plants. Work will be carried out by RoadTek and is expected to be completed by late June 2017, weather permitting.

A road safety review is being conducted on a 60-kilometre stretch of the Captain Cook Highway between Florence Street, Cairns and Port Douglas.

The investigation is part of the Queensland Government's Transport System Planning Program, and is a new approach to reviewing road safety and will enable TMR to develop a prioritised, strategic program of safety upgrades for implementation along the route, as funding becomes available.

Technical officers will look at a number of safety treatments, including: wide centre line treatment; guardrails; removal of roadside hazards; intersection improvements; motorcycle safety works; cyclist and pedestrian facility improvements; upgraded signage and line marking; and upgraded lighting.

A reminder that the Queensland Government intends to ban single-use plastic shopping bags in 2018 and is a critical step in a long term plastic pollution reduction plan.

A public discussion paper was launched late last year with the closing date for public submissions 27th February 2017.

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
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What's on our minds?

CASSOWARIES, SNAKES

ON THE KURANDA RANGE ROAD

With the number of calls reporting cassowaries on the Kuranda Range Road, you'd be forgiven for thinking there'd been a population explosion. But, we could be seeing more than one. There's Karl with his chick close to where the "cassowary crossing" signs are (seen umpteen times) but there could be another male with two chicks towards the bottom on the road and yet another, possibly a female. Karl comes on to the edge of the road to pick at small red/black berries. The berries fall from a tall canopy tree and embed in the crevices of the bitumen. Not easy to sweep away. We're doing all we can to get Transport & Main Roads to take some responsibility, but it's slow and heavy going!

IF YOU SEE A CASSOWARY ON THE RANGE ROAD, A QUICK CALL TO 4093 8834 HELPS US KEEP TRACK AND ADVISE THE AUTHORITIES.

Kuranda is snake heaven. Most of the calls we take are for pythons and night tigers (the orange/brown ones). The pythons go for the chickens, wallabies and cats; the night tigers seem more interested in insects. Neither has a dangerous bite. You can usually sweep them out of the house if they are small. The big pythons are a different matter. Usually quite docile, you often need two people - one at the head end and the other to unwrap the tail end from your body. Call Jax on 4093 8834 if you

need a hand.

AND PIGS

National Geographic is seeking our assistance re the interaction between pigs and cassowaries. There has long been uncertainty as to whether pigs raid cassowary nests for eggs or attack chicks. We believe they do. It's probable that this nesting season, just passed, the nest of our Black Mountain Road bird was attacked. We believe he was sitting but was seen looking stressed and bruised one day and didn't return to the nest. There is a boar in the area and no chicks this year. 1+1=2? Pig shooter Kalle Oiderman will be the star. He is liaising with National

Geographic.

Cassowaries in and around Kuranda

The season has been late this year. Juveniles are usually sent away to find their own home ranges long before the end of the year, when the parent birds are ready to mate and sit on eggs. There is a young bird, named Hercules, at the western end of Mason Road, seen by many residents in the Williamson Drive

Then there's been a similar looking juvenile seen on properties near the Fallon Road Recreation Centre. Same bird? It's hard to tell.

In March, we'll have a CASSOWARY **IDENTIFICATION** session at the nursery at 1 Pademelon Lane, and over morning tea we'll talk about plants and how to catch a snake. Hope you'll come.


Our happy raffle winner - Coral Stratford

Lacelid frog claims another site

Frog monitors this month reconfirmed the endangered lacelid frog (Litoria dayii) is present at Jeffreys Road bridge in Russett Park. The previous record of calling there was in 2000. Warril creek was discovered as a brand new location for the frog in April last year.

Regular monitoring ensures we understand what diversity and species numbers are present and guides us as to the level of protection we need to place upon the habitat in order to ensure the survival of our local threatened species.

All rainforest frogs need high quality water, low in sediment, and clean, clear riffles for breeding, with good quality wide rainforest corrdiors along the creeks to provide habitat for general living. If you know of any real estate like this, please let us know. We need to keep it that way to ensure their survival.

