

The issue of fluoridation of our water supply is too important to be determined by the vocal minority who demonstrated in the park at Kuranda. Why is it that our councillors are prepared to act in response to this display of confused and misleading information while paying no heed to the fact that the vast majority of our residents stood aside hoping their lack of support for the anti-fluoridation campaign would be noticed? Could it be that our elected representatives were influenced by their own views rather than taking into account the feelings of their constituents?

These questions can be easily resolved: if, as seems likely, there is a referendum on the question of de-amalgamation then it behoves the Tablelands Regional Council to have the question of support for fluoridation added to the referendum paper. Then, and only then, will the Council be in a position to make an informed decision on this important health issue.

In Defence Of Flying-foxes

I see that one of Bob Katter's Australia Party mob has made the news by "offering to pay for the cost of shooting flying-foxes in Charters Towers" (Sunday Mail 25/11/12).



Shane Knuth presumably doesn't think that the extermination of a substantial number of an ecologically important species should be of any concern. No doubt his comments have brought a few sagely nods of approval and admiring chuckles from his redneck mates. However these sorts of comments do nothing to arrest the growing concern in the more rational community concerning the competence of this state government to address any conservation, arts and humanitarian issues with any sense of responsibility at all. Paradoxically enough, Knuth is a member of the government's Agriculture, Resource and Environment Committee. Clearly the "Environment" section of this Committee runs a distant third in importance. This Knuth comment will, in the mind of many rednecks, give a tacit approval for them to go forth and shoot any flying-fox in sight. Why stop there? There's plenty of other pesky ' invaders" into suburbia that some complain about - brush turkeys, galahs, various other birds, possums and macropods.

The Charters Towers council is now apparently following advice it should have taken a decade ago, to create a habitat outside the town for the flying-foxes. All fauna experts agree that flying-foxes prefer native flowering flora and fruit, and those townships surrounded by farmland that have knocked down this native food source in favour of agriculture, now pay the price by having 'invaders' into parks and gardens in the suburban areas.

I wonder if flying-foxes weren't black and they made melodious whistles and songs, would we be so quick to condemn them.

Kuranda Visitors Centre

I write in response to Mark Riley's letter criticising the administration of the Kuranda Infrastructure levy and questioning the design of the new Visitor's Centre.

In order to hear anything, one must stop talking. Differentiate fact from opinion and recognise that not all opinion is born of a reasoned approach nor backed by facts.

As one of the community reps for the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory committee (KIAC) and as an ex-volunteer at the Visitor's centre, I'm aware that a new visitor's centre space has been a long time in the planning. The surveys done for the KIAC strategic plan showed there was high interest from tourists for information which a Visitors Centre provides. Take a look at the size of Kuranda's visitor's centre, then, as you tour across the Tablelands (Mareeba, Herberton) and beyond, you will understand that the current space is woefully inadequate to service the increasing numbers of self drive and independent tourists to Kuranda. The new design for the centre is modern and funky — a building which represents that special Kuranda feeling, don't you think?

It seems rather unreasonable to assume the town's ambience is solely the council's responsibility to fix, and to correct the description of Kuranda by the JCU tourism academics mentioned, quoted as "state of advanced destruction and substantially weakened theme". One might look to the unfortunate situation in Kuranda where CBD business owners haven't been able to speak with one voice to council for many years regarding the environs in which tourists shop, the lack of a unifying theme across shop fronts, the quality of merchandise, I'm sure there's quite a list, none of which the council is in control of – some poor planning decisions yes – but mandating Kuranda shop fronts – hardly.

The Kuranda Infrastructure levy was set in place by a special agreement with the State government some 15 years ago. The purpose was to provide funding to upgrade the infrastructure of the Kuranda village, as the increasing numbers of tourists put pressure on the town services and the local council could not afford to fund the upgrades required: sewerage, roading and footpaths.


No other town in Queensland has such an infrastructure levy: \$1 collected for each visitor arriving by train and a yearly access fee paid by Skyrail (note: not by bus or self drive). This agreement has been extended for another 10 years but no levy increase was agreed by government. Very hard-nosed of them as inflation diminishes the real value of the dollars. The levy's lifetime is unlikely to be extended again, as Kuranda, in the next eight or so years, will have much of the infrastructure required to service its visitors, some say too much already. The government also agreed to allow funds to be spent on maintenance for the first time. But yes, the ratepayers will be paying for the maintenance in the future, as with all infrastructure.

The agreement specifies that the funds are to be spent on enhancement for the visitor and resident's experience in equal measure. Hence the proposed river walk was top of the tourist and the resident's survey list, the proposed covered walkway from the train and Skyrail will benefit tourists, the toilet block at Barron Falls and regulating access to Wrights lookout might benefit both groups.

Here's a list of the larger items of infrastructure funded by previous KIAC money: Centenary park improvements, toilet block and plantings, road signage, rail bus parking, Barang St carpark, walking tracks, the extensive upgrade of upper and lower Coondoo street scaping, including the fig bonsai planter boxes, the brick paving, the bollard street lighting, a share of the toilet block at Barron Falls, Wrights lookout upgrade.

Farewell Eco-Warrior!



THE woman we all knew as Di Horsburgh, began her life as Dianne Christine McElwain on 10th July 1952. She and her sister, Sandie, were brought up in Auckland, surrounded by their mothers' family. She had a happy childhood, and was extremely close to both her sister and her mother, and remained so throughout her life, until illness claimed the life of her sister in 2001, and some years later in 2009, her mother.

These losses were extreme for Di, and she often talked about these wonderful women to her friends and family. Di was a strong, independent woman and greatly admired others with that trait! New Zealand, however, could not contain such a large personality as Di, and at the age of 16 she made her way, by herself, to Australia.

Initially travelling around by herself, she met the father of her oldest son, Justin, in Perth. Their relationship was short lived and for the first year of Justin's life she raised him by herself. She met her younger son Jaime's father, Marshall Horsburgh in Sydney later on.

Shortly after Jamie's birth, the adventurous pair purchased a yacht and sailed – if not the seven seas – all the seas around Australia and the Torres Straits for the next 14 years from 1971-1985. This time, spent living primarily in the Torres Strait Islands region, sparked Di's deep love and respect for indigenous peoples, their cultures and their values.

Di home-schooled the boys and provided them with a childhood that gave them the opportunity to become resourceful and independent, to the point that at times the children were entrusted with sailing the yacht while their parents took a much needed rest. Di made many connections in the Torres Straits, and her honest and direct character opened up the opportunity, when she finally became a landlubber to manage Wharf Agencies from 1987-2000.



True to form, Di would only deal with the cray fishermen who dealt with their catch in an ethical humane way and in exchange ensured they were paid a fair price for their catch.

The 1990s were a turning point in Di's life. Hinchinbrook Island was threatened by the development of a mega resort, to be built on its doorstep within the Great Barrier Reef Heritage area. Di helped to organise a blockade of the site, and was even arrested at one point and charged with piracy!

