



Help Needed ...NOW!

The Wet Tropics Management Authority (WTMA) and committed residents are trialling a community led approach to the eradication of Yellow Crazy Ants (YCA) in the Russet Park infestation. YCAs were first detected in the area in 2013 and dismayed householders have watched them rapidly spread through rainforest and backyards, killing and displacing native fauna.

Russet Park residents are determined to fix the YCA infestation and are coming together to form a community task force mentored by WTMA. This new approach could set a worldwide precedent in how to respond to new biosecurity threats.

WTMA will provide training and support to the community taskforce through its Yellow Crazy Ant Eradication Program. Taskforce members will be trained in YCA identification, how to conduct ground treatments, monitoring and data recording.

Through its current funding arrangements, WTMA can fund treatment of the Russet Park area until late 2016, however it is likely that follow-up treatment and monitoring will be needed for a number of years and new sources of funding may be needed.

The Russet Park infestation is one of two YCA infestations which adjoin the Wet tropics World Heritage Area with the other, larger area being to the south of Cairns. "Our" infestation, if we may call it that, has the "advantage" of being small, at 27 hectares, and so can be subjected to concentrated efforts which can be more easily monitored for their effects.

The area abuts the Barron River, however, and YCAs can colonise driftwood or form rafts which can move during flood events and finish up downstream. Constant vigilance and probably monthly testing for their presence will be a necessity. This is an area where citizen volunteers can be of great use.

All of Kuranda needs to be aware of the threat to our area and way of life these ants pose. If they become established here nothing will be the same afterwards; just ask a Russet Park friend. Their gardens have been stripped bare of other ants, other insects and other small creatures. There is a YCA nest under virtually every moveable rock, log, potplant, even seat cushion. They come inside and colonise air conditioners and light fittings.

This must become OUR job. We MUST eradicate them from their present sites and we MUST keep them from establishing new ones. More than fifty people have already volunteered to be part of the taskforce but those managing the response could do with many times that number. There is no substitute for feet on the ground. The next quarterly meeting will be held on Monday 22nd June 2015 at 6.00 pm at the Fire Brigade Building on Roscommon Park, Speewah.


All Speewah residents are invited to attend.

Kuranda To Get Wet & Wild

Our village in the rainforest will be transformed into a water wonderland on 4th July with a giant waterslide in Arara Street. The City Slider is a giant 325m long and 6m wide water slide with two lanes to whizz down and a layer of 35mm foam underneath for a soft landing. There is also a free mini-slide for kids under 110cm tall to enjoy throughout the day.

The City Slider is touring Australia throughout the year with previous events including Launceston, Hobart, Toowoomba, Wollongong and Newcastle. Tickets are on sale via www.thecityslider.com.au and past events have sold out so get in fast! Ticket prices are for 1.5 hour session \$35 general admission. Sessions begin at 9am with the final session closing at 8.30pm. Ticket holders must be a minimum of 110cm tall to experience the big waterslide and those between 110cm and 130cm must be accompanied by a ticketed adult. A free mini-slider (25m long) will be available throughout the day for visitors under 100cm.

The City Slider has a recycling system in place to minimise water usage and it also asks all participants to enter into a 'social contract' when purchasing a slide ticket where they commit to reduce their water usage before and after their day on the slide. A portion of every ticket sold is donated to cancer charity CanTeen.



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Gardening in Kuranda with Alectura

UNE and recent fleeting winds and rain remind us that the halcyon days of summer have passed and more tender tropicals are retreating to winter's rest. It is important to mark where these buried treasures lie as too often cut by spade or fork or planted over and yes – bush turkeys will often take them sans foliage.

Unfortunately, the annual beauty pageant of so many spring-flowering bulbs, featured in glossy catalogues and gardening magazines, fare poorly in our climate as lacking the cold to build up reserve for next year's flowers. Some very keen gardeners invest in yearly purchase of new bulb stock to enjoy the fleeting beauty of tulips, hyacinths, cyclamen and liliums as potted subjects.

Noted with interest some recent planting by the Mareeba Shire Council in the street garden bed outside the Red House. One to keep your eye on as to its success as a ground cover is Viola betonicifolia, possibly subsp. novaguineensis. With various forms of V. betonicifolia found throughout Australia, this particular form may prove more reliable than the more commonly seen and sold "Australian violet" V. hederacea which comes from cooler climate.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: Strophanthus is a genus of flowering plants in the family Apocynaceae, with near 40 species hailing from tropical Africa through to South Africa with a few species from southern India to New Guinea.

The name Strophanthus means "twisted cord flower" and is derived from the long twisted threadlike segments which on the species S. preussii may grow to 30+cms - surely one of Nature's more bizarre extravaganzas. S. preussii grows as a shrubby vine but may be pruned to shrub and also serves as an unusual potted subject and, once established, easily maintained in any well-drained soil in a sunny position. With its clusters of faintly scented cream-white, rust tinted throat and reddish long twisted cascading stringed flowers, this can be a spring/summer feature always remarked upon.

Also sometimes seen is S. speciosus, again with elaborated petals and requiring similar growing conditions. More vigorous and potentially a threat to the rainforest - as so many introduced ornamental vines have become - is S. gratus with fragrant flowers of white/purple, a woody liana growing up to 30m.

Many African tribes used the toxic alkaloids in plant extracts from this family to tip their poison arrows and modern medicine today uses it in cardiac stimulants.

Q & A:

Dear Rosie, thank you for the identification and I must learn not to throw away plant-name tags. Stifftia amarelle (syn. S. chrysantha), commonly known as the Yellow Powder Puff Flower, is a member of the Compositae (Daisy) family and is a multi-branched shrub or small tree growing to 3-5m and comes from Brazil. Preferring full sun and well-drained position, it is quite striking both in massed and individual flowering. As this is its first flowering in my garden, I am keeping eyes peeled for its possible weediness as it has a significant set of potentially winddistributed seed.



Dear Graham, Thank you for your sterling and continued work as an outstanding Kuranda eco-warrior helping to identify and report potentially invasive plant escapees. The Kearns Creek escapee is Ruellia simplex, the Mexican Petunia, a member of the Acanthus family and originally introduced as an hardy, easily grown garden ornamental but unfortunately now having weed status.