In Memory of Ramona Rusch

On behalf of her husband Wolfgang and her children Rosita, Rosmarie, Rozana, Ricardo, Rosalie, Rohan, Rainer, Rene and Ranjini let us remember Ramona's joyful, lively, feisty spirit, wicked sense of humour and her loving open heartedness.

Ramona first travelled from Sri Lanka to Australia in 1952 when she was just 18 years old. She lived in Adelaide working as a trainee nurse at the lung Sanitorium in Mt Lofty, and later at the home for incurables in Fullarton. It was during this time, she met Wolfgang.

Wolfgang and Ramona married in Cairns at St Monicas Cathedral on September 18th 1954. The wedding was reported in the Cairns Post on the 1st October (p.8) as follows:

"The dainty dark haired bride entered the cathedral on the arm of her father who gave her away. She was attired in an exquisite frock of silver tinsel brocade and nylon net with bolero to match. Her billowing skirt was of fully flared nylon net in two tiers over a foundation of rich taffeta and she wore silver sandals. A double tiered, foamy veil of tulle fell gracefully from a tiara of orange blossoms, which framed her face. Long white mittens were worn by the bride and she carried on her arm a bouquet of while orchids, roses and gladioli".


Ramona made her own bouquet and designed her own wedding dress. Later she put all that netting to good use making mosquito nets for her babies' cots. During the early years of their marriage, Ramona and Wolfgang lived all around Far North Queensland - Cairns, Innisfail, Atherton, and Mareeba. They built their first house in Mareeba in 1958. In 1962, they sold the house and travelled by ship to Germany with their five children. In 1965, now with seven children in tow, went to work in PNG. Another child born in Port Moresby and soon another baby on the way, Ramona and Wolfgang went on holiday to Sri Lanka and so it was there that their last child came to be born in Sri Lanka.

Ramona enjoyed living in small town Kerema PNG where Wolfgang was employed for the public works department as a heavy equipment fitter. She took a part time job with radio Kerema and became the town barber, baker and resident artist. She was commissioned to paint two large murals in the Kerema Catholic Church. This led to an invitation to paint the Stations of the Cross in the Cathedral in Port Moresby. Ramona loved portrait painting; her painting of Sir John Guise, the first Governor General of PNG was purchased to hang in Parliament House. Whilst living in PNG as if she did not have enough kids of her own, Ramona also opened up a licensed baby care centre.

In 1972, the family returned from PNG to Cairns. Ramona and Wolfgang bought a fish and chip shop in Parramatta Park in 1976. Later Ramona bought a dress shop, named Nakula's Asian Imports, in Grafton Street, selling sarongs and many of her

In 1979 Ramona and Wolfgang moved from Cairns to live a self-sufficient life on a five-acre block on Greenhills Road Kuranda. Ramona named this place "Nirvana Reach".

Ramona was renowned for her cooking having established two Sri Lankan



Ramona had an adventurous spirit and liked to explore the world but she also longed to put down roots. She felt at home in Kuranda, surrounded by like-minded people who also had a love of the land and growing things. She was thrilled when Wolfgang found the land at Koah and together with their children purchased this property. Here is her description of her first day on the land:

"So now we were on our block of land with no house. We looked around and chose this site close to the creek. I had a desire to look at water and also wanted to have water at hand to water my plants... So I stuck in a few cuttings and put all my pot plants under a tree... I started by raking a few pathways and Wolfgang was raking a spot for our future home. We slept in the car which got really cold and water dripped on us all night...I'll never forget how cold it was! Next day I set about getting our temporary kitchen ready. I collected firewood and three huge stones for the fireplace. I boiled water and we had our

first cup of coffee. I found a tree branch and hung the cups off it and put a basin for rinsing the cups on a hollowed out log. I loved it ... I started planting some of my trees and pot plants... (Selection of Ramona's writing, c. Jan. 1996).