She went on from this experience to study and gain a degree in Environmental Science. Di was passionate about many causes, and was also a leader in the campaign to stop the Kuranda Range Road becoming a four-lane highway. She was also a cofounder of the Kuranda-based Friends of the Earth group, and in 2004 was elected president of CAFNEC and was involved in Friends of Hinchinbrook, NQCC, Cairns Action Group, Save False Cape and Save Mona Mona.

In more recent years, Di worked tirelessly in the area she loved best, as the Cairns community campaigner for The Wilderness Society, working at grass-roots level, growing community support for the protection of Cape York Peninsula and in particular the protection of the Wild Rivers legislation in force to protect this unique region from being completely overrun by mining concerns.

Di made a lasting impression on all her knew her, and unlike many passionate and committed conservationists, never rammed her own views down anyone's throat, rather she led by example.

Even in the last weeks of her short fight with the aggressive cancer that claimed her life, Di was still insisting that her coffee be purchased using her "keep cup".

This woman, who always took her own (re-used and washed) plastic cutlery on board when she flew, refused to use anything throw-away if there was an alternative open to her. Di was a keen supporter of live music, festivals — anything. Di never missed an opportunity to attend whatever she could, and even a few weeks before becoming so ill that she was forced to go into hospital, made the effort to attend the inaugural Black Mountain Unplugged Festival.

Di could be found enjoying or campaigning, often both, at all the annual local festivals, and made many, many friends as a result. She was a keen supporter of local music as her CD collection attests!

She loved to travel, and was up for any road trip or adventure that anyone suggested, and she would also often take the opportunity to hire a "Wicked" van and travel by herself to smell, touch and be in the wild places that were so dear to her heart.

We will all miss our Di. Her passion and integrity touched the lives of many, both here and all over this huge country. Di passed away on Saturday, October 6th, 2012, surrounded by her loving sons Jamie and Justin, and close friends, at peace, happy to once again be in her beautiful open rainforest home.

Di also leaves her three grandchildren, Cougar, Ice and Hewn as well as her daughter-in-law Amanda Horsburgh. We will all miss her.

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Rhonda Brim

(Kuranda/Mona Mona)



Rhonda was awarded a Cassowary Award for her dedication to advancing respect of Rainforest Aboriginal people, their cultural obligations to country and supporting their beneficial participation in decision-making and on-ground management of Wet Tropics landscapes.

"The Wet Tropics is Rainforest Aboriginal country. I appreciate being given this Cassowary Award because, as a Djabugay person, I have fought hard with other Bama for over twenty years for us to be recognised as the original landowners. We are still here and we won't go away. The Wet Tropics is our country and we want to manage it. This is for us mob," Ms Brim said.

Djabugay traditional owner Rhonda has been actively involved in Rainforest Aboriginal engagement for twenty years. She was a key Aboriginal negotiator over four years for the Wet Tropics Regional Agreement signed in 2005, a director of the Aboriginal Rainforest Council, a member of the Rainforest Aboriginal Advisory Committee and a member of the Australian World Heritage Indigenous Network. She was instrumental in steering the comprehensive community planning for Mona Mona, negotiating the Mona Mona Management Agreement with the Wet Tropics Board, and more recently, successfully campaigning for and securing a long-term lease from the Queensland Government for the Mona Mona community. Rhonda has led the way in community governance and is a Director of the Mona Mona Bulimba Corporation, and a Director of the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation, who also run the Djabugay Aboriginal Guided Tours with Skyrail. Apart from her long-standing community leadership at a local and regional level, and her artistic endeavours, Rhonda's passion is being a role model for young people in the Kuranda district and encouraging them to succeed for themselves and for their community and country.

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New Chinese Direct Flights:

On 31st October, Cairns saw the first direct services start from Mainland China. The China Market is certainly not a new market to North Queensland but with the introduction of direct services from mainland China, this market is going to be an increasingly important business sector for Cairns and Kuranda. The first wave of Chinese tourists has already been visiting Tropical North Queensland. Many of these people have come from areas which are socially, culturally, and linguistically different from mainstream mainland China. The second wave of Chinese visitors will have a different socio-cultural and political background. They will be Mandarin speaking mainland Chinese citizens who have limited experience of Western societies and values. Their behaviour and their needs may be different. Understanding the behaviour and the culture of these people and focusing on their specific needs will ensure that more mainland Chinese visitors and potential investors will be attracted to our region. Tourism Kuranda will be targeting this market more in the coming 12 months we hope to work closely with local operators to ensure a positive experience to Kuranda village. We are also in the process of producing a basic "All about Kuranda" information sheet in Chinese and we will be including a dedicated Chinese Page to our new website which is currently under construction and will be ready for launch in early 2013.

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





Health Effects of Mould in the Home

There is often misleading and dramatic reporting of the potential health effects of mould; however it is undeniable that some people are particularly susceptible to its effects, and that most types of moulds can cause health effects of varying degrees.

To better understand the potential health effects; this is an extract from the EPA's guidelines to mould: "Moulds produce allergens (substances that can cause allergic reactions), irritants, and in some cases, potentially toxic substances (mycotoxins). Inhaling or touching mould or mould spores may cause allergic reactions in sensitive individuals. Allergic responses include hay fever-type symptoms, such as sneezing, runny nose, red eyes, and skin rash (dermatitis). Allergic reactions to mould are common. They can be immediate or delayed. Moulds can also cause asthma attacks in people with asthma who are allergic to mould. In addition, mould exposure can irritate the eyes, skin, nose, throat, and lungs of both mould-allergic and non-allergic people".

So we can see there is good reason to be wary of mould on a wall or ceiling, and the very young, the aged, and those with immune compromised systems are particularly susceptible.

A mould infestation in the building materials may be caused by a past roof leak or other water intrusion that has started the mould, and without a remedy, years of bleaching and high humidity have spread it throughout the home. So if you have even a small issue, deal with it now. Don't wait until it requires major works and may cause your family health issues.

For investment property owners, this is particularly relevant as they may be exposed to potential litigation. In a recent court case, tenants were awarded \$10,000 for damage to their furniture and clothing caused by an untreated mould issue in the building. Experts also found the mould contributed to the tenants' frequent respiratory health issues.

Mould thrives in high humidity, and with the wet season nearly upon us, this is a good time to take care of any ongoing mould issues. So what can be done? For starters, bleach does not kill mould on porous surfaces

such as timber and plasterboard. Bleach merely strips the melanin compounds out of the hyphae membrane so it looks like it's working, however it will quickly regrow, aided by the water within bleach. There are a number of "home remedies" which have had varying success but are not yet proven. Do not worry; there are new products on the market now that can kill mould on porous surfaces. Do your homework and make sure you read the label for ingredients and that its efficacy is proven.

The culture of having to "live with mould because you live in the tropics" is no longer relevant. There are potential health effects and affordable solutions are available.