Dear Sue, The Curry Leaf Tree, Murraya koenigii, while valued in cooking curries has unfortunately considerable weed potential from its prolific seed set carried off by birds as well as its suckering, particularly when its wide spreading roots are damaged. To reduce these threats, you would be wise to plant in a large pot to contain and enable seed removal. Unfortunately, with the increasing take-up of health/cooking interests, more plants of unknown but likely weed potential are being introduced into local gardens.

Broadscale Clearing of World Heritage Quality Land has Begun on Cape York

The clearing of 32,000 hectares (330sq km) of World Heritage quality bushland has begun on Olive Vale on Cape York, one of the last intact and most diverse natural places on Earth. The clearing was approved recently in the dying days of the LNP government and was made possible by weakened legislation. The razing of the Olive Vale bushland would put 17 threatened species at risk and increase runoff and pollution into the Great Barrier Reef. The impact on wildlife should have meant the project was referred to the commonwealth under species protection laws, but it wasn't.

Land clearing has tripled in Queensland over the last three years with the approval of at least 1130 sq km of bushland for clearance and the removal of protection for another 7750 sq km of remnant native vegetation. This means that Queensland will once again be the land clearing capital of Australia.

Senate Committee comes to Cairns to Evaluate the Proposed Mt Emerald Wind Farm

Six senators held a public hearing in Cairns into the health, environmental impacts and regulatory governance of the proposed wind farm on the 18th May. There has been no wind farm approved in Australia which has so many people living so close to it as the Mt Emerald site with over 2500 people living within 5km of the turbine (700 properties) and 7000 living within 10km. The Senators heard testimony from many people who claimed that their life and health had suffered from living close to another wind farm in the area, which was attributed to various things as the noise, light flicker, low-frequency vibrations and infrasound.

At the inquiry photos were tabled which showed that the site of the proposed wind farm had been poisoned and the Senators were told that the area and its creeks now have the stench of poison. The Senators said they would refer this to the EPA as this has occurred before an environmental study of the site is needed to be done. Some threatened species known to have been in the area were the northern quoll and the southern cassowary.

Celebrate and Participate in World Environment Day, Friday 5th June

The theme for this year is understanding that the well-being of humanity, the environment and economies ultimately depends on the responsible management of the planet's natural resources as people are continuing to consume far more natural resources than the planet can sustainably provide. By 2050, when the world's population is expected to reach 9.6 billion, we will need to have the equivalent of three planets to sustain our way of life. Living within the planet's limits is clearly going to be necessary to ensure a healthy and secure future.

At one event on the day people will be protesting to the Cairns Council about the recent felling of thirty historic 125-year-old mango and fig trees in the CBD and also hundreds of letters and petition signatures will be presented to the Council asking it to declare the Cairns region to be coal seam gas free – as Cook Shire and Douglas Shire have done already.



THE BOOGIE BROTHERS CD REVIEWS

The Decemberists 'What a Terrible World, What a Beautiful World'



The album title is a line from Track 13: "12/17/12". The birth date of a baby boy who turns up in other tracks as well. New fatherhood is obviously a powerful theme here, "Better not wake the baby".

This is a seriously complex album, lyrics rich and evocative, skirting around the edges of strange dreamscapes with themes obscure and tantalising. Very R.E.M. in places. Lyrics like these often get lost in the mix. But not this time! *Colin Mozoy*'s lead vocals stay strong, bright and

clear; owning every word and phrase, lifting the poetry above the mix very convincingly. And it's a great mix; full-blooded guitars, keyboards, strings, percussion and backup singers. 14 tracks, each one a journey into a strange and unsettling landscape.

High-country rock, folk, militaristic, haunting and confronting. So many highlights we can't begin to list them. You'd have to say every track has something special musically and vocally, they consistently meet the high standard of the lyrics. And that's a very high bar. Sings Colin: "I'm a boy from the high country and I got a little love for the offering".



Actually, a whole lotta' love... A beautiful journey and already a contender for album of the year.

Wagons 'Acid Rain and Sugar Cane'

Ah! Three Albums in and Henry is hitting it: peaking! Right from the first track it's clear that this is gonna rock!

"And that strange man is starting a war dance, encircled by wet bodies and reaching hands..." The guitars go frantic, **Henry** does his best rockstar impression and we're away.

The gravolly baritone that was Henry Wagon's signature has opened out, and by the time we get to Track 3, "Chase the Eclipse", his vocal strength is reaching into the stadium – rock stratosphere. Bloody impressive!

There's a lot of *Nick Cave* here, but that's ok. Henry will pass through the caveman'sterritory and still has a way to go. These are rich songs with a truly kick-ass rock band: even touching on *Bowie* at his most heroic; mixing his pub-rock persona with arena anthems. These wagons are really rolling, not to mention rocking.

"Drowning at the beer barrel bar; searching the streets for love and down on his knees in the dust". Almost a U2 feel in "Search the Streets". This is a high quality album, some of the best pure rock we've heard all year. Go the Wagons!

Upper Burma. I am not a collector but I sell these amber stones to collectors or institutions after I have trimmed or cut and repolished them.

The Myanmar amber or 'Burmite' is 99 to 110 million years old and holds scientific important clues of what happened when the dinosaurs vanished about 60 million years ago. Insect inclusions in amber tell a story especially the old ones about lineage, extinction, evolution and many more unanswered questions.

I didn't know very much about amber before but when a German tourist came to my stall at the Heritage Market, and exhibited only a handful of specimens, I got hooked on to it. Rainer Ohlhoff, who was then only a Baltic amber collector, was fascinated to get his hands on my Myanmar amber inclusions. He is now my private and closest friend in regards of everything concerning amber.

At the time travelling to Myanmar was still for most visitors a daunting challenge, even more so when you would like to purchase gems, jade or the lesser known quality amber inclusions.

Since 2001 I have visited Myanmar every year mostly to catch up with my wife's family but also to follow my passion for gemstones. Myanmar is one of the highest quality gemstone producer in the world especially rubies.