Wherever Ramona settled, she created lush edible and ornamental gardens and always had something creative on the go: if she was not painting portraits, she was making wax lilies or crepe paper roses, sewing clothing for her children, cooking delicious feasts. Whilst living in Koah, Ramona was commissioned to weave unique hats for feature films The Island of Dr Moreau and Paradise Road. Ramona also enjoyed being on set as a featured extra. Ramona found pleasure in writing children's stories, script writing and researching her family tree. She would often design costumes, sing and play piano to encourage her children and grand children to find pleasure in the art of performance.

Ramona thrived on the land along with all the plants she nurtured along the way. She would have happily lived there for the rest of her life, surrounded by her children and grandchildren, had she not suffered an aneurism that led to a stoke 16 years ago. Ramona and Wolfgang decided to move to a more convenient wheelchair friendly unit at Trinity Beach.

Each year Wolfgang would take Ramona for overseas holidays. He wheeled her all over the world, including Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Borneo, Malaya, Thailand, Singapore, New Zealand, Germany, Austria, Italy, Croatia, Hungary, and Denmark. During the last year of Ramona's life when she needed extra care, she lived at Bupa in Mooroobool. Wolfgang lived right next door. They were married for 63 years and had hardly lived a day apart. During the year that she was in Bupa, family visited Ramona each day and she happily escaped the home to visit Wolfgang daily.

Ramona will be sadly missed. It is fitting that Ramona's ashes have been brought back to the land at Koah where she was most content and happy, and where family and friends can visit.

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A Thought for February

THIS month we read a short passage from St Matthews Gospel Chapter 4 verse 13-16.

One of the most wonderful things we can do for someone is to affirm them. We can help them to become aware that we think a great deal of them and therefore expect much from them. It is not enough just to feel this; we have to express it. This is where we often fail. Sometimes we fail most with those who are closest to us and whom we love the most.

Failing to affirm others can also cost a great deal in the workplace. In both family life and with our colleagues or employees we can for a long time assume that they are fully aware of our appreciation of their performance, so we fail to mention it. They do not feel they can ask us and keep wondering until the relationship is damaged.

Jesus was careful again and again to affirm people, making it clear that he thought they had a great deal to give if they only chose to do so. He was equally ready to question their motives and actions if He felt it necessary

just as we must if relationships are to be honest and

In this Gospel passage Jesus is surrounded by a crowd on a hillside near the Sea of Galilee. He turns to them and says something so affirming and generous that we use it to this day. Jesus says simply, "You are the salt of the earth". But immediately he emphasizes that being the salt of the earth, being gifted, being useful, being creative, brings with it responsibility. The question then is how we use and offer what we have been given [v 13].

Again Jesus affirms his listeners. He says: "You are the light of the world." Once more He immediately asks us to be accountable to God for the gifts and qualities that may entail [v 14]. We may be the salt of the earth and the light of the world, but we will be so only if our gifts are directed out from ourselves towards others. If they are all directed into ourselves and our own interests, then that which makes us salt and light is useless to God. The whole value of salt is its effect beyond itself. The whole point of light is to reach out and to guide.

Jesus is quite direct and stern here. He affirms us but calls us to account for what He knows we can be and do. Affirming people does not mean that we ignore their shortcomings. But if we affirm one another when we should, we will enable each other to respond to the demands and the responsibilities placed upon us. Jesus then shows us that affirming one another makes it possible for us to be responsible to ourselves and to one another.

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Into the eclipse season again. And the numbers Lare quite intriguing. At around 11.00am on 11 February there is an annular lunar eclipse at 22 degrees Leo, with the Sun at 22 degrees Aquarius. Well now that cycle is complete; peacefully, gently and with gratitude and forgiveness. Nice Piscean qualities. And it's also an annular eclipse; The Moon sitting centred on the Sun, with a golden ring of light haloing around the rim.