The CD has a collection of new original Australian reggae songs.


Elements of reggae, rock, soul, blues, funk and jazz ensure the album has a diverse range of sounds.


You guys do a great job and have a very welcome Christmas break and we'll see lots of families here in the break enjoying the aquatic side of fun and learning

The Birth of the Prophet Founder of the Baha'i Faith

Celebrated by Kuranda Baha'is

By most measures, November 1817 was a decidedly "ho-hum" month in world history. Colonialism was in full swing. The French Revolution had disappeared. On November 5, a war broke out between the British and Indians at the Battle of Khadki. On November 20, the first Seminole War began in the American state of Florida.

Historical almanacs show the change in 19th century thinkers, passing from a world of crushing conventionality (Jane Austen died that year) to a world to come of intense questioning and social and philosophical ferment (Henry David Thoreau, Frederick Douglass and Frederik Hegel were born that year and Charles Darwin was born only a few years before).

But on November 12th, 1817, a Wednesday, a baby was born in Tehran whose life, Baha'is believe, ushered in a new era of dramatic change and modernity that would eventually lead to the long-promised but elusive era of peace and spirituality

The baby was named Husayn. As a youth He showed many remarkable traits peaceful, happy, wise beyond His years, in fact, so wise that despite His complete lack of theological training the most learned of the clergy could teach Him nothing, but only learn from Him.

In early adulthood, he, like the Buddha, rejected the princely existence that was his inheritance, instead choosing to serve the poor. He became a follower of a new messianic figure and became his leading apostle. When that person, the Bab, or "gate", was martyred, he fearlessly led the believers on and eventually was confirmed as the One whom the Bab had heralded — the promised one of all the great religions.

Of course, 194 years later, only a relative handful of people — about one in 1,000 people on earth, spread over virtually every country and territory, know this date as being special.

One online source lists November 12, 1817, as the birthdate of Bahá'u'lláh, with the descriptor: "Persian spiritual figure." And this lack of recognition, Baha'is believe, fulfils ancient prophecy — that when the spirit of Christ returns He will come as a "thief in the night," as Biblically recorded.

Baha'is in Kuranda, like elsewhere around the globe, celebrated this birthday this month in a spiritual manner.

This is the same in every great religion, where the birth of the Founder is commemorated as a joyous occasion. A gathering was held on the Tablelands, to which many friends and those interested attended as well as local Baha'is. It was a happy but spiritual gathering.

Of those that recognised the special status of Baha'u'llah in his early days, the Russian Government of the time was in the forefront.

Their Imperial ambassador offered Baha'u'llah a place of refuge in the face of severe persecution in which thousands were killed. Baha'u'llah graciously declined this offer and left his destiny to fate, to spend the rest of his life as an exile and prisoner through the Ottoman Empire to the Holy Land.

But one Leo Tolstoy, a Russian and among the foremost intellects of the 19th century, whose life span offset that of Bahá'u'lláh's by only about a decade, may have put it best when he wrote:

"We spend our lives trying to unlock the mystery of the universe, but there was a Turkish prisoner, Bahá'u'lláh, in Akka, Palestine, who had the key"

Scorched Earth

Bushfires are in mind at the moment given recent fires in the area. In Australia, land management with fire is a deep tradition. Aboriginal culture used fire strategically for tens of thousands of years before the arrival of

Paleontological evidence indicates Australia was covered by mostly rainforest millions of years ago. Gradually the continent dried and Eucalypt and Acacia trees came to dominate the landscape in many places. Both these

> large groups of trees are fire-adapted - and favoured by burning.

> These days, we struggle every year to control wild fires and try to minimise damage from them. Damage caused to flora and fauna by late season burns can be significant. Sadly, nearly all out-of-control fires are lit by people - either carelessly, in ignorance, accidentally or with malicious motives.

Burning is often viewed as the cheapest and easiest way to manage land. Pastoralists regularly burn vast tracks of land to control weeds and promote new growth. From their perspective, burning has served Australians

Climate change introduces a new factor

into the equation. Though Australia doesn't currently include carbon dioxide emissions from fires in their total emission figures, we already have one of the highest greenhouse gas emissions per capita in the world.

There was pressure in Copenhagen to include emissions from fires and farming in Australia's figures. Though this didn't happen, the scale of those emissions ensures the issue won't go away.

At a local level, we should aim to live harmoniously with our natural environment and to use fire intelligently.

If you do live in a bush fire prone area, put in fire breaks around what you wish to protect. Allow access for a fire engine. Keep breaks slashed rather than as bare earth to prevent erosion – or use livestock to keep grass at bay.


Re-vegetate weedy patches, especially if they're in an area where rainforest would be the natural habitat. If you think it's necessary to do a hazard reduction burn, check if there's a total fire ban and remember to get a permit for fires bigger than 2 x 2m from your fire warden.

Burn in May so you don't turn your hazard reduction burn into a habitat reduction and

mass cremation of wildlife. As a property owner, you have a legal responsibility to stop any fire leaving your property no matter where it starts.

Last but not least, join the local Rural Fire Brigade! As well as helping your community as a whole, this empowers you in the event of a fire and you learn how to protect yourself and your property.







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Today, luxurious cakes of organic soap and bath products, made from secret recipes with ingredients such as goats' milk, cream, fruit and honey, botanical flowers, herbs, clay and essential oils are available for our bathrooms and our homes. The aroma greeting me when I entered **Rimei Toff**'s studio was fresh, natural and exhilarating. Bowls of rainforest scented bath salts stirred up the senses and I was fascinated by the colours and subtle perfumes in Rimei's natural handmade soap.

Where is your current studio?

Within my home in Koah. It is one long room and was planned in the building. I have been creating bath products in this studio for almost seven years. I actually started using it before the house was finished.

Do you work alone or with others?

I work alone creating my bath products. I do all the production, and my partner Bernie attends to the business side.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Good energy. I am very much an early morning person and I prefer natural light so I usually work during the day.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

Monday and Tuesday I am in the shop, so Wednesday to Sunday 10am-4pm each week I am creating in my studio. I am disciplined with my hours and my work, but I do, of course, take time and days off when necessary.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

I make bath and skin care products from natural plant-based ingredients. I try to always use Australian products but I sometimes have to source some essential oils from other parts of the world when particular plants are not available here.

Why is soap making your chosen medium?

I was a dive instructor before this and one of my work colleagues was also very artistic. Together, as a sideline, we made 'things' for the markets. We started making handmade soap, long before this product became so popular. My friend moved away and I continued making the soap on my own. Now it is my full-time business. I really enjoy creating things. If I was not doing this, I would be making something else. I enjoy working with wood and stone. I made most of the furniture for our house and built the natural rock walls in the garden and on the drive to our house. [I passed this incredibly long stone wall as I came up the drive and was amazed to learn that Rimei had collected the rocks from their property and built it herself. TR]

List three things you listen to while working.