Through Rainer I expended my knowledge and shortly I developed a name for my scientifically interesting amber inclusions. Just by sending my microscopic images of the amber inclusions to some of the world known entomologists landed me with respect in the field and a few times acknowledgement of having my name given to the new species.

Luckily this happened now again with the find of a new spider species, which will be scientifically described by the 'Spider Guru' – arachnologist, palaeontologist and entomologist Joerg Wunderlich in Germany, and will carry my name...(something to be decided)...-bruckschi.

Travelling Exhibitions



Lotus Flowers and Lotus Pose

Lotus pose is usually the one people think of when yoga or meditation comes to mind. For centuries pictures have captured people sitting in lotus pose to meditate. While these images make the position look comfortable and easy, it is actually quite challenging. Lotus can be hard on the knees and hips. It is important to 'grow' your lotus pose slowly with the help of sequencing to warm up the body. Yoga kids know that if they feel any pain in yoga it is important to stop. We only push our body to a comfortable maximum. Yoga must never be painful. If full lotus is not happening for you today then staying in half lotus (one leg in the pose) is just as good. So why is yoga so closely associated with lotus flowers?

The lotus flower is a symbol of non-attachment, determination and beauty. When the lotus is just a seed, it settles in the mud at the bottom of a body of water, like a river or pond. The seed germinates and slowly moves through the muddy water to the surface. Once it is at the surface of the water the bud opens into a beautiful flower that has not been stained or corrupted by the mud at all. The flower emerges from murky water but rises above it all and is not affected. Each night the flower gently closes and falls beneath the water again. In the morning the flower opens and is perfect. The muddy water cannot even wet the lotus lily pads, it rolls straight off. Lotus flowers teach us that when we begin our yoga practise we can often feel a little bit like we are stuck in the mud. Maybe we have a lot of negative thoughts about our self or we find it hard to move our body into the poses. With time and as we grow, slowly things become more clear. As we learn and practise, we become less stuck and more determined. After we have been practising yoga for a while we will become free from the mud or bad times that life can bring. Unfortunate things will still happen but they do not consume us. Like the lotus and lily pads repel the mud and water, we have become resilient and are not attached to things that don't benefit us anymore. We will be able to rise above all the confusion, bad days and negative thoughts by strengthening the mind and body through yoga. Watch as your lotus blooms. When you are practising lotus pose, sit up tall and proud. You are strong and capable. You can get through anything life throws your way.


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Influenza

Not to be confused with the common cold, Influenza (colloquially known as "the flu") is caused by a highly contagious and rapidly changing virus that is spread person to person via airborne droplets (from either coughing or sneezing) or by direct contact with nasal secretions or contaminated objects. There are three types of influenza viruses, A, B and C.

Indigenous people, the old and the very young, pregnant women and those with an underlying medical condition are likely to develop serious complications as a result of influenza. These complications can include secondary bacterial pneumonia, primary influenza pneumonia and inflammation of the brain and heart.

The flu virus has the unique ability to change its surface structure. This means the immune system might not be able to effectively fight the new version of influenza that circulates each season. For this reason it is recommended that people who are at risk of complications be immunised each year. The immunisation historically has contained three strains of the influenza virus which is predicted by the World Health Organisation. This year the trivalent combination had to be changed due to the northern hemisphere's flu season being different than predicted and to reduce the impact that these strains would have here. This year's trivalent influenza vaccine contains an influenza A / H1N1 (swine flu) - like virus, an influenza A / H3N2 - like virus, and an influenza B like virus.

Most cases of influenza occur over the late autumn to early spring period. The virus usually takes two days to start developing symptoms and for the infected individual to become contagious. However people with the flu can be contagious shortly before signs and symptoms commence and for up to a week after becoming sick.

Symptoms include; high fever, chills and sweating, sore throat, runny or stuffed nose, weakness, headache, general muscle and joint pains (in the legs and back), and a dry cough that can progress to a more severe chesty cough. These symptoms are not to be mistaken with those of the common cold which are milder and much shorter in duration.

As with the common cold, there is no cure for influenza. Once infected there is only symptomatic relief. As the flu is caused by a virus antibiotics will not work in treating the initial infection or help to shorten the duration of symptoms. Symptomatic treatment is achieved with the use of decongestants for nasal congestion, paracetamol or ibuprofen for fever, aches and pains and with increased fluid intake and rest.

Prevention is better than cure

The most important preventative measure is good hygiene. This will help reduce the chance of getting infected but also reduce your risk of spreading the infection once you're contagious. Examples include: coughing into your elbow, (rather than your hands), throwing out used tissues, avoiding close contact with infected individuals, and regular hand washing. Staying healthy also includes eating a balanced diet of nutrient rich foods, getting adequate sleep, reducing refined sugars and processed foods and reducing alcohol and toxin intake.

As we are confronted with mutating viruses our immune system is working to fight off viruses and keep our bodies healthy. People with uncompromised immunity have a better chance of fighting off infections and staying healthy throughout the cold and flu season. Building our immunity with herbs and vitamins may improve your health throughout the winter. Olive leaf extract (olea europaea) has been traditionally used to enhance the body's immune system. Olive leaf extract started to gain attention when research explored its broad antioxidant capacity. It contains many different antioxidants which are best known for their ability to neutralize free radicals in the body, most commonly caused by environmental toxins, poor diet, stress and human disease.

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Elderberry (sambucus nigra) is commonly used throughout the winter months to build immunity as it may help in the treatment of cold and flu symptoms, aches and pains, coughing and congestion. Elderberry has been shown to be effective in shortening the duration of colds and flu and reducing the severity of symptoms. Elderberry is believed to have immuno-stimulatory effects and high antioxidant activity, which is one of the reasons why it is also used throughout the winter period as a preventative.

Anyone passing through Kuranda will often see our local village 'gang' of **Bush Stone**curlews gathered near the CWA Hall. Numbering up to ten birds, they relax gregariously in the sun and eyeball passers-by with their large soulful eyes.

Further afield, locals will often see the odd curlew or at least hear the curlews' calls (best described as a cross between a scream and a baby cry) at night nearby or in the distance.

Because of this familiarity, we tend to regard the curlew as a commonplace bird, and this was indeed once the case across the mainland.