Selected music CDs, birds and my nine chooks. My free range hens make it their business to know where I am and they follow me and talk to me. I also have three roosters and they certainly make themselves heard. When the cicadas are about, they can be so loud, but that is part of living here and I love it.

Your favourite tool?


My hands. With all my creations I couldn't do anything without my hands.

How do you identify your work?

The word 'Ceti' – a star in the constellation, and a picture of a whale. I have always loved to dive with whales on the Barrier Reef. Together they form our business logo.

How do you sell your work?

At our Bath Shop in Coondoo Street, Kuranda. We have been open five years in the



Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I do not teach. I used to be asked but I consider teaching to be a skill in itself. I prefer the peaceful meditative process of creating on my own.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

Not at the moment.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? I would like more time. Everything I do is time-consuming and there is always

I would like more time. Everything I do is time-consuming and there is always much on my list. Being disciplined helps and I ensure I do the things I have to do before I do anything else. But there is only so much that you can do in the time that is available, so more time would be welcome.

If you were not working with making bath products what would you be doing?

I have done many amazing things, including swimming with whales and watching turtles lay their eggs. I guess in another 20 years I will still be making things. My life has never been planned and I tend to just go with the flow. This is where I am now and who knows? Maybe exploring the unknown depths of the oceans!

At this finishing point in the interview, the beautiful little hen Tiffany arrived and took up her place on Rimei's knee, rearranged her black and white feathers and peace, harmony and goodwill prevailed. TR.



local couple that had found an unusual bright orange spider in their possum box. They Googled the spider and it led them to us. It was a Tiger huntsman. Since then we have found four more specimens, including two on our property in November. The last one climbed in my office window! We are also aware of few more sightings. One dead specimen turned up in a fumigated house in Mossman, and a couple more have been photographed in the Daintree region. There is no doubt more people that

We suspect that these spiders are not all that rare, but may spend much of their time in the rainforest canopy. They show great aptitude for jumping, far more so than most other huntsman species. We have observed them moving to the edge of large leaves, spreading their legs wide, and leaping competently to leaves 30cm away. This is a behaviour that species residing on the tree trunks do not exhibit.

have seen them without knowing their significance.

Like other huntsman spiders, this species are accomplished hunters. We have observed them capturing moths in mid-air, and they readily prey on cockroaches, katydids and other smaller spiders. Their reproduction is very similar to other huntsman spiders, producing hundreds of eggs and wrapping them in white disc-like egg sac. Tiger huntsman in captivity often silk together large leaves to conceal themselves while incubating their eggs. We have learnt a great deal about this species in the past six years, but there is still much more to know. The species still remains undescribed, but recent molecular work on specimens sent to US indicates it is most likely a new genus. One thing is for sure, though – Kuranda is certainly the home of this elusive species.

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
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New species of spiders are classified on a regular basis, but it is rare for something so large and spectacular to go unnoticed for so long. Meet the Tiger huntsman; an undescribed species which just happens to be one of the largest and most colourful species in Australia. It lives right here in Kuranda. We found the first recorded specimen of this species in 2006 near Lake Morris while working for Melbourne Museum. When I first laid eyes on the spider I knew it was something special. It was the kind of spider that you would expect to see on the cover of a spider book, yet I had never seen a picture of it anywhere. Fortunately we were able to capture the spider and I took plenty of photos. The photos of the specimen were sent to a variety of spider taxonomists throughout the country, but no one was familiar with it. The specimen was sent to the South Australian Museum where a taxonomist who specialised in huntsman spiders was working. He confirmed that it was in fact an undescribed species. Unfortunately that taxonomist retired soon after and the Tiger huntsman remains undescribed.

As luck would have it, the first specimen we found turned out to be a pregnant female, and she laid eggs several months after she was collected. We were able to raise many of her offspring and display them within Melbourne Museum's live invertebrate exhibition 'Bugs Alive!' Her descendants are still on display there today.

For the next three years after finding the first specimen, we continued to visit this region looking for invertebrates for Melbourne Museum. We spent hundreds of hours in the rainforest and encountered an enormous number of invertebrates, but not a single Tiger huntsman.

We moved to Kuranda to live in 2010, and in early 2011 we were contacted by a









"The Legacy: An **Elder's Vision for our** Sustainable Future"

bu David Suzuki (2010, Allen & Unwin) ISBN 9781 74237 3553, RRP \$8.95

DAVID SUZUKI is well known to many readers, particularly those concerned about the environment. A biologist and scientist, environmentalist, academic, futurologist, lecturer and writer, a man of many talents, his teachings and writings have affected an entire generation. Some might regard him as tending to be at the more extreme end of the global environmental debate, but this is perhaps

a little unfair. His passion for the subject is evident, but many would say that his approach, particularly in so far as he has concentrated on the indigenous or tribal peoples' perspective, is quite appropriate in this age. There are no doubt lessons for the contemporary global society to learn from this perspective.

Recently retired from his professional work, this book comprises his retirement thoughts as an "elder" after a lifetime of environmental advocacy. And his thoughts may be seen by some as rather radical. But then he would assert that these are dangerous contemporary times that call for a radical adjustment of the thinking and practices of humanity in this 21st century. He is not a pessimist. He sees these times as both dangerous and providing an opportunity for change.

He points out that for most of human history we lived in local tribal societies able to live off the local environment and learning to live in balance with that environment. But now we live in much larger territories for which we are prepared to fight and die. We exist in a much different and more divided relationship with the earth. And in his view, this relationship is not sustainable into the future. It is, in his view, a relationship that is in crisis. The demands of ever increasing economic growth and population pressures are running head long into the natural capacity of the earth to accommodate these pressures.

Of course this approach is not new. There have been predictions before of a

point of climax and a disaster of global proportions that adversely affects human civilisation as a whole. But this has not yet happened. There have been famines, droughts, floods, cyclones, wars, disasters of all kinds, but not of the global magnitude anticipated by some environmentalists. Science and technology have so far both contributed to avoiding this. So what is new about this call of Suzuki?

Suzuki foresees that the present degeneration of the earth cannot continue indefinitely, there has to be a limit. And to avoid the worst, he is offering his own view as to how to avoid that limit. He calls for a number of changes in approach: From the emphasis on neoclassical economic growth to the biological realities of nature; From a war economy to a peace economy; From planning for our immediate future to planning for our long term future; From a people increasingly divorced from out natural surroundings to a holistic approach to life that values and interacts with the whole of nature of which humans are a part.


But Suzuki goes further than that. He sees that just by adopting a new and sustainable environmental approach to the earth is not enough by itself. And it is in this respect that he moves beyond the approach of some environmentalists. He

> calls for a new approach to the centrality of love and empathy in human society. We need love, he says, to realize our full human potential. And he says we are spiritual beings, and that we need spirit more than ever to understand the value and sacredness of nature and to live in harmony and balance with each other and with nature.