The Bush Stone-curlew is still relatively common in North Queensland. However, elsewhere in Queensland, and in southern states, it is becoming rare and is on Endangered or Threatened lists under the Threatened Species Conservation Act.

This sharp decrease in population over the last few years is of course, mainly due to predation of the ground-dwelling bird especially by foxes, dogs and cats in addition to its native predators. The ACT and areas of other southern States have even introduced breeding programs to rejuvenate curlew numbers.

Their main defence against predation is to adopt a frozen posture – which may work well with those natural predators relying mainly on sight and movement such as raptors and reptiles. When their nest is threatened, they extend their wings (up to 60cm span), and bravely charge the threat. emitting a loud hissing sound. Unfortunately many domestic dogs and cats are not easily deterred by this heroic action.

Unusual for a bird, the curlews are mainly nocturnal, resting during the day and hunting insects, spiders, frogs and small reptiles at night, and they can often be seen near outdoor lights gathering up insects.

There are conflicting reports about the longevity of the Bush Stone-curlew, with some



experts maintaining an average lifespan of four years, but others claiming recorded reports up to 16 years. We know that our two front-yard curlews were already mature and resident when we moved in, in mid 2007, so they're at least nine years old.

Some people complain about the curlew's nocturnal calls, disturbing their slumbers through the night, or drowning out the TV. We relish the sight and sound of our resident curlews, and celebrate at the arrival of a new chick, and commiserate when a chick mysteriously disappears. We worry when we don't see or hear them for a few days - then are relieved when they return 'home'. To us they have become an essential part of living in Kuranda, and hopefully breeding programs for this beautiful bird never become necessary in our part of the country.



X Marks the Spot

The St Andrew's Cross Spider (*Argiope keyserlingi*) is one of Australia's most recognisable spiders due to the very distinctive web it builds. A bright white 'X' of thickened silk sits prominently in the centre of the web, just like Saint Andrew's Cross – the national flag of Scotland. These spiders align themselves perfectly with the cross by holding all eight legs in pairs along each diagonal. Unlike the Garden Orb-weaving spiders which only sit in their webs at night, the bold St Andrew's Cross Spiders sit proudly in their webs both night and day.

The thickened area of silk which creates the cross is known as a 'stabilimentum', and is a structure made by a variety of different species of orb-weaving spiders. Some have diagonal lines, others make a bullseye-like circle, and of course some make a cross. The scientist who first studied and named the stabilimentum thought it played a role in stabilising the web, hence the name. Today however, this belief is no longer held, and it is thought that these spiders build a stabilimentum for other reasons.

Birds are a big problem for orb-weaving spiders; if they aren't trying to eat you, they are flying accidentally through your web, destroying all your hard work. It is now thought that the stabilimentum alerts birds so that they see the webs and fly around them, and deters them from eating the spider. Another remarkable role of the stabilimentum is to lure insects directly to the spider. It has been shown that the bright white silk reflects ultra-violet (UV) light, the light that attracts insects. Flying

insects see the stabilimentum and are attracted to it just as they are attracted to flowers that reflect UV.

St Andrew's Cross Spiders are very quick off the mark when prey does strike their web. As soon as the spider feels the vibration, it rushes to the source and immediately wraps the struggling insect with copious amounts of bandage-like silk. In seconds the prey is completely bound and helpless – no other group of spiders has the same speed-wrapping ability as the St Andrew's Cross Spider and its close relatives.

Like many other orb-weaving spiders, male and female St Andrew's Cross Spiders are very different in size. The males are tiny in comparison to the females, and it is thought that this may assist them in sneaking onto the web of the female without being detected and mistaken as food – a male spider's worst nightmare! They are in fact so much smaller that they look like a different species.

The eggs of these spiders are yet another example of these master weavers' skills with silk. Their eggs are encased in a number of layers of different silk – the outer layer being green. This structure is called an egg sac, and holds several hundred eggs. The egg sac is suspended nearby to the web, usually against something which hides it from predators.


Despite the bright colours that decorate these spiders, they are completely harmless to humans. They are common spiders in the wet-tropics and Kuranda residents will be very familiar with these amazing spiders making their stunning webs in their yards.

Popular German actor Daniel Brühl plays David Kern, a socially awkward waiter who works a dead end job in a chic cafe. One day he stumbles upon the biggest break of his life, an unpublished manuscript which he finds in a jammed nightstand drawer. He reads the manuscript, and thinking there might be something to it, claims it as his own in order to impress Marie, a pretty literature student who frequents the cafe. The manuscript turns out to be a lost masterpiece. Marie is quite taken with this stunning new writer, and is not content to let the hefty document go unpublished, much to David's dismay.

With David's guilty conscience nibbling away, a stranger appears – the real author of the story, Jackie

Stocker. Jackie wastes no time prying into David's life and turning his newfound fame into a living nightmare. David, unable to comprehend what is unfolding before him, must come to grips with what his deception has caused, and figure out what exactly are Jackie's plans. Will Jackie expose David as a fraud, or will he just "settle" for blackmailing him? Jackie, a shrewd con-man who recognises opportunity when he sees it, latches onto David for dear life and soon proves to be as much of a weasel as David proves to be auspicious.

Based on the novel Lila Lila by Martin Suter, the film is a story with a refreshing ending in which forgiveness and reconciliation overcome misguided intentions. It is in the end in which the perpetrator realises the error of his ways, and is afforded a chance to remain atop his perch while mending the most precious thing to him that had appeared to be broken forever.

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Inside My Studio

At first glance, local artist **Andrea Vlahovic**'s drawings bear all the hallmarks of cartoons, but Angela, always a perspective observer, takes the viewer deeper, revealing an imaginative and emotional landscape, defining connections. In a calm and single-minded focus Andrea's approach is considered and 'on course'. Her drawings are perfectly balanced and her powers of observation are extraordinary. Her insights never fail to be generous. Andrea Vlahovic's successful use of bright colour is not at all mystical, and her understanding of colour shows it is possible to incorporate into her designs a confidence based on integrity to colour tested concepts and methods.

Where is your current studio?

My studio is in my home at Speewah, providing a large space for 2–4 easels. The room is approx 6 x 10 metres which suits my every need as I work a lot on the floor. There is room for the children too, however, they do have their own areas in which to work

Do you work alone or with others?

Alone, always, as I like to let my mind 'go'. All my drawings are based on my mind and my relentless imagination. I do not copy from photographs or a still life assembled on a table. My work is all original.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Big floor space and good artificial light. I work a lot at night and I have to get close to the board. I also work a lot on the floor. I am inspired by nature and shapes and even though the landscape outside my studio is under construction with heavy machinery I can still admire the environment. I see leaves falling, butterflies and the sunlight forming shapes coming through the tall trees.

$Describe\ your\ work\ pattern-hours/days/weeks.$

It depends a lot on my feelings. Some days I can just sit for some time and then I start drawing and continue to the point where I can stop. My work is very detailed. I am then able to finish the artwork with the colours. I have to finish each artwork before I can allow myself to start another one. To me, it is similar to reading a book. You cannot start reading another book until you have finished the one you are reading.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

I describe it as contemporary 'mind blowing' art. My drawings are full of very intricate shapes and are based on geometrics and colours. I try to make them alive. I am not happy when my work is not symmetrical and balanced. I like to combine bright colours – especially fluoro colours. My designs start at a central point and expand from there. They all tell stories. My imagination tells me where and how to start and then takes me on an expanded course. I really don't have a direction when I start and make the first pen stroke on the page.

Why is drawing your chosen medium?

I choose drawing because I can sit at any time, daytime or at night and draw. I appreciate also being able to put my pen down at any stage whereas if I was painting with acrylics or oils I would have to wait for them to dry before proceeding.

List three things you listen to while working.

Firstly the quiet. Secondly, my animals in the background. Then thirdly, I listen to the news. I don't mind other background sounds but if one of the children chooses to play loud music it immediately takes over my train of thought and concentration.

What is your favourite tool?

My plastic ruler and geometry measures and shapes. I like precise shapes as my



drawing is so intricate.

How do you identify your work?

Just with my initials AV on the bottom. I do not date my work. I have not seen any other drawings like mine so my artworks are easily identifiable.

How do you sell your work?

I am not selling my artwork at this stage. I am building a portfolio. I see my designs eventually on scarves and special fabrics, but again, I am not at that stage yet.

I have a Facebook site "Andrea Vlahovic artist" and I really appreciate the feedback I receive.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No I don't. It is not possible at the moment, but I would certainly like to further down the track.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid work?

I do not have the time unfortunately. With my seven beautiful children and a menagerie of hobby farm animals including; five horses, my favourite four pigs, six goats, a pair of prize Eclectus parrots, fourteen snakes, assorted dogs and cats and many feathered friends, my time is limited. Any spare time I allocate to my drawing.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? Some more artificial light would be an advantage, but really, I am very happy with the space and design of my studio.

If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing?

I would be on my Quarter horse "Pumpkin" and together we would ride off into the sunset. I would stop when I wanted to and take a collection of photographs of my travels.



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
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NICOLE of Kuranda Markets

Our profile of this month is of Nicole Whybrow, a very well known marketeer in Kuranda since first coming here in 1981. You may well have seen her in the local markets at different times selling different things. She has in this time become somewhat of a Kuranda identity.

She was born in Melbourne. Her father passed away when she was quite young and her mother remarried. Her step-father was a pioneer film maker and commercial producer. She attended a Grammar School in that city. After school she travelled to London with her Mum and stayed on working casually. From that first journey she acquired the travel bug which has stayed with her ever since. She returned to Australia by the overland route.

Back in Australia she opened a leather shop in Melbourne. But it wasn't that long

Later she had another shop selling juices, decaf coffee and wraps. She carried on her juice business in the Heritage Markets until about 2001.

For about six years Nicole looked after her sick mother and did not have a stall. When her mother passed away, she liked the work Malcolm and Gina had done renovating the original markets so she opened a woman-made jewellery stall for a while with Suzie, Linda and Jan. This was followed by another shop with Suzie and Linda called '3 Crows'. Then Nicole opened a second shop opposite the other one called "Bizzare", selling clothing and other items. She is still to be found there most days. She loves the markets and enjoys the good company.

Her son Gopal passed away four years ago at 38 years of age. He had been a visitor to Thailand so Nicole decided to continue that connection. She goes up to Thailand at least once a year, supporting a family there and paying for their children to go to school. Gopal's ashes were spread in Thailand.

Nicole enjoys living in Kuranda. She regrets some aspects of the development of Kuranda, particularly when it involves the chopping down of trees, but otherwise sees the development of the Village as a good thing. In her spare time she gardens, listens to music and generally enjoys the natural environment. She also spends time with her step-father down on the coast.

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
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Two Prawns

A History of Kuranda Rail by Ivana Andacic

Construction was by three separate contracts for lengths of (hapter 5 Construction was by three separate contracts for lengths of 13.2 km, 24.5 km, 37.4 km. The line was to total 75.1 km and surmount the vast Atherton Tablelands leading to Mareeba.

Sections and Three were relatively easy to locate and construct. But the ascent of Section Two, Cairns to Kuranda extremely arduous and dangerous due to steep grades, dense jungle, ticks, venomous snakes and jungle fevers!

Section One of the line ran from Cairns to just beyond Redlynch. The contract was won by Mr.P.C. Smith for \$40,000.

However, work was dogged by bad luck and a possible lack of supervision. Sickness was prevalent amongst the navvies and the working conditions in the swamps were approaching unbearable.

In November 1886, P.C. Smith relinquished his contract for Section One. It was taken over by McBride and Co., but they too had packed it in by January 1887. Section One was finally completed by the Queensland Government.

The area we are describing is where Stratford and Freshwater is situated today.

During construction of Section One, Cairns to Kuranda railway line was plagued by malaria, it was then that a famous pioneer of the north, Dr Edward Koch,

made a fever mixture for the sick.


His fever remedy and preventative measures helped to keep malaria under control in the late nineteenth century.

Even with Dr Koch's fever mixture, a number of men died and it is rumoured that the territory was so rough that some of them were buried under the foundations of the Cairns to Kuranda railway line.