And cities: "I can imagine a future in which cities are exquisitely adapted to climate, the surrounding landscape and wildlife, and the natural rhythms of the seasons, in which every building captures all of the sunlight and water falling from the heavens, where food is grown on rooftops, where roads are permeable and allow water to percolate back into the earth instead of running through gutters and sewers, where a yard becomes a natural landscape and not a monoculture of grass, and where butterflies flit through gardens in every schoolyard. I can picture a city where cars are rarely needed because of all of the action and fun are going on in the streets of the neighbourhoods where we live, work and play"

He is a visionary, but a visionary whose views are based on rational argument. And while we may not agree with everything he says, we dismiss such visionaries at our peril.

Like me, if you are a sucker for plants, well almost any plant - the new, the strange, the beautiful or bizarre or the one(s) on your Want List finally obtained, how many proved reliable, perished or are still sitting waiting for you to find the perfect spot? At last count, I have eleven pots in the waiting, remain embarrassed by the plenitude of perishers but still enough of the thriving to count my blessings.

Visiting for therapy with other plantaholics, this holding number seems an average range, not too severe, in a life-time addiction.

Talking of addiction, it is never too early to introduce your child to this vice of gardening via a potted plant. Boys seem to like prickly specimens, cactus or succulent, girls more floral fare, but them's stereotypes, maybe even give a non-sexist pot of herbs as the young gardener's ongoing contribution to the meal table. Whatever - needed is the oncoming generations to learn and love plants not only for their endless beauty and fascination but for the vital role plants play in the tapestry of life and as importantly, have young people move into the specialist gardening groups and forums as old-timers pop their clogs and take with them lifetimes of expertise.

Any gardener worth their digging fork, knows that their work is never ending, their garden ever changing, knowledge ever acquiring and friendships ever growing. Nothing, I think, provides as much contentment and fierce and unexpected joys (and yes, sometimes disappointments) as working in one's garden – be it only several potted plants, average plot or acreage. Is it some primeval memory of a lost Eden? I also know that so many gardens hold dear memories of childhood, family, friends and places in that special plant given or exchanged.

An often forgotten benefit of gardening, we won't count the fresh air, exercise or relaxation, is the opportunity to meet other gardeners, amazingly generous. indomitable and inspiring. Tales of gardens created in most inhospitable sites, wiped out in cyclones, cindered in bush fires, trashed by wild pigs, turned over by bush turkeys. And the knowledge and experience to be gained. That's why joining a Garden Group, generalist or specialist, is the ideal way to learn and enjoy gardening and meet both novice and veteran.

Congratulations and thanks to Graham and David, Kuranda Palms, and Greg and Julie, The Retreat, for again hosting Open Gardens and sharing their visions of Paradise. It takes an awful lot of behind the scenes preparation, a great deal of hope and trust that the weather will be fine, no unexpected blight will mar, the special bloom will hold and faith that the visitor will enjoy and not souvenir that precious plant, so again – thank you for sharing.

Make a note, coming up is Friends of the Flecker Botanical Gardens Plant Sale on Sunday 2nd December, always a good place to pick up the odd and interesting as well that plant that took your heart in somebody else's garden.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: Crinums (Amaryllidaceae family) with a 100+ species world-wide, with major concentration in Africa, gives planting choice for almost any spot – from relatively dry to very wet. Australia has five native species, with Crinum pedunculatum (Greek krinon: white, Latin pedunculatus: "with a peduncle", referring to the long flower stalks), commonly known as the Swamp Lily, most usually seen and may be found growing along creeks and tidal areas along the east coast as far south as Newcastle.



Crinum pedunculatum

Crinum pedunculatum is a large bulbous perennial, which may reach more than two metres high with a similar spread. With strappy leaves, the clustered and faintly perfumed flowers occur in the warmer months. Of particular note as a featured plant is the often boldly white and green striped leafed form.

Most Crinum species will grow well in any soil to which plenty of compost has been added. C. campanulatum needs to be placed in a pot in water. While growing best in full sun, Crinums will tolerate light shade and thrive in wet spots. C. moorei does well under trees and is a most useful species for the 'dry shade' problem. All plants will benefit greatly from occasional feeding with liquid fertilizer and compost added to the growing medium.

The greatest threat is the black-and-yellow-striped amaryllis caterpillar (Brithys pancratii) which may virtually destroy a plant overnight. In the garden, the amaryllis caterpillar often necessitates regular spraying in summer with a broad spectrum insecticide or more satisfyingly hand picking off the grubs although this requires a very early rising.


Crinums dislike being transplanted and take time to re-establish. Flowering across Spring - Summer with various floral forms, there are enough species and hybrids to satisfying even the most discerning.

Q @A. Dear Peter, OK, OK, you win. I was wrong and you were right - apologies and I humbly eat worms! Here are the two Anthuriums correctly labeled as the "King" (Anthurium Veitchii) and the "Queen" of Anthuriums (A. warocqueanum). And yes, I promise to explain more botanical terms and/or provide one term a month. So there!

Dear Trisha, Couroupita guianensis, the Cannon Ball Tree, coming from the Amazon rainforest is a large deciduous tropical tree to 30m+ and flowers with large waxy yellowish pink perfumed flowers in cauliflorus racemes [Cauliflory: where flower and fruit come from main stems or woodu trunks rather than from new growth and shoots.1. The tree bears, directly on the trunk and main branches, large globose woody fruits, like big cannonballs hanging in clusters. These fruit contains many small seeds enclosed in an unpleasant smelling jelly. Not a tree to plant where falling fruit may injure but certainly an interesting feature.

Dear Jeremy, Any reader able to supply seed/source of the following: dwarf form of Grevillea decora from Laura, Neofabricia myrtifolium and Syzygium papyraceum.

Hercules Moths

Our Hercules Moth breeding program started out a little by accident. It started when people would bring in a female moth laying her eggs, or just the eggs themselves, and we would raise the caterpillars and let the moths go and just leave it at that.



Since we opened up the breeding nursery to the public though, we have noticed that our Hercules moth caterpillars have been of intense interest to visitors – no surprise really, full grown they're huge.

For those of you that don't know their story — they are the biggest moths in the world, and consequently the caterpillars are some of the largest as well. Hercules moths don't eat when they have transformed into the moth stage of their lives, rather they live off stores put in during the caterpillar stage. This means that they don't live very long — anything between 5 to 10 days is their time spent as a moth, and during that time they have to mate and lay eggs.



The Hercules moths that we have been breeding in our nursery are usually put on display as caterpillars, and then for a day when they become moths. We then release them outside so that they have the opportunity to mate. The females tend not to fly very far at all (she's the bigger of the two), relying on the male to come and find her. Makes sense really, she is already near the plant where she needs to lay her eggs and time is limited.

Although over the years we have had the Hercules in various stages almost constantly, the last lot of caterpillars we raised seem to be taking a long time to

emerge out of their cocoons and we really need some more eggs to keep the program going.