Even the horses used to carry goods became so bogged they had to be shot and left to sink in the mud.


Dr Edward Koch memorial is now proudly displayed at Anzac Memorial Park which is situated on the corner of the Esplanade and Spence Street.





On January 21st 1887, John Robb's tender of \$580,188 was accepted for Section Two. He and his men tackled the jungle and mountains not with bulldozers, jackhammers and other modern equipment, but with strategy, fortitude, hand tools, dynamite, buckets and bare hands. Great escarpments were removed from the mountains above the line and every loose rock and overhanging tree had to be removed by hand. It was during this type of work that the first fatal accident occurred. At Beard's Cutting, a man named Gavin Hamilton stood on the wrong side of a log as it was being rolled in a fire, and was killed.

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
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Today, pets are being treated more like 'one of the family' than ever before. The rewards of owning a dog are well documented and children in particular benefit immensely from sharing their lives with a pooch. More than being a simple playmate, pets aid childhood development in a myriad of ways; from boosting the child's immune system, to reducing childhood obesity to increasing the child's self-esteem, nurturing and social skills.

Millions of homes around the world are shared by dogs and kids and it's amazing that dogs get along with children as well as they do. Many canines seem to understand that kids should be treated differently, with gentleness and tolerance. Unfortunately sometimes child-dog interactions not only end in tears, but in tragedy.

Expecting dogs and kids to get along without adult direction, training and supervision can be a recipe for disaster. Approximately 70 per cent of all dog bites occur in or around the home and are from a dog familiar to the child. A potentially dangerous situation can develop in mere seconds and more than half of all dog bites are related to innocent activities such as playing, cuddling and feeding a dog. Sadly, the most at risk age group is the under five-year-olds. It's hard for us to fathom why our once trusted companion would bite a child. Understanding what drives a dog to bite a little person is key.

Not all dogs are willing to tolerate absolutely anything a child does. Sometimes young children can be rough and unrelenting. According to the Royal Children's Hospital in Melbourne, a child's high pitched scream and uncoordinated attempt at showing affection may cause a dog to feel threatened and it may act defensively or trigger a chase response. With around 13,000 people each year attending hospital emergency departments in Australia for dog bite injuries, the Royal Children's Hospital has some sound advice:

- 1. Always supervise children when a dog is nearby (remember to reward both the child and the dog when they behave correctly)
- 2. Discourage rough, inappropriate play
- 3. Never let a child tease a dog
- 4. Teach children to call you rather than remove or reclaim a toy from a dog
- 5. Teach children not to approach a dog that is eating or gnawing on a bone
- 6. Teach children not to disturb a sleeping dog
- 7. Provide the dog with a bed that is separated from noisy high-activity areas. Veterinarian, Dr Sophia Yin suggests parents teach both their dogs and children to be polite to each other. She also stresses that as tempting as it may be, dogs don't like being hugged or climbed upon. If a dog chooses to be left alone, it should be allowed to do so.

Most dogs end up bonding strongly with children in their family and are both friend and protector. With proper guidance and supervision you can help your dog and your child develop a safe and fulfilling friendship.



What is Freemasonry?

For those readers who have stayed with this article through the previous months we now reach the final stage for the brother going through his three degrees to reach a Master Mason.

The Third Degree, or having been raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason, is the culmination of a brother's symbolic journey in Craft Masonry. As a Master Mason, he will be urged to perform his allotted task while it

is yet day.

As we go through life we are constantly reminded of the certainty of death, yet we rarely connect it with ourselves. The ceremony through which the brother has passed dramatically reminds masons as it does all of us that, although we make plans for the future, death may come for any one of us, at the least expected time.

It also shows us that, at the last day, in death, all ranks are levelled, and distinctions swept away. The ceremony of the Third Degree forcibly reminds us not only of our demise, but that Freemasons are men of trust and honour, care for their fellow man.


The brother taking the third step will during the ceremony have been reminded of various aspects of his first and second degrees with the addition of one major act. It is then pointed out to him that although he has reached a superior position in the Craft it calls on him to afford assistance and instruction to Brethren in the other Degrees.

In last month's article Religion was briefly touched on and the writer gave the undertaking to cover Freemasonry and Religion this month. Freemasonry is not a religion, nor is it a substitute for religion. It has no theological doctrines, offers no sacraments and does not claim to lead to salvation. There is no "new" expression of religion that a member must subscribe to, apart from admitting to a belief in a "Supreme Being". A member's concept of a "Supreme

Being" is undefined; it is left to the individual to preserve his own understanding according to his own religious traditions.

There is nothing whatsoever in being a Freemason that conflicts with a member's religious beliefs and practices. Therefore, men from all religions, whether they be Christian, Jewish, Muslim or Hindu for example, come together in a Lodge, confident in the thought that they have a common shared foundation. This common belief is the basis of the Masonic brotherhood. Freemasonry admits men of all religions who believe that there is one God and reminds them that they should base their

life and morals on the teachings of Him as revealed in the Sacred Writings of their own individual faith or religion. In the Lodge discussion of religion and politics is forbidden as such discussions can easily lead to argument. The essential tolerance and respect of Freemasonry is that men might meet together in peace, love and harmony.



Later, when the Lodge was taken into places like India by the British Army lodges, the courtesy of tolerance was extended to other major religions, provided a man was able to express his faith in a "Supreme Being". When it is remembered that in history many wars and persecution have been caused by religious bigotry, as is visible in the world today, it is time that mankind gives heed to the vision of Freemasonry that allows tolerance of another man's religion while not compromising his own.

Is Freemasonry compatible with Christianity? To be incompatible means to be opposed in character or discordant. If

Freemasonry were incompatible with Christianity, then the teachings and principles of Freemasonry are opposed to, and at variance with, Christianity. In the First Degree, the Master of the Lodge assures the new candidate that in Freemasonry "there will be found nothing incompatible with your moral, civil or religious duties". Broadly speaking the moral duty of both Christian and Freemason is to offer charity to a fellow man.

In conclusion it is the hope of Freemasons that under the Fatherhood of God they might bring about the Brotherhood of man, that each Freemason might so regulate his life and actions by the principles of morality and truth, and learn to limit his desires, so that he may live respected and die regretted.