We would really appreciate it if you could keep an eye out for these moths around your properties, and if you happen to see a female laying eggs, if you could either drop some in to us at 8 Rob Veivers Drive or ring us for us to collect, so that we can continue our breeding program and give everyone the chance to see these amazing insects.





Generosity is a possibility for most people if we give of ourselves, our time or our talents. This month's focus is on **The Families as First Teachers program**–FAFT, currently in its eighth year in Kuranda.

The FAFT program is designed to support families in helping to get their children ready for school and engage them in early literacy and numeracy activities. School is a culture of structured learning, expectation and being with unfamiliar children and adults. This can be a real shock when children have had the freedom to entertain themselves surrounded by familiar faces and places.

The FAFT program is run by a qualified teacher, supported by a teacher's aide, a community liaison and a volunteer. Children are introduced to the concepts of sitting in a group, listening to a teacher, engaging with songs, stories, painting, counting, games and books in the comfort of having the back up of family members.

Think - Kindy where the whole family stays.

FAFT runs two sessions a week: 10.00 am-12.00 noon in two locations:

- · Saint Saviour church on Tuesday
- · Kowrowa Community Hall on Wednesdays.

To get an inside perspective I asked Kate (who has given her time for the last two and a half years on Wednesdays) why she feels the program is important.

"To me volunteering is about giving back to the community things that you have learnt in your own life's journey, to support others as you have been supported yourself. I really felt I could identify with what the FAFT program is all about and that is, preparing children to be school ready.

"When you embark on the journey of parenting you really do not know what you don't know. This is how I felt about the process of preparing my children to be 'school ready'. I was lucky I was supported through my lack of awareness by all the wonderful teachers at the Kindy, then while attending pre-school as well through the insight of friends and neighbours who had done it all before me. I was amazed at what was learnt through play and the easy way in which literacy and numerous concepts can be introduced into everyday life. Even the task of learning the letter combination of their own name and the names of their friends was an introduction to words having meaning.

"Mat time, sharing meals, having food they could open and eat without help, a structured routine, singing, being in a large group with their peers, listening to the teachers, being comfortable, confident and speaking up in a group is not something that is learnt at home but is needed for a child to be "school ready".

"It wasn't until my first child entered grade one did I even realize how important this process of getting them ready for school really was. With my second child I looked at learning through play in a whole new light and it gave me greater confidence as a parent being his first teacher. It is with this knowledge that I have gained through my own experience that I hope I can help support other families in our community give their children a strong start in school."

The FAFT program aims to help close the gap and has been enhancing the schooling experience of many children over the last 8 years.

Down But Not Out

MOST of the senior members of our community, at least those who lived in North about five miles from Kuranda. Mr. McDonald was alone in the plane and was Queensland in their youth, will remember Tom McDonald. McDonald owned and operated a jewellers shop in Cairns from the 1923 to the 1960s.

However, he was better remembered as the father of the aviation industry in Far North Queensland. In those days the only way to import merchandise from the south was by ship, a costly and sometimes erratic exercise.

To circumvent this problem, in 1929 McDonald purchased his first plane, a Gypsy Moth, to ensure a regular and speedy delivery for the merchandise for his business. His first landing strip was on a saltpan where the present light aircraft terminal is now.

"Tommy Mac", as he was generally called, eventually built an aviation business carrying passengers, freight and mail throughout North Queensland.

He generously made his aeroplanes available to transport many injured and sick patients to Cairns for treatment, and was instrumental in the establishment of the Cairns Aerial Ambulance.

But well you might ask "What has all this to do with Kuranda?'

Well it transpires that Tom McDonald took off from Cairns on 7 February 1941 and had engine trouble west of Kuranda. He searched for a safe landing place and made a forced landing near the Barron River. The **Cairns Post** reported:

"Mr. Tom McDonald, the well-known Cairns airman, while flying his single-engine Miles Falcon machine, made a forced landing a little after 9.30 o'clock yesterday morning on the northern bank of the Barron River between Mantaka and Kowrowa, uninjured. The machine received slight damage to the undercarriage, and lantana cut one wing.

McDonald was able to borrow a boat and row across the river to the residence of the Dillon family at Kowrowa. Here he was able to phone the news to Cairns. He organised to have a rail wagon sent up the range to carry the plane back to Cairns. A van carrying first-aid was also sent but this was not needed. Many locals, including several members of the Veivers family, offered their assistance to drag the plane across the Barron River to the railway siding where it was loaded for its trip



down the range. McDonald said he hoped to have the plane flying again within a few days. There is no record available to tell us how long he was grounded in this instance. However, given his reputation for surviving several mishaps, and his ability to be in the air again within a short time, it is presumed that Tommy Mac was not earth-bound for very long.

Apparently McDonald liked what he saw from the air when he flew over Kuranda, because he purchased a property in the vicinity of his forced landing - but then he might just have decided it would be a good idea to have an emergency landing ground ready - just in case!

Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee

The Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee has a new member, with local hotelier Robert Matthews joining the group. Tablelands Regional Council voted on Thursday 15 November to accept Mr Matthew's nomination following the resignation of committee member Terry Pates in October.

"Mr Matthews will take on the role of tourism representative and I welcome his appointment," Tablelands Regional Council Mayor Rosa Lee Long said. "I thank Mr Pates for his input and am delighted to see this community organisation continuing to attract support. This council welcomes community involvement and values the contribution of organisations such as the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee".

Recycling Popular with Survey Respondents

Tablelanders who responded to a Council survey have indicated they are firmly behind plans to introduce waste recycling.

The Tablelands Regional Council has conducted community consultation on a new draft Waste Reduction and Recycling Plan and survey results from that process were presented to the most recent meeting of council.

"The community returned 1287 responses and the results were overwhelmingly in favour of recycling," Mayor Rosa Lee Long said. "The question 'Do you support recycling' received a massive 96.1 per cent 'yes' vote. That is a very clear indication for council in its future planning."

The community of Atherton also backed the return of a dump shop, with 56.7 per cent of responders saying they would use one. In Mareeba though, only 23 per cent said they would use a dump shop.

Other replies indicated that the existing waste transfer station hours were meeting the needs of 93.7

per cent of responders.

Of those living in the former Atherton and Mareeba Shires, 92.5 per cent said they would use a recycle bin at their household.

"This level and detail of community feedback is extremely useful for council, we are developing policy for a range of issues and this kind of information helps us to bring in documents that do what the community wants us to do," Councillor Lee Long said.

A report on the survey results received unanimous support from Council.

A full copy of the report into the survey results is available to the public on request to the TRC.

State Government to Force Fluoridation on Tablelands Communities

Kuranda and Malanda water supplies will be fluoridated with the State Government moving to slam the door shut on any other option, Tablelands Regional Council Mayor Rosa Lee Long said yesterday.

"The existing legislation, the *Water Fluoridation Act* 2008, had created the situation where legally, council had no choice but to fluoridate," Councillor Lee Long said.

"There has been strong community opposition to this especially in Kuranda and Malanda and council has done everything in its power to honour that position. There was, I believe, a clear expectation from Premier Newman and the Local Government Minister that community wishes would be respected. In August the Premier was reported in the press as saying: 'Certainly, we would not be removing it from any location where it exists already, but the idea of forcing certain communities right now to put it in and incur the cost, that is something I am more than happy to have a look at.

"However the new legislation will trample all over that. Instead of allowing these communities a choice, the State Government has tabled laws that, when adopted, will mean there is no option at all."

The new legislation, contained in the South East Queensland Water (Restructuring) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2012, has been introduced to State Parliament and is expected to be debated within the next few weeks.

"If passed, and Premier Newman has a massive majority in Parliament, Council will be left with absolutely no option and there will be very severe penalties if we do not obey," Cr Lee Long said.

Graham Nicholson — a Man For all Seasons

Most people who read this paper will have read Graham Nicholson's interviews. Today it's Graham who is the subject of this interview.

Graham Richard Nicholson was born in 1942, in the bush town of Beverley. He had a grandfather, two uncles and a cousin who were solicitors, and the grandfather was the Leader of the WA Upper House and an ex mayor of Perth. Graham remembers his school life in the bush as monotonous and boring. He was an asthmatic and frequently sick. He gave up his first attempt at University due to a shortage of funds, but gained a Commonwealth Scholarship after going back to school for a further year.

Graham graduated in 1967 from the University of WA in Perth with an LLB(Hons) and a reputation as a bit of a reprobate. His cohort included a future Leader of the WA parliamentary opposition (who was also his future wife Terrie's cousin). Graham was articled for two years in his uncle's firm. He earned \$10 per week: \$1 went on petrol and he lived off the remaining nine. He must have had enough over for flowers and chocolates because at the end of his articles he and Terrie were married.

The couple lived for the next five years in the bush, South West of Perth. Graham worked as a solicitor but was suffering more and more from asthma so they returned to Perth. A friend went to Darwin and wrote back enthusiastically about the prospects in the Territory. He urged Graham to come up and work for the government. A house would be provided. Graham and Terrie upped stakes and followed.

Graham found himself thrust into constitutional review. The Territory Legislative Council had been half nominated and half elected, with the Commonwealth having the right of veto, but was preparing itself for full representation as an elected Assembly, so the machinery of government had to be re-invented. In October 1974 the Country Liberal Party won the election and together with two independents formed the new Legislative Assembly.

Then came Cyclone Tracy, striking at Christmas in 1974. Darwin was demolished and all but a skeleton crew were evacuated for three months. Graham's house was destroyed and his family evacuated but he returned early to help with the legal side of the recovery. Toward the end of the first moratorium the Commonwealth decided to extend it for a further three months, against the wishes of the local Assembly. The Commonwealth needed its desires to become law before the locals could finesse it by unilateral action. Graham was handed a despatch containing the newly drafted amendment to the Emergency Powers and, with no notice, no tickets, no money and few clothes other than shorts and the great-coat he was wearing at the time, told to get himself down to Sydney by any means possible and pass

the paper to the Prime Minister. Graham bluffed his way onto aircraft, firstly to Adelaide, then Melbourne, then finally Sydney and Kirribilli House. At each stop an unhappy fare-paying passenger was bumped from the next leg, with the help of Commonwealth phone calls and Graham's insistence that the mail must get through.

When the Governor General was finally in possession of the paper and the Bill was on its way to becoming law, Graham was no longer needed. He found himself surplus to requirements and wiped, as it were, like a dirty nose. He can't remember how he got back to Darwin but when he finally arrived he was exhausted and spent several days in hospital.

Graham was invited to join the Commonwealth Attorney General's Department and was detailed to assist an inexperienced member of the Assembly with her new portfolio of Law. At one stage he was the complete legal branch of the Northern Territory Government.

Between 1974 and 1978 the family, now with three children, were living in a caravan next to a cyclone damaged house they had bought, and in his so-called spare time Graham rebuilt the house. In July of 1978 self government came to the Northern Territory. Six months beforehand a full public service was installed by Canberra. Life was chaotic. Graham was now First Crown Solicitor in the new Crown Law Office, advising Ministers. There were no precedents. Graham was deep in developing the Constitution. Long hours were worked. He was in and out of the Federal and High Courts due to continued heavy negotiations with Commonwealth public servants. He became a workaholic and his health and family life suffered. He became obsessive. Several minor strokes were glossed over and ignored.

In 1979 Graham broke down, mentally and physically, and briefly took time out, away from Government. He

frequented the library at a local Community College, reading mostly Philosophy and Comparative religion and developed his lifetime interest in the Bahá'í faith, which emphasises the spiritual unity of all mankind.

The Community College transitioned into a branch of the University of Queensland and Graham became part of the team overseeing the transition. He went to the University part time, graduating as a Master of Laws and became an adjunct Professor and Law Lecturer at the now fully transitioned branch. His day job was in the Law Department. During the mid '80s there was a bi-partisan move in the NT Government to proceed to Statehood and Graham became legal adviser to Parliament, serving on select committees over many years. During the early 90s he became Crown Counsel and finally Senior Crown Counsel. He commenced practising as a Barrister.

A referendum on Statehood failed in 1997, largely because of party political machinations and there came a period of recriminations and bloodletting. Graham took early retirement in 1998 and left behind, as one of his legacies, founded by him and named after him, the Graham R Nicholson Law Library of the Northern Territory Government.

Even in retirement the Northern Territory follows him. Because of the high turnover of civil servants, Graham is often the only one with the institutional knowledge necessary to prepare briefs and sometimes to deliver them on behalf of the Territory. It is not backward in coming forward to ask for his expertise. Graham loves the intellectual challenge but is grateful it's not all the time. After living for several years on Magnetic Island, he and Terrie sold up and bid on a house in Townsville but detoured via Kuranda on route to visiting Palau. While here they learnt their bid was unsuccessful and found themselves homeless; they bought a small cottage in Kuranda which they renovated and extended and have been here ever since.

Graham has always been an avid reader and collector of books, and over the years his personal library has grown to overwhelming proportions. Hoping others might share his passion, he took a lease out over his present office in Therwine Street, stored his own books there and started his bookshop, "Hidden Words". He loves tracking down and buying a hard-tofind book for a prospective purchaser: guaranteed to be better priced than Amazon. Graham can be found there virtually every weekday, presiding over one of the most interesting and eclectic collection of books to be seen in the tropics. Presiding also over two of the most indulged and loved dogs in the world, his beloved collies: Misty and Jaffa. Pop in and have a cuppa and a chat. You'll be made extraordinarily welcome by a true gentleman, with a wealth of experience but a humble manner. Garth Owen

NO, NOT A CASSOWARY **BUT AN EMU STORY**

A juvenile emu was reported to be pacing up and down the back fence of a property in Koah, not far from the Koah service station. It was feared the bird was weakening from hunger and lack of water.