Barbed-wire fencing causes the deaths of thousands of native animals every year. Although flying-foxes are particularly susceptible to barbed-wire entrapment, gliders, possums and birds also frequently encounter the deadly barbs.

Any compassionate person seeing such a stricken animal will want to help. Often well-intentioned people will attempt to free an animal themselves. This, however, can be counter-productive. Often further injury is caused to the animal, resulting in longer periods in rehabilitative care or even rendering the animal unreleasable or requiring euthanasia.

Any animal trapped on barbed-wire fencing will be distressed and may bite or scratch in self-defence. Do not attempt barbed-wire rescues yourself, call Wildlife Rescue for help or Batreach if you're in the Kuranda region.

Wildlife carers are vaccinated and experienced in dealing with barbed-wire rescues. Usually two people are required – one to wrap and restrain, the other to disentangle the animal. It is imperative that tissue such as the wing membranes of flying-foxes and gliders not be cut. Often, by patiently untwisting the animal, it can be freed from the barbs with minimal damage and released back to the wild with only a brief time in care.

Salvation Army Financial Counselling: A financial counsellor from Salvation Army will come to KNC (when there is demand) on Wednesday mornings to see people who are experiencing financial difficulties with debts, debilitating contracts, high interest loans or other problems that are causing financial stress. Again, all sessions are strictly confidential and appointments can be made by calling KNC on 4093 8933 and asking for Ceri or Marg.

Budget 2015-16: The 2015-16 Annual Budget will be handed down on Wednesday 3 June. Obviously, I cannot give details until after that date, however I can say that the Budget places Council in a sound financial position for the coming year and future years, without creating major burden on ratepayers.

Qld Treasury "Report Card": Qld Treasury has audited the financial sustainability of de-amalgamated Councils to see how things are tracking. QTC has given MSC a good report card. The rating is now "moderate to neutral", which is a great result. Council has had to make some tough decisions over the past 18 months but this has built a solid financial position for the shire. Council is continuing to look at ways to reduce costs by finding better ways of doing business and providing for effective services.

Federal Grant for Mareeba Sewerage Treatment Plant: Recently, Council was successful in their application for a grant of \$6 million from the Federal Government "Stronger Regions" funding for assistance in renewing the Mareeba Sewerage Treatment Plant. This is good news for ratepayers in Mareeba. In addition, Council has also received a State Government grant of \$1.2 mill for the first stage of the redevelopment of the Sewerage Treatment Plant in Mareeba.

MSC Planning Scheme: Good progress is being made on the development of the new MSC Planning Scheme. Council has already had a number of workshops to discuss the Planning Scheme. There will be further public consultation and input and the Overlays will be reviewed. Completion and submission of the final draft of the Planning Scheme is anticipated for early- mid 2016.

Mareeba Airport: In late April, Council was granted \$13 million from the Qld Govt Royalties for Regions Fund, for the redevelopment of the Mareeba Airport. Council plans to develop the airport as the second regional airport for Far North Queensland, involving flight training for both fixed wing and rotary wing aircraft and a major centre for general aviation maintenance activities. This funding has come and gone a couple of times over the past few years, but this time it is here to be spent!

Koah Community BBQ Monday 4th May: A large number of Koah residents attended the recent BBQ meeting and a small group is now working together to arrange an AGM and get the Koah Hall up and running again.

Redevelopment of Therwine Street: Community consultation has now been completed and the final design for the Therwine Street redevelopment has been approved by Council. The design is now on display at three locations in Kuranda: Post Office, Foodworks, Library. Works are expected to commence later this year and will be managed to minimise disruption to businesses and visitors to the Village.

New Water Reservoir: Good progress is being made in the construction of the new one megalitre water reservoir in Kuranda. This will enable greater water storage capacity and is funded by State Government grant funding of \$772,000.

Road Re-seal program: Residents will have noticed a number of local roads and streets being re-sealed recently. This is part of a regular program for re-sealing roads to extend their life. The program is not an asphalt upgrade or road reconstruction.

Speewah Bridge: Design work is underway for the new bridge at Speewah and construction will commence within the next few months. The completion date was anticipated as 31 August, however this may extend a little. A grant from the federal government will fund half the cost of the new bridge.

New "Taggle" Water Meters: Council has begun implementing the new "taggle" water meters on each property. Stage 1 (Mareeba town) is already operating and Stage 2 (Kuranda) will be implemented over the next few months. A small green meter will be attached to your current water meter and the technology will enable close monitoring of water usage. Water leaks will be immediately detected and Council will be able to advise residents of any leaks as soon as they occur (even those "hidden" leaks). The system will bring savings as Council will be able to conduct water meter reading without having to travel to each property. It will also provide an exact meter reading when a property is sold. The system will eventually have the capability to allow residents to individually monitor their daily usage.

Wheelie Bins: Council is also working towards using technology (a chip reader on each bin) to ensure correct wheelie bin collection. A few helpful tips about your wheelie bin: One bin per property/no extra bins will be collected; bins will only be collected from properties that pay for the service; bins are allocated to a particular property, so please don't take your bin with you if you move house; Overloaded bins cannot be collected (make sure that the bin is not "overflowing" and the lid completely closed); if your bin is broken/damaged you can request a new one. If you have any questions, please phone Council at 1300 308 461.

Great Wheelbarrow Race May 15-17: The annual Wheelbarrow Race was again a great success with nearly \$300,000 raised for charities.



Great Wheelbarrow Race 2015

THE twelfth annual Great Wheelbarrow Race has raised a jaw-dropping \$243,300 for charity, making the total raised in the past two years well over the one million dollar mark.

"That is a magnificent result and a great effort. The event is unique in that it benefits all the communities along the Wheelbarrow Way, while catering to so many different charities," organising committee chairman Councillor Nipper Brown said.

"We had 54 teams enter this year, and added a social category, which had ten teams enter. When we totalled up the funds raised, again we were blown away by the outcome.

"And the icing on the cake is that this year's event was conducted in high spirits by everyone who took part and everyone pulled up pretty healthy in the end."