All the local zoos were notified but no one was missing a bird.

No one can remember ever seeing an emu in these parts and its unlikely one stray bird would find its way from regular emu habitat tens of kilometres away. One theory is that the property the bird was trying to get into used to belong to

a wildlife carer and it was coming back for a feed. Water was made available to the bird away from the property and soon after it was seen grazing on the native grass which is its natural food.

For the time being, it seems the emu is OK but we are urging QPWS to take steps to relocate it to a more suitable location where there are other emus.

There's a lot we still have to learn about releasing wildlife after raising or rehabilitation as well as relocating. Home ain't necessarily home.

De-amalgamation Update: On December 14th the Minister for Local Government will announce whether or not there will be a vote on deamalgamation. Following the examination of all submissions and Queensland Treasury examination of costs, the Boundaries Commissioner will make his recommendation to the Minister in late November. Further details at http://www.dsdip.qld.gov.au/bc/ and on the TRC website http://www.trc.qld.gov.au/mycouncil/de-amalgamation-facts I am presenting this as information to residents and ask that you consider all the information before you form your opinion on whether or not you support de-amalgamation to a new Mareeba Shire. In the meantime, the Council of the TRC is intent on getting on with the business of running the TRC.

Kuranda Community Precinct: If you are interested in joining the Advisory Committee applications are now open (see advert in this edition) Council is progressing the resolution of October 2011 and September 2012. The full resolution is available on the TRC website. There are a number of parts to the resolution, including moving the Library to the site, sale of the Old Pre-School, removal of Block A and B and future planning for the community facilities at the

TRC Draft Planning Scheme: There are a number of changes to the State Planning Provisions. It is anticipated that Council will be advertising the Draft TRC Planning Scheme for public consultation from approx. Late December until late March.

FIKS Grants: Not for Profit Community groups and individuals are eligible for Council's FIKS (Financial and In-Kind Support) grants of up to \$2000 per year. Young people who excel in sports, cultural activities are also eligible for grants. Application details are on the TRC website or by contacting Council.

Recycling: Community consultation regarding the TRC Waste and Recycling Strategy has concluded and the results resoundingly support the introduction of kerbside recycling. Council has received the report of

the findings and the next step is to develop costings for implementation.

Fallon Road Jum Rum Causeway: Work has commenced recently on the upgrade to the bridge on Fallon Road. The road will be closed until late January to allow for construction.

Road Projects: Current works are occurring on reconstruction/upgrade of sections of Black Mountain Road and Mona Mona Road; design work on the safety upgrade to the Morton Street/Rob Veivers Drive intersection is still underway.

Pet Owners Urged To Protect Pets From The Summer Heat

With Summer fast approaching and temperatures starting to soar, experts are warning pet owners to protect their animal's welfare during periods of extreme heat.

Leading Queensland animal hospital, BVSC, is reminding pet owners that high temperatures can dehydrate animals and may be fatal if not treated quickly. BSVC founder, Dr Rod Straw, a specialist veterinarian, said that everyday activities can cause significant stress on animals during periods of extreme heat.

"There are some simple techniques that can be used to prevent your pets from suffering from heat stroke and heat exhaustionh", said Dr Straw.

- 1. Never leave animals locked in a car, even with the windows down:
- 2. Exercise animals during the cooler times of the day; 3. Always carry water and a foldable water bowl when on walks and hikes with your dog;

- 4. Clip animals with long, thick coats;
- and plenty of water;
- 6.Put non-zinc containing sunscreen on your animal's nose. It is a part of an animal's body that may not be protected by hair or pigment, and is very susceptible to sunburn. Unfortunately most animals will lick this off, so keeping out of the sun is still the best prevention.

Dr Straw said dogs and cats are at greater risk of overheating as they do not sweat in the same way humans do, and therefore cannot tolerate the heat as well. "In a short period of time an animal can suffer critical damage to its nervous system, heart, liver or brain, which can result in death", he said. "Pet owners should look for signs of heat stroke which include bright red gums and excessive panting. If your pet is having difficulty breathing, has thickened saliva, is

vomiting or has diarrhoea, it is possible it is suffering 5. Ensure pets have access to a shaded, cool environment from heat stress, and will require immediate veterinary attention.





A Thought for December

Each year at Christmas I enjoy the Christmas nativity scene and carols which in their soft familiarity often allow us to forget the harsh details of the birth of Jesus. In the romantic version Mary smiles, her hair is unruffled. She looks fresh as a daisy, unlike any newly delivered mother. Jesus is silent and still, clean and pink and happy unlike most new-borns. But we need to think and imagine a little more accurately about the birth of Jesus.

Joseph would not leave Mary behind, alone to face the shame and difficulties by herself, so he took her with him to Bethlehem. We may want to accuse him for making a young first time pregnant mother travel such a distance. It's no wonder she had the baby after that kind of trip. Donkeys don't carry evenly; they swing their hips as you ride. It would be a lot more of a roller coaster ride than a trip down the range on a bus. We can forget all this, the difficulties and obstacles, but St Luke's Gospel brings them into play.

We have a story of a young girl surprised by her pregnancy which would bring shame and dishonour and a puzzled man engaged to be married to her. Mary and Joseph believed, but she must have been afraid and he must have had his doubts.

St Luke's Gospel provides the detail about the census for taxing and explains why a couple living in Nazareth had their child in a Bethlehem stable but it also shows more of their difficulties for the taxes and the census were part of the Roman occupation of Judah. Mary and Joseph belonged to an oppressed people living in an

I always imagine Bethlehem as it is today, and was when Jesus was born - an overcrowded city, full of rotting garbage full of people and noise and jostling everywhere. And let's be honest – stables stink. The stable may have been warm but it would have smelled of manure, animal hair and rotting straw. The stable of a busy innkeeper is not spotless, the smoke from the torches; Mary is tired and dirty from a long trip and despite the angel's assurance, she is afraid. Mary has no midwife, and it is hard to imagine that Joseph attended prenatal classes. So this young mother must give birth in a stable with only the help of an old inexperienced man.

It is our human inclination to soften the dirt and suffering and fear but we must recognize that God was born into poverty, dirt, homelessness and fear, into a very real world, our world. God was born a wrinkled, bloody baby to a scared young girl in a stable.

The world of our imagined nativity scene needs no redemption, it is perfect already. But God was born into the world we know with all its wonders and with all its hatred, fear, dirt and pain. God so loved the world and God so loves you and me as we are.

That harsh manger scene is transformed into something warm and sweet by the presence of Jesus' himself. We see a stinky stable as something warm and mysterious and wonderful because we see it in the light of Jesus Christ.

If we can see something warm and mysterious and wonderful in the nativity scene, it is by the same light of Jesus Christ that we can see something warm and mysterious and wonderful and, see what God loves in us, in ourselves and in one another. My prayer this Christmas is that we might experience something warm, mysterious and wonderful in ourselves, in one another and throughout the entire world at Christmas.

December Stars