Councillor Brown said the three-day event, which took competitors from Mareeba to Chillagoe in the footsteps of the district's pioneers, had set an extremely high benchmark.

"Even the weather held out," he said.

The competitive side of the event saw outstanding efforts turned in.

"We had records set all over the place. In the overall category the Bad Boys broke the overall record by 49 minutes, coming in to Chillagoe in 6hrs.25mins.44sec," he said.

"The High school category record was broken by Nudgee College in a time of 7hrs.08mins.45sec, averaging a cracking 20 kilometres per hour and breaking the record by 11 minutes," Cr Brown said.

I have to commend all of the competitors, their support teams, event volunteers and the organising committee."

"Much of the preparation goes unseen but this weekend has shown the benefits of all the training, planning and organisation that has consumed so much time in the preceding weeks and months."




"The benchmark has now been set at a very high level for next year's race but I am sure the region is up to the challenge," Cr Brown said.

UNCERTAIN TIMES AHEAD WEATHERWISE

El Nino threatens, with forecasts of drought or floods. Right here in Kuranda it has been unseasonably dry with only a small amount of rain recently - enough to wash down the leaves and keep the grass green. We all know what's happened in the past, but what's to come? Should you plant? The answer is yes, if you can keep water up to them. Native plants will withstand mild dry conditions better than most exotics. However, some of the more invasive exotic weeds, like Ardisia with its mass of brilliant red berries (you may have some in your garden which you didn't plant there) seem to tolerate whatever nature throws at them. Please watch out for this weed. Bring a sample to the nursery if in doubt and we'll identify it for you. Be careful not to drop fruit when removing the bush.

Stamping out the Tramp Ants – update

Our Yellow Crazy Ant (YCA) infestation within Russett Park area has spread to more properties since it was first assessed over 18 months ago. The recommended

poisoned bait is giving some people cause for concern and it's very important to take a cautious approach. Information is being gathered from other projects in the world, where YCA infestations have been treated and controlled.

So what options?

To do nothing is to witness elimination of our local wildlife as the colonies grow to reach swarm point and consume all small invertebrates; lizards, snails, frogs, chicks in the area. Google videos showing how these swarms behave.

The colonies on several properties in Russett Park are near that stage, with no small wildlife present now. The real danger is that without containment the YCAs spread across our region and become an irreversible problem.

To use a biological control against the invader is definitely the Holy Grail solution of any pest control but we're not there for YCAs. Meanwhile we have *an* effective knock down bait whose active ingredient is fipronil.

We have the chance to knock down this Russett Park infestation and stop its spread while a biological control is developed.

Sugar and protein lures are used to locate the ants and fipronil treatments are only applied where the ants are found.

If you've been stung badly in your garden or yard by an ant-like insect, please ring for a free yard check on 13 25 23.

Improving Water Quality

Water is vital for healthy eco systems and a resource we cannot live without. When our water is polluted it is not only devastating to the environment, but also to human health.

Things we can all do to improve water quality in our local urban and rural residential creeks:

- 1. Address erosion issues on your stream banks by planting native species to minimise soil wash off and filter sediments washing away to the Great Barrier
- 2. Mulch or compost lawn clippings as this minimises the need for fertilisers. Less fertilizer on your lawn means less fertilizer in the water.
- 3. Reduce storm water runoff from your property. Runoff is excess water that washes the grass clippings, leaves, fertilizer and other "pollutants" from lawns, sidewalks and driveways, carrying them into our water system. To reduce runoff, direct downspouts onto your lawn not onto hard surfaces.
- 4. Use native plants; remove invasive, non-native plants.

Landscaping with local native plants improves our local ecosystem. Local native plants are adapted to our environment and climate and are tolerant of both drought and tough winters. This drought tolerance means no need for excessive watering and, therefore, less runoff.

Local native plants are also adapted to our soils and, thus, don't need fertilizers or pesticides. This means less maintenance for you.

And, because native plants have deeper root systems (which create more air space in the soil), they accommodate water infiltration which, in turn, reduces

Finally, local native plants also provide better habitat for local wildlife.





A Thought for May

HIS month's Bible reading is from St Luke's Gospel Chapter 24 verses 46-53. This is the last encounter with the Jesus which Luke gives us. Jesus has appeared to them as they are gathered together, still awed, still rather frightened, and still unsure because they are experiencing something too wonderful to believe easily, just as it is too wonderful for us to believe easily two thousand years later.

Jesus is speaking to them, trying to meet them at ease, trying to explain the great mystery which they are now all involved in for the rest of their lives.

"The Christ should suffer and rise." That is the central event for all Christians. That is the beginning of everything. Without those two events in time and history, you and I would not be communicating with one another on this page at this moment. The worldwide family of Jesus Christ would not exist.

This suffering and dying and rising are not merely another telling of a universal myth. Rather, the universal myth of dying and rising is the searching in every time and culture to express what this event made actual in time and place.

"Repentance and forgiveness of sins should be preached." Why? Because if these events are true, then something wonderful follows. If human nature has been used by God as the means of God's being in the world, then that same human nature, in spite of its being flawed, in spite of its sinfulness, has been transformed.

The potential of God is within it, and the good news for you and me is that you and I share that very human nature. Our human nature, the poor stubborn thing we battle with and sometimes detest, has been used by God to be in the world in Jesus. If you and I can truly believe this, it turns around our view of ourselves. That's what it means to repent. It means to be turned around, to face in another direction, to journey toward God instead of away from God. Also, if God has used and transformed the human nature we share, then you and I have been forgiven what we are. God has forgiven us or accepted us as we are.

"You are witnesses of these things." We were sharing recently the fact that a witness in the Bible is not merely someone who sees something. It means having your life affected by what you have discovered. Jesus wants us to be changed by encountering him. Jesus Christ is not just a fascinating object of thought and philosophy.

Jesus is a change agent in our lives. To be changed by our encounter with him is to be "clothed with power from on high." That does not mean power in the sense of a "power trip." It means that we are put in touch with a source of grace for our daily living. That was the good news for Our Lord's disciples on that hill of ascension.

To believe that God in Jesus Christ has used our human nature to be in the world is to have our own nature transformed.
